Aspen Parade entries open till Thursday

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce announced that entries for Saturday's Aspen Festival Parade will be accepted through Thursday.

Floats, mounted units, bikes, marching bands and antique cars are just a few of the categories available for the fall celebration. The theme of this year's parade, scheduled for October 6, is "Anything Goes."

The grand marshal will be Gordon Snidow, cowboy artist, Western art pioneer and local resident.

Other entries include politicians Pat Ward, Anita Sanders, Ben Hall, Sandra Grisham and Wilton Howell, Roy Nakayama, the father of chili, the Ruidoso High School Band and the Ruidoso Middle School Band; floats by the Rio Grande Soaring Association, the Ruidoso Police Department, the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Emergency Department and the Texas Club; the Rocket Riders Shrine Club of Alamogordo; the winner of the New Mexico Cinderella Pageant; and the 17-member drill team from New Mexico Military Institute.

As a special treat for the kids, McGruff, the crime-fight hound, will be on hand to ride the Police Department float and wave to the crowd.

The parade departs at 11 a.m. from the corner of Sudderth and Mechem,

and terminates on Bishop Street. Parade entries are being taken at the chamber office on Sudderth.

Preparations also continue for two other events scheduled Saturday—the state championship Chili Cook-off and the midtown Street Festival.

Chili Cook-off organizer Gail Adams announced that Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels will be one of the judges for the event. Site of the cook-off is the parking lot of Nottingham's Pub in midtown, beginning at 11 a.m.

Besides the cooking and tasting chili, several games are planned for chili aficionados attending the cook-off. These will include an egg toss, a lemon roll, "plumber's friend," chile punt, pass and kick, Billy the Kid look-alike contest, tortilla toss, and wet T-shirt and ugly foot competition.

The only charge for spectators at the cook-off is one dollar to buy a bowl for tasting chili.

The Street Festival, also set for the midtown area, gets under way at 2 p.m. Featured entertainment will include square dancers, break dancers, jugglers and a clown. Various musicians will perform, too.

Gymnasts and firemen will give demonstrations, with the firefighters rappelling.

Warriors tie Rams, stay unbeaten

They may not have ended up on the long end of the score as they did in their first three games, but the Ruidoso High School varsity football team gained a giant measure of respect by tying host Portales 20-20 Friday night.

The game was played in steady rain and hail, which made footing treacherous and holding the ball tough for both teams.

Ruidoso, now 3-0-1 on the season and sixth ranked in the Associated Press state AAA division poll, gained the tie against the state's fourth-ranked AAA team by driving 40 yards for a touchdown and two-point conversion with just over five minutes left in the contest.

Quarterback Russell Easter finished the drive with a one-yard plunge on fourth down for the touchdown.

The Warriors then went for the two-point conversion and Easter found senior tight end Chuck Jarrell all alone in the right side of the end zone for the two points and the tie.

The drive was set up by a Ram fumble on the Portales 40.

Easter ran for 15 yards to the 25, but a pass was incomplete on the next play.


The Warriors then moved 21 yards in four plays to the four.

Ruidoso appeared to be over the goal line on a couple of plays, but the referees ruled the ball short. However, Easter bulled over on fourth down for the score.

The Warriors had to hold off two more short Portales drives to preserve the tie.

After holding the Rams on the next series, the Warriors received a short punt but the ball was fumbled on the 30.

Ruidoso held the hosts and ran the ball for four plays before punting again. Time ran out before Portales was able to get into good field position.

Ruidoso started the game off in impressive style.

On the second play from scrimmage, Easter ran 51 yards down the sidelines to the Portales four.

After a short gain and offside penalties on both teams, Michael Williamson ran over for the touchdown from the one.

The run for the extra point was short, but the Warriors led 6-0 with 10:35 left in the first quarter.

But Portales struck back quickly, driving 61 yards in six plays for a touchdown.

Halfback Tony Pena, who scored all three Portales touchdowns, ran in from the 10 for the touchdown.

The run for the two-point conversion failed, and the score was tied 6-6 with 7:20 left in the opening period.

Williamson put the Warriors ahead with 15 seconds left in the first period

when he dashed 63 yards for a touchdown.

The Warrior junior, who led Ruidoso with 110 yards rushing, broke through a hole, cut to his right and outran several Ram players for the score.

A pass for the two-point conversion was incomplete, but the Warriors led 12-6 at the end of the quarter.

Pena tied the game with a 15-yard run to finish a short drive in the early part of the second period.

Quarterback Rod Emerson then threw a pass to Von Buzzard for the two-point conversion, and Portales led 14-12.

The Rams went ahead 20-12 in the closing moments of the first half on a two-yard run by Pena. A pass for the two-point conversion failed, and Portales led 20-12 at halftime.

