Village may up sales tax

A move to increase the municipal gross receipts tax in Ruidoso took a step toward reality Friday as the village council voted to schedule a special meeting January 25 to consider a local special gross receipts tax ordinance.

Councillor Sherman Atwood made the motion to schedule the meeting for consideration of a one-half of one percent increase in the tax, to be used for infrastructure improvements within the village and the Ruidoso Extraterritorial Zone.

According to village clerk Leon Eggleston, if the council elects to enact the ordinance and pass an election resolution, a special election will be scheduled for March 22 to allow voters to determine the fate of the tax.

If the measure passes, the tax will go into effect July 1.

According to village manager Jim Hine, recent public demand for better road conditions is a primary reason for the proposed increase. He noted that work on area roads and bridges is badly needed in some areas, especially those affected by recent flooding.

Hine estimated the tax would raise \$500,000 to \$600,000 for infrastructure work in the village.

Crime Stoppers hear year wrapup

Ruidoso Crime Stoppers conducted a busy meeting Thursday. They heard a year-end report from Ruidoso Police coordinator Mike Lovelace, voted on committee appointments, and learned that the Crime Stoppers telephone number is now operable 24 hours a day.

Lovelace reported that Crime Stoppers received 22 calls in 1984, resulting in seven arrests. Two of those were for misdemeanor offenses and five were for felonies. Of those arrested, two were convicted and two were placed on pre-prosecution probation. Three cases still are pending.

As a result of the calls, \$849 worth of stolen property has been recovered and more than \$4,000 worth of illegal drugs has been confiscated, Lovelace noted.

Four calls received by State Crime Stoppers and relayed to the Ruidoso group have resulted in two arrests—a

felony and a misdemeanor. The coordinator reported that Crime Stoppers paid \$2,000 in rewards during 1984.

Also during the meeting, Lovelace reported on recent action on the Crime Stoppers telephone line. A caller, November 21, claimed to know the perpetrator of the John Hall arson case, but that allegation proved to be unfounded.

A caller December 18 gave information on the Tom Boyd residence burglary. That resulted in an arrest and recovery of \$424 in stolen property. A January 2 caller provided information on a Camelot Condominium burglary, which resulted in the recovery of two television sets and provided information for continuing investigation.

In other action, the Crime Stoppers board of directors voted to make appointments to the Nominating Committee for new members. Appointed chairman was Bernie Lechman. Also appointed were Wilma Sandoval and

Don Parsons.

Appointed to the Scholarship Committee were Steve Stillman, E. J. Fouratt and Rick Evans. Named to the Awards and Recognition Committee were Earl Randall and Bill McCutcheon.

New members of the By-Laws Committee are Paul Davis and Lechman. The two also were appointed to the History and Records committee.

Appointed to the Publicity committee were Bob Duggar and Randall Mark Paz. Sandoval and Parsons were named to the Fund-raising Committee.

In other business, the board heard president Richard Sandoval urge that as many members as possible attend the State Crime Stoppers Training Conference this spring.

The regular meeting time of Ruidoso Crime Stoppers has been changed to 8:30 p.m. the second Thursday of the month.

Chino in like a lion

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort will be called "Ski Apache" if Wendell Chino achieves one of his major goals. Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, said he wanted the ski area to be identified with the tribe.

"There's going to be a professional ski race up there and we get no credit for that," Chino said in a loud voice. "I'm going to find out why. We own and operate Sierra Blanca."

The president listed his agenda for 1985 to the Tribal Council Friday. The meeting was the first of the new year, and four new members were sworn in by Chief Tribal Judge Michael Zunie Sr.

Lewis LaPaz, Frederick Peso, Silas Cochise Sr. and Virginia Klinekole took the oath of office and immediately were seated with other council members.

The meeting was set for 10 a.m., but members met in closed session to work out some undisclosed matters before the council convened. New members were sworn in at about 11 a.m.

Vice-president Keith Miller welcomed the newcomers and called for a unified council. Other council members Evelyn Breuninger, Raymond Kirgan, Berle Kanseah and John Shendo Jr. added their congratulations.

