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Leash length bone of contention

A young girl in a grocery store parking lot is attacked by a dog lunging from the back of a pickup truck. A jogger is confronted in the middle of a side street by a snarling, fang-baring mongrel. Groups of stray dogs attract unrestrained pets, combining into roaming packs that destroy and defile private property.

Such instances in the village of Ruidoso have prompted government action that will culminate in the February 12 Ruidoso Village Council public hearing of a reworked animal control ordinance.

At that meeting, the council will hear public input on the topic of animal control and will decide the fate of a new, updated animal control ordinance formulated by a council committee.

Committee and council member Rick Evans noted that action by the council to make changes in the ordinance were stimulated by public request. He said several "loopholes" in the old ordinance made enforcement difficult in many circumstances, and

that the ordinance was somewhat vague.

The committee studied the model ordinances of the state veterinarian, the Municipal League and the city of Albuquerque for guidance in making the changes.

"We took language from those to accomplish our objectives," Evans pointed out. "Mainly, the ordinance just needed some reworking."

A big change in the ordinance involves the requirement of a leash. As presently written, the ordinance describes an animal as stray if the animal is "beyond the boundaries of the premises of the animal's owner... (and) free of physical restraint and out of the immediate control of the owner."

As proposed, the ordinance will describe an stray animal as being "beyond the boundaries of the premises of the animal's owner or keeper unless the animal is under the physical restraint and immediate control of the animal's owner or keeper and is on a secure leash no more than six feet in length."

That wording, though, has councilor Bill Karn concerned. Although he agrees in concept with the need for

a new ordinance, he expressed his concern that the ordinance, if passed as written, could be "giving a weapon to some people."

Karn described a potential situation. A person dislikes his neighbor. He sees the neighbor out walking his dog on an eight-foot leash. He could call the animal control officer and demand that a citation be written. Karn said the officer would have no other alternative than to issue a ticket.

Interpretation of whether the person walking the dog was really in violation would be up to the municipal judge. Karn is of the opinion that someone walking his dog on a leash under complete control should not be found in violation of the ordinance, regardless of the length of leash.

"I don't see why he should be put in jeopardy," Karn said of a person in that situation. "I just want a law that can be interpreted fairly. I just want a little discretion."

The councilor suggested the wording, "a six-foot leash or lead of appropriate length," be used in the ordinance.

Evans, however, said he viewed the ordinance leash-length wording as the

wording of a speed limit, which is not usually enforced to the letter but enforced at the officer's discretion. Evans predicted that a person walking a dog with an eight-foot leash would be cited only if it were determined that the animal was out of control.

Most changes in the ordinance have more uniform support of the council. According to Evans, the ordinance will give a person the right to file a complaint in Municipal Court against the owner of an animal that makes a nuisance of itself by making excessive noise.

Among other changes, the ordinance requires that any animal transported or left in the back of a pickup truck be confined so that no part of the animal's head may protrude from the truck bed.

The ordinance also stiffens penalties for animal owners whose pets are consistently in violation of the ordinance by being picked up by stray.

Other changes include a reworked definition of a vicious animal, and recognizing as valid the out-of-town registration of animals.

BLM-Forest Service land switch won't affect airport

The proposed site of the Sierra Blanca Airport on Fort Stanton Mesa is included in plans by the U.S. Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to conduct a land transfer. Any changing of administration of the land will not affect negotiations to locate an airport there, however, according to a Forest Service official.

"Doesn't affect it one iota," commented Albuquerque Regional

forester M. J. Hassell on the land "interchange" on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Hassell said the plan to exchange administration of federally owned BLM and Forest Service land is a move to save costs and duplication of effort.

He called the Fort Stanton Mesa situation a "perfect example" in that it typifies what the interchange will attempt to prevent. The BLM-controlled Fort Stanton Mesa is almost completely surrounded by large Forest Service land holdings. Under the interchange, administra-

tion of the Fort Stanton land will be transferred from BLM to the Forest Service.

The overall interchange plan includes 2.4 million acres statewide and 34 million acres in 11 Western states of BLM and Forest Service lands.

Officials estimate the land transfers could save as much as \$35 million every year in administrative costs. Initial implementation of the plan will cost \$35 million to \$45 million.

Approval of the plan is expected from Congress in time to allow com-

pletion of the interchange by June 15.

