

Ruidoso rides out the flood of '84

Normally the Rio Ruidoso is a pleasant neighbor, flowing gently by homes and businesses with a calming gurgle. Heavy, persistent rains, however, turned friend to foe this week when the runoff-swollen river jumped its banks and brought destruction and disarray to most areas along its path.

By the end of the weekend, the flood situation in Ruidoso resulted in a declaration of a state of emergency and request for state aid Saturday by Mayor George White: the arrival in Ruidoso of National Guard troops bearing 10,000 sandbags; and the first closing of Ruidoso Downs Race Track in 12 years.

Meanwhile the rains continued, and by late Sunday, area officials were closely watching Lake Mescalero, which was flowing three and a half inches deep over the spillway at 10 p.m. Deputy Police Chief Jim Alston stressed, though, that the dam itself was in no imminent danger.

The flood situation began as a result of a week of frequent rainstorms in the Ruidoso area, followed by days of continuous rainfall Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The rain brought the river to flood stage, more than three feet above normal in some areas.

The destruction began Thursday as rising waters threatened area bridges. Village street crews were dispatched to clear culverts on several bridges. Street crews also worked on building a large earthen dike along the northern bank of the river at the Paradise Canyon Road bridge near Sudderth Drive to prevent the overflowing river from washing out the road.

Several footbridges in the Upper Canyon area were removed to prevent them from becoming part of the fast-collecting debris in the river.

Friday the street crews continued cleaning out culverts, often with the help of backhoes. The dike along the Paradise Canyon Road bridge was lengthened to protect low-lying areas downstream from the bridge. Also Friday, a village water department backwash tank emptied, leaving most of the Upper Canyon area with little or no water.

According to water department superintendent Richard Sanchez, the treatment plant in the Upper Canyon was in need of backwashing due to the extremely turbid condition of the water in the river, which resulted in the minimal amount of water available in the water lines feeding the area.

White and village manager Jim Hine met Friday to consider the flood situation. The two decided to wait until the following morning before taking any action toward declaring a state of emergency.

Friday night found personnel from the village Fire Department, Forest Service Smokey Bear Hot Shot crew and White Mountain Search and Rescue laying sandbags in areas threatened by the rising waters. Some of the personnel, many of whom were volunteers, worked until 3 a.m. Saturday morning.

Street Department crews were also kept busy Friday night, performing various road jobs including the removal of a river-undermined bridge on Short Street.

Early Saturday morning the sandbag crews were out again in the rain. White made an official declaration of a state of emergency at 9 a.m. and requested that the state send 10,000 sandbags. His request was granted

about 10 a.m. The village council assembled at 11 a.m. and confirmed White's declaration.

"It's crucifying us now," Hine said of the river at the time.

The Police Department patrol room was designated the state of emergency command post. The directors of the Ruidoso Public Library and Senior Citizens Center were put on 24-hour standby, with those buildings designated shelters for any flood victims. Two water trucks were set up at the police station for any villagers without water, and an agreement between the village and Safeway stores provided food for workers and flood victims.

Ruidoso police began going door to door along river-area roads, advising residents to move to higher ground. The Mounted Patrol Troop 5 was also called out Saturday.

The Ruidoso Downs Race Track closed Saturday for the first time in over a decade. National Guard troops arrived in Ruidoso Saturday evening, bringing along 10,000 sandbags.

The troops gave the village department personnel and volunteers a much-needed rest. Reports said some workers had been going for 48 hours straight without a break.

Also Saturday, the Ruidoso Elks club organized a chili dinner for National Guard troops and local volunteers.

Sunday seemed to try to live up to its name, with the sun peeking out of heavy clouds a few times during the day. The National Guard troops left early, village officials began to assess the damage of the waters, and Ruidoso seemed to breathe a sigh of relief. About 7:15 p.m., however, the sky again opened, dropping about two inches of rain during an hour-long storm.

That storm resulted in many washed out and debris-laden roads around the village, and area officials paid particular attention to the situation at Lake Mescalero. Although the dam itself was not threatened, about three and a half inches of water was coming over the spillway at last report.

The command post was discontinued about 11 p.m. Sunday night, but the state of emergency was continued. Late Sunday evening, the sky was clear, with no more precipitation forecast.

The flood waters also affected areas outlying Ruidoso.

The weekend rainstorms and flooding prevented people from golfing, picnicking and going to the racetrack, which was closed Saturday. But it didn't stop them from spending money.

