## '84 building tops \$40 million

Building permits issued by the Village of Ruidoso reached a valuation of over \$40 million during 1984, far surpassing the \$23 million total in 1983.

Total permits issued in 1984 numbered 580, compared with the 361 issued in 1983. During December, however, permits were down to the lowest monthly total of the year.

One reason for the jump in the total valuation during 1984 was the fact that the village changed the method of determining the valuation of projects as of January 1, 1984. Estimated construction costs were set at \$27 per square foot in 1983, but were raised to \$42 to \$50 per square foot in 1984, depending on the type of construction and the materials used.

The village Building Inspector's Office last month issued 20 building permits with a valuation of only \$751,713. That was down more than 50 percent from the previous low recorded in November, when permits totaled just over \$1.6 million in valuation.

Up, however, was the category of commercial additions or alterations. Largely due to a \$191,915 commercial addition project in December for the Swiss Chalet Inn, the category jumped from just \$21,100 in valuation in November to \$228,195 in December. It was the highest valuation since April, when the figure was \$432,727.

A total of 580 building permits were issued in Ruidoso during 1984, with a valuation of \$40,412,970. Of that, 46 permits were issued for commercial additions or alterations, with a valuation of \$1,444,055.

In December, the building inspector issued five permits for the construction of new single-family dwellings, with a valuation of \$476,026. That brought the yearly total to 264 permits issued with a valuation of \$21,667,531. Average valuation of a new home in Ruidoso was set at \$82,074, up from \$43,775 in 1983.

Permits for the construction of residential additions or alterations numbered seven in December, with a valuation of \$43,462. The yearly total for this category reached 194 permits issued, with a valuation of \$2,157,393.

Permits for nearly \$10 million in new commercial buildings were issued in Ruidoso during 1984. The Building Inspector's Office issued a total of 43 new commercial building permits with a valuation of \$9,842,569 during the year. Of that, just one permit with a valuation of \$4,030 was issued in December.

Also during the year, the Building Inspector's Office issued five permits for demolitions, with a valuation of \$27,015. One permit for the construction of a church was issued, with a valuation of \$205,800.

One permit for the construction of an addition or alteration to a church was issued in 1984, with a valuation of \$143,865. Construction of apartments and condominiums expanded in 1984, with 22 permits issued with a valuation of \$4,885,607. One permit for the construction of an apartment addition or alteration was issued, with a valuation of \$21,008.

Also issued were three "other" building permits with a valuation of \$18,136.

## Cree purchase recommended

An ad hoc committee set up by the Ruidoso Village Council voted Friday to recommend that the village purchase Cree Meadows Country Club.

The committee, made up of members of the community appointed by Mayor George White to study the feasibility of purchase of the country club and golf course, met at village hall Friday afternoon. Representing the council at the meeting was councillor Jerry Shaw.

Committee members agreed that the village should not attempt actual operation of the course, and should follow a policy of leasing the facility. That agreement took the form of a recommendation when committee chairman Ralph Petty called for a

vote of the committee.

In addition, the committee members advised that upon purchase of the golf course, the village should attempt to sell or lease the clubhouse part of the complex, and that the golf course be leased to a private operator.

That recommendation came as a result of committee members' comments stressing the advantages of owning the golf course—open green space, water rights and the advantage to the community—and the difficulties of dealing with the complexities of the clubhouse.

Also, at the suggestion of member Stormy Edwards, the committee voted to recommend that the village honor all existing memberships in the golf course and clubhouse.

"I think they (the councillors) need

to be aware of how important that is," Edwards said.

Chairman Petty reported that a group of property owners and club members in the Cree Meadows area is preparing to purchase the golf course and country club when the property comes up for public auction. He reported that the property owners have agreed to offer the facility to the village after the purchase at their cost.

Village manager Jim Hine explained that the village cannot participate in the auction because the necessary money for the purchase is not available in the village budget. Hine said any subsequent purchase of the golf course and country club would be through the issuance of revenue bonds.

