## Warriors get home hoop win

Now the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team truly can say, "There's no place like home."

The Warriors won their first home game in three years and their first game of the season when they stopped New Mexico Military Institute 39-24 Saturday.

Ruidoso, now 1-9 on the season, had not won at home since February 5, 1982, when the Warriors defeated Tularosa 43-39. Ruidoso will play NMMI again Tuesday night, this time on the Colts' court in Roswell.

It was defense and some clutch free throw shooting that stopped NMMI Saturday night.

Ruidoso forced NMMI turnovers time and again. Warrior 6-3 senior Tracy Gann iced the game with two steals and ensuing layups that gave Ruidoso a 34-23 lead with just over two minutes left.

Russell Easter and Dion Lopez came through with some clutch free throw shooting in the victory. Each player made two free throws in the last four minutes.

"It was a long time coming," said Warrior head coach Gene Segura after the game. "We played good defense and forced a number of turnovers."

"That number 21 of theirs (Bruce Buttrun) is an excellent ball player." Buttrun scored 15 points, but the rest of the Colts players were ice cold. No other NMMI player scored more than three points.

Ruidoso had a slight lead most of the game, taking a 12-9 edge at the end of the first period.

Sophomore Brian Davis scored seven of his 10 points in the first quarter to spark the Warriors. Davis picked up three fouls in the first half and did not play much in the second half.

The game was slow-paced as both teams played deliberate ball and had

trouble finding the hoop. With the score 12-10 early in the second quarter, Patric Pearson sank two free throws to give the Warriors a 14-10 edge.

After NMMI came back with four points to two for Ruidoso, Easter hit a jumper for an 18-14 Warrior edge. Davis then closed out the first-half scoring with a free throw for a 19-14 Ruidoso advantage.

The Warriors took a 21-14 lead in the first minute of the third period when Gann hit a field goal.

But NMMI came back and closed the margin to 21-20. Easter made a bucket for a 23-20

Warrior lead, but the Colts scored three points to tie the contest.

However, Lopez fed Easter for a layup that gave Ruidoso a 25-23 edge. The Warriors led from then on.

The Warriors did an adequate job on the free throw line, hitting 11 of 19 attempts.

But Ruidoso did not do a good job on the boards, and Segura hopes for some improvement.

Davis led the Warriors in scoring, but Gann and Easter each had nine points. Easter also stole the ball three times and had one of his best games.

Pearson tallied six and Lopez scored five.

## Rechanneling scrapped

Flood prevention efforts continued in Ruidoso as the village council voted during a special meeting Friday to direct village administration officials to draw up plans for a bridge replacement program.

The vote came as a result of discussion primarily between councilors and assistant village manager Frank Potter. Potter outlined the progress of the rechanneling project for which the council recently allocated \$100,000.

He reported that plans to clean up and rechannel the Rio Ruidoso and Carrizo Creek had to be scrapped. Village attorney Lee Huckstep stated the opinion in a letter to the council last week that any such work could be done only through condemnation proceedings or by obtaining permission of the property owners bordering the waterways.

It was learned at the meeting that the riverbed actually is owned by those private property owners who border the waterways. Only the water itself is in the public domain.

Potter indicated that either condemnation or gaining permission of the property owners would take too long.

He described the waterway situation as "quite a problem"—one that demands rapid solving.

"It hurts my soul to see the condition it's in," he remarked of the waterways.

Potter noted the collection of flood debris and the filling-in of the waterway channels by sediment as the major problems that must be remedied.

Also, many river-bordering property owners have expressed fear over how the coming spring snowmelt may affect the level of the river, Potter reported.


"There are some people we have that are absolutely frightened," he said.

After being questioned by Mayor George White, Huckstep explained that the village has no legal right to enter onto the private property riverbed.

Huckstep also noted that although a declaration of a state of emergency had been made by the council at the time of the last flood, the village only had the right to cross onto private property under the declaration while the emergency existed.

Even if a group of citizens were to collectively give permission for cleanup and rechanneling along their properties, the problem would not be solved, Potter said unless the whole channel can be remedied at once. Piecemeal attempts would be futile.

Potter explained that if one area of the river were cleaned and rechannelled, the next period of flooding would simply wash debris into the cleared

area from upstream. The river would not necessarily flow in the rechannelled area.

Councillor Sherman Atwood pointed to the cost of cleanup and rechanneling as another blockade against the village effort. He estimated a thorough cleanup and rechanneling would cost \$5 to \$10 million.

"The only thing we can really do is take care of the bridges," he said. He stated that river property owners should be responsible for cleanup of the river.

Potter outlined the steps necessary to repair or replace all bridges and river crossings threatened by flooding in the village.

First priority, he said, is the Paradise Canyon Drive bridge at Suddarth Drive. Potter also listed as areas of concern the Reese Drive bridge; Gavilan Canyon Road bridge; Hull Road and Paradise Canyon Drive Cedar Creek crossing; construction of an emergency access

bridge to Paradise Canyon Heights; a culvert crossing on Paradise Canyon Drive; and a bridge at the village hot mix plant.