Area shops reported brisk business because of the weather—quite a change from the usual turnout whenever it rains.

Sidney Barrett of Heart's Delight on upper Sudderth Drive said the foul weather had driven people off the streets and into the shop.

"They can't play golf, they can't do anything," she said. "So they go shopping."

She said Thursday, Friday and Saturday were particularly good days, with people willing to part more readily with their cash.

The same shopping conditions were found at the New Orleans Shop off Mechem. Estelle Mehlhop said there was "standing room only" at the shop all day Saturday.

"It's marvelous, it's just marvelous," she said. "People are wandering around. They want someplace to go."

Priscilla Bustamante of the Final Touch at Serenity Plaza voiced much the same opinion as other merchants.

The weekend rain was a blessing in disguise.

She said the latter part of the week had been slower than expected. But Saturday was different, she said. "The rain's helping quite a bit."

Besides shopping, some people were checking into the Camelot Twin Theater, where "Gremilins" and "Red Dawn" were showing.

Manager Marty Sleight said the first two showings of both movies Friday were sold out. She said that was an infrequent situation at Camelot.

Sleight said the sellouts, and the closing of the racetrack, caused her to schedule a matinee showing Saturday.

She said she made the decision around noon that day for a 3 p.m. showing, which resulted in over 100 people turning up.

"It was a spur of the moment thing," she said. "I was surprised this many people showed up. I'd say it was because people don't have anything else to do."

Normally, Sleight said, foul weather keeps movie-goers away. "But not this time," she said. "Partially it's due to the good movies we're showing, but also because people can't do things like play miniature golf or something."

In all, the floods, mud and heavy rains may have added a depressing touch to the weekend, but not for businesses. The crowds were in a buying mood.

At the River Ranch Campground east of Ruidoso Downs, manager Sherry Gosdin reported evacuating 40 campsites on the south side of the Rio Ruidoso. She said all campers from those sites were moved to higher ground on the north side of the river.

"We're holding our own right now," Gosdin said. "We lost the bank, the south side of the bank, but we've only evacuated those 40."

She said some campers had called to cancel their reservations, and one or two had left because of the flooding. But she wasn't surprised as much by the cancellations as by the weather.

"Since we've owned the campgrounds (from 1980)," she said, "this is the first time it has rained for four solid days."

West of the campgrounds, flooding was evident in the overflowed river banks cutting through ranches and farms, and below trailer parks in Ruidoso Downs.

Up at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, Rick Hall reported that 2.5 inches of rain had fallen in a 24-hour period starting Friday at 8 a.m. He said the resort suffered no damage, though, as a result of the deluge.

Duane Binson of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department said the only trouble spot in the county was along Eagle Creek Road, where stuffed culverts were backing water up onto the road.

He said a crew had been dispatched to drag the culverts late Saturday.

"There's no one in real danger in that area," he noted. "They'll just be isolated for a while."

The airport reported no problems or damage over the weekend. Official rainfall from August 5 through August 10 was recorded at 3.64 inches, with the majority, .98 inches, falling on Friday.

Tom Guck of the U.S. Forest Service at Capitan reported Sunday that 10.7 inches had been recorded at Pine Lodge on the east end of the Capitan Mountains, for the period of Tuesday through Saturday. He said roads were flooded in that lightly populated area.

Airport mailout plans big final push

The massive mailing to top officials urging support of location of the Sierra Blanca Airport at Site B is continuing. Volunteers and donations of boxes suitable for mailing envelopes are needed by Tuesday night, said Ovella Estes, an organizer of the effort.

A large-scale mailing will be prepared at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Ruidoso Public Library. Volunteers are urged to attend. Also, boxes to hold envelopes are desperately needed.

Support of the campaign has been excellent so far, Estes said. "I've been overwhelmed by the response," Estes said of the 1,950 letters from New Mexico residents and 2,175 letters from Texas residents

that have been returned to the Sierra Blanca Airport Relocation Commission (SBARC), the group directing the campaign.

The New Mexico letters, addressed to U.S. Senator Pete Domenici of New Mexico, have been copied eight times and are being sent to U.S. President Ronald Reagan; U.S. Secretary of the Interior William Clark; U.S. Secretary of Transportation Elizabeth Dole; U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman; New Mexico Governor Toney Anaya; and U.S. representatives Joe Skeen, Manuel Lujan and Bill Richardson.

