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

Texas AG looking into time share operation

The Ruidoso Condo Share Vacation Club again has been connected with questionable business practices, this time by the Texas Attorney General's Office Consumer Protection Division.

The Attorney General's office has filed in Texas District Court a petition against J.V. Marketing Enterprises, a business endeavor of Jim and Pamela Vincent. According to Lee McDaniel, the petition lists several questionable business practices in which J.V. Marketing Enterprises has allegedly engaged.

McDaniel, an investigator for the Attorney General's Office, said the Vincents agreed to a 10-day temporary restraining order, pending the results of the District Court hearing of the petition, scheduled for Thursday, August 9.

According to McDaniel, the restraining order restricts the Vincents from concealing any company records and from marketing any memberships in the Ruidoso Condo Share Vacation Club until a number of liens are cleared up that are pending against the Ruidoso property.

Jim Vincent was convicted in a time share-related case December 16, 1983, in New Mexico's 12th District Court of two counts of fraud over \$2,500, two counts of criminal solicitation, one count of criminal conspiracy, one count of sale of unregistered securities, and one count of securities fraud in connection with his activities as manager of the club. Pam Vincent, his wife, was also charged in the case, but was found innocent on all charges.

Jim Vincent was sentenced February 21 by District Judge Robert Doughty to a total of 13 and a half years of incarceration in the New Mexico State Penitentiary for his convictions, of which all but 12 months was suspended.

Doughty specified that the time would be suspended only on certain conditions, including the condition that Vincent serve five years of probation, that he not hold or apply for a license to sell land, time shares or securities, and that he obtain and retain employment in a field in which he

is not involved in sales of any kind and does not have direct contact with consumers, subject to the approval of his parole officer.

According to McDaniel, however, because Vincent is appealing his New Mexico conviction, the terms of his sentence do not apply until his last appeal is finalized.

McDaniel said the Texas Attorney General's petition also charges J.V. Enterprises with failure to disclose to customers that a "free" vacation to New Mexico actually includes a high-pressure sales pitch.

In addition, the petition charges that the company fails to disclose to customers that about \$90,000 in tax and judgment liens have been filed against the Ruidoso property the time shares are sold to, of which over \$9,000 is a lien by the Internal Revenue Service, according to McDaniel.

"This is totally unsound for the selling of time shares," McDaniel said of the liens. She pointed out that the company is selling 40-year time shares for property that could be foreclosed on at any time.

Complaints from Austin residents apparently initiated the Attorney General's Office petition.

Contacted in Austin Friday, Jim Vincent said the Attorney General's Office petition merely asks for measures that will help to properly "take care of the membership" of the vacation club.

"It's all very understandable," he said of the petition.

In response to the allegations of the Attorney General's Office, Pam Vincent released a prepared statement, excerpts of which follow.

"We're removing all liens re-

quested from the condos used by members in our time-share program," the statement reads. "We are in the process of having an instrument filed for the protection of current and future members and we are working with the Texas Attorney General's Office for the protection of our customers, which has always been our concern."

"We would also like to publicly state that all members have been receiving everything that has been promised and have been for 18 months," the statement continues.

"And as Christians, we would like to ask forgiveness from those who we could have possibly hurt in any way as we forgive those who might have hurt us," the statement concludes.

"We agreed that those are things that need to be taken care of," Jim Vincent said of the terms of the temporary restraining order. Pam Vincent indicated that she would be taking out a loan to pay off two judgment liens by Wednesday, August 8.

She also stated that a court date has been set in an attempt to have those judgment liens vacated.

"We believe in what we're doing," she said. "We have over 100 members and they believe in us, we're obligated to them."

Jim Vincent went on to defend the past activities of the condo share operation in Ruidoso.

"It is not a fraudulent practice," he said. "We've done nothing to Ruidoso except to spend money there. We're not trying to hurt anybody."

The results of the Thursday hearing will certainly shed much light on the future of the Ruidoso Condo Share Vacation Club.

