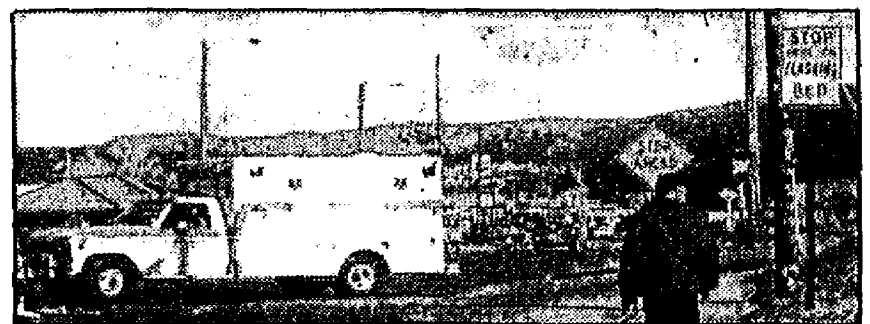

Signs limit speed, point out services

Ruidoso drivers are slowing down.

New speed limit signs have been posted on Sudderth and Mechem drives to indicate that acceptable rates of speed have been lowered from 35 and 40 to 30 miles per hour (mph). Since Mechem and Sudderth Drives also are state Highway 37, the State Highway Department placed the signs after setting the limits.

One stretch of Mechem Drive has different posted speed limits for the two directions of travel: southbound traffic is limited to 30 miles per hour from the Lela Easter Real Estate location, and on past the Sudderth traffic light in both directions; while a speed limit of 40 mph is set for northbound traffic from just past Sudderth to Alto Hill.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard A. Swenor explained that the lower speed was set for southbound drivers because of the area on the downhill side of Mechem Drive.

The new speed limit on part of Sudderth Drive has been set at 30 mph, said Swenor. The new limit

begins at Carrizo hill, he added, and continues at that rate to Highway 70.

Signs have been posted indicating that most of Sudderth Drive—from the Upper Canyon end to the 35 mph sign near the Pizza Hut—continues to have a speed limit of 30 mph.

Rates of speed within the state highway system are regulated by state law, explained state District Two engineer Lou Medrano of Roswell.

Medrano said the state Highway Department completed speed and line-of-sight studies on Highway 37 in late summer, and signed speed resolutions establishing the new speed limits on August 27. By law those resolutions are filed with the state records secretary in Santa Fe, noted Medrano.

The traffic studies were prompted by the increasing amounts of business and commercial usage of state Highway 37, commented Medrano.

"We rely on a reasonable and prudent driver theory," said Medrano, in explaining how tests are performed. He said Highway Department technicians monitored

and recorded the speed of travel on the two roads. Using the figures from the study, the 85th percentile speed was rounded off to the nearest speed limit, and that is the rate used to establish legal speed limits, explained Medrano.

"The posting of the speed limit signs generally fulfills our obligation to notify the public," remarked Medrano.

Swenor said Ruidoso Police officers are currently issuing warnings rather than citations to most motorists exceeding the new posted speed limits.

However, Swenor added that motorists "going 50 in a 30 will probably get a ticket."

Medrano said his office has also completed traffic studies on the portion of Highway 70 that cuts through Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. Evidently the findings didn't warrant any changes, he added.

Two other new signs were posted on Mechem Drive near the Sudderth and Mechem traffic light, said Medrano. Those signs, which were requested by Upper Canyon lodger Bill Rawlins, indicate that

food and lodging are available in the Upper Canyon.

