## We're talking SNOW

### Village, ski area blanketed in white

A storm that dumped at least 15 inches of powdery snow on Ruidoso late last week just about guarantees the wishes of those who are "dreaming of a white Christmas."

The flakes started coming down heavily Thursday evening, leaving a white blanket of snow over the Ruidoso area by Friday morning that was measured at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport at nine inches deep. Friday, the snows continued, bringing another two and a half inches to the village by 2 p.m.

Friday night saw another heavy snowfall, and by Saturday morning, an official 15 inches was measured at the airport, by far the heaviest snowfall in Ruidoso so far this year.

The snows did more, though, than just create a pretty scene. At times during the snowfall, all highway entrances to Ruidoso were either closed or restricted by law enforcement officials to chains or four-wheel-drive vehicles only.

Affected were U.S. 380 from Carrizozo to San Antonio, U.S. 54 from Carrizozo to Corona and U.S. 70 from Carrizozo to Roswell, all of which were closed at least once during the storm. Officials required motorists to drive with chains or four-wheel-drive vehicles throughout much of the storm along U.S. 70 from Ruidoso to Tularosa.

Chains or four-wheel-drive vehicles also were required by the Ruidoso

Police Department in the village, and by Lincoln County Sheriff's Department officials county-wide during the storm. Law enforcers were kept busy straightening out conflicts between motorists and the elements for the duration of the storm.

"We're surviving," commented Ruidoso police chief Richard Swenor Friday. He acknowledged that village officials had considered declaring a state of emergency Friday morning, among other plans of action. Fortunately, conditions never became bad enough to warrant the declaration, as village officers and road crews were able to keep up with the progress of the storm.

Swenor noted that no serious accidents resulted from the storm, although at least 16 minor accidents had occurred by Friday afternoon due to the wintry roads.

Swenor said Ruidoso police officers were taking the requirement for chains or four-wheel-drive vehicles seriously, citing for careless driving drivers whose unequipped vehicles caused traffic problems or accidents.

Traffic into and out of Ruidoso was discouraged throughout the storm, Swenor reported. He especially discouraged travel along long stretches of sparsely populated highway, where a motorist could be in danger if stranded during the winter conditions.

Swenor advised Friday that anyone who absolutely had to travel outside the village should travel prepared for survival in the snow. He advised such motorists to take along extra warm

clothing, snacks and a Thermos of something hot to drink, plus blankets and candles.

A lit candle on the floorboard of a stalled vehicle could be the difference between living and freezing to death during a cold night on the road, Swenor said.



Also handling the storm were village road crews, according to assistant village manager Frank Potter. He reported Friday afternoon that village snowplow and grader drivers were able to keep the major roads in the village clear, but continuing snowfall made the task of clearing all the side streets impossible.

"It was definitely hard to keep up with," Potter said late Friday. "All they can do is blade and blade."

The heavy snows were a welcome addition to nearby Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, where 35 inches of snow fell during the week, leaving the resort with 71 inches at midway on the mountain by Saturday morning. Skiing conditions continue to be excellent, according to Sierra Blanca manager Roy Parker.

By Monday morning, Ruidoso police logs listed a rash of minor "fender bender" accidents, and numerous stuck vehicles as a result of the snows Thursday, Friday and Saturday. No serious accidents were reported in the village.

Clear skies Sunday and Monday and predictions of the same and warmer temperatures for early this week should give Ruidosans the chance to catch up from the effects of the storm, before another one arrives.

## Capital outlay funds to RHS fine arts

Ruidoso Municipal Schools will receive \$600,000 in capital outlay funds to complete the fine arts room at Ruidoso High School.

The Office of the Governor announced that 12 New Mexico counties will share \$65 million for public school construction projects. Funds were allocated last week by the Public Schools Capital Outlay Council.

Governor Tony Anaya presented the projects as part of his education legislative package during the 1984

Legislature. State voters approved the general obligation bond issue to fund the package in the November 6 general election.

"It's not enough," commented superintendent Sid Miller of the \$600,000 allocation. He explained that Ruidoso schools had requested \$1.2 million. All the money is earmarked for the fine arts area at the high school.

This is the final phase of current plans at the high school. Principal Tom Hansen stressed that the finality is only on paper.

"We'll keep on dreaming," he said with a laugh.

Miller and Hansen noted that schools other than the high school may be next in line, as they need to be remodeled and repaired. Other funding will be needed for those projects.