## Children's home planned for Ruidoso

"There are children whose world has fallen apart around them. They are full of fear, uncertainty and bitterness. They need help," said Carl Foerstner.

Foerstner and a group with similar concerns want to provide that help. They are planning a children's home for Lincoln County.

Foerstner, his wife, Cora, and John Bachelor Jr. make up the board of directors for the home, which is to be Christian in philosophy but non-denominational in practice.

"There's no place for children to go when they are removed from home for whatever reason," Foerstner said. He explained that these children often end up in correctional institutions even though they have done nothing wrong.

"What we propose in our home is a place to take care of these people," he said. Foerstner feels that it is really wrong to take a child whose only offense is his family situation and send him to a correctional facility or back into the same problem environment.

Others involved with young people and their problems have confirmed the need for a children's shelter in this area.

"There is definitely a need ... we don't have anything like that," said Jane Parnell of the Lincoln County Juvenile Probation Office. She said that in December her office dealt with four youths who needed either long-term or short-term shelter.

"There's really nothing we can do," Parnell said. These young people were returned to their homes because there was no safe place available for them.

"Something like this would alleviate that," Parnell said.

Betsy Siler of Human Services pointed out a need for group homes throughout the state. She places children in foster homes, but said that group homes might be an option if they were available.

Foerstner explained that the home will be set up with cottages and houseparents. Each cottage will function as a family unit. The plan is for each cottage to house no more than 10 children.

Within the family each child will have jobs and responsibilities, according to Foerstner. He explained that opportunities will be afforded for every child to experience some successes and to be an achiever.

"We'll be sensitive to the whole child's needs ... not just physical," he said. Foerstner contrasted his philosophies with the tendency in state-run homes to institutionalize children, offering room and board and no more.

"A child needs discipline in his life, backed up by spiritual values," he said. "As a minister I'll be involved in helping in this area."

The Foerstners received some of their training at Azusu Pacific University in Azusu, California. Azusu is a private Christian university.

They received further training through New Tribes Mission, and then served as missionaries in South America for several years. They directed a children's home in South America.

Foerstner is devoting full time to organizing the children's home. He will be the administrator once land and buildings are obtained, but until then he will be spreading the message and raising funds.

Cora Foerstner is a Spanish teacher at Ruidoso Christian School. The Foerstners have four children: 16-year-old Shawn, a student at Ruidoso Christian School; 14-year-old Carl Jr. and 12-year-old Chad, who attend Ruidoso Municipal Schools; and five-year-old Rachel.

The family has lived in Ruidoso for two years and been active in churchwork and in Boy Scouting. Foerstner feels that his background of working with youth has prepared him well to serve as school administrator.

"We will do whatever it takes to help the children," he said. He will work with local counselors, local ministers, and county and state officials to meet any special needs of children placed in the home.

Foerstner stressed that the board of directors, which will eventually number from three to seven members, is aware of the importance of choosing the right staff. They see the house parents as role models for

the children, and will appoint them with great care.

The home won't be a separate community. The children will attend Ruidoso Municipal Schools. Houseparents probably will take their unit to a church of their choosing in the village.

"We feel that any church or group would be able to have an involvement with the children," Foerstner said. "We really feel it will be a place of community involvement."

"Rather than the home being a burden on the community, I see hurting children changing their attitudes to where they'll reach out to community needs," he said.

As the home grows, Foerstner has a vision of the community and home cooperating in many areas. He envisions a home with community center-type facilities such as a pool, ballfields and horses.

"If we let it, the home could be the catalyst to meet the needs of the community," he said. His group plans for the facilities to be accessible to all area youth, not just the home residents.


Several prospective locations for the campus are being considered by the board. They hope to make a decision very soon so they can begin to meet the immediate needs.

"Without community involvement this home will never get off the ground," Foerstner said. He is available to answer questions or talk to anyone interested in hearing more about the home.

Foerstner stressed that this venture is not an elite one—all kinds of help are being recruited. Volunteers will be needed to serve on the board, participate in planning, donate money, and work directly with residents.