Their remarks emphasized working together and forgetting differences and personal problems, evidently referring to exchanges during the earlier closed session.

Chino has just returned from a multi-tribal meeting in Reno, Nevada. More than 100 Indian leaders discussed a United States government report of proposed legislation.

Chino condemned the report, as did delegates to the Reno meeting. They passed a resolution asking the president and Congress to allocate money for Indians to prepare another report.

"This report tries to tell us our tribal governments are obsolete," Chino said. "We had tribal governments that predate the government of the United States. It has served us well."

"This report says that we don't know how to run this tribe; but we don't have trillion-dollar debt, a debt like this country."

Proposed legislation in the report includes giving everybody within the reservation the right to vote and receive services.

"It would disintegrate, disrupt and destroy the authority of tribal sovereignty," Chino said.

Within 30 days President Reagan would begin to dismantle the Bureau of Indian Affairs, according to Chino. He predicted that education and services for the elderly would "fall along the wayside" with the new plan.

Chino called on council members to help him form a coalition of New Mexico Indian tribes to defeat passage of legislation listed in the report. He suggested working with federal employees as well as other Indians.

Updating the tribal cattle management project is another priority on Chino's agenda. He listed a sawmill project and the golf course at the Inn of the Mountain Gods as 1985 projects.

The tribe has approval for 50 additional houses.

"We need to get a move on it before Mr. Reagan puts his axe to us," Chino said.

He said he planned to pursue the tribal claim on Fort Stanton Mesa.

In an item left over from 1984, Chino said Plains Electric had offered the Apaches "peanuts" for right of way through the reservation. He rejected their offer, which he said should have been about \$300,000.

"We're a long way from being broke because our portfolio is pretty good," he said. "But we want to protect that for generations and generations."

Strengthening the tribal court and getting youth workers to staff the tribal facilities are Chino's goals. He showed the council the new tribal seal.

In closing, Chino again emphasized the importance of laying aside "petty differences" and moving forward for the good of the tribe.

The tribal council stood and applauded their president's remarks, and then went right to work in closed session.

Busy year for P&Z

Planning and Zoning activities in the Village of Ruidoso were somewhat busier in 1984 than in past years, according to Planning and Zoning (P&Z) enforcement officer Paul Davis.

Davis released a compilation of the official activities of his office, the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) and the Planning and Zoning Commission during the past year.

"They've been a little busier," Davis said of the commission. In his compilation, Davis notes that the commission handled 31 rezoning requests in 1984, 18 of which were requested by property owners and the remainder of which were initiated as administrative reviews.

Also during the year, the commission heard 52 replat requests and 49 lot line setback variance requests. Five conditional use requests and 15 appeals from APRC also were part of the workload.


In addition, the commission considered 13 requests for abandonment or vacation of rights of way and handled six commercial development reviews and two changes of use. Also heard were two annexation requests and a non-conforming use request.

Also busy was APRC. The committee handled 121 sign applications and 111 building applications for commercial or multi-family buildings.

The Planning and Zoning Office also handled sign applications after June 11, due to a Ruidoso village council decision to give the office that power. Since that decision, the office handled 109 such requests.

The new year will see the office also handling lot line setback variance requests as the result of another council ruling. However, the office will handle only variances on lots that date back prior to the institution of the master plan in March 1976.

"As you can see, the year 1984 was a very productive year," Davis concluded in his compilation.

Students enjoy battle of the eggs

The objects dropped from a height of 40 feet—some bouncing on the ground with a minimum of noise, some impacting with a loud splat.

A loud splat was the rule rather than the exception, however, as the "First International Egg-Dropping Contest" was held at Ruidoso Middle School Friday morning.

The contest was organized by science teacher Frank Cannella, and it involved some of the school's sixth-grade students.

"I got this idea when I attended the National Science Teachers' Convention in Albuquerque in November," the tall, slender Cannella said. "We think this will help the students get more interested in science and engineering."

A total of 35 students took part in the contest, with 12 eggs not break-

ing. Ruben Reyes, an employee of Texas-New Mexico Power Company, got into a bucket truck and dropped the eggs to the ground.

