School board greets HS staff

About 50 people joined the audience for the Ruidoso Board of Education meeting Tuesday night. They didn't come in anger. Most of them were Ruidoso High School staff members.

The meeting was moved from its regular location in the district office to the high school to accommodate the crowd.

Principal Tom Hansen introduced his staff to three inspectors from the state Department of Education. One boy snored sleepily in his father's lap during the introductions, which came near the end of the 90-minute meeting.

The state inspectors were in Ruidoso for two days this week. At a meeting yesterday, they released a largely favorable review of the district's educational program.

They did mention eight new teachers, who expect to complete certification by October 26. The inspec-

tors also recommended that the district examine the guidance program.

At the board meeting Tuesday, four members voted to authorize seeking bids for a bond sale next month. Member Lamar Osbourn was not at the meeting.

Voters had approved the bond sale during a special election last February. The district waited until now to sell the million-dollar package so it could avoid two sales. Officials were waiting for 1984 assessed valuation figures.

In another matter, the district is seeking bids for a chain-link fence around the new high school track.

Board members opened some bids Tuesday for a used lawn mower, a van, pickup trucks and a long distance bus.

In other money matters, the school board members voted to join Cooperative Educational Services. The new southern New Mexico group offers members bulk food buying and

Lodgers hear from Wheeler

Magistrate Judge J.R. (Jim) Wheeler was the guest speaker Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association.

Wheeler is one of three magistrate judges in Lincoln County who handle cases involving state laws, felonies, misdemeanors and civil matters involving up to \$2,000 in contested value.

Wheeler is a former Albuquerque police officer who earned a General Equivalency Diploma but has no law degree. Wheeler has been a county magistrate judge since 1976.

"All I do there (on the bench)," he told the lodgers, "is listen to the evidence presented on a case and make a decision as if I was one of you."

The matters he decides are everyday problems that involve the law, matters that by necessity bring law breakers and business owners, including lodgers, face to face.

Of special interest to the group members were Wheeler's remarks concerning lodging and the theft of services, known as obtaining services by fraud or deceit.

He said when a customer spends a night or two in a lodging facility, and then leaves without paying the bill, the act of failing to pay can be treated in the same way shoplifting is treated.

The police can stop the suspect on the road and make an apprehension, he said, without the issuance of a warrant.

If the case is civil, then no police are involved. For example, if somebody busts up furniture in a rented room, the lodge owner has the right to pursue the incident in civil court. The owner will act without police intervention.

In both criminal and civil cases, Wheeler said, the burden lies with the complainant to prove that the suspect has indeed been responsible for a certain form of damage.

Various laws have been enacted in recent years that give police a stronger hand in battling crime, he said. And the court system is following suit, he added.

"The Supreme Court," Wheeler noted, "is now making it easier for the police and the courts to make communities safe."

He also pointed out that an attorney is not always needed to file a complaint, particularly in his court. The evidence of a case and how it is presented determines the outcome, he said.

Wheeler spoke after a picnic at Two Rivers Park. Sixteen lodgers were present for the sunshine, hamburgers and a brief peek into the complicated system of criminal and civil proceedings.

LTC chairperson resigns

Joan Bailey, the chairperson of the Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC), resigned from her position during the Wednesday meeting of the group.

Citing health and personal reasons, Bailey informed the group of her decision at the end of the afternoon meeting.

"It's been very important to me," she said of her role on the committee. "I'm having to cut some things out."

Bailey had served a full term as a member of the committee and was returning for a second term, this time as chairperson. She encouraged committee members at the meeting to continue their good work.

"I really do believe in the importance of this committee," she said.

Members took no action at the meeting to name a replacement for Bailey.

Also during the meeting, committee members voted to appoint a member at the end of each meeting to report any significant LTC actions or developments to the Ruidoso village council.

The measure was suggested by LTC member Bill Rawlins as a move toward better communications between the groups.

During the Wednesday meeting, many LTC members expressed their dismay at the council's recent allocation of \$20,000 of the LTC budget council-approved funds line item for the upcoming Pro Ski Race.

Members said their recommendation before the ski race presentation was that the money used in an advertising campaign was not effective.

"I feel like they didn't even consider it," Rawlins said of the LTC recommendation. "We need to communicate what our thoughts are."

LTC member Phil Hamilton said council members should have been presented with a detailed proposal for use of the funds

before the ski race presentation.

"They might have had second thoughts," he said.

Leon Eggleston, the Ruidoso village clerk, reported that Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce officials will try to find sponsors for the event, and so may not use the entire \$20,000.

In addition, committee members voted to set up a meeting with council members soon to discuss communication between the two groups.

In other business, the committee members:

—Heard LTC member Rod Adamson give the financial report. He outlined recent expenditures on a lodgers' survey, fall and winter advertising and art festival posters.

—Heard Rawlins report that response so far from the lodgers' survey has not been great. He said the limited success of the project may be caused by poor timing because the last month was a busy time for lodgers.

Rawlins suggested the program, designed to gauge the effectiveness of Ruidoso advertising, should be tried again.

—Heard Hamilton outline the tentative advertising program for the fall and winter.

Much discussion favoring the use of billboard advertising in key Texas cities ensued during his presentation. Hamilton said more work must be done on the campaign before finalization, since earlier plans depended on the \$20,000 the council allocated for the Pro Ski race.

—Voted to require that groups wanting to get LTC funds must first fill out a form to be considered, and that those groups must fill out a follow-up form after their event. Failure to do so will jeopardize future funding for a group that does not comply, the LTC members voted.