The Foerstners will be available to speak to clubs, churches or organizations who want to hear more about the home. They want community involvement from the very start.

"We're here for the kids ... not to push one philosophy," Foerstner said. "I want to help these children."

## Raids result in arrests

Ruidoso Police Department and Lincoln County Sheriff's Office personnel arrested 13 area residents and brought 66 felony and misdemeanor charges—ranging from possession of marijuana to commercial burglary—in a series of raids Thursday and early Friday.

According to Ruidoso Police Captain Dave Pfeiffer, the raids resulted in the arrest of eight adults and five juveniles. Adults arrested were Martin Woodall, 22, of Ruidoso Downs; Timothy Reed, 28, of Ruidoso Downs; Scott Mejia, 22, of Ruidoso; Jeff Reynolds, 21, of Ruidoso; Ryan Woodall, 19, of Ruidoso; Jesus Urquica, 19, of Ruidoso; Rebecca McDougal, 21, of Ruidoso; and Kurt Richardson, also known as Kurt Hess, 18, of Ruidoso.

The names of the five juveniles were not released.

Pfeiffer said the 66 total counts brought against the suspects include 20 felony charges and 46 misdemeanors. The charges include possession of marijuana, receiving stolen property, commercial burglary, residential burglary and larceny over \$100.

Recovered in the raids was over \$8,000 worth of property, Pfeiffer reported. The officer said all the arrests were made in the Village of Ruidoso. The county was involved because some of the alleged crimes occurred outside village limits.

Pfeiffer said the arrests came as the result of investigative work by police officers.

## Gas pressure dropped with cold temperatures

Ruidoso natural gas users were asked to cut back on consumption Thursday morning because of low pressure in village gaslines.

Local radio stations passed on Ruidoso Natural Gas Company's request for everybody to be "as conservative as possible."

Erma Stevenson of the gas company said that gas pressure from El Paso was very low because of cold weather there. That low pressure had a big impact on Ruidoso gas lines.

This problem has occurred several

times over the years, usually when the temperature drops drastically and consumers turn up their thermostats. Thursday morning's temperature dropped to three degrees Fahrenheit.

The gas company has installed a new compressor on the other side of Capitan that was expected to alleviate pressure problems. It is designed to adjust local gas pressure to compensate for El Paso's lowered pressure during heavier than normal use.

"We've just grown so much that it was necessary to do this (install the compressor). It's been a great expense but was something we had to do," Stevenson said.

"It didn't kick in, though," she added. The compressor company, an Oklahoma firm, had technicians en route to Capitan to investigate the problem by noon Thursday.

"There is no danger of any kind," Stevenson said. By 11 a.m. gas pressure was already on its way back up to normal levels.

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


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


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

## Advice from expert eases income tax time

The calendar turns to a new year and with it often comes the familiar tug of tax-time anxiety. As thoughts turn to this year's tax-preparing experience, David T. Whatley of H & R Block said 1984 is the third year of a three-year federal reduction plan. "I personally think the most significant change in this year's tax returns (affecting local residents) is the reduction in individual taxes. For most taxpayers, this represents a five percent reduction across the board," Whatley said. "However," he added, "that doesn't necessarily mean that everyone is going to pay less tax." After the sealed envelopes contain-

ing the bottom line are mailed and destined to be fingered by government workers, the words "I.R.S. audit" are to many as frightening as hearing one's mother-in-law is coming for a long, long visit. "Most audits are based upon statistical data. Everyone has as good a chance being selected for audit as the next," Whatley said. But, he noted, there are people the Internal Revenue Service watches carefully. He cited dealings in horse racing, small farms, ranches and art. "Statistically people who are self-employed tend to get audited more than people who are employees. That's just an I.R.S. fact," said Whatley. What is Whatley's main advice for preparing income tax returns?

