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## Hungry December for needy?

Food may be scarce for the needy in Ruidoso this December. Donations are down for the Happy Holidays Drive, according to fireman Danny Garcia; commodities will not be distributed; Food Stamps applicants may experience delays in certification; and the Human Services food pantry has only a very small supply of beans and rice.

"There will be NO Commodities Distribution for the month of December for Lincoln County," according to a memo received by Bette Romans of the Senior Citizens Center.

Commodities are distributed once a month to families who meet specific criteria regarding income and family size. Distribution has been from Ruidoso Downs village hall recently.

"We aren't doing distribution in any area of the state," said Estelle Gallegos, commodities bureau chief in Albuquerque. According to Gallegos, there is nothing to deliver.

"We have no cheese and a very limited supply of butter and flour," she said. "We discourage county employees from doing a partial delivery."

Since it would be unfair to give commodities to only a few, none will be distributed this month and possibly next month, according to Gallegos.

New applicants for Food Stamps also will have to wait to become certified. Food Stamps workers from Carrizozo visit Ruidoso the first and third Wednesdays each month to interview applicants.

Workers were unable to travel to Ruidoso because of the snowstorm last Tuesday. Since they were snowbound in Roswell on Tuesday, they returned to Carrizozo on Wednesday, skipping their regular stop in Ruidoso.

Workers not required to travel when the weather is bad, said Jeanie Wilmeth, a Food Stamps worker in Carrizozo. She said they have no plans to make a special trip to Ruidoso.

Wilmeth will be at Ruidoso Downs village hall to take applications December 19, weather permitting.

## Hospital Foundation proceeds with planning

Current economic woes at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, which caused a staff cutback of about 11 percent, evidently will have little effect on plans of the new Hospital Foundation.

When the foundation board met recently, members heard a presentation by Arthur Sherman, a consultant hired by the hospital's parent company, Southwest Community Health Services.

Sherman's topic was "The Foundation's Relationship to Hospital Development." Sherman will advise the board on fund raising.

"We need a new hospital or a \$5 million bond and for the old one," said foundation board president Mary Spencer. Spencer said the foundation's function was simply to be an advocate for the hospital and its board. The board has decided to build or renovate.

"We will help fulfill their goal by funding," Spencer said.

Hospital administrator Ken Moore showed slides and made a presentation titled "Past, Present and Future, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital."

Moore mentioned that the future holds two options. One would be to add onto and remodel the current facility, the other would be to build a new building on a new site.

"Our hospital is a functional hospital, but it is a 1950s hospital," he said. According to figures furnished to the foundation board, a renovation project would cost \$5 million and a new building would cost \$12 million.

"The same amount of fund raising would be required for an add-on as for a new building," said Moore. He stressed that a new facility is by far the preferred option.

Moore's slides showed the problems of the current building. Poor insulation, overcrowded offices, lack of storage space and faulty pipes were some of the problems shown. Not shown (but discussed) was a problem of high utility bills and high laundry costs that a new facility might alleviate.

Both Moore and Sherman said there is no available space to add on to the current building. Moore said that the two or three years required for renovation would drive away hospital business and that a great deal of

revenue might be lost.

"If we renovate it would be out of date by 1995, and have to be torn down," said Moore as another reason for preferring a new building. He said something must be done, in any case.

"We are running a full one-third short of space to do what we're doing right now," he claimed.

Land already has been purchased as a possible site for a new hospital. Of the 80 acres purchased, it was noted, the hospital board plans to sell half to pay for part of the building.

Other parts of the proposed funding "game plan" include use of recently approved null levy funds to re-equip the new building, a \$4 million bond issue, and sale of the current site for \$1 million or more.

Moore said that when property tax assessment values are refigured during the next few years, the null levy revenue amount probably will be much higher than current projections of \$364,000 a year.

"We don't want to do anything that the public doesn't want us to do," he said. Moore said the hospital has been delivering quality care in spite of inadequate facilities, and that it will continue to fulfill its commitment to the public trust.

Foundation committees will begin meeting this week to start making plans for early 1985 fund raising. Educating the public to the hospital's needs will be a major priority, according to Spencer.

Hospital board member Pinky Jones, when asked whether the current fiscal problems and layoffs would affect building plans, said, "We hope not."

"We've got building a new hospital in our minds, but first things first. We're taking care of what we've got with what we've got right now. Other hospitals are having these same problems. You can't staff for 26 patients and have just 15 or 16 a day."

"I think we are committed to a new building," said foundation board member Ken Cole. About the downsizing, he said, "The actual needs of the hospital are the same."

According to Cole, a new facility might generate the business needed to provide more jobs.

# Village may modify plot plan rule

Progress is being made in the effort of Ruidoso to begin requiring certified plot plans after stem walls and foundations are in, reported Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis.

