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No arrests yet in slaying of McKnights

After questioning neighbors, friends and relatives Thursday and Friday, investigators continued to come up empty in their search for clues into the murders last week of Thomas "Cotton" McKnight and his wife, Judy, of Picacho.

"We've been interviewing everyone we can find," said Lincoln County Chief Deputy Sheriff Charlie Cox Friday. "But nobody's come up with any logical reasoning. He (McKnight) was just an easygoing type of guy."

The bodies of the couple were discovered around 9 a.m. Thursday on the kitchen floor of their ranch home, according to Cox. They were discovered by concerned friends, one of whom had tried unsuccessfully at least twice Wednesday to reach the McKnights.

Cox said the front door to the house was locked but not completely closed, allowing entry to McKnight's friends.

McKnight had been shot in the chest, and his wife was shot in the back. Cox said both victims were then shot once in the head as they lay on the floor. The bullets found at the scene appeared to be from a .38 caliber gun, he added.

"We're not saying it was an execution, just that it was typical of an execution-type killing," he said. "Any time someone shoots someone in the head like that, that's what it looks like. They did it for the express purpose of seeing that they were killed. It was just a cold-blooded thing."

Cox said there were no signs of forceful entry, and nothing was taken or disturbed in the house.

"None of the drawers were gone through and nothing was out of place," he said. "Even in the kitchen there was nothing disturbed. The chairs were all in place."

He described the scene as casual in appearance. There was a bottle of liquor, some glasses and beer cans on the kitchen table. Mrs. McKnight found with a cigarette in her hand appeared to have been smoking.

Cox said that evidence suggested the killer may have been an acquaintance of the McKnights. But he noted that that was only speculation at this point.

McKnight was last seen by neighbors at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday. Cox estimated the time of death as late

Thursday evening.

The bodies were removed to the medical examiner's office in Albuquerque, where an autopsy was to be performed.

McKnight served two terms as chairman of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, and was an unsuccessful candidate in the 1982 Republican primary for District 56 state representative.

He and his wife ranched a cattle and sheep operation in the Hondo Valley, about 20 miles south of Picacho.


John Hightower served with McKnight on the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners for four years. Hightower said that was the only contact he had had with McKnight, but that he respected McKnight and got along with him.

"He liked to have fun, but when there was work to be done, he got right down to it. You could depend on him," said Hightower. Hightower said he was shocked to hear about the tragic shooting.

Many Lincoln County residents were deeply upset by the incident. A potluck supper that had been scheduled for Saturday night in honor of the county's emergency medical technicians was canceled in observation of the deaths.

Funeral services for the McKnights are scheduled for 2 p.m. today Monday at the First Baptist Church in Roswell.


It's time to ski!

Chamber names executive director

After an exhaustive search that spanned three months, the board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce announced Sunday the permanent appointment of its new executive director.

John Jeffers, the president and general manager of the Bentonville/Bella Vista (Arkansas) Chamber of Commerce, has been named to the position. He was the unanimous choice of the board.

"I feel really good about it," said board president James Paxton. "I think of all the people we've interviewed... (Jeffers) was the one who ended up sticking out."

Paxton said Jeffers shone particularly "in terms of what the chamber needs right now." He described the Arkansas native as a diplomatic, down-to-earth, a fine communicator and a good organizer.

"I love also that he's realistic," said Paxton. "When somebody would say, 'How would you handle this?' one of those theoretical things, he would say, 'I don't know. I'd have to know more about the situation.' I think that's realistic."

A former manager of the Taos Chamber of Commerce, Jeffers has served in various chamber-related capacities over the years.

In his present position in Arkansas, Jeffers is responsible for all administrative functions of the chamber of commerce. Included in his duties are membership and membership services, budget preparation, economic development, special events, chamber newsletters and committee activities.

According to his resume, he organized and conducted a unique membership drive that yielded a 55 percent membership increase and a 70 percent increase in member income.

He also has been involved in membership contact from a program of informal monthly member receptions called "Business After Hours" to quarterly membership luncheons.

Prior to his present position, Jeffers was executive director of the Arkansas River Valley Tourist Association in Russellville, Arkansas.

There he was responsible for promotion, advertising, budget and

membership development, and legislative liaison for a six-county area.

