Timeshare regulations are stiffened

New Mexico Attorney General Paul Bardacke signed into effect new regulations governing sweepstakes promotions of time shares and other land interests on Tuesday, September 3.

The laws were formulated in response to what Bardacke called, in a recent press release, "a steady stream of complaints and questions we have received from consumers."

"We think these regulations will help clarify promotions and eliminate much of the confusion consumers have reported to us," said Bardacke.

Some of those complaints were about establishments located in Ruidoso, said Anita Miller, special assistant to the attorney general's office, and Stuart Bluestone, director of the Consumer Protection and Economic Crimes Division, in telephone interviews Friday.

Bluestone said he could not comment on particular businesses, but did reveal that his office currently is investigating certain Ruidoso timeshare operations for problems relating to promotions.

Time shares are apartments or condominiums sold by the week, for a certain length of time.

To attract people to visit timeshare locations, many companies use heavy promotional campaigns such as phone solicitations and mail pieces offering prizes or vacations for touring the facilities.

Many consumers have complained of misrepresentation in the promotional material. For example, some companies offer "free" trips to Hawaii, Florida or Mexico as prizes. However, the trips often pay for only one person when two are required to travel and do not

depart from a New Mexico location.

Under the New Mexico Fair Trade Practices Act, the attorney general's office has the right to issue laws to protect consumers against false or misleading advertising.

The new regulations require extensive disclosures on the promotional material. Advertising information must contain the odds (stated clearly) of winning prizes and the verifiable retail value of the gifts.

The new regulations require mail pieces and phone solicitations to explain that the gift recipient must attend a sales presentation before claiming the gift. The word "giveaway" must be used instead of "sweepstakes," if an actual contest is not involved. Methods of choosing the names and gifts (such as computer preselection) must also be revealed.

The new regulations will not apply to radio and television as originally discussed by the attorney general's office because the length of time per commercial is too short to include all of the information, said Bluestone.

But this doesn't mean you can be deceptive in television ads. If an ad is deceptive, we'll take action," Bluestone added.

The regulations were drafted in May and revised this summer after discussion at three public hearings in Ruidoso, Santa Fe and Albuquerque. Members of the timeshare industry gave input at the meetings, which led to revisions, some of which toned down the wording in some of the original regulations.

Four local timeshare managers consulted Friday said they found no problems with the regulations. Each said their company had complied with the rules even before

they were written.

"When someone sends out a misleading mail piece, it affects the whole industry," said Jim Smith, marketing manager of Chateau de la Shay.

Rob Lavanchy, marketing director of Triple Crown Condominiums, opined that the regulations moved the industry in a positive direction. Tierra Del Sol manager Vic Topeka said he felt the regulations would "not put a hardship on any legitimate developers and would do the industry good."

Topeka said that all timeshare resorts offer giveaways as a means of getting people to tour the sites.

Don Boss, assistant manager at Crownpoint Condominiums, said he felt the rules are "excellent."

"You never hear about it when people do win prizes," he added, explaining that his company recently gave away a new car.

Miller said she felt the key to the regulations is "full and fair disclosures."

Both Miller and Bluestone said they felt an additional regulation needed in the timeshare industry is a seven-day right of rescission period. Currently, only complexes built as deed simple (ownership) condominiums after 1981 must honor that "cooling off" time.

Miller and Bluestone reported that a bill requiring a rescission period passed in the state house of representatives during the last legislative session, but died on the final day because of a filibuster on the floor. Both attorneys said they hoped it would be addressed in the next legislative session.

Miller said she had just received a phone call from a lady who changed her mind about a pressured timeshare purchase.

"These people have no rights," said Miller, about the current lack of a rescission law.

Warriors whip Wildcats; take aim at the Rockets

Ruidoso High School's varsity football team put its passing game into high gear and took a 28-18 win over visiting Lovington Friday night.

Ruidoso, now 2-0 on the non-district season, was sparked by quarterback Russell Easter. Easter threw three touchdown passes, including a 46-yarder to split end Brian Davis with 2:53 left in the game which cinched the Warrior win.

Lovington had cut Ruidoso's edge to 21-18 with a blocked punt returned for a touchdown with 3:07 left in the contest.

But Easter and Davis soon put the large Warrior crowd at ease with their touchdown pass.

From the Lovington 46, Easter found Davis near the left sidelines. The 6-2 junior battled for the ball with a defender, juggled it and then raced down the sidelines for the score, as his teammates rushed on the field to mob him.

Garret Henson kicked his third extra point of the night to give the Warriors their final margin of victory.

The contest started out slowly as neither team could score in the opening quarter.

But the Warrior running game came alive in the second period and Ruidoso hit paydirt. Easter hit tailback Michael Williamson with a 21-yard scoring pass to culminate a 67-yard drive in 12 plays.

Most of the yardage on the drive came on runs by Williamson, Easter, Kirk Taylor and fullback Billy Harrison.

Easter, who earlier had muffed a

field goal attempt, kicked the first extra point of his career and Ruidoso led 7-0 with 6:41 left in the first half.

It did not take Ruidoso long to hit the scoreboard again, five plays to be exact.

Lovington got the ball on its 20, but fumbled the ball three plays later on the 37.

From there, Easter found Davis over the middle for the touchdown. Henson added the extra point and Ruidoso led 14-0.

But Lovington averted a first half shutout with a 30-yard field goal by Aaron Acha with 1:46 left in the half. The field goal ended a 74-yard drive.

Lovington cut the Warriors' lead to three points in the third quarter after a short drive.

Tailback Paul Gage ran 10 yards to the Warrior five to set up a short touchdown pass. The two-point conversion was good and Ruidoso led just 14-11.

But that Lovington score brought a quick response from the Warriors.

Starting from their 36, the Warriors drove 64 yards in seven plays aided by a facemask penalty.

Williamson ran 15 yards to the Lovington 49 to start the drive. Three plays later, Easter hit Davis for 14 yards to the Wildcat 29 and the facemask penalty put the ball on the 14.

Williamson ran through a hole, cut to his right and crossed the goal line for the touchdown.

Henson added his third extra point kick and Ruidoso led 21-11 with 3:00 left in the third period.

Ruidoso had another good drive midway through the final quarter, driving to the Lovington 36.

However, the Wildcat defense held and the Warriors were forced

to punt, setting up the block and return for the final Wildcat score.

But Easter's pass and Davis' great catch put an end to Lovington's hopes.

The Warriors gained 378 yards total offense, 190 passing and 188 on the ground.

Easter completed eight of 14 passes for the three touchdowns. He also ran for 40 yards.

Williamson led the Warrior running game with 79 yards in 12 attempts. Harrison added 40 yards.

Lovington gained 148 yards total offense. The Warrior defense throttled most of the Wildcat drives.

All-District 3-AAA safety Jeff Willingham intercepted one Lovington pass and knocked down a number of others.

