

Warriors discuss victory

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Ski team plans dinner today

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Big plays give Warriors state championship, 21-19

STATE CHAMPIONS!

Ruidoso High School's varsity football players are probably repeating those two words over and over again in their minds after defeating Silver City, 21-19, Saturday at New Mexico State University for their first-ever state AAA-division title.

The 12-1 Warriors combined a clutch defense and some big plays on offense to down the Fighting Colts and avenge their only loss of the season.

Quarterback Russell Easter connected with split end Brian Davis for two scores and another long pass that got the Warriors out of bad field position in the final quarter.

The defense forced four Silver City turnovers and was tough in the clutch.

"It's just great," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson as he was being congratulated by happy fans at the conclusion of the game. "I can't think of anything else to say."

But the win did not come easy. Ruidoso's defense rose up in the final two minutes to stop a Silver City drive and preserve the win.

After stopping a Warrior drive at the Colt 30, Silver City drove down the field behind the passing of Cameron Doan.

The Colts reached the Warrior 27 with the help of an official's call that many people questioned.

On fourth down, a pass seemed to drop out of a Colt receiver's hands but the official ruled the play was already dead.

No matter, the Warrior defense stiffened and Doan was called for intentional grounding.

That put the ball back on the 42.

With 10 seconds left and no timeouts left, Doan completed a short sidelines pass to tight end Joe Quintana but he was stopped at the 25 and time ran out.

That started a huge celebration on the Warrior side of the field, that saw the players and coaches cheered by Ruidoso fans.

Earlier in the fourth period, Warrior safety Jeff Willingham knocked down a pass for a two-point conversion that would have tied the game at 21-21.

Silver City had just scored on a 10-yard pass from Doan to Quintana that ended a 77-yard drive

in 10 plays.

The Colts led, 13-7, at halftime, but the Warriors came out in the third period and played one of their best quarters of the season.

Just two plays into the second half, Easter connected with Davis on a 57-yard pass play that tied the game at 13-13. Davis got behind two Colts at the 20 and sprinted in for the score.

Garret Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso had a 14-13 advantage.

Then the Warrior defense got tough.

In the latter stages of the third period, Ruidoso's Kyle Jameson and Matt Evans tackled the Silver City ballcarrier and the ball rolled free.

Ruidoso's Gene Mowdy recovered the fumble at the Colt five and the Warriors were in business.

Easter got two yards to the one and two plays later, tailback Michael Williamson banged over for the score.

Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso had a 21-13 edge.

Then Silver City drove for the touchdown that pulled them within two points.

Ruidoso opened the game's scoring with a 45-yard pass from Easter to Davis on the Warriors' second possession.

Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso led, 7-0, with 4:11 remaining in the first quarter.

However, the score was tied just 12 seconds later.

On the ensuing kickoff, Silver City's Robert Rydeski took the ball at the 15, cut through a hole on his right and darted 85 yards for the touchdown.

Shane Stevenson kicked the extra point and the score was tied, 7-7.

On the Warriors' next possession, Easter was intercepted at the 50. Silver City then drove 35 yards to the Warrior 15.

There, Ruidoso's defense stiffened and Silver City was forced to go for a field goal.

However, holder Mike Mares took the snap, ran to his right and threw a pass to Quintana in the end zone for the go-ahead touchdown.

Then Willingham made another big play he has become known for.

The Warrior junior blasted in to block Stevenson's extra point kick and Silver City had a 13-7 lead with 9:58 left in the first half.

Ruidoso drove to the Silver City 27 before time

ran out in the first half.

Another big pass from Easter to Davis occurred in the fourth quarter after Silver City scored its final touchdown.

Faced with a third-and-eight situation from his own 22, Easter faded back and found Davis at the Colt 35. The Warrior junior finally went down at the 31 with a big first down and more time for Ruidoso to run off the clock.

The Warriors had 280 yards total offense, 173 on four passes from Easter to Davis.

Ruidoso gained 107 yards on the ground, with Williamson picking up 86 of them on 17 carries. Easter was held to five yards in 10 carries, but his passing kept the Colt defenders off guard.