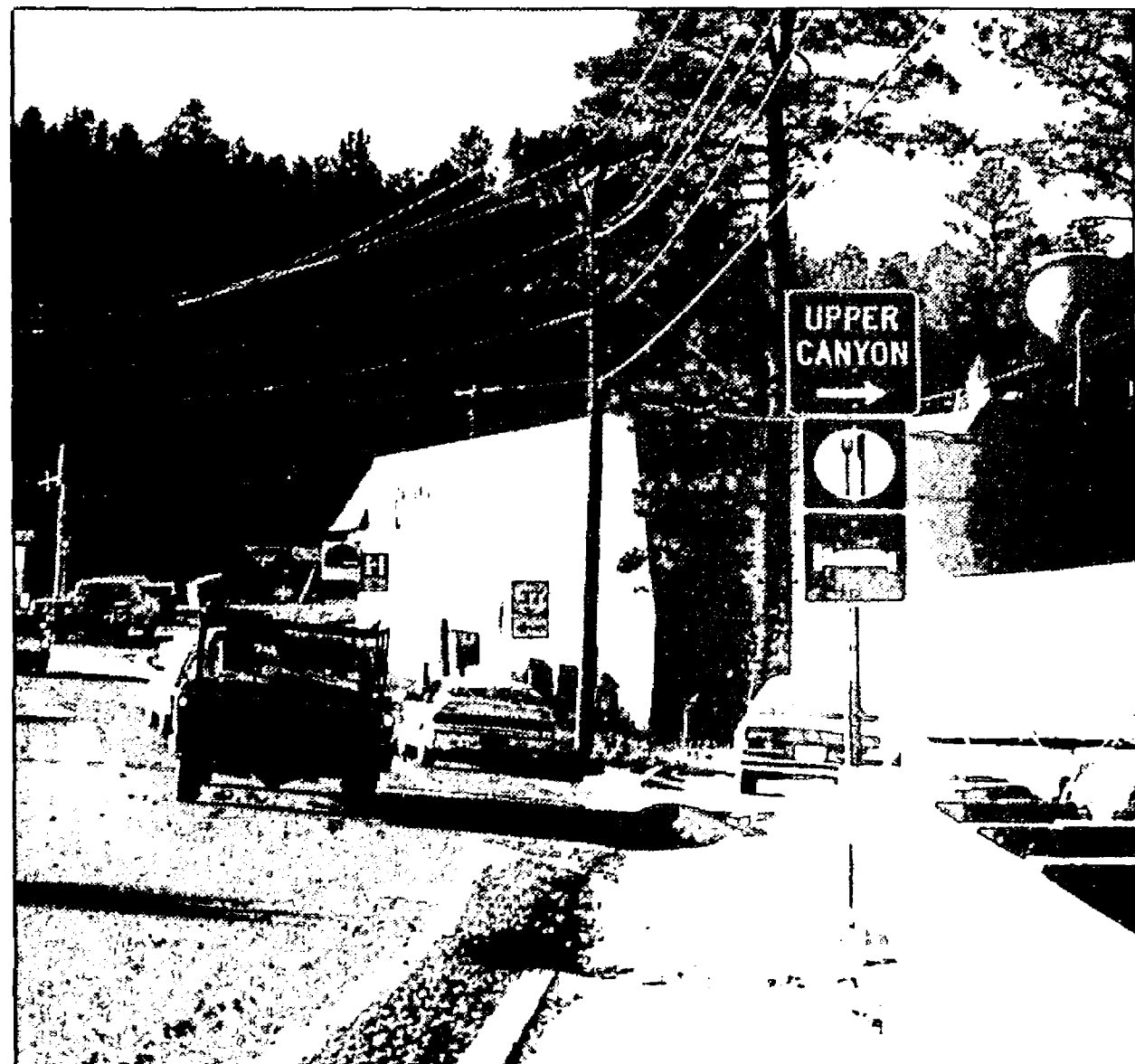
Any citizen may make such a request, explained Medrano, who added that his office reviews and evaluates recommendations.

"Our biggest concern is to keep traffic flowing as smoothly as possible," added Medrano, who said signs that will contribute to that goal are favored by the Highway Department.

Another state Highway Department project that is pending in Ruidoso is the placement of a traffic light at the traffic "Y."

Medrano said schedules call for awarding the contract for the traffic light in March 1986. He said the date has been moved up on that project, because the need for a traffic light at the "Y" has been so firmly established.

The state Highway Department also has plans to place a traffic light in Midtown Ruidoso, on the street beside the skating rink, by late summer, said Medrano. He said some drainage problems must be addressed at that location, before the light can be installed, but studies have indicated a need for directional signals in that location.

Officials advise celebrators not to drink and drive New Year's Eve

New Year's Eve, considered by some as the last chance in the year to party, may see more drunk drivers on the roads than any other night.

"Moderation" is the key to a happy and safe New Year's Eve celebration, noted Richard A. Swenor, chief of the Ruidoso Police Department.

"If you've had too much, just don't drive," he said. "Get a ride, it's not worth the risk," he added.

Swenor said the risk he was talking of was much more serious than getting arrested; he warned of serious to fatal accidents involving

drunk drivers.

Since things at the Police Department will be "business as usual," Swenor recommends that party-givers and -goers monitor themselves.

If you're going to have booze, be sure to have somebody at the party who's not drinking," said Swenor. The host's liability encountered by bars that serve liquor to already intoxicated patrons, can also be applied to private party hosts and hostesses, according to Swenor.

Buying liquor or providing it, it's the same thing," he commented.

In cases where a ride is not available, Swenor said the Police Department will provide

transportation.

"If they've had too much, we'll give them a ride," said the Chief. "They just may have to wait," he added.

Undersheriff Charlie Cox reported that Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies will be working to discourage drunk driving in the county. He said his staff will be on the lookout for intoxicated citizens and encourage them to sober up in a cafe or call a sober friend to provide transportation home.

Cox echoed Swenor's advice for New Year's Eve drinkers: arrange for safe transportation home.

Some restaurants will provide transportation for partyers who overindulge, but that practice is not limited to special occasions.

Martha Rankin of Win, Place and Show explained that a standing policy exists at that establishment to monitor the amounts of liquor consumed.

Usually there is someone here who can drive someone home," added Rankin.

Most bar operators contacted had similar comments, noting that experienced bar and restaurant employees are alert to see that customers do not drive drunk.

Cree Meadows Country Club and the Texas Club are cooperating to provide a driver and vehicle for

Downs, county hope to stymie drunk driving

Ruidoso Downs police chief Skip Hazel said he and his department will be happy to give drinkers a ride home on New Year's Eve.