"I was pleased with the overall play of our team," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "We had some outstanding individual efforts."

"Aside from our penalties and kicking game, we did an excellent job. We've got to improve in those areas."

Both teams were hurt by a rash of penalties which made the game last more than two and one half hours.

The Warriors will host Goddard at 7:30 this Friday night. The Rockets fell to AAAA-division power Roswell 32-14 last Friday.

NOTES-Davis was named the Golden Helmet award winner by the coaches. Other award winners were James Herrera, top offensive player; Chuck Daniels, top defensive player; Henson, top kicking game player, and Billy Chadwell, top scout team player. Season reserve tickets for the remaining four home regular season games are on sale in the high school's main office this week. They will cost \$20 for four games.

Senior citizen transportation is discussed

It's been my policy to open board meetings with prayer," said Barney Waldrop, chairman of the Ruidoso Adult Recreation Committee, as he preceded that group's business with a lengthy prayer Friday.

Most of the meeting's discussion centered on transportation policies at the Adult Recreation Center.

"Our bus should be used more," said committee member Sybil Riddle, who added that the van is parked nearly every time she passes the center.

"We only have a driver once a week," said Bette Romans, direc-

tor of the center. "Nobody would be happier than I to have the bus used five days a week if we could get somebody to drive it," she added.

Burdette Stampley, a member of the committee, presented a proposal by part-time driver Carl Ross in which Ross would increase his paid working hours from eight to 16 hours a week, and would then volunteer to be on-call for emergency transportation needs during other hours.

He Ross has concerns about the use of volunteers, he thinks of the van as his baby, and doesn't want other people driving it," said Stampley, who added that Ross's offer is "most generous."

"I think it would be wonderful," said Romans, adding that she couldn't see where the money could be found in the current budget.

The committee voted to recommend to the Ruidoso Village Council that Ross be hired at five dollars an hour for 16 hours a week.

But the transportation discussion continued as committee member Verna Adams questioned Romans about why she and her assistant, Angella Garmes, can't help with emergency transportation on days when they are both in the center.

"How can we plan anything down here if we're going to be called out," said Romans, listing Wednesday luncheons, home visits and craft programs among scheduled activities.

"There's a great group of us that are ambulatory, but I think we deserve a little consideration," said Flora Elliott, a member of the committee, who opposes any change that would call Romans or Garmes out of the center. "We deserve a well-managed center," she added.

Committee member Bill Underhill expressed a feeling that there was a movement to increase transportation services and eliminate other center activities.

"I don't want to see things eliminated, I want to add things," said Stampley. He explained that the more services offered and

utilized, the more usage the center would have. "The city supports the center for the needs of all the senior citizens we need to reach out," he said.

During a discussion on refurbishing the van, questions were raised about a recommendation by the defunct ad hoc advisory committee to repaint the van. Romans said the van wasn't painted, but plans were apparently changed and it will be waxed instead.

"City Council accepted the budgetary recommendation as presented and it seems to me the village administration has changed that decision," said Stampley.

Adams volunteered to work with Ross on a suitable step and safety rail for the van. She also offered to instruct employees and/or volunteers on how to help people in and out of the van.

In other business, the committee discussed "Meals on Wheels," and heard a recommendation by Stampley that the Adult Recreation Center work toward assuming that project.

Heard Romans report that work is progressing on a mailing list, and Stampley report that he'll obtain more names through local churches.

Approved Waldrop's suggestion that a recommendation be made to Village Council to sell the center's lapidary equipment, and perhaps purchase exercise equipment.

Voted to ask the Golden Age Club for funds to purchase a quilting frame for about \$140.

Agreed with Waldrop's request that agenda items be submitted by the 25th of the month before each committee meeting.

Heard Adams suggest that a discussion on ways to help the center director be included on next month's agenda.

The Adult Recreation Committee meets at 11 a.m. the first Friday of each month in the Adult Recreation Center building behind the Ruidoso Public Library.

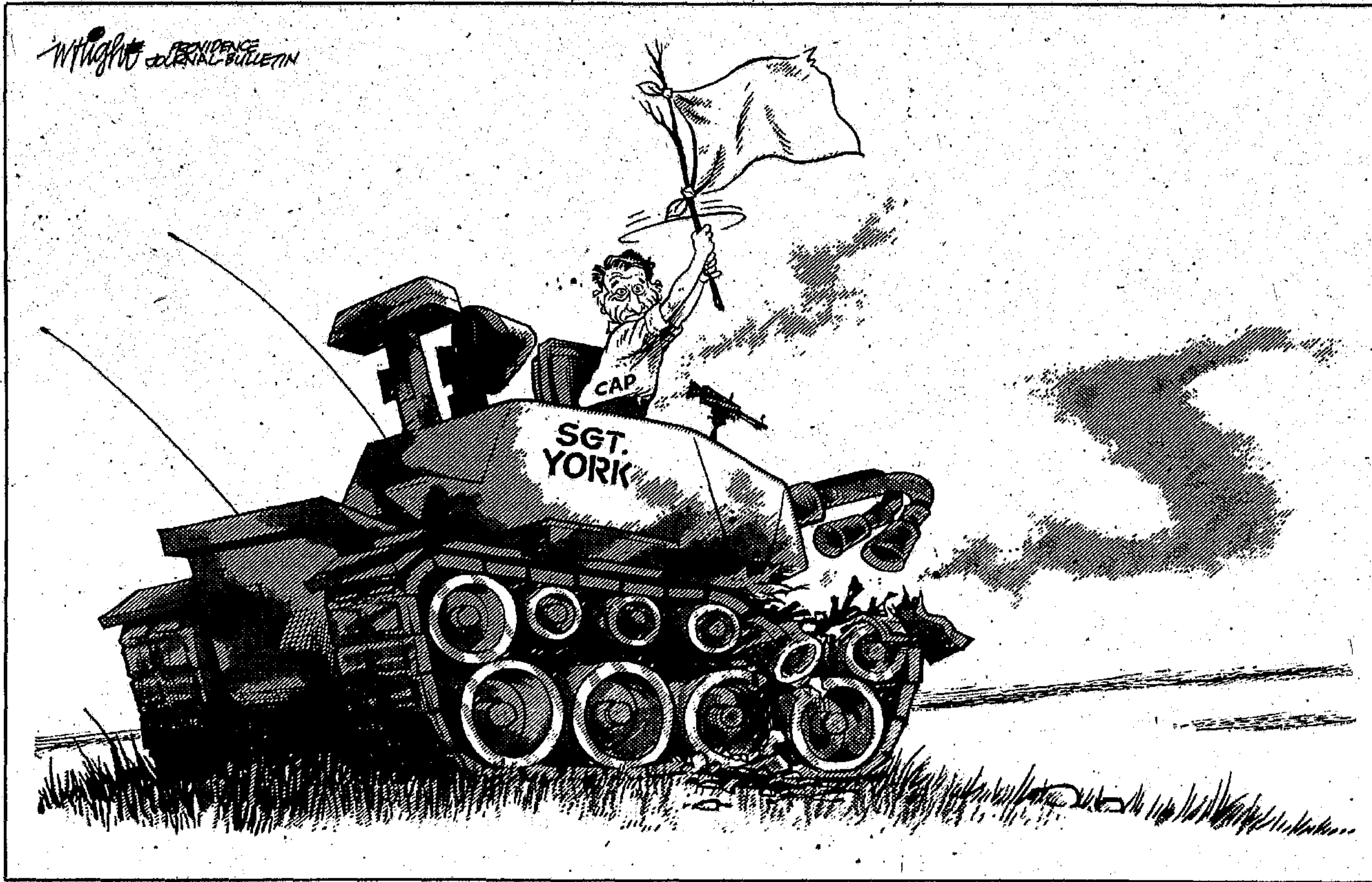

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—New Mexico's Republican Senator in Washington fights with the Republican President more than the Democratic one does. And there's more of that coming.