Silver City gained 272 yards total offense, 186 passing and 86 rushing.

Mares led the Colt rushers with 49 yards in eight carries and was outstanding on defense from his linebacking position.

Willingham again played a great game on defense. Besides blocking the extra point and knocking down the conversion pass, he intercepted

his 10th pass of the season.

Besides teaming with Evans to force the second-half fumble, Jameson also recovered two fumbles himself.

After the excitement of the win gradually wore down, Henderson discussed the game.

"It's definitely the biggest victory of my career," he said. "Except for their late passing, our defense did a tremendous job."

"They did a few things different, but we adjusted in the second half and our running game picked up a little bit."

But it was those big plays on offense and a ball-hawking defense that led the way for the Warriors to win their first-ever state AAA-division title.

NOTES-Ruidoso's last state title was in 1972 when the Warriors won the AA-division crown. Ruidoso also won several titles in the late 1940's and early 1950's when the Warriors were in the now-defunct C-division. Clovis won the state AAAA-division title for the fifth straight year, dumping Alamogordo, 36-12, Saturday.

Planning and Zoning members weigh comprehensive plan ramifications

No one is going to wake up one day and find out that the zoning on their land has been changed," said Ruidoso Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Commissioner Martin Rose recently.

Rose, P&Z chairman Mike Callaghan and commissioner David Smith were reflecting on progress toward a new zoning ordinance for the Village of Ruidoso. That ordinance, still in the draft stage, is part of a proposed comprehensive plan prepared by BRW, Inc., a professional planning organization.

The three explained that Ruidoso "outgrew" the 1976 Master Plan, and that prompted village leaders to contract for a new plan designed to carry the village into the 21st century.

"If we'd have followed that (the 1976 plan), we'd have been in better shape than we are now," noted Callaghan.

Rose said BRW was hired because it was felt that professional help was needed to get the new plan started.

"The document that BRW prepared is a marvelous vehicle to carry us into the year 2010," he noted.

Reviewing the zoning ordinance portion of that document has occupied P&Z for the last several months, and Rose said a great deal of progress has been made. Information in the zoning ordinance will then be applied to a land use map, he said.

Commissioners stressed that the plan will basically be for future development, and reiterated the fact that no zoning will actually be changed without going through a public hearing process.

"We're changing some of the possibilities," said Smith, who ex-

plained that although zoning will remain constant in developed areas, the zoning designations may be changed.

One proposed addition the men described was a new zoning designation for low-density mobile home neighborhoods.

Rose said the ordinance will strengthen municipal control over the placement, location and anchoring of mobile homes.

Another zone proposed in the document is a multi-family high density area to allow for low cost housing, said Rose.

Rose said the proposal addresses the central business district and adds neighborhood business zones for small businesses that service certain geographic areas and do not generate a lot of traffic.

Smith mentioned that several options will be considered for the revitalization of the central business district. Those options will be closely tied to whatever transportation plan is eventually proposed.

BRW is preparing a transportation report, and P&Z will recommend one of the options they've prepared. Plans under discussion range from eliminating off-street parking to closing Sudderth Drive.

"It's going to be up to the citizens to go to Village Hall and study the plans," said Rose. "We can only do what the people want," he added.

"Since our forest is our main attribute, we're going heavy into forest protection," said Rose. "With the forest hillside protection zone we'll have some control over what people do on the side of the mountain," he added.

The proposal includes provisions for site plans for some lots and replacement of trees over 60 inches in diameter.

For the first time the village will include the flood plain in a

municipal ordinance, said Callaghan. He said Ruidoso will spell out requirements to abide by the federal Corps of Engineers rules regarding the Rio Ruidoso.

Parking lots regulations also are included in the proposal, with parking required on lots with 14 or more spaces. Callaghan said that the state requires handicapped parking spaces for lots that size, too.

Rose said parking lot landscaping also will be proposed.

Commissioners said they're working to identify suitable areas for industrial developments. They agreed that the village economy needs industrial development, but haven't agreed upon where it should be located.

Although they aren't yet at the stage where zoning designations will be plugged into the land use map, the commissioners agreed that no more commercial zoning will be approved for the Upper Canyon.