Each student covered his or her egg in some kind of protective material. The eggs had to be un-tampered, and all containers had to free-fall. If the egg was undamaged after the fall, the experiment was a success.

The material around each egg was supposed to absorb some of the energy and relieve pressure on the egg. Otherwise, the pressure of the fall would transfer energy to the egg and it would break.

As Reyes dropped each of the objects, the students gathered around. Each egg that broke brought laughter from the students.

Even Cannella got into the experiment, covering his egg with a large box. His egg broke on impact.

"I think the key to the egg not breaking would be to have it


covered by some light material that was dispersed over a large area to create low density," Cannella explained. "And that's what the kids learned in this experiment, more about density."

The students whose eggs survived the fall were Erica Batton, Amy Sitzler, Bridgett Herrera, James Larkin, Chris Tate, Lynn Casteel, Emily Chavez, Brian Perry, Vincent Chavez, Scott Hickerson, Stefanie Stillman, and Sterlen Kane.

But the whole idea of the experiment was to learn, and Cannella may have some more ideas in the future.

"We're thinking about having the 'First International Naked-Egg Dropping Contest sometime,'" he said. "That would be where the egg by itself would be dropped into some material on the ground."

"That would be an even bigger challenge."





Playing without senior star Diane McClure, the Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team lost to visiting Artesia 57-42 Thursday night. The 6-0 McClure was ill, and the Warriors missed her strong inside shooting and rebounding. Ruidoso is now 2-6 on the season.

Artesia had a 38-14 lead at halftime, but the Warriors came back to outscore the Bulldogs in the second half to make the score more respectable.

"I thought playing without Diane

would hurt the team, but not as much as it did," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "We played terrible in the first half."

"We didn't show any leadership out there. No rebounding, no control. In the second half, however, we settled down and played better."

Artesia led almost from the start in the contest as standout Tracey Bennett scored 35 of the Bulldogs' points, hitting on a variety of shots from inside and outside. Bennett is rated one of the top players in the state.

Ruidoso slowed down the Bulldogs in the second half, outscoring them 28-19. Sophomore Katherine Sanchez

did a good job offensively and defensively for the Warriors.

Sanchez scored 10 points and grabbed nine rebounds to at least partially make up for the absence of McClure. Senior Gia Rose led the Warrior scoring with 16 points. She also did a good job defensively, stealing the ball several times.

"Gia did a good job," Castanon acknowledged. "But we need more overall scoring from our guards."

McClure should be back for the Hatch contest next Saturday in the Warrior gymnasium. The junior varsity will play at 3 p.m., followed by the varsity contest.

The Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team got a good look at one of the top teams in the state when the Warriors lost to visiting Lovington 62-39 Friday night.

Ruidoso, now 0-9 on the season, trailed 8-1 early in the first period. But the Warriors stayed close to Lovington as Dion Lopez hit a jump shot at the first-period buzzer to cut the Wildcats' lead to 12-7.

Lovington gradually increased its margin in the second quarter as 6-4 Greg LaFour and 6-3 Johnnie Hilliard hit on a variety of shots from inside.

The Wildcats outscored the Warriors 14-3 in the second quarter for a 23-15 halftime advantage.

Both teams traded buckets early in the third quarter, and then Patric Pearson hit a layup off a pass from Lopez to cut the Wildcats' lead to nine points (28-19).

However, the visitors built their lead back up and took a 42-25 advantage into the final quarter.

The Warriors added 14 points in the fourth quarter, but Lovington tallied 20 points for its final margin of victory.

Senior Tracy Gann led the Warriors with 16 points. He played one of his best games of the season. But no other Ruidoso player scored in double figures.

LaFour scored 18 points for the Wildcats. Pat Homer added 14 and Hilliard scored 11. Hilliard also blocked several shots and was tough on the boards.

Despite the Wildcats' height advantage, the Warriors almost matched Lovington in the rebounding battle.

Lovington picked off 22 rebounds and Ruidoso grabbed 20. Sophomore Brian Davis garnered 10 rebounds and blocked two shots for the Warriors.

"We just couldn't hit inside," said Warrior head coach Gene Segura after the contest. "I can see why they (Lovington) are ranked second in the state."