"I'd rather give a courtesy ride than have to investigate a darn accident," he said.

The Downs police will work with the bars and check them regularly for people needing rides. He said he does not want to see people arrested for DWI or hurt in an accident.

"That's a hell of a way to start the year," he said of the two things which could result from drunk driving.

Hazel stressed his willingness to give courtesy rides and urged people to call for them if needed. The Downs police phone number is 378-4001.

Some establishments offer rides and alternative options to New Year's Eve patrons. Prime Time in Ruidoso Downs, offers a free limousine service to anyone needing a ride home. Manager Bill Bergish

said he will call the police if someone who should not drive is uncooperative.

The Downs police are ultra-cooperative," said Bergish.

Bergish said his establishment hopes to prevent drunk driving this year.

"We flat refuse service to anyone who is intoxicated," he said.

Fran Nevins, manager of Carrizo Lodge, said her experienced bartenders will use their discretion and cut people off if they've had too much to drink.

Nevins said she hopes that each group of partyers would designate a non-drinking driver for the evening. That person would receive free soft drinks or coffee all night, she said.

Carrizo also offers a discounted after-hours breakfast. Nevins encourages people to walk to the restaurant from the lounge and have the breakfast before driving home.

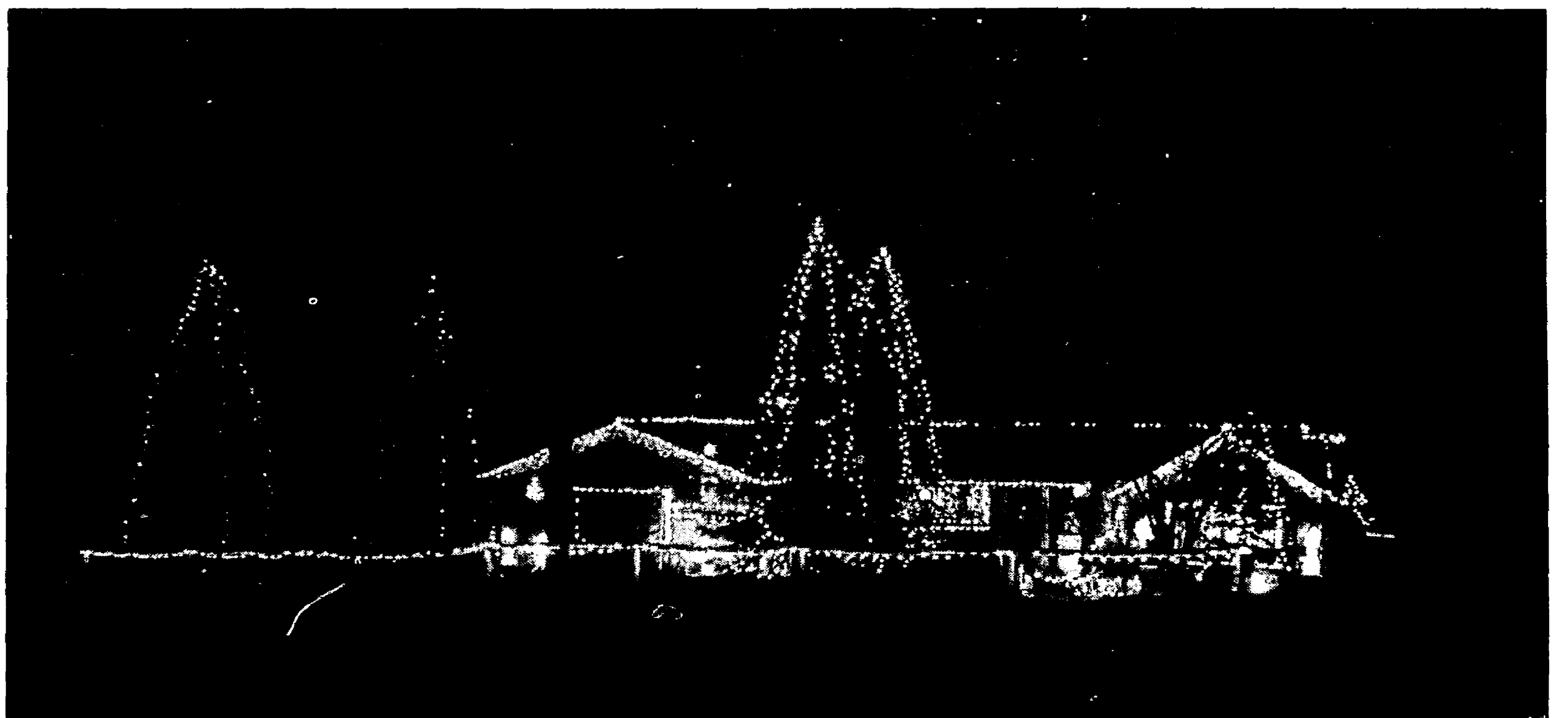

Besides Easter's 16 points, Willingham scored seven for the Warriors. Garret Henson was the top Warrior rebounder and did well in all three games.

Ruidoso was never in the game against Aztec. The Tigers hit 60 per-

cent of their field goal attempts for the game and 70 percent for the first half.