Davis and Ruidoso building inspector Jimmy Neeley currently are gathering input from area builders and contractors on the possible ramifications of such a move by the village.

The idea surfaced at a meeting several months ago of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z). It was a result of the increasing problem of structures being built in a way different from that specified in the required certified plot plan as approved by the village. Changes often have resulted in structures encroaching onto lot line setbacks.

P&Z members and administration officials theorize that by requiring the certified plot plan after the foundation and stem walls are constructed—instead of before any construction is completed—mistakes in the placement of a structure could be more cheaply reconciled. Granting of variances onto setbacks could be cut back accordingly.

Mistakes are now not usually caught until after the structure is completed, causing the scenario of making the structure adapt to the original plans to be a potentially costly prospect. To correct a problem after only the foundation and stem walls were in place would be far less expensive.

Davis noted that under the plan of requiring a certified plot plan after basic construction is completed, a builder would first apply for a building permit with a preliminary site plan only. The surveyor-completed certified plot plans would not be required until the stem walls and foundation stage were completed.

The same basic idea is already being followed in neighboring Alto. According to Lowell Long, chairman of the Alto Architectural Control Committee, the requirement hasn't been as successful as was originally hoped, but it has resulted in a decrease in the number of misplaced structures.

"The builders are not fully cooperative," Long said, "but we're going to stick to our guns."

Long reported that the relatively low success of the requirement is believed to be partly due to the unclear directions in the committee's instruction sheet. The committee now is reworking the instruction sheet in

an effort toward better clarity.

"I think it's a heck of a good idea," Long said of the requirement. "It should solve a lot of problems."

Davis said adoption of the policy by the Village of Ruidoso will help curb the problem. He pointed out that if the policy is approved by the Village Council as an amendment to the ordinance, stiff penalties will be applicable to violators.

Through municipal court, violators will be subject to a fine of up to \$300, and up to 90 days in jail. Through the village, Davis said he would propose that any variances needed by those who willfully violate the requirement would never be granted. This would "cloud" the title of the subject property.

"What they (would) have is a white elephant," Davis said of that situation.

Davis explained that he and Neeley would continue to gather input from contractors and builders, and asked that anyone interested in giving input call him or Neeley at village hall.

From there, Davis will present their recommendations to P&Z. If commission members voice approval of the idea, it will be sent to the council for final action.

"It's something that's really needed," Davis noted.

# Mall developer says work to proceed on time

Construction of the Sierra Mall will be done in cooperation with recent Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) stipulations, and the May 15 opening of the mall is still on schedule as planned, reported Odell Spurlin of C. S. D. Inc., the group developing the project.

Spurlin referred to a recent P&Z ruling that backfilling behind the Ruidoso True Value Hardware was to be done before work could continue on the mall, which is being developed next to the new Safeway on Mechem Drive. The developer said the backfill work is being completed in full compliance with the commission's ruling.

"We're going to comply," Spurlin said. "We're going right ahead."

Also, the developer reported that the plans for the mall were given the go-ahead by the Architectural Plans Review Committee last week.

Spurlin indicated that other openings at the mall are still right on schedule, including the late December opening of the Sierra Sinema and the February 15 opening of the Sprouse Reitz.

Other foundation committee chairmen, Don Swalander and Storny Edwards, indicated that present financial shortfalls will have no substantial effect on plans for the future.

"Everything will be reassessed," Swalander said, "but I'm optimistic

about the economic picture."



Meanwhile the hospital is operating with a reduced staff. Besides the 16 employees who were laid off 10 days ago, several current employees say they are working reduced hours.

"If we jump up to 100 percent occupancy we'll have to pull in some help ... if they (laid-off employees) stay in town, we'll call them back,"

said Moore.

Former employees seem to be expecting just such a callback. The ones contacted were unwilling to make any statements. One did say, "I hope to work there again."

"We are still delivering medical care to the community, and we will continue to do so," Moore said. "We are definitely not out of business."



## Consultant notes changes in tax laws

Some Social Security and retirement benefits will be taxable beginning January 1, 1985, according to financial consultant David Whatley. Whatley presented two programs recently at the Senior Citizens Center behind the Ruidoso Public Library.

"Depending on your income, you may have to pay income tax on part of the benefits you receive," said Whatley, in his special presentation for retirees. His second talk was broader-based and included changes for current workers.

"The tax law has a myriad of changes that affect a lot of people," he said. Future changes are imminent, too. "There are at least 10 proposals for this session of Congress."

The short form has few changes, but it has been redesigned. Those who were familiar with the old form will need to watch for line number changes, according to Whatley.