"See your tax accountant frequently, not just at tax time," he said. Financial transactions made in the previous year cannot be undone and turned into tax-saving gold mines on April 14, he emphasized. Federal tax return forms, or form request cards, are mailed very early in the year, he said. The mailed forms are sent to last year's address and usually are not forwarded by a post office. Persons can get both federal and state tax return forms at the local post office or library, or by writing the I.R.S. with a request for needed forms. Whatley added that tax preparers and tax accountants do not routinely hand out tax return forms to the public. "As far as having your tax return professionally prepared, it always helps to have a good list of all earned income and all possible deductions. I see more people lose money because they fail to keep good books or keep receipts, and therefore they fail to take advantage of deductions," said Whatley. Persons on Social Security also should heed his bookkeeping advice, he said. Most persons collecting Social Security no longer need to file government tax returns. But he suggested they should keep records—especially medical—for the state of New Mexico, where benefits are numerous.

## MLS enlists aid of computer

Hello! What is your identification number? What is your code number? What is your command? If you can answer these three questions for "Ralph," the Ruidoso Multiple Listing Service Datapoint Computer 8200, the world of Ruidoso real estate is at your fingertips. Ruidoso Board of Realtors Executive Officer Alton Lane said the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) has been computerized since October. He reported that to date the system is a big success. "It's just loaded with a fantastic amount of information," the animated Lane explained. "The commands are very simple and it's an excellent program." Lane, with the help of MLS chairperson Don Harmon, explained functions while they demonstrated the modern, up-to-date, computerized service. All current MLS real estate listings, sales, and contracts are entered into the Data Point, they said. Four real estate categories can be filed—land

and lot, commercial and industrial, residential, and multi-family. The system also contains up to date lending rates from local banks. Real estate companies in Ruidoso have the option to participate in the MLS computer service, said Lane. Any personal computer—such as an Apple, IBM or Radio Shack—can be hooked in via the telephone. The cost to each agent is pro-rated monthly, according to Lane. He said the service has been \$34.28 since November. Once a broker opts for the system, all agents in the office are required to participate. "The agents also receive the MLS book and hot sheets are delivered twice a week," Lane said. An additional duty of the computer is aiding in the search for specific requirements of clients, said Harmon. In a hypothetical situation, he went to work looking for a particular piece of property for a very specific client. "Say the person comes in. He has \$15,000 down. He wants a two-bedroom, one and a half-bath with two fireplaces ... in White Mountain III. You pump that in and ... here it

comes," he explained. Harmon said by changing the requirements the computer can pull up property listings from over 1,858 current entries. Recently sold listings and listings under contract are also recorded for Realtors' use. "The cost is amazingly low for the benefits, and we've just scratched the surface," Harmon said. Lane said the system is security oriented by use of personalized codes. All entries into the computer must be documented by paperwork and delivered to the MLS office, at 629 Sudderth. Pickups frequently are made also, he said. "It is a great tool. As soon as the information is punched in, it's available," Lane beamed proudly at the \$80,000-plus investment. Inter-office messages and instant loan payoff amortization schedules might take time for people of the old school to use to the full potential, said Harmon. "But we are learning fast that this information is ready and accurate and can be obtained quickly," he added.

## Warrior girl cagers fall to Socorro

Poor shooting proved to be fatal for the Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team as the Warriors fell to Socorro 50-42 Saturday night on the winners' court.

Ruidoso only made 14 of 54 attempts from the field. The Warriors did fairly well on the foul line, making 30 percent of their attempts.

Socorro led from start to finish, taking a 16-9 first-quarter advantage and increasing it to 31-18 at halftime.

The hosts increased their lead to 49-25 at the third-quarter break, before Ruidoso made a comeback in the final period.

Seniors Stacy Ivy and Gia Rose led the comeback with several crucial buckets. Ruidoso cut Socorro's advantage to six points with about a minute left in the contest, but had to

foul to get the ball and could not get any closer.

Ivy led the Warrior scoring with 16 points while Rose scored 14 and played a fine all-around game at guard. No other Ruidoso player scored in double figures, however.

"I saw some bright spots from our players," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castaneda. "They (Socorro) have the makings of a pretty good team. The poor shooting hurt us, but we didn't get blown out."

