



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Voice of a member entering Governor Anava's Cabinet meeting early this week: "Does anybody have a photograph of this Cabinet? I am not sure I shall recognize all its members."

Answering voice of an Anaya aide: "No. The latest photograph we have was taken last week, and so is no longer applicable."

Just a little joke there, folks, to lighten up your week.

Two thoughts concerning next year's election, toward which we are already moving inexorably, partly to distract ourselves from what is presently going on in Santa

-First the view of Richard Koster, longtime member of the national committee, who says the Democratic party is "morally, spiritually and intellectually dead." He goes on to add, "It's just lying there like a piece of hamburger on the griddle."

The view, please note, is not that of this columnist, but of a man who may be presumed to know his own political aggregation from the inside.

—And second, this reminder, which does come from the writer of these words: The picture a party presents to the electorate is now forming, and gets itself well set before a campaign ever begins. Campaigns, as those of us who have been intimately involved in many of them know, have a very limited impact on the outcome of elections

For that reason, what is taking place in New Mexico politically this moment may in fact have more direct effect on what the voters do by way of choice next November than all the speeches and the TV. ads and the hoopla that will take place during the actual campaign

That may also be why word now reaches us that Bruce King will delay an announcement about his decision on the governor's race till after the first of the year. Those making that prediction say he wants to see what further indictments of Democrats take place between now and that time. * * *

Why would these months see a sudden increase in the amount of advertising being done for Dura Bilt, an Albuquerque firm selling steel buildings?

Because each ad when it appears gives the company a chance to feature Bill Sego, the company's owner, and so refresh the memories of New Mexicans about Sego's existence in case he decides to get into the Republican race for governor.

Such ads, of course, are chargeable-off as a legitimate business expense, and are not counted as political expenditures.

Governor Anaya, speaking to Democratic women in Las Cruces, said the right wing is waging war on him.

That's hardly surprising. In America, the political arena is one in which those who disagree with one another's philosophy can carry on a species of war to see which prevails.

The Governor is undoubtedly accurate when he observes the right wing's goal is to achieve political realignment by winning governor's offices and legislative seats for con-



Why did they do that? Certainly we can handle our. own affairs!



Who really knows when we'll have the first snowfall of the season?

certain of the date of the first snowfall on Sierra Blanca, and then the first snowfall here in the village. Most people you talk to are looking forward to early snows on the mountain, and the resultant early start to this year's ski season. But not as many are as eagerly anticipating the first signs of the powdery mischief-maker on roads and walkways in the village.

I think we all experience a thrill, no matter how we might feel about snowfalls, at the sight of the first frosted covering of Sierra Blanca and then the view of those first magical flakes drifting down and turning everything into a dazzling sea of white.

A fun part of this time of the year is trying to guess when the time of the first snowfall on Sierra Blanca, and here in the village, will occur. Just about anyone you ask is eager to speculate on when the big event

will take place. "I had to turn my heater on last night," reported sports writer Gary Brown, as he mulled over when the appearance of the snows will be. When pressed to name the date when snow will be visible on Sierra Blanca and when measurable snow will last at least five minutes before melting in the back parking lot of The Ruidoso News, Brown finally chose October 10 as the day during which "some snow will fall within ten miles of Ruidoso.'' He predicted measurable snow in The News parking lot on November 20.

"I wouldn't be surprised if it comes a month earlier," he hedged after announcing his decision. He added that he expects an early , winter and an early spring.

Dan Storm has seen many winters from his valley ranch near Glencoe. The longtime resident said determination of when it will snow first depends on weather patterns.

that he's seen.

"You know, a whole lot depends first this year?

on the snows up north," he said, while pointing out that most of our snows come from the east as do our rainshowers. Storm said if the frequent rain pattern continues, we could be in for substantial snows.

"I kind of think it might be a snowy winter if this moisture keeps up," he said. Storm said he expects the first snows to appear on Sierra Blanca around the first of October, and snow in the parking lot by Oc-Of course, no one can actually be tober 9. But he stressed that predicting snow is no easy task.

"It's a very chancy thing," he

Village manager Jim Hine was as efficient about predicting snowfall as he is in his handling of village workings. Why choose two days when one will suffice? With little hesitation, he boldly chose November 15 as the day snow first will appear on Sierra Blanca and first will appear in The Ruidoso News parking lot.