The Internal Revenue Service will use an individual's or a couple's modified adjusted gross income (MAG) to determine whether or not Social Security benefits are taxable. Here's how to calculate your MAG:

Add the following:  
 • adjusted gross income  
 • Social Security or Railroad Retirement marital deduction (if any) amount  
 • foreign earned income

The sum of those figures is your MAG. If you are married and filing

jointly and your MAG is over \$32,000, part of your Social Security or retirement is taxable.

If you are married, filing separately, part of your benefits are taxable. In all other cases, anyone whose MAG is over \$25,000 will be liable for taxes on some benefits.

The amount of benefits taxed is limited. No one is required to pay taxes on more than 50 percent of his or her benefits, regardless of income size.

The formula for calculating taxes owed uses the MAG and a base

amount. Specific instructions will be available from the Internal Revenue Service. Social Security will provide recipients with a form telling exactly how much they have received.

Changes affecting other taxpayers include a change in income averaging. The number of years averaged has been reduced to three from four, and the percentage of change required has been increased. Schedule G instructions will be helpful to taxpayers averaging income.

"A host of new regulations" affect persons using automobiles, trucks and other equipment in business. Whatley said to read the instructions carefully when deducting for personal items used in business.

Depreciation of real estate purchased as an investment has been changed. Length of time for depreciation has been increased from 15 to 18 years.

Whatley had the following recommendations to save taxes in 1984:

- Pay all deductible expenses by December 31, 1984, even if you have to put it on a credit card.
- Pay property taxes by December 31, 1984.
- Pre-pay state income taxes and deduct.
- Accelerate charitable contributions.
- Pre-pay professional organization dues and subscriptions to professional journals.
- If you are self-employed and plan to contribute to a KEOGH account, be sure to open the account by December 31, 1984.

Whatley cautioned taxpayers to read instructions carefully this year because of the many changes.

## Turnovers fatal in Warriors' losses

Turnovers—56 of them—proved fatal to the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team as the Warriors lost their first two games of the season Thursday and Friday night against visiting Roswell and Portales.

Ruidoso fell to the strong Coyotes 80-37 Thursday night, but played Portales tough for three quarters before losing 45-23 Friday.

The Warriors, who will travel to Goddard Tuesday night, made 38 turnovers against Roswell and 18 against Portales.

"They hurt us," admitted Warrior head coach Gene Segura. "The good ballclubs usually make around eight or nine turnovers a game."

"Tonight (Friday night against Portales), we also couldn't convert when we forced a turnover. A couple of times we stole the ball but couldn't convert on it."

Against Portales, the Warriors battled well before the Rams pulled away in the final period.

Portales led just 26-18 entering the fourth quarter, then broke the game open with the help of Warrior mistakes.

Several times the Warriors had easy buckets inside but couldn't put them in, and the Rams put the contest away.

Ruidoso took an early lead in the contest when senior Tracy Gann put in a layup. The two teams exchanged buckets for a 4-2 Warrior edge, but Portales then scored six straight points for an 8-3 quarter-advantage.

Portales outscored the Warriors 10-8 in the second period for an 18-12 halftime edge.

Gann injured his ankle twice, the second time leaving the game for good. With the 6-3 athlete out of the lineup, the Warriors' inside game suffered.

Then came the final period with Portales stretching its lead to the final margin.

Dion Lopez led the Warrior scoring with eight points on four field goals. Patric Pearson scored five, Gann and Jeff Willingham each added four, and Brian-Davis tallied two.

Bobby Armijo led the winners with 19 points, on seven field goals and five free throws.

Against Roswell, the Warriors got into a hole right away as the visitors jumped off to a 19-0 advantage and led 21-4 at the end of the first period.

The tall and experienced Coyotes dominated the boards and forced the Warriors into turnovers.

Gann led the Warrior scoring with 12 points on six field goals. Davis and 6-3 junior Trent Tolbert each added six points.


Kevin Davis led Roswell with 22 points. Ronnie Vaughn added 14.

"What's hurting us is our lack of rebounding," Segura said. "We hope to improve on that."

The Warriors could do that this week if junior Russell Easter gets medical approval to play. The 6-2 athlete broke his collarbone during football season and will see a doctor Tuesday morning.

Gann worked out in practice Saturday with an air-splint ankle support, and he could be ready for Goddard also.

The junior varsity game at Goddard will start at 6 p.m. with the varsity contest to follow.

## Herrera's second-place finish top effort for Warrior matmen

James Herrera took a second place in the 167-pound division to highlight the Ruidoso High School wrestling team's performance in the Los Lunas Tournament Saturday.

Ruidoso finished last in the eight-team tournament with 21½ points. Host Los Lunas won the competition with 166½ points. However, the Warriors were going against some of the toughest wrestlers in the state.

Herrera, a junior, won his first two matches impressively before being pinned by Edwin Romero of Los Lunas in the third period.

