

Airport report prefers Site B

The Environmental Assessment (EA), long-awaited as the official go-ahead for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, was made public Thursday, November 14, the same day members of the Ruidoso Airport Liaison Committee were in Albuquerque to meet with representatives of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

'The implementation of the replacement alternative at Site B on Fort Stanton Mesa is the FAA preferred alternative," was the announcement contained in the inchthick document, prepared under the direction of the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Aviation Administration

Besides a thorough review of the four alternatives considered during the EA research and investigation.

at Site A on Fort Stanton Mesa, expansion at current site and elimination of the airport.

Details for rejecting the no action, expansion and elimination alternatives are explained in the EA. Environmental consequences for all alternatives are also contained in the document.

Positive impacts of the replacement alternative include "increased opportunities to view a highly scenic landscape, more intensive use of the existing airport site, improved air travel opportunities to the region and opportunities for substantial regional economic development," according to the EA.

EA investigators discovered a specimen of an endangered plant species, Kuenzler's Hedgehog Cactus, just outside of the southern boundary of Site B. Even though the plant is not typical of the Fort Stan-

continues the report.

On the positive side, the EA stated that moving the airport from its current site would eliminate noise impacts there and "allow more space-intensive commercial/residential land use of the existing airport land, the last prime developable site near Ruidoso."

The future of that land was the topic of a Thursday meeting between the Airport Liaison Committee and Bill Howard of the FAA. John Underwood, village attorney, serves as chairman of the committee, but was unavailable for comment late Sunday.

Ruidoso Village Councillors Rick Evans and Bill Karn were present at the meeting along with Frank Potter, assistant village manager. Tim Morris, Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager; Jerry Trujillo. environmental specialist with FAA; and Howard "The village has a few options," said Karn, who added that the meeting basically concerned what Ruidoso is expected to put into the new airport. Karn said several options were discussed that will now be presented to the governing body Karn said the FAA has a policy under which the village is expected to sell the current airport land at current market value and dedicate funds from that sale to the building of the Sierra Blanca Regional Anport. Karn stressed that the requirement is a "policy" rather than federal law "They (FAA officials) basically indicated that they're ready for usto formulate a plan to dispose of the land (current airport site)," said Evans Sunday Evans indicated the next step

that an appraisal of the current airport lands is the next step for the village.

"They're (FAA) expecting us to come up with fair market values, he added.

The EA listed anticipated costs for replacement of the current airport at \$18,205,000 for Phase I, \$12,123,000 for Phase II and \$18,913,000 for Phase III.

Karn said that the village is expected to pay a certain percentage of those costs, with the FAA paying for the rest. He explained that for some kinds of construction and equipment the village will pay as little as 10 percent, and in some cases the village will be expected to pay as much as 40 percent

"We want to make sure that we're allowed to fast-track the construction on Phase I," said Karn, adding that village officials may need help from state and federal elected officials in seeing that "discretionary funds are free flowing



Lincoln County Clerk Fran Siddens has been notified by the Attorney General of New Mexico (AG) that allegations made by two Lincoln County residents "contain no information upon which a criminal investigation could be based."

Stephen Westheimer, deputy attorney general, notified Secretary of State Clara Jones in a letter dated September 17, that "we see no reason at this time to conduct an investigation of alleged violations of voter registration procedures in Lincoln County.

"On the other hand, it is possible that certain administrative procedures may not have been fully followed by the Clerk's office," the letter continued.

Westheimer concluded that an investigation would result in "an un-

Lincoln County Clerk Fran Sidens has been notified by the Atbrney General of New Mexico Siddens.

On August 10, Coleta Elliott and Charlotte Jarratt, Lincoln County residents, reported to the Secretary of State that voters were "encountering obstacles in registering, becoming deputy registrars and in obtaining forms needed to register voters."

Jones reported the charges to the AG, and also sent a representative from her office to investigate activities in the Lincoln County Clerk's office.

Siddens denied the charges in an August 13 letter to the Secretary of State. When contacted by phone Sunday, Siddens said she "was not surprised at all to receive the (Westheimer) letter,

"There was nothing to the allegations," she added.

Jarratt, in a telephone interview Sunday, said she has received no official notification from the Governor, the Secretary of State or the Attorney General.

"It's still hanging," said Jarratt, who added that "I'm still waiting to hear from them ... that's who my contact was with."

Hoyt Clifton of the Secretary of State's office confirmed that a procedural investigation was conducted in the Lincoln County Clerk's office, however he was unable to comment on the results of that review. Jones was unavailable for comment.

Siddens said that Tony Armijo of the Secretary of State's office visited her office in August, but said he came at her request.