—Voted to require recognition of the contribution of lodgers' funds in the printed materials of an LTC-funded group.



Ruidoso Downs trustees okay police car buy

Ruidoso Downs Police Chief Skip Hazel will get a new police car for his department. The village's trustees approved the request unanimously during their regular meeting Monday night.

Hazel told the trustees that in the last week, he had been forced to pull a police car from the road because it had posed a hazard to his personnel.

The car, a 1978 Plymouth with more than 225,000 miles on it, had been in and out of the garage for repairs several times during the last few weeks, he said.

The incident that made Hazel decide to sideline the car happened earlier this week. The police officer who got the car at the garage hit the brakes and went into a spin.

Another vehicle has also had trouble, Hazel added. Much too much time is spent repairing it.

"After eight days on the road," he said, "that car goes back into the garage."

Hazel said two options are available to the village board in terms of replacing the crippled vehicles.

One option is to buy a 1984 Dodge Diplomat equipped with a police package, such as a light bar and interior modifications. The car sells for \$11,778, and can be delivered in 10 to 14 days.

The other option involves leasing a car. Hazel said that, based on a formula of putting 20,000 miles per year on the car, the downpayment on the vehicle would be \$681, with a monthly payment of \$298.

The total year-end cost would be \$3,578. The village now pays \$3,300 per year on each of the Malibu vehicles.

Hazel said he liked the lease program because if it is adopted, it would be like getting a new police car every four years.

"And I think you'll be saving in the long run by leasing the vehicles," he said.

At Trustee Jake Harris' request, the village clerk, Wilma Webb, quickly compiled figures quoted by Hazel. She said buying the Diplomat would

cost \$2,000 less than leasing a new unit.

Hazel said police cars receive rougher treatment than a family car, and in four years may not be worth much in trade-in value.

However, the trustees voted to purchase the Diplomat for the police department.

In other business, the trustees heard from Bill Harvey on the subdivision of property. He was sent to the planning and zoning commission to get first approval of his subdivision request.

Approved the joint powers agreement with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, stipulating that the village pay \$10 a day per prisoner for housing in the county jail.

Heard from Trustee Jacquelyn Brantum on the New Mexico Municipal League Conference held last week.

Among other items, Brantum reported that a state vehicle inspection station was rejected by conference attendees, and that the gross municipal tax may include horse

sales in the future.

She also told of an economist and futurist who predicted robots will soon be prevalent, of a capsule that isolates the age agent from DNA and will help people live productively past 120 years of age, and of future airplanes that will resemble flying saucers.

All of these predictions, she said, are based on tests completed or being completed around the world.

Branum said the economist also noted that the average passenger car will cost \$50,000 by the year 2,000.

Tabled action on a proposed ordinance requiring security at night clubs and entertainment until more details are worked out about how the ordinance will be applied. The ordinance will be considered at the next meeting.

Voted to acquire the Creole Palace property.

Approved the sign request of Monroy Chavez, as it was approved by the P&Z. Chavez plans to post a 34 by 8-foot sign across from the Feed Barn. His business is excavation.



Federal flood damage funding guidelines outlined

"We can put it back to pre-disaster conditions," said Lonnie Chant at the Wednesday flood-relief meeting of local, state and federal officials at the National Guard Armory in Alamogordo.

The meeting, organized to outline the steps local governments need to take to complete the flood relief funding process, was led by Chant. He is the federal coordinating and public assistance officer for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Recent flooding and storm damage to Eddy, Lincoln and Otero counties led to a disaster proclamation by Governor Toney Anaya. His declaration was followed by a request to the federal government for aid, which was made official by President Ronald Reagan September 6. That declaration led to the Wednesday meeting.

According to Chant, local governments are to participate with state and federal engineers who will conduct damage survey reports of affected areas.

The local government will then make a formal application to the disaster field office that has been set up in Alamogordo. Individual applicants are then to be called in to the office, and final steps to funding are to be completed.

Chant said funding from the federal

government will cover 75 percent of the costs of the damage. The state government will pay 12.5 percent of the costs, and local governments will pick up the remaining 12.5 percent.

Only public property is covered by the president's declaration, Chant noted. Some assistance for private property owners who suffered flood damage may be available through the Albuquerque office of the National Red Cross.

Chant said the decision not to fund private property areas damaged stemmed largely from earlier FEMA "windshield inspections" of the affected sites. He said it was decided that the damages FEMA personnel saw could be handled on a local or volunteer basis.

Chant noted that an appeal of the decision not to fund private property areas may still be made.

"The door is still open," he pointed out.

Forms of aid available from the federal government include: debris removal; reimbursement of local governments for extra police time and flood prevention efforts; restoration of damaged public roadways and bridges; repair of damage to public buildings and related equipment; repair of damage to public utilities; repair of damage done to hospitals and private non-profit organizations; and repair of damage to nursing homes and park facilities.

Chant also noted that funding is for the period of August 8 through August

28 only.

"If your roof was already leaking, we're not going to fix it," he said of pre-disaster conditions.

Relief can come in many forms, Chant revealed during the meeting, depending on the amount of aid requested. He said money in an amount "enough to cover this disaster" has been deposited in a federal depository in Santa Fe to be allocated to qualifying entities. Chant said funds may also be forwarded up to 15 days.