The assistant village manager estimated total costs to remedy the problem at \$300,000. He noted that funds for bridge replacement currently are being sought through two sources—the State Highway Department and the Legislature.

Funding through the Highway Department-administered Bridge Replacement Off Systems program is being requested, Potter indicated. Also, it was reported that funds for bridge replacement will be sought as part of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County request to the Legislature for a direct appropriation for various roadway projects.

Councillors also discussed the possibility of enacting some provision that would make keeping the waterways clear the responsibility of the property owners. No action was taken on the suggestion.

## Sports complex core drilling delayed

Snow may be a boon to skiers, but to the Parks and Recreation Department it is proving a bane to progress on the Eagle Creek Sports Complex.

"We're waiting on the weather," said Parks and Recreation Department director Bobby Bailey. What is waiting is core testing at the site of the complex.

Bailey explained that core testing will determine the rock content of the earth that must be removed to level the future site of playing fields at the complex.

Recent snows halted the core drilling project with only two of six holes completed. Bailey noted, however, that the two holes yielded samples that show much less rock content than he had feared the hillside might contain.

"We look real good," Bailey said of the drilling so far. He indicated that the results were good enough to justify keeping the project at the Eagle Creek site.

Village officials had been concerned about a high rock content in the area. Had the tests revealed a high rock content, costs to level the rocky area might have outweighed the positive points of the site, causing the project to be moved to another location.

But Bailey said the department will proceed at the site, weather permitting.

"I think we're basically going to go ahead with this project," he said.

Also awaiting the melting of the snows are archaeological studies of the area mandated by the state. Bailey explained that since the project will be funded in part through the state Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, the studies are necessary to identify any archaeological findings that may be at the site.

Other work at the site includes the moving of a power line that runs across the future playing fields. Bailey reported that an estimate on moving the power line—about \$9,000—had been received from Otero County Electric Cooperative. Bailey said he sent a letter notifying the company to move the lines.

"We're trying to get this thing going," Bailey said.


## SKI REPORT

Smith and Rhodes will be in different countries, they will be within 300 miles of each other. They hope to travel together some weekends.

"This is something very few people get to do," Smith said. Both he and Rhodes are elated to have been selected.

They agreed that John Howden of Ruidoso is largely responsible for their selection. Smith and Rhodes ex-

pressed their gratitude to Howden, Carrol Carter and Charles Tallman for the opportunity to be exchange students.

New Mexico exchange students will meet in Albuquerque in April. Smith, Rhodes and other new students will meet foreign students living in this district this year.

They expect to learn a lot from other exchange students. The students will participate in one more preparatory event, and then they'll be on their way.

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

## Warrior wrestlers take victories over Goddard, Colts

The Ruidoso High School varsity wrestling team moved its dual-match record to 3-2 with wins over Goddard and New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) Saturday in Roswell.

The Warriors stopped Goddard 38-23 and rolled over NMMI 53-18. "We didn't really wrestle well," said Warrior head coach Gerald Ames. "We didn't get to wrestle last week in El Paso (the team didn't go because of a snowstorm), and we just weren't that sharp. But

I was pleased that we won both matches."

Kevin Jameson was a standout for the Warriors, taking two impressive victories in the 137-pound class. He pinned both of his opponents, with the victory against NMMI coming just 33 seconds into the first period.

"Kevin Jameson did very well," Ames remarked. "He was probably our top wrestler today. He and Zach Swalander did a very good job."

Swalander, competing in the 140-pound division, pinned his opponent in the Goddard match. He took a forfeit victory in the NMMI competition.

Jeff Schmidt at 100 pounds, Scott Yeatman at 107 pounds and heavyweight Phillip Herrera each took two forfeit wins.

Jameson's younger twin brothers, Kyle and Kerry, had mixed results in the two matches. Kyle pinned his 147-pound opponent in the second period of the

Goddard match. He lost a tight 2-0 decision against the Colts.

Kerry, wrestling in the 157-pound division, lost a 5-4 decision to Goddard's Miguel Garcia, but defeated Scott Robinson of the Colts 18-3.

Ruidoso's 169-pound James Herrera had a 5-3 tie in his Goddard match. He lost a close 5-4 decision to NMMI's Ed McKean.

Despite the loss and the tie, Herrera still has a 5-2-1 record on the season. Ruidoso's Cory Garner at 121

pounds pinned his NMMI opponent, but was pinned by a Goddard athlete.

At 128 pounds, Manuel Montano had a forfeit victory against NMMI but was pinned in the second period of his Goddard match.

The Ruidoso junior varsity did well in a Carlsbad tournament Saturday. There was no team scoring in the tournament.

Augustine Apache finished second in the 169-pound division.

Apache's teammates Don Eder and Robert Harris finished third and fourth in the same weight class.

Freshman Lance Willard added a fourth in the 137-pound division.