In addition to his New Mexico chamber experience with the Taos Chamber of Commerce, he served as manager of the Chamber Division of the Roswell Chamber of Development and Commerce.

Born in 1942, Jeffers is a native of Fort Smith, Arkansas. He is married to a special education teacher and has two teenaged boys.

He is a 1968 graduate of North Texas State University, where he majored in psychology. Professionally, he has attended the institutes for Organization Management and for the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

According to Paxton, Jeffers will be paid \$29,000 a year. He will receive health insurance for himself and his family, life insurance for himself and reimbursement for approved travel expenses, approved chamber-related education, and approved dues to chamber-related organizations and publications.

The board's approval of the candidate followed a Friday night special board meeting and a Saturday night get-together at which an informal board meeting was held.

Jeffers was selected above 30 other applicants for the position, including four local candidates.

Paxton said Jeffers is expected to be on board by the first week of January, and may be even before the end of the year.

Post Office encourages 'mail early'

It's that time of year when the United States Postal Service makes its annual plea for customers to ship early and mail early. And that's with good reason, according to Ruidoso Postmaster Bernie Lechman.

A week ago, he said, the post office handled 162,000 pieces of mail in a seven-day period. During the week of Christmas last year, by comparison, the volume was 234,000 pieces for seven days.

That kind of increase in total mail volume can dictate how soon a card or letter reaches its destination.

"You can't expect a letter if you mail it on December 22, to make it by Christmas," Lechman said. The key to successful holiday mailing is to mail early and correctly.

Lechman said that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas, and using the proper ZIP codes on all parcels.

To arrive by Christmas, packages sent anywhere in the United States must be mailed by December 14. For cards and letters to arrive on time, they must be posted by December 18.

Many overseas mailing dates will occur this month, Lechman said, both for civilian and military addresses. For example, for packages to arrive by Christmas throughout Europe, they must be mailed by parcel airtail by November 26.

He said customers can call the post office to receive specific information on other international dates.

"We just want to make sure they do mail early," Lechman said. "And if they have any questions, they can call us."

Beginning December 10 and continuing until Christmas, the post office will open the building's central Dutch doors for the pickup of parcels.

Anyone getting a yellow notice that a package is being held at the post office can pick it up during that time, either the Dutch doors or the post desk.

It was well said by the Reverend Dale McCleskey, at the services for John Ancil Pior, at Clarke's Chapel of Roses, November sixteen, that John was well prepared to meet the Lord.
Most of us knew John by his middle name, Ancil, all through the many years that, as a good and faithful son, he helped his mother, Mable, and his father, Clovis, make Biscuit Hill Cafe famous from coast to coast.
The cafe was started in 1946, and became so famous for the home-cooked food, especially the biscuits, that truck drivers and other coast to coast travelers would look forward for hundreds of miles on the way to stopping at the place they named Biscuit Hill.
The famous cafe was just down the river from the bridge, there where Conley's Trout Lakes and Camp Ground now stand.
After the cafe closed down, Ancil lived for years in the house by the side of the road, with the giant Red gold apple tree shading his home.
Often I would go by his place, and during the time of the ripening of the apples, he would always tell me to "Help yourself."
At his services, two very appropriate hymns were sung: "Take My Hand, Lead Me Home" and "There'll Be Peace in the Valley for Me." Oh Lord.

Although frail in body, Ancil was stout in heart, and remained cheerful and helpful all through his days here among us. He was a thoroughly good man, with nothing in his nature but kindness and good will. He will always hold a fond place in our memory, and we rejoice that our dear friend is safe and happy with our Lord in Heaven.
Happy Birthdays
to Gentleman Kid Black
I had given Jack Black, owner, and operator along with his wife, Eddie, of Black's Feed and Supply, the nice name of Gentleman Kid Black because he reminded me of photographs I had seen in my youth of Gentleman Jim Corbett, perhaps the greatest heavyweight boxer of all

time. Little did I know how close I was to the mark.
It turns out that, as a soldier in World War II, he came within one bout of boxing for the heavyweight championship of the Allied Armed Forces in the European theater.
Jack was born November 21, 1921, in Captain, to Roy Adams Black and the former Pearl Elizabeth Thurman, who had arrived there in 1920 from Texas, after travels and adventures as thrilling and dramatic as a western novel written by Zane Grey.
Not long after Jack's birth, the family moved to El Paso. He volunteered into the Army in World War II and spent three and a half years in the service, including two and one-half years overseas. He earned four major battle stars, having served in Africa, France, England, Belgium, Holland, France and Germany.