July building permits average value up

Building permits for the month of July totaled 45, valued at \$4,850,878 - the lowest number of permits issued in a month so far during the summer season. However, the average value of the July permits exceeds both those of May and June, since 58 permits valued at \$5,073,235 were issued in May and 67 permits valued at \$3,775,134 were issued in June.

The yearly total is 343 permits, valued at \$25,299,694.

The permits break down like this: For single-family dwellings (SFDs), 17 were issued, valued at \$1,717,164, bringing the yearly total to 173 issued valued at \$14,177,653.

For residential additions and alterations, 19 were issued in July, valued at \$180,512. That brings the yearly total to 95 issued, value \$1,165,907.

For commercial buildings, three were issued, valued at \$357,270, bringing the yearly total to 33 issued, value \$4,607,074.

For demolitions, one permit was issued with a valuation of \$8,125. That brings the total for the year to four permits issued, value \$19,815.

Five permits for the construction of apartments and condominiums were issued with a valuation of \$2,587,797, bringing the yearly total to 16 issued, value \$4,321,909.

Generalissimo rewards his fans

Generalissimo, running as a 2-1 second favorite, ran aggressively through the stretch and scored a half-length victory in Sunday's \$45,024 Rio Grande Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The six-furlong sprint for New Mexico-breds was worth \$22,512 to the winning owner, and breeder, Glen M. Cox of Lenora, Texas. Mike Lidberg was in the saddle.

Earlier on the program, there was a highpoint of a different sort as the Pic-Six wagering—riddled with longshots—failed to produce a six-win ticket. This set up a hefty carryover of \$31,509 for Wednesday's Pic-Six wagering.

But Mr. and Mrs. D.C. Woodruff of Brock, Texas, still managed to hit it big in the Pic-Six. The two wound up with the only five-win ticket, and collected \$10,846.60 in the consolation.


In the Rio Grande (run on a muddy track), Generalissimo got off to a brisk start in fourth place and gradually improved his position. Most of the pace was set by the 6-1 shot, Polly Smoke, ridden by Larry Chavez.

Mels' Christian, (9-2), purchased for only \$1,500 in the 1983 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings, settled in second place.

In the upper stretch, Generalissimo—a gelding by Ross The Boss out of My Spanish Lady—accelerated sharply. Polly Smoke fought gamely but could not hold off the winner. Mels' Christian, ridden by Darrell Blevins, finished third.

Generalissimo returned waging payoffs of \$6.40, \$3.80 and \$3. His record now stands at 2-1-0 from five starts. The Rio Grande was negotiated in 1:14 4/5 seconds. M. Dooley Guinn is the winning trainer.

Polly Smoke, a late supplemental nominee into the trials at a cost of \$2,500, earned \$9,905. The payoffs: \$6.20, \$4.60. Polly Smoke is owned by

James Haworth and Norbert Pohl of Albuquerque.

Mels' Christian, the property of Jo Mann of Coleman, Texas, banked \$5,402 and handed out a show price of \$4.

Ruidoso fans made Latin Star the favorite at 9-5, but the filly was unable to mount a serious bid after taking

over fifth place. She wound up fourth, earning \$2,701.

The remaining order of finish: 5th - Draconic's Cap, earning \$1,800; 6th - Aquaconic, \$900; 7th - Zaminder, \$900; 8th - Nachtleider, \$900; 9th - Gaelic Sam, no purse money earned. Jeep Dancer was scratched.

Racing resumes Wednesday at 1

p.m. with the first of three straight days of first-round All-American Futurity trials.

Sgt Pepper Feature 'on'

Sgt Pepper Feature, the 10th richest quarter horse of all time, rallied out of third place for a driving neck victory in Saturday's Big Profit Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The sprint covered 550 yards and offered a purse of \$11,575.

Sgt Pepper Feature was made a 9-2 shot in his fourth outing of the meeting and collected \$6,954. That hiked his career income up to \$86,493. Tim Williams was in the saddle.