For Texas residents, a copy of a letter addressed to Texas Governor Mark White is being sent to U.S. senators John G. Tower and Lloyd M. Bentsen, both of Texas.

Estes said the lists of Texas and New Mexico residents, who are sent

the original letters for their signature, are obtained from Lincoln County property-ownership files. She calculated that about 22,000 letters so far have been prepared to be sent to the officials. The final step in mailing the letters is to pack them in boxes and have them shipped.

The success of the project so far is due to the presence of many dedicated volunteers and the support of village officials, Estes said.

"The community support is very definitely still there," Estes commented.

Estes also praised the Board of Realtors, which agreed to let SBARC use their copy machine. Estes stressed that the effort of the group is community-wide.

Estes urged those who have not yet signed a letter to one of the groups of officials to do so as soon as possible.

Machisma rises to occasion

The track was sloppy and that was exactly the kind of footing Machisma liked in Sunday's 36th staging of the Ruidoso Downs Thoroughbred Derby.

The filly jumped into an early lead and took the fast lane in the mile journey, which carried a total purse of \$29,121.

None of her foes managed to mount anything approaching a serious threat and Machisma, carrying nearly 10-1 odds, cruised down to the wire to win by nearly six lengths. She covered the distance in an excellent 1:41 2/5 seconds—considering the off-track conditions.

First place in Ruidoso's key sophomore fixture was worth \$14,560, and this hiked Machisma's career earnings up to \$164,058. She is owned by H.T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque and trained by Fred I. Danley. Salustio Burgos does the riding.

Fans who had backed Machisma (a New Mexico-bred by Scout Leader out of Madam Vista) collected mutual returns of \$21, \$10.40 and \$7.

Release The Wind, a 31-1 outsider ridden by Leroy Coombs, was far back in the early going, then came alive at the turn for home and charged eagerly through the stretch to finish second. The runnerup prize was \$6,406. The place return was a hefty \$27.40, the show prize, \$10.20.

Release The Wind is owned by John G. Graham of Road Forks, New Mexico. Bob E. Arnett does the training.

Makum Trimble, who had beaten Machisma in the Derby trials, went off as a 5-2 second favorite in Sunday's showdown but lagged far

behind in the early furlongs. The gelding, ridden by Gary Sumpter, accelerated sharply down the backstretch to get in the fight. He came on again in the stretch to finish third, 3 1/2 lengths behind Release The Wind.

Makum Trimble, a \$15,000 purchase in the 1982 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings, earned \$3,494. That put his career total at \$51,433. He is owned by Guy M. Bowers of Pampa, Texas.

Draconic Ship, the 8-5 favorite owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, held onto third place most of the way, then wound up fourth. The gelding, another New Mexico-bred, earned \$1,747. His career total is an impressive \$205,644.

Machisma now holds a 1984 record of 2-3-1 from eight starts, good for an income of \$28,607.

Sunday's co-featured Three Bars Handicap put up a \$13,875 purse and the 870-yard duel went to the 16 1/2-1 outsider Bozart. The New Mexico-bred quarter horse (by Mr. Odell out of Rose Of Sharon) opened up boldly from the number eight post and had plenty of cushion for the romp down the straightaway.

The fattest payoff in the history of New Mexico racing emerged in Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs when the Pic-Six wagering produced two six-win tickets.

Each of these tickets represented a \$2 investment, and each returned a staggering \$55,104.

"There has never been a payoff in New Mexico racing which was even

close to this figure," pointed out mutuels manager Jerry Knott.

Friday's entire 12-race program consisted of the third and final day of first-round trials for the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity. The top three finishers in each first-round trial move on to the August 22 time trials.

The day's top performer was Thermalia, a 14-1 outsider in the ninth race. The filly, ridden by Jerry Burgess, splashed eagerly through the rain-soaked track to score an impressive half-length win over the 1-5 favorite, Eastex (a winner of almost \$225,000). Thermalia was clocked in 21.99 seconds for 440 yards (the fastest of the day) and returned \$30 to win. The filly is leased by Darrell Kissee of Miami, Oklahoma.

Another impressive winner was Spring Lark, who won the sixth race by nearly two lengths as a 2-1 shot. Jacky Martin was up for W.E. Burrows and Paul Howard of Ada, Oklahoma.

Thursday's program, the second of three straight days of first-round All-American Futurity trials, proved a successful stepping stone for two of quarter horse racing's top two-year-olds: Heavenly and Flying Arky.