Through the FEMA program, funding may be used to restore exactly what was damaged by the flood, or funds may be utilized for a use that will better serve the community, subject to FEMA approval. Final inspections of flood aid projects will be made and audits of damage restoration will be completed by state officials.

According to Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine, some funds may be used to build a more effective, span-type bridge at Paradise Canyon Drive. He indicated his agreement with the funding programs outlined at the meeting, and said other money will be used to restore flood-damaged areas in Ruidoso.

Ruidoso Downs Trustee Conrad Buchanan said he foresaw using the federal aid money solely to restore flood-damaged areas in Ruidoso Downs, and not for improvements or changes. He noted that about half of the roads in the village were damaged by the flood waters.

Hearing set

A hearing to determine possible suspension of the Carrizo Lodge Restaurant food service permit has been scheduled for Friday, September 14, in Roswell.

James Edwards, environmental supervisor of the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division, said the hearing will take place at the EID's district office at 1:30 p.m.

"It's an enforcement proceeding outlined in the food service regulations for someone who has repeatedly violated the regulations."

Edwards said he inspected the restaurant on Friday, August 31, and found various food service violations. One was no protection for outer openings, such as screens, to prevent the entrance of insects and rodents. Another was no disinfectant in the final sanitizing rinse for utensils. A third was failure to properly label toxic items in the kitchen area.

In addition, said Edwards, the restaurant was "pulling down the posted grade emblem indicating an unsatisfactory grade," a violation of food service regulations.

Glen Sherman, food and beverage manager at the Carrizo Lodge Restaurant and Lounge, said the person responsible for pulling down the emblems is no longer employed at the restaurant.

He said the emblems would remain in place, and that the other violations cited by Edwards would be quickly remedied.

Smokey Bear Hot Shots back

After a week in the heat and dust of Montana, the Smokey Bear Hot Shot Crew returned home early last week. The crew had been dispatched to help battle a blaze that involved some 3,300 acres in heavy timber. The fire was concentrated in Glacier National Park and the Crystal Creek section of the Flathead National Forest.

Andy Hale, superintendent of the 18-member crew, said the team was on the fire line within eight hours of being notified that its services would be required.

"We had five shifts," said Hale of the firefighting effort. "The first four shifts, we cut fire line. The fifth shift, we dropped all the trees that presented a hazard or problem, and then we mopped up."

He said a six- to eight-foot trail was cut as a fire line to prevent the fire from spreading beyond a designated area.

Beyond the struggle of the fire and the mop-up shifts, Hale said the crew had to be constantly alert for black bears and grizzly bears.

The crew drove to Albuquerque in the Smokey Bear crew carrier the final weekend in August, climbed aboard a chartered 727, and, two hours later, were picked up in buses and transported to the fire camp.

Police stress weapons proficiency

"We've got a good bunch of shooters here," said Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) Captain Dave Pfeffer of the department officers.

Pfeffer said that while actually firing weapons in the course of duty is rare in the department, proficiency with all weapons an officer carries is highly stressed.

RPD officers must qualify at the shooting range with each weapon they plan to carry on duty or off, Pfeffer said. For all patrol division personnel, that means being capable of scoring 80 or above with both a handgun and a shotgun.

Pfeffer said officers qualify three times a year: during the winter after it has snowed; during the summer; and under nighttime conditions with handguns only.

Qualifying is scheduled under those conditions to acquaint officers with shooting in realistic situations, Pfeffer said.

At the shooting range, an officer fires at a silhouette target of a torso and head from a distance of 25, 15, 10, seven and three yards.

Pfeffer said longer distance shooting is less stressed than short range situations, because statistics show that most police in the field shoot within six feet of their targets.

Scoring at the range begins at 80—no officer who shoots a lower score qualifies. Pfeffer noted that many police departments start at 70. RPD scores from 80 to 90 are qualified as marksman, from 91 to 96 are called sharpshooter, and from 97 to 100 are deemed expert.

Another level, for those who consistently shoot scores of 100, is the combat master classification. Pfeffer said no scores at a recent qualification were less than 92.

For practice, Pfeffer said each officer is allocated 50 rounds of ammunition each month. All ammunition is specially loaded by department personnel. It is the only ammunition an officer can use.

The special loads are designed for knockdown power, Pfeffer said. He said handguns used by the department include .41-caliber magnum, .44-caliber magnum, .45-caliber automatic, .45-caliber long colts, and .45-caliber revolvers.

Each officer may choose a handgun from those allowed by RPD. Twelve-gauge shotguns are supplied to the officers. Pfeffer said other, more sophisticated weapons are available in emergency situations, but are not carried on a daily basis by Ruidoso police officers.

The officers pay for their handguns out of their clothing allowances, Pfeffer said. The average cost of the weapons often exceeds \$350, he noted.

Officers will have even more realistic conditions for practice and qualifying when the RPD "fun house" is built. Pfeffer said it will be built at the site of the present range, the Ruidoso Gun Club location.

Features will include pop-out targets, moving targets and changing targets set in a structure that will simulate a building or house scene. Pfeffer said targets will be "bad guys"—gun-bearing criminals or "good guys"—children and innocent people.

Avoiding shooting good guys while targeting all the bad guys will be part of qualifying, Pfeffer said.

The captain also said automobile and outdoor situations will be staged at the range for added realism.

Pfeffer said construction on the facility could begin this winter or early this spring.

Building inspectors also reported to the board members about the new high school. Hansen said if anyone inferred that he was satisfied with the condition of the building, he was not.