He was a member of the One Hundred and Thirteenth Triple A Anti-Tank and Anti-Aircraft Gun Battalion, which was attached to the 101st Army. His rank was T 4, motor pool, at first, and he rose to Acting Master Sergeant the last six months of his duty, when the ranks were then frozen.
Shortly before the Battle of the Bulge, Jack had won the heavyweight division in the French section of the boxing tournament of the Allied Armed Forces. He was scheduled to go to London to box for the championship when Germany made the desperate push known as the Battle of the Bulge, and the remainder of the boxing tournament was cancelled.
After the war, back in El Paso, Jack's star of good fortune shone brightly when in 1946 he was married to the prettiest girl in El Paso, the Darling of the Town, the former Edna Nell Burch, affectionately known as "Eddie."
They have five children: Winifred Lewis, Canutillo, Texas; Jackie Watson, Arlington, Texas; Roy Black, Ruidoso; Joyce Black, Ruidoso; and Iris Black, Ruidoso. They also have five grandchildren.
From 1946 to 1975 he was manager

of the El Paso branch of the Producers Livestock Marketing Association, which included New Mexico, Texas and Mexico.

In 1975, Jack and Eddie moved to their present spot in Ruidoso Downs, and will soon celebrate their tenth anniversary here where they have made friends all over this section of the country.

In addition to operating his feed and supply store, Jack is manager of the Apache Ranch Cattle Company.

From a Long Line of Western Pioneers

Jack's grandparents, William Charles Black and the former Maud Adams, as a young couple, left their home in Fort Worth, Texas, and went by covered wagon to Oklahoma Territory and homesteaded near what is now Elk City. Their first two children were born in a prairie dugout. They became friends with the Cherokee Indians who lived on the reservation nearby. One time they persuaded Chief Elk River not to go on a raid against some white people.

From 1893 until 1904 they ranched at their homestead, and then a severe drought forced them to leave for the plains of Texas looking for grass for their herd of registered cattle. Near Seagraves, in 1905, an arctic cold blizzard struck, causing the death of their cattle. Undaunted, they moved on and homesteaded at Muskee Creek near Alpine. It was from there that they moved to the Texas panhandle and then for a while to Captain, New Mexico and then to El Paso.

Through all their trials and hardships, this courageous couple remained cheerful and always ready for new adventures, true American pioneers.

Hunting accidents

A Dexter man was accidentally killed Sunday while on a hunting trip with relatives east of Pine Lodge on state highway 48.

Manuel Candelaria, 39, was shot to death as he pulled a 22-caliber rifle from a sleeping bag in his pickup truck. He was pronounced dead at the scene by emergency medical personnel. The time of the incident was set at about 4 p.m.

In another shooting, Ernesto Barela of Albuquerque died from an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound Friday while hunting in Baca Canyon north of Lincoln. According to officials at the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, the incident is being investigated as a possible suicide.

Bog Springs Road project getting final touches

A year ago, the Bog Springs valley knew only a gurgling creek and a meadow sparsely populated by horses. This month, Village of Ruidoso Street Department crews will put the finishing touches on a modern road that winds through Bog Springs and services the new Ruidoso High School from Hull Road to Gavilan Canyon Road.

From empty meadow last November to completed road and a high school nearing completion this November, the Bog Springs project has been one of the largest-scale efforts Ruidosians have seen yet.
"It's going to be a nice area for Ruidoso," said assistant village manager Frank Potter. He noted that the development of Bog Springs had been foreseen as long ago as the 1976 master plan. Potter said he had hoped for the project for a long time.

"It's kind of my little dream-come-true," he remarked.

Potter praised the cooperation between the school system, village, Lincoln County and utility companies as an essential ingredient for success of the project.

"Everyone got together and it's done," he said. The assistant manager noted that the road cost

about \$180,000 to construct, and was funded 60 percent by the state and 40 percent by the village. Potter said the costs of the project were kept low since village Street Department crews did most of the work.

