Airport hearings assessed

Local and state officials expressed hope that the environmental impact statement (EIS) of the Sierra Blanca Airport will not delay determination of the site for the replacement airport for Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

In a letter last week to William Clark, Secretary of the Interior, Governor Toney Anaya declared his belief that a complete EIS would not be necessary, and that a more expedient update of a previously completed environmental assessment would be satisfactory.

"My concern is that more lives will be lost because of undue delay," Anaya said in the letter. He continued by highlighting the airport-related developments that have occurred in the state, including the softening of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association stance against location of the airport at the site favored by Anaya and many in the state: Fort Stanton Mesa "Site B."

Site B is currently being used for range research by New Mexico State University (NMSU), whose board of regents opposes location of the airport there.

Anaya expressed optimism in the letter that Site B will be an acceptable site for the airport if NMSU is compensated for the land. He concluded by again pointing out there was no need for an EIS.

"The state has made significant advancements toward resolution of this issue," he wrote. "From all indications, the Department of Interior's insistence on an Environmental Impact Statement will thwart our efforts to date."

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission Chairman Fred Heckman also called for completion of the study "as expeditiously as possible."

Heckman commented on the recent scoping meetings in Ruidoso and Carrizozo, designed to determine the scope of the statement for the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), the group in charge of the study.

According to Heckman, the meetings were most valuable in that they gave top Bureau of Land Management (BLM) officials in attendance the chance to see the local

situation in Ruidoso," Heckman noted. BLM is responsible for the land at Site B, and it has been suggested that a decision could be made at the Washington, D.C., level to transfer the land to FAA for use as an airport with or without the consent of NMSU.

"We're getting the attention we hoped to get," Heckman said. He pointed out that in addition to top BLM officials, the scoping meetings were attended by top FAA and state officials, including New Mexico Department of Transportation Secretary Judith Espinosa.

Espinosa, also, noted the presence of the BLM officials at the meetings as a positive sign.

"I think it sounded a little more positive from the BLM side," she said of the meetings.

Espinosa spoke at the first meeting in Ruidoso Wednesday, August 29, and reiterated her comments this Wednesday. She pointed out that an EIS can take from a year to two years to complete, and that such a delay should be avoided.

"I certainly hope it doesn't take that long," she said. "It's difficult to know where we'll be in that time."


She said another site studied for location of the airport, "Site A," is being rapidly developed, and the longer a new airport is delayed, the more possibility of other Ruidoso airport accidents.

"I would venture to say we'll have more fatalities," she said of the situation.

Epinosa discounted the comments made at a Carrizozo scoping meeting that accidents at Ruidoso are due to pilot error, and that the airport is actually safe.

"Most accidents are caused by pilots," she pointed out, saying the difficult conditions surrounding the Ruidoso airport make normally minor pilot errors very serious, and often fatal.

FAA officials have estimated that final determination of the scope of the study will be accomplished by September 14. Actual work on the EIS by a private consultant is expected to start around the beginning of the year.

Handicapped parking problem noted by police

The problem of illegal parking in designated handicapped parking zones is a growing concern in Ruidoso. According to Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor, a surge in the number of such violations has been apparent since the beginning of the year.

Swenor said his officers usually do not actively seek out those who are parked illegally in the handicapped zones, due to a shortage of manpower. He said police respond to such parking violations if someone complains of an illegally parked vehicle.

Many of the people who are cited may indeed be handicapped, but unfortunately do not display the proper state license to park in the zones, Swenor noted.

The process to obtain a handicapped parking permit from the New Mexico Motor Vehicle Department (MVD) is very simple. If a person believes he qualifies as a temporarily

or permanently handicapped person, a form must be obtained at the Ruidoso MVD, completed by the person and his attending physician, and sent to the MVD in Santa Fe.

According to officials at the Ruidoso MVD, the state will process the form in about a week and return a handicapped placard to qualifying applicants. The placard is displayed in the window of the vehicle in use by the handicapped person, and can be transferred from vehicle to vehicle. A \$2 fee is required.

According to the Ruidoso MVD officials, if the handicap is temporary in nature, a placard is issued with an expiration date which coincides with the anticipated date of recovery from the handicap.

Ruidoso Police, MVD and Municipal Court officials encourage those with a disability to complete this very simple procedure to eliminate the needless issuance of citations and to ensure that the handicapped zones will be available to those who need them.

Gavilan Road meeting set

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners will meet at 1 p.m. Friday at the Ruidoso suboffice to discuss progress made to date on work on the Gavilan Canyon Road.

The commissioners are also expected to look into the next area of work to be completed on the road project. The suboffice is behind the Ruidoso village hall.

Mule days, mule days again

The mules will be running this weekend, chasing a prize purse estimated at \$60,000.

Sponsored by the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skippers, the meet will take place September 7, 8 and 9 at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Organizers expect to attract at least 60 team ropers for the daily roping event, along with mule riders from several southern and southwestern states, and over 9,000 spectators.

The mule races are scheduled to run each of the three days, with a post time of 1:30 p.m. Roping will start each day at 9:30 a.m.

Other events include a balloon bust, an all distance championship race, a mule pony express race, with mules carrying sacks of dirt instead of mail, a mini mule race, and a mule auction, set for Saturday, September 8, at the All American Sale Barn.

Jacks, jennies, mares with mule colts and mares bred to jacks and draft animals will all be sold. A \$15 consignment fee and a seven percent commission will be charged to sellers.

Cancelled this year are the chariot races, which were to be held in Honor do According to Melvin Means, past president of the Mule Skippers, the heavy rains of August interfered with the building of a track appropriate for the event.

Jim Lackey of Bishop, California will be the track announcer, as he was last year. Means said Lackey is one of the top experts in the field of mule racing, having been involved for a number of years in a similar event at Bishop.

General admission to the mule races is \$2. Children under 12 get in free.