The main consensus of the discussion was that more public input is needed to complete the zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan.

P&Z has debated more than once the effect of outside merchandising on the atmosphere of Ruidoso. Since that can be allowed to continue as it is, limited to certain times of the year or disallowed in the final ordinance, commissioners have specifically asked for citizen input on that issue.

"Send a letter or postcard to Village Hall, call or whatever," said Rose. He, as well as other commissioners, wants to know how villagers feel about the outside displays that were seen throughout Midtown during the summer.

Rose said people can expect fair and equitable treatment under the ordinance being proposed.

"We'll be asking the citizens," he added.

Last season it took the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball 10 attempts to win the Warriors' first game.

This season it took the team just two games. Ruidoso evened its season record at 1-1 with a 40-39 victory over host Portales Thursday night.

Ruidoso led most of the way before Portales took the lead with about two and a half minutes left.

However, Ruidoso's sophomore guard Kirk Ryan hit a bucket to give the Warriors the lead for good. With about 10 seconds left, the

Warriors had possession but lost the ball in the backcourt.

The Rams took over and called time out with two seconds left.

Portales tried a shot from the outside but the ball bounced off the rim as the buzzer sounded.

Ruidoso jumped off to a 13-8 first-quarter advantage and led, 23-19, at halftime.

The Warriors led, 35-27, at the end of the third quarter, before the hosts began their comeback.

Junior Carl Lueras and Ryan each had 13 points to lead the Warriors.

Ruidoso had 18 rebounds, 14 of them off the defensive boards.

"We did a good job on the defen-

sive boards, but our offensive rebounding stunk," said Warrior head coach Gene Segura.

"But these kids never quit. They just keep playing. We only played six players."

The Warrior junior varsity lost its second decision in as many tries, falling to Portales, 57-33.

Tuesday, December 10, the Warriors will open the home season, taking on Goddard. The junior varsity game will start at 5:30, with the varsity contest following it.

Some of the Warrior football players are coming out for basketball, but will not play until Saturday, December 14, against the visiting New Mexico Military Institute Colts.

Valenzuela, Yeatman lead Warrior matmen

Mike Valenzuela and Scott Yeatman came through with the top performances as the Ruidoso High School wrestling team opened the season Saturday in the Los Lunas Tournament.

Valenzuela took third in the 112-pound class and Yeatman was fourth at 119 pounds.

Ruidoso was eighth in the eight-team tournament, but the Warriors only had eight wrestlers entered in the competition. Ruidoso scored 27 points.

Valenzuela, a transfer, won three matches and lost just one.

He won his first match, 12-4, lost

his second, 7-2, won his third, 7-2, and took his final match, 4-1.

Yeatman had a 2-2 record. He took his first match, 13-8, lost his second one by a pin, won his third one, 13-5, and lost his final one, 7-4.

Jeff Schmidt at 105 pounds, Bubba Lane at 138 pounds and Clint Bob at 145 pounds each won one match and lost two. It was the first time Lane and Bob had ever wrestled in competition.

Cory Garner at 132 pounds, Brian Harris at 126 pounds and Jeff Harvey in a junior varsity 155-pound match lost their first two matches and were eliminated.

However, Garner lost to the top two wrestlers in his weight class. It was the first time Harvey and Harris had ever competed. Harris drew the defending state champion in his first match.

"I think we did all right, overall," said Warrior head coach Gerald Ames. "We're still taking it easy. We have some more wrestlers coming out from the football team."

Ruidoso will host the Roswell Coyotes in the Warriors' home opener Wednesday, December 11.

There will be varsity and junior varsity matches. The junior varsity match will start at 6:30 p.m., with the varsity one following.

Girl cagers lose three tilts in tourney

Ruidoso High School's girls varsity basketball team finished eighth in the Goddard Invitational in Roswell over the weekend.

The Warriors lost Thursday night to eventual runner-up Roswell, 54-43, were edged Friday afternoon by Goddard, 48-44, and lost a 43-20 decision to Portales Saturday.

"We played two good ball games," said Warrior head coach James Sanchez. "In the third one, we just didn't play well."