At the beginning of the second half, Portales picked up where it left off by driving 50 yards to the Ruidoso 12.

However, Ruidoso's Kevin Jameson recovered a Ram fumble there and the Warriors started a drive of their own.

Easter, who did not complete a pass in the first half, completed two in the drive. One was a 19-yarder to Mike Smith, and the other was a 26-yarder to wingback Justin Smith, who was stopped at the Ram 10.

Williamson ran for two to the eight, but the drive stalled there and a quarterback sack ended the threat.

On the next series, Portales fumbled. The Warriors then drove in for the tying touchdown and extra point.

Ruidoso gained 312 yards total offense while the Rams had 318. Besides Williamson's running, Easter completed three passes for 60 yards and gained 89 yards on the ground.

The Warriors again proved tough in the turnover department, forcing four Portales fumbles and intercepting a pass when sophomore Jeff Willingham picked one off in the first half. It was Willingham's fifth interception of the season.

"I guess the biggest thing we did was we proved we could play with a very good ball club," Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson said. "They're a big, physical team, the best we've played this season."

Henderson also praised the Warrior defense for stopping the Portales offense in the second half after it had scored three touchdowns in the first half.

Now the Warriors will host New Mexico Military Institute Friday in Ruidoso's homecoming game.

New Mexico Military Institute lost to Tularosa 14-6 Friday. The Warriors clubbed Tularosa 28-6 last week.

NOTES: The Warrior coaches selected tackle Chris Woodul as the offensive player of the game. Willingham was named the top defensive player, and Steve Gonzales was the top scout team player of the week.

Petition calls for pediatrician at local hospital

Hundreds of people have signed a petition asking for a pediatrician in Ruidoso, says the woman who circulated the document recently.

Last week, Andree Cohen presented the signatures to Ken Moore, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital administrator.

"Being pregnant myself, it came to my attention that we do not have a pediatrician in Ruidoso," Cohen said with a wry smile as she presented the petition Thursday.

"There's no reason we shouldn't get the best pediatric care right here in Ruidoso," she added.

Cohen noticed an ad in The Ruidoso News for BCA Medical Associates. The Roswell doctors plan to send a pediatrician to Ruidoso every Wednesday, beginning October 3. The doctor would use Dr. E. V. Stalzer's office on Sudderth Drive.

She would like to see a full-time pediatrician here, and started the petition with that aim. She said she gathered hundreds of signatures of backers in a little more than a week.

"I have not been to the schools, or out to the day care centers," she said. Cohen believes she could easily gather more support. "This is just from a week to 10 days of running into people."

She sees a couple of possible problems with the Wednesday pediatrics plan. First, the Roswell doctors cannot admit their patients to the Ruidoso hospital.

Moore said they had not yet asked for permission for that. They would have to send seriously ill patients to hospitals out of town.

Second, if a child became sick on a day other than Wednesday, visits to the doctor might be delayed up to a week.

Moore generally agreed with her, and said hospital board members discussed the Roswell doctors' plan at their recent meeting. "Having a

pediatrician here one day a week is better than none," he said.

The hospital board instructed Moore to discuss a full-time practice with the Roswell group. He plans to ask if they would consider expanding into a full-time practice in Ruidoso.

He said they might want to gauge demand, or seek office space near the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Moore said the hospital might also consider recruiting a full-time pediatrician for Ruidoso. If either the doctors' group or the hospital does that, they would be likely to approach members of the medical class who

will graduate next June, he said.

Ruidoso might get a full-time pediatrician next summer, Moore said, but the hospital would not want to settle for just any doctor. "To get the background we're after, it could be August," he said.

"It'll either be those guys, or we'll bring somebody else in," he predicted.

However, he indicated he would hate to see a doctor come into the area without access to needed equipment. Moore used his discussion with Cohen as an opportunity to urge sup-

port of the hospital levy placed before voters this November.

"Equipment is one thing we'd spend the mill levy on," he said.

Moore also mentioned results of an examination of income and expenses from the last fiscal year. "We made a whopping \$18,000 profit," he said.

The hospital had operating expenses of \$4,764,519, so that profit represented money to stay in operation for two days, he said.

Moore said he planned to pass the petition along to hospital medical staff and board members.



Motorcycle Festival a success, despite the weather

Despite the generally miserable weather, the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival managed to send home delighted motorcyclists and vendors, many of them promising to return next year.

Nancy Radziewicz, one of the organizers of this year's festival, reported low participation in certain events, but overall success throughout the four days of the festival.

"It was fine," she said. "We had very positive responses from the vendors. Many of them already put down a deposit for next year ... But the weather was a problem."

The Scavenger Hunt-Poker Run Friday, intended to draw the motorcyclists into local shops, met with mixed reviews from business people, and a suggestion for next year.

