BRW, village officials meet

Everything from planned unit developments to hillside protective zones was discussed at meetings Tuesday and Wednesday between village officials and representatives of BRW, the firm preparing the Ruidoso master plan.

BRW representatives John McNamara and Rich Unger met Tuesday morning with members of the village administration, then met that afternoon with the village council. Wednesday they met with Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) members.

Main discussion during the meetings centered around the zoning ordinance the company is preparing in addition to the master plan. That ordinance will allow enforcement of the concepts of the master plan.

During the discussions with P&Z members, it was decided that BRW would swing a great deal of their emphasis to completion of specifics of the zoning ordinance. This will give less time to other components called for in the contract, such as a housing study.

"It is our most severe short-range problem," P&Z member Don Shaw said of the need in Ruidoso for an up-to-date zoning ordinance.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter opened the meeting Tuesday afternoon with the village council by outlining the contract between the two parties. He said population, land use and zoning, transportation, public facilities, commercial and industrial issues, and other topics will be addressed by the company in the master plan and its components.

McNamara then noted the history of the company's involvement in Ruidoso, beginning last year in October when BRW was hired to prepare a transportation plan for the village. When that plan became very involved—almost to the point of becoming a miniature master plan—village leaders voted in January to go ahead with a full master plan of the village by BRW.

In response to a question at the meeting from Mayor George White, McNamara explained that the company is not updating the 1976 village master plan, but forming a whole new plan.

McNamara estimated the transportation plan is about one-third complete and running on schedule. The planner said extensive data collection for the plan has taken place, including information on land use and develop-

ment, volume of traffic, parking and alternative transportation modes.

One element in the data collection phase of the master plan preparation has been a lot-by-lot inventory of the entire village. McNamara said the study, which will list by lot all development currently in the village, will be "unbelievably valuable" for completion of both the transportation plan and the master plan.

McNamara said information being collected will be fed into a computer and that projections of future development in the village will be simulated to determine the best ways to direct the master plan.

Of the master plan, McNamara said the data collection phase is about 75 percent complete. The overall plan is less than 25 percent complete.

One difficult aspect of the village to determine has been the population forecast for Ruidoso. That data has been "worked and reworked and reworked again," according to McNamara.

He estimated that the computer modelings of future scenarios will be complete in about a month. Also nearing completion are the goals and objectives of the master plan and the lot-by-lot inventory of the village.

McNamara said the entire master plan is expected to be complete in April or May of 1985. He noted that the company is not necessarily trying to hurry the plan along, but is trying to proceed as carefully as possible.

"This is going to be a plan that you're going to live with," he told the councillors.

Unger then spoke to the councillors, going through the rough drafts of the zoning ordinance and the subdivision ordinance. Unger stressed that the provisions in the rough draft ordinances are recommendations only and are subject to change.

"We have given you the issues that need to be addressed," he commented.

"Overall, this is more restrictive than what you've got," he said of the ordinances.

During the meeting, discussion covered issues that included consideration of the placement of underground gasoline tanks. Councillor Bill Karn asked that such placement be dealt with in the ordinance, to somehow control the possibility of leakage of such tanks into underground water supplies.

Councillor Rick Evans asked that the possibility of increasing density to allow for more affordable housing be considered in the zoning ordinance.

Councillors also expressed concern

about a suggestion in the ordinance that all trees six inches in diameter or larger be saved. Unger again pointed out that the provisions in the ordinance are subject to change.

The rough drafts also suggested the possibility of a full-time engineer for the village.

"Are we old enough and big enough to consider an engineer for the city?" White asked during the meeting. Unger said it was a consideration that must be dealt with.

Unger continued with brief outlines of the various sections of the proposed ordinances, and councillors gave occasional input.

Most of the councillors appeared to be pleased with the BRW presentation.

"I think it will be the greatest thing for us since pockets on a shirt," Councillor Sherman Atwood commented on a part of the ordinance at one point in the discussion.

Wednesday, Unger and members of P&Z met and discussed the ordinances on a page-by-page basis. The discussion during that meeting was more specific, with Unger and P&Z members Ray Bishop and Don Shaw zeroing in on details of the rough drafts.

Highlights of their discussion included consideration of Hillside Protective Zones, which would prohibit development above ridgelines in selected areas, and the possibility of allowing denser development to enable cheaper housing.

Bishop indicated he would favor allowing multi-family developments of as much as 30 to 40 units per acre if those developments were so constructed to conform with current open space requirements.

P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis noted Wednesday that the meetings went well. He, also, opined that completion of the master plan should be around April or May of next year.

P&Z Chairman Greg Masters said that although he was able to meet only briefly with the BRW representatives, progress on the project so far looked promising.

"I would say that the overall picture is very, very good," he said.

Davis said the planners are expected to return to Ruidoso in about a month. Suggestions of the village officials will be included in the next stage of rough drafts.

"I think what we're doing is very constructive," Masters said.

Council hears industrial revenue bond proposal

A last-minute special meeting of the Ruidoso village council Monday morning may result in the village-sponsored issuance of industrial revenue bonds for the \$5.5 million Painted Lady Square hotel project.

The meeting was called at the request of Tommy Morel, representing Gary Hall, Melinda Hall and himself as H H & M Enterprises. During the meeting, Morel gave a brief presentation of the motel project to the councillors.

After much discussion, including a long-distance conference phone call

to H H & M bonding attorney Don Monheimer, the councillors voted to draft a letter indicating "an expression of intent" of support of the project.

Morel said such a letter is necessary to "get our name in the hat" for consideration in the Industrial Revenue Bonds Program. That program, initiated by the federal government, gives states the power to allow issuance of such bonds, according to Morel.

States then control the actual bond issuance by private entities with the guidance and sponsorship of a local public body, such as the Village of Ruidoso. Financial responsibility of

the bond is up to the private entity. "There will be no expenses to the city," Mayor George White declared during the meeting.

The urgency of Monday's meeting was due to a last-minute release of an executive opinion by Governor Toney Anaya detailing application procedures for the program. That opinion, released last week, convinced Monheimer that Painted Lady Square could qualify for the program.

Morel said Monheimer notified him Friday of the possibility of their participation in the project, with Monday, October 15, being the deadline for application to the program.

Morel indicated they would seek \$6 million in bonds to cover all costs of the Painted Lady project.

Original plans last year for the project called for a push, eight-suite hotel at a cost of \$2.2 million. Morel said. Location of the project was planned to be at Center Street and Suderth Drive, site of the former Chris' Lounge.

Morel said the current expanded project plans may necessitate moving Painted Lady Square to another downtown Ruidoso location. Those expanded plans call for a 34-room hotel with extensive amenities and entertainment facilities.

Morel said the project bonds would be an attractive investment, since the village would lend its tax-exempt status to the project if approved. Morel will seek an official letter of inducement, the next step in the industrial revenue bond process, from the council at their next meeting, Tuesday, October 30.

Upon receipt of that letter by the state Department of Finance and Administration, the project will be considered for supplemental bonding. Since the state has only authorized potential bonding in the amount of \$286,500 for Ruidoso and \$244,000 for Lincoln County, supplemental bonding is necessary to reach the \$6 million needed for the Painted Lady project.

A key to the success of the bonding attempt will be meeting many fast-approaching deadlines of the program. Monheimer indicated the importance of issuing the bonds by December 31. Village clerk Leon Eggleston noted that the bonding deadline is just 75 days away, and normal issuance of bonds takes around 90 days.

Morel, however, was optimistic. "It's one of many positive steps that need to happen," he said of the council's vote of preliminary support.

Bomber crash kills two

Two men died in the fiery crash of an Air Force F-111D jet north of Carrizozo Wednesday evening.

Charlie Cox, Chief Deputy for the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, said the plane crashed about 13 miles north of Carrizozo and about a mile east of Highway 54. The sheriff's office received a call about 7:45 p.m., Cox said.


The two men were flying from Cannon Air Force Base near Clovis. This morning, Air Force officers at Cannon said they were notifying the

families of the pair.

Cox said sheriff's deputies reported that pieces of the plane were scattered for about a quarter of a mile along the terrain. The jet crashed near the boundary between the Barham and Harkey ranches, he said.

Witnesses included two officers who were chasing cows off a road at the time of the crash. Guy Brown of the sheriff's department and Eddie Flores of the State Police described a massive explosion, Cox said.

"They heard an explosion and saw a big ball of fire," he explained. The plane dug out a crater about 50 feet wide at the crash site, Cox added.

Teachers and aides join Ruidoso Municipal Schools

Aides, secretaries and teachers have joined the staff of the Ruidoso Municipal School District this year.

Two teachers are new at White Mountain Intermediate School; an aide has joined the White Mountain Elementary School staff; and a secretary has joined the staff at Ruidoso High School.