Up till now Pete Domenici has disagreed with the White House principally over its unwillingness to come to grips with the budget deficit. Now, after a swing through the Far East, he can be expected to fight about another problem Reagan seems equally unwilling to face, our trade deficit.

It's possible, of course, that the man at the top in this nation doesn't really understand either of these serious economic pitfalls. Anyone who can say of South Africa, as Reagan recently did, that "they have eliminated the segregation we once had in our country," isn't really with it. He needs a new set of three-by-five cards to talk from.

While Reagan (backed by Regan) gives us his Readers Digest version of economics, compound interest goes on eating us up.

You know, compound interest—when the interest earned is added to the principal, so that the interest is larger in the next period than it was in the last.

Once that begins operating on big numbers, with lots of zeroes, debt begins to gather a momentum of its own, as both the two deficits now have, and old equations of supply and demand no longer apply.

Because of just the four years of national debt built up since Reagan took office, his successors will find it hard to do anything other than meet the government's interest obligations. In 1980, one dollar in every ten the government spent was to pay interest on the national debt. Now interest consumes one dollar of every seven. As interest payments continue to rise, the government has to collect more in taxes, reduce its other functions or borrow more—and borrowing means interest payments (remember compound interest?) will rise even faster next year.

That's what got Our Pete steamingly, table-poundingly angry earlier this year—the fact that neither the executive nor the legislative branch wants to face up fully to reducing government, the only sensible way to end this precipitous rise, which has

grown so frighteningly since Carter left Washington and Domenici's own party took control.

Those facts dovetail exactly into what is happening to the imbalance in foreign trade. In 1982, just a few short years ago, our nation's position as a creditor gave us an international-investment surplus of \$150 billion. By the end of last year, the international debts of the United States have grown until they equalled its investments. By the end of this year the U.S. will stand roughly \$100 billion in debt to the rest of the world.

That's worse than Mexico, Argentina and other "debtor" nations—less than three years after we were the world's biggest creditor.

See how that compound interest can eat you up? By the end of next year, we will owe at least \$100 billion more.

Here's how we got that way, or at least part of how we got there: Our government has to borrow more money each year because of its budget deficits; because we borrow more, interest rates go up (the government offers high interest to attract lenders, and other institutions have to raise their rates to stay competitive); because U.S. interest rates are high, foreigners (like the Japanese, let's say) deposit money in American banks; and because so much foreign money is on deposit here, the dollar stays high—so high, in fact, that it now constitutes a 40 percent "export tax" on U.S. products. No wonder nobody wants to buy our merchandise, with that heavy additional load.

Actually, what Americans are doing right now is borrowing money from foreigners so we can buy their cut-rate foreign goods.

That has to stop—which means Congress has to act to break the circle. Domenici, still mulling over what he saw in busy Japan and Korea, and what he thinks we will see in time from that home of one billion humans, mainland China, will want to take steps to stop it.

When that happens, look for Act II of the Italian boy from New Mexico and his war against the occupants of 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue.

It'll be a scrap worth watching.

Perhaps the Lincoln County Democrat Women should have visited with Fran before going "right to the top to get it straightened out" as the president of the organization was quoted as saying. Such actions erode the confidence voters perceive in the political process.

The Democrat Women accuse Fran of being reluctant and/or refusing to train new deputy registrars. We need to remind them that the County Clerk attended one of THEIR meetings in May to hold a school of instruction for deputy registrars. Notice of this meeting was published beforehand in the "Lincoln County News" and the "Ruidoso News," where the public was invited. Fran has also informed leaders of the organization that she would hold more schools when the summer months were over, but was willing to train individuals in the meantime. She has told the Democrat Women anyone wanting to become a registrar may make an appointment with her for training, and further suggested that they may bring more than one person for time efficiency.

Fran is accused of not furnishing registration forms to registrars. Among the people sworn in as a Democrat registrar at the May meeting of the Democrat Women was a "Ruidoso News" reporter who wrote the original story about the complaints. The reporter has since called the County Clerk's office inquiring where her registration supplies are. The reporter failed to pick up her registration materials during the instructional meeting, although those present were asked to do so. I suggest this may be a case of negligence on an individual's part, rather than the fault of the County Clerk.

Fran has tried to make the registration process as convenient as possible for the potential voter. She has acquired registrars in all of the city halls—Corona, Capitan, Ruidoso, and Ruidoso Downs. She has even obtained registrars in the Ruidoso State Bank and Bank of Ruidoso. I certainly would not call these efforts "obstacles" in the registration process, but a superb undertaking at giving people the opportunity to register to vote.

The Republican majority was obtained in Lincoln County because voters are no longer identifying with the Democrat Party's philosophy. The majority was obtained by the hard work of the Lincoln County Republican Party and the Lincoln County Republican Women. Perhaps it would be more constructive for the Democrat Women to heed the Republican example.

Editorial

The statewide crackdown on those driving while intoxicated (DWI) on New Mexico's roadways seems to be making some headway, but the DWI situation is still at a critical level in many parts of the state, including Ruidoso.

Measures took effect a year ago that provide for longer jail terms, stiffer fines and possible drivers license revocations—yearlong in the case of those who refuse to submit to intoxication tests.

The state Transportation Department reported that the first four months of 1985 showed just 71 alcohol-related automobile crashes, compared to 99 such crashes in the first four months of 1984.

Locally though, Ruidoso Deputy Police Chief Jim Alston reported that for the period of January through August 1985, 152 motorists were arrested for DWI, compared to 131 such arrests in the same period of 1984.

Chief Richard Swenor pointed out in a recent report that even in the face of national attention to the problem of DWI, the Ruidoso area continues to experience a "tremendous" DWI rate.

"We still have a problem," Alston commented.

Alston said the problem of DWIs can be traced to a combination of visitors "letting their hair down" in the Ruidoso resort atmosphere, and local drinkers.