"I'm not trying to pick," he said, "but what I want is a good, sound, waterproof building."

During August flooding, carpets in one classroom wing were damaged and must be replaced or cleaned. Some holes also had to be patched.

In addition, mildew has invaded some sheetrock in classrooms and is even in Hansen's office.

Water leakage also was discovered in the vocational wing.

A teacher there, Thurman Sanchez, asked about the safety of uninsulated wires at junction boxes.

The board members discussed getting a new contractor for this phase of the high school construction.

Band director Danny Flores asked when the final phase, including the arts building, would be complete. He may be able to move into a band hall next April.

In another matter, Mike Gladden, the assistant superintendent, announced enrollments for four college courses at the high school. Freshman composition has 17 students, psychology has an enrollment of 23 and a speech class has 14 students.

A business management class attracted 32 students, plus a waiting list. The classroom has just 30 chairs. A sociology class did not attract enough enrollment.

Credit for the classes is offered by New Mexico State University in Alamogordo.

Near the end of the meeting, Ruidoso Middle School Principal Texie Cole and staffer Linda Hawthorne discussed the new advisor-advisee program.

Groups of 15 to 20 students will be assigned to a teacher for the years they attend the middle school. Cole said the students will find the teachers somebody they can talk to about problems.

The teachers and students can build relationships over the years, and the adults can do some counseling with the youngsters.

In other business, the board members:

—Transferred some items within the district budget and increased others. They added \$28,611 for the Title IV Indian education program and \$2,500 for the artist-in-residence program.

—Hired Sharon Kirgan as an Indian aide at Nob Hill Elementary School.

—Hired bus drivers Kelly Arnett, Anthony Craig, Raymond Bilger and James Jenkins. All have been certified at a school bus drivers school.

—Hired Cathy Ames as a cook at the White Mountain schools cafeteria.

—Accepted the resignation of Andrew Lebron as Ruidoso Middle School custodian and hired Marty Davis for the position.

—Accepted the resignation of Perina Martin as a first grade teacher at Nob Hill Elementary School and hired Connie Forrest for the position.

—Approved an open meetings resolution, an annual action to comply with state laws.

—Received a letter congratulating the high school marching band, which

won first place in the New Mexico State Fair parade competition for groups from schools of similar size.

Leonard DeLayo, the New Mexico school superintendent, sent a certificate honoring the prize-winning band, Danny Flores, Church Cooke and Tim Wadley direct the group.

—Heard Stormy Edwards, the board president, add congratulations to the high school varsity football team. The Warriors beat Lovington 21-16 last week for their first season-opening victory in three years.

—Heard an enrollment report from Gladden. District officials had projected an enrollment of 1,655 students this year, and recently had 1,657 students.

Gladden said the total is expected to increase, although some grades have fewer students than expected. For instance, the district expected 150 kindergartners, but has 136. However, enrollment has increased at the high school.

New Mexico pays more to school districts for older students and for special-education students than it does for younger students. The Ruidoso increases for high school and special-education students will help the district financially.

Gladden said the elementary school enrollment increase has exceeded the six percent the district expects each year. Miller added other area districts have failed to match the enrollment increases in Ruidoso.

Board members plan their next regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, October 9, at Ruidoso Middle School. The building is the former high school, just off Sudderth Drive.

Retail Merchants Committee has non-meeting

The scheduled meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Retail Merchants Committee Monday fizzled out, leaving the two attendees—Budgie Green and Herb Brunell—wondering where next to turn.

Green expressed disappointment in the turnout, especially, he said, since he had been assured by at least four committee members that they would attend the meeting.

He suggested scheduling at least one more committee meeting for the first Monday in October.

"I think it's a great committee. I think it's badly needed," he said. "And I don't want to see it fold."

Brunell noted that it might be better to wait until a new executive director is on board at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce before proceeding with the committee.

He said merchants did not view the

committee seriously, and had little desire to see it work.

During the discussion, member Nancy Shaver sent a note resigning her position on the committee.

Although there was no vote, it was agreed that Green would call on committee members and notify them of the October meeting. If no interest is expressed at that time, the committee will wait until the chamber hires a new executive director.

Capitan election Friday

The Village of Capitan will hold a special election on Friday, September 14. The ballot will consist of two issues of gross receipts tax.

One would raise the tax by one-fourth of one percent, the other would raise it by one-half of one percent. If both issues pass, Capitan's gross receipts tax will rise from four and one-half to five and one-quarter percent.

The first question on the ballot asks for an increase of one-fourth of one percent in gross receipts taxes. Money collected from this tax will go into the village's general fund. The general fund covers such things as wages and street repairs.

This ordinance could have been adopted without an election, but since the council wanted to ask for the one-half percent increase as well, they wanted to leave both decisions to the voters.

The second issue on the ballot asks for a special gross receipts tax of an additional one-half of one percent. Revenue generated from the increase would go to the repair and replacement of infrastructure within the municipality, specifically storm sewers and other drainage improvements.

The council is currently awaiting word from the state attorney general about also using this tax for water improvements and road repairs.

Friday's election is open to all voters within village limits who were registered to vote before August 8. Polling will be held at the Fair Building from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Gross receipts taxes are imposed on everyone who does business within the municipality. If passed, the tax raise will become effective January 1, 1985.

Bond issue for water?

Capitan's water was a strong concern of village council members at their regular meeting in the Capitan Village Hall on Monday night.