Bernard Roth is teaching 18 students ages eight to 10 years. They are in C-level special education classes at the intermediate school.

He teaches in a portable building. One end is organized into a usual classroom setting. Learning stations scatter down to the other end.

"Without Libby Sears, I couldn't do it," he said. She is an aide at the school.

As he works with his students this year, Roth is "really concentrating on academics, and making school a pleasurable place to learn," he said.

He has a half-dozen years of experience working with children and adults in education. Roth spent two years on Guam teaching emotionally disturbed youngsters, then two years at Fort Stanton. He was also educa-

tion director at Camp Sierra Blanca for two years.

"I like switching from kids to adults. It kind of balances me out," he said.

Roth and his wife, Renee Carpenter, are expecting a child. Their daughter Amber, age five years, is a student at Nob Hill Elementary School.

Carpenter is a counselor at Camp Sierra Blanca.

Roth earned a bachelor's degree in social work at San Diego State University in California. He has done graduate work in education at the University of Guam and New Mexico State University.

He's quite a distance from the ocean he knew as he grew up in San Diego, but he doesn't mind. Roth likes winter in Ruidoso because he can ski, something he said uses skills he developed as a surfer.

He came to Ruidoso about five years ago. "I met some people from here and decided it would be a good place to settle down," he said.

Jann Treas has lived in Mesalero for most of her life, so she knows many of the children who come to her

room. She is an aide for Indian students at White Mountain Elementary School.

"I help the kids with reading, or help them with math if they have a hard time with that," she said.

Each day is a little different for her, because she works for all the second grade teachers. She usually sees about 25 students each day.

Next semester, Treas said, she will work with third grade teachers on a similar rotating basis. In addition, she works a handful of hours each week with special education students.

She enjoys doing everything. "It's a lot of fun, and a lot different than what I had been doing," Treas said. She used to operate heavy equipment.

Keeping track of dozens of details was a factor in another former job. She was a telephone operator.

Treas can easily reel off the details of the places where she has lived, although the list seems to include most states in the West. She has lived in Hawaii, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Washington and California.

She attended school in some of

those states, but graduated from Ruidoso High School in 1976.

Her husband, Johnny Baca, is a heavy equipment operator in the area. Their daughter Veronica rides to school each day with her mother. She attends second grade.

Treas already knows that stretch of road well. "From Sierra Blanca Motors to my house is 14.6 miles," she said.

Lucy Servies finds her job as assistant librarian and special education aide at Ruidoso High School enjoyable and challenging.

Servies has lived in Ruidoso for six years. This is her first year at the high school.

She feels the students she works with are special to her, and she finds the teachers very helpful.

Her job as assistant librarian is different from any position she has ever had in a school system. She said she was learning things she never knew before.

Servies started her career as a special education aide in Texas, working in that job for four years. Her next job was as an audio-visual screener for special education in the

Lone Star State. She worked at that for one year.

After that, she worked at White Mountain Elementary for one and a half years, working as a Title I reading aide. Her next job was as a computer data clerk for special education in El Paso, Texas, where she worked for one and a half years.

Last year Servies worked at White Mountain Middle School as a special education aide.

She is originally from Texas. She has taken undergraduate courses through the University of New Mexico to teach "Monterey Reading," which she did when she was a Title I reading aide.

Her husband, Ron, is a retired teacher. They have two sons, James and Ron.

Cindy Morgan is a new classroom teacher in Ruidoso this year, but she's already familiar with the school district.

Last year, she was a regular substitute teacher at White Mountain Middle School and in elementary school classrooms.

"Substituting made it real nice,"

because she already knows many of the people working in the school district.

This year, she teaches fourth graders at White Mountain Intermediate School. She enjoys working with children of that age.

"They are able to work independently and still have enthusiasm," she said.

She has 13 years of experience working with youngsters. She had fifth grade, fourth grade and second grade classes in Alamogordo.

Then she met Barry Morgan, who sells real estate with Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates. They married and she moved to Ruidoso more than a year ago.

Mrs. Morgan grew up in Hagerman, so it's natural that one area she is enthusiastic about this year is state history. She plans various projects with her students to explore this new part of the curriculum.

When she was a student, she earned a bachelor of education degree at the University of New Mexico. Then she received a master's degree in curriculum instruction from New Mexico State University.

Henson states R-S stand

Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, will try to persuade the state Racing Commission that a spring race meet at the State Fairgrounds in Albuquerque would be detrimental to horse racing in New Mexico and to Sunland Park in particular.

"We're trying to emphasize to the state Racing Commission that we feel the dates will be economically devastating to the Sunland Park racetrack," said Ruidoso-Sunland general manager Rick Henson Wednesday.

The commission Tuesday delayed action on a request for racing dates from Ken Newton, whose bid for the Albuquerque meet was approved by the State Fair Commission last Friday.

Newton's request had not met the requirement for a 20-day review period for interested parties. His petition for a 35-day race meet running from March 1 to April 28, 1985, will be taken up by the commission at its next regular meeting, Henson indicated.

Plans call for an 86-day January-to-April meet in 1986, with the grandstand at the fairgrounds to be enclosed by then.

"What really bothers us is the availability of horses at that time of year," said Henson. He pointed out that spring race meets in Arkansas and Louisiana already draw horses out of state.

Trainers also use that time of year to train young two-year-olds and to rest older horses for summer racing, he said.

Henson said Newton's claim that Sunland had a lock on 4,000 race horses in the spring was untrue. He

claimed Newton had arrived at that number by totaling the horses that run at La Mesa, Santa Fe Downs (Newton's track) and Ruidoso Downs in the summer.

"That's not a fair number," said Henson. "We certainly have never had applications for that kind of number."

The state Racing Commission needs to look at economic impact and at the possibility of oversaturation, according to Henson. He noted that Farmington just received approval for 56 racing days next summer, and that Silver City has asked for dates for the summer of 1986.

Henson said horsemen have mixed feelings about spring racing at Albuquerque. Many live in the northern part of the state, which makes Albuquerque attractive, he said.


He said a number of horsemen feel that a fall meet in the Duke City would suit their training programs better than a spring meet, however. He said Ruidoso-Sunland would not be so strongly opposed to fall racing at Albuquerque.

Henson was non-committal about whether the corporation would take its opposition to the state Legislature if unsuccessful with the Racing Commission.

Expansion plans at Ruidoso Downs Race Track will go ahead whatever happens, Henson said. At its meeting Tuesday, the commission approved plans for a new entryway and three river crossings for Ruidoso Downs.

Henson said he was pleased with the cooperation of the commission on the expansion project.

He noted that Sunland already had felt the impact of racing at Albuquerque. He attributed a slow opening weekend at Sunland to extra race days at the State Fair.

Interest rates have less impact on real estate sales here than elsewhere

Like prosperity and the march of progress, mortgage interest rates and real estate sales often go hand in hand.

As the cost of borrowing money climbs, the investment of housing becomes less attractive for many buyers. Conversely, when interest rates dip to an acceptable point, the market hums.

But such is not always the formula in Ruidoso. According to local real estate agents, the Ruidoso real estate market is primarily a secondary market—a second-home market—which is not as susceptible to the rise and fall of interest rates.

"You take a larger town, most people have to sell their first home before they can buy another one," explained Jim Carpenter, president of the Ruidoso Board of Realtors. "But for many people in this market, the

houses are a second home."

He said higher interest rates naturally affect everyone interested in real estate. But high rates represent less of a concern for an affluent buyer whose primary residence is out of town than for a first-time buyer whose capital and credit are limited.

While noting that his sales have been typical for the off-season, Carpenter said he was ahead of last year in total sales activity.

Jim Douglass of Douglass Real Estate said he had recorded an increase in sales toward the end of summer and early fall. But overall, he added, sales are down this year compared to last year.

"Sales continue good on homes below the \$100,000 mark," Douglass noted, "not as good on those above that amount because of the interest rates. Nobody's interested in them right now."

He said if interest rates drop to 11 or 12 percent, the market will im-

mediately pick up at all levels.

"Thirteen percent and over just scares people off."

As of late last week, conventional fixed-rate mortgages at Ruidoso banks were running between 13 percent and 14.25 percent.

Despite the high rates of the last six months, the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) reported that for a 10-month period from December, 1983 to September 1984, real estate sales in the area amounted to \$59,426,127—a net gain of \$3,967,530 over the same period the previous year.

Those figures, which represent commercial, residential and investment sales, do not reflect sales not listed with MLS.

"Right now, we have a buyer's market," said real estate agent Karon Petty. "Supply is greater than demand, in my opinion."

She said supply of second homes and homes costing \$80,000 or more ex-

ceeds demand, while less expensive homes for first-time buyers are dropping behind or keeping pace with demand.