The Warrior varsity will get some tough competition when Ruidoso participates in the Carlsbad Tournament this Friday and Saturday. Some of the state's top AAAA-division schools will compete.

## Ruidoso boys junior varsity cagers take victories over Goddard, NMMI

The Ruidoso High School boys junior varsity basketball team is on a hot streak after taking home wins over the Goddard sophomores and New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) over the weekend.

Friday night the Warriors belted Goddard 46-35. Saturday Ruidoso topped the Colts 40-22. Ruidoso is now 3-5 on the season.

Against Goddard, the Warriors jumped off to a 16-4 first-quarter lead and coasted in from there. Ruidoso's fast break worked very well in the first half.

Ruidoso led 26-12 at halftime and 37-22 at the end of the third period.

Freshman Kirk Ryan canned 14 points on six field goals and two free throws to lead the Ruidoso attack.

Carl Lueras added 13 points and Jeff Willingham tallied 10 for the Warriors.

Saturday's contest saw both teams get off to a slow start. The score was tied 4-4 at the end of the opening quarter.

Ruidoso gradually opened up a lead in the second period, and led 13-7 at halftime. NMMI cut the advantage to 21-18 at the third-period break.

Early in the final quarter, Ruidoso led 23-20. However, Kirk Ryan hit a jump shot and Toby Rue added

another field goal for a 27-20 Warrior lead.

The Warriors then blew the game open, outscoring NMMI 13-2 the rest of the way.

Rue led Ruidoso with 10 points. Ryan added nine points, Hamilton Carter scored seven and Garret Henson tallied five.

"We're getting better," said coach Ridge Bowden after the game. "The

game against Goddard was probably our best of the season. We were kind of slow getting started against NMMI, but we scored more points in the final quarter (18) than we have in any other quarter this season."

Ruidoso will play NMMI for the second time when the Warriors travel to Roswell Tuesday night. The junior varsity contest will begin at 6:30.

## Maul's second-place finish leads local skiers' efforts

Goddard jumped out to a 17-2 advantage over the Warriors and never trailed.


Eric Ford led the Warriors with 10 points. Sean Moore added eight points. Clint Bob scored seven.



## Bank has new look

Creation of a warm, friendly atmosphere was the intent in remodeling The Bank of Ruidoso main branch. Response of customers and employees indicates the goal was achieved.

"Nothing but favorable feedback" has resulted from the project, according to bank vice president Don Shaw. Actual square footage of the bank building did not change, Shaw ex-

plained, but the amount of space for customer access was increased significantly. Closets, stairwells and wasted space were utilized to provide an estimated 700 to 1,000 square feet for customer services.

The floor plan also was modified with the customer in mind. President Ralph Petty Jr. has his office just inside the bank's main entrance.

"The accessibility of our officers is

very important to us," said Petty. Petty helped organize the bank when it first opened in 1970. He recalled that the building originally was a grocery store. It had been remodeled three times prior to the most recent improvements.

He said the bank board considered building a new main branch, but decided the Gateway location really couldn't be improved on.

Shaw said the project was practically like starting from scratch, since it included new walls, a new roof and new plumbing and wiring.

All of the newness contributes to something else the bank wanted new—its image.

"We wanted a new image that reflected our belief in the future of Ruidoso," said Petty.

## Accountant notes change in tax law for autos

Ruidoso accountant Frank Gally prepared a report on a new federal law regarding automotive expenses. His report follows:

The amended Code Section 274 states that no deduction will be allowed for:

Travel (including meals and lodging); entertainment; gifts; or automotive expenses for vehicles of a type that can be used as passenger vehicles unless the taxpayer establishes by adequate contemporaneous records the time, place, amount, and business purpose of the expense.

The new law added auto expenses to the list of deductions expressly denied without definite records. Also, the law previously had allowed the deduction based on "adequate records" (note the addition of the word contemporaneous in the new law) or "sufficient evidence corroborating the tax-

payer's own statement" (this phrase eliminated under the new law).

New IRS Regulation 1.274-5T (pertaining to vehicle expenses) reads: "The adequate contemporaneous record requirement shall be satisfied only by keeping a log, journal, diary, or other similar record in the manner prescribed ..."

"... the taxpayer shall make a separate entry in the log, diary, journal, or other similar record for each use of the (vehicle). Uses which may be considered part of a single use, for example, a round trip, may be accounted for by a single entry. Each entry shall specify:

The date of the use of the property; the name of the user of the property; the number of miles driven; the purpose of the (trip) (e.g., 'to make a sales presentation to a

customer,' 'to devise a personal budget plan')."

The new law and regulation are effective as of January 1, 1985. Note that "contemporaneous" means "at or near to the time the vehicle is used," not at the end of the year.

If you claim deductions for the above expenses and cannot produce the required contemporaneous records if and when you are audited, you will likely be assessed a negligence penalty in addition to having all of the claimed expense disallowed.

Tax preparers are required by law to advise you of the above changes prior to preparing your 1985 tax return and to obtain a signed statement from each taxpayer claiming such expenses that the taxpayer does have the required records.