"We'll just barely get by," commented Board of Education member Mike Morris of the funds approved for the fine arts completion. He agreed that repairs on older buildings might be the next step for school projects.

He noted that some schools need major roof repairs.

Lincoln County's Ruidoso school system and Belen Consolidated Schools in Valencia County were the only two school districts to receive as much as \$600,000. Fifteen school districts were allocated funds.

As predicted by Ruidoso Municipal Schools business manager Bonnie Brock Wood, most funds were to complete projects that already had been started.

West Las Vegas Public Schools in San Miguel County and Moriarty Municipal Schools in Torrance County each were allocated \$550,000, and 11 other school systems received less than that.

Valencia County benefited the most from allocations. Besides Belen's funds, Los Lunas Public Schools will get \$549,000. Valencia County's total allocation is more than \$1.1 million.

"We're glad to get it," Hansen said of the Ruidoso allocation, even though it is far short of the school's needs.


### SKI REPORT



# Chamber takes ski message to media

The word is getting out. A unique phone-calling system has been worked out by the board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce to spread the word of ski conditions at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort to a wide area.

Acting chamber executive director Tommy Morel said the idea is to telephone media representatives in 14 primary and secondary markets serving Ruidoso, giving continuing news of skiing conditions at the resort.

From there it is hoped that television, radio and newspaper sports and weather reporters will relay the ski information to their audiences, keeping the names of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort and Ruidoso fresh on the minds of eager skiers.

Morel pointed out that because other ski areas have toll-free 800 numbers and often have full-time promotional staffs, information about conditions at those areas is readily at hand for reporters and broadcasters.

"Our competitors are calling media regularly," Morel commented. "Our

competitors have bigger budgets to promote their areas than we do."

Indeed, many media members have wondered why they haven't been called before this year, Morel reported. He said most are happy the telephoning is being done.

"Fantastic!" was the response of one such media representative when told he would be getting the calls this year, Morel said.

Morel noted that each of the 14 callers will be telephoning at least once a week, mostly at prescribed times. He said a pattern of calling on Thursdays is developing. Callers also are notifying the media when conditions change dramatically in a short time, such as happened last week when the ski resort received 15 inches overnight Thursday.

Chamber of Commerce office manager Doris Baca calls the resort each morning and records the official ski report for the morning. Phoners then call the chamber and get the information from Doris before making a media call. That arrangement ensures consistency of the system, Morel said.

Some callers phone from the chamber, but others do the calling at

their own expense.

Morel said the system is working, and exposure is growing.

"It's one of the better ideas that we've come up with," Morel commented.

The executive director said the system will continue into spring—especially when many skiers think conditions may be deteriorating but good spring skiing still is available.

Ten members of the board of directors plus Chamber of Commerce member Phil Hamilton make up the list of callers.

Calling Roswell is Buddy Bundick; calling Phoenix and Tucson, Arizona, is Nancy Rádziewicz; calling Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and Dallas and Fort Worth, Texas, is Bill Rawlins; calling New Orleans, Louisiana, Albuquerque, and Houston, Texas, is Morel.

Calling Amarillo, Texas, is Duane Byers; calling Austin, Texas, is Flodie Wilson; calling San Antonio, Texas, is Ken Moore; calling El Paso, Texas, is Sue Snidow; calling San Angelo and Abilene, Texas, is Sandy Dacy; and calling Midland and Odessa, Texas, is James Paxton.

## Hospital finds itself busy once again

Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital administrator Ken Moore had good news and bad news to report Friday.

"We have 34 patients and five babies," he said. That's good news for the financially troubled hospital.

Patient population in the 39-bed facility has been averaging 23 to 25 a day for the past few months, resulting in staff layoffs and other cost-cutting measures.

The bad news is that at least 29 Lincoln County residents did have to be hospitalized for health reasons. The five babies were each born to a patient counted in the 34, but those mothers and babies are generally in good health.

Moore said the other patients generally were suffering from winter-related illnesses. No one disease is causing the increased hospital use.

The administrator said that in the health business there is always that mixed feeling when the house is full.

It's good for business, but nobody wants to be sick.

More personnel is needed to meet the increased patient load, but few of the laid-off workers will be called back, according to Moore. The hospital has adopted a policy of using a fully licensed staff for patient care. Some positions involved in the cut-backs were aides and unlicensed technicians.

As staff size is increased because of higher numbers of patients, Moore said, licensed personnel will be hired.