"We've needed good scoring from our guards and we got it from Gia this time. Stacy is becoming our most consistent player. She's doing a lot of things well."

"If we can get good scoring from both Stacy and Diane (McClure) plus good scoring from at least one of our guards, we should be in good shape." Socorro recently lost close decisions to both Hot Springs and Silver

City, generally considered the top teams in Ruidoso's district, District 3-AAA.

This week will be a busy one for the Warriors. Tuesday night they will travel to Goddard, Thursday night they will host Artesia and Saturday night Lovington will visit the Warrior gymnasium.

"This (the busy week) should help us," said Castaneda.

The Warriors have already played Goddard twice this season. They lost to the Rockets 60-44 in the opening round of the Goddard Tournament and then fell to the Rockets 59-49 the week before Christmas.

But Ruidoso showed considerable improvement in the second game against Goddard, trailing by just five points midway through the final quarter.

Some people in the past have indicated interest in adult soccer and flag football programs.

Bailey thinks it may be hard to get those types of programs started.

"The weather could be a problem," he said. "About the only time we could play flag football would be about the same time softball would be getting started."

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

## Wortley: unique dining, lodging



The Wortley Hotel is one of Lincoln's historical landmarks. It was originally built around 1872 to house the workers at the Murphy-Dolan Store. Today, it houses guests year-round as part of a bed and breakfast program.

When you enter the Wortley, it is like visiting another world—a dimension that transcends our era and takes you back to a time of Victorian furnishings and spirits as warm as the fireplaces they surround.

The Wortley Hotel and Restaurant is on the main street in Old Lincoln Town. It is one of the many historical landmarks there.

It was originally built around 1872 to house the people who were working on the Murphy-Dolan store (what is now the Courthouse Museum). The original Wortley building burned down in 1937 due to an electrical fire. It was reconstructed as closely to the original as possible in 1960, with the help of Dessie Sawyer and the Lincoln Historic Commission.

The Wortley got its name from its first cook in 1873, Sam Wortley.

Today, the hotel and restaurant are run by Jerre Pace. She leases the buildings from State Monuments, a division of the Museum of New Mexico. Many of

the historical buildings in Lincoln are owned by the state.

Pace took over the Wortley in 1982. She had always liked the idea of a country inn, and was thrilled with the chance to run one.

The restaurant was bustling on the day of our interview. Since they were short-handed, Pace and cook Cell Chaffins were very busy serving all the patrons. It was hectic, but they seemed to love every minute of it.

Pace describes the food as "home-cooked cuisine." She explained that the food is homestyle, but the atmosphere is elegant and tranquil and not your proverbial "greasy spoon." The patrons that I queried gave similar descriptions.

Chaffins, who has been with the Wortley on and off since 1968, features five luncheon entrees during the week and three on Sunday.

"Cell always outdoes herself on Sundays," said Pace.

The restaurant is open six days in the busy summer season (closed Wednesdays) and five in the winter (closed Tuesdays and Wednesdays) for breakfast and lunch. On Friday and Saturday only, it offers dinner.

Dining at the Wortley is a nice experience. The atmosphere is relaxing and the food is good. I had a wonderfully seasoned hamburger and delicious carrots. Chaffins makes all her own buns, breads and flour tortillas. I'm looking forward to having blueberry pancakes there sometime.

Breakfast is special at the Wortley because it is part of the bed and breakfast hotel package. Bed

and breakfasts (B and B's, as they are called in the travel industry), have been popular in Europe for many years. Their popularity spread to the United States in the mid-1970s.

When Pace arrived in New Mexico in 1982, she found some places in Santa Fe that wanted to start a group, so the New Mexico Bed and Breakfast Association was formed. Members work together and refer travelers to B and B's all over the state. They have a full-page collective ad in the most recent "New Mexico Magazine." Pace is secretary of the organization.

Pace is pleased with the success of the B and B system. She said employees had told her that business increased since she started it.

In Europe, B and B guests are served a roll and coffee, but at the Wortley, all guests receive a full-size American breakfast. Pace said that it is common to see the dining room filled with wet-headed guests (just out of the shower) enjoying a relaxing morning meal.