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

## Batte, Quinones state views on schools

Robert Batte, a resident of Torch Ranch (between Lincoln and Capitan), believes in a back-to-basics, well-rounded education. That is one of the reasons he is running for the Capitan school board.

Batte is a senior serviceman for the Penasco Valley Telephone Company. He feels that seven years of administrative work with the company has given him the public relations and decision-making skills a school board member needs.

"I'm able to listen to all the facts before making decisions," he said. Batte said he always had taken an active interest with his children in school activities such as band boosters. He would like to see Capitan schools continue to grow and improve to eventually become one of the top 10 school districts, educationally, in the state.

"As a board member, I would work closely with the superintendent and his professional staff in seeing that our kids get the best education. In my opinion, that should be the major responsibility of the board," said Batte.

He said he felt that sometimes the school board interfered with the ad-

ministration's duties. The defined duties of the board include delegating administrative functions to the superintendent.

Batte indicated that many problems that come up before the board could be dealt with in-house, "without hurt feelings at a board meeting."

"I feel that politics and egos need to be kept out of our kids' education," said Batte. "I have no axes to grind... I want to contribute to this area."

Batte is a firm believer in old-fashioned discipline and has no qualms with students being paddled when necessary. He feels that Capitan does not have a serious discipline problem in comparison to other schools.

He would like to see more vocational training offered in the schools. As president of Capitan's emergency medical technicians (EMTs) group, he supports EMT and cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) classes.

Batte is a native of Alamogordo. He and his wife, Betty, have three children in the Capitan schools. Bob is 14, Jamie is 9 and Kerry is 8.

"The bottom line is to provide the best possible education to each and every student in the district, given sound application of available resources to that district," said Armando Quinones, school board candidate.

Quinones works at Fort Stanton as supervisor of the building trades department. Before coming to Lincoln County, he taught high school social studies and English for three years in Los Lunas and eight years in Alamogordo.

Quinones cited his degree in education from the University of New Mexico, his teaching experience and continued education as his qualifications for the school board. He is certified to teach seven secondary subjects, and has taken graduate level classes in curriculum, educational finance and management and sociology of education.

In Alamogordo, Quinones served as president of the Associated Classroom Teachers for two years. In that role, he dealt with negotiations and various educational issues.

"I feel an urgency to contribute to

the growth of the students in this district," said Quinones when asked the reason for his candidacy.

Quinones stressed the need for a "good, effective" discipline policy. He feels that corporal punishment is not effective on a secondary level. He advocates a policy of counseling, suspensions and appeals procedures.

As a board member, Quinones would support a "strong fiscal policy." He would not pinpoint where, if necessary, he would favor budget cuts.

"It is possible to re-prioritize... well within the parameters of the line-item allocations," he said.

Quinones will suggest retaining an in-house attorney to answer legal questions and represent the school district in court if needed. He favors expansion of the art and vocational departments.

Quinones and his family live 20 miles on the north side of the Capitan Mountains. His wife, Helen, works as an aide in the school. Quinones said that if an issue concerning his wife were to come up before the board, he would abstain from voting.

They have four children - Armando, 21; Yvonne 17; Inez, 13; and Priscilla, 7.

## County P&Z on replats

At a regular meeting Thursday night, the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission again discussed the sticky issue of replats.

Tim Collins approached the board for an advisory conference on the Magado Creek subdivision. Doug Bass, owner of 12 of the 10-acre lots, wants to divide each into two lots.

According to the restrictive covenants on the land, each landowner may split his lot four ways. Thus, if those lots had 12 different owners, 48 lots could result without anyone going through the lengthy subdivision approval process.

The Bass proposal would, however, create another subdivision. The board advised Bass to limit the lots to 23, which would create a "type three" subdivision. He still has to have approval from the board and submit certain environmental reports on the land and water.

Collins also showed the board a map and master plan for the Tall Pines Trailer Park subdivision. The board rejected the plat because a cul-de-sac was too long. Collins will return to the drawing board.

The board approved member Betty Schreengost's request to replat her five lots two miles west of Lincoln.

County manager Suzanne Cox presented the board with some pro-

posed changes in the state's subdivision regulations. Cox, who is on the statewide committee that drafted the changes, said the changes clarify certain words and definitions.

The committee will meet next week in Santa Fe to finalize the drafts and present them to the state Legislature.

One major proposal would allow counties to vacate inactive subdivisions. Many subdivisions were approved in the 1970s, before the county set guidelines for road standards. Now counties are faced with upgrading the roads. If the proposal passed, developers would have to receive approval on the subdivision's roads.

The board liked this proposal, although Cox was not sure if it would pass through the Legislature.

Another proposal would empower the county commissioners to require that land splits be approved. According to Cox, Lincoln County already has done that with a resolution. Other counties, however, are just beginning to face replat and density problems.

Cox said Lincoln County already uses most of the word clarifications and replat regulations in their amended subdivision regulations.