## Weapons tested in McKnight murder probe

Results of laboratory tests on two weapons seized in the investigation of the Cotton and Judy McKnight killings are expected by the end of this week, according to Lincoln County Under-sheriff Charlie Cox.

Cox said two weapons have been sent to the crime lab of the Department of Public Safety in Austin, Texas, for ballistics testing. Those tests will compare the two weapons,

both capable of firing a .38 caliber bullet, with the bullets recovered in the shootings.

Thomas "Cotton" McKnight and his wife, Judy, were found shot to death at their ranch near Picacho November 15. The bodies of the McKnights were discovered by a neighbor and friend of the couple. Sheriff's Office officials have determined that a .38 caliber weapon was used in the killings.

Cox said results of the test may be

used to help identify the killer.

"We're using it for the process of elimination," he said of the testing.

Another two firearms were also confiscated, but have not yet been sent in for testing. All four of the firearms belonged to friends and relatives of the couple, according to the department. Investigators have speculated that the killer was someone very familiar to the couple.

McKnight was a Lincoln County commissioner for four years.

## Commodities distribution resumed in county

Food commodities will be distributed in Lincoln County after all, according to Marie Varela, county commodities coordinator.

Varela had earlier sent memos to commodity distribution centers notifying personnel that she would not be delivering the surplus food in December.

"I had planned to have distributions in December," she said, "but the

state didn't order commodities."

She has now been given the go-ahead and will be in Corona from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. Tuesday, December 18, at the Corona Senior Citizens Center.

Commodities will be distributed from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Wednesday, December 19, in Carrizozo at the Lincoln County Economic Opportunity Board Office at 404 Central.



Varela will distribute commodities from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. Thursday, December 20, at the Ruidoso Downs village hall.



## Warrior girls play Rockets

The Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team hopes to gain a little revenge and play giant-killer when the Warriors host the unbeaten Goddard Rockets Tuesday night.

There will be a junior varsity contest at 5:30, followed by the varsity game.

Ruidoso, now 2-2 on the season, lost to Goddard 60-44 in the Goddard Tournament last week. After losing to the Rockets, the Warriors won their next two games to finish with the consolation championship. Goddard won the tournament title.

"They're the best team we've played this year by far," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "They're ranked second in the state and they're undefeated."

Ruidoso is ranked 10th in a state coaches poll and has played a tough schedule.

What will the Warriors have to do to

win the game?

"They've got two real good guards, who are both averaging around 20 points a game, I think," Castanon said. "We're going to try and stop them and press a lot."

"I'm working on a defense against them."

Goddard is smaller than the Warriors but they are a lot quicker, according to Castanon.

"They're medium size but have a lot of quickness," Castanon commented.

Castanon will probably start Diane McClure and Stacy Ivy at the posts. Gia Rose and Judy McCoy will go at two of the guard positions, and either Susan Davis or Lillian Duffy will go at the other guard spot.

McClure has been consistently in double figures and has been a top rebounder. Ivy has done a good all-around job and scored 14 points to lead the Warriors' scoring in a 52-50 decision over Bowie (El Paso, Texas) in the tournament consolation title

game.

Rose has been a consistent performer for four seasons, while Davis and Duffy have shown improvement during the season.

The recent snowstorms have cut down on the Warriors' practices.

"We only had three days of practice last week," Castanon said. "We practiced the first three days, but I only had some of the girls at Thursday's practice."

But Castanon is hopeful of pulling off an upset.

"It should be a good Christmas present to upset the number two team in the state."

The Warrior junior varsity will attempt to raise its record to 2-0 at the expense of Goddard. Ruidoso's only game so far has been an impressive 49-2 victory over Cloudercroft.

Following the Goddard game, the Warriors will be idle until Saturday, January 5, when they travel to Socorro for varsity and junior varsity contests.

The Ruidoso Middle School boys and girls games at Hatch Saturday were also postponed, and may be rescheduled after Christmas, although no date has been set.


The Warrior junior varsity wrestling team also was idle Saturday, as Ruidoso did not go to the Carlsbad junior varsity tournament because of the bad weather.

# Around Sports with Gary Brown



I was sitting at my desk Friday morning, trying to think of a good subject to write about on a wintry, snowy day with not many sports activities going on.

Wintry, snowy days always limit the number of things you can write about, since many athletic events (particularly high school sports) are postponed or cancelled.

But I finally decided that even though many sporting events are cancelled, there are plenty of other events which could take their place.