Petty said creative financing, including owner financing, has helped to sustain the market in Ruidoso. But she said the national economy—specifically, the 1982 recession—has begun to influence sales.

Real estate appraiser Clifford Anderson said home sales in the area are experiencing an unusual situation that is pulling the market. "In two directions at the same time."

At one end are the lower-priced and smaller homes that are sought by local and part-time residents. The demand for those homes, he said, is remaining stable or rising slightly, helping to maintain an active market.

Typically, the smaller homes run between 800 and 1,200 square feet, at costs of \$40 to \$60 a square foot.

At the other end are larger homes costing in excess of \$100,000, of which there are currently too many, Anderson said.

The larger homes are in oversupply, yet do not drop appreciably in price as they would in a city of primary homes. The reason for that, he said, is because the owners are not normally forced into selling. "They are willing to wait longer for the price they want."

What results is a marketplace of real estate where prices remain relatively high and interest rates score less of an impact on the average home buyer.

Anderson indicated also that as the community continues to grow, the geographical profile of the average buyer becomes increasingly narrow.

He said the majority of secondary home buyers today are from Texas, Oklahoma and eastern New Mexico. Twenty years ago the buyers traveled

from farther distances, from Kansas and the eastern sections of Oklahoma.

"So we're drawing from a geographic area more narrowly defined," he said. This is a reflection of emerging Colorado resorts that are closer to those areas or more accessible.

However the geographical indicators break down, the consensus among real estate people is that Ruidoso will continue to hold its own in the sale of commercial and residential properties.

Part of that is evidenced in the fact that, according to Douglass, 30 people were selling real estate in the early 1980s, and some 300 are brokers and agents today.

As Petty explained it, housing in Ruidoso will always be considered "a necessity and secondary investment"—a necessity for the local resident, a resort investment for others.

Warrior gridders hope to take the 'bite' out of Bulldogs

It may not be a district game, but Friday night's varsity football game between the Ruidoso Warriors and the visiting Artesia Bulldogs has plenty of importance.

The 7:30 game could be a preview of the state playoffs.

Ruidoso is 5-0-1 on the overall season, 1-0 in District 3-AAA play, and ranked fifth in the Associated Press AAA-division state poll.

Artesia, the defending state AAA-division champion, is ranked second in the state and has a 4-1-1 record. The Bulldogs opened the district 4-AAA season last week with a 7-7 tie against Goddard. Artesia won the tie-breaker competition after the game.

"Except for the Roswell game (Roswell topped Artesia 21-6), Artesia has stopped just about everybody they've played," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "They're tough to score on."

Artesia has given up just 55 points in six games, while scoring 117 points. Ruidoso also has done well, scoring 138 points and allowing just 78.

The Bulldog defense should be a good test for the Warrior offense.

Middle linebacker Tom Harvey, a 6-6, 205-pound athlete, keys the Artesia defense.

"He's definitely a college prospect," said Henderson. "They move him around a lot on offense."

Robert Johnson at tackle (6-3, 200 pounds) is another standout defensive player. He plays guard on offense.

The Bulldogs run out of the wing-T on offense, the same as Ruidoso.

Robby Ballew leads the Artesia offense at quarterback. He runs the option well. He completed 14 of 25 passes for 131 yards against Goddard.

Tailback Roy Galdon is the Bulldogs' top rusher and scorer. Felix Garcia is at fullback and Harvey probably will go at halfback.

Johnson is the biggest player in the offensive line. Duane Lewis at 165 pounds is the starting center.

Artesia coach T. W. Harvey says his team doesn't have as much depth as it did last season. The Bulldogs will bring a 33-man squad to the game.

The Warriors are fairly healthy for the contest.

Starting tight end and kicker Chuck Jarrell broke his finger Monday but will still play. Second-string tackle Jimmy Frost is recovering from pneumonia and will not be able to play until next week.

Ruidoso's offense struggled a bit against Hot Springs last week, but the Warriors are still averaging 283 yards per game (a 1,703-yard season total).

Defensively, the Warriors held Hot Springs to just 108 yards. They have given up 1,201 yards on the season (a 200-yard per game total).

Quarterback Russell Easter has completed 26 of 66 passes for 630 yards and has done a good running the ball.

Tailback Michael Williamson has run for 466 yards in 59 carries. Williamson also leads the Warriors in scoring with nine touchdowns. He scored all but one of the Warriors' points last week on two touchdowns and a two-point conversion.

Fullback Manuel Montano has only scored one touchdown this season but has had two called back because of penalties, including a 62-yard gallop against Hot Springs. Versatile Justin Smith at wingback rounds out the Warrior backfield.

Jarrell and split end Mike Smith are other targets for Easter's passes.

The Warriors offensive line was inconsistent against Hot Springs, and Henderson is hoping for a better effort against Artesia.

"We're going to have to move the ball well and establish ball control," he said. "We can't afford to turn the ball over."

"We've been having good results in turnovers this season, but last week we lost three and gained three. Turnovers make a big difference."

Two seek clerk's post

Fran Siddens, a 14-year Lincoln County resident, is the Republican candidate for county clerk.

"Because I was the chief deputy (under clerk Jane McSwane), I feel I have the experience needed," said Siddens. Siddens worked in the county clerk's office until last year, when she became involved in a ranching project.

She and her husband, Ed, are studying embryo transplants in registered Simbah cattle on their ranch near Carrizozo. Siddens presently works part-time in District Court.

Siddens hopes that the voters will recognize her past work as qualification for the job.

"I feel that the county clerk is hired by the public to do a job," said Siddens. "I would like them to consider the qualifications that the job demands. They should hire the one most qualified for the job."

Siddens said she had no immediate plans to make any major changes in the office, but that she did plan to make a line-by-line study of the budget for possible changes later.

"Most of the duties of the county clerk are pretty cut and dry," said Siddens. She noted that the county clerk's office is very busy with the day-to-day business of recordings and filings and with election year work.

Siddens feels that "someone with experience in the office is invaluable."

"The experience I've had is most important," she added.

A native of Truth or Consequences, Siddens has lived in Lincoln County for the last 14 years. Before moving to Carrizozo five years ago, she lived in Ruidoso. She and her husband have three children—Doug, Kam and Jacquelyn—and two grandsons.

Siddens is a member of the Carrizozo Women's Club and the Federated Republican Women's Club. She enjoys bowling.

Charlotte Jarratt, a 14-year Ruidoso resident, is the Democratic candidate for the office of county clerk.

A past chairperson of the Democratic Party of Lincoln County, Jarratt has been active in state and local politics for some time. She said that as a Realtor and wife of a builder, she realized the importance of the services rendered by the clerk's office, and thus chose to seek the position.

"All of the clerk's duties are mandated by Legislature," said Jarratt. "My main objective would be to have such organization and management ... that the functions of the office would be done in a timely and efficient manner." She stressed the time aspect.

The county clerk's duties include maintaining deeds and public records and keeping minutes at county commissioners meetings.

According to Jarratt, "One of the primary functions of the clerk's office is with regard to elections." She feels that she is very familiar with the duties of the office, due to her past political activities.

"I like to do different things," said Jarratt. Before becoming a Realtor, she was a nurse, a teacher and a writer. In 1973, she was the first director of the Lincoln County Senior Citizen center, a position she held for six years.

She still does volunteer work with senior citizens. Jarratt also belongs to

Jarratt wants to be county clerk as a "service to the community."

"I do feel that I could give a service—I'm qualified," she said.

Planning and Zoning Board meets, elects officers

At the first meeting of the Capitan Planning and Zoning Advisory Board, held Monday night at City Hall, the board elected Jim Wright chairperson and Duffy Morton secretary. The board felt that as a 24-year resident of Capitan, Wright would be most qualified to lead the group.

The meeting opened with a brief round of introductions. Members of the board include Wright, a local emergency medical technician and secretary of the Capitan Fire Department; Morton, who retired here with her husband in 1978; April Randle, a real-estate broker; Hollis Fox, a former employee of the departments of Interior and Agriculture; Jim

Clees, superintendent of the Alto Village Golf Club; Joe Gémioets, a retiree from El Paso; and Hermit Otero of El Paisano Restaurant (not present at Monday's meeting).

After the introductions, the board began to discuss the large project that lies before them.

"We've got a huge job ahead of us," said April Randle.

"We need to come up with a viable ordinance which the village can use in building and replatting," said Wright.

Replatting was cited as one of the major problems that the board would have to face. Other major issues raised were water supply and distribution, and fire safety—having proper water lines to put out fires.

The board decided that its first job was to decide their objectives. "We

must first set goals and a master plan—how we want our town to develop," said Morton. After that was done, she noted, the board could implement the plans.