The trustees voted to enter into an agreement with Stern Brothers & Co. of Albuquerque, a firm that specializes in bonds, to explore the possibility of seeking a bond issue for water in the future.

"We must educate the public that if we're going to have water, we're going to have to pay for it," said Darrel Fowler, from Stern Brothers.

The process of seeking a bond issue includes holding hearings, analyzing finances, and preparing plans for spending funds by detailing the water system renovation. It takes about a year.

Mayor David Cummins commented on the necessity for Capitan to take steps to raise money for water improvement.

At the Municipal League conference in Santa Fe last week, Cummins learned that when a town applies for money from government grants, officials notice whether the town has tried other sources of income.

"In Santa Fe, they figure that if you're not willing to help yourself, why should they," Cummins said of government workers' attitudes.

He added a bond issue would help Capitan obtain more grants in the future.

Village council members are trying to decide what to do with a \$193,000 grant the village has received.

The money is scheduled to be used to fund building a booster pump and a 200,000-gallon storage tank. However, people are debating where the tank should be located.

Engineers in Albuquerque are working up two proposals for the tank and the pump. Possible locations include a site adjacent to the present water treatment facility and a site in the Hiway Hills subdivision.

During Monday's meeting, the council went into closed session to discuss minutes of the last meeting of the Water Advisory Board (WAB).

WAB chairman Vern Goodwin asked for the closed session because of possible litigation.

Cummins later said some friction existed between the WAB and the Village Council. He emphasized the WAB's purpose was to advise the council, but that the council was free to accept or reject the information.

"The council has the ultimate deci-

sion and responsibility as to how funds are expended," said Cummins.

Also during Monday's meeting, some suggestions were made for defraying the village's water costs. An increase in billing rates for water usage and establishing a separate commercial rate were proposed.

Cummins cited the need for conservation.

"You can control wastefulness by the cost of the water," he said. Cummins asked that specific figures be worked out and discussed at the next meeting.

Another suggestion was having a stand-by fee for meters that are turned off several months each year. Currently, vacationers have turned off 63 pumps and left for the winter. If a \$10 monthly fee was collected on those meters, the village would get an additional \$630 per month.

Charging a water security deposit was also proposed.

In another matter, Cummins announced his appointments to the new planning and zoning advisory committee. Members will be Jimmy Wright, Hollis Fuch, Jim Clees, Herman Otero, Joseph Gemoetz, April Randle, and Duffy Morton.

The trustees approved the appointments.

In addition, Cummins and Trustee Kelly Beavers discussed their experiences at the Municipal League conference.

Cummins said Gini Spall, the Capitan village clerk, was named vice president of the Clerks and Finance Officers Association.

Other Capitan delegates to the conference were Spall, Police Chief Randy Spears and Trustee Bill Allred.

Other business at Monday's meeting included adoption of Ordinance 84-5, which allows the village to collect a \$10 penalty from businesses that do not pay their license fee.

In addition, trustees approved Ordinance 84-6, which amends the village traffic code in accordance with recent state legislation.

Ruidoso gridders aiming for second win against Clint

Fresh from their first opening-season win in three years, the Ruidoso High School Warrior varsity football team will travel to Clint, Texas, Friday for a 7:30 p.m. game. Ruidoso topped Lovington 21-16 last Friday and has an opportunity to gain a 2-0 record against the Lions. They lost a 34-0 decision to powerful Fabens last week.

On Saturday, the Warrior junior varsity will travel to Portales for a 2 p.m. contest.

Last season, the Ruidoso varsity edged Clint 22-21, but later had to forfeit the game because of an ineligible player.

"They're a very quick team but not very big," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson of Clint. "We're probably bigger than they are."

Despite the Clint players' size, the Lions will more than likely present an eight-man defensive front to the Warriors.

"That means we'll probably throw the ball more," Henderson said. "That's what you've got to do when they have an eight-man front."

Clint showed a lot of quickness, particularly in the backfield, against Fabens. The squad has at least one back who is at least as fast as Michael Williamson, the Warriors' speedy tailback.

The Lions rely on finesse and quickness instead of size.

However, Ruidoso may win the battle in both the offensive and defensive lines. The Warrior coaches have been working with the team in both categories this week.

"We didn't tackle that well or have great offensive execution last week," Henderson said. "We got a lot of players to the ball but we slipped a lot of tackles."

"We didn't move the ball well in the first half and we've been working hard on offensive execution and tackling this week."

The Warriors gained 148 yards total offense and gave up 263 on defense against Lovington. Henderson hopes the team can improve those figures against Clint.

Williamson gained 50 of those offensive yards on the ground while junior

quarterback Russell Easter completed three of 12 passes for 52 yards.

Senior fullback Manuel Montano adds running ability while wingback Justin Smith, tight end Chuck Jarrell and split end Mike Smith are key receivers. Justin Smith caught the winning touchdown pass from Easter against Clint.

However, the Warriors' biggest scoring threat may again be the kickoff return. Ruidoso scored its first two touchdowns against Lovington on long kickoff returns by Easter and Willingham.

Last season, Easter proved effective as a kickoff return man, and the Warriors are apparently even stronger in that category this season.

Ruidoso made few mistakes against Lovington. The Warriors did not fumble but did intercept one Wildcat pass. That came in the first half by sophomore Jeff Willingham.


Besides Willingham, middle linebacker Bobby Dickinson also played well against Lovington. The junior keyed a young Warrior defense which showed improvement as the Lovington game progressed.