State figures show that 62 percent of traffic deaths in New Mexico continue to be alcohol-related.

The state has already cracked down heavily on drivers who drink, what will it take before we motorists in Ruidoso finally wake up and tame the problem of DWI? Please, don't drink and drive.—DJP

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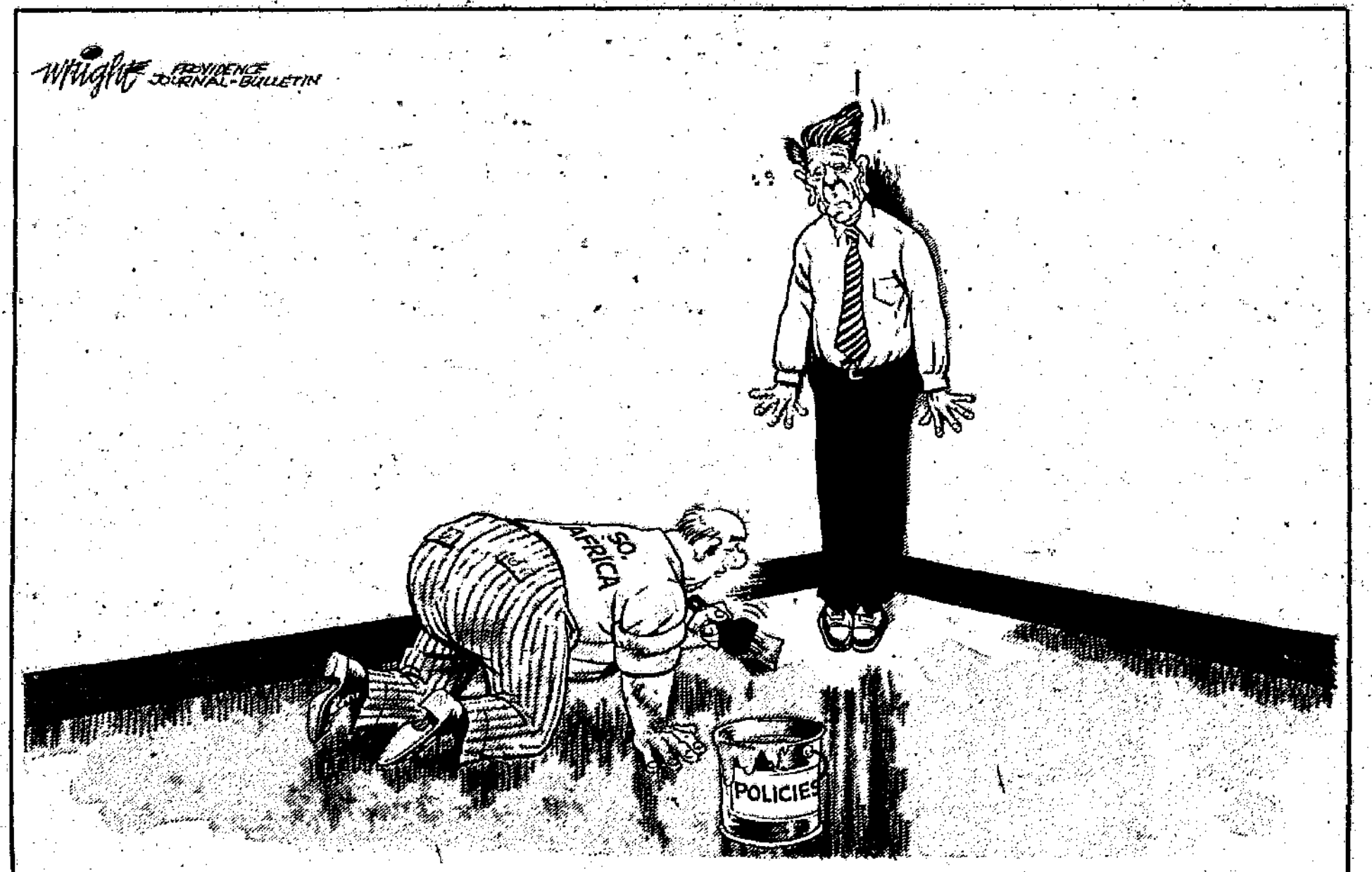

Douglass led the Warriors in the first set with five serve points. Zeba Morris had six in the second and third sets.

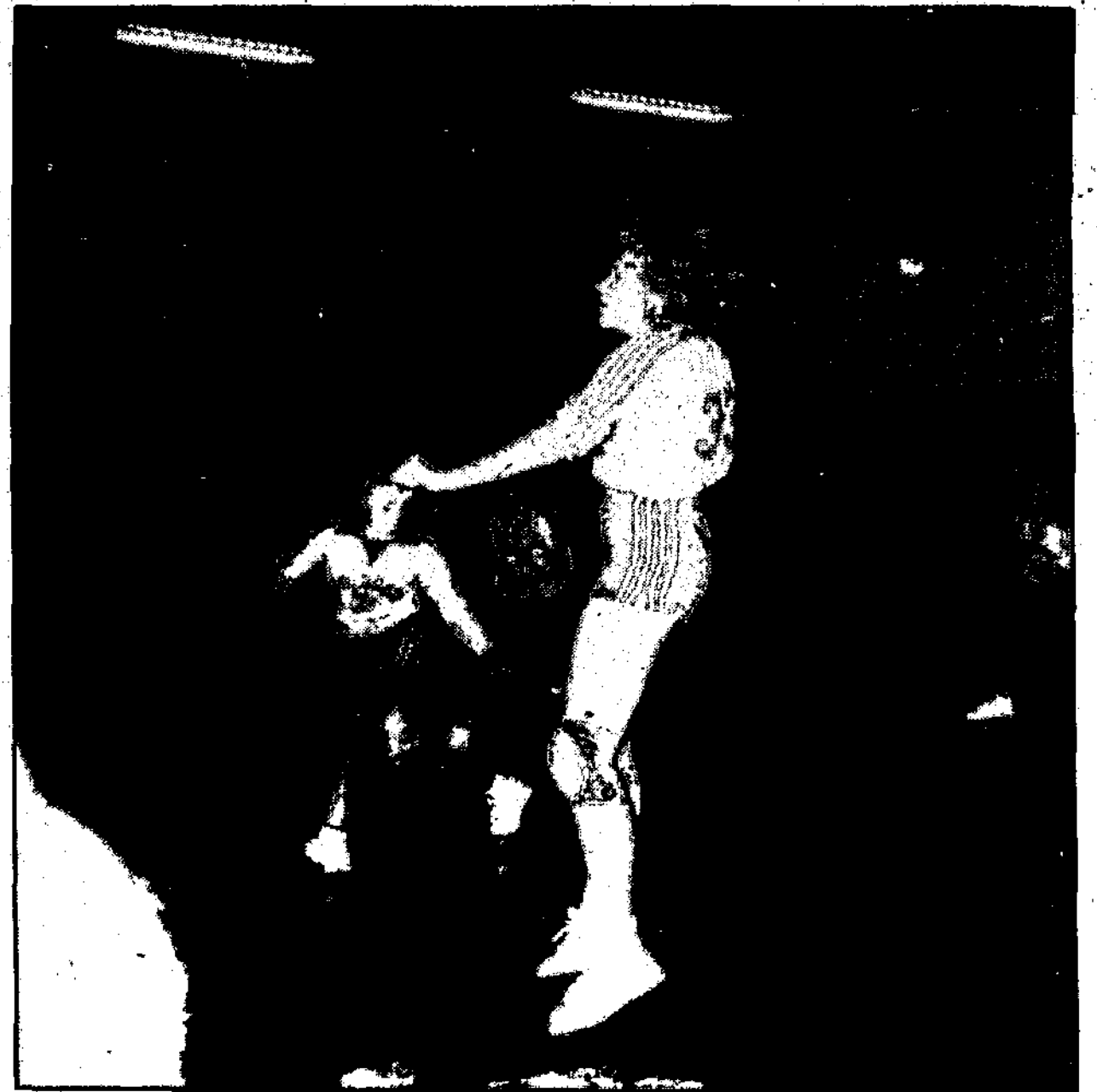
Despite the loss, Arthur has high hopes for the Warriors against Tularosa.