Many muleskinners had arrived by Wednesday and were busy getting

their animals situated at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Sharon Betancourt of Dexter was looking forward to a good meet.

"You know what a good meet is?" she asked. "That's when nobody gets hurt."

She acknowledged that mules are more of a hobby than anything for most muleskinners.

"A few people make a few dollars, but then you go down to the next meet and spend it," she remarked.

David Smith of Knott, Texas, brought his mule, Matilda, for the team roping event. Matilda is "just a baby" at age three, he pointed out.

"Me in her we're learning together."

Asked to describe Matilda's per-

sonality, David answered, "Oh, she likes to eat."

"If you ever have any trouble catching her, just rattle a feed bucket and she'll be there."

Feed buckets and probably a few riders' bones will rattle all weekend as the lovable but sometimes unpredictable mules take to the track and the roping arena.

Trio of Australians enjoy All-American Futurity

The All American Futurity quarter horse race attracted people from New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma, and no doubt from many other states. But three horse racing fans who traveled about 14,000 miles to view the event were probably the farthest from home during the race.

Australians Bernie Willis, Joe Agresta and Graydon Marks came to Ruidoso two weeks ago to view the races leading up to the big futurity. The trio from "Down Under" stayed at the Valley View Motel and attended the races during the All American trials, All American Derby and All American Gold Cup.

Their final day at the races was Monday, when they viewed the All American Futurity.

"I've wanted to see it for five or six years," said Willis. "It's good to see good quarter horse racing."

"It was a tremendous experience," Agresta added.

The three have valid interests in the sport, since they all have connections with quarter horse racing in Australia. Willis and Marks worked with quarter horse trainer Steve Clifton, who they said is one of the top trainers in Australia. Clifton visited Ruidoso in 1977 and 1982 to observe

American methods of training horses.

Agresta is one of the foremost jockeys in Australia. He was approached during his stay here to ride for Dwayne Gilbreath Training Stables, but was unable to make the weight requirements.

Australian racing is somewhat different than the American form of the sport, according to the three. Racing there is very distinctly split between quarter horse racing and thoroughbred racing. In Australia, a jockey can be suspended from racing if he is found racing on both types of horses, Agresta said.

Quarter horse racing there is all done on grass tracks. Regulations are strictly applied. Agresta said actions such as that of a jockey who pulled back a horse during a race they attended at Ruidoso Downs would be blatantly illegal at an Australian race.

"Back home you just wouldn't try it," he said.

Betting on races is possible by phone in Australia, due to extensive television coverage. Willis said he watched 42 races during a single afternoon, separately broadcast from all over the country.

The Australians said thoroughbred racing is much more popular than quarter horse racing in Australia.

"If (quarter horse racing) is still in

its infancy stage," Willis said. He pointed out that the richest thoroughbred race in Australia, the Melbourne Cup, has a purse of over \$400,000. The richest quarter horse race is worth just over \$20,000.

Close links exist between quarter horse racing here and in Australia, they reported. Willis said many Australian horses have blood lines that originate in the States.

Marks and Willis have been in the United States for four months. They began their trip to New Mexico in

California, where they bought an old gold Cadillac to tour the country in.

Willis said the high point of the trip was viewing the All American Futurity. The two adventurers will be returning to Australia with Agresta in a few weeks.

The three planned to take in the sights of the Grand Canyon and Las Vegas before returning to the land Down Under, where the summer quarter horse season will be just about to start.

Protest of rezoning for apartments unsuccessful

A protest by area residents against the rezoning of a lot near the intersection of Mechem and Metz drives was unsuccessful, as the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) voted 4-1 to approve the measure.

The request, submitted by Dan Swearingin, was to rezone from R-1 to R-2 the north 100 feet of lot 6, block 3, of the First Addition to Cree Meadows Heights subdivision. Swearingin said the rezoning was to permit the construction of an apartment project on the land.

Opposing the rezoning were several persons who sent letters to the commission, and Metz Drive resident Frank Gally. Gally reported that he represented the wishes of several residents in the area who opposed the rezoning because they felt it would affect their property values.

"We don't believe our property values should suffer at the enrichment of his," he said, referring to Swearingin.

Swearingin countered Gally's argument, saying the project would be well operated and maintained, and would not affect the neighborhood. He emphasized his experience as a landlord, pointing out that he had

been involved with rentals here since owning Dan Dee Cabins in 1937.

"We'd run this on a first-class basis," he promised. "We want it to look like Ruidoso." Swearingin also noted that the project will not be visible from Gally's property, and so would not affect it very much.

Commission member Martin Rose raised the question of what would happen in the future if Swearingin did not continue as owner of the apartments.

"What are those units going to look like in 10 or 20 years?" he asked.

Rose cast the only dissenting vote as the commission approved the rezoning.

The commission also voted to deny a request for abandonment of a section of Center Street between lot 4, block O, and lot 1, block F, of Ruidoso Springs subdivision. According to residents in the area, the street only serves a few residences and is creating a flooding situation in the area.

Commission members, however, expressed concern that the street may be useful to the village in the future, as a river crossing site.

"Pending completion of the master plan, the village might need that land," said commission member Bill

Carrigan.

P&Z members agreed to set up a committee to study the situation, composed of Rose and Carrigan.

Also during the meeting, P&Z:

—Approved a rezoning from R-1 to R-2 a part of the SE 1/4, Section 2, T11S, R13E, NMPM, as requested by Wayne Dacy.

—Approved the rezoning from R-1 to C-1 lot 6, block 1, of Young Heights subdivision, as requested by Larry Memmott, with the stipulation that the property be used for the construction of an office complex only.

—Approved the rezoning from R-1 to R-2 for a tract of land commonly known as Warwick Place in the NE 1/4, NW 1/4, Section 36, T11S, R13E, NMPM.