"It was close most of the way," said Warrior head coach Gerald Ames of the championship match. "James just got gassed and then the guy pinned him."

Herrera pinned his first opponent in 35 seconds of the first round, and his second opponent in 30 seconds of the first round.

The only other Warrior wrestler to win a match was Jeff Schmidt at 98 pounds.

Schmidt lost his first match to Mike Geban of Grants, but came back to pin Tim Fowler of Los Alamos in the second round.

Schmidt then took a 4-0 lead over Mike Esquivel of Valley. However, Esquivel came back to pin Schmidt in the second round.

"Jeff wrestled very, very well," said Ames. "I thought he had a chance to beat Esquivel."

Zach Swalander at 138 pounds lost both of his matches, but one of them was to the eventual champion.

Ames only took eight matmen to the tournament as several wrestlers took ACT tests Saturday.

"I wasn't disappointed," the coach remarked. "The kids wrestled well and were aggressive. This will help us get ready for the district season."

"We really only had one week of practice (many of the wrestlers had just completed the football season) where some of the other schools have had more."

Ruidoso will have 10 days off from competition before the Warriors travel to Carlsbad Saturday, December 22, to meet the Cavemen and Santa Fe in a triangular meet. Both Carlsbad and Santa Fe are tough AAAA-division teams.

# Warrior girls win consolation crown

The Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team got a chance to meet some tough competition, and passed the test when the Warriors won the first consolation title of the Goddard Invitational in Roswell over the weekend.

Ruidoso, now 2-2 on the season, nipped a tough Bowie of El Paso, Texas, team 52-50 Saturday for the consolation crown. Friday the Warriors topped Lovington 62-50. In the opening round Thursday, Ruidoso fell to eventual champion Goddard 66-50.

"We're playing just good enough to win now," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "We also got some

breaks today (Saturday) which we haven't gotten before.

"We haven't got one outstanding individual. Everybody just pitches in and helps."

Against Bowie, the lead changed back and forth several times.

Bowie led 39-36 entering the final period, but the Warriors fought back to take the lead.

Diane McClure provided the Warriors with the winning points when she made a short shot off a rebound for a 51-50 Ruidoso edge with less than a minute left.

Susan Davis of Ruidoso then made one of two free throws for the final score.

Bowie still had a chance to win the game with a few seconds left, but

time ran out after a jump ball.

Stacy Ivy led the Warriors with 14 points. Davis added 13 points and McClure tallied 12. Gia Rose scored six points, including some clutch free throws. Lillian Duffy added five points and did a good job rebounding.

Ruidoso led 10-8 at the first period break and 24-19 at halftime. However, Bowie outscored the Warriors 20-12 in the third quarter to take the lead into the final period.

Hofstadt praised the play of Roller, Murrillo and Chavira in the final contest.



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## State foresters serve district

When one thinks of Capitan, one usually does not think of regional offices of state agencies. Yet Capitan is the home of the district offices for the New Mexico Division of Forestry.

The office, on Second Street at the White Oaks corner, serves as headquarters for district five. The district is comprised of seven counties: Lincoln, Otero, Chaves, Lea, Roosevelt, Eddy and DeBaca.

According to District Forester Christobal Zamora, his agency services all state and private lands with two main emphases: timber and fire management. Forester Larry Bandy is the district's fire management officer. Randy Baker is the timber officer.

Since the district encompasses seven widespread counties (over 12 million acres), the agency depends on rural and municipal fire departments to suppress fires. The district office helps recruit backup units when needed to cover the larger blazes.

The 64 local fire departments respond to the fires and then report them to the district office, which later compensates them for their work. Bandy coordinates the fire departments and helps them to obtain equipment and grants.

At present, the Capitan office is giving a fire engine to Glencoe. Bandy travels districtwide, providing training when needed.

Although the agency's function is to service private and state-owned lands, it has cooperative agreements with federal and municipal agencies. They help each other as needed, especially in fire-suppression.

Randy Baker helps landowners manage their timber. Timber management includes instructions on land planning, erosion prevention and timber harvesting and sale. He said most of his timber management work takes place in Lincoln and Otero counties near the Sacramento Mountains.

According to Baker, many people consult him because they have too many trees on their land and must thin them.

"If you thin the land, the trees get stronger," said Baker, who compared the problem to having too many children at a table without enough food. With fewer trees, the remaining ones have less competition for sunlight and for nutrients in the soil.

Baker said the tree density problem is so prevalent in this area that no one has come to him for help with reforestation.

"When you think about forestry, you usually think about planting trees, but that's not the need here," he said.

There is a program, however, for people who do want to plant trees. Each September and March, the district sponsors a tree seedling program. To participate, a landowner must have a minimum of one acre and must purchase a minimum of 100 tree seedlings, at 50 cents apiece.