The "ice scraper contest." This would involve a race to see who could scrape the ice off their car in the shortest period of time.

Contestants would need a great deal of emotional stability, because once they looked out their door and saw their car covered with ice and snow, they would need plenty of courage to even start the race.

The timing of the event for each individual would end when the person

finished the scraping and got into his car.

The "Sudderth Run." This does not seem like a difficult event, but contestants would be required to wear street shoes, not boots.

Whoever finished the run from Ranch House Restaurant to the "Y" first would win. The trick would be to avoid slipping and sliding on the wet and icy pavement.

Any contestant who slid the entire way would be disqualified. However, they would get an honorary medal for surviving the race.

The "football pass and catch contest." This event would be conducted in heavy falling snow with each team (consisting of a passer and a receiver) getting 10 attempts.

In order for each attempt to be considered, the pass must go at least 20 yards. The team with the most completions would win the competition.

The judges would have to be extremely watchful to make sure no passer moved beyond the line of scrimmage to pass the ball. The judges would need to be especially watchful since the heavy snow would make visibility difficult.

Any team trying to use a cannon (hoping to avoid being seen in the snow) to shoot the ball off would be disqualified.

"The search-and-rescue race." This race would again involve teams of two individuals.

One of the team members would "get lost" in some business or store in the immediate Ruidoso area during a heavy snowstorm.

The other team member would then begin a search for his partner on foot. The first team to unite again would be the winner.

Since this event could take all winter to complete, the award for first place would be a big one. A chance to do the event all over again.



## Laser artist a hit at Hondo School

Students at Hondo School participated in a fun and fascinating program when laser artist Nancy Sutor visited last week.

Her visit was part of the artists-in-residence program, in which the state shares costs with the schools. Sutor's visit also was sponsored by the Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo.

During her week-long stay at Hondo, Sutor gave a general assembly program and then worked extensively with two groups of 10 students. The students will take a field trip to Alamogordo and see the laser images they created projected to music in the laserium at the Space Hall of Fame.

At the assembly on Tuesday morning, Sutor showed the audience just how the laser works. She began by projecting laser drawings done at other schools onto the wall, delighting the younger children with the moving red pictures.

The images were hand-drawn onto the graphics pad of an Apple IIE computer. The computer perceives the drawing as a series of dots. It codes the information, which is stored on a disk.

After the picture is stored, it can be "replayed" through the laser onto the wall. The laser beam is projected onto the wall from a machine that bounces the light off of two tiny mirrors.

The motorized mirrors have adjustable speeds. The faster the mirrors move, the more contiguous the picture appears. At the slowest speed, one can see the laser beam tracing the image of the picture.

"It's kind of like dot-to-dot, but the dots are closer together," Sutor told the students. When the dot

moves very quickly, the eyes see it as one continuous picture.

Sutor explained that since these were line drawings, they could not be shaded. Caricatures and animated subjects work well, she told students, and suggested they start thinking of ideas to draw.

Sutor explained that laser beams do not spread out like the beam from a flashlight. Because of that property, they are used to perform delicate eye surgery.

New Mexico farmers use lasers to level their fields, she said. They put a laser beam in the center and scan the ground until the field is level.

After explaining and demonstrating the equipment, Sutor had several students and teachers step up and draw laser pictures. Every hand went up when she asked for volunteers.

Sutor, a Santa Fe resident who

has been with the program for two years, said students do very well with it.

"By the end of the week, you should see what these kids come up with," she said. She told of an animated monster's mouth sequence that took a student many hours to create and design.

Sutor visits about 12 schools each year. This year, she also will share laser art with children at a psychiatric hospital in Albuquerque and with students at the School for the Visually Handicapped.

This reporter found Sutor's presentation to be an informative and enjoyable way to spend a morning. After the show, she let me try my hand at the graphics pad, and I wrote my signature.

It was great. I can finally say that I've had my name in lights.

## Bus driver certification discussed

The issue of having certified bus drivers for the Capitan activity buses was a major topic at the school board meeting Thursday night.

Apparently the athletic buses are often driven by coaches and teachers who are not state certified. This weekend, Howard Shanks (husband of Mary Shanks, cheerleader sponsor) drove the basketball teams to Floyd.

Superintendent Leonard Hays said Shanks and the other coaches who drive the buses were certified up until this year, when the regulations changed. They do possess bus drivers' licenses, said Hays.

Principal Jay Dark said that the non-certified drivers are used to save the school money. Capitan schools still face a \$30,000 deficit and may run out of activity funds by track season.