—Approved the change of use from residential use to retail business and professional office use for Mystic Pines Estates Condominiums, Mystic Pines Estates, Unit 2, being a part of the replat of lots 1-4, block 2, Third Addition of Cree Meadows Heights subdivision, as requested by Richard McCarter. The motion contained the stipulation that traffic on the lower end be limited to one way.

—Denied the application for a vacation of right of way in front of lot 3, block 13, of Pinecliff subdivision, Unit 4, as requested by Roger Winters.

—Approved the replat of lots 1-4, block 1, of Hamilton Terrace subdivision, as requested by Ted Bennett.

—Approved the replat of lots 126, 127 and 128 of Innsbrook Village, as requested by Aspen Investments, Inc.

—Approved the replat of lot 3 of Edelweiss subdivision, as requested by John Harrelson.

—Tabled for 60 days the replat of lot 5A, block 1, Airport West subdivision, Unit 2, as requested by William Blaney. Commission members plan to meet with representatives from the BRW planning firm to discuss the request.

—Approved the replat of tract 2 of the Driver Tract to create an easement for access, as requested by Southland Corporation and CDS, Inc.

—Heard acting chairman Ray Bishop report that the committee to study the proposed rezoning from C to C-1 of various areas in Sleepy Hollow subdivision near the intersection of Sudderth Drive and Main Road has decided to seek input on the situation from BRW.

—Voted to form a committee to study the possibility of limiting the maximum size of signs allowed by the new sign ordinance. The committee will include P&Z members Rose, Bishop and Don Shaw.

Peter York working to unseat Joe Skeen

His literature describes him as a quiet and progressive individual, someone with deep-seated convictions who depends on reliable appraisals instead of "flashy political rhetoric."

They are descriptions that paint Peter York exactly the way he wants to be painted, as a family man dedicated to the future.

But York also wants to be painted as different. He is determined to draw a line of distinction between himself and U.S. Congressman Joe Skeen, and in so doing, deprive Skeen of a third term in Congress.

"My philosophy," York said recently, "is somewhat opposed to Mr. Skeen's, primarily in that he pretty much follows the party line and the administration."

He said Skeen, a Republican, is out of step with the Democrat-controlled House, so much so that his votes on important issues "are on the losing side, which indicates that his vote is a losing vote."

York said national defense, which the Reagan administration is attempting to bolster, is one example. "I think we're spending too much on defense," he said. "I'm opposed to giving the Pentagon everything they want without looking at every system they propose."

He said a lot of waste exists in the defense system that is not being cut out or even addressed.

York opposes sending troops and military equipment to Central America. "My belief is that it is an internal struggle and we should stay out of it."

He said he was appalled at the

federal budget deficit, calling it "the most horrendous thing facing the U.S. today."

York said he would support a constitutional amendment establishing a budget that could not, by law, drift into deficit.

"Something has to be done on cutting back on this continued spending beyond our means," he said.

In the area of social spending, York said he would like to dispel "the false conception of what (the administration) has done for social programs."

He said the administration has cut back on the school lunch program, the milk program and college tuition. The Social Security system, he noted, also has suffered in recent years.

The only area he was in harmony with Skeen was on the question of a new airport for Lincoln County. He said he supported the need for the airport, and that he would like to see it built on Fort Stanton Mesa.

He said he also would like to see Highway 70 completed as a four-lane road, from its starting point in Clovis to Las Cruces.

York said 141 miles remain to be upgraded to four-lane interstate standard, a project that will "help all of the communities in the area, as well as provide easier access to Ruidoso Downs and the racetrack."

Born in Texas in 1924, York has lived in New Mexico since 1965. He is a licensed architect with a degree from the University of Texas, and was a general contractor for 19 years. He was elected mayor of Roswell two years ago.

He will oppose Skeen in the November 6 general election for the U.S. Congress, representing the Second Congressional District.

A registration fee of \$15 is required for all float and politician entries. All other entries are free.

the route's end.


Missing from the parade this year will be the motorcycles from the annual Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. That event is scheduled for the weekend prior to the parade.

Chamber acting executive director Tommy Morel is urging businesses and individuals to become involved in the parade, and truly make it an "Anything Goes" event.



Happy Birthday to Paul H. Jones
 This will reach you on the eve of the birthday of Paul H. Jones, born September seven, 1928, hardly a stone's throw from where he and his wife Nellie Ruth live today amidst their green pastures in "The Narrows," as the old-timers used to call it, a mile up the creek from Stormvale.
 Since we arrived here in 1925, I have known Paul all his life and remember fondly his Mother, the former Ola Casey, and his Father, Tom Jones, both members of pioneer families prominent in early-day Lincoln County history.
 Born into the mountain ranching life in the hills to the south of his home, through the years he has developed cattle raising into a fine art. It is his very life's blood to ride these hills and vales of which he knows every nook and corner.
 He is a veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict and has been awarded the purple heart as well as other decorations. You would never know it, though, for he talks very little about himself. He has been very active in the Disabled Veterans of America and the American Legion. And he is a valuable member of the Episcopal Church of Lincoln County, having done great work in the restoration of Saint Anne's Chapel.
 The Story of the Post Driver
 I was fascinated when first I saw iron fence posts being driven by the new-fangled post driver. This saves a lot of digging. The only thing, these first drivers took two men to handle them. I began to wish I had one light enough for one man to handle.
 Through most of the summer I had borrowed Paul's post driver. Then one day I asked him how much trouble it would be for a welder to make one of these. He said, "Oh, I guess they could be made."
 For years Paul has been welding and otherwise working with iron, making gates, head-ache racks, and other things; and worked his way up to ornamental ironwork, and finally into artwork in iron, among which are little religious crosses of his own design.