In making his decision of the first snowfall dates, News business manager Rolland Ramos used a . combination of readings from the Farmer's Almanac, personal experience, a peek at what happened last year and stories of past years' first snowfalls he's heard from his native Ruidosoan wife, Elizabeth. He chose October 15 as the day we'll be able to see the snow on Sierra Blanca and October 20 as the day for measurable snow that lasts at least five minutes in The News back parking lot.

Ramos predicted a winter with lots of snow but relatively mild temperatures. He pointed to "extremely high humidity counts" during the past three months as evidence that the snows will be frequent. Let's hope so!

Roswell Record writer Matt Bosisio predicted Sierra Blanca snowfall by October 18 and snow in town by the week before Thanksgiving. News writer Frankie Jarrell picked October 28 for the mountain and December 6 for The Ruidoso News parking lot. News business writer Sharon Makokian predicted October 14 as the day for the first snow on the mountain and "out in the outskirts," and November 15 as the date of measurable snow in the parking lot. She went on to make an unsolicited prediction of Thanksgiving Day as the time when 'we'll have "shoveling snow."





How about oil and gas?


When President Reagan removed price controls on crude oil and gasoline in 1981, some critics predicted spiraling oil prices and \$3.00 gasoline.

However, since that time oil has dropped from \$37 to \$27 a barrel and is still falling. Gasoline went from \$1.39 to \$1.24 a gallon between June 1981 and 1985. (That meant the consumer paid less despite a 54% jump in gasoline taxes during that same four-year period.)

So too with natural gas: When the 1985 New Mexico Legislature voted to eliminate State price controls on intrastate natural gas in July for the first time in eight years, opponents predicted a price fly-up.

However, utility and producer reports indicate that natural gas prices, which had been rising steadily for several years, are now declining in New Mexico.

Although one may argue about the economic factors underlying oil and gas prices, one thing is certain: The American private enterprise system operates most fairly and efficiently when it is most free of political and bureaucratic interference. With the eventual lifting of all federal price controls, the petroleum industry will be able to rejoin other businesses in selling its products in the competitive market place.







According to McChesney, also a co-chairman of the convention com-


mittee, more than 300 people attended the conference, which he said was one of the best state conventions within the past 10 years.

In Ruidoso, McChesney is working with the Village of Ruidoso on several projects, including the new trash compactor.





Delgado leaves Fort Stanton

Mark Delgado, administrator of the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, will become the administrator of the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School in Los Lunas on October 1.

Delgado was adminstrator at Fort Stanton for almost nine years, He said that at first he was reluctant to apply for the opening at the Los Lunas facility because he was content with his position at Fort Stanton. He said the Department of Health and Environment invited him to interview for the job.

Delgado said he was interviewed before an eight-person screening committee consisting of employees from the department and outside mental health associations. Delgado said he was notified by Alfredo Santisteban, director of the Office of Institutional Coordination,

on September 3, that he was selected as administrator.

Delgado said that administration of the Los Lunas facility is "going to be a challenge." The facility employs 652 and has 355 clients. Delgado said the facility serves infants to adults, with more medical involvement than Fort Stanton.

Delgado said he will concentrate on reconditioning the staff at the Los Lunas facility, since the former administrator served there for 16 years. Delgado said his administrative methods differ from prior ones at the facility.

"Basically, I'll be starting over again," he said.

Irving Aldaz will serve as temporary administrator at Fort Stanton until the position is filled.

Delgado said he will resign from the Capitan Board of Education and the New Mexico State School Board Association, of which he is presi-

dent. He said he regrets having to leave the positions, but plans to spend more time with his family as he settles in Los Lunas.

Delgado expressed his appreciation for support from his staff and from the three governors in office during his years at Fort Stanton. He said that more than \$4 million has been spent on capital projects at Fort Stanton and the annual budget grew from \$1.9 million to \$4.7 million during his administration.

Delgado said that without the state's support, Fort Stanton would not be "in the position as an extremely viable service provider for the mentally retarded in New Mexico."

He added that he wanted to recognize and express his appreciation for all the hard work and support from his staff during his nine years at Fort Stanton.