Stacy Mobley and Mikki Roller each served seven points in the first set for Ruidoso. Shawn Foerstner had seven serve points in the second set.

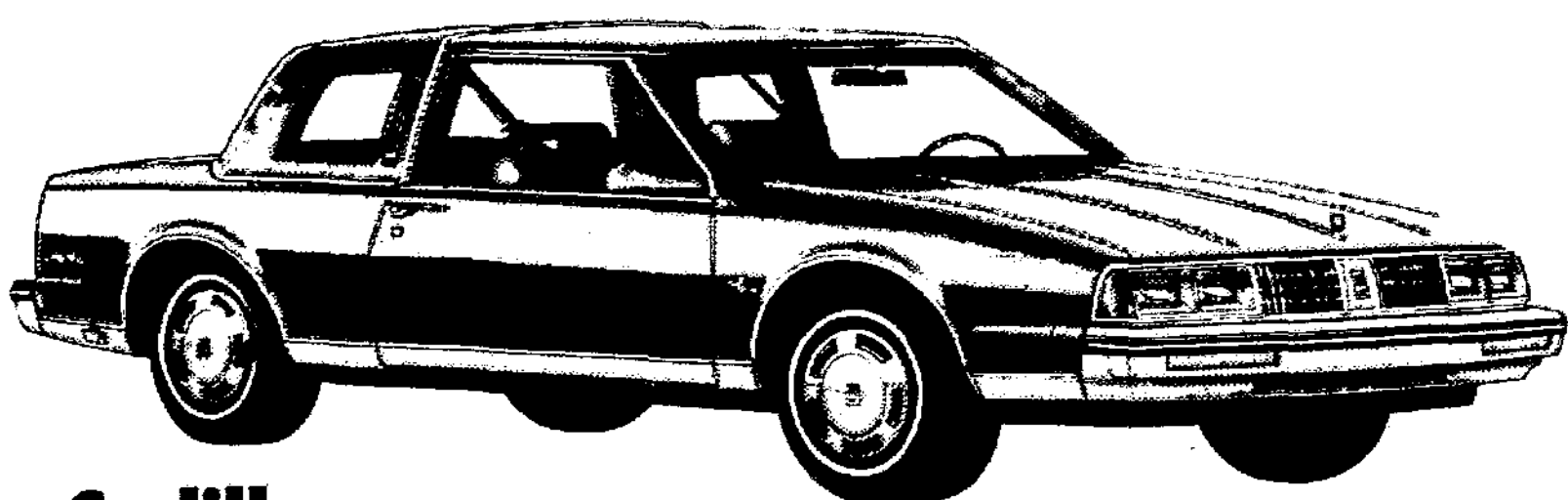
Despite the defeat, coach Jim Hofstad was pleased with some of the things he saw.

"The freshmen were especially impressive," he said. "The jvs look promising."