"They're awfully quick and very good shooters," Segura said of Aztec. "We got a chance to see three of the top teams in the state's AAA-division in the tournament."

Hot Springs won the championship, beating Aztec in the finals. Aztec had defeated host Lovington in the semi-finals.

Now the Warriors will resume play Tuesday, January 7, at Socorro. Both the varsity and junior varsity teams will play.

"We're going to be a pretty good ballclub," Segura said. "Some of the players are still trying to adjust from football to basketball."

"That's a major reason. We haven't got the timing down or the confidence yet. But we'll be there."



It was one of the most interesting and successful sports years Ruidoso has ever had.

Yes, 1985 was a good year, highlighted by the Ruidoso High School varsity football team's state championship 21-19 win over Silver City December 7 in Las Cruces.

But the Warriors' football success was not the only noteworthy story of 1985. There were many other highlights during the year.

Here's a month-by-month look at the 1985 sports year.

January: Ruidoso High School's boys varsity basketball team won its first game of the season and its first home win in three seasons with a 38-24 victory over New Mexico Military Institute.

The Warrior girls ended January with a 2-9 record, one of the losses a heartbreaking 46-45 defeat at the hands of Lovington.

The boys beat Cobre and Tularosa and gave Deming a tough battle before losing. The Warrior girls topped Deming and highly-rated Hot Springs.

The Warriors opened the football season on a winning note August 30, beating defending state champion Artesia, 14-13, on the losers' field.

December: Ruidoso won the state AAAA-division title, defeating Silver City, 21-19.

Quarterback Russell Easter threw two touchdown passes to Brian Davis and the defense set up the other touchdown, a one-yard run by Michael Williamson.

Ruidoso ended the season with a 12-1 record.

The Warrior boys basketball team opened the season with an 83-41 loss to Roswell. Ruidoso's girls fell to Cloudcroft in their opener, 49-36.

Ruidoso won its first boys basketball game of the season, a 40-39 win over Portales. The Warrior girls topped Roswell, 39-36, for their first win of the season.