Coda Mundi, off at just under 3-1, grabbed an early lead but Sgt Pepper Feature wasn't far behind. Truckle Wings, the lukewarm favorite as 5-2, moved well out of fourth place to challenge for the lead at mid-stretch.

Sgt Pepper Feature took the lead from Truckle Wings on the outside. The winning time, on a good track and against a headwind, was 27.36

seconds.

Sgt Pepper Feature, a former stakes star on the West Coast (the gelding is now six years old), is leased by W.C. Chaney of Midland, Texas. The trainer is Leo D. Wood.

Fans who backed the gelding collected mutual payoffs of \$11, \$4.60, \$4.40. Sgt Pepper Feature is by the quarter horse, Truckle Feature (who holds the 440-yard records at both Ruidoso and Sunland Park), out of the thoroughbred mare, Marketina (still co-holder of Sunland's two-furlong record) by Tom Neff.

Truckle Wings, ridden by Steve Harris, earned \$2,546 for second and returned payoffs of \$4, \$3.40. The gelding appeared to run out of wind while pulling up in the backstretch, and collapsed.

Truckle Wings was later revived, and seemed okay, but jockey Harris was taken by track ambulance to

Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Truckle Wings returned \$4, \$3.40. Coda Mundi finished third, returning \$1,157. The show payoff: \$3.80.

For the fourth straight day, no fan was able to get six winners in the Pic-Six Saturday's Consolation Pic-Six produced five five-win tickets, each paying \$1,730.60.

Black Jack Mack takes his revenge

Black Jack Mack got his vengeance on Groton Going in Friday's \$9,400 Futurity Prep Handicap at six furlongs.

Ruidoso Downs patrons evidently felt Black Jack Mack was in for an uphill battle and made him a 6-1 shot. But Groton Going, gunning for his fifth straight win (and his third straight stakes conquest), was bet down to a 3-5 favorite.

The betting public was also swayed in Groton Going's favor by the fact that he had trounced Black Jack Mack by nearly 10 lengths in his last-out conquest of the Pocket Coin Handicap at Ruidoso.

But it was obviously a different ballgame in Friday's off-track going in the Futurity Prep. Black Jack Mack, ridden by Joe Martinez for Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, was right at home on the surface listed as good. The colt accelerated sharply during the backstretch run and left the eager filly, Old Broad, struggling in his wake.

Groton Going, who likes to take the lead and hold it, did not seem to appreciate the off-track conditions. He was third (under Salustio Burgos in the top load of 124 pounds) early in the backstretch run.

At the turn for home, Groton Going moved up willingly under a hand ride and reached a near even position with the rail-hugging Black Jack Mack.

The real running began in the upper stretch, and when Jockey Martinez

gave Black Jack Mack a few right-handed whacks with the whip, the issue was quickly settled. Black Jack Mack pulled away sharply and cruised under the wire with a five-length lead in a clocking of 1:16 1/5 seconds.

The colt, by Barrera out of Affecting (he was bred in Kentucky), earned \$5,640, which pushed his career earnings to \$23,533. His record now stands at 3-0-1 from six starts. William F. Leach, Ruidoso's leading trainer, handles Black Jack Mack.

Fans who had supported Black Jack Mack collected \$15.80, \$4.40, \$3.40. The colt enjoyed a big pull in weights from Groton Going, carrying 115 pounds.

Groton Going, a \$10,000 acquisition in the 1983 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings, earned \$2,068, and this hiked his total earnings to \$64,399. The tote payoffs: \$2.80, \$2.80.

Groton Going is owned by Bob Haynsworth of El Paso and Edwin Mayer Jr. of San Angelo.

Fair Grecian Lady, an 18-1 outsider owned by Philbert Richardson of Ruidoso, hauled 114 pounds to a third-place finish (under Manuel Toquinto) and earned \$940. The show payoff: \$7.80.