Lillian Duffy led the Warrior scoring with 19 points, 17 in the second half. Veralyn Platta added 13.

When the owners of the recently opened Jerry Dale's Bowling Center say they have the finest bowling center in the Southwest (and the best hamburgers in the world), some people might chalk it up to simple owners' pride.

Jerry and Debi Bigham, however, manage to back up their claim very nicely, thank you. A visit to the facility can turn even the most skeptical into believers.

First off, for the old-timers, the ghosts of the past have been swept away. Memories of loud, smoky conversations when the building housed a popular dance hall are erased away in minutes. Competitive shouts of joy and bowling pins crashing now penetrate the well-lit, plushly carpeted interior.

The Bighams give the complete tour. First stop is the nursery. Jerry explains that baby-sitting service is provided free to any participant bowling in a league.

"Where else can you go to have this much fun and not pay a baby-sitter?" Debi asked.

"The best hamburgers in the world" are right around the corner. This month the special is free French fries and a Coke with every hamburger. Reasonable prices, fast service, and fresh ingredients are the recipe for the snack bar.

Whoa ... just what every bowler needs is only a hop away from the excitement of the lanes. Famous Haagen Dazs ice cream goes for 80 cents a scoop.

You say you want to know about the bowling? Ten brand-new Brunswick system 2000 ("can't buy a better brand") lanes are at your service, the Bighams explain.

Open bowling (non-league) is available most afternoons, Saturdays and Sundays. At \$1.75 a person per game and 75 cents for bowling shoe rental, the Bighams think "it's the best and cheapest

family entertainment there is."

"We have a league for everyone. Men's, ladies, mixed leagues. We have business lunch leagues, restaurant leagues, real estate leagues, junior leagues, senior citizens ... oh, all kinds of leagues," Debi says with pride. She pointed out that around 400 local people belong to a league at Jerry Dale's Bowling Center. New leagues form again for the summer season.

Bowling pro Chuy Castaneda and Wayne Bassham are co-managers of the bowling center, the Bighams said. Castaneda offers free bowling lessons to those wanting to learn to bowl or improve their game. A complete line of bowling accessories are available in the pro shop, from balls to bags.

"Obviously we are very proud of this place," says Jerry. "We took what we considered a big loser, and turned it into a winner."






Patricia Sedillo and Anita Lacey fear for their lives in this humorous scene from "Whodunit?" The play is one of three to be presented this week.

School board sets building priorities

Discussion of building proposals and priorities took up much of Capitan's school board meeting Thursday night.

In February, Capitan residents will vote on a proposed \$973,000 bond issue. If passed, the money will be used for additions to the school.

The board discussed the proposed projects and the order in which they will be completed if the bond issue passes.

It was agreed that the first priority will be acquisition of adjacent land currently owned by the United States Forest Service. School superintendent Leonard Hays is in the process of negotiating a possible land trade with the Forest Service. The board also discussed the possibility of selling some of the school district's 13 acres of land to raise money to augment the bond issue.

The first building constructed would be the new library. The current library would be renovated into a much needed cafeteria. After the

library and cafeteria have been started, construction would begin on the new athletic field and track.

Architects Jim Haag and Kent Travernicht of Nims Calvani and Associates presented another master plan proposal to the board. Architect Jim French discussed the land situation. It was determined that nothing more could be decided until the land situation was settled and the bond issue passed.

On financial issues, Hays reported that Capitan might receive \$25,000 Critical Capital Outlay money and \$27,000 in Supplementary Assistance funds from the state this year.

The outlay money would be used to furnish shades, carpets and furniture for one of the classrooms in the remodeled building. The supplementary assistance money will offset the \$73,000 deficit in Capitan's general funds.

After a discussion of non-certified employees, the board asked Hays to draft a proposal on how to figure starting salaries for employees with experience at other schools. Board

member Robert Runnels had asked to see the workers' salaries at last month's meeting.

The board accepted the resignation of Marlene Long, a special education aide who has moved out of state. The board voted to accept Hays' proposal to move Zelda Zumwalt into the position. Zumwalt, a custodian, had been filling in as the aide since Long left.