"We had a few (bikers) dribbling in this morning," said Florence Wilson of the Roadrunner. "Probably 30 today."

She said a few of the visitors had stayed and shopped, but many were in a hurry to continue the hunt.

"I imagine we got a few we might not have gotten otherwise," she said. "So it's a good idea."

Herb Brunell of Brunell's seemed to think the concept was good for business, particularly his.

"In fact," he said, "for the cost involved—which is nothing to me—the return's been good."



About two dozen motorcyclists stopped in his store to select from sets of buttons offered for the scavenger hunt. Several browsed and made purchases.

At Old Mill Curios, Donna Druss reported that about 20 people showed up for the event and made off with the postcard she provided for the hunt.

"But as far as people staying and purchasing things, no," she said. "They come in, pick up the postcard, look around for a minute and leave."

She wasn't sure whether the scavenger hunt did any more than simple curiosity to draw people into town and into the shops.

According to organizers, motorcyclists were to be given a blue, pink

or white sheet of paper with the names of the shops they had to visit on it.

Jean Stillman of SJS Lock & Safe Company said she was down on all three lists. As a result, she recorded 75 different visits from participants in the event.

She said she made some keys and sold a few padlocks and key rings. But she got the feeling that the motorcyclists were rushed.

"They felt a little pressured to find what they were supposed to and get on to the next place," Stillman said. "A lot of them said, 'I just wish we had a little more time.'"

She suggested that the hunt begin next year on the first day and be stretched out over two or three days. In that way, she said, the bikers would stick around and do some shopping.

The idea, though, was great, she said. "The bikers really enjoyed it. The first-timers saw Ruidoso, and the old-timers saw what's new in Ruidoso."

Throughout much of the festival, the weather played havoc with participants. Many riders reported foul weather in all directions, said Radziewicz, with snow in Colorado and rain, high winds and fog elsewhere.

"It was just a freaky thing," she said, which may have added to a lower-than-expected turnout for the scavenger hunt.

Radziewicz also reported that there were no incidents or accidents on the grounds—at the Super Select Sales Arena—festival headquarters.

Winner of the McDonald's Gigantic \$1,000 Poker Run prize was Charles Griffin of McLean, Texas.

Betty Albert of Covington, Louisiana, was the winner of the first grand prize, a custom-dressed touring Honda, complete with a Poly Tron Cargo Trailer, valued at \$15,000.

The second grand prize, an Eagle HI Cargo Trailer, worth \$925, went to Larry Reed of Hill City, Kansas.

And the third grand prize went to Bob Moliene of La Luz. Moliene won the European tour package, valued at \$2,500.

Public television station KENW of Portales, Channel 3, was on hand for the festival. The station filmed numerous events, including Saturday's parade. Broadcast of those events will begin today (Monday) at 5 p.m.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor estimated the number of motorcycles at about 7,500, with the total number of people attending the event set at more than 9,000.

Swenor said there was one minor accident before Saturday's parade, but nothing major. He said the accident amounted to two bikers bumping each other and dropping their motorcycles.

"Overall, as far as we know from incident reports and accident reports," he said, "we had no trouble at all. It was one of the best ones we've had."



Taco Villa breaking new ground

Regarding Ruidoso as a test market with an unusually high growth potential, Taco Villa came to town recently, armed to do business.

Craig Van Amburgh, director of marketing at the company's corporate headquarters in Midland, Texas, said some early basic research convinced the company that the area is far from stagnating in terms of business and capital investment.

"The main reason we picked Ruidoso is that our growth goals over the next two years are in Texas and New Mexico," said Van Amburgh. "And our growth plans dictated ... that Ruidoso is a very good place for us to go."

He said the company examined traffic flow, per capita income and gross potential, and that all three aspects pointed to a strong market.

Even the company's sales people had noted the physical potential during drives from Alamogordo to Roswell, he said.

But because the town relies heavily on tourism, he noted, there was uncertainty about whether the Ruidoso outlet could expect the type of growth other Taco Villas register, particularly during the off-season.

"So it's a test market in a sense, since it's the first time we've started up in a tourist industry town," Van Amburgh said.

Two other firsts at the Ruidoso outlet, on lower Sudderth Drive, relate specifically to design.

Van Amburgh said the company has studied interior and exterior store design over the last couple of years to make their outlets nationwide more attractive and functional.

The two design changes at the Ruidoso store, which may be carried to other stores, are a covered drive-through window and an exterior playground.

Both changes have worked well for the local store. Manager Chris Beard said the covered drive-through is "one of the best things they've incorporated in years. And the playground is a nice touch. It adds a nice touch."

Beard said the covering over the drive-through protects customers and window employees from rain and wind, and makes the ordering and pickup process more reasonable.

And the playground has been so

popular, he said, that a daily maintenance schedule has been established to straighten up after the kids.