In a closed session, the board discussed possible litigation proposed by the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board to curb violations of the historical ordinance. No action was taken on the proposed litigation.

The Capitan Education Association (CEA) will sponsor a "Meet the Candidates" night from 7 to 9 p.m. Thursday, January 24, in the multi-purpose building at the school. The forum will feature school board candidates Robert Batte, Armando Quinones, Robert Rannels and Tom Trost.

Candidates will give statements based on a questionnaire sent by the CEA and questions sent in by the public. They will also take questions from the floor. Refreshments will be served after the program.

suddenly from behind came something like an unsuspecting blow on the hurr of the ear with a twenty-pound icicle.


Down went the temperature like a freight elevator—from fifty to eighteen. The sledge hammer effect of the suddenly increasing cold sent you running to the fireplace inside.



She has a personal best of 33.85 in all-around competition. The 5-1, blond-haired Richardson has bests of 8.65 in the bars, 8.8 in the floor exercise, 8.65 in the vault and 8.35 in the balance beam.

"I'd like to compete in optionals this spring," she remarked. "In optionals, you compete in the same events but you use your own routines. I like it because you can be more creative." Garrett, a 5-2 blond 12-year-old student at Ruidoso Middle School, has a best of 32.45 in all-around competition. She says the vault is her favorite event. "The vault makes me feel like I can reach for something, like a goal," she said. She has a best of 8.35 in the vault and 8.65 in the floor exercise. Rachel has a best of 7.85 on the bars and 8.20 on the balance beam. Tam, an 11-year-old dark-haired student at White Mountain In-

termediate School, prefers the floor exercise over the other individual events. "I guess I like it because I'm good at it," the 4-7 gymnast said with a smile. "Plus, I don't get as nervous doing it." Luisa has an all-around best of around 30.00. She has bests of 8.05 in the floor exercise, 6.90 in the vault, 7.90 in the balance beam and 7.80 on the bars. Richardson probably will compete in Class II next season. Tam and Garrett will move to Class III. Next year several more Ruidoso gymnasts could join Tam, Garrett and Richardson on the competitive level.

"We could have about 15 girls competing next season," Johnson said. "We hope to have our own competitive team in this area and a new gymnasium next year." Johnson is not sure whether the competitive team would be sponsored by the Parks and Recreation Department or by the Ruidoso School of Gymnastics and Creative Fitness. "It might be a combined effort by both," Johnson commented. "But our program is really growing." Regardless of how many local youths will be in competitive gymnastics next year, look for Richardson, Garrett and Tam to be leading the way.

## Students seek work for trip

Fish, algae and assorted specimens grow in tanks and tubes in Jackie Branum's science laboratory. Her seventh and eighth graders are learning a lot about things that grow in water. Ruidoso Middle School students have an unusual opportunity. Branum teaches a course in marine biology, one of only two or three offered at the middle school level in an inland geographic location. She began the class because of many requests, and it has been so successful she is taking class members on an extended field trip March 23 through March 31. Twenty-four students will travel to Port Aransas, Texas, and go out on the Katy, a University of Texas research vessel. Students will stay in Texas A&M dormitories and do marine experiments aboard the Katy. "Students will be raising funds to pay for the trip, too," she said. Each student will need to raise \$150 or more to pay for the trip. They will host a spring school dance March 8 to raise some funds. Individuals are shoveling snow,

"Besides coaches and helpers who can ski, we'll need huggers and people to cheer the skiers on," said Jean Stillman. Stillman said the event was getting good support from Ruidoso, but more help is needed. ## Schools change attendance rules

Ruidoso Municipal Schools' new attendance policy will standardize absentee regulations among the five schools. Superintendent Sid Miller said his staff has been concerned for a long time about absenteeism at all levels. Administrators, principals and faculty members were involved in formulating the new system-wide policy. Ruidoso High School attendance director Doyle Howell said the new policy changes little at that level. RHS already had a strict policy, and he has been enforcing that policy. Howell explained that tardy students might lose credit, because late arrivals are sent to the Attendance Control Center (ACC). The ACC teacher evaluates the student's reason for being late, and determines whether he or she may go on to class or must be counted absent and remain in ACC. Roger Sowder, principal of Nob Hill Elementary School, said his school has not had a set policy in the past. Being a part of the uniform regulations will be a change for his students. Sowder explained that he felt kindergarten was not too soon for parents to begin to set some priorities involving their children's education. Setting regular attendance for students as a family policy needs to begin in kindergarten and first grade, he said. Although absenteeism has been a concern, it has not been a major problem in this school system, according to Miller. Within the next year or so he expects legislation tightening up attendance policies. "This system will be ahead of the game," he said. Administration and staff emphasized that this policy is another effort to get parents, students and schools working together for quality education.