The board approved the revised discipline policy that was discussed at the last meeting. The new policy spells out strict guidelines for administering corporal punishment.

A resolution asking the state to do a compatibility study comparing New Mexico's teacher certification requirements to those of other states was adopted by the board. The study could change the reciprocity guidelines if necessary. School board president Mark Delgado said the New Mexico School Board Association had passed a similar resolution recently.

The board will hold its next meeting one week earlier than usual because they have to canvass the votes from the election. They will meet at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, February 7.

Tigers win Smokey Classic, girls take second

Editorial

In the lead paragraph of his story on last Tuesday's village council meeting, the reporter referred to a "dramatic" project.

The "drama" lay not only in the scope and expense of a planned \$100,000 rechanneling of the Rio Ruidoso and Carrizo Creek, but in the fact that it was approved, and funded so suddenly.

Item 6E on the council agenda for January 8, under "Reports From Municipal Officials," read: "Frank Potter - Flood damage." As it turned out, Mr. Potter's report was a sales pitch for a plan to rechannel the two rivers.

He proved to be a good salesman, winning approval of the plan and the \$100,000 appropriation by a unanimous vote of the three councillors present.

We wondered if it was a case of preaching to the converted—whether the council had been briefed individually or collectively beforehand. Such was not the case, according to the councillors we asked.

Rick Evans said the action was a spontaneous thing. It was evidently prompted by the realization that if Ruidoso were to address its flood problems, it would have to do so itself, without much hope of state or federal help.

It struck us as a little odd that the council acted so suddenly, with three members absent. We would have been more comfortable if the action had been taken at a special meeting, after public input on the specific subject of flood problems.

Of course, it is not the purpose of the council to make the newspaper feel comfortable.—TP

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Remember the Wise and the Foolish Virgins? In the scriptural story, the wise ones were prepared and the foolish ones were caught short at the arrival of the wedding party in which they were to serve.

Well, in Santa Fe, it's now Bridegroom Time, as it is every year when the Legislature comes to town; and some state agencies are prepared and some are not.

Saddest to see are those who think they are prepared and then have the whole show blow up in their faces.

Take Michael Francke of Corrections. He staged that big media event, the locking-up of some legislators, public officials and news folks, to get maximum coverage for how well he runs his department, so legislators would look with mercy on him and grant him the bucks he says must be his. He was making like a Wise Virgin, in short.

Then along comes that big escape from the medium-security prison at Los Lunas and that report from the special master named by the courts, and it's Foolish Virgin days for sure.

Is that maybe just the luck of the draw?

Senate and House members won't think so. Instead, they will ask Francke questions like these:

—How come a rogue cop who already was implicated in a past serious escape can apparently wander around the pen at will, maybe taking a couple of other cons with him?

—How can an ex-inmate drive a rented truck into and out of one of Francke's institutions without thorough inspection of the vehicle at either end of the trip?

—Shouldn't a guard who is out of circulation for three hours because escapees have handcuffed him to some shelves at least be missed?

—What use is being made of the funds given Francke for training correctional personnel when almost half the guards at the main pen in Santa Fe have not received the orientation courses ordered by the court?

—And finally, why is Francke going around the state criticizing past legislators for the way they treated Corrections when the job he is doing

leaves so much to be desired? (Those are not just "made-up" questions which originate with some intemperate newspaper columnist; they come from real, live members of the Legislature, who say the Corrections boss had better prepare his soul for a rough time during Legislature 1985.)

Another one staging press conferences and going suavely about making as many friends as possible at just this time of year is State Land Commissioner Jim Baca. He, too, wants everyone to see that he has his lamp trimmed when the Bridegroom arrives.

He's anxious to impress legislators because he wants them to give him a very big gift. He wants to be allowed, solo, to set the charges for any use of state land. If he is to do that, the present cap on such charges, as limited by statute, must be removed.

So obliging is Baca being that he has even said he hopes leaders of the oil and gas industry, the ones most affected by his proposal, will help him lobby it through the Legislature. (That's a little like your landlord asking you to assist in getting a sharp raise in your rent.)