Street Department supervisor Jack LaMay said that after being started last November, work on the project progressed to the finish of a subgraded surface, then was called to a halt to allow the sewer system to be installed. He indicated that the delay was

unfortunate but necessary.

When that work was completed this October, village crews again worked on the road, laying about 26,000 tons of asphalt on the road surface, leaving a three-inch asphalt layer. LaMay said the layer will be an improvement over the two inches that are usually laid on village roads.

"It takes a lot of work to build a good road," he said. "It's going to be a good road."

Accidents result in minor injuries

Ruidoso Police Department officers investigated two single-vehicle traffic accidents with injuries Friday. Neither resulted in extended hospitalization.

Police reported the crash Friday at 4 p.m. of a vehicle driven by Julia M. Pokorski, 24, of Ruidoso. The Pokorski vehicle was traveling eastbound on Main Road when it left the roadway and struck a tree head-on, according to police.

Pokorski was treated and released at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital for facial and knee injuries. She was cited for careless driving.

Ruidoso Police also investigated an

accident later Friday, at 11:50 p.m. In that accident, a vehicle driven by Patrick G. Clair, 18, of Ruidoso Downs, was traveling southeast on Paradise Canyon Drive when it began to slide sideways. Police said Clair overcompensated and the vehicle left the roadway, entered a ditch and overturned completely to come to rest on the wheels.

Passengers in the vehicle, Mike Keaton, 15, of Ruidoso, and Erin Rad, 18, also of Ruidoso, were treated and released at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital. Craig was cited for careless driving.

The firm's absorption by Thomson McKinnon became effective earlier this fall.




Cisco Bob takes second as Warrior runners finish sixth

Senior Cisco Bob finished second in a tough field to lead the Ruidoso High School boys cross-country team to a sixth-place finish in the state AAA-division meet in Albuquerque Saturday.

Bob recorded a 15:57.0 time, six seconds behind winner Mangel Tahe of Tohatchi, who had a 15:51.4 clocking over the three-mile course.

Ruidoso scored 174 points, five points ahead of District 3-AAA rival Silver City. The Colts nipped the Warriors by two points in the district meet last week.

Zuni won the boys title with 47 points. Wingate had 56, Grants scored 61, Bernalillo had 110 and Robertson had 128.

Bob, who finished 11th in last season's state meet, was seventh in the early part of the race, but moved up to second about halfway through the hilly course and stayed there.

The runners finished on the flat track at Milne Stadium. Bob made a good try to catch Tahe, but the slender Tohatchi runner finished strongly for the victory.

There were three large hills the runners had to climb during the course of the race. To make matters worse, the weather was cold and the ground slick from a recent rain.

"It was a real rough course," Bob said after the race. "Much tougher than the Silver City course last week. I ran as good as I can."

Bob had won several meets this season in faster times than his state-meet clocking.

Sophomore Gabe Tam was the next Warrior finisher. He came in 27th. Tam finished second to Bob in the

district meet. Senior Curt McClellan was 45th and junior David Ordozica was 50th.

Wayne Richardson was 72nd, Kevin Yuzos 73rd and Hamilton Carter 76th. McClellan, Bob and Richardson are the only seniors on the team. The rest of the runners will return next season.

"I think the kids did a pretty good job," said Warrior coach Ronny Maskew. "This was a tough course."

I'm sure it was one of the toughest they've been on all year.

"The kids we have returning should do well next year."

Times were only given for the top 10 finishers.

Zuni also won the girls AAA-division title. Gallup captured the boys AAAA-division crown and Santa Fe won the girls AAAA-division championship.



This season's District 3-AAA football race was pretty much of a two-team affair.

Silver City won the district championship and Ruidoso finished second. Cobre, Deming and Hot Springs might just as well have not played the district season. There wasn't any doubt which teams were the best.

Silver City captured its ninth straight title, but a true reflection of its dominance were the scores of the Colts' games.

Outside of Silver City's 39-22 win over Ruidoso, no district team scored any points against the Colts.

Silver City beat Hot Springs 49-0, topped Cobre 42-0 and routed Deming 41-0. That's a total of 131 points for the Colts against none for their opponents.