The Futurity Prep was jockey Martinez' fourth win of the afternoon. Earlier, he won on Score (\$7.80), Sexy Socialite (\$9.60), Hard And Bold (\$11).

Kauai Kannon booms

Kauai Kannon took a hike in class for Thursday's seven-furlong headliner, went off at odds of nearly 7-1, and fought gamely for a head victory.

The gelding was ridden by Pedro Benitez for Grady D. Hopper of Dallas.

In his previous start, Kauai Kannon faced easier company and won by more than seven lengths as a 24-1 longshot. But Ruidoso fans evidently felt the 10-grand claiming competition in Thursday's headliner was a bit steep for the six-year-old gelding.

Kauai Kannon proved them wrong, grabbing a three-length lead at the

start of the muddy journey, then refusing to give in to the 5-2 shot Yet Time when that one launched a prolonged stretch challenge.

Kauai Kannon was clocked in 1:26 2/5 seconds and returned \$15.60, \$5.40, \$3.40. Yet Time, piloted by Carlos Rivas, refunded \$3.60 to place, \$2.60 to show. Spy's Delight, an 8-5 favorite handled by Kenny Lewis, wound up third. The show price was \$2.80.

Thursday's Pic-Six wagering proved to be a tough nut to crack. There were no six-win tickets. It took four winners to score in Thursday's Pic-Six Consolation, and each of such 30 tickets returned \$116.00.

Over the weekend, the two were at Ruidoso, and decided to take a chance on Sunday's Pic-Six wagering. They spent \$10 in an attempt to string together six winners in the fifth through 10th races.

This crack at getting six straight winners was a failure. But they did get five winners, and the result was a handsome Pic-Six consolation payoff

of \$10,846.60.

Much of the credit for this success goes to Mrs. Woodruff, who said she burned the midnight oil the night before. "I got two of those five winners from a handicapping column in an El Paso newspaper, called 'Ruidoso Sam'. The others, I picked myself. I really don't have a system. I play by names, where the horses are from, the names of the jockeys and trainers—a combination of things."

Mr. Woodruff had a more direct explanation of their success: "just mark it off to Lady Luck."

A-A Futurity trials this week

The first step toward the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity will be taken Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs as first-round elimination trials get underway.

The first-round will cover 12-race programs on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Each race in the period will be a 440-yard dash for All-American hopefuls.

Those finishing in the top three in each race will advance into the All-American time trials on August 22. At that point, the clock comes back into play—and those 10 hanging up the fastest times will meet in the televised Labor Day finale, aiming at that fabulous victory purse of \$1 million.

The All-American Futurity is the culminating event—and the richest—in the Triple Crown series for two-year-olds.

The turf weekend in the cool pines extends through Sunday, as usual. Saturday's program is topped by the \$15,000-added Ruidoso Sprint Championship (for three-year-olds and up) at six furlongs, plus the 440-yard elimination trials for the \$500,000 (estimated) All-American Gold Cup. The Gold Cup is the exclusive domain of four-year-olds.

On Sunday is the \$12,000-added Three Bars Handicap at 870 yards, plus the \$29,121 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby at one mile.

First post through Saturday is the usual 1 p.m., but Sunday's program begins at 12:15 p.m. (That same early starting time will be in effect each Sunday for the rest of the season.)

The highpoint of Wednesday's card figures to surface in the second race, as the outstanding filly, Miss Mitedo, launches her All-American dream out of the number five post. Larry Byers will be at the helm.

Miss Mitedo, owned by J.W. Ham of Odessa, Texas, caught the attention of the quarter horse world during the spring portion of the last Sunland Park meeting. She won her trial heat for the \$192,547 West Texas Futurity by two lengths as an 11-1 shot. In the 330-yard finale on March 25, she was made the people's choice at 2-1 and flashed to a half-length win and collected \$67,391. That also put her career record at three wins against no defeats. (Before shipping to Sunland, she had won her debut against allowance company on the Texas non-pari-mutuel circuit.)