The oil and gas producers this writer talks to often grow obscenely vocal on the subject of Baca's idea—against, not for it. Essentially, they ask a tough question, which comes down to this: What does Jim Baca know about setting fair rates of the kind he talks about?

The Constitution, after all, lists no qualifications required in a candidate for Land Commissioner. All he has to do is run and get elected, often, like Baca, with no obvious qualifications for the job. Normally the person chosen has little or no knowledge of the value of the land he oversees.

Now Baca wants that person to have a kind of life-and-death power over rental rates and royalties, with no check or balance from any other part of government.

You can see why that makes oil and gas folks, along with the livestock and agricultural industry, a little nervous. They're hoping Baca's preparations for the legislative session will not impress lawmakers and his ideas will not prevail.

Do you ever wonder why you no longer do some of the things you used to do? We were at a 7-11 the other night and my wife asked me to get her a magazine.

Looking over the selection, I spied a "MAD" magazine.

"What the heck?" I thought, and bought it.

I used to be a regular reader of MAD, but I guess I outgrew it. It was fun looking through the March '85 issue. (Remember how the magazine always was dated many months ahead for some reason? It still is.)

Another thing MAD still does is refer to the price on the cover as "cheap." It's now \$1.25 cheap instead of 25 cents cheap, however.

What do you get for your buck and a quarter? Well, the March cover has a painting of someone who had been straggling across the desert.

The unfortunate has just been flattened by a crate of rescue supplies dropped from a passing Red Cross plane. The hand at the end of the arm sticking out from under the crate still grasps an empty canteen.

The name stenciled on the canteen: Neuman, A.E.

Alfred E. Neuman, MAD's Everyman, he of "What, me worry?" fame, still is quoted under the nameplate on the table of contents page. This month's quote is rather weak, however, and does not bear repeating.

MAD still contains no advertising, except its own. What MAD sells, of course, are special publications like "More Trash From MAD," which features "8 shocking, ridiculous full-color MAD mini-posters, plus 80 pages of garbage from past issues."

The ad for "A MAD Look at the 50's" invites readers to "Re-live those 'Happy Days' of McCarthyism, the Korean War, Ike and Dick, The Bomb ... and other Fonze and Games!"

Getting into the magazine's editorial content (?), I found not one but FOUR movie satires. Movie satires appear to be more of a staple of MAD than ever. This month offers "Ghost-Dusters," "Purple Acid Rain," "The Karocky Kid" and "Supergall."

The satires are a lot of fun to read,

especially if you have seen the movie. In Ghost-Dusters (has anyone in the world not seen "Ghost-Busters"?), the team takes a captured ghost and puts it where "It'll never live to haunt us again!!"—on a New York City subway!

We see the terrified apparition surrounded by knife-wielding thugs as the Dusters smugly look on.

If you haven't seen the movie that's being satirized, you still can appreciate the humor in dialogue like this, from "Purple Acid Rain:" Prince character (The Kidd): "Hi! I'm the Kidd ... an electrifying, half-Black, half-Italian, bisexual-looking rock performer who wears 18th Century lace and makes Boy George look like Walter Mondale! I could be a SUPERSTAR!"

Girlfriend: "Oh, really ... ? What's holding you back ... ?"

Kidd: "I need a GIMMICK!"

A fixture in the MAD stable of regular contributors ("the usual gang of idiots") is artist/writer Dave Berg. In the "Berg's-Eye View Dept." this month we find "The Lighter Side of ..." several things.

Berg used to devote himself to one subject in his department, but here we find him dealing with several. Berg is a master of irony.

On "Names," he has a couple stuck in bumper-to-bumper traffic with nobody moving. "THAT'S something I always wondered about!" says the wife. "So why do they call it the 'RUSH HOUR' ... ?!"

Well, that example shows the drawbacks of trying to communicate the humor without the accompanying illustrations. Suffice it to say that MAD seemed to me as fresh and funny as ever.

"Exciting New Uses for Miracle 'VELCRO'" is hilarious.

I don't know if a person outgrows MAD, or just doesn't have as much time as he gets older to stop and laugh about things. That's kind of sad.

Somehow I doubt that reading the March issue will make me subscribe to MAD, but I might pick it up once in a while at the store.