Morton said she wanted to preserve the character of Capitan. She said that it was the country atmosphere and tree-lined streets that prompted her to move here.

Fox agreed that the flavor of the town should be preserved, saying, "My memories of Capitan are of a ranching town, it's unique, really, different from any place I know."

Randle agreed that the essence of the town should be preserved. But she felt that it should also be able to "grow as a healthy community ... have light industry come in" in the future.

She said she felt that Capitan should

be more than "just a bedroom community for Ruidoso."

The board agreed that light industry would be good for the area as long as it was "clean industry—soft tech," such as computer chip processing.

The board decided to concentrate on planning first and then zone the area according to the plans. The group will hold open meetings at City Hall on the first and third Monday of every month.

They hope that public attendance will provide input for their work.

"If you want the value of your land to accrue, you have to think of location and placement," said Morton.

"People should be interested in planning and zoning for selfish reasons," she said, hoping to motivate public participation.

New plans for a homecoming are still being formulated. There will still be a high school dance on the night of October 28.

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

P&Z grants commercial zoning

A proposal to change the zoning at the Cowan Cabins from R-1 (single-family dwelling) to C-1 (light-commercial and office) was a major topic of discussion at the Monday meeting of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission. Commission members finally voted to grant the rezone as requested.

Planning and Zoning Chairman Greg Masters excused himself from his commission position for discussion of the rezoning, due to his ownership interest in the property. Masters said he requested the rezone to bring the cabins into conformance with their current use as a commercial endeavor, and to enable repair and possible future developments on the property.

He indicated that past village rezonings had omitted the cabins from being zoned commercial and that much of the surrounding property is currently zoned commercial.

Several property owners in the area expressed concern with rezoning the property as commercial.

"That is a peaceful neighborhood up there and we would like to keep it that way," area property owner Clayton Ferrin commented. Ferrin voiced his fear that Masters, or a subsequent owner of the property after Masters, could change the business on the site to something less desirable than the current cabin operation.

"We appreciate the way it is," he said. "I like the Cowan Cabins."

Donald Brown, another landowner in the area, said he also represented several Cowan Cabin neighbors in his opposition to the rezoning. Other property owners in the audience at Monday's meeting also voiced their feelings against the rezoning.

Masters then defended his request. "It's a commercial enterprise, it's been that way and it'll continue to be that way," he said. "There's all kinds of commercial enterprises up there. There's nothing going in there that's not already there."

He pointed out that as much as 50 percent of the lands surrounding the cabins are currently zoned commercial.

Commission member Karon Petty suggested that the request be handled with conditions attached. She said a conditional use permit could be considered that would restrict the type of

development that could occur on the site.

Commission member Bill Carrigan pointed out that the village would have input on any future development at the site if the property received a commercial zoning designation. Such control does not exist for residential-zoned areas.

Commission member Don Shaw then moved that P&Z approve the rezone with the condition that the use of the land be limited to a motel operation.

"That's very restrictive," Petty noted.

Masters protested the motion, instead suggesting that the C-1 be passed with the stipulation that any future development follow guidelines of a master development plan.

Shaw's motion failed, and Carrigan moved to pass the rezone as requested. The vote came to a tie, and acting chairman Ray Bishop nudged approval of the measure with an affirmative vote.

The commission members also voted approval of several rear lot line variances for existing structures on the Cowan Cabin property.

Also during the meeting, the P&Z approved the master development plan of a proposed commercial townhouse project at Mechem and Poir drives.

In his original request, developer R. A. Alexander asked that the commission members only consider phase one of the development, since access to that phase is planned to be from Poir Drive. Other phases of the plan call for access onto Mechem Drive, and Alexander said agreements with the state Highway Department regarding those accesses had not yet been worked out.

Bishop moved for P&Z to approve the entire master plan, including phase one. The motion included the stipulation that a letter be sent to the village administration asking for input on ramifications of use of Poir Drive as the major access to phase one of the development.

In other business, P&Z: —Approved the replat of lots 34 and 35, block 5, White Mountain Estates, unit 3, as requested by Ernest Serviner and Stanley Cameron.

—Approved the replat of lots 5, 6, 7 and 8, block 18, Ponderosa Heights, unit 3, as requested by Jeremy Taylor, Carl Koch, Frank Kensak and R. P. Foust.

—Approved the request for

variance of the sign ordinance to allow for a theater marquee for the Sierra Sinema, as requested by Sidney Alford.

—Approved front and side lot line variances of lot 17, block 4, Black Forest subdivision, as requested by Paul Knight.

—Approved a five-foot vacation of right of way along the entire east side of Vine Road, subject to this written approval of the affected property owners, and with the stipulation that the price of the land be determined by the Ruidoso village council.

—Voted to reaffirm action earlier taken regarding a request to rezone from R-1 and R-3 to C-1 various tracts of land in the Paradise Canyon area, and to send a copy of the minutes of the meeting when that decision was made to the village council.

—Heard Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis report that work continues on a proposed ordinance to control the placement of mobile homes.

—Heard Councillor Bill Karn initiate the procedure to have the village attorney available by phone or in person when needed during Planning and Zoning Commission meetings.

Jack Frost Pays A Brief Visit

One the morning of October sixteen, Jack Frost, sloped down here from his busy schedule in the Rockies piling up the snow, to pay us a little visit here in the vale — his first of the year. The thermometer was an even thirty-two, forming paper thin ice on the Metates in the yard.

Up until that morning, the river trees were still green, and the oak brush on the upper reaches of the hills had just barely begun to turn. Now you could plainly see everywhere you looked that Jack Frost had touched the world with his magic paint brush.

But the touch was light. The walnuts showed their lemon yellow on about half of their leaves; the oaks

were only trimmed with bronze; and the Box Elders were about half amber and green.

On the oak brush hillsides you could see the leaf painter had brought in more color.

The day before you could see dull crimson, pink, light orange in small areas, leaving most of the vast stretches of rolling brush-clad hillsides green.

And now the colored patches had widened out and there were deeper colors, like pure crimson, bright lemon yellow, pumpkin orange, dull maroon, and purple gray. Yet here again it was only half colored with still wide areas of green oak brush.

All this day, the sixteenth, the north wind blew cold with the temperature never rising much above forty.

Out in the pathway to the door there was a line of bird feed, and the snow birds had lots of company in this crow line. Rabbits wings with them were house finches, and four or five scrub jays in full Prussian blue uniforms — all feeding in a hurry. Here came two little striped chipmunks and joined the feast, darting among the birds which paid them not the slightest mind. The chipmunks would eat all they could hold and then fill their cheek pockets and take off to stash the grain away, and then return. The same with the Scrub Jays.

You would think from this all-day cold and non-stop feeding that in the morning Jack Frost would come in with a hard frost and turn the leaves to full October color, thus bringing in the enchanting season within a season, Indian Summer.

However, Jack Frost and the rest of them up at the North Pole changed the signals. About six in the evening here came a warm wind out of the West off the desert, bringing the temperature up to sixty.

So this morning it was about forty in the shade; and here in late afternoon the warm west wind is stinging down the valley. The two apricot trees are in full green without a sign of yellow. The Purple New England Asters are blooming, and there is no new color in the river trees or the oak brush.

The sky above is pure October blue, the temperature is up to sixty six; the sun beams down warm and bright, not the slightest sign of approaching cold weather.

And yet, you can see that the top of the mountain is decorated with a little sprinkling of snow. And a new band of Snow Birds has just flown in. I thought I heard the wood pecker calling up in the gleam in front of the house. Most of the time, this is a warning of approaching cold.

If you will forgive me, I will say it one more time. Be careful this time of year in these fair and balmy days. A snow storm can come driving in suddenly. Do not be caught out in the wilderness unprepared.

Although we need to keep an eye in the changes of the weather, we are approaching a very favorite time of the year.

"Lifestyles of Rich and Famous" crew visits area

A television crew from Texas brought plenty of lights, cameras and action to the Inn of the Mountain Gods during the Labor Day weekend.

Four producers and photographers working for the syndicated television show, "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous," stayed at the resort hotel near Ruidoso.

They captured the excitement surrounding the 1984 running of the All-American Futurity, the world's richest horse race.

This year, field producer David King set up equipment at the Inn and at Ruidoso Downs Race Track to interview prominent horsemen.

He explained that his helicopter was specially designed for flight from Alamogordo into the heights of southern Lincoln County. He flies

camera crews, counis game and herds cattle from his machine.

On the warm fall day before the rich horse race, kids clustered around his helicopter while Jennings waited to load television gear. Some of the youngsters toted tennis rackets. Others just carried open mouths as they crowded up to his flying machine.

The helicopter flight was just part of a hectic weekend for the television crew. They arrived Saturday and immediately started telephoning area residents and visitors to arrange coverage.