I had forgotten all about post drivers, and then one day in late August, Paul phoned me and said, "When you are up this way, stop by. I have something for you."
 When I stopped by, here came Paul with a sealed envelope and a poker face. I thought to myself, what now? The card said "Happy Birthday - Little Early." When I looked out the pickup window at Paul standing there, here he was holding up a brand new post driver, painted bright red "so you won't lose it."
 I must have looked pretty surprised, because Paul burst out in loud and hearty laughter.
 This is just one more of many deeds Paul has done which mark him as a valuable neighbor and a life-long friend, the best anyone could have.
Orphan of the Flood
 Where have we heard about "Orphan of the Storm?" Was it a play or a book or what?
 During the late floods through Ruidoso, the Australian Silkey belonging to Barney and Hope Currier became puzzled by the raging waters, and the loud noise of the "foaming brine," and must have taken the "wandering blues." Anyhow, this beloved pet, Tara by name, is nowhere to be found.
 The Currier home is just across from Dan Dee Cabins. Surely Tara is close around. Any help in locating Tara would be a great blessing to Barney and Hope Currier.
 The Curriers advised Kate Guthrie to call up about her large grey Siamese cat which jumped out of the car and went exploring "somewhere between Tinnie and Ruidoso" back in February. We should never give up on finding our pets. Generally speaking, people are kind-hearted and will make a home for lost dogs and cats until their owners can be found.
The Changing Of The Guards
 So now we are in the midst of the time of the "Changing of the Guards"—from vacation time to back to school; from visiting in the mountains to going back to the low country; from the hot days of summer to the cool nights of approaching fall; and from ground-soaking rains to the bright and warm "ripening rays" of

late summer sun.
 The sun's rays are at a certain slant that you can feel the heat seeping into your bones. And the children of Mother Earth can feel it too, and respond, as the sun makes up for lost time.
 I noticed in front of the Canyon Trading Post owned by Bob and Betty Lambert, an algerita bush full of berries of such abundance, color and size as I have not seen for a long time, if at all. This, of course is the work of the rain followed by its partner the late summer sun. Ordinarily the algerita berries are a bright scarlet; but these, although not fully ripe, are a crimson color just this side of sweet cherry red. Most of the other wild fruit like wild cherry and wild grapes are very slim pickings this year, but not the algerita.
 The word algerita comes from the early Anglo pioneers trying to say the Spanish word "Aigritos" (little sour ones).
 They are mostly sour all right, but this season will be sweet. They make the best jelly in the world.
 It always gives you a lift to stop by Conley's Nursery below Ruidoso Downs; it is a sight on earth to see the wonderland of red, white and dark blue petunias shining under the large American flag. And the folks there have the same cheerful personality as the flowers.
 Wilbur asked me if I could remember a summer like this. And I said, not many—and certainly none better.
 Wilbur said that he had seen one—1956. That summer he was working for the Indian Service making a study of native plant life. He mentioned the east side of the reservation; the area of the Pajaritos Flats.
 "That country was filled with rain water lakes, and the gramma grass was as high as the hood of the pickup. It looks as if it will be this high this year."
 From the looks of the rapidly growing grass around the place here, it looks as if Wilbur could be right.

 Mark touched upon our close call while swimming in a pool in the Panuco River, a rushing stream in the mountainous country seventy miles up the mountains from the city of Mazatlan, near the village of Santa Lucia, and hard by the little two-house settlement of Batel where we lived.
 This is a part of the story of the five little gringos, John, Dan, Mark, Joe and Lynn, when we spent a year with our parents in Mexico.
 This is all famous tourist country,

but in that day, 1921-1922, it was wild, accessible only by foot or mule train.
 After a while in Batel we moved down to the historic little village of Copala.
 Surrounding the town were cattle ranches in every direction. And there were lasso ropes of all kinds, rawhide, horsehair, and maney, and others. We learned to rope from the Mexican boys.
 Lynn roped one of the pigs running loose, and in an effort to escape, the creature ran in the front door of a house and out into the back where the ladies were washing, and set up a great chorus of laughing.
 I have mentioned my ant Mark's experience in the Panuco River before, but was not going to mention it again; but since Mark brought it up, if you will forgive me I will touch upon it one more time.
 Two things have remained with me from that day: It came home to me how more than glad I would always be to give my life for any of my brothers; I feel that this is in all of us. The second thing is that I do not know to this day how I got out of the deep water.
 I am not talking lightly when I say that the Lord Himself reached down and saved us both.



The Ruidoso High School varsity football team will be looking for revenge when the Warriors open the 1984 season Friday night at Lovington.

The University of New Mexico (UNM) Lobos will open their 1984 football campaign Saturday against visiting New Mexico State University (NMSU), and there should be a local flavor to the game.

Former Ruidoso High School standout Lon Nunley and ex-Capitan High School star Danny Cummins are on the Lobos' roster for the 7 p.m. contest.

Nunley, who will be starting his third season for the Lobos, is a 6-0, 233-pound defensive tackle. Cummins, only a freshman, is a 6-0, 208-pound defensive end.

Nunley was an all-state linebacker in high school. He helped the Warriors to an 8-2 record in 1981, and made the South all-star team in 1982. Cummins was an all-district first-team linebacker.

The Lobos have a reputation as a strong defensive team, and this season should be no different, thanks in part to the two Lincoln County players.

Lobo defensive line coach Jacob Burney has praise for both players.

"Lon probably won't start, but he should see a lot of playing time," Burney said. "We try to use six men in the line about equal time. I'd say if the opposing offense runs 80 plays, he'll be in on around 40."

"Cummins is only a freshman but he's doing a heck of a job on our scout team."

UNM had a 6-6 record last season after going 10-1 without a bowl bid in 1982. Most pre-season predictions have the Lobos fighting for a high finish in the Western Athletic Conference.

Brigham Young University is rated by most experts as the favorite for the conference crown again. The Cougars looked like title favorites when they came from behind to defeat the University of Pittsburgh last Saturday.