It's doubtful that any other team in the state dominated its district foes the way Silver City did.

But the Warriors should provide tougher competition for the Colts next season.

Besides the loss to Silver City, Ruidoso topped Hot Springs 15-8, club-

bed Cobre 44-6 and rolled over Deming 31-14 in its district games this season.


"We played well offensively and defensively against Pecos," Segura said. "They were taller than us but we seemed to do pretty well against them."

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
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
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
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
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
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Mayor David Cummins 'For \$10 a month, they get a lot'

A fourth-generation Capitan resident, David Cummins is the mayor of the village.

At 25, Cummins is one of the youngest mayors in the state. He served on the village council from the age of 20.

Cummins had been mayor pro tem when former Mayor Don Stark resigned his position in May 1983 for health reasons. The council then appointed Cummins to the mayoral seat.

The mayor has many duties in the daily operation of the village. He handles routine business such as signing checks. He also must make sure that decisions made by the council are properly carried out.

Cummins attends various meetings and conferences on behalf of Capitan. Last week, he went to a hearing in Roswell to try to obtain a Community Development Block Grant for water improvements.

The mayor also represents Capitan's water needs on the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association board. The board, composed of members from both Ruidoso and Capitan, is a non-profit organization that oversees the use of Eagle Creek water.

A firm believer in community participation, Cummins has some definite ideas on local government.

"I have no sympathy for people who don't support the village, but expect all the services and then some," he said.

Cummins would like to see more people attend village council meetings.

"A lot of people rely on word of mouth," he said. "But around here, that's not always good because things get distorted."

"One thing that upsets me about people is that they're greedy to an extent," said the mayor. "They don't care about village government unless it affects them directly."

Cummins stressed that most of the council's decisions do have an impact on everybody, and more people should participate.

He would like to see Capitan continue to grow in the future, as long as the growth is carefully planned.

"I'd like to see the future administrations not have to go through what I have for the past five years," said the mayor, citing water problems in particular. "I would like to see growth have to catch up with water supply."

Since his appointment in 1983, Cummins has taken many steps toward improving Capitan's water supply. He obtained a \$193,000 grant and currently is trying for others.

As with most local governments, money is the biggest problem Capitan faces when trying to improve the water or the roads. When Cummins was first on the council, the yearly allotment for street repair was \$2,000. Now, it is close to \$9,000.

"But that doesn't go far," he noted. Cummins himself has gone out

and helped the crew with water and road emergencies.

"For \$10 a month (the mayor's salary), they get a lot," he said.

Cummins said that he probably would not seek to be elected mayor when his term ends in 1986.

"It has gotten to where it's taken too much of my time and caused pain for myself and my family," he said.

Although he spends his lunch hour at city hall, Cummins works full time as vice president and assistant manager at his family-owned supermarket.

"I've worked there ever since I was big enough to look over the counter," said Cummins.

The mayor and his wife, Deborah, enjoy traveling and sightseeing. An avid skier, Cummins also enjoys participating in and watching many sports.

Superintendent Hays meets with bus drivers

Capitan Superintendent of Schools Leonard Hays held a special meeting with all of the Capitan school bus drivers Thursday morning.

Hays told the drivers the meeting had been called to discuss recent problems on the buses and to find ways to meet the criticisms that have been made.

Most of the problems surfaced with the report of alleged molestation incidents on the Alto bus. Jeff Denton, driver of that bus, expressed his concern that many of the older children on the bus were afraid of being mistakenly accused of these acts. He asked Hays to allay the students' fears.

"We must protect both the children making the complaints and the children that have been accused," said Hays.

Hays told the group of drivers that the children's legal code is much stricter than that of adults, giving

children more protection.

"We've got to protect both sides—that's hard to do," he said.

Hays told the drivers there were still no conclusive answers to the many questions surrounding the alleged molestations. According to Hays, school officials met last week with the victims' parents and Assistant District Attorney Richie Askew to "work out" the situation.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan later gave a similar statement.

"We still don't have any corroborating evidence on any of the alleged acts," he said.

Sullivan said his department was still in the process of interviewing people. Investigators also are waiting for enlarged pictures to help the children make identifications, he said.

"We can't arrest somebody on hearsay," said Sullivan.