The Silver Lining

Trene Trujillo
It was good to see so many loved ones and friends at the services held Monday, September ten, at the Church of San Ysidro Labrador (Saint Isidor the Farmer) in Glencoe for Trene Trujillo, who was called Home by Our Lord on September six.

Trene was born July 16, 1909, in Glencoe to Fidel Trujillo and the former Apolonia Benavides. Her parents on both sides were well-beloved pioneers in Lincoln County and were long-time friends of the Storm family.

Fidel, the classic type of Spanish Vaquero, was a special friend of Brother Mark.

Apolonia was the sister of one of the favorite people of the Ruidoso Valley, the legendary Willie Benavides, the last of the wagon drivers.

For years Willie's wagon, pulled by a dun and a grey, was a familiar sight on the highway between Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso. Willie never forgot how his dun horse was pulled out of the quicksand by Louis Smith with the help of Laurence Tafuya.

The tiny Church of San Ysidro, patron saint of the farmer and the rancher, becomes more sacred as the years go by.

And many boyhood friends—now grown to grandparents—were there at the services, bringing back treasured memories.

All the kinfolks and friends at the services paid fond tribute to the spirit of our beloved Trene, and we all take comfort in knowing that she has gone on to meet her mother and father in Heaven with Our Lord.

The Spell of Sweet September

There is a mellow sweetness in the mid-September air, and everywhere a spell of deep contentment dwells, on sunny meadows glowing greener by the day, and fields of tall grass waving at the peaceful sky.

The cows and calves have caught the spirit of this time of year when all the promises are coming true, and the time of quiet happiness is here. Everywhere, Mother Earth has spread a banquet for and wide and many a dreamy resting place is near

at hand. The shade beside the clear murmuring stream bids the mother and the children cows rest and meditate. Or the sunny green glades will do just as well for a place to lie down, for the afternoon is neither hot nor cold.

The season is in a quiet lull, having fulfilled its mission of bringing in the full tide of summer. And yet, amongst the scarlet gilia and evening primrose and other blooms of summer, you see the yellow goldenrod and sunflowers and New England purple aster—the flowers of the Fall. Green Summer and Golden Autumn will soon be joining hands to take us into Indian Summer.

There is a honey fragrance in the air, breathed in over the land from many a golden blossom, overflowing with the abundant life brought by the rain and the sun.

The restless flowing of the waters on the upland heights has stilled. And the river flows with a quiet song in sparkling clearness, much clearer than the air above, now overcast with motionless scattered clouds of gray and white and golden trim.

At the crossing, a large band of pinon jays comes flying in, calling their bugle notes as they light down—some at the shallow water's edge, others in the cedar and pinon, waiting their turn.

In their own special blue, they stand shoulder to shoulder with toes touching the water's edge, dipping into the stream and then throwing back their heads to swallow down their beakful. Some drink their fill and fly up into one of the riverbank trees, their places to be taken by others.

The Apple Picture

The apple situation has not become clear so far as I have heard, with some reports of slim pickings. Still, I notice the apples turning red just before you hit Tull Stansall's Bend, on the way down.

And I stopped by the Montes fruit stand just below the Canyon Trading Post, and Monroy Montes gave me a Double Red Delicious from his stock of apples there. The flavor of the apples is fine this year, and the apple season has begun.

The \$450,000 sale of a full brother to million-dollar winner Make Mine Cash helped bring total receipts from the fourth annual Ruidoso Super Select Sale to a record \$6,675,000.

In the yearling session August 29, 95 head passed through the ring and brought a record total of \$4,626,900. After subtracting the repurchases, the average yearling price was \$50,539 which is the second best in the sale's history.

The following day the broodmare and stallion share auction was held in addition to the Dr. F.A. Foresta partial dispersal sale. Total receipts were \$2,048,100.

Both sales were held in the Super Select Sale pavilion located 12 miles east of Ruidoso Downs.

The grand total of just under \$6.7 million shattered the old record of \$5,613,700 in 1982 when the two sessions were held at two locations on separate dates.

This year's vendue came shortly after Super Select Sale graduate Sixy Chick won the \$954,000 Faberge Futurity at Los Alamitos. One week after the sale another graduate, Eastex, captured the \$2.5 million All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. Sixy Chick was sold for \$16,000 as a weanling in the 1982

broodmare sale, while Eastex was sold in utero in 1981 when his dam, Tall Cotton, was purchased for \$45,000 in the first Super Select Sale.

A total of 14 head sold for \$100,000 or more, including Outcashem, a son of two-time world champion Dash For Cash out of the Easy Jet mare Easy Missile Bar. He is a full brother to Make Mine Cash, a 1981 Super Select Sale graduate who has earned over \$1.1 million. The sorrel colt was consigned by Ted Bruce and Floyd Jackson and sold to Charles Tidwell of Fort Worth.

The \$450,000 ticket for Outcashem was the third highest in the Super Select Sale record books. The highest was the world record price of \$510,000 for Himto Dancer followed by \$500,000 for Hot For Cash. Both were purchased at the first Super Select Sale.

The second-highest seller this year was Sound Of Cash, a Dash For Cash filly out of the thoroughbred Special Sound, who produced world champion Super Sound Charge. She was consigned by the Frontera Farm and sold for \$200,000 to the San Jose Cattle Company.

Other top sellers included: Thats Cashin In, a daughter of Dash For Cash out of Miss Thats

That, who has produced two \$200,000 winners. She went from the Frontera Farm to Louis A. Lucas for \$185,000.