Childs started work in a staff office. Her casual clothes, done in shades of pink included a braided vest, striped blouse and socks tucked into brown loafers and crisply creased designer blue jeans.

On Sunday, King appeared in a crisp white shirt and blue jeans to film horsemen at the track.

Dale Hall, the owner of the favorite, maintained careful security around his gelding, Eastex. However, he granted an interview to the crew. So did Joe McDermott and other owners.

While the camera crew prepared for another interview in the barns area at the track, they squeezed in a few comments about their film work. Childs has filled positions in

television operations across the country. Her production company films program segments and advertising projects to air nationwide. She sees advantages in locating her headquarters in Irving, near Dallas, Texas.

On the job, she started Kelly Childs

because it was that next challenge she sought. Off the job, she is married to noted modern artist Richard Childs. They have a young son.

When she's at work, she focuses every ounce of attention on the job. She and the rest of the crew travel across Texas to film segments for the

"Lifestyles" show. Coming to Ruidoso to film the All-American race was their first trip into New Mexico. The segment they filmed in the area is expected to air on "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous" soon. The program is carried on assorted cable television channels.






The mishap occurred shortly after the break when Bubbly Bobbie, an 8-5 favorite, drifted outward from the No. 8 post and bumped King Afton Bar (who had broken from the No. 9 post).

King Afton Bar, ridden by O. A. Martinez, suddenly found himself in ninth place. But the colt spent the rest of the race making up considerable terrain. Bubbly Bobbie, a double stakes winner at Sunland last fall, moved eagerly in the final half of the race and reached the wire a neck in front of King Afton Bar. The latter was a half-length in front of Glo Billy Sims.

The stewards, after reviewing the

ta. The Savannah winner now holds an '84 record of 6-1-1 from 10 starts, which translates into winnings of \$21,885.

Casey Lambert was up on Bubbly Bobbie. If Lambert had won the Savannah Swinger, it would have been his fifth victory of the two-day opening weekend. Lambert is

Sunland's defending jockey champ. Glo Billy Sims, owned by Betty Lou Shebestor of Wynnewood, Oklahoma, was ridden by Larry Byers.

The winning time (with a tailwind) was 17.65 seconds.

There were no six-win tickets in the Pic-Six, so the carryover for Friday's program is \$6,051.

Double B Express goes to gate again

Double B Express, a career winner of over a quarter-million dollars, makes his seasonal debut in Saturday's headliner at Sunland Park.

The 6 1/2-furlong sprint for three-year-olds and up offers a \$3,300 allowance purse and is the topper on a 12-race program that gets under way at 12:30 p.m.

Weekend action at Sunland continues through Sunday, culminating with the \$10,000-added Don Lewis Memorial Handicap at 5 1/2-furlongs.

In Saturday's feature, Double B Express will pack 116 pounds and will break from the No. 7 slot in the 10-head field. The sturdy nine-year-old gelding made his last outing in the \$85,000-added New Mexico State Fair Handicap on Sept. 23, but had to settle for fifth. The distance was 1 1/8th miles.

Before that, he finished second at 5-1 odds in a six-furlong allowance dash at the State Fair.

Double B Express, owned by the Double B Ranch of Anthony, N.M., has become something of a legend on the New Mexico handicap scene. He has won 32 races from 122 career starts. His record is spotted with stakes victories at Sunland Park, Ruidoso Downs. The Downs at Santa

Fa and the New Mexico State Fair. Double B Express racked up his last stakes win on Aug. 13, 1983, when he picked off the \$10,065 Isayoboy Handicap at Ruidoso Downs. In recent years, his Sunland efforts produced wins in the Mount Cristo Rey Handicap, Don Lewis Handicap and Sleepy Ned Handicap.

His wins at Ruidoso Downs include the Mescalero Apache Handicap (twice), the Billy The Kid Handicap, Governor's Handicap and Ruidoso Sprint Championship, among others. His work at the State Fair over the years included wins in the Tom Clouston Memorial Handicap (twice), E. T. Springer Memorial Handicap (twice), and the State Fair Handicap.

Sherry's Ace in Sale Futurity trial heat Friday

Sherry's Ace, a three-time winner at Ruidoso Downs during the summer, shapes up as a powerful force in Friday's trials for the Thoroughbred Sale Futurity at Sunland Park.

Three six-furlong trials are on the 12-race agenda, and are booked as the fourth, ninth and 11th slots.

Sherry's Ace goes in the feature 11th race. Each of the trials offers a \$1,500 purse, and the top four finishers in each will advance into the finale on Nov. 4, aiming at an estimated purse of \$30,000.

Friday's program launches the second weekend of the new season. It's also Ladies Day, and the new angle this year is the fact the girls now have their choice of free grandstand admission or free clubhouse admission.

The weekend extends through Sunday, culminating with the \$10,000 added Don Lewis Memorial Handicap for three-year olds and up at 5 1/2 furlongs. First post each day is 12:30 p.m.

Sherry's Ace, owned by Gail Odum of Santa Teresa, N.M., has plenty of talking points, and the best one isn't even related to those three Ruidoso wins. Even more impressive is this: the gelding made the Sept. 1 finale of the \$145,755 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, and rallied out of seventh place at the top of the stretch to finish fourth. He earned \$3,744, lifting his career total to \$19,030.

Sherry's Ace is now 4-2-0 from 10 starts. The gelding first caught some attention last spring at Sunland, when he took a close second (as a 15-1 shot) in a maiden race. At Ruidoso, he rolled up a 1 1/2-length win in a trial for the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity. In the finale, he had more than he could

handle from the likes of stakes-standout Seward Junction, and finished seventh at 21-1.

Undaunted, Sherry's Ace bounced back to take second behind Groton Going as an 11-1 outsider in the Pocket Coin Handicap. Next, he rattled off impressive wins in allowance company and in a trial heat for the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity.

The youthful jockey from El Paso, Eugene O'Neill, will guide Sherry's Ace on Friday. Here's a complete look at the field in post-position order: 1 - Crystalool, 117; 2 - Our Native Gus, 120; 3 - Lady Chanel, 117; 4 - Joe Cody, 100; 5 - Aced Baby, 117; 6 - Dragon Trouble, 120; 7 - Sherry's Ace, 120; 8 - Miss Calico, 117; 9 - Cruising Countess, 117.

In the ninth race (second division of the trials), the lineup consists of Dracula, Herod's Reply, Fair Grecian Lax, Mister Mito, Rawcut, Bald And Flashy, Desert Heiress, Thermoody.

The first division (fourth race) brings out Grand Exit, Sweet Noice, Cash 'N' Glopy, Dia's Blaze, Primo Frilero, Elegant Reason, Resplendency, Satan's Desire.

One to keep an eye on in the ninth race is Rawcut, who made the finale of the \$28,900 A.C. Kemp Memorial Handicap at the recent New Mexico State Fair meeting.

Our Native Gus, in the 11th race, battered \$3,500 claimers by 5 1/2 lengths in his last-out appearance in Albuquerque.

The Thoroughbred Sale Futurity is restricted to two-year-olds which were purchased or re-purchased in the 1983 Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs.

Parachute team to perform at Holloman

Their membership changes with each new academic year, much like a college football team. Yet, they've dominated the sport of parachute

jumping in collegiate ranks for the past 19 years, winning the national collegiate parachute championships for 17 years.

They perform some 35 demonstrations each year before more than two million spectators, exhibiting their aerial skills and precision landings.

They're the "Wings of Blue", the United States Air Force Academy's precision parachute team, and they'll be the featured performers at Holloman Air Force Base's 1984 Open House October 27.

The public is invited to the Open House, which also will feature an aerial demonstration by one of Holloman's F-15 aircraft. Gates will be open from 10:45 a.m. until 4 p.m. A special "mini" Open House for elderly and handicapped individuals who want to view the many aircraft on display prior to the arrival of large crowds is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m.

The primary mission of the "Wings of Blue" parachute team is not to compete or perform. It is to train other cadets in free-fall parachuting—a lifesaving skill an Air Force officer may one day need. Jumping as taught at the Academy is designed to familiarize future Air Force pilots with basic needed to safely complete a parachute descent from a disabled aircraft. Each team member is a qualified jumpmaster

and instructor in the Academy parachuting programs. Each must also maintain high academic and military standards to remain with the team.

For those interested in viewing current Air Force operational aircraft, there will be a number of aircraft on display not normally seen at Holloman. There will be a KC-10 from March AFB, a C-5A and a C-141 from Altus AFB; and F-111 from Cannon AFB, an A-10 from Davis Monthan AFB and other types and kinds of military aircraft to view.

A glimpse into aviation history will be on the ramp as well, courtesy of the Confederate Air Force. Members of the New Mexico and West Texas Wings of the CAF will place their vintage World War II aircraft on display for viewing by the public.