Van Amburgh said each Taco Villa store has a monthly goal of \$40,000 gross. While the Ruidoso store has had no difficulty matching or surpassing that goal as yet, he said, it is anticipated that some of the slower months will require bolstering from the summer and skiing months.

He emphasized that the local trade, though, would be as aggressively sought as the tourist dollar. Beard agreed.

"We're a community-oriented company and we're here to serve the community," he said. "We're here full time and we want to relate that to the community."

Beard said as one of the year-round businesses, Taco Villa wants to be a part of the growing town.

"We're not here to take the money

and run. We're here to put something back into the community."

Both Van Amburgh and Beard said the next major thrust for the Ruidoso store would be the marketing of its breakfast line.

Breakfast is an increasing tradition with fast food franchises, including other Taco Villas. Beard said the breakfast items available now naturally complement the overall product line of the company.

For example, he said, Taco Villa offers a menu item known as the breakfast burrito. The burrito comes wrapped around eggs, eggs and sausage, eggs and ham, or eggs and meat. All are offered with a choice of sauces.


In addition, said Beard, orange juice, Danish pastry and hash browns are available, as well as the company's full product line.

"It's for people who normally don't have time for breakfast," he said. "And they can eat the burrito in their car without making a mess."

Beard expects the breakfast business to take hold before long, particularly since a fast-food type breakfast is served in only one other location in town.

Described by Beard as a Mexican-style family restaurant, the local Taco Villa employs 20 persons and is open daily. And though it is less than two months old, the customers are finding it pleasing to the palate.

"It's coming along real well for us," said Beard. "And we expect, in the next few months, that it'll pick up in line with our projected goals."

Yule tree permits

The Lincoln National Forest will again this year sell Christmas trees to individuals for their personal use. A total of 3,900 trees, mainly pinyon pine, will be available for cutting in five areas of the forest.


Fir trees will be sold only in the Mayhill District, due to the damage caused by the current spruce budworm infestation.

Permits will sell for \$5, and will entitle the holder to a tree up to 10 feet in height. Applications for a permit will be available about the first of November.

The application will contain the location of the cutting areas and the number of trees available. As the time approaches, additional information will be made available by the offices of the Lincoln National Forest.

Buildings sold

First Capital Corporation, a national real estate investment company, has acquired five bank buildings that belonged to Moncor Bank, N.A., of New Mexico in a long-term sale leaseback transaction for a total of \$11,943,099.



Moncor Bank, including the Ruidoso-based branch, has become the lessee of the buildings.

Moncor president James Atwood said the sale "was simply, primarily, a business move." He said the leaseback transaction provides the bank with the option of buying the buildings back a few years down the road.

Atwood said the transaction was a profitable move, intended to allow the bank "to take a profit on the real estate."

Besides Ruidoso, First Capital purchased the Moncor buildings in Carlsbad, Rio Rancho, Artesia and Roswell.

'85 cars coming

New car and truck prices are going up, but both Ruidoso new car dealerships report that plenty of 1985 models will be on hand this month.

Clark Scott, vice president of Buck's All-American Ford-Lincoln-Mercury, said he expected to have a full line of new cars and trucks on the lot by October 4.

He said he also expected the accompanying price tag to average about 10 percent higher than last year for the same model.

Ted Durham, general manager of Sierra Blanca Motors, said he would be fully stocked with 1985 models between the middle and the end of the month.

He said he was looking for an average increase of approximately 2.2 percent over last year.

Both men said their stocks of 1984 model cars and trucks were lower than usual, attesting to a strong year in sales.





The success of the United States gymnasts at the recent Summer Olympics is helping to encourage young gymnasts in the Ruidoso area.

Over 90 youths have signed up for the fall gymnastics classes offered by the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department in conjunction with the Ruidoso School of Gymnastics and Creative Fitness.

"Things are going great," said Robyn Garrett Johnson, who is in charge of the recreation gymnastics program. "A lot of kids have signed up."

"The Olympics have definitely helped spur interest in our program. It's always that way in an Olympic year. Everybody has heard about Mary Lou Retton (the United States gymnast who won the Olympic women's all-around championship)."

Classes will begin Monday, October 8, in a building near the Upper Canyon. The building will be called the Village of Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Center.

The kinds of classes offered include a class for tots one and a half to two and a half years old; pre-gymnastics classes for youths three to four years old and five to six years old; a class for youths seven years old and up; and an intermediate class for more advanced gymnasts seven years old and up.

There will also be a class for boy gymnasts, with particular emphasis on the parallel bars, rings and trampoline.

Most of the gymnasts that have signed up so far are girls. About one-sixth of the youths who have registered are boys.

"There are a number of boys in the younger classes," Johnson said. "It just seems that as boys get older, they turn to other sports, like football and soccer."