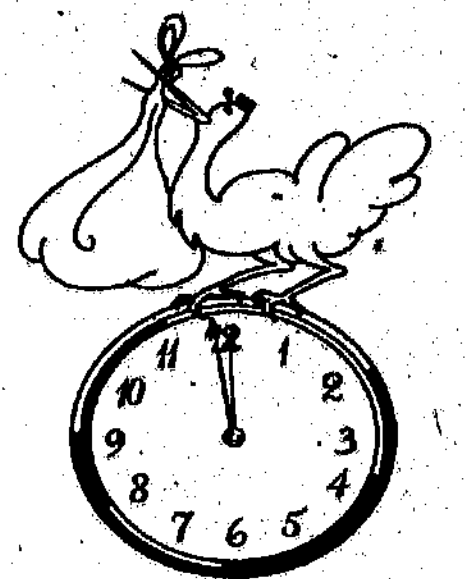

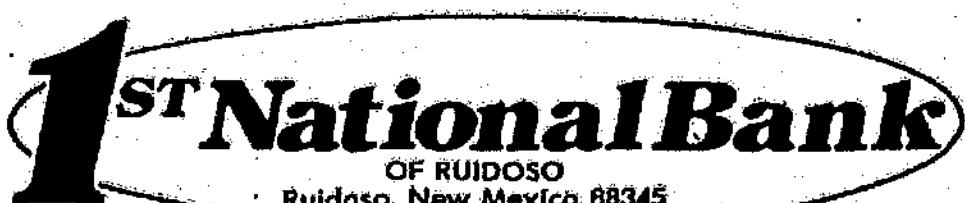

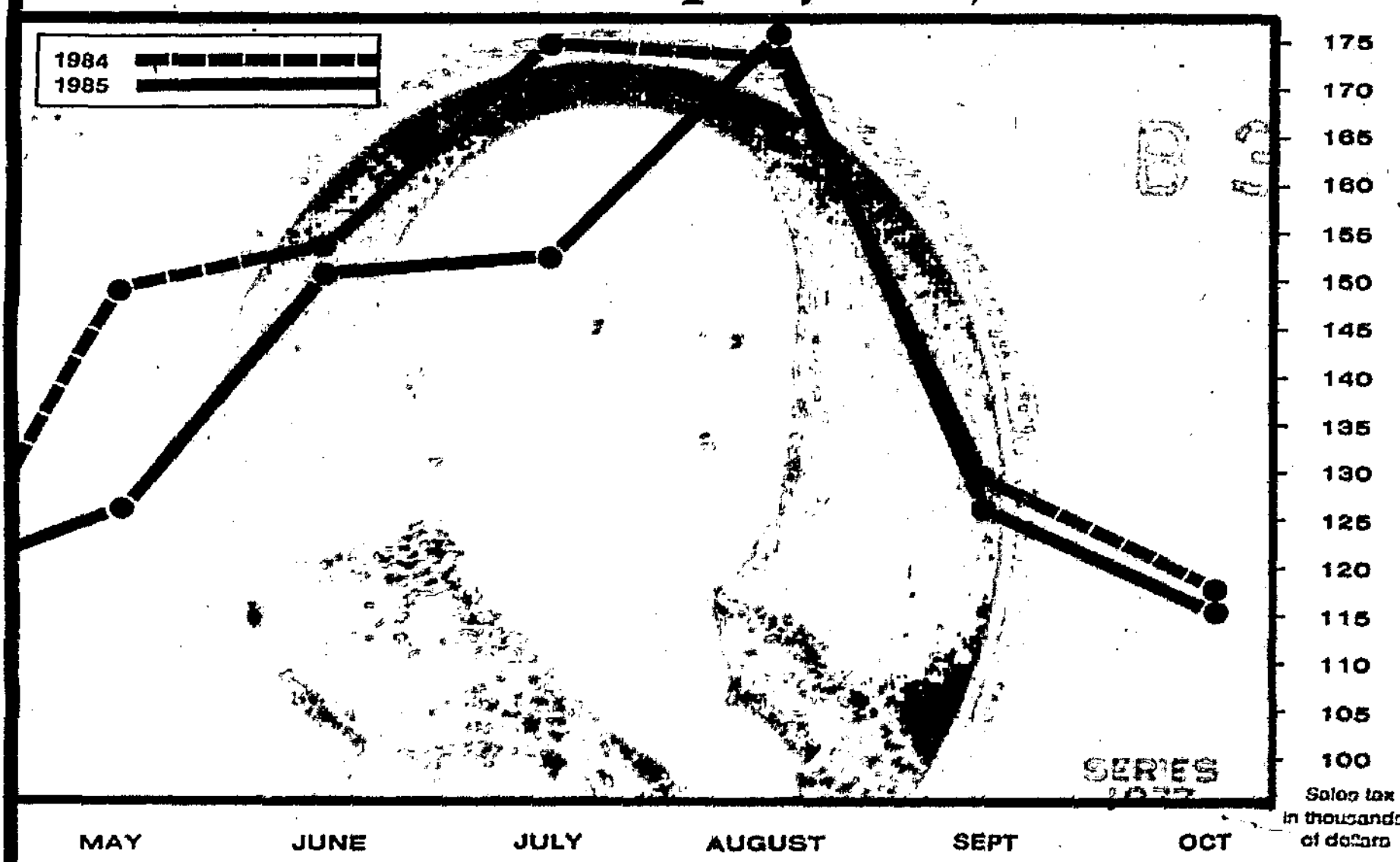

Capitan Corner

1985 is creeping toward its end and these final hours give us a chance to reflect upon the events of the year.

Lincoln County (and other counties in New Mexico) received a valuable lesson in managing its assets this year when the First National Bank of Lincoln County (FNBLC) failed.

The county invested and deposited funds in the bank as a result of a bid process. The county advertised for the best interest rates from a qualifying institution and FNBLC (formerly Moncor) submitted the best bid.

Few in Lincoln County, especially the Lincoln County officials, will forget the Friday-the-13th of December, when FNBLC closed its doors—insolvent. Luckily, New Mexico has friends in high places.

Friday the 13th is becoming an unfavorable day at the county seat. County manager Suzanne Cox said that on another Friday-the-13th, a bolt of lightning hit the courthouse in Carrizozo, erasing all the information stored in the county computers. Fortunately the information was stored elsewhere and was restored to the county computers, but it left everyone wary of the "unlucky day."

Also this year, the commissioners took a tough stand on subdivisions, determined to bring all new subdivisions into compliance with the county subdivision regulations.

Financial woes were heard throughout the county during 1985. The villages experienced downturns in gross receipt revenues, perhaps the best indicator of economic activity.

Capitan experienced lowered revenues. Some attribute the economic downturn to the ban on Sunday liquor sales. Many governments and related entities—county, municipalities and schools alike—suffered with increased insurance rates.

But water was the big subject to many Capitan residents—a new well brought a bit of hope, but voters defeated a bond election to raise the money to bring the additional water to the village.

Summer and late autumn floods turned the water brown. The village water problem is not a new one: it is a topic that has recurred in village business for many years.

October and November were dismal months for Capitan water. Broken valves and floods muddled the water. Villagers began purchasing and hauling water.

The once-defeated bond question will appear again on the municipal election ballot in March 1986. The winter of 1985 has been very dry so far, and a dry winter usually means a limited water supply in the early summer.

The county sheriff's department was busy this year. Deputies confiscated an alleged John Lennon drawing and hundreds of marijuana plants during the pot plantation raids this summer.

The county's state institutions feared the worse—closure. But Fort Stanton saw a new cafeteria and then the transfer of administrator Mark Delgado.

Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) had four walk-aways this year (after having none in 1984.) CSB's closure, a subject discussed again this fall in the New Mexico Corrections Department, hangs in question, waiting for the next session of the state Legislature for an answer.

Sports took a peculiar turn this year when controversy rocked the Capitan Board of Education. Outraged parents confronted the board about the behavior of a coach on a out-of-town trip, finally leading to the coach's termination.