Additionally, there will be a high speed test-track demonstration firing

for the Open House. Twelve buses will take spectators to the viewing area. If you have plans to see this demonstration, you must be on one of the buses by 11, so make arrangements to arrive early. There will be no privately owned vehicles allowed into the North or West areas of the base.

Other planned demonstrations include the 449th Mobility Support Squadron setting up an expandable shelter, the USAF Academy's Sabre Drill teams, a demonstration of an F-15 "combat quick turn", which is a rapid loading of air-to-air munitions onto an aircraft, and a simulated aircraft fire being extinguished by the fire department.

Open House visitors will be able to park in designated parking areas close to the day's activities and base personnel will be located at strategic points along major thoroughfares to direct traffic.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Everybody knows about environmental studies.

They were invented by the federal government, which requires them before you start projects which will change the face of the earth in any way.

State legislators also get copies of economic impact studies, which are prepared to show the results of big-money bills being considered by the lawmakers.

But the Anaya administration is apparently the first to have instituted political impact studies.

A middle-level bureaucrat, asked recently to report on the status of a paper he was preparing, said, "Oh, that's finished. But it's gone to the Governor's office for a political impact study before we are allowed to release it."

(The Voice from the Corner of the Room explains sepulchrally: "That means it can't be put out until Shirley Scarafioti has approved it.")

A word to a senior staffer in the office of the Governor (who will know which one he is when he reads the message):

You made a total, firm commitment that the whole \$1 million worth of stock in that proposed Business Development Corporation which was to be one of the stars in the Anaya administration's crown would be sold by Tuesday, October 9.

It wasn't. Don't you think maybe the time has come to admit this is an idea which is not going to fly? Since your efforts have proved fruitless, isn't it time to move on to some project which has a better chance of success?

First query of the day: Is there anybody in the state of New Mexico who can name any discernible benefit the state gains from the \$297,000 it spends each year to keep open that Washington office we needlessly maintain?

Second query: Is there anyone around who believes that we would seriously be considering a railway line to link Ruidoso-area tourist attractions or that wildly unlikely Rio

Grande Rapid Rail System, to connect Albuquerque and Santa Fe, if the Department of Transportation did not retain a "chief railroad planner" who has to do something to justify his existence?

Once November 7 has come and gone, we should hear something a little more detailed from the administration on their ideas of the tax increase the state may need. They appear to be staying mum in part because they don't want to hurt Democrats up for election this year.

So far, they haven't given us much guidance. According to Governor Anaya, the state will need something between \$45 million and \$200 million in new revenue—but \$45 million and \$200 million are a long way apart.

The other reason we may not have heard any firm suggestions from the Roundhouse is that they chose this particular time in our history to run in a new Secretary of Finance and Administration, boss of the department which is charged with coming up with such figures. He's capable, hard-working Dan Lopez, who acknowledges that he has one weakness: his experience in financial matters is more or less limited to balancing his own checkbook.

He recently told one capital city correspondent that once he comes to know and trust the experts in his department, he will rely on them to provide the data he needs.

Meanwhile, of course, the clock ticks on. The 37th session of the New Mexico State Legislature is scheduled to start just 13 weeks from yesterday.

The major conclusion of that lengthy report on conditions at the State Hospital in Las Vegas is that a new boss there is an absolute essential.

That person should be a top-flight hospital administrator, willing to take over a troubled institution located in a small town. He or she will have to be a personnel expert, with ability to break up cliques and dispel nepotism.

For such a paragon, the state is prepared to pay a miserly \$50,000 a year.

Editorial

Why should the Village of Ruidoso sponsor a multi-million dollar industrial revenue bond issue for construction of a hotel?

Perhaps we should ask, "Why shouldn't it?"

The village would incur no financial liability. The developers would be responsible for paying off the bonds. Legal and other costs of floating the bonds would be borne by the developers.

The apparatus exists to handle future requests for sponsorship of industrial revenue bonds. Of course, it might get to be a nuisance to call a special village council meeting everytime someone had such a request. Perhaps one or two special meetings per month could be set aside for the purpose of hearing applicants.

Of course, others would want to be heard also. Owners of lodging establishments that had to obtain their financing on the open market (at roughly two percent higher rates) might want to make their unhappiness known that the competition was getting the advantage of cheaper money because of the bonds' tax-exempt status.

The state law was changed when Silver City merchants complained about K mart wanting to build a store with industrial revenue bonds. Retail establishments can no longer use them. Hotels can still qualify under the letter if not the spirit of the law, but some bonding attorneys will not handle them because of the outcry sure to ensue. Roswell is experiencing this right now.

Although the municipality is not liable in the event of default, the bonds authority we talked to pointed out that a stigma remains when bonds do default. He cited an aircraft plant failure many years ago that blemishes the City of Carlsbad's fiscal image to this day.

Industrial revenue bonds were designed to attract industry that will create a lot of jobs in a community. The council would be wise to wait for a request for a manufacturing plant before putting itself in for a lot of flak—justified flak—for sponsoring a hotel.—TP



Students renew drunk driving fight

Members of Students Against Driving Drunk (SADD) are renewing their efforts at Ruidoso High School this year.

They are distributing bumper stickers and repeating their slogan, "Friends Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk."

SADD members also encourage teens and parents, husbands and wives to sign a contract for life. Those who sign it promise to avoid making trouble at the time of a specific incident and to keep people from driving after drinking.

SADD has four goals: helping to eliminate drunk driving to save lives; conducting alcohol awareness programs; informing students about the dangers of combining drinking and driving; and organizing peer counseling.

Ruidoso teenagers organized a SADD chapter last February after listening to a program presented by Robert Anastas, who founded SADD in Massachusetts in 1981.

He mentioned some chilling facts during his talk in the Ruidoso High School gymnasium, facts which are repeated in literature distributed by SADD members.

For instance:

- Half of all fatal accidents involve alcohol.
 - Six of 10 people who kill themselves in single-vehicle accidents are drunk.
 - Alcohol is responsible for 8,000 deaths a year among people ages 16 to 24 years. It is responsible for disfiguring 40,000 more.
 - Alcohol and highways result in injuries to 125,000 people per year.
 - The cost of alcohol-related accidents exceeds \$24 billion per year.
 - Of 60 children born today, one will die and three will be gravely injured in alcohol-related car accidents before their 20th birthday.
 - Drunk driving will kill 70 people today and injure 2,150 more.
 - Every 23 minutes, a drunk driver kills a person.
 - On a Friday or Saturday night, one of every 10 cars on the road is being driven by a drunk.
 - Less than one of five convicted drunk drivers lose their licenses. Of those who do, 70 percent continue to drive illegally.
 - Only half of the states prohibit people from drinking alcohol while they drive.
 - Nine of ten people arrested for drunk driving are men.
- A chilling list details how a driver can die within seven-tenths of a second in an automobile crash. University studies provide a chronology of what happens when a car rams into a tree at a speed of 55 miles per hour (mph).
- Within one-tenth of a second, the front bumper and grill collapse.
 - Within two-tenths of a second, the hood crumbles, rises and smashes the windshield.
 - Within three-tenths of a second, the driver is sprung upright from the seat, his or her broken knees are pressed against the dashboard and the steering wheel bends.
 - Within four-tenths of a second, the front of the car is dead still, but the rear end keeps plunging forward at 55 m.p.h. The half-ton motor crunches the tree.
 - Within half a second, the steering column bends into a nearly vertical position and impales the driver. Jagged steel punctures lungs and arteries.
 - Within six-tenths of a second, the impact rips shoes off the driver's feet. The chassis bends in the middle. The driver's head slams into the windshield. The rear of the car begins to fall and its spinning wheels churn the ground.
 - Within seven-tenths of a second, the entire car is twisted. The front seat rams forward, pinning the driver against the steering shaft. The driver has died.

Landlord-Tenant Law

Most of us at one time or another have either been a tenant or a landlord. In 1975 the legislature passed what is known as the Uniform Owner-Resident Relations Act which covers most situations where one person rents a dwelling place from another. If you do not have a rental agreement or lease, then the act also provides automatic provisions which cover most of the common problems that occur between a landlord and a tenant.

Unless provided otherwise, all rental terms are for month-to-month unless the tenant pays weekly, in which case the term is for week-to-week. Either the landlord or the tenant can terminate a lease on thirty days written notice for a month-to-month tenancy or seven days on a week-to-week tenancy.

If a landlord receives a damage deposit in excess of one month rent (not including the last month's rent if collected in advance), the landlord must pay the tenant interest on the deposit equal to a savings and loan passbook rate of interest. When the tenant leaves, the landlord is under a duty to give the tenant a written statement which itemizes any deductions from the deposits and states why the deductions were taken within thirty days from the date of the termination of the tenancy. If the landlord fails to do this, the tenant can recover the deposits, attorney fees and court costs.