Hassell explained that any agreements or negotiations concerning land subject to the interchange that are begun prior to the June 15 deadline will continue unaffected by the transfer. It is only those dealings started after the interchange that will be handled by the new administrator of the land.

Any negotiations that have begun concerning the attempts to locate a new airport on Fort Stanton Mesa will proceed unaffected by the interchange, Hassell said.

Ski race a success

"I think it was a success in every aspect," commented Tommy Morel on the recent All-American Pro Ski Classic Morel, co-chairman of the event, reported that things went well enough to ensure tentative scheduling of next year's race for the first weekend of February.

Although all the bookkeeping for the race has not been completed, Morel said it appears to have been a money-raising success. He noted that Thursday night's Charity Auction took in at least \$13,000. The auction was just one of the money-raising facets of the pro ski race.

Money raised from race-related activities will go to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital and the Handicapped Skiers Association.

Attendance at the events was high. Morel said 275 attended the auction, 400 participated in the "Pick the Winner" party Friday night, and a sell-out crowd of 508 attended the Saturday night Celebrity Pro-Am dinner and show.

News coverage of the event was widespread, with 35 media represented at the race. Morel noted that the ESPN television coverage of the race will be aired locally at 8 p.m. Saturday, March 2.

Coverage of the race also will be

televised within two weeks over Metro media stations in New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Dallas, Houston, Boston, Washington, D.C., and Santa Fe.

The only drawback of the event was the weather. Morel said the snowstorm made it impossible to determine whether the race could have drawn a large crowd of spectators to Ruidoso. He reported that many called, wondering if roads into Ruidoso were passable, which indicated more visitors would have come if the weather had been better.

One benefit to local lodgers over last year's race was that all racers stayed wherever they wanted to and paid for their own rooms, Morel said. Last year the rooms were all complimentary.

Prospects for next year look good. Morel said a tentative commitment to have the race at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort has been received from ski area manager Roy Parker. Peugeot has indicated an interest in the 1986 race.

Several large sponsors such as U.S. Tobacco, General Foods and CB Sports sent representatives to the race this year. All were impressed with what they saw, according to Morel.

"There were a lot of people pleased with the event," he summarized.

The McKnight Ranch, scene of two cold-blooded murders last November, is a ranch just like any other these days.

The hired hand lives in the small stone ranchhouse and goes about his daily business just like any other ranch manager.

Cotton and Judy McKnight were found murdered in the kitchen of that sturdy brown house at around 9 a.m. Thursday, November 15, 1984. Each had been shot twice with a .38 caliber weapon.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Department officers are conducting a thorough investigation of the crimes.

Sheriff's deputies have interviewed many friends, neighbors and other individuals in connection with the crime. They have never named anyone as a suspect.

"We're not ruling anybody out," said Charlie Cox of the Sheriff's Office.

His investigators confiscated four .38 caliber weapons. In December, they sent two of those weapons to the Department of Public Service headquarters in Austin, Texas, for intensive testing.

"We're using it (the testing) for the process of elimination," Cox said.

"We did recover some finger prints with laser scan at the scene," Cox said. Mike Lee of the Sheriff's Office hand-delivered the prints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D.C. Cox said his office is awaiting those results.

"We expected them last week," he said. Cox is hopeful that those results will open up the case.

Sheriff's deputy Connie Hopper drove this reporter out to the ranch on a cold gray day recently.

We headed toward Roswell on Highway 70 and passed through Hondo. At the blue and gold Lincoln County A4 highway marker we left the highway and crossed a small bridge.

Cars whizzed by on the highway as we headed down a rutted dirt road.

They were the last signs of civilization we would see for two hours.



The front porch was covered in

dust and a few brown branches hung down. Nobody uses the front door these days.

Hopper and I circled around the house. The ringing telephone in the house went unanswered.

A hanging plant in the kitchen drooped brown leaves, untended and unwatered.

A cold chill went down my spine as I looked through the kitchen window.

Hopper was already back in the car. Let's get out of here.

"Nobody's here, we might as well head on back," she said. She must think it's as spooky as I do.

No, the McKnight Ranch is not a ranch like any other. Until the questions surrounding that day in November when someone murdered Cotton and Judy McKnight are answered, it will remain a place of mystery.

Burst pipe floods part of hospital; fifth such incident in a year's time

For the fifth time in about a year, the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) has experienced flooding caused by broken water pipes.