Heavenly recently won the \$776,820 Rainbow Futurity (the middle leg of the Triple Crown), and Flying Arky, in the early days of the meeting, coped the \$605,384 Kansas Futurity (first leg of the Triple Crown).

Both came through handsomely on Thursday and will advance into the August 22 time trials for the world's richest horse race.

Accident Saturday results in death

A two-car traffic accident near the Inn of the Mountain Gods Saturday resulted in the death of one woman and the arrest of a man for driving while intoxicated.

Dead is Geraldine Smith, 60, of Alamogordo. Smith was a passenger in a vehicle driven by B. D. Smith, 64, also of Alamogordo. According to Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Law Enforcement Services reports, the Smith vehicle was eastbound on Mescalero Route 4 when it was struck at about 12:45 p.m. on the front and left side by a truck driven by Marlin Palmer, 20, of Mescalero. According to police reports and witnesses at the

scene, the Palmer vehicle was traveling westbound on the road in the east-bound lane and was apparently in the process of passing other westbound vehicles when the accident occurred. The reports said the Smith vehicle veered to the right in an attempt to avoid the Palmer vehicle when the vehicles collided.

B. D. Smith, Brian Smith, 28, and Carla Dingman, 26, all of Alamogordo, were taken to the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital where B. D. Smith is listed in stable condition. Brian Smith and Carla Dingman were not hospitalized.

Passengers in the Palmer vehicle included two juvenile males, also of Mescalero. None of the occupants of the Palmer vehicle were hospitalized.

Marlin Palmer was arrested by BIA officials and charged with driving while intoxicated, according to BIA Lieutenant Mark Chino. Chino said federal charges may also be pending in the accident.

Chino praised the actions of other agencies who responded to the accident, including the Ruidoso Police Department, Ruidoso Fire Department, State Police, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and Inn of the Mountain Gods Security officers.



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
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Around Sports

Pan-O-Rama Rampage wins cage crown

Happy Birthday To Clayton Bennett
 The other day, it must have been Friday the ninth, I ran into the Reverend Wayne Joyce and Clayton Bennett up at Hollywood Junction. The talk went from one thing to another until Clayton began telling what a devoted daughter he and Helen had in Betty. Then he looked off into the distance and said, "By the way, I was eighty years old on the second. I can't believe it. I don't feel eighty."

He did not look it either. Many is the time I have asked him the secret of his youthfulness and he has always said: "Carrots. Carrot juice." Then comes the famous grin and the laugh. Clayton was born in Warren, Indiana, August 2, 1904. Like countless others in failing health, he "lit a shuck" for New Mexico, where in "The State of Second Life" he not only regained his health but became a robust dynamo of activity.

It took three tries to land in Ruidoso, landing first in Roswell, then Tularosa. I think he said he hit New Mexico in 1928. First he went to work for Ike Wingfield in his store and post office, which stood just across the street from where Wingfield's Wharf now stands, and later on down at what we used to call "The Junction," right there where you whip into the left coming from Mesalero to enter Ruidoso.

Not long after, Clayton and Helen established the first Clayton Bennett Indian Store where they stayed for thirty years. In 1959 they moved into their place just up the way on the left on the sunny side of the world. It is a showplace as well as a gift shop and Indian arts center, a landmark from coast to coast.

A day or so later I called up and Helen answered the phone. I thanked her for taking such good care of Clayton all these years, and then asked her to put Clayton on.

"Clayton," I said, "for the last time, what is the secret of your youth?"
 "Like I keep telling you—carrots, carrots, carrots. Naw. That is just between you and me."

"I just get up in the morning and begin enjoying the beauty of the day. There is so much good in the world. That is the secret—just get up and realize how lucky you are to be in this beautiful God's Country."

Clayton and Helen have long been two of our very favorite folks, and we wish them all blessings, and Clayton many happy returns of the day.

Across The Lone Star State in the Wildest Part, and Back Leaving Ruidoso on the bus the afternoon of July thirty-one, we pulled through the reservation through the beginning drops of a light rain. The wildflowers were unusually pretty along the way. Just out of Alamogordo it began to rain steadily and rained all the way into El Paso. All the Sacramento mountains were

capped with a solid mass of clouds—always a welcome sight. Riding all night, I landed in Dripping Springs just outside of Austin at eleven the next day, and here were Lynn and Maxine in their wagon. Throwing the suitcase in, we were off with less loss of time than the sprint relay runners in the Olympics passing the baton.