It's easy to see why the Wortley's guests are relaxed. Besides Pace's

friendly personality, the rooms possess a relaxed, homey atmosphere. Each room has antique furniture and its own fireplace. There are no television sets, and Pace said that no one seems to miss them.

"The rooms have a retreat feeling," said Pace. "I like people to feel as if they've gotten away from it all while they're here."

The Wortley will undergo some structural refurbishing soon, thanks to an appropriation by the 1984 state Legislature of over \$230,000. The bill was introduced by Senator Edward McLaughlin.

According to Pace, the state is currently in the process of planning the renovation, which will include updating the plumbing, heating and sewage disposal systems. Pace said she would try to stay open around the workers, but the hotel will close sometime in the spring when the bulk of the renovation is being done.

The work should be finished before the busy season next summer. Pace said rooms are booked a year in advance for Old Lincoln Days - the first week of August.


The Capitan Education Association will sponsor a "Meet the Candidates" forum at 7 p.m. Thursday, January 17, in the multi-purpose building at the school.

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

There on the telly is the resident guru of one of the state's educational TV stations being amazed when a statehouse reporter tells him higher education isn't going to get massive infusions of new bucks from the 1985 Legislature.

Of course, this man teaches at the school where some people still believe they may be able to talk the lawmakers into giving them money for a new football stadium. If you can believe that, you're totally out of touch with reality.

Those who haven't gotten the message yet would do well to read these next words slowly and carefully—preferably out loud: Our state barely has enough money to keep itself alive; it won't be passing out goodies to anyone this year, and that includes teachers, state employees, egghead college professors or anybody else who comes to town begging for more dollars. No matter how thoroughly convincing the case you make, there aren't the bucks to give you.

That's not a very complex idea to get through one's head. You'd think those who depend on state coffers for their money might have grasped it by now just because a lot of us have been saying it repeatedly.

But as always, there are some who just don't get the message.

They're too busy concentrating on drawing up plans for a bright new tomorrow. They're talking about how much money they'd like to have—say an 11.8 percent raise for the group they represent—when they ought to be listening. If they did that, they'd know the answer to their request before they make it: "Not a chance, friends. Not a prayer."

The money just isn't there, and nobody has any schemes for getting it.

If you don't believe that, just ask Doctor Dan.

He's Dan Lopez, whom Toney Anaya named to head the Department of Finance and Administration just in time to listen to heads of state agencies making their budget proposals. Did any of those wooly-heads the Governor put in charge of state government say he or she proposed to

spend less money next year than last? Is the Pope a Baptist?

So now old Doctor Dan has settled down with all those figures. He's putting the scalpel to them—a slash here and a hack there. What he's been told to come up with is what we call a balanced budget. That means one which does not require the expenditure of more money than we are likely to have.

Again, a simple notion you would think most people would be able to grasp. So how come so few in state government understand it?

It is as though they didn't comprehend that what fuels this whole operation is hard dollars. Either we have those, or we don't. When we don't, there's no way any lawmaking body can give them to you.

Those figures in their budget proposals don't refer to cigar coupons or trading stamps, as some seem to believe. They are hard-down bucks, which somebody has to work for, only to have them taken away in taxes so these bureaucrats can play disappearing games with them.

They might also note that the state of New Mexico, unlike the federal government, can't just print up more money to take care of its needs.

No sir, in government at this level what is needed is to keep in touch with reality. There is little good in kidding yourself. Either we have the bucks, or we don't have the bucks—and at the moment, it's the latter condition which prevails.

Without even knowing who's going to be in charge in the Legislature that meets here shortly, we can say this with full assurance: The total amount of appropriations the Senate and House will come up with will not go beyond expected revenues. With court orders requiring increases in funding to the Corrections Department and the Human Services Department, almost every dollar of increased revenue will be eaten up there. That leaves almost literally nothing to pay for anybody else's dreams.