At Thursday's meeting, Hays said the parents of the alleged victims planned to withdraw their children from Capitan School and send them to

Ruidoso schools.

During the meeting, Hays and the drivers exchanged ideas about maintaining order and safety on the buses. Hays said he and the school principals had received calls from parents who were upset that their young children had been harassed by older students.

Hays suggested that the drivers separate the children by age, with the youngest at the front and the oldest at the back of the bus. He noted that riding the bus is a privilege, not a right, and said problem children can be suspended from riding the bus.

Hays also said that problem children should be sent to the office for disciplining. "It's interesting what a paddling will do," he said.

At the present, the school has no plans of hiring additional adults to ride on the buses. Denton's wife, Mary, who finishes her Fort Stanton bus route before the regular buses depart in the afternoon, has been riding the Alto bus since the alleged molestations were reported.

Volleyball season ends, band honored

The Capitan varsity volleyball team lost to Tatum in the first round of the state championship tournament Friday at Albuquerque. The scores were 15-6 (Capitan), 4-15, 10-15, 16-18.

"We didn't play well early," said coach Bill MacVeigh. "Our serving let down in the first two games."

"Michelle Otero came off the bench in the third game and really sparked us with her excellent setting," said MacVeigh. Joiner did a good job spiking the ball.

MacVeigh said his team would have won the match if they had been able to take the fourth set. "We were ahead 11-3 but we let them come back and beat us," he said.

Although they lost the state title, MacVeigh was pleased that his players had gone as far as they did.

The Variance may be granted provided that the Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer makes a factual determination that the structure or improvements existing prior to March 9, 1976 and that the granting of the Variance would comply with the standards set forth in Sub-section C of this section. The Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer cannot make the factual determination that the improvements or structures existed prior to March 19, 1976 and/or do not fulfill the standards set forth in Sub-section C, the Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer shall forward the application for Variance to the Commission for action. Any person aggrieved by the decision of the Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer may appeal the decision to the Commission. 31.31.1. BUILDING PERMITS AND CERTIFIED PLOT PLANS.
A. All applications for building permits shall be accompanied by a certified plot plan showing, with dimensions, the lot-lines, the building or buildings and the locations of buildings upon the lot. The drawing or plat shall be prepared and certified by a registered New Mexico surveyor or engineer. The drawings shall contain notations indicating the proposed use and location of all land and buildings. A record of the original copy of such applications and plats shall be kept in the office of the Building Inspector, and a duplicate copy will be kept at the building at all times during construction. No excavation or site clearing for construction purposes will be permitted without having first obtained a permit.
B. Any person, firm or corporation which deviates from the certified plot plan required in Sub-section A above, shall be subject to proceedings in the Municipal Court of the Village of Ruidoso. Upon conviction of deviating from the certified plot plan required in Sub-section A above, such person may be fined not more than \$300.00, imprisoned for not in excess of ninety (90) days, or both.
C. In addition to the penalties provided in Sub-section B above, the Village of Ruidoso's Building Inspector may, upon reasonable belief that a person, firm or corporation has deviated from the certified plot plan required in Sub-section A above, revoke the building permit of said person, firm or corporation.
D. No variance from the strict application of setback requirements shall be granted to any person, firm or corporation which deviates from the certified plot plan required in Sub-section A above.
E. Copies of Sub-section A, B, C, D and E hereof shall be incorporated within, or attached to, all building permit applications and, by signing a building permit application, the applicant shall be deemed to have:

The Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer cannot make the factual determination that the improvements or structures existed prior to March 19, 1976 and/or do not fulfill the standards set forth in Sub-section C, the Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer shall forward the application for Variance to the Commission for action. Any person aggrieved by the decision of the Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer may appeal the decision to the Commission. 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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—How to get an argument started at the next party you attend? announce that you are for or against a state-run lottery.

No matter which side you take, somebody there will disagree with you, almost certainly with great heat. It's clearly a topic on which few are neutral.

That fact will cause the spilling of many words and maybe some blood in the 1985 Legislature, where proponents and opponents of the plan will meet head-on.

How will it all come out? Well, it seems clear even this long before the legislators meet that if they pass a bill to create a lottery, the governor will almost certainly veto it. All that turmoil will have been in vain.