Daship Passion, a Dash For Cash filly out of Sextosee. She sold to Clarence Scharbauer III for \$180,000 and was consigned by Dondi & Associates.

Maid To Dash, a Dash For Cash filly out of the \$120,715 winner Deck'em. She was consigned by the Alred Brothers and sold to Ed Alred for \$160,000.

Dashin Saint, a son of Dash For Cash out of Country Mama, who produced \$418,372 winner Baby Hold On. He sold to the Nine Bar Ranch for \$155,000 and was consigned by the San Jose Cattle Company.

Reach Together, a Raise Your Glass (thoroughbred-TB) filly out of \$254,068 winner Dash Again. She was purchased by AOS Enterprises for \$135,000 and was consigned by Dr. Lindsey Burbank.

Pay Linda, a daughter of Dash For Cash out of Linda Te. She was sold to Robert Moore for \$132,000 and was consigned by the Cimarron Ranches.

Rose Laree, a filly by Super Sound Charge out of multiple stakes producer Runnin Rose. She went from Les Horner to Willie and Dee Talley

for \$130,000.

In the broodmare session, Azurelena was the high seller at \$122,000. She is a daughter of Azure Te (TB) out of the Jet Deck mare Jet Lena and is in foal to Dash For Cash. She was consigned by Quarter Horse Ltd. and sold to Valeria Foresta.

Topping the Foresta dispersal session was Sweet Game, a stakes winner of almost \$50,000 who is in foal to Beduino (TB). She went to the Alred Brothers for \$80,000.

Five head from the Rancho Costa dispersal were also sold, with the Easy Jet mare Sasseem Easy going to Joseph Bryant for \$60,000 to lead the bidding.

Eight stallion shares were sold that day. The high seller was one in Super Sound Charge going for \$36,000.

Super Select Sale general manager Richard Thompson announced the dates for next year's sale. The yearling session will be on August 25 with the summer mixed session on August 26. He also said another yearling showcase, which was so successful this year, would be held. The yearling consignment deadline will be March 15, 1985.

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

So many people wanted to take the business course that names were put on a waiting list. More courses may be offered in the winter.


For years, residents of the Ruidoso area have talked about the need for upper-level classes near their homes. Few people can take the time to attend courses in Roswell or Alamogordo, the closest locations of state university branches.

The healthy enrollment for the Ruidoso classes shows people in this area don't just talk. We put our tuition money where our mouths are, and also spend our time.

The start of college classes shows we are willing to invest in the future and the growth of our community.

Residents of the area who are now college teachers or students deserve commendation. So do school district and NMSU staff members who worked countless hours on the project.

The opening of college classes in this mountain community serves high purposes indeed.

SANTA FE—On one topic at least the Anaya administration has a clear legislative strategy.

It plans to spring an "either-or" trap on lawmakers forced to consider further increases in funding for our state's penal institutions.

Here are the points it means to make on the "either" side of its brief:

The Legislature (prior to the time of the Anaya administration) rejected indeterminate sentencing, which had allowed the state, through its parole board, some measure of control over total number of prisoners actually locked up.

State government (prior to the time of the Anaya administration) signed a consent decree which committed New Mexico to a great leap forward in its treatment of prisoners unlike any such effort it had ever made. Time has run out; that series of 600 or more changes is now due.

And legislators (prior to the time of the Anaya administration) were prodigal in voting funds for additional institutions in Santa Fe, Los Lunas, Grants and Las Cruces. Those installations are now on line or about to become so.

Because of multiple locations, much duplication of facilities and staff is necessary. Every prison needs a kitchen, an infirmary and a minimum number of keepers, no matter whether the security it offers is minimum or maximum. Hence the cost of operating the system has skyrocketed.

So Toney Anaya and Mike Francke are poised here to deliver this message: You who are in charge of raising and allocating state funds must face the consequences of those actions. Steadily growing prison populations will continue to be a drain on our finances, and you have to provide the solution.

In what he proudly says is 5000 pages of budget and budget information, Francke evidently intends to propose that a minimum of \$30 million extra be given his department this year alone. That necessary figure, he will contend, will rise to as much as \$100 million a year in times just ahead.

(Those 5000 pages of information,

the Secretary tells us, are divided into 10 volumes. Some would see that as a full-hearted attempt to justify the request for expanded funding. Others will see it as an effort to make sure no lawmaker bothers to read what you have made available. Bureaucrats know more than one way to skin a cat.)

If that's the "either" portion of the argument, what will be found on the "or" side?

An imperative, the Anaya folks will insist, to undo what the Legislature has already done.

That means, at the very least, killing the determinate sentencing law and granting Corrections the power to decide which of the structures already completed will be fully activated and which not. About the consent decree there is little the state can do. The administration will try to convince the federal courts it is moving as rapidly as possible if the lawmakers show strong signs of willingness to fund the changes required.

But on this horn of the dilemma, there is something more riding than meets the eye.

Here we have the determination of the present Governor to use the system to bring about social adjustment.

He has said it in so many words: "I want to force the Legislature, the courts and society to make some changes."

Those changes, of course, as you can tell from his position on the death penalty, are in the direction of what he sees as more humane treatment of prisoners—fewer and shorter sentences, more opportunities for work release and parole, and a generous improvement in the onerous conditions of imprisonment.

He knows that is not the philosophical direction in which most New Mexicans are presently trending—hence his use of the word "force."