Heavenly, the upset winner of the \$776,620 Rainbow Futurity, launches her All-American Futurity bid on Thursday at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, owned by Roy Browning of Fort Worth, surged into quarter horse prominence with a blockbuster 1 1/4-length win in the 400-yard Rainbow.

First place in the middle jewel of the Triple Crown for two-year-olds was worth \$276,059. The filly raced as a 21-1 outsider with Steve Harris at the helm.

On Thursday, Heavenly (by All-American Futurity winner, Pie In The Sky) will explode out of the number seven post in the eighth race.

Thursday's program is the second of three straight days of first-round elimination trials for the \$2,500,000 All-American Futurity. Those finishing in the top three in each trial heat will advance into the All-American time trials on August 22. On that day, the clock becomes a factor—and those hanging up the 10 fastest times will meet in the Labor Day finale. The winner of the All-American Futurity collects a staggering \$1 million.

Weekend action at Ruidoso continues through Sunday, culminating with the \$29,121 Ruidoso Derby at a mile. First post through Saturday is 1 p.m. All Sunday programs for the rest of the meeting begin at 12:15 p.m.

Heavenly began her racing career in Oklahoma, finishing second (by a head) in her first two starts. At Ruidoso, she won her trial heat for the \$605,384 Kansas Futurity by two lengths and qualified for the Consolation. She wound up seventh.

Magic hours crowd Lincoln

"One magic hour ..." was how the narrator started the "Last Escape of Billy The Kid" pageant Friday night at Lincoln. Indeed, it was magical, but it was more than one hour. The festivities Friday night were just the beginning of the Old Lincoln Days weekend.

A sharp half-moon and scattered stars brightened the evening of the Old West. Smells of popcorn, gunsmoke and horses mingled with the scent of freshly rained-on grass. Mounted cavalry, brightly dressed Indian maidens and Civil War generals strolled the grounds. It was no longer the 1880s, but a night in the 1980s.

Along the main street of Lincoln, visitors from the present century halted with participants from the past. History enthusiasts came from as far as Tennessee to be part of the festivities.

Members of the New Mexico Territorial Volunteers, a group that dresses up and re-enacts the Civil War, cooked their dinner over an open fire near the courthouse and discussed historical events with interested onlookers.

A definite excitement filled the air as the pageant began. Children sat hunched at the edge of their seats, waiting to see what would happen next in the story of Billy the Kid.

While the fabled sheriffs shot down the "bad guys" on the stage, the real-life policemen were enjoying the show while patrolling the pageant grounds. This was the third year for State Police Officer T. C. Burke.

"I've never had a problem (with Old Lincoln Days)," he said. "And that's the way I like it!"

This weekend marked the 44th presentation of "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid." The pageant was directed by Betty Bennett. Betty was pleased with the way things were go-

ing and "really proud" of the new things that were added to the pageant this year, such as music and fiesta dancers.

This was Bennett's second year as pageant director. She felt that the rehearsals (about a week's worth) went well except for a few nights of heavy rain. She said that the cast was "great," and that the people had fun doing the show.

Cast member Mike Walstad agreed. He said that the cast members shared an "affinity for Lincoln," and that they enjoyed getting together, dressing up, and putting on the play.

Mike was pleased with the number of people participating in the show. Last year, he had to play a few different parts; this year, there were enough people for all the parts. Over 40 people—from Lincoln, Capitan, Ruidoso and surrounding areas—acted in the play.

In total, more than 100 people volunteered their services to Old Lincoln Days this weekend. President Matt Borowski and 40-year veteran Betty Shrecengost (herself a past president) were both pleased with the pageant and the entire weekend's events.

When asked why they go through all the work of producing Old Lincoln

Days, both gave similar answers. "We enjoy doing it and hope that everyone who comes has a good time. That's the bottom line ... our primary concern is that the people (who come to the festival) have a good time," said Borowski. He estimated that more than 2,500 people passed through Lincoln this weekend.

Tradition and preserving history are also a main reason for Old Lincoln Days.