But the Lobos should be very competitive this season. UNM has strength at quarterback in Buddy Funk, and a large number of returning starters on defense. Linebacker Johnny Jackson, a definite All-American prospect, is probably the best player.

The Lobos have an experienced offensive line, although injuries in practice have hurt them.

The Aggies have an improved defense but an inconsistent offense, which they showed in a 14-0 opening loss to San Jose State University last Saturday.

Look for UNM to win the contest 28-14.

Mr Master Bug, Fill Mackis Cup top horses of 1984 meet

Mr Master Bug, the dramatic winner of the All-American Gold Cup and the Rainbow Silver Cup, and Fill Mackis Cup, a five-time winner of the meeting, were named the top champions of the 1984 Ruidoso Downs meeting.

Mr Master Bug was honored as the Quarter Horse Of The Meet, and Fill Mackis Cup was selected the Thoroughbred Horse Of The Meet.

Mr Master Bug, a four-year-old owned by Marvin and Lela Barnes of Ada, Oklahoma, became quarter horse racing's top money maker with his All-American Gold Cup win. His total stands at \$1,792,397.

The great champion was retired following his emotion-packed win (as the second favorite) in the \$422,882 All-American Gold Cup. His victory share in that one amounted to \$211,431. Earlier in the meeting, he collected \$77,005 for his win in the Rainbow Silver Cup. He was a four-time winner at the meeting. Jack Brooks is the trainer.

Fill Mackis Cup, owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, and trained by William F. Leach, earned the prestigious honor by winning three handicap events: the Mesalero Apache Handicap at seven furlongs, the Sierra Blanca Handicap at six-and-one-half furlongs, and the Mr. Tattoo Handicap at six-and-one-half furlongs. He also won at seven furlongs in allowance company, setting a new track record of 1:24 2/5 seconds. The six-year-old gelding also would up as the co-holder of the seasonal six-and-one-half-furlong record. He was timed in 1:19 2/5 in the Sierra Blanca Handicap.

HORSE OF THE MEET — Mr Master Bug.

BEST TWO-YEAR-OLD COLT OR GELDING — Eastex, owned by Dr. and Mrs. H.D. Hall of Ada, Oklahoma. The gelding, trained by James McArthur, scored a tremendous one-and-one-half-length win in the finale of the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity, earning \$1 million.

BEST TWO-YEAR-OLD FILLY — Miss Mitedo, owned by J.W. Ham of Odessa, Texas, and trained by Larry Keiter. She ran third as the favorite in the Rainbow Futurity, and finished second in the All-American Futurity (in which she earned \$343,500). She won four races at the meeting.

BEST THREE-YEAR-OLD COLT OR GELDING — Racy Roman, owned by Morris Stephens of Graham, Texas. The gelding collected nearly \$100,000 for winning the Kansas Derby, and \$94,437 for his second in the Rainbow Derby. He also made the final of the All-American Derby.

BEST THREE-YEAR-OLD FILLY — Indigo Illusion, owned by Jerry Windham of Bryan, Texas. She won the Go Together Handicap under 126 pounds, and later won, as an odds-on favorite, the \$590,320 Rainbow Derby.

BEST OLDER QUARTER HORSE — Mr Master Bug.

BEST 870-YARD HORSE — Shecky Who, owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas. The seven-year-old gelding was a two-time winner at the meet, including a decisive one-and-one-quarter-length victory in the \$17,500 Brigand Handicap.

MOST IMPROVED HORSE — Betts Full Moon, owned by Vincent C. Fister Jr. of Westerville, Ohio. He

finished second by a nose in the \$154,010 Rainbow Silver Cup to Mr Master Bug and was a finalist in the All-American Gold Cup.

Lidberg, Leach earn jockey, trainer crowns for 1984

Mike Lidberg guided in 53 winners during the 70-day 1984 Ruidoso Downs meeting and captured the seasonal riding championship.

The top trainer honor went to the defending champ, William F. Leach, who accounted for 49 victories. It was Leach's third straight conquest of the trainer title at Ruidoso.

Lidberg wound up with a tally of 53-33-46 from 388 mounts for a win percentage of .137. Lidberg and Joe Martinez (who won the title last year) were in a neck-and-neck battle which went down to the final races of the final day of the meeting.

Martinez, who took the championship last year with 65 wins, wound up with 52-44-55. His win percentage was .161 from 323 mounts.

Third was taken by Eugene O'Neill, who graduated to journeyman status in the final month of the meeting, and wound up with marks of 54-32-32. His win percentage (with 305 starts) was .164.

Jacky Martin, a perennial rider star at Ruidoso, ended the meeting with 47 wins from 176 starts for a remarkable win percentage of .267. He took fourth in the final standings.

Leach led throughout the meeting, and finished up with 49-44-34 from 250 starts for a win percentage of .196. Many of his victories came with the powerful horses owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas.

The runnerup position was taken by Fred I. Danley, who finished with 43-29-23 from 187 starts. Third went to

Inside the Capitol Reporter's Round

SANTA FE—That federal court decision criticizing our way of setting up House districts concerned itself mightily with "cracking" and "packing."

Maybe it should have addressed itself more to "splitting." Because of the way New Mexico politics works, that could do more than any other thing to frustrate the court's aim of electing more minority legislators.

On that latter point, something should be said straight out: At the present time, 29 percent of our Senate and 34 percent of our House members are of either Indian or Hispanic extraction. That's not shamefully bad, no matter what courts may rule. It will be interesting to see, as a practical matter, how much that record is improved by our new court-appointed districts.

But back to that old New Mexico custom of splitting, which not even the federal courts have the power to forbid. That point is amply demonstrated by the number of attempts at it which can clearly be seen among those who declared themselves candidates in the special primary—the judges have ordered us to hold later this year.