At the beginning of the lease the name and address of the person authorized to manage the premises and the person authorized to accept service of lawsuit papers on behalf of the landlord must be given to the tenant in writing. The tenant is entitled to live in a place that substantially complies with the requirements of the applicable minimum housing code materially affecting health and safety.

The tenant is required to keep the premises clean and safe as the condition of the premises permit, and to return the premises in as clean a condition as they were in when the tenant moved in. The tenant is required to dispose of all trash and garbage from the dwelling in a clean and safe manner, and is also required to use all heating, plumbing, cooling, etc. in the premises in a reasonable manner. Tenants must conduct themselves in a manner that will not disturb the neighbors' peaceful enjoyment of the premises.

The tenant is required to pay the rent when due, and if not, the landlord can give the tenant a three-day notice in writing to leave. If the tenant does not pay the rent within that three-day period, then the landlord can terminate the rental agreement and go to magistrate's court to seek to have the tenant removed from the premises and ordered to pay any back rent or damages.

If the tenant breaks (breaches) the lease agreement in any other manner, the landlord may give the tenant notice of the breach, and if the tenant does not "cure" the breach within seven days, the landlord may then terminate the lease. If the tenant commits a second material breach within six months of the first breach, then the landlord can terminate the lease on seven days' written notice. This provision is very specific and a landlord should consult her or his attorney before relying on it, and a tenant should do the same before complying with a notice to leave the premises.

These are just some of the rules that apply to a landlord-tenant relationship. Both the landlord and tenant should contact his or her attorney concerning specific rights and duties under a rental agreement or under that act.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 1 (SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 7, AS AMENDED FROM SECOND REGULAR SESSION, 36th LEGISLATURE)

PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO REQUIRE FUNDING BEFORE ANY NEW OR INCREASED COUNTY OR MUNICIPAL SERVICE MANDATED BY THE STATE HAS THE FORCE OF LAW.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 10 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new section to read:

"A state rule or regulation mandating any county or city to engage in any new activity, to provide any new service or to increase any current level of activity or to provide any service beyond that required by existing law, shall not have the force of law, unless, or until, the state provides sufficient new funding or a means of new funding to the county or city to pay the cost of performing the mandated activity or service for the period of time during which the activity or service is required to be performed."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

NEW MEXICO LAWS-1984 CHAPTER 6 (SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL 12, AS AMENDED FROM SPECIAL SESSION OF 36th LEGISLATURE)

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF EDUCATIONAL BONDS TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR CAPITAL EXPENDITURES AT CERTAIN STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND CERTAIN POST-SECONDARY AND PUBLIC SCHOOLS; PROVIDING A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL OF THE BONDS; PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION OF THIS ACT TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE AT THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Educational Bond Act".

Section 2. For the purpose of providing funds for capital expenditures at certain state educational institutions and certain post-secondary and public schools, indebtedness of the state is hereby authorized for the year 1985 in the amount of sixty-four million dollars (\$64,000,000) or any lesser amount as may be legally issued under constitutional limitations existing at the time of issuance of bonds evidencing the indebtedness, or any lesser amount as may be approved by the state board of finance.

Section 3. The state board of finance, except as otherwise specifically provided in the Educational Bond Act, shall determine at its discretion the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued pursuant to the Educational Bond Act, including but not limited to: date of issue, denominations, maturities, rate or rates of interest, call features, call premiums, registration, refundability and other covenants covering the general and technical aspects of the issuance of bonds. The bonds shall be in such form as the state board of finance may determine, and successive issues shall be identified by alphabetical, numerical or other proper series designation. The state board of finance shall cause to be prepared successively negotiable serial bonds of the state of New Mexico, to be known as "Educational Bonds—Series 1985", in denominations as the state board of finance shall determine, to be numbered consecutively and to be dated January 1 or July 1 of the year in which they are issued. The bonds shall bear interest payable semiannually on July 1 and January 1 of each year. Payment on the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the state treasurer in the city of Santa Fe, New Mexico, or at such alternate paying agent at a bank or banks within or without the state of New Mexico as the state board of finance may authorize. The bonds shall be signed and attested by the state treasurer and shall be executed with the facsimile signature of the governor and the facsimile seal of the state, except for bonds issued in book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical securities. Any interest coupons attached to the bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the state treasurer, which officer by the execution of the bonds shall adopt as his own signature in the facsimile thereof appearing on the coupons. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act. The full faith and credit of the state of New Mexico is hereby pledged for the prompt payment at maturity of the principal and interest of all bonds which may be issued and sold as provided in the Educational Bond Act.

Section 4. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for providing funds to those state educational institutions and post-secondary and public schools in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of the Educational Bond Act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds which are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of the Educational Bond Act shall be

used solely for the purpose of retiring the interest and principal payable on the bonds.

Section 5. The bonds authorized under the Educational Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance, at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect; to the bidder or bidders offering the best price therefor at not less than par and accrued interest to the date of delivery. The state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and also in a recognized financial journal outside the state. The publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least ten days prior to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, day and hour at which the sealed bids therefor shall be received. At the time and place specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders offering the best price therefor. The state board of finance may reject any or all bids and re-advertise. The state board of finance may, at any time, sell the bonds or any part thereof to the state treasurer or state investment officer at private sale. The state treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds with the funds in his hands for investment at any time. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

Section 6. The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds before any proceeds are distributed by the state board of finance under the provisions of Section 10 of the Educational Bond Act.

Section 7. To provide for the payment of the interest and principal of the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of the Educational Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of the bonds shall be outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state of New Mexico subject to taxation for state purposes sufficient to produce an amount equal to one year's interest on all bonds then outstanding, together with an amount sufficient to pay the principal of all bonds as they mature. The taxes hereby authorized, imposed and levied shall be levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other taxes for state purposes are levied, assessed and collected, and it shall be the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be levied, assessed and collected.

Section 8. The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected under the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the Educational Bond Act and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the interest and principal of the bonds as they become due.

Section 9. Any holder of any of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of the Educational Bond Act or any person or officer being a party in interest may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or by mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by the Educational Bond Act of any officer or person mentioned in that act. The provisions of the Educational Bond Act constitute an irrevocable contract with the holders of any of the bonds issued pursuant to the Educational Bond Act for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the State of New Mexico is hereby pledged. Without reference to any other act of the legislature of the state, the Educational Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of negotiable paper under the Uniform Commercial Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issue and sale thereof and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the provisions of the Educational Bond Act are exempt from taxation.

Section 10. The proceeds from the sale of the educational institutions bonds issued under the provisions of the Educational Bond Act shall be distributed by the state board of finance as follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

A. to eastern New Mexico university as follows:

(1) one million eight hundred fifty-seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,857,800) for remodeling of the liberal arts building at the main campus;

(2) two hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) for the renovation of greyhound arena for the health, physical education and recreation department at the main campus;

(3) one million six hundred ninety-six thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,696,800) for a computer sciences facility and other capital improvements at the Clovis branch; and

(4) two million one hundred eighty-one thousand seven hundred dollars (\$2,181,700) for a physical education complex at the Roswell campus, provided that the university has obtained funds from sources other than the state of at least seven hundred twenty-seven thousand two hundred twenty-five dollars (\$727,225);

B. to New Mexico highlands university, one million four hundred twenty thousand four hundred dollars (\$1,420,400) to replace the heating system and make other energy distribution improvements;

C. to New Mexico institute of mining and technology, six million five hundred two thousand nine hundred dollars (\$6,502,900) for a science and engineering complex;

D. to New Mexico state university as follows:

(1) eight million ninety-nine thousand seven hundred dollars (\$8,099,700) for a computer science and engineering psy-

chology building at the main campus;

(2) three million dollars (\$3,000,000) for the construction of a chilled water storage facility at the main campus;

(3) nine hundred ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$998,000) for an electrical distribution system at the main campus;

(4) one million nine hundred seventy-six thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,976,800) for general instructional building at the Alamogordo branch; and

(5) one million three hundred thirty-eight thousand dollars (\$1,338,000) for a facility to house vocational and technical education programs and for other capital improvements at the Dona Ana branch; provided that the university has obtained funds from sources other than the state of at least four hundred forty-six thousand dollars (\$446,000);

E. to northern New Mexico state school as follows:

(1) one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000) for campus improvements at the El Rito campus;

F. to the university of New Mexico as follows:

(1) seven million six hundred seventy-one thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,671,500) to remodel and enlarge the Anderson school of management building at the main campus;

(2) two million seven hundred thousand dollars (\$2,700,000) to construct a parking structure at the main campus, contingent on matching funds of one million six hundred thousand dollars (\$1,600,000) by the university of New Mexico;