"Why do we do it?" Shrecengost echoed the question. "Those kids," she said, pointing to some children playing—20th century children whose lives are enriched with the town's 19th century heritage.

Hornbuckle hopes to get fast start in match-play tournament

If Tommy Hornbuckle can get by his first hurdle, he may have a good shot at winning the 36th annual Cree Meadows Men's Match-Play Golf Invitational championship flight this week.

The veteran golfer, who is playing in the qualifying round for the championship flight today, has won the consolation title of that flight the past three years. He lost tight decisions in the first round all three years.

Hornbuckle also took second in the championship flight in 1980. He has

won the tournament crown twice, but not since the 1970s.

"I can't recall exactly when I won it last," he said. "Probably about six or seven years ago."

In 1983, Hornbuckle had one of his better years. Besides the match-play consolation crown, he won the Cree Meadows men's club title and shared three partnership tournament victories.

Last year Hornbuckle lost to eventual champion Jake Broyles of Texas in the first round of the match-play tournament. However, he came back to play excellent golf the rest of the tournament and took the consolation title.

"Jake's a good golfer and he should be tough again," admitted Hornbuckle. "I've also heard that a couple of new fellas in the tournament could be awfully tough also."

Hornbuckle first started playing in the tournament in the 1950s when he was a teenager. He has competed in it consistently since 1975.

Is this tournament his favorite? "Oh, definitely," Hornbuckle answered. "It's the best tournament in this area, and they've attracted a pretty good field. Plus it's my hometown course."

Hornbuckle also said the Cree Meadows course can be both hard and easy for golfers, depending on the situation.

"It's a lot tighter than the other courses," he said. "If you don't hit the ball straight, it's easier to hit it out of bounds. But if you hit it straight, it's easier."

First-round competition in the tournament will begin at 7:30 Tuesday morning. About 180 golfers are entered, making it the largest field in the tournament's history.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—You have to give Toney Anaya credit for one thing. He talks plain English.

Take this quote, from a recent informal news conference over the early-morning coffee cups:

"Kay Marr is still trying to run the state out of the Attorney General's office."

Or this one, from the same time and location:

"Nothing I do or say can satisfy Al Romero."

Those are both comments more notable for their sweeping candor than for their tact. Neither sounds like it comes from a man who is anxious to get along well with the branches of state government over which he does not have direct control.

Ms. Marr, in case you miss that reference, is an assistant attorney general (one of many), who is perceived by the Governor as having it in for him.

When we ask why, he provides more fodder for the newspeople to scribble down rapidly.

He explains that, early in his administration, when he sent in a Santa Fe attorney to attempt to clean up what they saw as a mess in the state's Property Control Division, Marr got ticked off at him.

In the King administration, she had headed Finance and Administration, of which Property Control is a part.

Anaya suggests Marr has what he calls "lots of animosity" over that event. He goes on to say, "Now she's enlisted the support of Alice Hester in the affair."

Hester headed Property Control when Anaya and Montoya thought it was ill-managed. Now she has joined Marr on the Attorney General's staff.

The Governor claims the dislike for him emanating from the two women can be seen in relations between his staff and that of the AG "over and over again."

He goes on to say that he and Paul Bardacke, the AG himself, get along well. Apparently he has decided that whenever he runs afoul of the office of the Attorney General (and he does that frequently) it is this aging feud which is at the heart of his problem.

"I've told Bardacke many times what the problem is," he adds grum-

pily, "but he doesn't agree with me." As for Al Romero, that's a different story.

He's the State Auditor, though you may not have recognized his name, either.

Auditors generally tend to take a low profile and stay off the firing line. Not Romero. He is into so many things that some have come to suspect he does not look upon his present post as the capstone to a political career. They expect to see his name on another ballot somewhere down the line, after this tour of duty is over. But that's a story for another day.

What's got Anaya all snarled up at this moment is that Romero has been saying that the Public Employees Retirement Association gave a contract to Tim Kraft, one of Anaya's old buddies, only after crumbling under heavy political pressure. The implication is clear that the pressure came from Toney.