But we might as well get used to listening to arguments on the subject, because if the pro-lottery forces lose in 1985 they'll be back—again and again.

Main cheerleader for those shouting that we must have a lottery is Ken Schultz, Albuquerque city councilor, who has adopted the project as a sort of crusade.

He's backed by the generous funding of Scientific Games, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of the nation's largest maker of slot machines for legal or illegal use. They'd like to sell the state the devices which make such a lottery possible.

Their promotional material is plenty slick. Maybe it's too slick; one legislator complained after looking at one of the company's television presentations that it implied that anyone opposed to such a lottery is downright unAmerican.

Look for Senators Manny Aragon and Tito Chavez to introduce Schultz's bill in 1985. Both are respected members of the upper house, and that will give the bill more standing than it has had in the past. But it's in for some heavy opposition.

When the horseplayers and the church groups join hands, that's got to get our attention; and that's exactly what's happening in this instance.

Most of their arguments against a lottery, interestingly enough, are not on theological or moral grounds.

They're the kind of hard-headed debating material which makes a deeper impression on the average legislator.

You can expect them to hammer away at the regressivity of adopting such a measure. They will insist that those who would spend most of the money for lottery tickets are the New Mexico citizens who can afford it least.

To show you how hard opponents are prepared to fight, we even heard a high-ranking Baptist telling lawmakers last week that the odds on any substantial winnings in a state-run lottery are so slim that those who create it ought to be ashamed of themselves. (When a Baptist reverend talks betting odds, The End may be near at hand.)

But what's liable to influence legislators the most is that such lotteries appear to hurt horse racing, and that industry produces much more revenue for the state than a lottery would in a sparsely populated place like ours.

Main arguments for the other side come down to the fact that this is a relatively painless way to raise revenue—which any form of taxation certainly is not. Proponents also point out that 22 states and the District of Columbia are presently using some form of lottery or another, and that the custom goes all the way back to George Washington's time. (The Father of our Country bought tickets, possibly in hopes that if he won he could afford some new teeth.)

What's going to count most in favor of establishing such a game of chance under the state's sponsorship is the number of people who want to see it done. Legislators just back from door-knocking during campaign time say they found this a topic which created great interest. Most people who address it, they say, want to know why we don't have a lottery already.

This writer can attest to that kind of feeling. Write one of these columns telling what a bad deal you think such a lottery is, and you draw more mail than on any other subject.

Just wait. The letters will start arriving tomorrow.

DEAR EDITOR:

We are naturally disappointed in Ruidoso Downs voting "NO" on Sunday Liquor Sales. As owners and operators of the Hollywood Inn in Ruidoso Downs, we feel the impact of the passage of this bill as will a lot of other people in the area. Sunday Liquor Sales have meant supplemental income to numerous families (including school teachers that have worked for us). The only person it will benefit is the bootlegger.

We don't think that people were aware of the fact that the Race Track would be exempt from the law when they voted "NO". We also understand that the track does not pay sales tax on liquor on their concessions. A large portion of the liquor tax goes directly to the education and street improvements of the State. Watching the barns burn each year and new ones going up, make us wonder just how fair this is to New Mexico Schools and streets.

The track also enjoys a tax break of a half million, more or less, for capital improvements. Thus the Race Track is putting the money directly back into their business and we, the people of Ruidoso Downs and State of New Mexico, are not enjoying the benefits that we should derive from this large industry.

The Hollywood Inn has been in business longer than any other lounge and package store in the Downs and

has contributed a large amount of revenue (from taxes) to the community and to the State. As any other business in this area, we depend on the summer season for a large amount of our income. We have worked hard in this business and have always tried to keep within the law. We also have been robbed, had our lives threatened and have been assaulted both physically and verbally.

We have never tried, by any means, to take customers away from any other liquor establishment. We have not knowingly permitted anything to take place in our business that would hurt anyone in the community. Any profit from our business is spent here in the community or within the State. We realize that the money derived from the sales tax on Sunday is a small amount, but it does help defray some of the operating costs, such as the cost of the Village Police directing traffic during the summer.

The taxpaying citizens voted "NO" to the transfer of more liquor licenses into Ruidoso Downs. Since then three more licenses have been brought into the Village. This includes another license at the track, by the name of the Jockey Club. We do feel badly about the Downs voters closing us down on Sundays, especially during the summer and deer seasons.