"Advertising co-op (cooperative) money should be a challenge to cities and the private sector," said Bob Gold, Secretary of Economic Development and Tourism, Saturday during a reception in his honor

Ed Jungbluth, the state's liaison to the advisory group, reported the discussions to Gold, who met with commission members and squelched any further moves in that direction. Gold said members were very cooperative when he explained his

the position.

"I think co-op advertising could work more effectively than it does," remarked Gold, as he issued his challenge for every business in the state to participate in promoting tourism.

"I don't care if they just write a \$10 check," said Gold. Funds for advertising and promotion would "double or triple overnight if the private sector would take this challenge," he stated emphatically.

Gold said he was impressed with Ruidoso's plans to target specific markets in advertising and promotion, adding that individuals in the private sector have been waiting for leadership in that very area.

"Ruidoso does a good job," noted Gold, who added that not all cities are targeting markets as well as they should Gold, who has been in his present position just over a month, served as an executive assistant to Governor Toney Anaya for two years. He was pleased to receive the governor's appointment.

"It's something I really wanted to do," Gold noted.

Gold served for 11 years as executive director and lobbyist for the New Mexico Retail Association, and also has worked as an administrative aide to the Attorney General.

Before entering government service, Gold said he was in public relations and the radio business.

With just 14 months left to serve, the secretary has set a personal goal of getting "every business person in this state to realize that tourism and economic development are vital to New Mexico."

The New Mexico State Corporation Commission has authorized Continental Telephone Company of the West (Contel) to increase its monthly telephone rates beginning November 1.

This increase is in two segments:

0:30-5:30


- A 10% increase in rates for all in-state long distance calls originating in Contel serving areas, and for all WATS, private line and foreign exchange service, and
- (2) A \$4.00 per month surcharge on the basic monthly service rate.

Contel's State Telephone Services Manager, Charles Ferrell, said, "For the time being, the revenues derived by the increase in basic monthly service rates will be held aside by Contel and are subject to refund following a full review by the Corporation Commission at a later date."

The Commission's rulings were made in the course of its investigation of independent company settlements in New Mexico—an investigation prompted by the certain entry of competition in the telecommunications industry in New Mexico following recent actions by the Federal courts, the Federal Communications Commission and the New Mexico State Legislature.

In its August 6, 1985 Interim Order in this investigative proceeding, the Commission eliminated the long standing practice of pooling instate long distance revenues derived by all telephone companies in the state and distributing funds back to the local telephone companies to help pay part of the costs of local service. This practice was called a "settlements process" and was used to help keep local service rates low.

In its Interim Order ending the settlements process, the Commission said, "The current toll pooling and settlements process is inconsistent with and detrimental to the competitive toll market which exists and will continue to grow in New Mexico." The Order further states, "This Commission has recognized that the pressure for cost based telephone rates in the presence of competition is inexotable and finds that the present settlement process does not conform to the competitive realities of the toll market."



The Commission recognized in its Interim Order that termination of the settlements process would deprive local telephone companies of revenues upon which current rates had been set. The rate increases granted to Contel are designed to allow Contel to recoup those lost revenues.

Similar increases were granted to General Telephone of the Southwest and Western New Mexico Telephone Company.

Contel provides telephone service in Rio Arriba County in northern New Mexico and in the Ruidoso and Truth or Consequences areas of the south-central part of the state.

SANTA FE—The political pollsters oversold their product.

It is as though, once they get used to the TV lights shining in their eyes, their scholarly objectivity goes out the window.

Reason for making that comment now is the miserable job they did on all Albuquerque's commercial television stations during the recent mayoral race in that big city.

mayoral race in that big city. "Miserable" in that sentence doesn't refer to the fact that they gave an implied prediction that turned out to be wrong; anybody can make that mistake. What it means is that, by suppressing information that the listening public should have been given, they put forward a product that is essentially phony.

If they had been advertisers, we could have them up on charges of violating "truth in advertising" laws.

We can pass over in silence the fact that some of us old-fashioned fuddy-duddies who still believe in free will are not at all sure their probability theory applies in all its rigor to human beings and their actions. We don't even have to argue from that position in this discussion.

It's enough to say that they present their numbers, or allow them to be presented by others, as though they designate what numbers normally do, a quantity that is measureable and has been measured. Most of us, to put it bluntly, take figures to mean something with exactitude, as in "I only have \$48 left in the bank."

That's not what these kinds of pollsters mean by their numbers at all.

Far from indicating something definite, the figures they share with us represent, not an exact point, but a whole range of possibilities. Because they do, it is incumbent on these people to make certain explanations—but how many of them do?

When did you last hear a TV newscaster point out that these statistics are at best merely probable? That they are valid only for the day on which they were arrived at? That there is only a 90 percent chance of their being accurate, no matter how much else is true? minus four points," or maybe "six points." But when did you hear one of them explain what that means—if indeed they know themselves?