At about 9:30 p.m. Sunday, an old weld on a dead-end pipe in the ceiling of the physical therapy area burst, causing major damage.

Areas with water damage were physical therapy; hallways outside dietary and in the private patient room wing; the administrator's office; the foundation secretary's office; and the administrator's secretary's office.

Some areas of the business office also were underwater for a short time.

Administrator Ken Moore said Wednesday carpeting in the hallways was still wet, and a new ceiling will have to be installed in the physical therapy gym and exercise area.

Physical therapy has been nearly shut down by water damage.

Moore said some physical therapy staff members took time off early this week since they couldn't serve patients. Others rearranged schedules to serve Fort Stanton patients.

Virtually no therapy will be possible in the hospital until cleanup is complete and the new ceiling is installed.

"It gets real old," Moore said.

Within the past 12 months, flooding has occurred in the front lobby area, the laboratory, the operating room and the nurses' station.

One of Moore's major concerns is possible damage to expensive equipment in some areas, although he was quick to say the financial burden just for repairs and cleaning is bad enough.

"At least this one (flood) didn't set off the fire alarms and sprinkler system," Moore said. "That is really an added stress for patients and staff alike when that happens."

It has happened during some of the previous flooding episodes.

Moore said he really appreciated the help he got from police officers, firemen and paramedics Sunday.


"It's nice to have the community help you out, and we were definitely in dire need of help," he said.



Ruidoso girls beat Tularosa

Fresh from two straight victories, the Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team will host Hot Springs Friday night in a key District 3-AAA contest.

Following the Hot Springs game, the Warriors will travel to Silver City Saturday to play the powerful Colts in another district game.

Ruidoso traveled to Tularosa Tuesday night and took a decisive 58-33 non-district win over the Wildcats.

The Warriors are now 4-0 on the overall season. They topped Deming in the District 3-AAA opener last weekend.

But Hot Springs and Silver City are much tougher teams than Tularosa and Deming.

"Hot Springs isn't as tall as us, but they're husky, smart and quick," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "Silver City is very tough. They beat Hot Springs by 20 points."

But the Warriors are improving. Against Tularosa, Ruidoso had a 20-20 halftime lead and blew the game open in the second half.

In the second half, Ruidoso used a 1-3-1 half-court trap and a 1-3-1 zone to confuse the Tularosa ballhandlers.

The Warriors outscored the shorter Wildcats 16-3 in the third period, and led 42-23 entering the final period. Ruidoso's fast break worked well and the team dominated the boards.

Ruidoso jumped off to an 8-0 lead in the first quarter. The hosts came back to close the gap to 12-10 at the quarter break with some hot shooting by Steph Guerra.

The Warriors gradually pulled away in the second quarter, and turned the game into a rout in the second half.

Four Ruidoso players scored in double figures, led by senior Diane McClure. McClure canned 18 points on eight field goals and two free throws.

Sophomore Katherine Sanchez added 13 points. Stacy Ivy had 11 and Gia Rose scored 10.

Guerra led Tularosa with 17 points. No other Wildcat player scored more than four points.

McClure grabbed 14 rebounds (eight on the defensive boards) and Ivy picked off nine. Rose stole the ball 10 times.

"The most pleasing aspect of this game was the effort we got from our bench," said Castanon. "The junior varsity players we brought up have been a great asset to the varsity."

"Our guards are shooting better. Veria (Platta) and Gia hit some from the outside."

But Silver City and Hot Springs will provide the Warriors with two of their toughest opponents this season.

Silver City is ranked fifth and Hot Springs is tied for eighth in a state coaches' poll.

The Warrior-Hot Springs game will start at 5:30. A boys junior varsity game will be played earlier. Saturday, the Warrior-Silver City girls junior varsity game will be played at 6, followed by the varsity game.

After its loss to powerful Deming last weekend, anything would seem easier for the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team.

And an easier opponent is on the schedule Friday night. The Warriors will host the Hot Springs Tigers after the boys junior varsity and girls varsity games. The junior varsity game will start at 4 p.m.

"I don't know much about Hot Springs," said Warrior coach Eugene Segura. "They've got a good big man, but they're not strong at guard."

Ruidoso, 0-1 in District 3-AAA play and 1-13 overall, probably will go with the same young starting lineup it had against Deming.

Junior Russell Easter, freshman Kirk Ryan and sophomores Brian Davis, Jeff Willingham and Carl Luercas started last week. Willingham has been sick this week, but if he's well, the same lineup probably will start again.