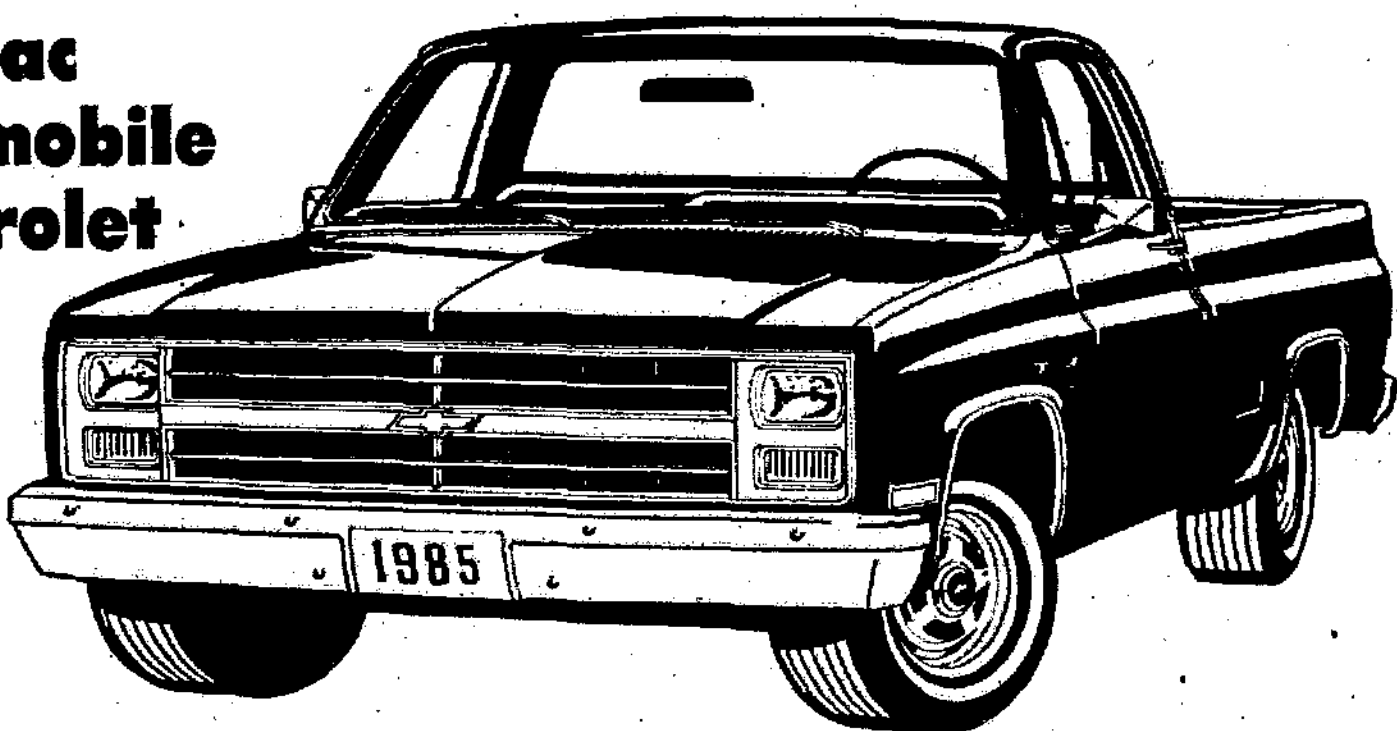
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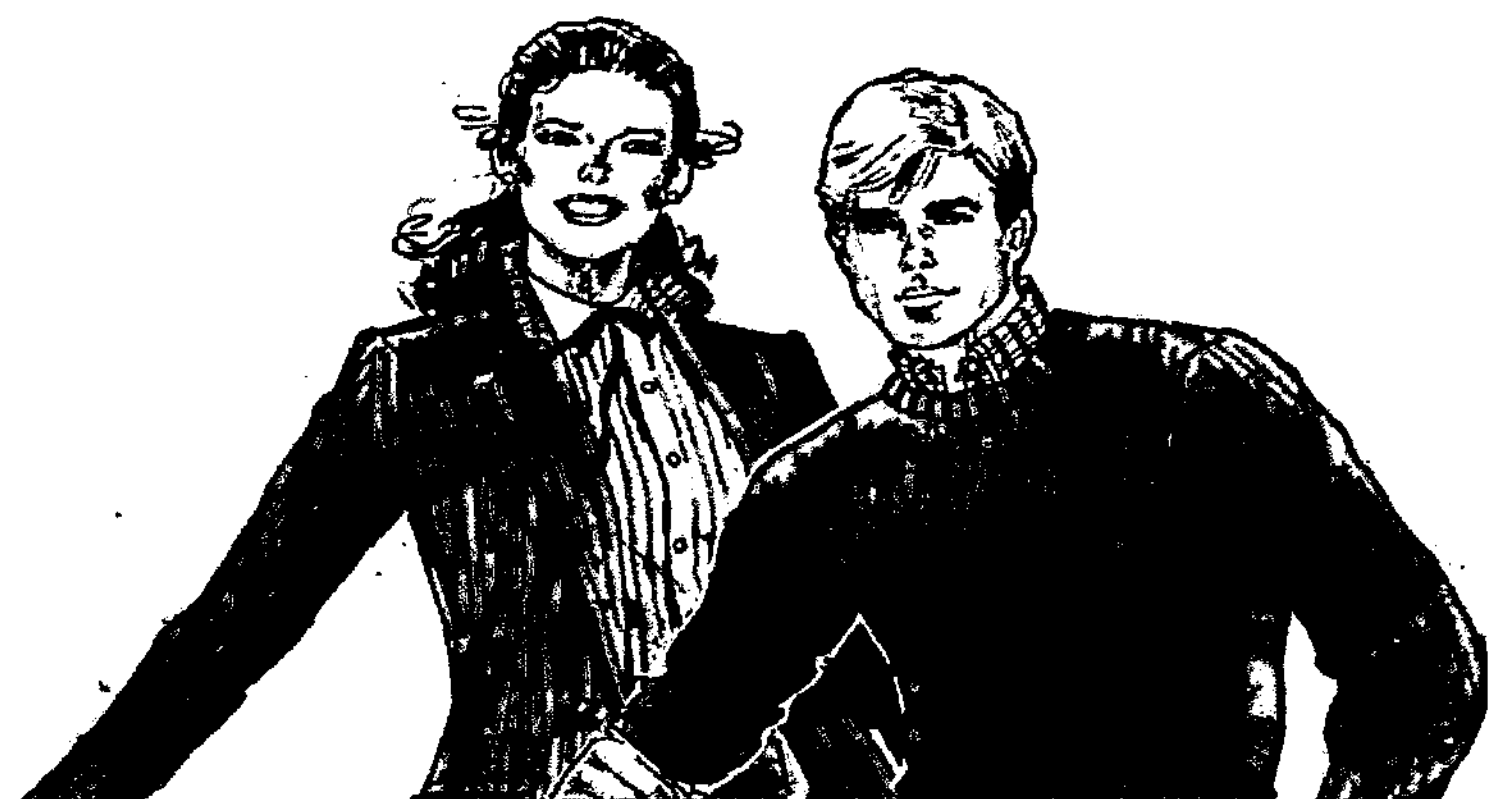

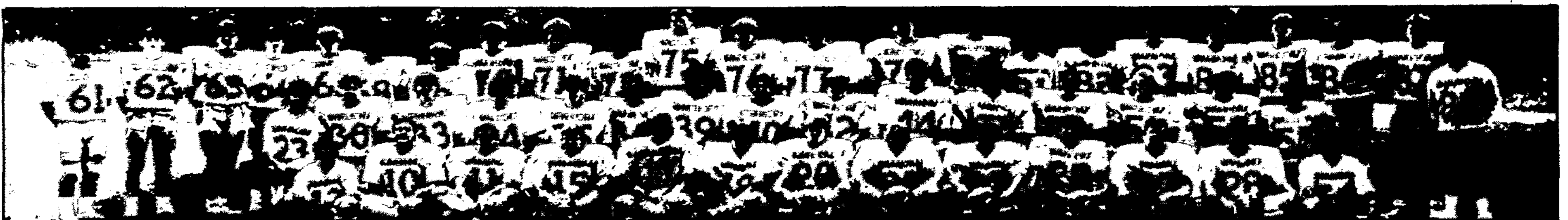

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Jockey designs breakaway boot

Veteran jockey Johnny Lewis weathered the exciting and often dangerous life of riding horses for 20 years, sometimes witnessing himself and other riders getting hurt by everything from falling horses to being dragged by a foot stuck in a stirrup after falling from a horse. Then Lewis decided to try to do something about the element of danger in the Sport of Kings.

So spawned the invention of the "breakaway boot."

Lewis said his invention came as a result of the precarious situation jockeys can find themselves in when they fall from a running horse and are then dragged by a foot

stuck in a stirrup. Lewis, who has been dragged by horses several times, said he saw the need for a riding boot that a rider can break out of if in trouble.

Around 1,800-pound horses clad with steel horseshoes, being in trouble can be dangerous. Lewis, a Ruidoso rider since 1971 "off and on when I wasn't busted up," listed a host of injuries he has suffered as a rider, resulting in broken ribs, a steel pin in an ankle, concussions, broken hips and now-plastic shoulders.

The breakaway boot looks, at first glance, just like any other boot. But close inspection of the back seam of the boot reveals a heel-to-calf split in the leather held together by industrial strength

Velcro.

Lewis said the material holds the boot together under normal circumstances. Under the strain imposed by a rider who is caught in a stirrup, though, the boot back peels open, releasing the rider.