Against Roswell, the Warriors rallied from a 14-6 first-period deficit to take a 21-16 halftime lead.

However, the Coyotes converted five straight turnovers into points at the start of the third period and led from then on.

Katherine Sanchez led Ruidoso with 23 points on eight field goals and seven free throws.

Collette Waconda added six points.

Ruidoso had a late rally against Goddard and almost pulled the game out.

The Warriors trailed, 40-26, entering the final period, but outscored the Rockets, 18-8, with an effective full-court press.

Sanchez led a balanced scoring attack with 14 points.

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



Shop sells pre-owned designer clothes

Designer Secrets, a new store in The Paddock at 1009 Mechem Drive, sells pre-owned clothes for women who want to "look like a million bucks" without spending it.

The store is a second location for owner Laveda Boggs, who has had a shop in Midland, Texas, for two years. Her daughter, Alicia Hammond, manages the Ruidoso store.

Hammond sells a variety of pre-owned apparel, including furs, coats, sweaters, dresses and even- ing wear. She takes designer

Hammond keeps a file of her customers and notifies them when items of their size and preference come into the store. She also sells new costume jewelry.

Designer Secrets is open from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday.



Commission reviews Oscuro road

Road closures brought some concerned Oscuro-area residents to the Lincoln County Commission meeting Tuesday. Glen Ellison, a landowner whose property is accessed by the recently closed Water Canyon Road, protested the closure.

The commissioners decided to close the road at their last meeting at the request of the Stephenson Ranch, whose property the road crosses. The county and the ranch had a prior agreement to allow access to the road with a key kept at the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

Commission chairman Bill Elliott said the county's main concern is with Sheriff Tom Sullivan not wanting to keep the key. At a recent meeting, Sullivan told the commissioners that he did not want his department to be responsible for the key.

Ellison said the road has been a county road in the past. He requested that a 1977 court case dealing with the ownership of the road be reviewed.

The commissioners directed county attorney Steve Sanders to research the records of the case and minutes of the 1977 commission meetings to determine if the road

was legally closed. Sanders will give a report at the next meeting.

Bill Stephenson also requested a closure of another county road—C001—that crosses his ranch. Stephenson said the New Mexico Game Commission is planning a new access road to the western side of the White Mountain Wilderness area, bypassing the old road which presently is the access for the wilderness.

Some Oscuro residents objected to the closure before the new road is completed. Elliott pointed out that the road crosses some state land and cannot be closed in those sections.

The commissioners reappointed Frankie Silva, Israel Miranda and George Beaudry to a road review committee to study the closure and report back at the next commissioners' meeting.

In other business the commissioners:

—Approved the transfer of the liquor license from Tinnie Mercantile Company to the Tinnie Corporation.

—Tabled a request for \$2,237 from the Lincoln County Fair Association to fence the north side of the fairgrounds, until the association receives a written agreement from the Village of Capitan approving construction of

the fence in the village right of way.

—Rejected the bids for the annual fuel supply requirement contract and agreed to rebid with a specification that the cost of fuel be based on market fluctuations.

—Accepted the lease-purchase bid from Rust Tractor Company for two articulated motorgraders, with an option for trade-in on two old graders, and no dealer maintenance fees.

—Postponed a request by Jerry Carroll to amend the Lincoln County Solid Waste Ordinance until the next meeting.

—Approved a resolution for the closed-bid sale of a wrecked Cessna aircraft and a 1983 Chevrolet truck, which became county property after being seized in a 1984 marijuana raid.

According to police reports, Chaves swerved to avoid a head-on crash when he saw the motorcycle coming, and the cycle crashed into the side of the trailer.



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

Interment was in South Park Cemetery in Roswell. Arrangements were by Clarke's Chapel of Roses Mortuary.

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
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
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

Village Board of Appeals may disband

The Board of Appeals, Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, will ask the Ruidoso Village Council at Tuesday's meeting to disband them.

"I have enough liability, I don't need any more," said chairman Bennie Coulston, during a Friday board meeting.

Coulston said if the village governing body isn't going to take action on the board's report of dangerous buildings, the committee has fulfilled its role and should be released.