Davis and Luercas are both 6-2, while Easter is 6-1. Hot Springs probably will have a height advantage, but the Warriors hope to counter that by playing mistake-free ball.

"The kids have looked okay in practice," Segura said. "They've worked hard."

"We're just going to have to go out, control the ball, and not make any turnovers."

Ruidoso's last district victory was a 50-49 victory over the Tigers last season. That win was in Truth or Consequences, but the Warriors

wouldn't mind their first district win of this season coming at home.

Besides the probable starters, Tracy Gann, Patric Pearson, and Dion Lopez probably will see considerable action.

Gann has been a good scorer and rebounder this season. Pearson made all-district honorable mention last season and Lopez is a good leaper and playmaker.

Following the Hot Springs contest, the Warriors will travel to Coche Friday, February 15, and host Silver City the following night. They will travel to Tularosa Tuesday, February 18, for their last non-district game of the season.

The Ruidoso High School boys junior varsity and freshmen basketball teams lost to Goddard Tuesday night in Roswell.

The Warrior freshmen lost to Goddard 83-44.


Warrior coach James Sanchez played mostly freshmen in the first three quarters. Sophomores Katherine Sanchez, Verilyn Platta

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

I still have a hard time getting used to high school athletic events being postponed by bad weather, particularly snow.

Before coming to Ruidoso, I lived about 70 feet above sea level in California. Not much chance of a high school athletic event getting postponed by snow there.

But most high school athletic events that are postponed can be made up. What about the ones that would be impossible to make up?

Let's visualize a hypothetical situation in the future.

A Ruidoso High School basketball team (boys or girls) has qualified for the state tournament in Albuquerque.

The first game of the tournament is Wednesday night. Monday the weather is fine. But Tuesday clouds creep in, and by Wednesday morning, a full-blown winter snowstorm is making its presence felt.

The team tries to leave town, but the bus is stopped on Highway 37 just this side of Nogal. The snow is so thick it's standing six feet high in the middle of the road!

By now it's 4 p.m. and the game is scheduled to start at 8:30. The Warriors have at least three hours of driving ahead of them, and they're still stuck in the snow.

The snow is piling up on all sides of the bus, so the team can't turn around

and go the long route through Tularosa and then Cañoncito.

Night creeps in and the Warriors' hopes of making the game in time are dim. Coaches, players and even a sportswriter are huddling together in the snow, freezing weather.

But just in time, the storm clears and like magic the snow blows away, giving the bus a clear path to Albuquerque.

The team arrives 10 minutes before the game starts, gets some brief practice time in and wins the contest.

Now the above scenario is only fiction, of course, and it's unlikely that a storm could be that severe in March. But it's possible that a heavy storm could cause some problems in making a state playoff game.

What would happen if a team wasn't able to make it to the state tournament because of bad weather?

According to New Mexico Activities Association executive director James Odle, the team would have to forfeit the game.

"It would affect too many other people," Odle said. "There's no way it could be made up."

Let's hope the Warriors are never confronted with a situation like that. It would be a shame for a team to qualify for the state tournament and then not be able to play because of Mother Nature.

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
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Tom Trost wins seat on school board

In a large turnout, Capitan voters elected Tom Trost to the school board and passed the two-mill levy and the general obligation bond issue.

Over half of the 438 voters participating elected Trost with 272 votes and five absentee ballots. Robert Runnels received 113 votes and three absentees, and Armando Quinones had 43 votes with two absentees.

"I want to thank everybody that supported me and I hope I can live up to their expectations," Trost stated after the election.

The present school board will canvass the votes at this month's meeting. Trost will assume his position in March.

The mill levy passed with 245 votes with eight absentees. There were 99 votes and two absentees against the levy.

The bonds received 247 votes with nine absentees for, and 112 with one absentee against.

Capitan schools superintendent Leonard Hays was pleased with the large voter turnout, which he estimated to be over 70 percent of the

registered voters in the school district. He felt the large turnout showed that the people of Capitan are interested in education.

"I think we'll be able to work with Tom (Trost)," Hays stated.

Hays was glad that the voters renewed the mill levy and approved the sale of the \$975,000 general obligation bonds. The bonds will go toward the acquisition of land and construction of a new library, cafeteria and new athletic fields. The two-mill levy will go toward maintenance of the existing facilities.