Sorry, kids, but that's reality—and reality is something which presses itself upon you whether you like it or not. It's time to stop blowing soap bubbles and come down to earth.



"To Live for All Mankind" was the theme for a world-wide Christian Science conference recently.



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Ellen Long of Daily Plant It explains how to care for poinsettia plants. The popular Christmas plants can be enjoyed for much longer than one holiday season with proper care.

## Poinsettias year-round plants

Poinsettias were a popular gift in Ruidoso this holiday season.

Kathy Harrison of Harrison's House of Flowers said she sold all but one or two. The Art and Flower Nook had the same experience.

Ellen Long of the Daily Plant It said she sold about 100 of the bright red plants, but had one or two still in the shop.

Poinsettias and Christmas cacti are both succulents of the Euphorbia pulcherrima family. They are of Mexican origin.

They are easily cared for, and thrive in normal household conditions.

To get the longest enjoyment from a poinsettia, it should be kept out of drafts in a warm place. The soil should be kept evenly moist.

They are potted in an all-purpose soil, and do well in sunny to semi-sunny locations. Normal home temperature and humidity are best for poinsettias.

The red blossoms on the poinsettia plant are actually bracts, not flowers.

A bract is actually a modified leaf. When the bracts begin to fall off, the plant is ready for a change of climate. Long explained how to care for poinsettias so that they will bloom again next Christmas.

When the bracts begin to look bad, and even fall off, set the plant in a cool room and let the soil stay nearly dry until spring.

In the spring, return the plant to a warm sunny location, water it well and watch for new growth.

The plant should then be repotted in all-purpose soil, and the stalks or canes should be cut back to about six inches from the pot rim. Poinsettias can be placed in a sunny interior or a protected area outdoors.

As the plant grows, pinch back the blooms to encourage more branches, more blooms and a bushier plant.

In early autumn, or when nights get cooler, the plant should be placed in absolute darkness from sundown to sunup everyday.

Day length determines when poinsettias will bloom, so this should force red blooms in time for Christmas.

The CP people never stop working and the movers and shakers never get the proper recognition. We all want to show that we're here to entertain and will give the audience a great TV show. Participation really does make life worth living. It should never be forgotten what we're here for. People should know that cerebral palsy just doesn't happen to newborn children. We're all in this together. It's really this network, this kaleidoscope of people doing something together and diving in for the cause."

### Elvis specials on cable

With Elvis Presley's deterioration in the years before his death, it's hard to remember him for the giant he was. HBO's special, "Elvis: One Night with You," takes us back to the days of Presley's greatness. The musical legend, in black leather from head to toe, is magical and charismatic.

"Elvis: One Night with You," airing Jan. 14 and 17, is one of a slew of films and specials being presented this month to commemorate the singer's 50th birthday on Jan. 8.

The HBO presentation, a longer version of a television special that aired 16 years ago, is a jam session between Presley and his musicians that is casual, relaxed, but still exciting. It shows Presley in his best light — playing well and looking terrific. Even sitting calmly in a chair, without any gyrating at all, he's charged with sexuality.

The music and laughter exchanged between the players is not enough to wipe away the sadness that hangs over this special, though. Seeing Presley at his peak only underscores the tragedy of his unnecessary death.

A different sort of special about Presley is playing on Showtime. "Elvis Presley's Graceland Hosted by Priscilla Beaulieu Presley" airs Jan. 17. It is what the title suggests, a tour of the famous Presley mansion in Memphis,

Tenn., by the singer's ex-wife. There are also film clips of Presley included. Look for "Elvis Minutes" this month on Showtime, too. It consists of quick features of news footage spotlighting different moments in Presley's life.

The Movie Channel has declared January Elvis Presley month. This week, there's "It Happened at the World's Fair," a musical about smugglers and a grand parade in Seattle airing Jan. 14. Next week, there's "Elvis on Tour," consisting of interviews and concert footage, airing Jan. 21, 26 and 29; and "Elvis: That's the Way It Is," airing Jan. 18 and 23, a backstage look at the performer before a Las Vegas show.