Counselor provides services

Professional Counseling Associates (PCA), formerly known as the Lincoln County Mental Health Association, has increased its services to county residents with the addition of Dr. Birgit LaMothe to the staff.

LaMothe has joined the state-supported counseling group in a half-time position. She will see clients in Capitan each Tuesday at the Capitan Health Center and Thursday in Carrizozo. She also will take cases from the Fort Stanton, Lincoln and Hondo areas. All ses-

Lincoln and Hondo areas. All sessions are by appointment only.

Carrizozo residents may make appointments by calling the Lincoln County Health Department at 648-2412. Capitan, Fort Stanton and Lincoln area residents should call the Capitan Clinic, 354-2518, or LaMothe's home, 354-2761.

LaMothe said she met with faculty members at Capitan and Carrizozo schools and plans to meet with the Hondo faculty about services available to students. LaMothe has had nine years of experience in school counseling. She said she enjoys working with young said she enjoys working with young people because results are seen more quickly than with adults.

LaMothe said she will provide

services for school-age youths which go beyond the school counselor's range. She said she will concentrate with the students on crisis intervention and prevention. LaMothe said she tells the teachers her philosophy of an educational approach to counseling.

PCA employs two other counselors in mental health counseling and two alcohol counselors at the Ruldoso office. J.L. Wilson directs the office staff, which is located in the Sierra Professional Center.

LaMothe said PCA counselors confer with a psychiatrist weekly. Some patients need the services of a doctor, LaMothe added.

LaMothe has a master's degree in counseling from Lehigh University and a doctorate in social and educational change from Walden University. She also received family counseling training at the Community College of Philadelphia.











Convention center facilities a popular conversation topic

Ask just about anybody in Ruidoso to talk about whether or not the village needs a convention center, and the answer is almost surely an emphatic "yes!"

Consensus ends at that point. Gather 10 "armchair convention planners" and discover at least 10 different ways to obtain and

operate a convention center. Ruidoso now has an Economic Development Committee charged with forming a tourist bureau and implementing plans for a municipal convention center. That group, chaired by Village Councillor Jerry

Shaw, has had two meetings. Shaw has recently been named chairperson for a similar committee appointed (soon after the municipal committee was formed) by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. That group, the convention center-visitors' bureau steering committee, has stated that it's purpose is to research possible sites for a convention center in Ruidoso and ways to promote con-

ventions here. The chamber committee and the village committee apparently share the same purpose and will be doing the same things, but since both committees are still in the organizational stages, no direction

has been established for either yet. Several private groups are following the same track as the two new committees.

During an informal coffee gathering at a local bank last week, Ed Hyman and Mike Mulholland talked of their two separate groups' plans and dreams for the future of Ruidoso, including two kinds of convention facilities.

Mayor George White, Village Councillor William A. "Dub" Holt, Bill Dunn, Larry Simon and Tom Payne shared in the lively discussion on promoting Ruidoso, getting tourists here and providing something for them to do while for Ruidoso's economic health. they're here.

Hyman revealed that he is a member of a group that is negotiating for land on which to build a coliseum-type convention center suitable for a variety of activities that will bring visitors into Ruidoso.

"We just think it's essential in the community, and we're trying to get it done," said Hyman.

Hyman and his coffee buddies reminisced of past trade shows and bemoaned the fact that the village has no suitable place for a huge motorcycle trade show to enhance the annual motorcycle festival.

"How many tourists would be in town this weekend without the motorcycle festival?" asked Hyman. He said he knew of at least 20 special interest groups that would have events in Ruidoso if a suitable place were available.

The facility being planned by Hyman will be a large metal building, "maybe even with open sides at first" and with plenty of parking. He said it will be suitable for trade shows, rodeos, roping events, horse shows and, of course, the motorcycle festival.

"We're only looking at 5,000 seats," said Hyman, who added that plans include horse stalls as well as bleachers.

"We're a horse community ... our trade territory is horse oriented," added Hyman, who stressed "horse-type" events. He said one key to a successful venture will be to offer events that people want, like roping, which he said draws 10,000 people into San Angelo, Texas, once a year.