Candidate Quinones said he felt good about Trost's win.

"I feel he will be a good asset to the board," Quinones said.

Quinones said he enjoyed the race but felt that being a newcomer did not help his campaign. He expressed his desire to run again in the future.

Defeated incumbent Runnels said he wished everybody the best, and hoped the new member does a good job. Runnels felt the turnout was good, regardless of bad weather.

"I doubt if voting would have been any different if the weather had been better," Runnels stated.

We have had sleet, hail, freezing rain, freezing mist off the plains to the east, and blizzards of little flat ice particles mixed with snow in the form of round pellets and small flakes trimmed with ice.

And now the beautiful mountain snow. Large soft flakes falling very slowly down like an infinity of small parachutes, so thick and so closely one following the other that all the world was hid from sight farther than

one hundred feet away. You were in a world of nothing but snow flakes; large, star-shaped, feathery, crystal and sparkling, rapidly covering the world with a thick blanket of white.

In the still air, the hoets of flakes drifting straight down to the ground presented a majestic sight that held you in a wintry spell. How remarkable that each flake kept its distance from the other, not crowding or rushing.

By the end of the day the mountain snow was still falling, and the ground was covered with eight inches of new snow, making the depth a foot or so in some places and a foot and a half in drifts.

Today on the sixth, in early afternoon it is forty-two in the shade; and a west wind beneath a sky of blue and white has melted off all the snow on the hills on the sunny side, while on the South side of the Valley, you see a picture of mid-winter in all its glory.

How wonderful to see such a snowy winter! Mother Earth is rejoicing, looking forward to a green spring and flowery summer.

When the thaw begins, be careful of the ice in shady spots. The snows have cleared the air making it fresh and pure; and just think of the abundant moisture and water we will have come Spring. Let us rejoice in the blessings of the snow.

We have a strong sense of loyalty at our house.

When Bud managed a retail fabric store we wouldn't have purchased sewing supplies or materials anywhere else. They signed the check, so we owed them a degree of loyalty.

A question of loyalty arose when I spent a very long time researching a very small story a few weeks ago. Home education ... why are some Ruidoso teachers removing their children from the Ruidoso schools and teaching them at home?

Nobody really wanted to talk about that.

Especially not the teachers.

Why isn't the quality of education in the schools good enough for these teachers?

Obviously they feel the quality is good enough for other people's children, for they continue to show up for work and they continue on the payroll.

School administrators were quick to defend any parent's right to choose home education over public education.

"But what about your teachers, your employees entrusted with educating those other students?" I asked.

Nobody really wanted to talk about that.

How must fellow teachers feel, knowing that these few aren't willing to have them teach their children?

I was told by more than one that this subject is not news.

Sorry folks, if you indict your own school system by saying it is not right for your own children, then there are other parents who are very interested in your actions.

If the schools aren't good enough for your children, then maybe they aren't good enough for our children either.

Maybe they aren't good enough for our neighbors or our neighbors' neighbors.

If enough folks opted for educating their own children at home, pretty soon we would have to make some major adjustments in the school budget.

Then this question of loyalty becomes a financial matter.

We might not need so many teachers with our greatly decreased student population.

Where should we cut first? And then we get to the question of the students themselves.

Maybe they can be taught better by

parents in some cases. But not all parents have any experience or training in education.

That's okay, none is required to enroll a child as an extension student of some school somewhere.

I spend a lot of time in schools. I hear a lot of laughter and I see a lot of very busy teachers and students.

I am impressed time after time by the resources and opportunities available at all levels to children in a school environment. Most of these things cannot be matched at home.

At Nob Hill I've watched as kindergartners and first graders were awarded Good Citizen certificates. The pride these little good citizens feel as they clutch those certificates tightly under their chins is very real and very visible.

They are proud to be recognized by their teachers, their principal and their peers.

This—as with log home projects, Thanksgiving and Christmas pageants and fund-raisers for the Statue of Liberty—would be very hard to replace for a solitary little student.

At White Mountain Elementary I've watched a cafeteria full of second and third graders enthralled by artists in residence performances. They too share the pride of fellow students as good citizens are honored each month.

Essay winners, honor roll students and science project participants at White Mountain Intermediate are always pleased to have their accomplishments recognized by other students.

When I photographed science students in a science taste test, their interaction impressed me as much as the experiment. Learning isn't always a solitary thing.