Jockey Lewis reported that he has tested the boot, taking falls from a horse after intentionally trapping a foot. Lewis said horseman Wes Smith opened his El Paso, Texas, ranch to him and furnished a horse for the testing. Lewis said the boot worked perfectly during each of three test falls.

Lewis has worn the custom-designed boots all year, during which he broke 18 colts. He reported that the boots hold up well even in wet conditions.

Lewis said the Tony Lama Corporation built the prototype boots at his request. Lewis has secured the patent on his invention and intends to spread word of his creation.

Lewis said he will hire a major boot manufacturer to construct a number of the boots. Then Lewis intends to sell the boots to other riders at his cost to promote the idea of the breakaway.

"It's just to make it safer for the riders," Lewis stressed. The jockey said such boots can be designed for all types of riders, including racetrack jockeys.

The rider said the boot replaces the need for kick latches on exercise saddles, designed to release a trapped rider. Lewis said the "obsolete" latches, which are prone to premature release, are often wired shut by riders and so are completely ineffective.

Lewis said he has invested three years and \$50,000 in his project so far. He said he has taken on the project personally, even though hand-some offers to buy the patent have been made, because he feels the project must reach fruition.

"This I don't want shelved," he said. "Racing's been a lot for me... I want to give something back. I had to, it was an idea."

Montgomery Ward catalog store to close

The Ruidoso Montgomery Ward sales agency (located on Sudderth Drive, near Ben Franklin) will close sometime around the first of the year as Montgomery Ward phases out its entire catalog division.

According to Tom Gandy, owner of the Ruidoso sales agency, there are approximately 1,300 privately owned Ward's sales agencies around the country, all of which will be forced out of business.

During the first part of this year, Wards closed all its company-owned catalog stores and the catalog desks in its retail stores. However, agents were assured that the closures would not affect the independent agencies, said Gandy, who attended a June marketing meeting in Denver.

Gandy said he was told he had

nothing to worry about, as Wards found the independent sales agencies and telemarketing divisions to be profitable. His store celebrated their official grand opening in late July.

In early August, he got his letter of notification that Wards would close all agency outlets.

"Wards is 113 years old—we thought we were safe in investing in something 113 years old," said Merri Gandy, co-owner. The Gandys sold their home and business in Albuquerque last year to move to Ruidoso and operate the Ward's agency.

The Gandys will join other New Mexico agents in a group action suit against Montgomery Ward for damages. Gandy said that M. Frank Powell and Associates, an Austin, Texas, law firm, has filed

an \$8.5 million suit on behalf of 11 Texas stores. Gandy said he and other New Mexico agents will meet with Powell, who will help them with a legal suit.

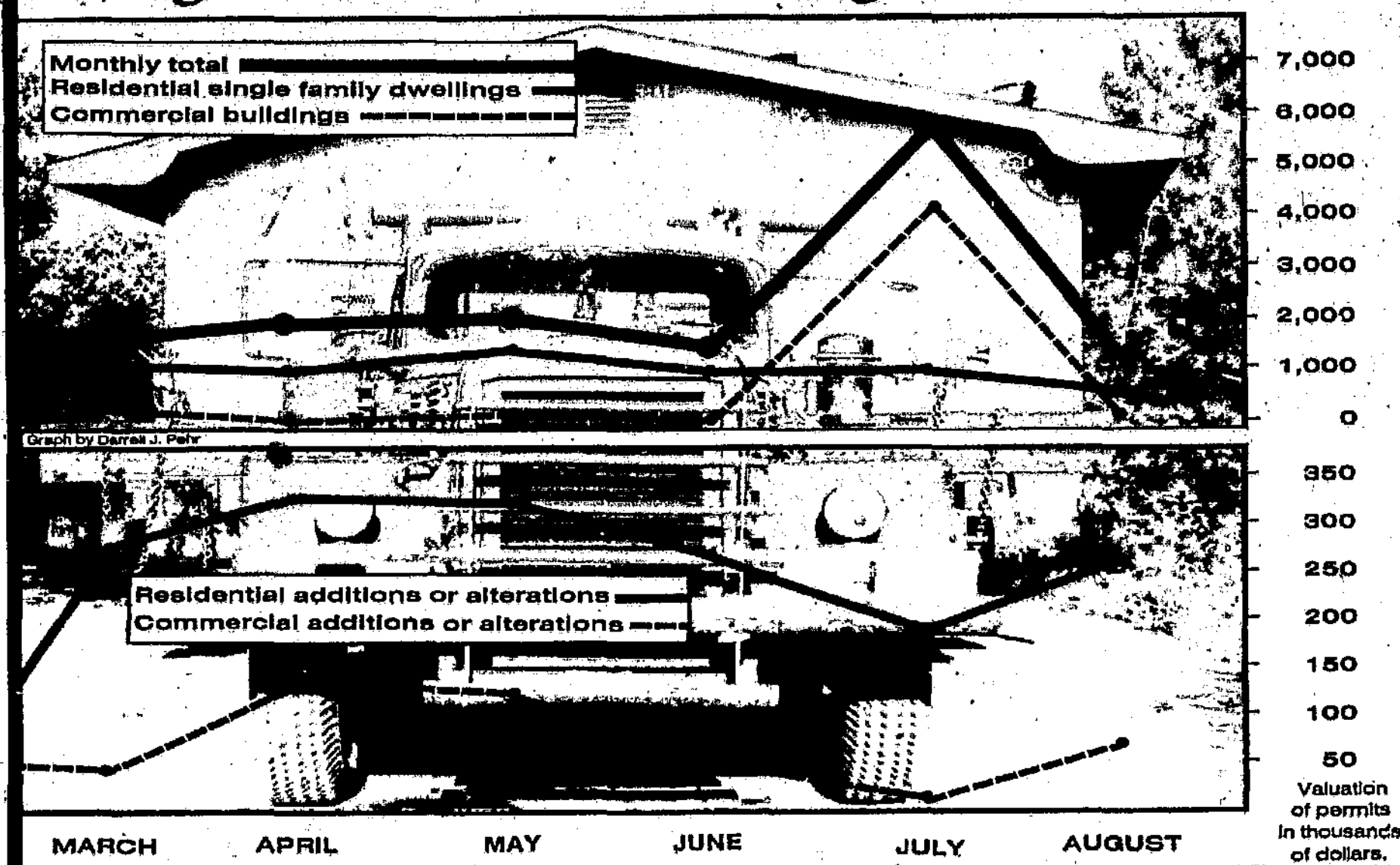
Gandy assured his Ruidoso customers that his store will conduct "business as usual" until the doors close, sometime between December 15 and January 15. He said he does not anticipate any problems with merchandise availability through the end of this year.

Merchandise may be returned to his store until it closes, and to any Ward's retail outlet after that. The Christmas catalog will come out in mid-September, he added.