**RUIDOSO MUNICIPAL SCHOOLS ATTENDANCE POLICY**

The Ruidoso School District is committed to excellence in education. Every student will have an equal opportunity to receive a sound educational program. As a District we believe that regular school attendance has been shown to be the first necessity for success in school. Maximum learning cannot occur if a child is not in class. Therefore, it is the responsibility of the parent and the student to hold absences to a minimum.

**General Policy:**

- A. A student may have no more than 10 absences per semester.
- B. When a student has six absences his/her parents will be notified.
- C. The parent will be notified again on the 10th absence.
- D. Should an 11th absence occur the parent may be referred to the Juvenile Probation Office for violating Article XII, Section 5 of the New Mexico Children's Code, or Section 10-4-4 of the Mesquero Apache Tribal Code.

**Notification to Schools:**

Phone calls are not accepted. A student must bring a note either the first or second day back. All parental notes are acceptable no matter what the reason for the absence. Absences will be "explained" or "unexplained". We do not "excuse" students, therefore every absence will count toward the limit of 10. All notes will be kept on file and will remain with the school for a period of 30 days following the end of the semester.

**Consequences:**

After missing the established number of days, the student will lose credit or be considered for retention, depending on the appropriate grade level. The Administration may grant exceptions in cases of extended illness.

**Special notes:**

- Three (3) tardies = one (1) absence.
- School trips or activities are counted as a day of attendance.

**Specific School Considerations:**

**Nob Hill School**

Poor attendance can cause a reduction in grades, poor progress toward academic achievement, poor self-concept and could result in possible retention. Since direct oral instruction is so critical in the primary years of education, Nob Hill students will be required to make up missed work whether the absence is explained or unexplained. It is further emphasized in the primary years that it is the responsibility of the parents to get their child to school and the shared responsibility of the parent, child and teacher to see that missed work is made up. Students of Nob Hill students are requested to sign a form acknowledging that they have read the policy and return it to the school where it will be kept on file. Students (new students or transfer students) must be present at least three (3) weeks in order to be properly evaluated for report cards.

**White Mountain Elementary/Intermediate**

Students are allowed to make up work they missed for an explained absence. They have the same number of days that were missed to make up their work. Teachers will be available in their classrooms to provide students with assistance with their make up assignments. A student may not make up school work missed due to an unexplained absence and zeros will be recorded for the missed work. Parents that desire to have pupils released for personal or family reasons should secure permission through the principal and in turn the principal should notify the teacher. Parents should give utmost consideration for the child's interest in school before requesting permission for the absence. Students who are tardy are very disruptive to classroom instruction. Therefore, we encourage parents to see that their children are at school on time. When a student is tardy he/she must report to the office to secure a slip to enter the classroom.

**Ruidoso Middle School**

The student must present the parent's note to his/her A&P teacher to receive an "explained absence" slip to take to each of his/her other classes. ABSENCES: Explained absence will allow make up of work. Unexplained absence will not allow make up of work. Students have the same number of days that were missed to make up work. It is the student's responsibility to take care of this.

**Ruidoso High School**

Students should report to the office after an absence to secure an "Admit Slip". Students who bring a note as specified will be given an opportunity to do the work missed. He/she will be given the same number of days missed to turn the make-up work in. If a student fails to bring a note, he/she will be considered unexcused, will not be allowed to do the make-up work and will receive a "0" if grades were taken for those in attendance.

1. After 10 days, credit is lost automatically.
2. Appeals must be made within 30 days following the end of the semester. Appeals may not be made after 30 days following the end of the semester.
3. Appeals must be initiated by the parents or students.
4. Appeals may be made only to the principal.
5. On an appeal, the only exception will be in cases of extended illness. No others will be allowed.

**SPECIAL NOTE:** Absences due to a student being held in ACC for being late to class will count toward the maximum permissible number of absences when determining loss of credit.

## Bonito firefighters respond to blazes

Bonito Fire Department personnel responded to two fires over the weekend, a Saturday brush fire and a minor fire at the home of John Hall. The Saturday fire occurred about noon Saturday when a controlled burn on private property near the Bonito Lake turnoff became agitated by gusty winds. According to Bonito assistant chief D. A. Kincaid, the flames were quickly extinguished after the arrival of firefighters.

Bonito personnel also responded to a fire at the Lost Mesa home of John Hall about 9:30 this morning. According to Kincaid, the fire was confined to a small area near the hearth. Chuck Flanagan of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office reported that the cause of the fire was "pyrolois"—drifting oil of structural wood and the melting of tile glue near the hearth. Damage was reported as minor.

## Editorial

"He is our president, and we honor him."

Democratic presidential candidate Walter Mondale showed some class with those words after his defeat by President Ronald Reagan in the November general election.

His words recalled to this writer a letter he received early in Mr. Reagan's first term. The author dated the letter with the notation, "the day some idiot shot our president."

It would have been hard if not impossible for that correspondent—and for many people—to refer to Reagan's recent predecessors as "our president." The inclination in the Nixon and Carter years was to want to disown the president rather than be proud of him.

Fortune seems to smile on Ronald Reagan. The courage he showed after the assassination attempt was admirable indeed, and helped his image greatly.