When a teacher or volunteer driver (such as Shanks) drives for free, the school saves 17 cents a mile. If an accident were to occur, however, the state would not back the school in resulting lawsuits, Hays said.

The board decided that a certified driver should be sent to bring the students home, and that all of the coaches and activity teachers who drive the buses should receive the training necessary for certification.

A later phone call to Santa Fe revealed that Shanks does meet the minimum requirements for certification, said Dark this weekend, thus Shanks could drive the bus back from Floyd.

Former activity bus driver Harold Perry told the board that he had resigned that morning, after being told that he would not be used to drive the bus to Floyd. Perry said a similar incident occurred earlier this month when coach Bill MacVeigh drove his girls volleyball team to Albuquerque.

"I didn't want to resign, but I cannot be part of a program that chucks the law," said Perry.

Perry also alleged that his denial of the trip was related to personal politics because he spoke out in defense of John Blea at last month's controversial meeting.

In another bus matter, Robert Runnels said that his niece and her young friends were dropped three miles from their home on the Bonito route during last week's snowstorm. Other people told of similar incidents occurring during rough driving conditions.

Hays said that he was preparing route maps to show the county road departments which roads need the most immediate work.

The board also discussed a proposed discipline policy revision that would spell out guidelines for the administration of corporal punishment. According to the proposed policy, the only form of corporal punishment shall be paddling with a wooden paddle.

Corporal punishment must be administered in the presence of another certified employee of the school and must be done away from other students, preferably in the principal's office. Corporal punishment on a female secondary student must be done by or in the presence of a female teacher.

Paddling should be administered without anger, frustration or malice, and must be documented in the principal's files.

The policy revision is the result of last month's controversy over teacher John Blea. Blea had been suspended for allegedly hitting students without following procedure, but the school board later voted to retain him. The board will vote on the policy change at next month's meeting.

Citing a need for remedial tutoring, Dark suggested implementing a study hall before first period each morning. Under the proposed schedule change, the students would begin the day five minutes earlier and lose 10 minutes at lunch. Other class periods would be shortened by five

minutes. Dark said students would be placed with a teacher of the subject with which they need help. English and math have priority. The board approved the change, effective next semester.

The Emergency Medical Services advisor for Lincoln County, Devil Bill Adams, approached the board requesting that EMT classes be taught at the school. Adams said the county needs more emergency medical technicians and that training in the school would give students marketable skills and background for future studies.

Board members were receptive to the idea and encouraged Adams to pursue the necessary proposals.

In other business, the board approved the graduation date of Tuesday, May 21, 1985.

Heard Hays discuss the auditor's report, which called for certain improvements, including collecting tickets as receipts at ball games. Currently, money is collected at the door, but tickets are not sold.

Approved a joint powers agreement with Roswell schools for the cooperative purchasing of basic supplies.

Approved various line item budget changes and departmental reports.

Heard Hays announce that he had published the filing period for the upcoming school board election. Candidates may file now through January 2 and must withdraw by January 11. Election day is February 5.

The school will be closed from December 24 through January 1, but will open all day on January 2 for candidates to file. Forms are available in the superintendent's office.

Congratulated Mark Delgado on his election as president-elect of the New Mexico School Board Association. As the president elect, he will spend one year under the president learning the office. The following year he will be president of the organization.

The Capitan High School girls varsity basketball team won the consolation title in the Floyd Invitational Tournament this weekend, beating Floyd 41-28 Saturday night.

The Tiger boys won one of three games, beating Corona 43-42 in double overtime Friday night.

Capitan's girls team dumped Corona 69-17 Friday night. Thursday

night the Tigers lost to San Jon 72-57.

Assistant girls coach Blane Miller said Thursday night's game had the Tigers within three points in the third quarter. He cited the 29 team fouls as causing the loss in that game.

He was pleased that his girls scored as well as they did, however.

"That was their eighth game, it was only our second. If we meet them down the road at the state playoffs, we'll give them a much better game."

Miller said the defense was excellent. "They had aggressive en-

thusiasm throughout the team," he said of his players.

Besides their exciting win over Corona, the Tiger boys lost to Floyd 87-49 Thursday night and fell to Dora 58-55 Saturday night.

Coach Kendal Lawlis said the team played well, but was sluggish in Saturday's game.