Female athletes at Capitan High School played well all year, competing in the state games in the spring basketball season and the fall volleyball season.

On the lighter side, country-music star Charlie Daniels roped with the area's best ropers at one of the many many ropings and rodeos in Capitan this summer.

And as a final note, a short eulogy to Bill Gallacher, 98, who died December 12. Gallacher was influential in this county because of his pioneering spirit and love of the land. He cared for the people of Lincoln County and gave many years of his life working to better education and county government.

Goodbye Mr. Gallacher and 1985.

overturned a quarter turn and came to rest on its right side.

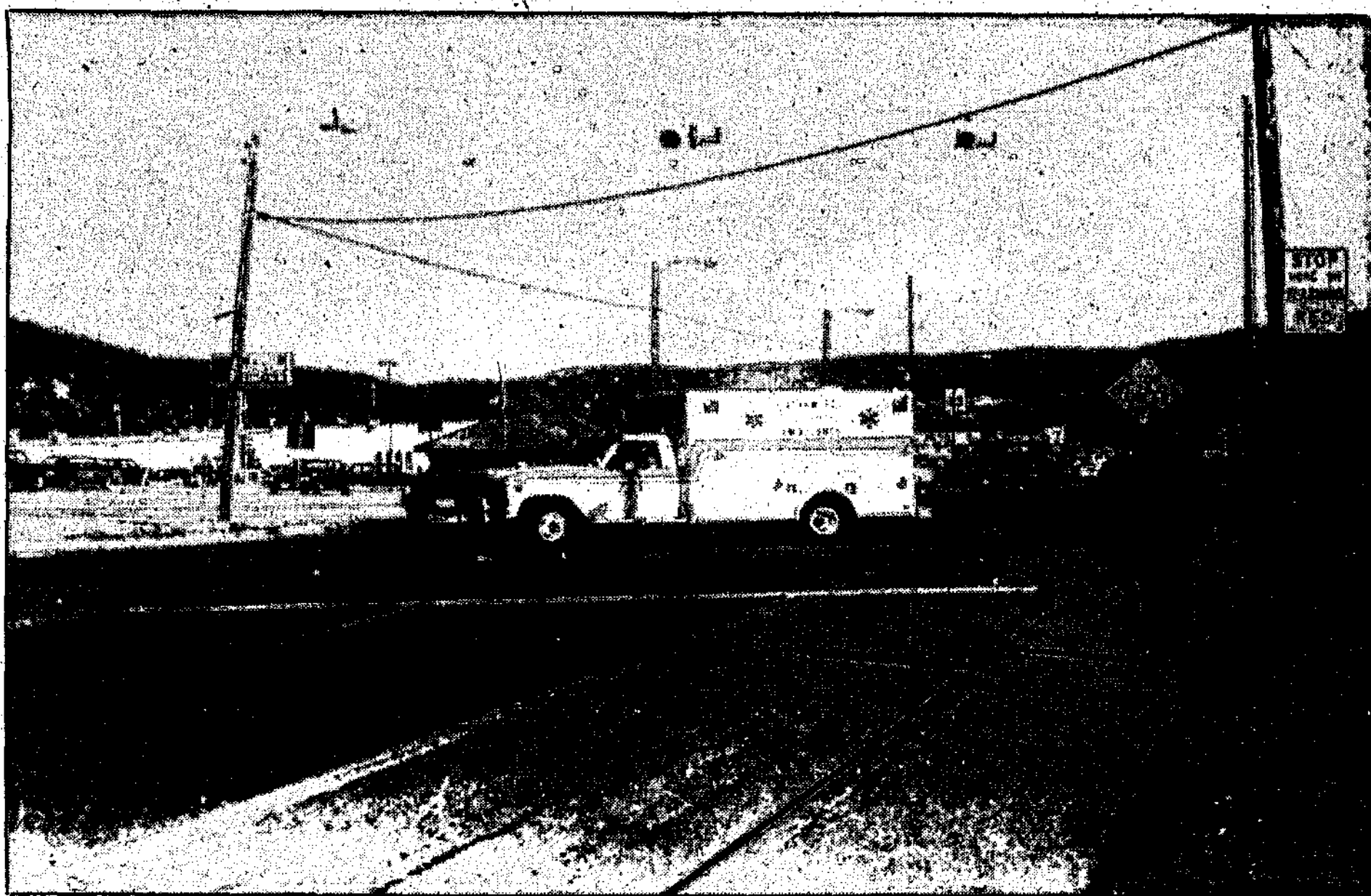

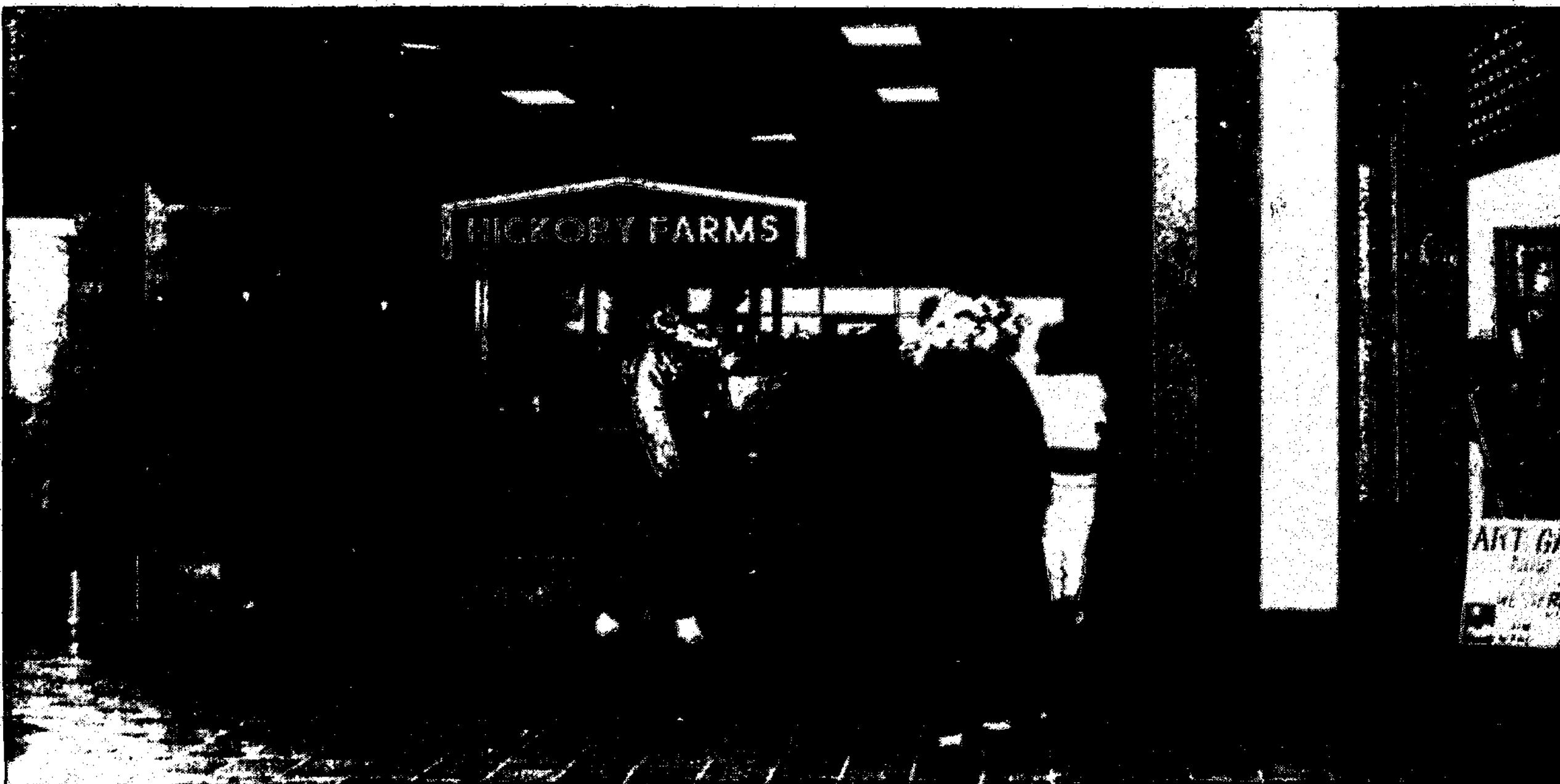

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Three questions ought to be asked before our Legislature comes to town: Who controls the agenda? Who leads? Who follows?

Unfortunately, with less than a month to go till that gathering convenes, the answer to all three questions has been given as "nobody."

There isn't anyone in charge. A few make fitful efforts, like gestures with a palsied hand, but no one can truly stand up and say, "This is what is going to be done."

Take all the stir about a bill to improve the status of the public schools as an example of how rudderless affairs here really are.