After attending the funeral services of my sister-in-law, Ferne Sweeney Storm, and visiting a day in Houston, I had a long-held desire fulfilled in visiting Lynn and Maxine's Storm Ranch in Dripping Springs. Then I went by plane from Austin to El Paso, looking down on West Texas, powder dry all along the South Plains. By the way, all South Texas, usually so lush and green, for the first time in anyone's memory, is short of water, with the great rivers like the Colorado and the Brazos low on water.

Beautiful Texas
 Back in the early thirties, former Governor W. Lee O'Daniel played a song with his Light Crust Dough Boys. "It's Beautiful, Beautiful Texas Where the beautiful blue bonnets grow."


We're proud of our forefathers Who fought at the Alamo. You may live on the plains Or the mountains Or down where the sea breezes blow.

But you're still in Beautiful Texas, The most beautiful state that I know."

I am back feeling light in my heart and step with a new admiration for my fellowman in general and the people of Texas in particular.



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
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
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Raising animals? Ask Alice

Hondo resident Alice Booky is busy preparing her 4-H livestock projects for the upcoming Lincoln County Fair. A past Grand Champion winner, Alice is entering her lambs, steers, pigs and a capon this year.

Alice has been involved in raising animals for 4-H projects for seven years. The money she has earned from her winnings will pay her tuition at New Mexico State University this fall. Alice plans to continue working with livestock while she studies agricultural business.

At her ranch, Alice discussed what is involved in raising livestock. First, she had to buy the animals. A lot is involved in learning what to look for and knowing how to pick a winning animal, she said.

Once the animal is at the ranch, Alice starts it on feeding programs to gain weight. Alice uses her own rations.

A good exercise program is also essential in the development of these livestock. They are "kind of like athletes," said Alice. "They have to be in top shape and look good." Alice exercises the calves and lambs by walking them one mile twice a day.

Alice has had the lambs since June, and she has had the calves for nine months. She said that she had tried not to get too attached to them, but that the "calves are kind of hard to say goodbye to." If the animals win at the fair, they will be sold at auction and sent off to the packer.

In raising capons, she said, "You feed them out and hopefully they develop into meaty size chickens." Unfortunately, her cat enjoyed four of the meaty birds, so Alice only has one capon to enter in the fair this year.

Capitan considering school bond issue

A possible bond issue was considered by the Capitan school board at its meeting Thursday night. The board voted to allow Quinn and Company of Albuquerque to research the bonding capacity of the school district and draft a proposal to show the board in late November.

If the board decides to go for the bond issue, the voters would decide the outcome in a February election. If passed, it would raise Capitan property taxes by approximately \$3.50 per \$1,000 valuation. According to Paul Casidy of Quinn and Company, this level would be the same as tax rates of two years ago because of increased property valuation.

If the school district were bonded to at least 75 percent of its bonding capacity, it would qualify for Critical Capital Outlay funds from the state, according to board member Mark Delgado. He said these funds are given to the school district with "no strings attached," if the board can show the state the usage of the money. The new high school was built with Critical Capital Outlay funds from the state.

The funds generated from a bond issue would go towards expansion costs and the construction of new buildings. At Thursday's meeting, architect Charles Nolan submitted drawings of possible concepts for the Capitan Schools Master Plan. Both concepts shown were predicated on acquiring land that lies to the south of the school.

The desired land is currently owned by the U.S. Forest Service. The board is looking into the possibility of buying the land from the Forest Service or trading it for the land across the street.

Board members indicated they would rather use adjacent property

than have children cross Highway 380 to get around the campus. The board also expressed interest in adjacent county-owned land for acquisition for future use.

In presenting the Master Plan, Nolan showed the board some projected growth statistics and space requirements. For the past two years, the number of students has grown by approximately 20 percent each year.

If the growth rate continues in this pattern, Capitan schools will have more than 2,000 by 1990, it was noted. This will necessitate over 70,000 square feet of new classroom space.

To provide more space that is currently needed, the old elementary school building is being remodeled. Architect Jim French reported that completion might be a week behind schedule due to recent rain, but said the project was going well. Board member Preston Stone expressed appreciation to French for supervising the remodeling work.

Dr. ????? Hays, school superintendent, told the board that the schools might be able to participate in a "Cooperative Regional Center."