Middle School students have so much going on that it's hard to keep up. Science and math projects, Shakespeare plays and athletic events foster a spirit of camaraderie among that group.

Ruidoso High School, too, is a busy place. The resources available for chemistry, physics, shop and computer science would be very hard to equal at home.

For me there's no question of loyalty. Ruidoso Schools are doing a good job. I see it every day.

I don't understand home education, but as I've been told over and over, "It's a matter of parental choice."

I'm choosing Ruidoso Public Schools.

There I was, driving down the street Tuesday morning, minding my own business. All of a sudden, the car was sliding sideways ... then backwards! Out of control on a heavily traveled street! Whoa!
Fortunately the car came to a stop with no damage incurred, but it was certainly excitement of the highest order.

What was the cause of this near calamity?
Prime Suspect: snow on the road!
My adventure Tuesday morning illustrates a phenomenon that seems to occur every winter in Ruidoso. Although I have only witnessed this occurrence the past two winters, old-timers tell me it happens every year—in winter, it snows here!

Probably the most interesting aspect of this phenomenon is seeing how people deal with the snow.

But it will eventually snow again, won't it? And the arctic types actually seem to look forward to the next snowstorm. A really good snowstorm, after all, is like a test of one's readiness to do battle with Mother Nature.

Some folks are so prepared for the winter snows that they could probably embark on a successful expedition to the top of Mount Everest in the dead of winter.

Boots stretching to the knees, parkas able to withstand temperatures of 40 below zero, and vehicles capable of rescuing stranded St. Bernards appear at the falling of the first flakes of snow in Ruidoso. Radio reports that chains or four-wheel-drives are required on Ski Run Road draw chuckles of self-satisfaction.

"Ha Ha," they chuckle as the snow begins to accumulate. "I'm prepared!"

Reports say large groups of arctic adventurers can be found traipsing around late at night, testing their Eddie Bauer thermal mittens.

On the other end of the scale are those who, having grown up in milder climes, believe that this is an unseasonably snowy winter, year after year.

Winter footwear of any type is unknown in their closets; tire chains are something others have to deal with.

These folks happy-go-luckily look forward to winter with the belief that it's only going to snow on the mountain, and not down here in town.

When the snows do come, it's mass panic time. Disaster has struck!

"It's snowing! What am I going to do? How am I going to get home? What if it never stops snowing?!"

Most Ruidosians find themselves somewhere between the two extremes, dealing with the snows as well as they are able. Some are lucky enough to have four-wheel-drives and proper snow apparel, others are not.

I was able to graduate from the horror of dealing with tire chains last year to the happiness of four-wheel-drive this year, grace au bon Dieu!

In my opinion, tire chains are one of the nastiest devices created by man, ranking right up there with the electric chair and bear-trap bindings.

Nothing quite compares with the experience of lying under a muddy, snowy, salt-encrusted car in the middle of a muddy, snowy, salt-encrusted road trying to put on muddy, snowy, salt-encrusted tire chains. Of course, it is usually during nighttime and sub-freezing conditions that you find you must put your chains on—never fails.

Once the chains are on, more adventure is in order. The big challenge of driving with the chains is knowing when to take them off. Sure, it looks like the snow has melted, but should you take them off and risk the disaster of having to put them on again? Best to leave them on until the sun is out, every trace of snow has melted and the month is July.

Even chains or four-wheel-drives do not ensure success on snow-covered roads, however. When the snows come down really hard, just knowing where you are on the road can be a challenge.

A blanket of especially deep snow seems to change things around. No longer are there distinct lanes of traffic. Everybody instead just floats along, hoping they are on the right side of the road (sometimes just hoping they are still on the road itself!).

Parking spaces are defined not by yellow stripes, but by wherever you think you can stop without getting stuck. Curbs become hidden obstacles that jump out like landmines when you hit them.

But really deep down, I think we all share a common thrill when a shimmering white layer of snow covers all in Ruidoso. Besides, we might as well get used to it—it snows in Ruidoso!

DEAR EDITOR:
Recently, Ed Hyman wrote a letter to you lamenting the fact that Ruidoso is presently in an overbuilt condition in certain types of housing and business enterprises. He pointed out that since tourism is our primary source of revenue, we must somehow increase the tourist-days to increase our economic health. He further suggested that we solve our problems ourselves by concentrating our efforts and by planning for the future. I agree.