On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



"If the November rains fail, there is going to be a lot of death in Kenya—from pure starvation."

That somber prediction was made by my visiting father-in-law, the Reverend Harold Cummins, last week. Harold and his wife, Betty, recently arrived in the States from Kenya, where they have been Southern Baptist missionaries for 20 years.

Harold's usual work in Kenya concerns "church planting"—the establishment of new churches—and theological education of local pastors. Famine conditions in the East African nation compelled him to spend much of his time this year on hunger relief projects.

Northern and central Kenya are suffering from the same drought that has contributed to the well-publicized famine to the north in Ethiopia.

Harold explained that the problem of hunger in Africa runs deeper than the current drought, however.

"It (the drought) has brought it to focus more," he said. But drought is just one of many problems that make it difficult for people to feed themselves.

Problems of inadequate farming methods—including inability to obtain fertilizers and seed and inability to store produce properly once it is grown—contribute to food shortages.

Insects and rodents inflict a substantial loss. Harold said that weevils eat up an estimated 40 to 50 percent of the food value of Kenya's main food item, corn. Rats take advantage of poor storage methods, too. Squirrels do substantial damage while the crop is still in the field, eating as much as half.

Insufficient knowledge and lack of availability of family planning methods also contribute to hunger, Harold believes. But multiple factors prevent the wisest of scientists from diminishing a birth rate that is the highest in the world.

For the average African, sons are social security in old age. Harold said Africans have told him they figure they need six children.

Of the six, three probably are daughters, who will marry and go off. Of the three sons, one quite possibly will die, as infant mortality remains relatively high.

As one of the remaining sons might be a ne'er-do-well, the African figures he needs all six children to have a chance at security in old age.

"It's almost unthinkable from an African standpoint to limit the family to two or three children," said Harold. Further complicating things is the fact that Africans don't bother with calendars and lack a sense of regularity. This rules-out some forms of birth control, like a daily pill.

Polygamy, the prestige of having a large family, the fact that children become workers around the home by age five or six in this 80 percent rural country—all enter into the ongoing population explosion.

Americans and others who wonder why people in Third World nations

don't simply stop reproducing so fast just don't understand the depth of the problem, said Harold.

"If we expect the answer to starvation to be family planning—it's almost a pipe dream," he said.

All of these endemic problems relating to agriculture and population come to a head when there is a drought.

"Starvation is obviously the result," said Harold. But if the other problems could be worked out, he believes, African nations could make it through the hard times.

He pointed out that a tremendous amount of work is being done by various agencies to alleviate those underlying problems. Rain charts dating back nearly 100 years show that severe droughts occur every seven to 10 years, so the need to cope with them is obvious.

Harold got involved in famine relief this year after repeated requests from Africans to consider their needs. He arranged for a nurse to check on children in schools and in their homes, and she confirmed severe malnourishment.

His next step was to contact the Southern Baptist Convention Funds for World Hunger program. That program began in February to provide \$12,000 a month for purchase of food and seed.

Help started going to about 18,000 people a month. Though the aid was spread that thinly, it meant a family could receive enough food for eight to 10 days.

Harold's involvement was in purchasing food and arranging for transport. African pastors did the actual distribution.

"It is seen as an act of mercy from black people to black people," he said, although it is known in the background that American Christians gave money to make it possible.

Harold has seen the reaction of the people who receive help.

"There is a tremendous expression of gratitude ... you could say a sense of astonishment that people who do not know them and live in faraway America would help them."

Harold believes this concept generates self-help. He pointed out that people in western Kenya, hit less hard by famine, followed the example and took up offerings to help people in drought-stricken areas.

I asked Harold if he personally had seen people starving to death.

"Oh yes," he said. "Yes, yes." "Starvation is a quiet death," he went on. The people don't fight back, the mind shifts to neutral and they die without a fight.

Harold speculated that if typical Americans could see what he has seen, they would make an effort to give all they could to share with their fellow humans. He recommends giving through church hunger relief programs, but he said World Vision and other organizations are also worthwhile recipients of funds.

"The sad thing is to see another human being who has no disease die from a simple lack of food," he said. "It hurts. It just hurts."


Classes move sign