Not so, the Governor says—and this writer, who cannot be beaten at viewing Anaya with suspicion, tends to believe him.

What's more, if you can stand a second shock to your system, we can't even find anything much to complain about in the contract given to the firm Kraft represents in New Mexico.

Some Santa Feans have been going on about all this as though it were a second Teapot Dome, but that seems a little steep. The contract's a legitimate one, and the company wants to perform the service it will get paid for. Unless there is something in its offering to do it for part of whatever funds it recovers for the state which violates the Constitution, we'd say give them the contract and let Kraft pocket his profit.

But Anaya's handling of the matter, like his comments on the team of Marr and Hester, seems unlikely to ease tensions between him and those to whom he is delivering the public chops.

You can bet reporters were on the phone to all concerned within minutes after the Governor retired to his office. You can't beat a good long-running name-calling match for providing lots of colorful copy.

With Toney around, our jobs are almost too easy.

With some elements slapping at the "developers" and "builders in the area, we would like to say a good word about the home building industry in Otero County.

People who say Alamogordo shouldn't grow and that we are big enough aren't paying attention to what is happening at Holloman Air Force Base. New families are moving into the area, and they must have housing. With many of the homes on base being renovated, this helps create a shortage of suitable places to live.

Home builders of Otero County (and townhouse and condominium builders) are keeping up with supply and demand—at least they are attempting to keep up.

We have had occasion to check out some of the new homes in the area and find the workmanship excellent in most cases. We salute the home builders for this. But there is another very plus factor in home building.

This is the payroll generated by this important industry. How many carpenters, masons, etc., are

employed on any given day in Alamogordo. The number must be in the hundreds. This industry is an important part of our economy and primarily is a spinoff from activity at Hilloman AFB and to some degree, White Sands Missile Range.

Of course the builders are out to make a buck. Who isn't? Their industry is providing bucks for the well being of the total community as dollars circulate. This is the good news. And there is no bad news on this front.

Mandatory Spanish language programs in the state's public schools?

We appreciate Governor Toney Anaya's desire to implement such a requirement—from the standpoint that school children should be exposed to foreign languages. There are several problems with the idea, however.

The first was raised by state School Superintendent Leonard DeLayo. "The single, most important function of the public schools is to teach kids how to read, write and speak the English language so that they may compete in the American marketplace," DeLayo said.

DeLayo evidently is concerned with the students for whom English is a struggle, and feels that having to take Spanish could deter their ability to master English.

Another problem is that the students' language-learning efforts would be directed toward one language, to the exclusion of others. Enriched programs in Latin and French and other tongues presumably would not be required by law.

Spanish is the best second language for most to know in New Mexico, obviously. It is encouraging that enriched Spanish learning programs like the one in Albuquerque that attracted the governor's attention are being started.

Nothing precludes a local school district that wants to from implementing such programs now. Therefore, there is no point in trying to make them mandatory statewide.—TP

Reporter's Round

A pregnant cat strolled past my place the other day, hunting for a handout. It wasn't the first time I'd seen her outside my door, but it was the first time she appeared so close to giving birth.

She is a regular member of a troupe of cats that fight and love at leisure, sharing a common denominator that is unmistakable in its shaggy appearance: homelessness. If they ever had a home and owners that cared about them, they don't now.

This one about to give birth ended up the following morning in a wire trap set by the landlord. There was enough room inside the trap for her to sit halfway comfortably if she had resigned herself to capture.

But instead she spent her time struggling to get free and, finally, managed to get her head stuck outside the cage, the trap door lodged against her throat.

It looked serious enough to be called an emergency, especially since she made no movement once the trap door was lifted. A call to Ruidoso Animal Control eventually brought Animal Control officer Buddy Dean to the scene, angry and disgruntled.

The problem was that the cat had gotten herself captured and injured on a Saturday, which didn't sit too well with Dean.