Besides the recreation gymnastics program, the Ruidoso School of Gymnastics and Creative Fitness will have a competitive program when it gets a permanent building.

The recreation building is somewhat limited in space for the floor exercise. However, there is ample room for a good tumbling program and other exercises.


The school's competitive gymnasts are working with the Pecos Valley Gymnastics Club in Roswell until the new building is available. Funds are being raised for the new building.

"We're looking at three parcels of land—where the building might be located," said Bonnie Richardson, president of the gymnastics school. "However, we haven't made a decision yet."

"We're hopeful of having a place within a year."

Regardless of when the new gymnastics school building is completed, the future of youth gymnastics in the Ruidoso area is definitely on the rise.

Camp Sierra Blanca danger downplayed by state official

Although the minimum security prison at Camp Sierra Blanca houses the "least dangerous" inmates in the state, according to Corrections Secretary Mike Francke, it does not comply with the county commissioners' April resolution asking that no prisoners convicted of violent offenses be placed there.

At a town meeting in Capitan Thursday night, Francke and other Corrections officials discussed the prison, which is near Fort Stanton, and the community.

"We'd received indication that some local citizens were unhappy about having a prison in the area," said Francke. "We wanted to come down and open the lines of communication—to talk turkey."

Attending the meeting were Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels, Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) warden Bob Marrs, various Corrections officials and Corrections Commission members, Capitan Mayor David Cummins, County Manager Suzanne Cox and Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan. Only a handful of local residents attended.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the prisoner classification system. This system determines which prisoners are placed at CSB.

"I suspect that people prefer the least dangerous prisoners and this is the lightest weight institution," said

Francke. "The other two minimum security institutions have tougher prisoners." He noted that CSB has no rapists or murderers—first or second degree.

However, 16 of the 45 inmates at CSB are currently serving time for violent offenses. According to Marrs, one prisoner is there for voluntary manslaughter, four for armed robbery, four for robbery, one for false imprisonment, two for aggravated battery and two for aggravated assault. Crimes of the other inmates include shoplifting, forgery, fraud and drug trafficking.

CSB has a work furlough program for which prisoners with three years or less left to serve on their sentences are eligible. Marrs stressed that all prisoners working in the community are carefully screened, and that work furlough is "a privilege, not a right."

Escapes from CSB usually average five or six a year, but there have been no escapes so far in 1984. Marrs attributes this to the new (as of 1983) classification system.

"I think this is the best classification system ever," he said. "If you get the wrong people, there are escapes."

Allen Sherman, director of classification, explained the system and the changes. The current system began in the spring of 1983.

When a prisoner is first convicted in the state, he is sent to the state's reception and diagnostic center for

one or two months. After evaluative tests and medical and psychological screening, a recommendation is made on where to place the prisoner.

Several committees review the recommendation before placing of the inmate. If a warden feels that a

prisoner should not have been sent to his institution, he can appeal the decision.

Sherman described the breakdown of prison divisions. There are three types of prisons: minimum security, where the prisoners are not con-

sidered risks to the community; medium security (such as at Las Cruces and Los Lunas); and maximum security—the penitentiary in Santa Fe.

Sherman stressed that no prisoners are sent to CSB without psychological evaluation and clearance. All prisoners at CSB must be physically fit to work.

A few years ago, before the new system was implemented, there were some problems at CSB, it was noted. In 1981, there were a murder committed in the camp.

Sheriff Sullivan said that in 1979 and 1980, "There were some pretty bad horrors in there."

Sherman said that when he took over the Classification Department in 1983, he moved the last of the dangerous prisoners to the state penitentiary.

The community, however, would prefer that there were no inmates convicted of violent offenses placed at CSB. Because of this concern, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners passed a resolution on April 24 asking that none of those prisoners be sent to CSB. Yet, as noted earlier, 16 inmates are there for violent offenses.

Once again, Francke stressed that CSB houses only the "lightest" criminals. He explained, "I've got 70 beds (at CSB) and a full system. If we take those 16 out, they'll be replaced with 16 that aren't as nice. I can't af-

ford to let beds go vacant."

Francke also said that CSB "looks like a Boy Scout camp to me. If I were a prisoner, I wouldn't act up, because they won't get transferred to another minimum security facility."

Warden Marrs said he felt comfortable with the prisoners at CSB.

"No one is more interested in this than me," he said. "My family lives right on the grounds."


Also discussed at the meeting were Corrections Industries and volunteers. Jim Mickelson, director of Corrections Industries, told the group that plans are under way to produce "high-tech, state-of-the-art" furniture at another facility. CSB would serve as a research and development center for the furniture plant.

Marie Porter, coordinator of volunteer services, expressed her appreciation to the volunteers who were in the audience, and stressed the need for volunteers. Prisoners need contact with volunteers from the outside world because most will eventually return there, she said. There are 700 prison-volunteers in New Mexico.