 Today, December sixteen, there are only three colors in the world: the sky of pure December blue above and a mountain world of hills and vales and meadows and cliffs of pure white and the soft dark green winter coat of the pinon and cedar. The west wind has been blowing since early morning so that there is not a drop of snow on the trees, waving free at the sky as if signaling that the Winter Spirit had certainly hit a good lick for the land with this last load of snow.  
 So now Winter is in on the ground floor with one of the best snowy seasons in a long time.



## Editorial

Should the Village of Ruidoso buy Cree Meadows Country Club and operate its golf course?

That is an interesting question—one on which the village council is seeking input.

We are glad to know that the village is looking into the acquisition, for several reasons.

First of all, the golf course is a great asset to the village—to golfers and non-golfers. In a worst-case scenario, imagine what are now the green fairways being covered with houses.

Even building the nicest homes imaginable there would change the character of the entire village—linking the south and north sides of town with suburbia instead of green space.

Second, golf is a popular tourist activity. Obviously, golfers want to play golf while they're on vacation. Village ownership of Cree Meadows presumably would ensure public access to the links at affordable fees.

The big tournaments that are played at Cree Meadows every season are economically important to the village. Acquisition of the golf course would, of course, be a quantum leap in Ruidoso's public parks and recreation assets.

It is easy to find reasons why the golf course should be there, and why it should be public. It is not so easy, at this point, to say whether the village would be making a great investment or buying a white elephant.

That determination is at a preliminary stage, however. Now is the time for all interested parties to make their feelings known.—TP

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—"We don't want to create the impression this is 21 Republicans led by two Democrats," Senator Jack Morgan told us.

Unfortunately, that was the impression all of us already had—and for a pretty good reason.

Morgan was speaking to the media at a news conference called to discuss organization of the Senate for the next two years. In that organizing effort, Democratic Senators Caleb Chandler and Les Houston had announced their decision to vote with the Republicans. That would avoid a 21-to-21 vote tie, which would result if every member voted with his or her own party. Neither of the two will change his party registration; they will simply vote like Republicans, while remaining registered as Democrats.

Their rewards for reaching that decision were fairly lavish. Houston got what he wanted—to replace senior Senator Ike Smalley as president pro tem, one of the most important jobs in the Senate. Chandler will be vice-chairman of Senate Finance, that body's most important committee.

Those assignments put them pretty far ahead of the 21 assorted Republicans who will serve in the Senate with them and with whom Senator Morgan would like us to consider them equal.

Morgan will be chairman of Senate Finance, so he did well in the deal. Other Republicans, however, may think they have reason to feel their leaders gave away the ranch.

Houston, at that same news conference, was restrained and modest. Those characteristics are not always part of his demeanor.

This is a man who tends to work his way instinctively into the limelight, and then bask there.

In this case, he has already won what he wanted, so it was appropriate to appear suitably humble.

One wonders if his triumph will prove as satisfactory as he hopes. That president pro tem job is important at the start of every session, because the man who holds it is chairman of the Committee on Committees, which passes out the goodies.

During the rest of the session, however, the post is mostly honorary. The man who holds it can't chair one of the working committees, and presiding over the Senate when the Lieutenant Governor is absent is no big thrill.

Once the season gets rolling, Houston may find himself hungering for those headlines he loves so well.

And what's going on in the other legislative body? In the House, will liberals or conservatives prevail?

It's hard to say. You can hear anything, and believe what you want.

House Speaker Ray Sanchez assures us all he has the "hard" votes to have himself renamed to the post he holds. Others of us are not so sure that is so.

At the recent Democratic caucus at which Ron Gentry was named floor leader for another term, he was reportedly warning his fellow members not to vote for him because he has committed himself to support Sanchez for Speaker, but simply on the basis of whether or not he should be their leader.

That could be read to mean that Gentry is not committed to Sanchez and can still be talked to by the opposition.

At any rate, it's an interesting remark at a time when the shift of a single House vote could be crucial to either side.

This column has occasionally speculated on whether or not some of those relatively inexperienced people Toney Anaya chooses as Cabinet Secretaries are worth about a thousand dollars a week.

Now it turns out one of them gets more.

He's Dr. Fitzhugh Mullan, just named to head one branch of the Department of Health and Environment. (He's Health; Denise Fort is Environment.)

Under the state's contract with the federal government, which "lends" him to us, New Mexico pays him the sum of \$77,101.48 per year, which ain't hay.

**An Idea**  
 The starvation in central and south Africa of as many as 100 human beings a day points out the selfishness of mankind and our insensitivity to the needs of others.