This would enable Capitan to receive \$13,000 in special education services if the district entered into an agreement of sharing with Corona, Carrizozo, Ruidoso and Tularosa. The board voted to participate in the program, which is contingent on the state putting it into effect.

During the meeting, the board entered into an hour-long executive session to discuss personnel hiring. The new faculty members (some of these had been previously hired) are: Jerry Newsom, elementary school

principal; Gary Thompson, physical education and coaching; Jane Calahan, elementary physical education and coaching; John Bleu, science and coaching; Rosanne Delgado, special education; Sue Carter, high school English; and Dick Effthimou, counselor. A number of aides and a secretary also were added to the staff.

The school board also announced Thursday that the National Safety Council had issued Safe Driver Awards to seven Capitan bus drivers. Nora Silva received a 16-year award, Gwendolyn McDaniel and Rosa Montoya received seven year awards, Leroy Montales received a five-year award; Ruby Frost got a two-year award; and Roger Garner and Debi Jeter each received one-year awards.

Another type of awards was discussed when Mark Delgado suggested that students should be able to earn letters and certificates for scholarship and activities other than athletics. Presently, only athletes can earn letters.

Delgado and other board members agreed that activities such as band require just as much time as athletics. The board decided to consider the idea and to set up criteria for awarding the letters and pins.

Also discussed was the handbook revision that is currently under way. The board will act on the new handbook at the next meeting when all the revisions are completed.

The board also voted to continue to buy the school's milk from Price's Dairy, this year's lowest bidder. School lunch prices will remain the same this fall.

Although Saturday's schedule of races at Ruidoso Downs Race Track was postponed due to the bad weather, it wasn't the first time in the history of the track that races have been postponed.

"I don't recall the exact dates, but we have had them postponed several times in the past," said track general manager Rick Henson. "Saturday's trials for the Gold Cup have been moved up to this Thursday."

Sunday's races went off as scheduled as the water in the Rio Ruidoso receded.

Henson explained the reason why the Saturday races were postponed.

"We didn't postpone yesterday (Saturday) because we had any problems, but because of what problems everybody said we could have," he remarked.


"We were worried that if the water rose it could flood the barn area. We did it for the safety of our patrons and to prevent flooding of the barns."

"I had a green tent in the yard," she said. When he went out to try to save it, the water was rising. "He got up to this high," she gestured

with her hands at chest level to indicate how high the river was on him.

"Then he kissed that tent goodbye," she added.

"Someone down in the Downs has our tent," she guessed.

The Millers weren't the only people whose driveway turned into a temporary riverbed. Just east of the Mechem Drive bridge, Larry Duke and his family had to drive their truck over a flooded driveway to get out of their cabin.

The Dukes came up for a vacation from Stanton, between Big Spring and Midland, Texas. For the sake of the farmers in that area, he wished the rain were falling at his home there.

They have had half their normal rainfall this year, he said.

Flooding didn't disrupt some plans in the Upper Canyon. The Reverend Cleve Kerby of First Baptist Church officiated at a wedding there Saturday morning.

The bridal couple used a company home for the ceremony. She was pretty, the pastor reported, noting that the bride dressed like a Southern belle.

become weekend flood fighters

Danny Garcia sprawled in a cushioned chair at the back of the Ruidoso Fire Department Saturday afternoon. He deserved a break that day.

Garcia and the three dozen paid and volunteer members of the department hadn't exhausted themselves fighting fires. Their problems in recent days had been caused by water.

In a few minutes, he sprang up to find a chain. He headed for a home near the Rio Ruidoso. A village truck carrying sandbags had become stuck in the mud there, and needed to be pulled free.

Firefighters, village workers and volunteers began placing sandbags along the rising river Thursday. The Upper Canyon was especially hard-hit by flooding.

Many of the sandbag workers got as little as three hours of sleep Saturday morning, the worst day for flooding. They worked until 1 or 2 a.m. and then went back at 7 or 8 a.m.

Some of them headed for the hot mix plant near Ruidoso Downs. The Village of Ruidoso had 15,000 sandbags on hand, said Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds.

As the rains continued to fall, people filled those sandbags. "Come on, sunshine," one man cheered as the sun broke through the clouds.

The firefighters got help from three United States Forest Service Hot Shot Crews.

Two 10-member Sacramento crews and one stationed in Ruidoso switched from fighting forest fires to filling sandbags. Their distinctive yellow jackets and green caps seemed to be everywhere in the huge plant.