Towards the end of the meeting, Mayor Cummins commented on the lack of local attendance at the meeting.

"If something's going good, they don't give a damn," he said. "But if something goes wrong, then they're on your can."

"We gathered around the band shell and sang the old songs," said Dorothy. "They even had me sing 'Smokey the Bear.'"



The day that Ford became vice president had special meaning for Dorothy. In high school, they had been voted the boy and girl who achieved the most. "When he became vice president," she said, "I took out my trophy and shined it up."

Actually, becoming the president of the United States was hardly Ford's first crack at politics. In high school, Dorothy ran for vice president on Ford's presidential ticket.

He lost, but she won. When Ford was choosing a running mate in the U.S. presidential election, Dorothy wrote to him that she was available. He didn't reply at the time, but they joked about it later.

That afternoon at the reunion, Dorothy was named Alumnus of the Year and was awarded a check from the class as a Smokey Bear conservationist. The check was to be presented

to John Ball Park. In return, a 30-foot English oak tree was planted in the park, with a bronze plaque at its base inscribed with a dedication to Dorothy.

In 1981, Ford had received this award, and his \$1,000 check went to the Gerald Ford Museum.

Dorothy's speech at the program covered anecdotes about her life as a forest ranger's wife and her involvement with Smokey Bear.

At the time of the big Capitan fire, Dorothy's husband, Ed, was the ranger in Ruidoso and was summoned to Capitan to be a dispatcher. Dorothy was a stringer for the Associated Press and a correspondent for the local papers.

Dorothy was the first reporter to cover the big fire. "I went there the day that Smokey was rescued and contacted the AP with the story," she said. At that time, the burnt bear was known as "Hotfoot Teddy."

"I had a little old box camera that didn't take very good pictures," she said, "but no one else took pictures until after the fire was over."

In 1954, her husband was transferred to the Capitan station. Over the years, Dorothy chaired many committees involved in honoring Smokey.

With the Capitan Women's Group, she put up the portals that honor Smokey. She also helped organize the big Smokey Day in 1955. Most impressively, Dorothy designed the Smokey Bear Museum.

Besides her involvement with Smokey and putting Capitan on the map, Dorothy also was very involved in helping her husband run the ranger station.



"When we first started in the Forest Service, the ranger's wife had so much work to help her husband run the district," she said. "There were no radios then, so when phone calls came into the station, the ranger's wife had to handle them ... call firefighters, et cetera. This is no longer the case now."

Dorothy titled the book she wrote, "The Ranger's Rib," because she helped her husband so much. The book tells about her life as a forest ranger's wife, and gives some amusing stories from those times.

One story tells of a time when her husband was cleaning up some campgrounds and a distraught man came running to him for help because his wife was stuck in the outdoor "privy."

Apparently they had been trying for hours to open the door, but had no luck. Dorothy's husband went for his crowbar, but he never had to use it. One shove was all it took; the couple had been pushing the door the wrong way.

An hour spent talking with Dorothy Guck provides one with a delightful insight into Capitan history and the spirited women who helped to create it. The class of '31 made no mistakes in honoring this year's most distinguished alumnus.

McGruff here to take bite out of crime

If you see a large dog wearing a trench coat roaming around Ruidoso and Lincoln County, don't be alarmed. It's "McGruff," the crime dog, "taking a bite out of crime."

A cooperative effort by the Ruidoso Crime Stoppers, Ruidoso Police Department (RPD), Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and Neighborhood Watch has resulted in the organization of a local crime prevention campaign to coincide with National Crime Prevention Month, as proclaimed by

President Ronald Reagan for the month of October.

A major part of that campaign, according to RPD officer and Crime Stoppers member Mark Paz, will be the use of a McGruff dog costume recently acquired by the Ruidoso organizations. Editorial

Though they won battles in the past, the group of Upper Canyon residents who opposed development in Sleepy Hollow subdivision probably lost the war last week.

A 42-acre tract of land there is one of several "pockets" in the village—areas surrounded by the Village of Ruidoso that have never been annexed. The Upper Canyon group successfully opposed two attempts to have the property annexed—in 1978 and 1983.

The 1983 request would have brought the property into the village with an R-1 (single-family dwelling residential) zoning.

The village council then in power did not approve the request, which meant the land stayed in the extraterritorial zone. When the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority considered a C-P zoning (commercial planned development) last week, the same group attempted to prevent that zoning.

This time they lost. Those folks, and perhaps the entire village, would have been better off to support a Sleepy Hollow annexation with an R-1 zoning.

Of course, what they really hoped was that the land would never be developed at all. And that would be great if the land were public.