Step one: Governor Anaya, who might be looked to for leadership, if only by reason of the title he wears, flies over to spend a few hours with the governor of Texas, and then announces his plan for shaking up the school system. When studied, it proves to be the work of a hasty compositionist, who has stirred up together ideas from a variety of sources without much worry about whether they cancel one another out.

Step two: The legislative committee specially appointed to prepare an overall plan, after months of taking testimony, retires into frequent and protracted executive sessions, somewhat as though they were expected to come up with a document of the scope of the United Nations charter. For weeks, we hear nothing from behind those locked doors.

Step three: Governor Anaya sends Luciano Baca, head of his Office of Education, like a humble errand boy to tell legislative committees schools need at least \$200 million more in their budget next year than they have this year. This proposition has nothing whatever to do with the previously announced Anaya plan for schools—or with reality, for that matter.

Step four: Representative Bobby Aragon, one of the chairman of the special legislative committee on the topic, holds a news conference to announce that lawmakers will meet (again, in secret) with the Governor to compromise two plans. Since Aragon and the others in his group have not yet even revealed their plan, to offer to compromise it

seems premature. What's more, it is obvious Aragon's co-chair, Senator Marvin Watts, and other sensible members of the group, see no need for compromise and suspect they may have been sold out. Included among those who appear to have left behind by Aragon's end-run is the honcho of the Senate, Les Houston, a man who doesn't like to be visibly left behind.