Cathy probably would just as soon I didn't.

She wanted me to buy her a "GOOD HOUSEKEEPING" ...!!

It Will Be a Horse Race
Horse racing in Texas, a hot item in the 1983 Legislature, will again become a much-discussed subject this session. And, while such gambling might bring some benefits to the state as a whole, for El Paso, legalization of pari-mutuel betting could be destructive.

This is admittedly self-serving, but El Paso's economy, just now recovering from peso devaluation woes, doesn't need any more blows.

Sunland Park Race Track, which is just outside El Paso and across the New Mexico border, already is reeling from New Mexico's decision to allow Santa Fe race track operator Ken Newton and the State Fair Commission to initiate spring horse racing at the fairgrounds in Albuquerque.

Sunland officials and El Paso tourism officials already have pointed out that Sunland will lose both top horses and customers to the new racing schedule. Since Sunland did about \$1 million of wagering business last year—an average of \$345,423 and 2,971 persons per day—that loss will be felt all over El Paso. The 1,500 to 2,000 people that Sunland and directly-related activities keep employed would be affected. Many of those people reside in

El Paso, pay taxes and send their children to school here.

The Texas bill would allow construction of tracks in four Texas cities. It would add \$2 billion a year to the economy, according to a study by the firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co. But, again, Sunland Track would lose business, and that means El Paso will lose.

When the last pari-mutuel proposal was made in early 1983, El Paso tourism officials estimated that 40 percent of El Paso's hotel occupancy on weekends came from visitors to Sunland and Juarez tracks. Up to 85 percent of that total was from Lubbock, Midland-Odessa and Dallas areas.

There also are other common sense arguments against pari-mutuel betting. The largest is that such legalized betting attracts the criminal element. States that have legalized gambling also must deal with growing organized crime.

Yes, a pari-mutuel bill could help legislators avoid another tax jump in 1985. The gambling revenues would add helpful money to the state's coffers. But the revenues would be made at El Paso's expense.

When a stunning young woman first inquired about Alexis Colby at the Denver Detention Center, she left many "Dynasty" fans baffled as to her purpose. And while she had not immediately identified herself, it was soon established that she was yet another secret of her mother's tumultuous past. Although Miss Oxenberg is starring on one of TV's hottest series, she says: "My greatest accomplishment is just seeing myself progress on a daily basis. I'm very much a person of today. I always have dreams."

And while she's content with her current role, it offers her a good opportunity for exposure. "As for my future plans, too much is going on in the immediate time, so it's too hard to tell. I want to be a good, acclaimed actress. I have thought about what this will branch off to. I have so much learning, so many roads to follow."

POPULAR COED — Whenever Bob Hope travels the college circuit, bringing wit and humor to the campus crowd, he keeps hearing the same question, "Where's Brooke Shields?" Brooke Shields manages to keep up her grades at Princeton and still get out to join Hope on TV, most recently on his Christmas special. "She's a brilliant performer," Hope says. "She's eager to learn. I'd give her straight A's anytime."

TOO MUCH — Television brings us too much of a good thing. That's the message from Robert Batscha, head of the Museum of Broadcasting in New York. He says that TV's worst aspect is that it produces too much. He cited the British comedy "Monty Python" as a show that knew when to stop. "They only did 19 of those shows. But if you take a series done in the United States, and if it's a good thing, it runs for 10 years. Maybe we ought to stop at 19 or 20 episodes and do them very well, instead of worrying about doing them year after year after year."

TESTING, TESTING — Have you ever wanted to do those detergent or paper-towel tests they do on TV just to see if you get the same fantastic results? David Horowitz challenges the accuracy of television commercials on his syndicated consumer awareness program, "Fight Back." "This segment has become a campy thing among ad agencies," he says. "They all tune in to see whose commercial I'm going to take on this time." Horowitz dramatizes the commercials to see if he can substantiate their claims. "We dressed a 200-pound guy in a gorilla costume to stomp on luggage, as they do in that commercial," he says. "It passed the test. We don't do these things to make fun of commercials but to make the consumers aware. About 95 percent of the commercials we've challenged have passed."