Some of the sandbags they all piled up on the concrete floor were stamped flour. They contained messages in many languages. Others were simply gray.

Lincoln County sent 4,000 of the bags for the volunteers to fill. After requests for volunteer help were broadcast, citizens sloshed their way to the plant.

Elaine Powers was a typical volunteer. She arrived before noon to work at the plant, went to her job, then came back and filled more bags.

Another pair who helped were recent Ruidoso High School graduates Robert Tuthill and Bobby Callaghan. After working for hours, they loaded a mud-splattered pickup truck with bags and headed home to the Upper Canyon.

As they were leaving, 65 National Guard members arrived to take over filling the sandbags.

The men from Roswell brought another 10,000 bags from Albuquerque, bringing the total to roughly 29,000 bags. The Guardsmen had been on maneuvers near Nogal.

More volunteers worked to lunch time. Barbara Downs arrived at the plant with a case of coffee. Paul Spears of DeCoty Coffee Company had donated it.

She was just one of many people who gave time and funds for the food. As a tired Chief Reynolds sat in a stiff chair at the plant Saturday evening, he wanted to make sure service groups got credit for their work, too.

The Elks Club served welcome food, including sandwiches, he said. So did the Noon Lions Club. Whispering Pines Restaurant supplied breakfasts for the sandbag crews, he added.

Some of the men filling sandbags ate their hot breakfasts balanced on truck hoods at the plant.

Other people went to the fire department and the police department. Secretaries went to work on Saturdays, their usual days off, to help the flood fighters. They answered countless questions about water supplies and bridges.

The fire department building was near one of those bridges across the rowdy river. Inside the building, donated food and homemade candies awaited hungry flood fighters.

All they needed was enough of a break from their sandbag work to enjoy them.

Editorial

The bottom line, if you'll forgive that overused expression, is that the Village of Ruidoso probably will need to come up with \$20,000 to host the second annual U.S. Open Pro Ski Race in early 1985.

The village has the money. If a meeting of minds can take place among those who control the money, the ski race should be able to go off again as scheduled.

We certainly hope it does, because the 1985 U.S. Open shapes up as bigger, better and more widely seen than the inaugural 1984 event.

The village is in the enviable position of having two promoters interested in staging the second race. One of those wants to make the race part of the Peugeot circuit—the North American Pro Ski Tour.

This group offers coverage on ESPN, the nationwide all-sports cable TV network. Paul Carson, whose Pro Ski International put on the first U.S. Open, is talking about major network coverage of the next race.

The \$20,000 from the village will be combined with funds from the state and from race sponsors to make up a rich purse for the race, ensuring that the world's top pro skiers will participate.

Arguments about the validity of spending that \$20,000 no doubt will be well aired before the commitment of funds is made—as they should be.

But the bottom line on that is—nowhere can Ruidoso get a better buy for its advertising, promotion and exposure dollar than by sponsoring the pro ski race again.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—There's no use having an accountant who doesn't tell the truth. A business operating on less than hard-nosed facts about finances is a house built on sand.

A political career is much the same. It offers no more room for hedging or fudging the facts than an accountant has when reporting bank balances.

In a business, you can't make plans for the future based on anything but total honesty about the books. In politics, you had better treat vote-counting in the very same way.

That's why Toney Anaya is doing everything he can to deny Pete Domenici every single vote. If he has to chastise his closest friends in public to achieve that aim, you can bet he'll do it.

It's because Toney can count. He knows that a super success by Domenici this year can peril Anaya's own political career, though the two men are not facing one another head-on.

To understand that, let's look at a scenario—one which some observers here think is closer to reality than fiction.

Start it with this picture: Domenici carries New Mexico by 80,000 votes, and is followed by Ronald Reagan, who garners a 60,000-vote majority.

That would be tough on Toney in many other ways than by making him look bad to the Mondale folks, who already appear to have their doubts about him.

It would practically guarantee us, during the remaining two years of the Anaya term, a Legislature which would be so strongly conservative in tone that the Governor's hands would be virtually tied. It could even give us a Senate in which Republicans are in the majority.

The Senate is a 40-member body. Twenty-one votes for either party can control it. And voters who are going for Reagan and Domenici at the top of the ticket could swing enough of those tight Senate contests to give the GOP a majority next year.

Two Republican Senators have already been elected, because they face no opposition in the Fall. Of those who have to run in

November, 13 come from districts which went for John Irick, Republican, not Toney Anaya, Democrat, just two years ago. If they did that then, without Reagan and Domenici, imagine what they are likely to do in 1984.