Some people will argue that it's not mankind that is so heartless, but nations. Still, it takes people to make a nation, so every governmental action, whether in the U.S., Russia or elsewhere, becomes a reflection of that nation's citizens.

Others will say that Africa's plight was of its own making. That too is partially correct. But does that absolve the rest of us from our humane commitments to aid those who are suffering and need our assistance? America's action, and response by other nations, came too late to help an estimated million-and-a-half people, including children, who starved to death in Ethiopia and other African nations.

Individually we are unable to stem such devastation. But collectively, as nations, there's much that could be done to alleviate such suffering. With modern, rapid communications, weather-monitoring satellites, and other high technologies available, there's no excuse for governments, Africa's or any other, not having advance knowledge of droughts and pending famines.

We suggest that this nation's Congress, and its counterpart in the Kremlin, agree to remove one missile launching site each—the one that each nation considers the least vital to its defense. Then, further agree to pool the money saved by removal of those sites and establish food warehousing at African ports and at least a semblance of a distribution system within that continent's starving nations.

That way, the United States and Russia would carry out the wishes of individual citizens, putting an end to the starvation deaths of so many men, women and children, and take one positive step toward arms' limitations.

By being as eager to devise means of saving lives as we are of killing one another, such holocausts could be averted.

If the leaders of these two great nations, able to put men and satellites into orbit, or to destroy each other with the push of a button, cannot devise the means whereby human beings need not die from starvation, then we have reached the hour of Armageddon.

God help us.

## On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer

Jim Hine seemed in an unusually good mood when I talked to him late last week, especially considering the fact that he had just returned from the dentist.

The reason for the village manager's high spirits was not laughing gas, however. It was water.

"It's too good to be true" was my feeling when I read about the big water strike of the village's exploratory wells on National Forest land off of Ski Run Road.

Listening to Mr. Hine, however, I didn't hear any discouraging words.

First of all, he noted, the quality of the water appears to be very good. He pointed out that drilling a well around Ruidoso that pumps 100 gallons per minute is no big deal, but usually the water will be too hard.

The notoriously hard Hollywood Well water tests out at 1,400 parts per million hardness, according to Hine. The new wells test out at a relatively soft 270 parts per million. The Rio Ruidoso tests at 140 parts per million.

Softness of the water from the new wells is one reason the drillers are convinced they hit a brand-new underground stream, Hine said.

The drillers went pretty deep. They went down 800 feet in one well, but pulled back to 525 feet.

Another thing that pleases Hine is that the new wells are only three-fourths of a mile from the village's Eagle Creek intake structure.

"The city council and all of us are just tremendously excited about this," he said. He called the find "a feather in the cap" of the council.

Hine recalled that the first bids on the drilling project had to be rejected last summer when they didn't meet specs. The council went back out to bid, and the contractor hit paydirt, so to speak.

The timing of the announcement of the find was set to coincide with the United States Forest Service's call for "public comment, as is required by OMB Circular A-95, on the proposed development of five wells and adjoining pipeline in the Eagle Creek Drainage."

I am quoting from a legal notice in Thursday's Ruidoso News that Mr. Hine directed me to. You certainly read some interesting things in the legal.

Anyhow, the A-95 process takes 30 days. Comments will be accepted at Smokey Bear Ranger Station until January 11.

After that, an environmental impact statement will be done. That will take the project to the design stage.

Hine said he didn't want people to get too excited about the \$6 million cost figure quoted by one of the engineers.

"My personal opinion is it will not cost anywhere near that," he said. Mr. Hine said he really appreciated the attitude and cooperation of the Forest Service on the well project.

I asked him if the find meant the end of Ruidoso's water problems. After all, Ruidoso without water worries would be like Ruidoso without airport worries. Both have become part of the village's character.

Mr. Hine predicted that water will continue to be a concern. He expects someone to say that now the village does not need the Grindstone reservoir.

It is his feeling that the dam and reservoir are needed. He pointed out that a new water treatment plant to serve the Upper Canyon area (part of the Grindstone project) long has been anticipated.

Grindstone also figures into Ponderosa Heights' need for adequate water for, among other things, fire protection.

For now, Jim Hine and other village officials can savor the results of the exploratory wells. The village manager exuded an optimism that has been missing from Ruidoso's water outlook for a long time.

"We feel we're over the hump," he said.

The good fortune of such a water find is even more remarkable when you consider what might have happened with the council's \$400,000 gamble.