That leaves us with this question: Can a man who has almost totally eroded away the fulcrum he needs for leverage exert sufficient force to move almost all the rest of society when it opposes him?

We will see, won't we?


Another time, I flew through Chicago with a plastic garbage bag of dirty laundry.



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
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New hospital foundation names committee heads

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WHAT IS PROBATE?

A lot of people worry about probate. Many have heard a number of "horror stories" concerning families and probate. Probate is a court proceeding to determine whether or not a person who died had a will. If the person had a will then probate will distribute the property according to the will. If a person died without a will the Court will distribute the property according to the statutes for people who die without a will (see my column on "Do I Need a Will?").

In 1976 New Mexico adopted what is known as the Uniform Probate Code. That statute greatly simplified probate and made probate a quicker process.

If an estate has a value of less than \$20,000.00 and no real estate it is now possible to transfer the personal property without even having to go to court. If the estate has real estate that needs to be transferred to a survivor, then normally a probate proceeding must be done to ensure that the proper person receives the real estate and the real estate is free and clear of all debts of the estate. Normally a simple probate takes approximately 3 1/2 months to complete. Before an estate can be closed the Personal Representative (the term means executor, executrix, administrator, etc.) must publish in the newspaper a notice to creditors for them to present their bills against the estate. If the creditors do not present their claims within two months, then the claims are barred and the Personal Representative can distribute the property free and clear of creditors.

A lot of people fear probate because they think that a surviving spouse will be left destitute while the probate is in Court. This simply is not true. A surviving spouse or dependent children have a family allowance of \$10,000.00 and a personal property allowance of \$3,500.00 which is exempt from the creditors of the estate. A personal representative can be appointed one hundred-twenty hours after the death of the decedent or sooner if necessary.

The personal representative can immediately make distribution of the family and personal property allowance to the surviving spouse or dependent children.

There are ways to avoid probate. One way is to hold property in "joint tenancy". This means that the surviving tenant automatically owns the property upon the death of the joint tenant. However, there can be adverse income tax consequences for property held as joint tenancy and you should consult your attorney or accountant before deciding to use this device.

Another way to avoid probate is to use a trust. This is what Dacy advocates in his popular book, "How to Avoid Probate". I have found that the use of trusts have been very appropriate in some circumstances, but in others the cure (trust) is often more painful than the illness (probate). Again, you should contact your attorney before using this probate-avoiding device.

Probate serves a useful purpose. If it is necessary, it cuts off creditors against the estate, it allows for the inventory and orderly payment of debts of the estate and orderly distribution of the assets of the estate.

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Ruidoso building permits set record

Building activity in Ruidoso took a jump forward in August. The Village of Ruidoso building inspector issued 62 building permits with a total valuation of \$7,187,871.

Those totals were up from 45 permits issued in July with a total valuation of \$4,850,878.

The August permits also represent the highest value of permits issued in a single month, topping the previous high of \$5,073,235 in May by more than \$2 million.

A major reason for the rise in August is the \$3,853,500 hotel development planned by Condel Investments at the intersection of Highway 70 and Mescalero Drive.

A total of 405 permits have been issued this year, valued at \$32,487,565.

The village issued 31 permits in August for the construction of single family dwellings (SFD) with a total value of \$2,819,239, bringing the total so far this year to 204 SFD permits issued with a valuation of \$17,096,892.

Permits for residential additions and alterations totaled 22, valued at \$159,107. The yearly total is 117 issued, valued at \$1,325,014.

The village issued five permits for commercial buildings construction, valued at \$4,038,415. The commercial construction yearly total is 38 permits issued with a valuation of \$8,645,489.

For commercial additions and alterations, the village issued two permits, valued at \$46,950. This year, 21 such permits have been issued, valued at \$26,310.

One permit for demolition was issued in August, valued at \$7,200, bringing the total to five issued this year, valued at \$27,015.

A permit was also issued for the construction of a foundation, valued at \$16,960. Two such permits have been issued this year, valued at \$18,138.


"We had a real good crowd," Means said. "And they came from all over the country, from as far away as Canada, Georgia, Utah, all across the United States."

Runoff-carved arroyos cut through the reddish soil to the river, creations of heavy infrequent rains.




The calm atmosphere enveloping the community of Bent is evident in this yellow-green grasshopper, perched alongside a weed-lined lane.

BENT

It's a place of rugged beauty, marked by dramatic contrasts. The tree-lined lushness of the Tularosa River cuts through arid valleys where even cactus sometimes do not survive. Even the name of this tiny community perched at the foot of majestic Nogal Canyon near Mescalero signifies a type of contrast. Bent is a gathering of hardy ranchhouses along a twisting green river valley within a

parched brown range of the Sacramento Mountains. The land along the river is a place of crops and orchards, while the upper mountain areas are thinly populated by gaunt-horned cattle. It is a place of little rain, and frequent beating sunshine. To the observer familiar with the Land of Enchantment, Bent is truly characteristic of New Mexico.




A valley along the Rio Tularosa is the site of this clutter of ranchhouses and occasional abandoned businesses known as Bent.




The pass came on a third-and-11 situation with 45 seconds left in the game. Smith broke loose from a Wildcat tackler and went into the end zone for the score.



Easter returned one kickoff 78 yards and Michael Williamson scored on an 80-yard return.

The Warriors will attempt to raise their record to 2-0 this Friday night when they travel to Clint, Texas, for a 7:30 contest.







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