Baker explained that the two main functions of the program are to help people who want to start Christmas tree plantations and to help protect the environment. Many people in the lower-lying areas need the seedlings to prevent soil erosion and to serve as windbreakers.

When called for a consultation, Baker visits the land and writes a management plan based on the needs of the landowners.

"I'll ascertain their objectives first," he said. He explained that one person might want to create a wildlife refuge while another might need a plan to fit his cattle.

Bandy also can assist landowners in procuring federal forestry incentive grants.

Up until this fiscal year, all of these services were free. Now, each person is entitled to 16 hours of work, but

must pay for the rest. A management plan costs \$1 per acre.

The state Division of Forestry also is responsible for enforcing state laws and codes. The staff must make sure that people follow forest-related

regulations such as leaving at least two genetically superior trees of seed-producing age on each harvested

acre. Fire regulations include proper disposal of timber slash.

Bandy is in charge of law enforcement. In February, he will become certified after a seven-week session at the Law Enforcement Academy in Santa Fe. Currently, there are only four state foresters with this law enforcement certification.

The Capitan office also serves as an information center. The staff can advise people on everything from pesticides to campsites.

Zamora said he recently received a call from someone in Texas who wanted to know where she could cut a Christmas tree in this area. "And I knew the answer," said Chris Zamora with a smile.

## April Randle: oil rig to real estate

April Randle, Capitan's newest real estate broker, is a lady who likes adventure, excitement and challenges.

It was on the oil rig in Alaska that April met Capitan native Mike Randle. They married, had a son, Seth, and returned to Capitan in the fall of 1983.

Back in Capitan, real estate became the next challenge for April Randle. Before becoming a full-fledged broker, April was a sales associate for Sierra Development Company in Ruidoso. She opened her office (on First Street in Capitan) two months ago.

April has two primary goals as a broker. In Capitan she hopes to "help the local people with their needs." She feels she can work closely with the people of Angus, Nogal, Capitan, Carrizozo and Lincoln.

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# The Dreamer

"Oh, Christmas Tree, Oh, Christmas Tree" It makes your heart give a little jump of happiness every year about this time to see the cars going down

the highway with a Christmas tree tied on top. From somewhere high amongst the upland forests, this cherished little evergreen is on its way to the low country to bring bright

cheer to children and grown-ups during Christmas-time.

The Christmas tree goes away back into the eighth century and beyond. Evergreens—long the symbols of eternal life—were used in many forms since time out of mind. Germany is generally thought to be the country where the custom of the Christmas tree began. And we have the German immigrants to this country to thank for this custom—today so wide-spread and deeply cherished throughout our land.

There is a traditional German song to the Christmas tree which has been translated into English: "Oh, Christmas tree, oh, Christmas tree, your branches shine delightfully."

The tune is especially beautiful with a touch of reverence, and has been adopted as the tune of many State

songs: "Alaska, My Alaska"; "Maryland, My Maryland". I guess the first Christmas tree I remember was a Sitka spruce there in the house at Valdez, Alaska, when I was a little over a year old. In those days the trees were decorated with gold and silver strings of tinsel, and bright red, green, silver, gold and blue baubles—as they are today.

In those days we had a custom that has long since gone by the board. The tree was lighted by small candles in special little holders which snapped onto the twigs of the tree. The light brightened up the green of the tree and made the other decorations shine, and also the heat baked out the incense of the tree. I can still smell this evergreen aroma all through the room mingled with the waxy smell of the candles.

To my early mind, this was the smell of Christmas. Today when the pinon Christmas tree gives off a faint aroma from heat of the Christmas lights, I can hear the blowing of small horns, the tinkling of toy sleigh bells, the sound of a musical top, and the tinkling, chime-like music of those little musical instruments made of small pieces of metal of different lengths, which you played with a wooden mallet. And I can see the faces of Mother and Father as they beamed while John and Mark and I opened the packages which had come up from "The States" from Grandpa and Grandma Kennedy and Grand-

father and Grandmother Storm.

The Pinon Tree and the Cedar Through the years, nationwide, perhaps the favorite Christmas tree was the Douglass fir. It seemed there was just about the right space between the branches for the presents and the decorations to have room to show up at their best.

Time was, here in the country, you could have any kind of tree you wanted—Douglass fir, balsam,ingleman spruce, blue spruce, white pine. Nobody gave the pinon a second chance.

Today the pinon has come into its own. It is a rugged tree, quick to grow back with little trees coming on. It has a trick all its own of survival. Under the cedars, if you look closely, you will see tiny pinon sapplings growing amidst the lower branches of the cedar. Here it will wait, biding its time. Often you will see where a fire has burned down the cedars and here comes a little pinon that has been hiding down next to the trunk, a mere sprig—later to grow into a mature tree.