How much better it would be if WE chose and implemented the means to enhance our town rather than hope that some outside interests would see the opportunities here and do it for us without our concurrence. Over the years, local interests have promoted such attractions as the Mule Races, The Summer Festival, The Pro Ski Race and The Chile Cookoff. Perhaps a more basic, far-reaching attraction might be the answer.

I've seen Mike Mulholland's Ruidoso & Territorial Railway mentioned in the News. He seems to be trying to solve this very problem, as I understand it, by offering to us a potential solution by financially sharing the potential risks and benefits of his enterprise so that it is truly a locally owned and operated major area attraction benefiting everyone.

It seems to address the basic problem of a long term attraction with broad appeal and the potential to grow with our expanding needs. In other words, he's saying a narrow

gauge steam railway would provide a rallying point about which we could all concentrate our efforts to make Ruidoso a better place to live and make a living.

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Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It's probably good conservatives control our Legislature.

It's certainly bad some of them try to control it in the wrong way.

Any parliament should be a deliberative body, in which decisions are arrived at by discussion and compromise, after all sides have been given a fair hearing.

Whatever militates against that procedure strikes at the essence of the legislative process—and what is taking place here now militates against it most flagrantly.

In the Senate, and specifically in its most powerful arm, the Finance Committee, discussion and debate have been reduced to total unimportance. When any group votes in identical fashion on measure after measure, day after day, that suggests that conclusions are being drawn from something other than the evidence which has been heard.

That is what happens here. Time after time, the vote is conservatives nine, other guys five, in a mindless repetition, as though this were a factory rather than a human enterprise.

If necessary to assure that each vote comes out that way, Senator Les Houston frequently moves for "a five-minute recess" so he can take his troops into a private room and apparently stiffen their spines.

No flexibility seems to be allowed. Houston and those who are close to him have clearly determined that their "captive" conservatives shall be granted no freedom to reach conclusions for themselves.

This, if continued, will reduce the Legislature to something very like the Reichstag before World War II.

In connection with the air of discontent which rules here, one veteran lobbyist says, "It is clear by now that the prayer breakfast with which legislators commenced this session was ineffective. Perhaps more prayer would be in order."

Even from before this session began, it was belt-tightening time in New Mexico. That has not ceased to

be true. It is possible that as you read these words the price of crude oil, which fuels so much of New Mexico's present economy, is continuing to fall.

Has that realization affected the way our lawmakers operate? Not so you'd notice it.

If every bill introduced through last Thursday was enacted into law, with the full amount of the appropriation each of them calls for, the state would end the year just a few dollars less than one full billion in the hole.

Nobody who realized what is going on with the state's economy will criticize the position which says this is not a time to go for tax increases.

Still, to commit one's self to that posture so totally that there is not even room to discuss departing from it would seem to be to run some risk.

To adopt it with no possibility of change, as conservatives here apparently have, is to take a stand which will cause certain bad things to happen. For instance, something like this is currently true: Every dollar of increase voted in spending for non-educational purposes next year will result in a dollar or more being subtracted from what is available to the schools.

That's the kind of result you get when you lock yourself in and will not listen to reason.

This column has made an occasional surly remark about those members of this year's freshman class in the Legislature who want to come too rapidly to the fore, introduce too many bills and make speeches on all possible topics. The suggestion is at least implicit in that position that it is a good idea to learn how the game is played before trying hard to star at playing it.

In fairness, it should be noted that those strictures from here do not apply to the women who are freshmen. By and large, they have showed a most adaptable spirit, and are working hard to learn how the system works, as their male counterparts dash about trying to act like heroes. It is the women who are truly wise.

Another session will focus on skin and hair care. Kemp has been a licensed hairdresser, so she will teach those topics.


Then students will learn mannequin modeling and fashion show modeling.

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

Area heart group organizes

The Lincoln County-Mescalero Apache Chapter of the American Heart Association (AHA) was organized recently.

Board officers are Billie Clarke, president; Jim Stover, president-elect; Charles Spooner, secretary; and Narcissus Gayton, treasurer.

The group has adopted AHA's national rules and regulations, and is gearing up to implement several community projects.

Since February is National Heart Month, the organization has some immediate educational and fund-raising plans.

Youngsters will "jump rope for heart" and high school students will learn cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) techniques this month.

Stover, who is head of Emergency Medical Services, will teach CPR to about 200 biology students.