"I'm a little disappointed in the lack of direction," said Jimmy

Neeley, building inspector. "It is my understanding that the village is going to go on with it," he added.

During Friday's meeting members reviewed their actions over the past six months. They have reviewed eight cases on buildings deemed to be unsafe, notified property owners of their intent to take actions, presented those cases to the Village Council, called for bids on removing the unsafe structures and asked the council to act on the bids.

The group heard Friday that the council rejected the bids and instructed the board to "proceed with the hearings."

Since property owners have been properly notified, sometimes over a two-year period, Coulston opined that the appeals board has completed its work.

Jim Hine, village manager, told Coulston that the council wanted individual bids on the demolition proposals, and was shown that the bids were itemized by project.

"I think they (council) were a little confused," said board member Lori Griffin.

Coulston suggested that plans to set a calendar for 1986 be abandoned until further instructions are received. The board instructed Neeley to speak on their behalf at the next council meeting.

Adult Recreation Committee considers senior citizen activity upgrades

The Adult Recreation Committee for the Village of Ruidoso heard Thursday that funds approved for a directional sign for the Adult Recreation Center (ARC) were lost at the end of the fiscal year.

Bette Romans, ARC director, reported that village administrators have postponed placing a sign until more funds are available.

Village Councillor Jerry Shaw reminded the committee that the funds were available when the sign was approved, but were eventually lost when the administration failed to order the sign.

"Everytime I would mention the sign to them they (village administrators) would say they were working on it," said Romans.

Romans also reported that she was advised by administrators to include the center's lapidary equipment in a March auction, although proceeds from the sale will go into the general fund rather than the ARC budget.

Charlotte Jarratt, a visitor to the meeting, suggested that since the equipment was originally purchased with federal funds, the disposal might be accomplished another way, so that the money would return to the center.

Burdette Stampley suggested that the Village Council be petitioned to sell the equipment and return the proceeds to the center, and the group passed a motion to that effect.

Romans reported on the new transportation plan in which the van and driver are available on Tuesdays and Thursdays. She said six citizens utilized the service Tuesday and eight Thursday. She said 11 people were provided transportation to a dinner at the Elks Lodge. Romans said she had contacted local doctors and remind-

ed them of the transportation available to senior citizens needing to go to the doctor those two days.

She said members of the ARC are collecting food for the Happy Holidays drive. They have also completed a quilt on the recently purchased quilting frame, she said.

When Waldrop asked for program suggestions, Stampley, the committee secretary, expressed surprise at the change in a meeting agenda. He and committee member Verna Adams said they were expecting to discuss the newsletter.

Waldrop still wanted to discuss programming, and Stampley suggested that the center plan trips to other towns for special events such as the Albuquerque balloon festival.

Adams said the local group might also visit other centers.

Shaw told of summer field trips planned for children by the Parks and Recreation Department, and offered to find out details and report back to the committee. She said the trips didn't cost the village any money.

"The biggest hurdle is the apparent opposition of the city," remarked Stampley.

Although Shaw said that leasing transportation instead of taking the village-owned van outside the city would take care of that problem, Adams said she questioned the validity of not allowing the van to go out of town because of insurance costs.

"They don't have a break for staying in the village," said Adams. "The insurance covers it to Timbaktu," she added.

Adams also suggested a more formalized liaison with the state Agency on Aging, in order to keep up with the many activities, and

members voted to invite an agency representative to come to the next committee meeting.

Waldrop wondered what "communications," the next agenda item, was meant to cover, and was reminded by Stampley that Waldrop himself had chosen that word, since the minutes called for a discussion on the newsletter.

It was learned at the meeting that the newsletter consists solely of a monthly calendar, and Shaw suggested that an invitation to come to the center be included next time.

"It bothers me to come into the center and find nobody out there using it," said Shaw. "I'd like to see us get more for our money," she added, noting that the building, salaries and operations are paid with taxpayers' dollars.

Jarratt, after learning that 200 calendars are being mailed, wondered why they are mailed in envelopes bearing first-class postage. She suggested that the cost be cut from 22 cents to six cents each by using a bulk mail permit.