A Wealth of Evergreens Here on the slopes of the White Mountain we are blessed with a great variety and abundance of evergreens, of many members of this great family. Besides the Christmas tree, the things made of evergreens for Christmas are numberless, including wreaths and other features handed down from our forefathers.

Colonial and pioneer New Mexico had a great number of very ingenious decorations entirely homemade, one of the outstanding being the nacimiento or manger scene, treasures of rustic artistry. The early New Mexico Christmas customs—many in use today—made up a true "Land of Enchantment" of their own, which we can go into a little next time or so.

The Christmas Basket Of late years there has arrived upon the Christmas scene something new to me—a creation of great charm—the Christmas basket. The first one I saw was in 1971, made by Mrs. Ike Kennedy, and transferred all over the hospital, cheering one patient after the other during the Christmas season.

This morning, December eight, Della Bonnell, the postmaster of Glencoe and the Darling of the Vale of Glencoe, presented me with a Christmas basket "for your table." And here it is before me on the table—a round basket with a circular spray of pinon twigs, four baubles of Christmas crimson, and a center of small poinsettias of the same color. In the very center stands proudly a red Christmas candle. The light from the candle lights up the whole green and red bundle of Christmas cheer, and the flame gives just enough heat to bring forth the pinon incense—a little breath of pure New Mexico—and at the same time bringing back treasured memories of "Far Away and Long Ago."

## Editorial

Would "Happy Hour" still be happy if you couldn't get a double-strength drink or two drinks for the price of one?

The Governor's Commission on Alcoholism and Driving While Intoxicated is proposing legislation that would ban happy hour or multi-drink promotions.

Restaurants and bars would be prohibited from offering free drinks and drinks at below-normal prices, serving more than two drinks at a time to one person, and advertising reduced-price drink specials.

In a tourism-dependent economy such as that of Ruidoso, the possible effects of any liquor legislation on tourist business must be weighed. We do not think the proposed legislation would have a negative impact.

The institution of happy hour will survive, because people will continue to congregate and lift a glass at the end of the day. The intent of the legislation, however, is that people will tend to drink less than they would with two-for-one specials, etc.

Selling drinks at full price would help balance any loss of revenue from fewer drinks being consumed.

Society tends, however slowly, to work to take care of the ills that beset it. Such is the case with the dual problems of alcoholism and drunk driving, which finally are receiving more public attention.

Under the proposed laws, happy hour could still be happy, and it would contribute to less of the attached unhappiness.—TP

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—"It is going to be a very frugal Legislature," observes one veteran of 15 years service in that body.

For that reason, he counsels all those who will be asking for dollars from the state in 1985 to sit down with the figure they have in mind and move the decimal point—to the left, not to the right, he hastens to add.

That message was first delivered to the Environmental Improvement Division when that group drafted a bill which would provide \$350,000 for (another) study on the disposal of hazardous wastes within the borders of the state.

Like many experts, those in this particular operation sit around and talk to each other about subjects which are of keen interest to them. Usually, they manage to convince one another that certain favorite projects of theirs are of paramount importance to the state.

They sometimes suffer consternation when they discover that not everyone agrees.

The latter group often includes members of the Legislature.

If the projects state employees want to launch require funding, legislators are the very ones they must sell, not other members of their profession or agency.

Such people would be wise to listen to what lawmakers say during the interim between sessions, so as to get a feel for how things are likely to go when the legislators gather once again for official action.

We poor ink-stained wretches of the press do that, so we often have some sense of the trend in government that those employed there would do well to heed.

We can tell you with almost total certitude, for instance, that the Commission on Aging is not going to get an 84.1 percent increase in its budget for the next year. That's what it is asking for, and perhaps every dollar of it is totally justified. But the agency is not going to be given that kind of extra money, simply because the money isn't there to give.

Same can be said for the Corporation Commission, which wants a 60.7 percent increase in its own budget and a 63.8 percent increase in the

budget of the Superintendent of Insurance, who is under the commission's control. In this case, besides the severe shortage of money, there is an additional element: Legislators have little confidence that the three Corporation Commissioners now in office can act like adults long enough to manage that kind of money.

Others who should be revising their Christmas-wish list include the Human Services Department, which wants to go up by 53.4 percent, and the Natural Resources Department, which plans to spend 31.9 percent more money.

Here we have beautiful examples of dreamers, who should be taking the advice to move the decimal point to the left.

One of the things legislators are going to be watching for most carefully in this session of frugality is something this column would call "executive creep." That is the tendency of those who head executive agencies to believe that their shop must grow with the kind of inevitability which is only applicable to the laws of physics.

In the late 1970s, the Public Service Commission made do with nine employees. In 1984, it has more than 50. Admittedly, life in the area of regulating utilities has grown increasingly complex. The PSC has more difficult cases to handle than it did back in those not-so-long-ago days.