To top it off, the trauma of the episode had induced premature labor. The cat lay twisting and turning, trying to find relief. She was having some kind of day.

Dean put her in the back of his truck and carted her to his office, where she gave birth that evening to a healthy litter of five.

A few days later, I called up to learn more about Animal Control, the policy on weekends and the quantity of cats and dogs that patrol the village.

Jan Merrill patiently explained to me that Buddy Dean works a 60-hour week, not including weekends. He goes out into the village and seemingly does it all, from shooting injured skunks (which is not his responsibility) to tracking down lost canines.

She said Dean only responds on weekends if an emergency exists. Emergencies include injured animals, dead animals and cases of dog bites.

Since Animal Control logs 15 to 20 calls a day, that makes for a lot of work for one man in the field. And since all animals are lodged at Fort Stanton, transported by Dean, the ritual can get old quick.

Jan said the majority of calls concern lost pets and strays. Because Dean has a knack for reuniting loved ones, lost pets and grieving owners are not usually long separated. But the strays are another story.

"People are not very conscientious," Jan pointed out. "They'll get a pet, but if it's too much trouble, then they don't want it."

The simple solution, of course, is to release the dependent pet in the Upper Canyon and forget about it. The animal, now a chubby stray, will revert to its natural instincts and survive. Might even enjoy being out in the woods with its friends.

It is exactly that mentality that angers Jan. She said it's a way of thinking that prevails with summer transients, and because it does, next month will see the usual abundance of loose dogs as people head back to their home states.

"These people just flat leave their dogs," Jan said. "And then (the dogs) start migrating up from Ruidoso Downs into Ruidoso."

The result is "tons and tons of strays," she said. They move through town in packs and tear up garbage and gardens.

Some have even been known to attack people. And all because someone couldn't live without a dog for three months, and now wants to leave it behind.

There are three doberman pinschers that have not been left behind. They are collared and well cared for. But every morning they are allowed to run free and terrorize at will. Who owns those dogs?

Jan said the pet ordinance specifies that all animals, including cats, must be contained, even on private property. She said any pet caught running at large will cost its owner \$25 for starters, compounded by the number of days the animal sits at Fort Stanton.

The village will soon be considering a new ordinance that could tighten up many of the weak provisions of the current ordinance.

But without solid and aggressive enforcement, the new ordinance will be no more useful than the one currently on the books. In fact it will be worse, since it will have tried to improve something halfheartedly and failed.

In rewriting the ordinance, the lack of respect a person has for an animal will have to be balanced by the respect a person has for cash. In other words, make the fines heavy and frequent. Put a dollar sign on irresponsibility.

And give Buddy Dean some helping hands so that weekend work considers not only the people at Animal Control but also the plight of so many strays.

One pregnant stray got fortunate and delivered in the warmth of an office. Without some real concern on the part of the village council, it's not likely to happen too often.



Magnificent Bomag arrives

The Bomag Recycler finally has arrived and been put to work. And after years of frustration and bewilderment, the residents of Gavilan Canyon Road can begin to breathe a collective sigh of relief.

Cutting the basecourse to a depth of five and a half inches, the mighty Bomag began moving south to north along Galivan Canyon early last week. It has been chewing up pavement at a rate of 60 feet per minute downhill and on level ground, 45 feet per minute uphill.

The idea is to scrape off the current surface and replace it with one that can be improved and strengthened over the next three years, the expected time frame of the county road project.

"I feel like by the time phase three is over with (in 1986), it will be by far the best road in Lincoln County," exclaimed county commissioner Bill Elliott. "And it will be at least as good as the state roads."

He said Gavilan Canyon is one of the most traveled roads in the county.

Guy Henley, superintendent of the county Road Department, said the Bomag, which resembles a giant roto-tiller, weighs in at somewhere between 31,000 and 35,000 pounds.

The rented Bomag, operated by Jake Lueras, will be dominating the scene on Gavilan Canyon for approximately a month.

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