"Thank God we didn't strike oil," said Hine.

## Chrismon tree uses symbols

A Chrismon tree looks a lot like a Christmas tree. It symbolizes much more, and is used to enhance Christmas services in churches throughout the United States, including Ruidoso's First Presbyterian Church.

Chrismon is a word formed by joining the name Christ with monogram. It means just that, Christ's monogram.

The Chrismons themselves, the ornaments of the tree, are various Christian symbols in the liturgical colors of white and gold. White symbolizes Christ's purity and perfection. Gold symbolizes God's glory and power.

Chrismon trees should be live evergreen trees as a symbol of everlasting life.

Lights used are all white, and in the First Presbyterian Church there is one light on the tree for each family in the church. Church families use their light as a reminder of Christ's commission to believers to "let His light shine" through them.


The first Chrismon tree was used in the Lutheran Church of the Ascension in Danville, Virginia, in 1957. Frances Kippis Spencer, who decorated trees professionally, volunteered to decorate a tree for the church.

## Diverse cultures book enhance

MaryLou M. Smith brought her mother-in-law's doll house to Ruidoso Wednesday. The New Mexico native displayed the house that inspired her book, "Grandmother's Adobe Dollhouse," at the Aspen Tree bookstore.

"I like to call her the architect and general contractor," said the author of her mother-in-law, LaVern Smith of Roswell. The doll house originator did a great deal of research into the history of New Mexico architecture before having the Santa Fe-style house built to her exact specifications.

She furnished it with historically correct handmade furniture and accessories. The tiny rugs, pottery and ristras add a delightful touch to the miniature house. The miniature books are even realistic, and can be read.

The author wrote "Grandmother's Adobe Dollhouse" from the viewpoint of her six-year-old son Matt. Readers are treated to a tour of the house with fascinating cultural and historical notes.

"Before we go in, let me tell you about adobe (ah-DOH-beh). This little house and all the adobe houses in New Mexico are really made of mud." The Mexican vocabulary words,

complete with pronunciation guide (as in the excerpt from the book above) are woven throughout the story.

"I wanted to emphasize the importance of the different cultures in New Mexico," Smith said. Smith, who is a Fort Collins, Colorado, publisher, is married and has two children. She and her husband, Stephen, have been partners in a consulting firm, but she recently established Nuevo West Books.

New Mexico Magazine co-published "Grandmother's Adobe Dollhouse," along with Nuevo West Books. Smith had the unusual experience to be involved with all phases of her book, from the idea through the publication.

On the drawing board now is a book about her children's two great-grandmothers. Smith's daughter, Laurel Collier Smith, is named for the two pioneer women who homesteaded in eastern New Mexico about 60 miles apart.

"They never knew one another," said Smith of the grandmothers—one from her family and the other from Stephen's family.

Smith's Nuevo West Books will specialize in books about the West and Southwest. She feels that being a fourth-generation New Mexican will help her in telling people the fascinating story of New Mexico's diverse cultures.



**THE BOUNCING BALL** — Before opening discussions with Boston College football star Doug Flutie about his possibly signing with the United States Football League's New Jersey Generals, Generals'

owner Donald Trump said he was prepared to offer Flutie "as much as I think is reasonable ridiculous."

That's a good way to describe CBS's recent signing of its sports major-domo, Brent Musburger, to a five-year contract that will pay the "NFL Today" host approximately \$2 million a year. This puts Musburger in Dan Rather territory.

In signing Musburger and keeping the popular emcee away from ABC — which was dangling money, a chance to announce a World Series and a Super Bowl under his nose — CBS has called for Musburger to do play-by-play of college basketball games. He already does the pro broadcasts for the network.

In the college games Musburger can concentrate on the bouncing ball because at his side will be one of the most astute observers of college basketball in the country, Billy Packer, in his fourth season as CBS's expert analyst.

Packer proved his sagacity last season when he named three of the final four teams competing in the NCAA national championship, naming Georgetown the winner before the season started.

This season Packer once again picks the Georgetown Hoyas to be the No. 1 team in the country, and expects them to meet stiff competition from Illinois, DePaul, Indiana and Memphis State.

As for individual stars he likes Olympian Chris Mullin and Walter Berry teaming up on St. John's, Oklahoma's wayman Tisdale, as the country's leading scorer, and Duane "Pearl" Washington, the latest hot shot from Syracuse University, catching the eye of the TV viewers.