"There is no way you can deny a property owner the use of his property," was the assessment of Paul Davis. That assessment is true, and the anti-development group may end up regretting they opposed the highest and best use.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Taiwan wants to buy more corn than New Mexico can produce, at a price at which we can't afford to sell.

That's the net result of the Great Leap Forward in international trade arranged most recently by the Anaya administration.

It's not easy to arrive at a conclusion of that kind. To do so, you have to fight your way through a veritable cloud of blah and hoorah sent up around the subject by the Governor's drumbeaters. It's meant to convince us all that the Anaya people have brought the millennium one step closer.

For instance, the Governor was as breathless as a girl on the way to her first prom when he called that Taiwanese offer to buy 27,000 metric tons of corn at \$130.27 per ton "a tremendous concession to us."

True agricultural experts, of whom Anaya is not one, say the reverse is true; for us to take that deal would be a great concession from us to them.

The Taiwanese visit, so carefully staged and dramatized, turned out to be lots of show, with little substance.

Even that firm contract to buy 80 buses for use on their island will do New Mexico little good if the buses get built in North Dakota.

Anaya and his team can't seem to get it through their heads that "economic development" means a lot more than whoop-it-up salesmanship to bring new industry and loads of tourists to New Mexico.

To be more than a hollow show, such efforts must be solidly based. They should be footed in a thorough understanding of the state's present economy and how it works, just to list one prerequisite. Have you ever seen any hard evidence that anybody in a policy-making position in the department to which the economic development role has been assigned is a true expert in that field?

Most students of the subject will further add that the major thrust of this kind of operation must be to expand and solidify the existing economy, not to concentrate only on the new and glamorous. But what do

we hear from those who hold the job under Toney? Mostly a lot of glib talk about "high tech" and "turning New Mexico into the second Silicon Valley."

That isn't telling the taxpayers the truth; it's trying to seduce them.

The latest Anaya efforts, all conducted in a glow of spotlights, exemplify the weakness of the present system.

Put less-than-professional people in charge of such matters and you run the risk of having the whole process turned into a circus.

That happens, as in New Mexico at present, when appearance and show take precedence over genuine accomplishment.

Where the true but hidden agenda of a government department is solely to make the man at the top look good, almost every effort, even from those who are sincerely trying, is vitiated. The showbiz aspects will always exert a built-in bias in such circumstances and sensible priorities will be dropped to pursue those which are less desirable.

There's also a kind of contempt for the rest of us hidden behind the belief that we can be conned. "Tell 'em anything, as long as it sounds good" is not really an adequate position from which to operate government. Those who adopt it may well tell us more about themselves than about the way they regard us.

Right now isn't the time to call on New Mexico farmers to make up a clause for some mere politician. A recent survey shows almost half our farm families are operating with a debt-to-asset ratio which the United States Department of Agriculture says indicates disaster is just over the horizon. Many of them say if current trends continue, they expect to be in business only for one more year.

In those circumstances, it seems particularly heartless to be issuing boastful press releases making promises with little behind them.

After all, there are things which should not be sacrificed merely to build the image of our chief executive.

On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



I didn't go down to Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival headquarters, expecting to observe an artist at work, but that's what I spent most of my time doing.

Steve Kafka of Phoenix, Arizona, bills himself as "America's Best Pinstriper." Pinstriping is the painting of decorative designs on motorcycles and other vehicles.

I wondered how Steve could lay claim to being "the best."

He told me he had been so designated by Ed "Big Daddy" Roth, a legendary figure in the world of car shows.

Steve was doing a "\$25 tank job" while we talked. He held a small brush in his right hand, and used his left hand to brace the right. He used the tips of his little fingers to guide the stroke.

"I'm the only one in the country who can work a brush like this," said Steve, demonstrating. "I did this in front of Ed Roth and his jaw dropped."

By pushing down on the tip of the brush, he varied the width of the stripe to achieve a design effect. Another effect was color.

The job I witnessed was a "grey fade-out." Steve's palette is a metal slab set on a well-used folding TV-type table. He mixed the oil-base enamel into darkening shades of grey.

years ago look like he just did them. "I like people to protect their investment."

That investment could run from \$25, like the tank job I was watching, to \$500, like a Florida industrialist paid to have his bike striped in gold leaf.

A basic two-color job on a whole bike costs \$150. Steve told me he and his fellow strippers at the festival made it a point not to undercut each other's prices.

They had competition from a stripper operating out of a campground. The people who paid that guy \$20 for a stripe job got what they paid for, Steve indicated. He pointed out the incongruity of putting an inferior \$20 striping job on an \$8,000 motorcycle.

I got the feeling Steve was more upset by the fact that people were getting inferior work than he was by any loss of business to himself.

He stressed gratification as his major reward, and predicted the owners of the bike he was striping right then would ooh and ah when they saw it.