"This is what Mr. Hine (village manager) worked out for us," said Romans.


Stampley said he'll check on the bulk mailing requirements and report back to the committee.

In spite of Waldrop's suggestion that "we need to let a little time go by for reasoning and consider the pros and cons," the committee approved Stampley's motion to expand the newsletter with articles and an invitation to readers to come to the center. The group also voted to offer a prize in the newsletter.

Members then worked on a redesign for the newsletter and came up with a new format for the next mailing.

Committee member Cleve Kirby was not present for the meeting.

Please pass this along: Play it again Hall! I don't care to become embroiled in another controversy; but, not being one to back down from a challenge, here we go again! (Ruidoso News May & June 1983.)

In its attempts to save time and money to ensure the continuation of good police work in our community, the Ruidoso Police Department is again trying to adopt new policies regarding alarms in our city. However, once again Mr. Jack

Halbrooks of Mountain Alarms is protesting. (Ruidoso News 10-17-85.) This is in regard to the question of the authority of security companies to answer their own alarm calls.

In addition, Mr. Sam Vest (letter to editor 10-31-85) states "... according to the law, a licensed security company does not have any more authority than a private citizen, and that's next to nothing."

Perhaps these learned authorities should "Rules and Regulations Private Investigators Act", dated February 5, 1985. I refer to New Mexico State Statutes 61-27-9 Article B, "A private patrol operator or operator of a private patrol service within the meaning of this act is a person who for any consideration whatsoever agrees to furnish or furnishes a uniformed or ununiformed watchman, guard patrolman, or other person to protect persons or property or to prevent the theft, unlawful taking, loss, embezzlement, misappropriation or concealment of any goods, wares, merchandise, money, bonds, stocks, notes, documents, papers or property of any kind; or perform the service of such watchman, guard, patrolman or other person for any of said purposes."

61-27-9 Article C, "A person licensed as a private patrol operator only, may not make any investigation or investigations except those that are of incidental to the theft, loss, embezzlement, misappropriation or concealment of any property or any other thing enumerated in this section which he has been hired or engaged to protect, guard or watch."

Section 30: Code of Ethics; Article A, "A code of ethics for both private security management and private security employees have been adopted and area made part of the Rules and Regulations. These codes shall be disseminated to all personnel involved in the security profession and shall be complied with."

61-27-1 N.M.S.A. 1978 Rule # 1. "As managers of private security functions and employee, we pledge: I. To recognize that our principal responsibilities are, in the service of our organizations and clients, to protect life and property as well as to prevent and reduce crime against our business, industry, or other organizations and institutions; and in the public interest, to uphold the law and to respect the constitutional rights of all persons."

"II. To be guided by a sense of integrity, honor, justice and morality in the conduct of business; in all personnel matters; in relationships with government agencies, clients, and employers; and in responsibilities to the general public."

"III. To strive faithfully to render security services of the highest quality and to work continuously to improve our knowledge and skills and thereby improve the overall effectiveness of private security."

"IV. To uphold the trust of our employers, our clients, and the public by performing our function within the law, not ordering or condoning violations of law, and ensuring that our security personnel conduct their assigned duties lawfully and with proper regard for the rights of others."

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"V. To respect the reputation and practice of others in the private security field, but to expose to the proper authorities any conduct that is unethical or unlawful."

"VII. To cooperate with recognized and responsible law enforcement agencies; to comply with security licensing and registration laws and other statutory requirements that pertain to our business."

Local Regulations", "The provisions of this act (61-27-1 to 61-27-49, N.M.S.A. 1978) shall not prevent the local authorities of any city, county, or city and county by ordinance and within the exercise of the police power of such city, county or city and county from imposing local ordinances upon any street patrol special officer or upon any person licensed within the scope of this act, if the ordinances are consistent with the Private Investigators Act (61-27-1 to 61-27-49, N.M.S.A. 1978)."

A note, regarding lawsuits, all private security companies are required to retain a bond, in full force and effect, on file with the State of New Mexico, Section 5, Articles A-M. Also there is insurance, every other business (including city police) have to pay for insurance coverage.