Instead they sit and tell us, accompanied by colorful graphics to make the message all the more impressive, that Candidate A "leads" with a rating of 50 percent, while Candidate B "trails with only 40 percent, and 10 percent of the voters are still undecided."

Conclusion: Candidate A is winning-right?

Wrong: Maybe he is, and maybe he isn't.

If this survey has that particular six percent plus-or-minus factor (because of its size), what we have just been told actually means Candidate A's rating is somewhere between 44 and 56 percent, not the flat 50 we have been told. Candidate B likewise has a range of support not an exact rating; his support could be anywhere between 34 and 46 percent. As for the undecided voters, they may be as many at 16 percent of the pool or as few as four percent. Now take a second look at what

Now take a second look at what that says about the candidates. The man you were told led with 50 percent may in actuality only rate at 44 percent. His opposite number, who you were assured was losing at 40 percent, may on the other hand have the support of 46 percent of those questioned—in which case it is he, not his opposition, who is likely to win.

In Albuquerque's recent race, for instance, what the pollsters should have been saying right up to the final minute was simply that it was statistically as probable that one of these men would win as it was the other would—in other words, they didn't know who the winner was likely to be. Instead, all three stations, through their pollsters, made predictions, and all three stations were wrong.

They could have been spared that embarrassment if they had only leveled with the audience fully from the start. Instead, they—or at least the stations' managements—want to fatten the size of their audience by giving us the impression they know something they do not know at all.



Commissioners show concern for county history

The need for the preservation of historic sites and records in Lincoln County was stressed to the Lincoln County Commissioners at their regular meeting in Carrizozo Tuesday.

In response to the need, the commissioners accepted sponsorship of the non-profit Lincoln Heritage Trust on an application for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). The grant will create a comprehensive plan for the restoration of historic buildings at Fort Stanton.

Steve Massey of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District and Rich Reese, representing the trust, reviewed the grant application. Massey, who helped prepare the application, said the overall plan for Fort Stanton is in two phases—historic preservation and the acquisition of funds, and the economic development of the area, working with the Fort Stanton Training 'School and Hospital and the state.

Reese said the hospital does not have the funds to maintain the unused buildings. The trust hopes to prevent the demolition of the buildings at the fort, the only existing pre-Civil War facility in New Mexico.

"If we lose Fort Stanton we lose tremendous history for the state," Reese said.

Because of the impact from the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, Massey said there is a need to plan for the unknown future use of the state lands around Fort Stanton and to create a buffer zone between commercial development and the historic area if needed.

Donald Lavash, representing the New Mexico Record Center and Archives, told the commissioners that Fort Stanton was first constructed in 1855. Lavash said the Lincoln County area has received too little attention on its historic past.

Lavash, who wrote the New Mexico history book currently used in junior high level instruction, researched Lincoln County history while writing his soon-to-be published book on Sheriff William Brady of the Lincoln County War era.

Lavash, historian at the center, was at the meeting to present three micro-films of the original Lincoln County territorial records to county clerk Fran Siddens. The territorial records, according to Lavash, date from 1876-1912 (when New Mexico received statehood).

Lavash said that the deterioration of the original documents, stored for years in the courthouse basement, prompted his center to offer the microfilming process free of charge to the county. He said the microfilming is available to all the counties within the state. Lavash assured the commissioners that the original records will be returned to the county when the microfilming is completed.

Lavash commended Siddens for her efforts to index and preserve the documents. Lavash added that the counties which do not adequately preserve their territorial records face the possibility of having those records taken to the center for storage.

In April 1869, Lincoln County was incorporated. Before then, the area was part of Socorro County, Lavash said. After incorporation, Lincoln County encompassed the southeastern quarter of New Mexico.

Also on Tuesday, the commissioners approved the proposed Sierra Blanca Airport Improvement Fund's 1985-86 budget. The budget included expenditures for capital outlay, professional services, construction, administration and contingencies totaling \$8,961,600. Anticipated receipts are from grants from the Federal Aviation Administration and the state of New Mexico, totaling the expenditures. The projected 1986-87 budget was listed as \$6,656,600.

The discussion prompted the commissioners to direct county attorney Steve Sanders to meet with attorney Gary Mitchell, representative of the Carrizozo-Capitan Gas Company, to make a contractural easement agreement. The agreement will specify where and how deep gaslines are to be installed along county roads.

Erineo Vallejos, manager of the company, told the commissioners that a four-inch; high-pressure line north of Capitan was uncovered by the county road grader. Mitchell said the pipe is the main transmission line to Capitan, Carrizozo and Ruidoso.

The commissioners agreed to halt maintenance on the road until they could view the situation and have it corrected.

In other county business, the commissioners:

—Approved a letter of cancelation of an agreement between Lincoln County and Stephenson Ranch, Incorporated, closing Water Canyon road.

---Approved a joint-powers agreement with Otero County concerning the use of surface and underground waters within New Mexico.