It's not difficult to do. It works like this:

If you want to be elected from a district which contains a large bloc of voters who may not be likely supporters of yours, you must take care to see that at least two members of that bloc declare as candidates against you. That allows those who belong to the group, come election day, to split their votes between your opponents so you can be swept in to nomination or election.

Since the avowed aim of the federal courts was to create districts which would be distinguished by the fact that they contain such putative blocs of voters, the result could have been foreseen: splitting is running rampant.

Take one lightly disguised example. Say you are a Democratic representative in a district which has now been heavily packed with Indians, the majority of them Navajos. You wouldn't want just one member of that tribe to file against you, lest he or she drain off all the Navajo vote. So maybe—just maybe—you help along a second,

perhaps even a third, member of that tribe to file. That way you can hope that the judges (who also saw everyone as simply "Indian," and didn't distinguish between Zuni and Navajos, who seldom think alike) have assured your re-election.

In one of the newly created districts, where there is no incumbent to blame for it, you can find a Cochiti pueblo resident running against a Jemez pueblo leader on the Democratic side, and a Jemez man running against a Navajo-Jicarilla on the Republican ballot.

Other examples of splitting are not so obvious, but the result will be the same.

Moral of the story: The bench may declare that blocs shall be preserved as blocs, in an effort to give them power; nothing, however, will prevent the wily minds of politicians from taking other steps to see that this does not come to pass, whether that is admirable or not.

How come when Abe Rodriguez, who runs the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, fired his deputy director, Freddy Martinez, he did it with a great splash of publicity, which made it sound like Freddy was probably a crook of some kind?

When it turned out that Rodriguez had to reinstate Martinez, that was done in as quiet a manner as possible.

Simple justice would seem to suggest that the office which publicized the former change would have to give the same weight to the latter.

You would think that Hoyt Pattison of Clovis, having read here that he was going to withdraw from his race for a House seat, would have had the common decency to do so.

Not so, alas. He went right ahead and filed to run against Cliff Moreland, in what both candidates agree is the largest Tweedledum-Tweedledoo race the state has ever seen.

It almost makes a writer mad enough to take back the nice things said about Pattison. Instead we will just have to shift into the conditional: Hoyt would have been missed if he had decided to withdraw, because he has represented his constituency well.

While the topic of the next few paragraphs has been bandied around a bit, some subjects bear repetition.

A great deal of commotion has arisen over the creation of a new airport, primarily because of the fear that residents, particularly children, could be injured by wayward airplanes trying to land at the present airport. It's not that they will be injured, only that they might.

Well, a similar situation exists with unrestrained dogs. And any problems we have from now on we can rest at the door of the Ruidoso Village Council.

What the council failed to do last week was pass an animal ordinance that is more enforceable than the current ordinance, and that addresses in clearer terms than before a problem not new to this area.

It is a problem Animal Control faces every day, and a problem that fails to get better by ignoring it.

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter raised a motion to pass the ordinance at the August 23 council meeting, only to see it die for the lack of a second. None of the other councillors raised an eyebrow.

Carpenter said last weekend that he was surprised by what transpired because the council had had a workshop session on the ordinance August 14 and no one appeared to have any difficulties with it.

Milt Alcorn hit it on the head when he said the council lacked the courage to pass the new changes. It isn't popular to pass an ordinance that penalizes all animal owners because of the irresponsibility of a group.

But in reality, the proposed ordinance is detrimental to neither animal nor human. It simply respects the right of all residents not to have to confront a roving pack of dogs, a single dog leaping into dumpsters, or incessant barking at 4 a.m.

In essence, the proposal translates into a leash law, a law in existence and enforced in villages, towns and cities across the nation. Its sole purpose is to create harmony and order

where people and animals co-exist.

To wait until a child is mauled by a "harmless" dog before enacting a set of rules is like waiting until there is a crackup on Mechem before establishing a speed limit. Every driver is not a menace, but living in society demands that all drivers conform to a set standard.

Police Chief Richard Swenor, one of the authors of the stronger ordinance, said the village is plagued with loose animals. And every so often, someone gets attacked. Meter readers from the power company and kids on bikes make conspicuous targets.

Swenor said that with a minor adjustment, the ordinance should pass the next time around. But it was also expected to pass the first time.

If it does pass, and if it is perceived by animal owners as too restrictive, pet owners will have no one to blame beyond the irresponsible element of their own kind.

It isn't the childlike dog that is the ultimate subject of the ordinance. It is the owner who treats his pet not as a member of the family, but as an object to suit the needs, to fill some latent desire to be loved by an animal without returning that love.

Beyond all the rest, Alcorn pointed out, it is the thoughtless owner who would allow his dog to stick its head out the car window into a rushing wind and precipitate a future of eye infections, skin irritations (from drying out the coat) and serious nasal problems.

"People don't want to take care of their animals," he said, and as a result, the need for a stronger ordinance arises.

Raising a pet is much like raising a child. Yet people persist in the belief that dogs are just dogs, and that their dogs are as harmless as toddlers.

"To me, that's juvenile thinking," Alcorn said.

Perhaps the council will revert to adult thinking when the ordinance re-emerges, and consider the greater general interest of everyone to the exclusion of special interests.







THE NEW D.W.I. LAW by Sandra A. Grisham



Last year, sixty-five percent of total traffic accidents in New Mexico were alcohol involved. Three hundred and fifty deaths in New Mexico in 1983 were partly or totally caused by people driving while intoxicated. Close to 5,500 people were injured in alcohol-related accidents. On July 1, 1984, New Mexico's new D.W.I. laws went into effect. The legislature changed several provisions while retaining much of the old law, and the final outcome reflects the growing concern over the senseless tragedies caused by mixing drinking and driving.