But have things grown five-and-a-half times more complex? Is the Commission five-and-a-half times busier? And even better as a question, are its employees now five-and-a-half times more productive than they were then?

That is the kind of question legislators can be counted on to ask during the next two years.

Twenty-four state agencies whose budgets have so far been presented to the Legislative Finance Committee have asked for increases averaging 28.4 percent. For themselves alone, they would like us to spend \$108 million more next year than last, and they make up only about a quarter of the total budget.

They'd better start paying closer attention to the placement of their decimal points.

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

- 4.) The present Village council has made more progress with regard to solving the "airport controversy" than any other governing body to date.
- 5.) The Village council is presently

preparing to go to Santa Fe to lobby the upcoming legislature for \$750,000 to pave Gavilan Canyon and Carrizo Canyon roads. Strange that you had to read about it in an editorial!

- 6.) The Village council has attended several seminars and conferences regarding water law and highway development to help them do a better job.

**Salvaged Satellites for Sale**  
 Discovery's astronauts have made possible the world's first salvaged satellite market. Their feat dramatized the reusability of the reusable space shuttle.

Last February the shuttle Challenger launched satellites for Western Union and Indonesia. Both misfired and never reached the desired orbit.

After launching a pair of new satellites, Discovery's crew set a precedent by salvaging those two defective satellites, the Westar 6 and Palapa B-2. Insurers, who already had paid off the original owners of those defective instruments, now may repair the two satellites and offer them for resale.

The latest Discovery mission has demonstrated another value of the space shuttle. It is an impressive accomplishment for Discovery's astronauts and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

 The moral and ethical considerations were someone else's debate. For Baby Fae, a baboon's heart represented a chance to live.

The month-old infant was born with a fatally underdeveloped heart.

Some ethicists and animal-rights groups said that, with human transplants available to most, cross-species transplants were unethical and immoral.

But with no human heart available in this case, Baby Fae's parents had to choose between a slim chance and no chance at all.

Medical science is constantly extending into new fields, opening up new ethical debates as it goes. In this case, doctors and parents agreed a new and controversial treatment was the only option.

The moral and ethical debates inspired by the case of Baby Fae will likely continue. But for now, most simply mourn the passing of an infant pioneer.



# Nogal author tells her tale

Eva Zumwalt of Nogal held a small group spellbound at the Ruidoso Public Library's monthly book review last Monday, telling them all about her latest novel. "When the Heart Remembers" is a contemporary romance published by Doubleday.

Characters in the book were brought to life as Zumwalt recounted their adventures.

"Those who deserve it always get it in the end," she said with a laugh, in explanation of the required formula for contemporary romances.

The book is set in New Mexico, a state that Zumwalt knows very well. She is a native New Mexican and has lived in the Nogal area for more than 20 years. She has written Gothic romances and a Western. Her first book, "The Unforgiving," doesn't fit into a formula category. "It has a little of everything including the supernatural," she said.

Zumwalt explained that writing a novel is a little like "moving into your characters' setting and watching them." That's why hearing her description of her characters made the audience feel as if she was talking about her own family and friends.

"Reading, to me, should be an 'escape,'" said Zumwalt. She explained that her books are innocent enough to have been included in Doubleday's teen-age series for school libraries. Her romances don't include "a lot of steamy stuff, they called it realism in my day," she said.

"But there are a lot of things that are very real but beautiful and sweet. I like to leave things a little bit to the reader's imagination."

Zumwalt has been writing for about 12 years. She just completed a historical novel, but normally she writes for a particular market.

"It's a little restrictive, but you need to get published if you're going to write," she noted.

Asked for advice for aspiring writers, Zumwalt said to read as much as possible, especially books in the category you intend to write. She said that writers may write to publishers for a "tip sheet," which includes information on how to submit manuscripts, as well as specifics for formula writing.

Zumwalt, who is married and lives on 20 acres outside Nogal, writes five days a week for at least three hours a day. She admitted that writing requires a great deal of self-discipline.

"I may skip a day if I have somewhere to go," she said, "but I get right back to it the next day."

Zumwalt has two daughters and a granddaughter, so she saves weekends for her family. She reads for relaxation and fun.

"I used to ride horses, but writing doesn't leave that much time," she said.

She also enjoys walking. Both her hobbies fit right into her occupation as writer. Walking is a good time to think, and she feels that she has learned more from her reading than from the writing classes she has taken.

"People who write are mainly shy, retiring people," Zumwalt said. "I stay alone and write while more outgoing people are out in business... Writers are people who just want to make a good story."

The subject that Zumwalt likes most is writing.

"I always enjoy talking about writing," she said.