Hyman didn't reveal where the coliseum will be located, but confirmed that he and four others are negotiating for the 20-acre tract.

"Let's face it—the place to put a convention center is out at the (current municipal) airport," said Holt. He agreed that getting visitors into town in large numbers is important

"We can have more than one (center)," said Mulholland, who has well-developed plans of his own that include a convention center. He is president of the Ruidoso & Territorial Narrow Gauge Steam Railway Company.

The recreational railroad planned by Mulholland's group is designed to include, besides a four-mile steam railway ride, a combination shopping mall/depot, a historical village, a theme park and a hotel

with convention facilities. Mulholland agrees that a convention center is vital to the tourism industry, but he stresses the importance of "giving them something to do when they (tourists) get here.

"It's got to be done by private enterprise," added Mulholland, who said control of the railroad company will remain with locals. That combination of free enterprise with local control is why Mulholland is convinced his dream will become a reality.

"It could happen tomorrow," said Mulholland enthusiastically, displaying pictures of the proposed hotel and convention center. As soon as the stocks are sold, construction can begin, said Mulholland, who calls himself "a railroad nut."

"We needed it 10 years ago," said Hyman. "The train is a natural, but we don't need two separate units 10 miles apart," he added.

first incorporated by the State of New Mexico since territorial days, will be able to locate the depot almost anywhere in Ruidoso because of eminent domain. He is determined to keep it within city limits in order to strengthen the village tax base. He said the railway will employ about 200 people, another enhancement to the

economy. "You and I talked about this when I was mayor in 1976," White reminded Mulholland. He compared the concept to a railroad in Chama.

Careful planning and public input will be needed before the railroad and auxiliary attractions begin, said Mulholland. The railwayconnected convention center will contain about 10,000 square feet, he said, enough to hold about 700 people.
"About 70 to 80 percent of conven-

tion business could be accommodated," said Mulholland quoting various convention studies available.

All agreed that the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will soon boost village tourism. They reiterated that Ruidoso must have the means to get people here and then provide some kind of entertainment.

"I'm looking for something with a little pizzazz," said Hyman enthusiastically. Since several men mentioned a tight economy, Hyman

Mulholland said the railway, the said Ruidoso should go after the "upscale people ... the ones that are going to Vail."

Recalling the 20 or so groups he knows of who could bring from 3,000 to 10,000 into the village for special events, Hyman encouraged listeners to imagine that only 200 exhibitors came to a trade show on some quiet weekend, and each exhibitor brought one more person.

Hyman further said to figure those 400 people would stay five days, and if each one spent only \$100 per day during the visit, that would be \$200,000 spent in Ruidoso. If the turn-around was figured at five times, instead of the standard seven, he said that would be a million dollars.

"It's strictly a numbers game," said Holt.

The men all agreed that money appropriated by the village for a tourist bureau should be used to "get people here."

Hyman said that even without convention facilities, the village should get the message out to Texans who are sizzling in 100 degree weather that Ruidoso is "cool, relaxing, quiet and peaceful."

"We don't have an exclusive on that," said Mulholland, but Hyman reminded him that even if we only get 1,000 visitors in a month like October, that would be a benefit.

"There are people in San Antonio (Texas) who haven't even heard of Ruidoso," said Hyman.

Another aspect of tourism and a convention center to be considered is the overall attitude of the community, said Hyman, stating his approval of what he terms "enlightened self-interest."

He explained that we need to bring people here to make money. "You've got a bunch of people who remember what it was like 20-25 years ago and they want it to go back like that," speculated Payne. "Then there are people like

metropolis," he added.
"I really don't want it (Ruidoso) to go back like it was," agreed Hyman, remembering the days when Ruidoso "wasn't a prosperous community.

"I don't want it to be a New York City," he added.

Hyman hopes to extend the tourist season by providing a facility for special events throughout the year. He reminded listeners that racing lasts just 16 weeks a year and skiing about 10 weeks. Few businesses anywhere could survive on just 26 instead of 52 weeks of business a year, he said.

Mulholland, too, has visions of extending the tourist season with his railroad and related attractions.

"Ruidoso is just one big shopping mall—it just doesn't have a roof over it, and it doesn't have enough customers," said Hyman.

"We have to find the customers or close the mall," he said.