Gandy said that Wards will contract with local companies to repair and service warranted appliances.

Huey protests water rights

The Village of Capitan has searched for additional water rights to the new well drilled this summer, but the search came to a halt by a protest.

The village employed Jack Atkins, of Atkins-Landfair Engineering of Roswell, to apply for additional water rights. Atkins was familiar with the well because his firm engineered the project.

In a recent telephone interview, Atkins said he applied for a permit on July 9 to incorporate the new well as a supplement to existing, unused village wells. The permit would give the village the right to pump 75 acre feet annually from the new well.

Since the amount would not provide sufficient water for the village over a long period of time, Atkins said that on July 15, he also applied for water rights credit on the effluent discharge from the sewage lagoons. The credits would come from the amount of water that is discharged from the lagoons, whether by seepage or directly from a sewage treatment facility, into Magado Creek, a tributary of the Bonito water system.

Atkins said the credits could reach a maximum of 140-acre feet per annum.

The applications, which were filed in the New Mexico State Engineer's office in Roswell, were

published. Atkins said he received a letter on August 7 from Kenneth Huey, a Capitan area resident, protesting the water rights applications.

Atkins said the protest was based on Huey's concern of how the pumping of water from the San Andreas aquifer (which the new well taps) for the village would affect the amount of water available to Lutz Ditch. Atkins said Huey owns about 25 acre feet of water rights to the ditch, which takes water from the Bonito River near Government Springs in the Bonito Valley (Lincoln). The water is used for agricultural purposes.

Atkins said that the ditch is about three miles east of the well. He said that the water for the ditch is derived from the river, which is fed by Government Springs. Atkins said he assumed the springs are fed from either the San Andreas aquifer or the Glorieta layer, beneath it.

Huey confirmed that he sent the letter in early August. He said that he has the closest water rights to the well. He said he is concerned that the drawdown from pumping the well would lessen the water available to his ditch.

Atkins said he is waiting on the issue until the village trustees make a decision. He said that the village could meet with Huey to try to resolve the protest without a public hearing.

Atkins said that if Huey does not

withdraw his protest, the village may call a public hearing. The village trustees will discuss the issue at their regular meeting tonight (Monday).

Atkins said the hearing would involve Huey and the village and an impartial party from the state engineer's office. Atkins said that the state official will render a decision based on information from both sides.

Huey said he hired a hydrologist to investigate the effects the new well could possibly have on Lutz Ditch. He said that if the reports show the well will not affect the ditch, he will withdraw his protest.

The losing party of the hearing is responsible for all costs, Atkins said. Appeal is available in district court.

Atkins said the state engineer told him that nothing could happen with the water rights applications until the protest is resolved.

Atkins said he hopes the protest is resolved soon. He said he advised the village to obtain more water rights because he thought the well is good enough to pursue.

Huey said he thought the village "needed to get a second opinion" about the well. He said the well was not tested to determine if there is enough water to serve the village over a period of time.

August building permits are sharply down

Building permits issued in August took a nosedive when compared with those issued last month and during August 1984. The valuation for all permits issued this year through August 1985 is \$16,773,283—about half of the first eight months of 1984's total of \$32,487,565.

Even though the permit dollar value is down sharply, the number of permits issued is up, with the current year's total at 443, compared with last year's total of 405; an indicator that the average permit value may be much less this year.

Permits issued for all categories during August 1985 totaled \$1,023,806, down over \$4 million from July's \$5,819,544 figure. Two big commercial projects accounted for much of July's healthy dollar figure.

The number of permits issued in August was just 36, compared with 56 permits issued in July. During August 1984, 62 permits were issued in all categories, with a total valuation of \$7,187,871.

Residential additions and alterations permits is the only category in which permits showed an increase, a continuing trend over the last few months. August's 24 remodeling permits had a valuation of \$270,442—nearly double the dollar value of August 1984's 22 permits valued at \$159,107, and a hefty dollar increase over the 31 such permits issued in July with a valuation of \$189,396.

Permits issued for new single-family dwellings numbered just seven with a valuation of \$569,672, down significantly from both July and August 1984. During July, 12 permits were issued for residences with a dollar value of \$1,139,165.

A year ago the village issued 31 permits for single-family dwellings and the dollar value was listed at \$2,919,239—nearly six times this August's valuation in that category.

Just one permit was issued in August for new commercial buildings, and the value was recorded as \$120,000—an enormous decline from last month and last year. Permits issued in that category during July numbered five with a value of \$4,008,047. August 1984 saw five commercial building permits issued with a valuation of \$4,038,415.

The remodeling trend in residential permits showed up in commercial additions and alterations permits issued as well, with three permits issued this August, valued at \$60,280—a significant increase over August 1984's two permits with a value of \$46,950. During July three commercial renovation permits were issued, with a dollar value of \$11,420.

No permits were issued either in August 1985 or August 1984 for new apartments or condos, nor for additions and alterations on apartments. During July two permits were issued in each of those categories with a value of \$115,686 for new construction, and \$354,574 for additions or alterations.

The village issued four grading permits valued at \$1,329 during August, and one foundation permit valued at \$3,432. Last August one

foundation permit was issued with a valuation of \$16,960; and during July 1985 four foundation permits were issued with a valuation of \$1,255.

Awards salute music videos

Zaniness is in store Friday on MTV when comedian Eddie Murphy returns to Radio City Music Hall to host the *Second Annual MTV Video Music Awards Show*.

Murphy, an Emmy, Golden Globe and NAACP Image Award nominee for his work in television and film, appeared as a presenter at last year's MTV awards show.

This year, the 1984 Grammy winner for Best Comedy Album of the Year is joined on the awards show by a long list of performers including Sting, Daryl Hall and John Oates, John Cougar Mellencamp, Tears for Fears, the Eurythmics and Pat Benatar. Tina Turner, Bryan Adams, Herbie Hancock, Grace Jones and David Lee Roth will be among the presenters of this year's awards.

Scheduled to be telecast live, the awards presentation acknowledges excellence in 15 categories of music video production, from the concept, to the performance, to the editing room. Two other special awards also will be presented: the Viewers Choice Award, in which viewers will select their favorites via a 900 number and Video Vanguard, MTV's own hall of fame award.

Judged by a group of about 1,700 members of the record and video music industries, nominees for the 15 other awards were selected from more than 760 videos which premiered on MTV between May 2, 1984 and May 1, 1985.

The judges, approved by the Recording Industry Association of America and the National Association of Record Merchandisers, narrowed down their choices in two rounds of voting during the summer.

Lindsey Buckingham tops the nominee list with seven nominations for his two videos "Go Insane" and "Slow Dancing." Don Henley, Bryan Adams and David Lee Roth tied in the number of nominations with six each. Henley received six nominations for his video "The Boys of Summer," Adams received six for "Run to You" and "Heaven" and Roth for "Just a Gigolo" and "California Girls." Madonna and the Eurythmics each received five nominations.