(3) four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) to purchase basic laboratory skills equipment at the Los Alamos branch;

(4) two million four hundred eighty-five thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,485,900) to construct a permanent campus for the Valencia county branch on a site deeded to the university of New Mexico. No proceeds of the bonds authorized for this purpose shall be distributed until the university of New Mexico has certified to the state board of finance that title has been conveyed to the university of New Mexico, and local matching funds in an amount not less than twenty-five percent of the distribution provided for in this paragraph have been made available toward construction of the project; and

(5) three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) to complete inside construction work in the lower level of a new classroom building currently under construction at the Gallup branch;

G. to the board of educational finance as follows:

(1) four million dollars (\$4,000,000) to require engineering and science equipment for those four-year institutions of higher education enumerated in Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico, but, in allocating the proceeds, the share allocated to each institution shall not be more than:

(a) forty percent to the university of New Mexico;

(b) forty percent to New Mexico state university;

(c) ten percent to New Mexico institute of mining and technology;

(d) four percent to New Mexico highlands university;

(e) four percent to eastern New Mexico university; and

(f) two percent to western New Mexico university;

(2) four million dollars (\$4,000,000) for library acquisitions and library computer equipment and appropriate data bases for post-secondary educational institutions; and

(3) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for distribution to Santa Fe community college for planning, site preparation and construction; provided that this appropriation is contingent upon passage of a local five million dollar (\$5,000,000) bond issue and site acquisition by the community college; and provided further that funds shall be distributed upon approval of the board of educational finance; and

H. to the office of education of the department of finance and administration as follows:

(1) one million six hundred twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$1,629,000) for distribution to Albuquerque technical-vocational institute for a computer facility;

(2) two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) for distribution to Luna area vocational-technical institute for a technology training facility;

(3) one million one hundred thirty thousand dollars (\$1,130,000) for distribution to Tucuman area vocational school for a transportation industries building; and

(4) six million five hundred thousand dollars (\$6,500,000) for distribution to the public school capital outlay fund to carry out the provisions of the Public School Capital Outlay Act. These funds may be used for gymnasiums, auditoriums and cafeterias; however, first priority shall be given to construction of classrooms.

Section 11. The Educational Bond Act shall be submitted to the registered voters of the state at the general election to be held in November 1984, and if it shall receive a majority of all the votes cast thereon at such election, it shall take effect upon certification of the state canvassing board announcing the results of such election; provided that no bonds shall be issued or sold under the Educational Bond Act until the registered voters of this state shall have voted upon and ratified that act at the general election in 1984 as provided in this section.

The ballots at the 1984 general election shall contain in an appropriate place enabling the voter to vote for or against the question, the words, "the Educational Bond Act authorizing issuance and sale of Educational Bonds" and in the same place on the ballot under those words, the following: "The Educational Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of educational bonds in the year 1985 in the amount of sixty-four million dollars (\$64,000,000) to provide funds for capital expenditures at certain state educational institutions and certain post-secondary schools and provides for a tax levy for payments of interest and

principal of the bonds."

The secretary of state shall include the submission of the Educational Bond Act to the people at the 1984 general election, and it shall be included in the general election proclamation of each of the county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the Educational Bond Act to be published in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the election at required by the constitution of New Mexico.

Section 1. Esta acta puede ser citada como el "Acta de Bono Educativo". Section 2. Con el propósito de proveer fondos para gastos capitales en ciertas instituciones educacionales del estado y ciertas escuelas públicas y post-secundarias, deuda del estado es aquí autorizada por el año de 1985 en la cantidad de sesenta y cuatro millones de dólares (\$64,000,000) o cualquier cantidad menor que pueda ser emitida legalmente bajo limitaciones constitucionales existentes el tiempo de la emisión de los bonos evidenciando deudas, o cualquier cantidad menor que pueda hacer aprobada por la junta de finanza del estado.

Section 3. La junta de finanza del estado, excepto como de otra manera especificado proveído en el Acta de Bono Educativo, determinará a su discreción los términos, convenios y condiciones de los bonos emitidos de acuerdo con el Acta de Bono Educativo, incluyendo pero no limitado a fecha de la emisión, denominaciones, caducaciones, tarifa o tarifas de interés, facción, primas, registro, reembolso y otros convenios cubriendo los aspectos generales y técnicos de la emisión de los bonos. Los bonos serán en forma como la junta de finanza del estado pueda determinar, y emisiones sucesivas serán identificadas alfabéticamente, numéricamente u otra propia designación de series. La junta de finanza del estado hará la preparación de series de bonos sucesivos negociables del estado de Nuevo México, a ser conocidos como "Bonos Educativos—Series 1985", en nominaciones como pueda determinar la junta de finanza del estado, serán numerados consecutivamente y serán fechados 1 de enero o 1 de julio del año que serán emitidos. Los bonos tendrán interés pagadero semi-anualmente el 1 de julio y el 1 de enero de cada año. Pagos en el principal de los bonos comenzarán no más tarde de dos años después de la fecha de la emisión, y los bonos caducarán no más tarde de diez años después de la fecha de la emisión. Ambos principal e interés serán pagados en dinero legal de los Estados Unidos en la oficina del tesoro del estado en la ciudad de Santa Fe, Nuevo México, o a dicho alternativo agente pagadero en un banco o bancos dentro o fuera del estado de Nuevo México como pueda autorizar la junta de finanza del estado. facsimile de la firma del gobernador y el facsimile del sello del estado, excepto por bonos emitidos en entrada de libros o forma similar sin la entrega física de las garantías. Cualquier cupón de interés pagado a los bonos tendrá el facsimile de la firma del tesoro del estado, cual oficial en la elección de los bonos adopta como su propia firma en el facsimile apareciendo en los cupones. Los bonos serán emitidos de acuerdo con las provisiones del Acta de Seguridades Públicas Suplemental y el Acta Uniforme de Firmas Facsimile de Oficiales Públicos. La completa fe y crédito del estado de Nuevo México es aquí prometido por el pronto pago a la caducación del principal e interés de todos los bonos que puedan ser emitidos y vendidos como es proveído en el Acta de Bono Educativo.

Section 4. Los productos de la venta de los bonos serán gastados solamente proveyendo fondos a aquellas instituciones educacionales del estado y escuelas públicas y post-secundarias en las cantidades y para los propósitos señalados en las secciones 6 y 10 del Acta de Bono Educativo. Cualquier producto de la venta de los bonos que no sean requeridos por los propósitos señalados en las secciones 6 y 10 del Acta de Bono Educativo será usado solamente con el propósito de retirar el interés y principal que son pagaderos en los bonos.

Section 5. Los bonos autorizados bajo el Acta de Bono Educativo serán vendidos por la junta de finanza del estado, a dicho tiempo y en dicha manera y cantidades como la junta pueda elegir, al postor o postores ofreciendo el mejor precio y no menos de par e interés acumulado al día de la entrega. La junta de finanza del estado publicará un aviso del tiempo y lugar de la venta en un periódico de circulación general en el estado y en una publicación financiera reconocida fuera del estado. Las publicaciones serán hechas una vez a la semana por dos semanas consecutivas antes de la fecha fijada para la venta, la última publicación será no menos de diez días antes de la fecha de la venta. El aviso especificará la cantidad, denominación, educación y descripción de los bonos a ser ofrecidos para la venta y el lugar, día y hora en la cual las ofertas selladas serán recibidas. Al tiempo y lugar especificado en el aviso, la junta de finanza del estado abrirá las ofertas en público y dará los bonos al postor o postores que ofrecieron el mejor precio por ellos. La junta de finanza del estado podrá rechazar cualquiera o todas las ofertas y republicar el aviso. La junta de finanza del estado podrá, en cualquier tiempo, vender los bonos o cualquier parte de ellos al tesoro del estado o un oficial de inversión del estado en una venta privada. El tesoro del estado u oficial de inversión del estado están autorizados a comprar cualquiera de los bonos con los fondos en sus manos para inversión en cualquier tiempo. Los bonos son inversiones legales para cualquiera persona o junta encargada con inversión de cualquier fondo público y puede ser aceptado como seguridad por cualquier depósito de dinero público.

Section 6. Los gastos incurridos por la junta de finanza del estado en la preparación y venta de los bonos serán pagados del producto de la venta de los bonos antes que cualquier producto sea distribuido por la junta de finanza del estado bajo las provisiones de la Sección 10 del Acta de Bono Educativo.

Section 7. 
Ruidoso, now 5-0-1 on the overall season and 1-0 in district play, held off one Tiger drive after Williamson's score.

Ruidoso will host defending state AAA-division champion Artesia this Friday night. The contest will start at 7:30.