Driving is a privilege, not a right, and as such the state can place conditions on driving. One condition is that by driving in this state a driver has impliedly consented to take a blood alcohol test. If the driver refuses to submit to a blood alcohol test, the director of the Motor Vehicle Division must revoke his or her license for one year. If the test is given and the results show 0.1 percent or more for adults or .05 percent or more for drivers under the age of eighteen, an adult's license will be automatically revoked for ninety days and a minor's license will be revoked for six months for the first offense and one year for subsequent offenses.

If the results are immediately available, the officer administering the test confiscates the driver's license at that time, and issues a temporary thirty-day license to allow the driver time for an administrative hearing. The driver then has ten days to request the hearing. These are automatic administrative revocations and are separate from any court proceedings. If the administrative appeal is lost, the revocation remains effective even if the driver is found not guilty in court.

In addition to confiscating the license, if the blood alcohol test shows the required percentage, the officer is also required to charge the driver with D.W.I. Once charged with D.W.I., a person may no longer "plea bargain" to a lesser offense. This eliminates any possibility of a driver pleading to reckless or careless driving. If convicted of D.W.I., a first time offender can be jailed for thirty to ninety days, and/or fined \$300.00 to \$500.00. If jail time is suspended, the driver can be placed on probation for up to three years.

A second or subsequent conviction is penalized by ninety days to a year imprisonment, and/or a fine of not more than \$1,000.00. Probation can last as long as five years, and all D.W.I. convictions remain on the driver's record for life.

If there are two convictions within five years, the statute provides for some mandatory jail time. There are additional administrative penalties to the jail time or fine. Except for first-time offenders sent to D.W.I. school, first and second time convictions result in an automatic revocation of the driver's license for one year, and third-time offenders will have licenses revoked for five years. Again, this is separate and apart from any sentence the Court might impose.







Warning: Adults at play" read the sign at the entrance to the campsite on the Bonito River last weekend. Upon entering the grounds, one was immediately surrounded by the smells of campfires, the sounds of rifle shots, and the sights of the early 1800s.

The gathering (which included children as well as adults) was the second annual Mountain Men "Ron De Voo" held in the Capitan area. The event was sponsored by the Fudo Valley Plainsmen of Roswell and the Guadalupe Mountain Men.

The Mountain Men are part of a national organization of muzzle-loading riflers. Jim Hiller, president of the Sacramento Mountain Men, describes the group as a "competitive, primitive shooting club." At their gatherings—of which there are several nationwide every year—they reenact the fur-trapping period of 1765-1840.

During that period, fur trappers would meet at a rendezvous such as this one to trade their goods. In keeping with the period, the mountain men dress in authentic costumes and set up primitive campsites in which no modern equipment is allowed.

Housing might be a tent, a lean-to or a teepee. Food is cooked on tin and metal (no aluminum) over an open fire made from flint and steel (no matches).

Over the course of the weekend, the mountain men, women and children competed in shooting targets, throwing tomahawks, and building fires the fastest. On Sunday morning was the "Mountain Men Run," a timed competition in which the participants ran through a series of events including shooting targets and setting traps.

At night, they sat around a large council fire "passing the jug around" and "yarning" (storytelling).

Bill Alexander of Odessa, Texas, became interested in the mountain men after reading about their philosophy, which is based on honesty and integrity.

"We don't even lock anything up," said Alexander. "Our handshake is our bond." By the end of this year, Alexander will have attended eight of these gatherings.

The "Ron De Voo" is a family event. Burt Hickey and family of Roswell have been participating in Mountain Men activities for five years. There are competitions for men, women, and children, and even a "pea wee" league. Hickey enjoys the way that the whole family gets involved in making the costumes, camping out and competing in the contests together.

"It's one big picnic," he said. Many of the participants have become friends through seeing each other at these outings. Most of the people have special names, such as "Cow Patty," "Little Hawk" and "Lost Knife."

Most of the mountain people agreed that the outing provided a welcome relief from modern civilization on this Labor Day Weekend. Robert Byrd of Roswell enjoyed the chance to "get out and have a good time."

First-year nursing student Debbie Corbin of Hobbs agreed. "It's great fun," she said. "It's a good way to get away."

1984 Warriors have new coaching staff, should have improved team this season

The Ruidoso High School football team could be on the upswing after two losing seasons.

Ruidoso has a new head coach in Cooper Henderson, some new assistant coaches, and a lot of returning players from last year's 1-9 squad.

Besides Henderson, the assistant coaches are Ronny Maskew, Ed Davis, Mike Speck, Ridge Bowden and Gene Segura. Maskew is the only returning coach from last year's team.

But the biggest plus for the Warriors should be the returning players from last season.

There are 17 players back from last year's varsity team, most of whom started at one time or another.

Although the Warriors lack depth, the talent is there to have a good team.

"I think we've got the potential to be a real good team, but we're not there yet," said Henderson. "The key to our season is to improve all year and avoid a lot of injuries."

Junior Russell Easter will probably start at quarterback when the Warriors open the season at Lovington Friday, September 7.

Perhaps the finest all-around athlete in the school, the 6-1, 172-pound Easter is a fine runner and is ideally suited to run the Warriors' wing-T type offense.

Sophomore Jeff Willingham is an able backup for Easter. Willingham was the starting quarterback on the freshman team last season.

"Our offense is suited to the kind of players we have," Henderson commented. "Our fullback, tailback and quarterback will probably carry the ball most of the time. Our wingback won't run with it much."

The fullback in Henderson's scheme is senior Manuel Montano, a tough 5-1, 146-pound athlete. Montano has good speed and is also a fine defensive lineman despite his lack of size.

Junior Mike Williamson is slated to be Ruidoso's starting tailback. The 138-pound speedster is the Warriors' top breakaway threat. He looked excellent in a scrimmage against Socorro two weeks ago.

Senior Justin Smith is currently running as the first wingback. Other players who should see action there are Mitch Mullican and Randy Reynolds.