"You thrive on it," he said. Sometimes when people are pleased with a job he has done, he gets goose bumps.

"This is an art form for me," Steve explained. He compared his gratification to that of a writer being told he had done a good story. I could relate to that.

He seems amazed that his customers give him the happiness of liking his work, then pay him to boot!

Steve's occupation takes him from one end of the country to the other. He is married and the father of two boys—ages 16 months and two and a half.

His family has traveled with him, he told me, but it is a hassle lugging playpens, formula and diapers to motel rooms.

"It's rough, being out on the road alone," he said. "It's lonely, y'know?"

So how long would he continue?

"I can't see myself quitting," he said. "I keep developing my style. I've been developing it for 10 years."

If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, Steve's fellow strippers in Phoenix flatter him greatly. He told me they photograph his designs and try to copy every line. "But they lose something in the translation."

Steve finished up the tank job and the owners showed up for their bike. I carefully watched the woman as she spied the design on the tank. She gave a delighted squeal.

"Ooooh, that's pretty!"

Old-timers call up memories before dinner

In the old days, the Lincoln County telephone list filled just four short pages.

As Ruth Moore prepared for the old-timers dinner scheduled at the Ruidoso Public Library this Saturday, she found a 1949 directory.

The Ruidoso area directory for 1984 shows 39 full-size pages of telephone numbers. The area-telephone leaflet from 35 years ago lists about 80

Capitan telephone numbers, fewer than 250 in Ruidoso, and just 28 at the U.S. Marine Hospital in Fort Stanton.

It also shows 13 phone signals for residents of Alto and its vicinity. They weren't numbers, but combinations of L for long and S for short. Some longtime Alto residents remember their telephone signals from those days.

"Ours was one long and three shorts," said Mrs. Nora Blood. "We had the old wall telephone. We put ours in '29."

She and her husband had to maintain a mile and a quarter of telephone wires as their part of the community line from Ruidoso to Capitan. "We all had to keep our own lines up."

Her family, the Hightowers, had lived in the area for years. "My father was one of the original owners on the line from Alto to Capitan."


Today, original owners and new residents alike have telephone numbers with seven digits.

Courts throughout county hear cases

People can tell it to the judge before half a dozen people in Lincoln County, and then appeal a decision at different courts entirely.

Judges hear everything from speeding charges and small civil suits to murder cases. They sit in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo and Alamogordo.

Some courts are organized into districts, some into divisions. Some judges are lawyers, others had no specialized law training before taking their seats.

Keeping straight who does what can be difficult. Here's a guide to the courts in the area.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

John Cupp is the municipal judge in Ruidoso. Paula Smith sits in Ruidoso Downs, Johnnie Romero hears cases in Capitan and Bill Payne hears them in Carrizozo.

Cupp said he hears criminal cases for offenses committed within the village limits of his community. He doesn't hear any civil cases. Similar rules apply to the other municipal judges.

Many of the cases Cupp takes involve speeding and other traffic violations, assault, battery or petty larceny. All of the offenses are misdemeanors. The major cases go to magistrate judges.

Romero said her cases generally involve citations by Capitan police officers. Voters in her community elect a municipal judge every four years, she said.

If people don't like municipal judges' decisions, they may appeal them to a judge for New Mexico's 12th Judicial District.

MAGISTRATE COURTS

Three magistrate judges hear cases in Lincoln County. James Wheeler of Division III sits in Ruidoso; Leroy Montes of Division II hears cases in Capitan; and Betty Dean of Division I handles them in Carrizozo.

The judges hear major criminal cases, or felonies, for arraignment and binding over to district court.

They also hear citations including speeding charges from outside village limits. In addition, they hear civil cases. People can sue in magistrate court.

If people don't like their decisions, they may appeal them to a judge for the 12th Judicial District.

DISTRICT COURT

Two judges hear cases in the 12th Judicial District of New Mexico, George Zimmerman and Robert M. Doughty II.

Voters will pick a third judge in the November election.

The district includes Otero and Lincoln counties. Since more people live in Otero County, the judges usually

hear cases in Alamogordo, the county seat.

However, the judges take turns going to Carrizozo, the Lincoln County seat. They often hear Lincoln County cases on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

The district court hears appeals of all types of cases from municipal and magistrate courts.

It also hears some civil suits for the first time. Many of them involve a resident suing someone for damages or unpaid bills. Decisions can involve thousands of dollars.

If people don't like district court decisions, they may appeal them to

the Court of Appeals of New Mexico or to the New Mexico Supreme Court. Both courts are in Santa Fe.

OTHER COURTS

In addition to the magistrate, municipal and district courts, others operate for people in the area. For instance, probate court handles estates after people die.

The federal courts are entirely separate from the state justice system. For instance, someone who robs a bank and goes into another state with the loot is tried in federal court.