-Approved the closure of a roadway between lots 1 through 5, Block 2, and lots 1 through 5, Block 3 in the Clara A. Skinner Tract, on the recommendation of the road review committee.

---Approved the closure of part of county road A-034, on the recommendation of the road review committee. Phil Kirk of the Bureau of Land Management protested the closure because of the lost access to pany of El Paso, Texas, and approved the request for bids for two more lease-purchased articulated graders.

-Appointed Lydia Krupicka, Sterling Badger, Robert Boverie, Kay Dennis and Rich Seeley to the Lincoln County Lodger's Tax Committee.

-Designated three successors for each commissioner in case of enemy attack. Bill Elliott designated Jeff Elliott, Mickey McGuire and Ken Cole. Nosker designated Dennis Nosker, Curtis Payne and Bob Miller. A.W. Gnatkowski designated Pete Gnatkowski, John Hightower and Ernest Lueras.

-Approved lending an unused flat-bed trailer, formerly used as a bridge, to the city of Alamogordo to be used as a bridge over the Rio Bonito.

-Approved the engineering services agreement with Joe Shain of Pajo Technical Services, with a two-to-one vote. Nosker voted no because he said he had "no confidence in his (Shain's) opinion,"

-Approved a budget increase in the general fund for an insurance payment for damages to a radio transformer.

-Directed Sanders, after an executive session, to write a letter to Mitchell, representing Lewallen-Hobbs Excavation, road contractors for Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates Subdivision. The letter will state that the top two inches of the road base course in the subdivision complies with county specifications and that the road does not meet county road widths and requires widening in areas designated by the county engineer. -Approved the October Treasurer's report and the payroll and warrants. Lincoln County employees, elected officials and guests are invited to the annual Christmas Party, starting at 6:30 p.m. Friday, December 6, at the Carrizozo Coun-try Club . School receives computer funding

Capitan Elementary students are excited about the computers coming to their classrooms. Thanks to an appropriation of \$1.1 million from the 1985 state Legislature to assist school districts with the purchase of microcomputer hardware and software, the Capitan school district will have \$43,522 to spend.

The method of selecting school districts to participate in the pro-

gram was a competitive process of reviewing applications and proposals. Districts which demonstrated the greatest financial and programmatic needs, with comprehensive plans for computer education, received the highest consideration. Out of 88 school districts eligible to apply for the funds, 65 districts submitted proposals to the state.

The Capitan school district received funding on the basis of their proposal. Capitan Elementary Principal Jerry Newsom said he and Mecca Aldridge, Ann Dark, Mary Shanks, Mary McIlwain, Tom Trost and Sharon Darby worked together on the proposal. Also, students were polled on their needs in the classroom, Newsom said.

The school plans to purchase Apple computers for each elementary teacher and two for the junior high classes. Once the program begins, the district is monitored and evaluated by the Department of Education throughout the first year, Newsom added.



"When we came into the presence of Crucita to give her Communion. or just as a visitor, you felt the power of this lady—a person so holy and near to God-so strongly that you were lifted into a feeling of hope, of joy, of renewed faith.

"All of us are familiar with the words, 'entrance into the kingdom of God? 'into Thy hands I commend my spirit; 'now I am leaving this earth to enter Heaven,' and the many other expressions of our immortal life. To be at the bedside of Crucita made us feel these words with new inspiration, to know in our hearts that these hopes and promises are true."

Crucita, during her long illness at home, told those who came to visit her that she was waiting so that everyone would have a chance to come by before she went to meet The Lord. So it was that during the month or more of her illness, Crucita, by her devout nature and words of Christian kindness, gave a blessing to all who came to see her.

Eulogy Delivered by Granddaughter A highlight of the services, and something long to be remembered and cherished, was a eulogy for Crucita written by her granddaughter, Charlene Radtke, who read her tribute to her "beautiful grandmother."

"Our grandma was, and still is, a beautiful person to both her family and friends. Since I can remembers she always sacrificed for us all. We all know she was a very loving, caring, understanding person. She had a hard life but it was a life full of love and happiness. When I was younger I was going to write a letter to the Pope of the Catholic Church and tell him that he should make Grandma a saint. To me she was the closest person to God that I knew.

"She has lived her life as a hard worker, a good mother, grandmother, teacher, wife, and Christian. And we are happy that she is now welcomed into the Holy Kingdom of Heaven. I know that she is still looking after us and praying for us all. We should all feel grateful for all the blessings she brought us here, and that she is now one of the most beautiful angels in Heaven."

For many years "Max chapo" ("shorty Max") and I worked on the electric power lines, all the way from Ruidoso down past Hondo. Jokingly I have often told my Spanish-speaking friends that I am "el gringo pobre" (the poor gringo).

One of Crucita's great gifts was the ability to cheer you up, make you feel