Kenny Rogers and Dolly Parton's "Once Upon a Christmas" is the duo's first LP together. It's also their first collaboration since "Islands in the Stream," the No. 1 duet that was 1983's biggest-selling 7-inch single and the year's only single certified platinum.

"Islands in the Stream," a song from Rogers' first album for RCA, the platinum-selling "Eyes That See in the Dark," reached No. 1 on both country and pop charts, selling more than 2 million copies. For "Once Upon a Christmas," Rogers and Miss Parton reunited to record a mixture of traditional holiday fare ("White Christmas," "The Christmas Song," "Silent Night") and five original songs written by Miss Parton.

For both singers, "Once Upon a Christmas" is a labor of love. "I was raised in a Baptist family," says Rogers, "and I've always thought of Christmas as a special time, a time when families who might be apart the rest of the year can come together again. Something special happens when they're together, and I get together as a base of the whole being ever greater than the sum of its parts."

"This is the first Christmas special album that I've ever done," says Miss Parton. "So when Kenny called me with the idea, I jumped at it. Kenny and I have singing together. I think the blend of our voices creates a real electricity that come across on a record. He also has a real Santa Claus spirit. He makes working fun and approaches things like I do, enjoying the people around him."

Rare Takes and Radio Cuts, a 10-song collection of previously un-issued perfor-

mances by country music legend Hank Williams, represents the first new Williams material to be issued by Polygram since the 1976 release of "Live at the Grand Ole Opry."

The "rare takes" on the historical album include "Honky Tonk Blues," "I'd Still Want You" and "My Son Calls Another Man Daddy," all from MGM sessions recorded on different dates than the originally released versions. "Crazy Heart," an alternate take from the same date as the original issue and "Honky Tonkin," a rare performance from Williams' second recording session for Sterling Records. Sterling Williams' original label was later purchased by MGM, whose catalog was purchased by Polygram.

The "radio cuts" are represented by five titles: "Little Paper Boy," a 1949 recording from Williams' Shreveport radio show and "I Saw the Light," "Lovesick Blues," "Mind Your Own Business" and "Pan American," all from the ephemeral "Health and Happiness" series of eight 15-minute radio shows financed by Dudley J. LeBlanc in October 1949.

## A Nelson makes her mark

Before joining "Glitter" (which airs Tuesdays on ABC) as receptionist Angela Timini, co-star Tracy Nelson did extensive research and interviewed for her character. "The whole country caters to the young executive person," Miss Nelson says. "Angela is a lot like me, she's been educated. She's a constant at the office. That's something you figure out right away. I've never played a character who was very smart. Angela's book smart and good with figures. She's secretly ambitious but gets flustered easily. But I'm comfortable with her."

"Glitter" is the type of show people have liked in the past because it has a little bit of everything," the young actress continues. "The formula has been tested in shows before and it's worked. Every story is complete unto itself. Aaron Spelling is known for detail. And 'Glitter' is open to all subjects and we can go on location."

"I'm really involved in history. I'm curious about people and am dying to do something in period."

I want to get to be 80 years old so that I can see a kind of progression. I want to be secure enough to go anywhere in the world. All my life I've thought I have something to say. I want my work to be good."



**HEIDI REVENGET? —** The National Football League ends its regular season this weekend and, although professional football has once again suffered a dropoff in TV ratings, CBS and NBC consider NFL football the king of the tube. At least NBC does.

That network proved it a few weeks ago when its much-heralded golfing project, "The Skins Game," ran overtime and was cut off the air in one-third of the nation because it was time to present a pro football pre-game show.

Because of the rules of the made-for-TV golf match between Gary Player, Tom Watson, Arnie Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, there was \$240,000 still up for grabs when Nicklaus was about to chip up to the 18th green. Then the lights went out.

Golfing fans on the West Coast (except for Los Angeles and Seattle), the mountain regions (including Arizona, where the match was held) and parts of the Southeast were deprived of watching the Golden Bear eventually sink an 8-foot putt for the whole ball of wax.

What they saw was a football pre-game show. A pre-game show!

To golfing fans, it was equivalent to cutting off the last two minutes of a tied Super Bowl game and beginning "Battle of the Network Stars." Or knocking off the ninth inning of the seventh game of a World Series for the 17th rerun of "Gilligan's Island."

"The Skins Game," which is probably the best made-for-TV sports promotion ever dreamed up by TV's deep thinkers, did very well in the ratings. In the Saturday half of the two-day presentation, it did better than most college games (losing only to the U.S.C.-Notre Dame game), and held its own against the pro games on Sunday.

Old-timers could consider NBC's sudden switch as poetic justice for the famous "Heidi Game" in 1968. Then the same network cut off the last minute of a New York Jets-Oakland Raiders game in which Oakland scored two touchdowns in a come-from-behind win after the cameras stopped. In its place was the start of a TV presentation of the classic "Heidi."