No Vietnam war, Arab oil embargo or Iranian hostage crisis has interposed his presidency. The loss of the Marines in Beirut coincided with a successful operation on Grenada, and the latter victory seemed to negate the former calamity.

If no more than good fortune were involved, however, it seems doubtful the country would have pulled out of a recession, seen unemployment and inflation drop, and brought the Soviets to the arms bargaining table.

Through tangible progress and intangible qualities of leadership, Ronald Reagan has helped America feel good about itself. On this, inauguration day, we echo the words:

He is our president, and we honor him.—TP

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The first session of the state's thirty-seventh Legislature is historic in more ways than one.

Since the start of the 1930s, we have never had a legislative gathering in which belt-tightening conservatives dominated both houses.

What is even more surprising was to find on opening day that the gentleman from the fourth floor, Governor Toney Anaya, has become a convert to the ranks of the belt-tighteners. His state-of-the-state speech caused one old-timer who was there to turn to the old-timer next to him and ask, "Is this the same man we heard giving the opening speech here last year?"

Oh, the Governor hasn't become quite as much of a conservative as he would like us to believe, but the impulse is clearly there. Just for one example, Corrections Secretary Michael Francke has long been telling us that his department cannot possibly stay in existence without a jump of \$20 million in its annual budget. Governor Anaya, who has appeared to agree with that up to now, only asks for an additional \$10 million in the budget he proposes for legislative adoption.

That's a sizeable cut, and it has to be seen as a big step on Toney's part toward the conservative view.

(It's still a lot more than Corrections is going to get. The Legislative Finance Committee's budget—the one which is almost certainly going to be followed this year—calls for a mere \$5 million increase. Still, we can say the Governor seems to be making an honest effort to practice what he has begun to preach.)

There's one trouble with conversions, especially when they constitute a veritable 180 degree change. Most of us want to watch the convert for a while till we get the answer to two questions: Has a genuine interior change taken place? And will it last?

After all, one of the aspects of the "new Toney" we have been asked to have faith in is his statement that he is separating himself from the dirty old political business carried on by the Democratic party. As a matter of fact, in many of those year-end interviews Governor Anaya gave, he clearly wanted us to believe he has never liked doing all those disgusting

things a leading politician is supposed to do.

So how come, the very day after Toney's speech to the Legislature, George Fettingler, the new Democratic state boss, and a lot of old faces that have not been seen on the fourth floor in two years were ensconced in the Governor's suite drawing up their plans for the "new" party?

Is he or ain't he going to indulge in politics?

After all, we didn't force him to say he wanted out of that distasteful job; he volunteered to give it up.

Now we discover he really hasn't. Is it hard to understand why, in light of all this, we question the sincerity of his other promises?

Maybe all that's being a little too hard on Toney. His speech to the assembled legislators included all kinds of peripheral remarks about what a hard time the political commentators have given him over the course of the last two years. Like his repeated interviews, there was much discouragement in the tone he adopted. (One TV viewer of the speech said, "He sounds like he's about to hand in his resignation.")

As one of those who contributed signally to the Governor's low state of enthusiasm, this writer has to admit straight out that he has no regrets. The things we have complained about in connection with the way Anaya has done or not done his job are verifiable facts. He has screwed up on a royal scale, and there is no reason to feel regret at having said so.

As for his change of heart and his newly discovered interest in having revenues on hand before they are spent, we are all for that. Like most New Mexicans who realize this is time for belt-tightening, we hope his conversion is deep-seated and genuine.

The 60 days in which the Legislature stays here should demonstrate how consistent he is or isn't.

We will give him the benefit of every doubt which arises during that time, but you can be sure that while it goes on, we will continue to scrutinize his activity with as sharp an eye as we can manage.

Vigilantism is the latest rage as citizens across the nation have rallied behind a man who shot four teenagers on a New York subway. This is a malady that must not be encouraged.

But, encouragement it is getting. Supposedly responsible citizens—including the chairman of the New York State Republican Committee—are lining up to offer moral and financial support to Bernhard Goetz, who shot four teenagers who accosted him on a New York City subway. Two of them were wounded critically. He has said that he did not fear for his life. Other than that, little is known of Goetz's motives.


But enough is known to denounce vigilantism of this sort which, if encouraged, offers anarchy as its logical conclusion. While one can understand the fear associated with New York's subways—or life in any

big city, for that matter—one must not lend support to efforts that deny the system of enforcement and justice necessary for civilized society. The alternative is to return to the West of Tombstone of the 1800s, where the gun was the law.

The support for Goetz is misplaced. Rather, efforts should be made to beef up law enforcement on the subways, on city streets, in crime-ridden neighborhoods. Efforts should be made to convince politicians of the priority of making our streets and communities safe, no matter what cost.

That is a rational approach. The vigilante's way, while enjoying a spate of current popularity, ultimately is the way of the criminal, the way that says might makes right. It is the wrong approach.