So I suggest to Mr. Halbrooks, and to Mr. Sam Vest, to read a copy of these rules and regulations. If

either of them does not have access to a copy, or if anyone else concerned would like to see a copy, contact me at the address below.

At this point I will quote the last three paragraphs of my letter to the Editor of 6-83, with just as much, if not more meaning now than then. "In our rapidly growing community of Ruidoso and surrounding areas, I feel the Ruidoso Police Department has more than enough to keep their hands full, contending with other aspects of law enforcement without subsidizing private business, and having the taxpayers of our area foot the bill. The money saved could be used in much more needed areas."

"We in Ruidoso are very fortunate to have one of the finest Police Departments in the country, but if they are spread too thin, how can they continue to do the great job they are doing."

"If Mr. Halbrooks wants to be in the security business, perhaps he should be the one to spend money and time to do so ... It seems that every other business in our area has to function on its own, be responsible for itself, or go out of business. Why should there be an exception to the rule?"

If you're going to be in business you must accept the liabilities as well as the assets.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—We New Mexicans have done ourselves wrong—and our chickens are now coming home to roost.

Don't be misled; that isn't the prologue to another of this corner's patented roastings of Toney Anaya. Instead, it's an attempt to say we citizens ought to keep a much tighter rein on what state government is up to, in governor's office and Legislature alike.

After all, it is the combined actions of those two groups that allowed our state to slide gradually into the fiscal mess in which we find ourselves. The exact dimensions of that mess, as you may have noticed, have not even yet been ascertained. At first, we were told the state stood to go into the hole something like \$60 million in this fiscal year, but a "position paper" put out by Governor Anaya's office earlier this week speaks of \$82 million as being the possible total. That's a 38 percent jump, as you can see, in just the few weeks we have been contemplating this possibility. Who knows where it will end?

Maybe what we should do here is take another look at how we got ourselves into this unpleasant situation—or, to be more accurate, how those who run our government got us into it.

The cause that lawmakers and the Governor could have most easily corrected was the habit they developed of spending more than we take in. That's been going on for each of the last three years, which is so long a period that any sensible observer would judge there has been a massive amount of irresponsibility, and enough guilt for both legislators and administrators to share.

What those folks between them created was actually "recurring expenses" that are more than "recurring revenues." They did that, as we have said, not once but three times. Recurring expenses, as you can understand, are for things like salaries to state employees, as distinguished from, say, building a building, which is a one-time shot. In the same way, recurring revenues are from taxes or royalty payments, not from things like settlements for lawsuits, which also occur only once.

What kept us from going deeper into the hole than we have is a hap-

py run of one-time payments, of the kind we can't depend on again, and use of the reserves of untapped surplus built up in happier days.

But the root cause of the problem goes deeper. It is an overall tax structure that does not work the way such structures should. A well-designed tax program, as is immediately clear, is one that produces more money in the recurring revenue category as the number of citizens, and hence the need for recurring services, grows. That's not the kind we've got.

Our tax system depends far too much on sources that do not grow with population, and which are at present actually contracting.

Back in 1975, it was okay to have 15 percent of the annual recurring income generated by a combination of severance taxes and royalty payments. But over the years, we let other sources of revenue lag until now almost a quarter of our dependence is on these same sources. That happens at a time when demand for services is increasing (see, for example, the hue and cry for expensive "school reform") and the severance taxes and royalty payments are rapidly shrinking.

What we have to do, therefore, is "Band Aid" the problem for the last half of this fiscal year, probably by dipping into the \$22 million we still have left in unappropriated surplus and the \$82 million we have in operating reserves. That latter category is our "rainy day" money—and thanks to our Governor and our lawmakers, we now face a very rainy day.

Then we need a total revamping of our tax base to make it respond to growth in need for services so we do not have to face this same problem soon again.

Are we likely to get that kind of revamping? Now, that's the question, isn't it? And will it be what we need if it is done by the very people who got us into this problem in the first place?

You can see why this column began with a thesis that said we average citizens are going to have to force out of our elected officials the kind of action they should have been taking, but haven't, for too many years in a row.

We are the only ones who can make them do what they don't want to do, or make them do right what they want to do wrong.