If those 15 get elected, the Republicans only need six of the additional 25 seats to control the body. Any honest Democratic observer can find you at least six races from among the 25 which have a strong chance of going Republican if that party is making a sweep.

If Republicans control the Senate and can be counted on to kill Anaya's measures, the House will not matter much at all.

In point of fact, many conservative Democrats in the House might find that very charming. If the GOP organizes the Senate, House members do not have to be accused of disloyalty to their own party. They do not have to form a coalition with

Republicans to keep a tight rein on the Governor. They could even vote for all the Anaya programs if they chose, content in the knowledge that they would meet a dead end in the Senate.

If Anaya wants to keep his four years from being a total poop-out, he had better do his best to see that this scenario never happens.

That's why he is being so tough on Pete—not because he is still steamed over the defeat he suffered at Domenici's hands, though that still rankles him.

You can expect him to get wilder and wilder in his charges over the next 13 weeks, as he realizes he is the Little Dutch Boy with his finger in the dike, trying to hold back what looks like an authentic Republican flood.

That's a lonely place to be, especially for a man who took office less than two years ago believing he was on his way to the crest of the wave. We have indications of the future he pictured for himself in his head. It's got to be painful for him to watch those images die, especially if it is Ronald Reagan and Pete Domenici who obliterate them.

Doesn't everybody hear the same old questions when people learn the size of their family? The answer to most of them, in my case, is yes.

Yes, we are Catholic. Yes, we all look alike, talk alike, and have the same sense of humor (heaven help us).

Yes, I can name all of my brothers and sisters without thinking too hard: Johnny, Jeannie, me, Ru, Tom, M.J., Claire, Glih, Jim, Meg, Beth, Joe and Michele.

Oops, I mean Chelie. I can never remember whether she spells Michele with one "i" or two. Besides, she's going through her turbulent teens and wants to be called Chelie.

Yes, I have to pause to remember their ages. If they'd only quit changing every year, I could catch up to them. Actually, I remember years of birth, more or less, and just go from there.

It runs something like this: Let's see, M.J. was the last one born in the '50s, so she was December 13, 1959. Claire was born in July, so she couldn't have been born in 1960. She must have been born in 1961, so she must be 23.

Simple, right?

Yes, I remember dates of all of their birthdays. Well, I remember most of them. I know the birthdays of the youngest ones pretty well. I even know my sister-in-law's birthday. The ones I'm never sure about are the obvious ones, like my only older brother's birthday.

You'd do it, too, if you had to keep track of people in five time zones, to know when to telephone them, or when to expect their calls.

I've lost count of the numbers I've rewritten in my crammed address book. One of the few that doesn't change belongs to my parents.

They moved to their house 28 years ago, shortly before I was born. They didn't think they could squeeze a third kid into their apartment. Little did they know.

Mom and Dad are also responsible for my needing a birthday list which goes on forever, for my constantly changing address book, and for my keeping the greeting card companies solvent.

In a way, Mom is also responsible for this column. I started musing about 13 when I realized today would be Smokey Bear stamp day in Capitán. Mom collects stamps, and I plan to send her a first-day cover.

It's not her birthday this month or anything, I just think she'd like to get the card. Even if I didn't have relatives in jumbo quantities, I think I would enjoy sending them little things.

You see, the answer to the most important question people ask about my family is also yes. I enjoy being related to them.

Let's Make MX Creature Extinct

Passage of another year hasn't produced any new arguments to justify production of the MX missile.

It still would not provide an appreciable gain in the nation's security. It still would cause severe social disruption and environmental damage. There still is no satisfactory way for basing the Hydra-headed monster or for protecting it against a first strike by the Soviet Union. Its costs still would strain the nation's economic resources. The United States still possesses thousands of modern missiles to deter a Soviet first strike and decimate that nation's population.

Those conditions, however, haven't deterred the administration from

pushing the House for approval of funds for production of the mega-buck Reagan "peacekeeper." When the administration recently saw that the whole system was about to go down the tubes - so to speak - the president agreed to a compromise that would fund production of 15 - rather than 30 - of the "defensive" dinosaurs.

The MX has been described as a multi-billion dollar wealth transfer from the American taxpayers to the military-industrial complex for a system that would provide no appreciable gain in American security. That being the case, why fund production of more of them?