"Times of Transition" would be an accurate title for a film retrospective concerning the collected works of director David Lean. The frequent transitions faced by all men and women, and, by extension, the fluid fates of countries and political ideologies, are what bind Lean's films together into a formidable, and with few exceptions, popular oeuvre. Think of his great films: "Dr. Zhivago," which was set during the turbulent times of the Russian Revolution; "Lawrence of Arabia," which also presented a country during a state of upheaval; and "The Bridge on the River Kwai," set during World War II.

It is the people who are most important in Lean's movies. And the same is true in "A Passage to India." Based on the novel by E.M. Forster, the 74-year-old Lean has written, directed and edited the film with characteristic style and grace.

Here, the very British Adela Quested (Judy Davis) journeys to India. She gradually realizes her civilized airs are mere upper-class trappings. When she seeks to learn about

and know the real India, she is confronted by an awakening sexuality.

The film is filled with primeval images, ancient erotic sculpture governed by a horde of protective monkeys, the large forbidding full moon and the caves of Marabar. What happened in the caves forms the center of this tale, but the caves are the furthest distance Miss Quested has come from civilization, and it is here in the darkness that she must face herself. Like Socrates' Myth of the Cave, she sees only her shadow — but cannot face that reality.

For all its superb cinematography, exotic locales, and lush scenery, "A Passage to India" is far from a travelogue. Each shot of moonlight reflected in the river, a vast sunset silhouette exists for a reason, as part of the whole of the film. Such shots are startlingly beautiful, but in their beauty they are as eloquent as they are grand. The eloquence of the visual poetry in "A Passage to India" may not make this Lean's most popular film, but it is easily one of his best.



Think of America's best sitcoms such as "Taxi," "Soap" and "Cheers," then make the subject feminism, add a British accent, and you have "The Fainthearted Feminist." A new, limited series on The Arts & Entertainment Network, the sitcom airs Jan. 27, 28, 29 and 31.

Lynn Redgrave plays the title character in this funny and feisty import from the British Broadcasting Corp. She is a woman who somewhat tentatively believes in the ideals of the women's movement, but can't seem to get out from underneath the dirty diapers to do anything about it. Everything from feminism and fatherhood, to sex and homemaking is satirized.

Miss Redgrave is terrific as a sort of English Erma Bombeck, frumpy and harried, who is put upon by everyone in the family. Her character, Martha, is very likable, intelligent and articulate. She's also quick with one-liners that will leave you laughing out loud.

The TV series was a spin-off from a column in a London newspaper, which took the form of a correspondence between Martha and her activist feminist friend, Mary. The column, by Jill Tweedie,

proved so popular that it became a two-volume book, "Letters from a Fainthearted Feminist." There are five half-hour episodes of the series. Don't miss even one of them.



### ESPN injects life into the Sweet Science

Old stars retire before new heroes are anointed. A string of imposters hold titles in a confusing array of weight divisions. And officials at the American Medical Association want to banish the sport.

Seeking to inject fresh blood into the pugilistic ranks rendered anemic by a variety of problems, ESPN and Bob Arum have launched the 1985 Top Rank Boxing Tournament. And if even a few contenders with strength and style can emerge from this 70-bout showcase — as did Dwight Braxton (now Dwight Muhammad Qawi) and Frank "The Animal" Fletcher in the tournament's 1980 version — its existence will be justified.

Boxing commentator Al Bernstein, a man whose salt and pepper hair is almost as tall as boxing promoter Don King's, travels across America in search of good boxing bouts. After honing his journalistic skills in Chicago as a newspaper reporter and editor, he finds it ironic that he is currently the only working broadcaster who both scores and analyzes fights.

"One of boxing's big failings is that as soon as a guy loses, people start saying he should retire," says Bernstein. "But we can't be perfect in life. In this tournament there'll be guys who might've lost before, but who didn't quit and who came back and now

have another chance. We were after a mixture of young fighters who'd been seen a little but who hadn't yet had a chance to shine, and fighters who had not been seen on national TV but who had good records."

Eight fighters will compete in 10 separate weight classes. Quarter-final regional bouts are scheduled for eight rounds; semi-final bouts are limited to ten rounds; and the finals can last up to 12 rounds. The top two in each division will battle during special broadcasts in April and August.

Thursday, Jan. 31, marks the appearance of two welterweights whose progress viewers might find intriguing: The rugged Kenny Butler (15-1, 7 KO's), out of the Goode-Petronelli stable (one that includes the undisputed middleweight champion of the world Marvelous Marvin Hagler) punches in one bout, while Rodney Trussel (19-0, 7 KO's), a member of the Detroit-based Kronk Boxing Team (featuring the tall and lanky Thomas "Hitman" Hearns) will be featured in another.

"Boxing has no agate," says Bernstein, aware that numbers can't foster allegiances between fan and fighter. "You can't look in the paper and see who's in first. But if we can give people some sense of perspective as we proceed," he concludes, "we can tell the story of these boxers."