Center James Herrera, guard Kevin Jameson and tight end Bobby Dickinson are returning offensive line starters from last season.

However, Dickinson is also the leading candidate at middle linebacker, so Chuck Jarrell is slated to go at tight end.

Other returnees who saw plenty of action in the offensive line last year are tackle Chris Woodul and guard Patric Pearson. Junior Philip Herrera, the biggest man on the team at 288 pounds, adds some depth.

"Our offensive line could be a strong point for us," Henderson said. "If our senior leaders come through, it could be very strong."

Henderson is hoping to have most of his players go one way, so only Jameson and Herrera are presently slated for starting duty on defense. Both will go at end.

The Warriors have a number of candidates for defensive tackle, but it's possible Woodul and Montano might have to start there also.

Dickinson is being pushed by sophomore Billy Harrison at middle linebacker. Chuck Daniels and Brian Davis have looked good at the outside linebacking positions.

In the secondary, Mullican, Willingham, Reynolds and Tracy Gann have looked good and will probably start. But if the Warriors get into trouble, both Easter and Williamson could go into the defensive backfield, as they were starters last season.

The kicking game is one of Henderson's biggest concerns now.

"We haven't really done that well in practice," he said. "Of course, we don't have any goal posts to kick through (at the new practice field)."

Williamson, Jarrell and Easter are vying for the place-kicking job. Easter and Willingham are going for the punting job.

Like most of the other coaches in District 3-AAA, Henderson sees defending champion Silver City as the favorite for the crown.

The Colts have won the district nine

straight years, and could have one of their better teams this season.

But it could be a dogfight.

"I think Cobre's got some big kids, and I hear Deming could be pretty strong. They've got a good passing game and they like to throw."

Hot Springs, which finished second in the district last season, lost heavily to graduation and is not expected to challenge for the title this fall.

Besides the varsity and junior varsity players, there are about 25 Warrior freshmen out.

The Ruidoso freshmen will begin their season Thursday, September 20, hosting Roswell.

Helping the Warrior gridders are several managers, led by student-trainer Richie Sanchez and manager Philip Wright.

Before coming to Ruidoso last spring, Cooper Henderson was the assistant varsity offensive coach at Amarillo, Texas, High School.


Before that, Henderson was an assistant varsity coach at Perryton High School in

Texas, and a freshman and assistant varsity coach at Portales High School in New Mexico.







"We're looking for a balanced attack," Thompson commented. "I like to pass when I can. We're hoping to go about 50-50 passing and running."

The Tigers were 3-5 last season after winning the state championship in 1982. However, Capitan was competitive in most of those losses, and had a lot of talent.

Reserve figures to be the team to beat in the Tigers' district.

Reserve has been perhaps the most consistent powerhouse in the A division the past few years, and could have one of its best teams ever this season.


Other teams in the district include arch-rival Carrizozo, Cloudcroft and Mountainair.

Stearns top offensive threat for Grizzlies

Speed will be the keynote of the Carrizozo High School football team this season.

That will come largely in the person of Steve Stearns, the sixth-leading rusher in the state (all divisions) last season.

The 5-9, 160-pound Stearns ran for 1,152 yards in 10 games last season in leading the Grizzlies to a 7-3 record and a berth in

the state A division playoffs. The speedy athlete also scored 21 touchdowns. He runs the 40-yard dash in about 4.7.

"He's the franchise," Grizzly coach Dennis Sidebottom said of Stearns. "But overall team speed will also be a strong point for us.

"We'll have good team speed, especially in our offensive line."

The Grizzly offensive line won't have a lot of size, but will be very quick.

"We always have a quick offensive line," Sidebottom said. "We pride ourselves on a quick takeoff by our offensive line."

The Carrizozo team will average about 155 pounds per player, so quickness is important.

Joining Stearns in the backfield will be Dominic Vega at quarterback.

Vega, a 5-9, 150-pounder, has quickness and is a "real good passer," according to Sidebottom.

Joe Candelaria, a wide receiver, offers more speed and ability. Kenneth Crenshaw is another back with lots of talent.

In the line, Chuck Zamora at 175 pounds, Benny Zamora at 162 pounds, and center Robert Connors at 165 pounds are top players. Freshman Angelo Vega is the biggest player on the team at 211 pounds.

But depth is probably the most important key to Carrizozo's degree of success this season.

"We don't have that much depth," Sidebottom said. "We can't afford to have many injuries."

Sidebottom and assistants Billy Bob Shafer, Robbie Hollis and Willie Gallegos have 35 players to work with out of a total of 47 boys in the high school.

Who does Sidebottom see as the district favorite?

"Reserve," he answered quickly. "They've got a lot of players back."

Reserve won the district title last season, finished second in the state in 1982, and won the state crown in 1981.

But Sidebottom is not going to give anything away to anybody.

"Actually, I think we've got a chance for first," he said. "We'll be in the running."

The Grizzlies lost in the first round of the playoffs last season, dropping a 28-14 decision to Tatum. But 1983 was still one of Carrizozo's best seasons.


Carrizozo will open the season Friday, September 7, at Hatch.

Brave coaches hope talented players will overcome lack of team depth

Ruidoso (which was called White Mountain Middle School last season) lost their first three games in the 1983 campaign before coming on to win the last three.

The Braves have a very tough schedule this season, and Wharton would be pleased

if the team could equal last year's record.

"The toughest teams on our schedule will probably be Hagerman, Dexter, Portales and Moriarty," he remarked. "I would be satisfied if we equaled that record (3-3) this season."

Ruidoso will also play Tularosa twice

this season, the first time against the eighth-grade team and the second time against the ninth graders.

The Braves are not used to having a losing season. Before last year's 3-3 mark, the Braves had a 5-1 record in 1982 and a 4-2 mark in 1981.