Question at this point: Who's running this show anyway?

Step five: Houston and others go 'round and 'round about whether or not even to tell the public what it is the special committee plans to recommend. Houston is at first for keeping all cards close to his chest and letting us know nothing until the bill is tossed into the legislative hoppers. Then the decision becomes to let us have a summary of the plan, but to let us look at the wording of the bill itself.

Step six: Everything is now changed. A gigantic press conference will be held in Albuquerque, where the TV stations are. Houston and House Speaker Gene Samberson will be seen smiling at the cameras as the whole plan is revealed. Copies of the draft legislation are passed out for us all to see.

Step seven: The great "summit meeting" to compromise the plans is convened behind closed doors, forcing the TV cameras to hang around to give publicity to the conferees only when the day's work is done. Publicity appears to be the object of it all, since what is clear at the end of the conference is that we still do not have a plan.

We are reassured that we will be handed one before the legislative session formally convenes, but it is hardly surprising in light of all that has so far ensued that some express a slight hesitancy at believing that to be literally true.

Who controls the agenda here? Up to this point, as we have seen, nobody. Who leads? Nobody, though Toney Anaya for one and Bobby Aragon for another are perfectly willing to. Who follows? Nobody, at least if those are the only two leaders.

And there are 21 and a half days till the Legislature begins deliberating.

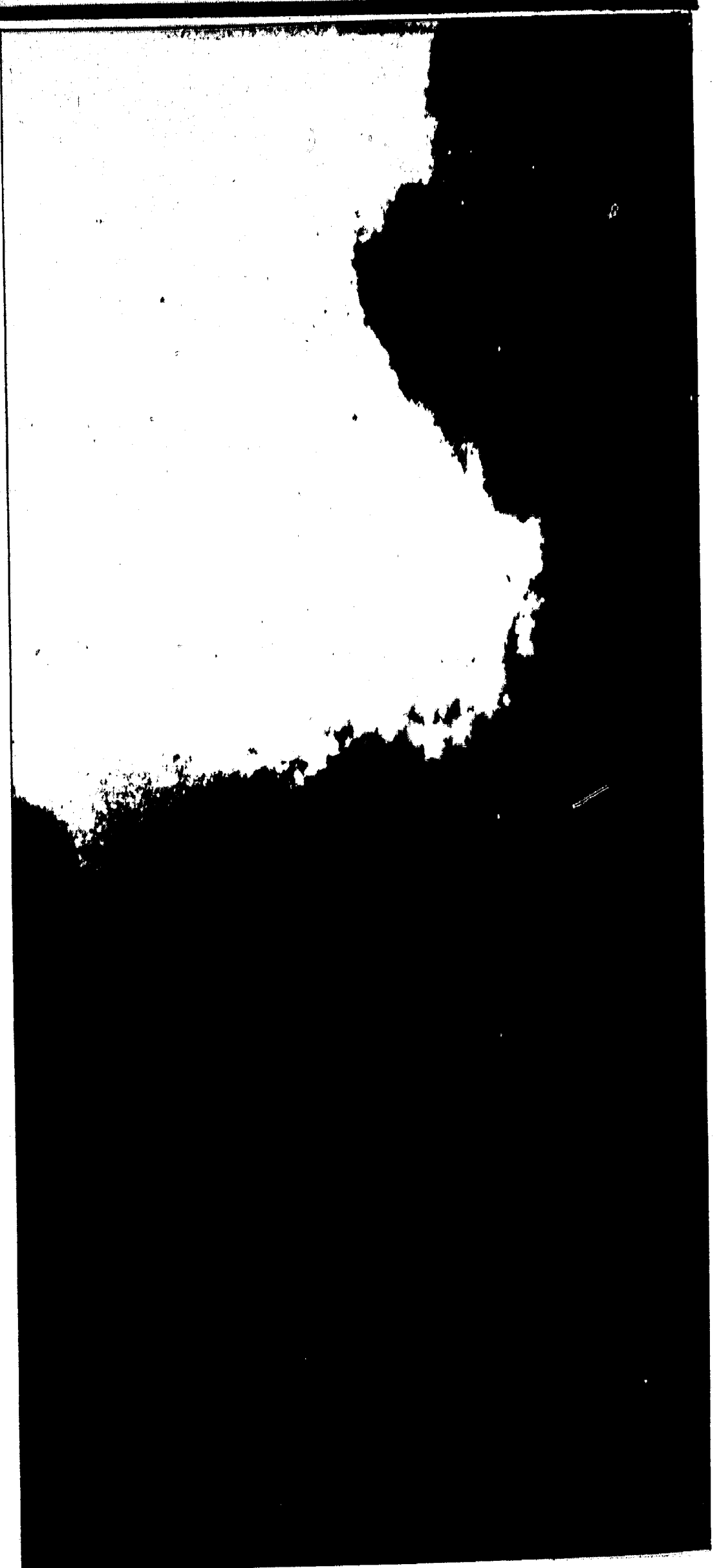