"In some schools CPR is a graduation requirement," said Stover. He would like to see everyone educated in CPR, and that may be a major part of the local chapter's educational campaign.

Another national program for young persons in kindergarten through 12th grade, "Heart Health in the Young," will be initiated in the next few months.

Local medical doctor Lance Kirkegaard is serving as medical ad-

visor. He will oversee education projects.

While progress has been made in reducing death rates from heart disease and stroke, more than 42 million Americans are still afflicted with these diseases. According to the AHA, almost as many Americans die as a result of these diseases as all other causes of death combined.

Besides the loss of lives to heart diseases, the economic impact in lost wages, lost productivity and medical expenses may be as high as \$64.4 billion.

The AHA has made some recommendations on ways to improve chances of avoiding a heart attack or stroke.

These include yearly blood pressure checks, not smoking cigarettes, good eating habits, regular and sensible exercise and regular medical checkups.

The local board voted to support the passage of two bills being considered in the New Mexico Legislature this session.

House Bill 48 is called the Clean Indoor Air Act and would limit smoking in public places to limited areas. Rather than a non-smokers' area, public buildings would be required to designate a smokers' area.

The other bill endorsed is Senate Bill 22, the Cigarette Tax Act. That bill is designed to place an economic barrier in the way of young smokers.

The bill proposes an additional

eight-cent state excise tax on each package of cigarettes sold after October 1985. That is when the eight-cent federal excise tax will be dropped.

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

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

Sea Horse continues on a roll

James Grice's Sea Horse continued his impressive winter campaign by taking Sunday's 6 1/2-furlong feature at Sunland Park by a length.

In catching his third win in his last four starts, the James Curry-conditioned gelding covered the 3 1/2 furlongs in 1:04 1/5.

As the strong choice of the 3,491 on hand, the winner returned \$4.00, \$2.80 and \$2.40 across the board.

Shesallitecoin, who set all the early fractions, was easily the best of the rest. Her second-place finish rewarded her backers with place and show prices of \$3.60 and \$2.80.

Release The Wind was a distant third and returned \$2.60 for the show. The winner was well back in the early going, but jockey F. O. Martinez began his move entering the turn. By the time they straightened out for home, Sea Horse had dead aim on Shesallitecoin, putting that one away with a sustained drive through the stretch.

Sea Horse's Sunday win followed one of the quicker performances in recent Sunland history, as he had bested \$15,000 claimers on January 12 in a sparkling six-furlong time of 1:09 2/5. It was the fastest mark for that distance in four years.

The winner stood the jump from claiming to allowance with no problem Sunday. The New Mexico-bred had been racing for an \$8,000 claiming price as recently as December.

Tonkawa Charger ran down the upstart pacesetter Viking Hustler and understood the stretch run of favored Hookem to emerge a one-length victor in Saturday's five-furlong headliner at Sunland Park.

Under Kevin Cogburn, the winner stopped the timer at 57 4/5 seconds and returned mutuels of \$7.20, \$3.20 and \$2.60 as the second choice in the field of six.

Hookem, the overwhelming public choice, salvaged second as Betty Harless took her charge to the rail and prevailed by a head for second

money. The 4 to 5 favorite, after surviving a foul claim, paid his backers place and show prices of \$2.80 and \$2.40.

All of the early fractions belonged to Viking Hustler, who jumped into allowance company after showing speed in claiming events, and almost stole the show with a strong first half and some stamina in the stretch. The longest shot on the board, Viking Hustler returned \$5.80 for his show effort, with Pedro Benitez in the irons.

The winner had tuned up for Saturday's event in an \$70 allowance over the Sunland course, finishing only a length and a half behind the winner in that half-mile. Prior to that tuneup, the gelding had been rested since Albuquerque following a strong 1984 campaign in which he recorded four wins in the higher claiming brackets.

The disallowed claim of foul against Hookem was lodged by trainer Phil Clemmer, whose charge Draconae

finished fifth. In Saturday's fourth, Trade Dancers was sent off at the seldom seen price of 3-10. That superior favoritism in Saturday's maiden company was the result of Trade Dancers record of three times finishing first, only to have all those wins disallowed when a breeding registration eligibility determination mandated disqualification.

Ironically, Trade Dancers finished second Saturday, but was placed first by the stewards, who disqualified Tough Ranger for interference.

Araman, the overwhelming favorite in Friday's 6-furlong feature at Sunland Park, supported his backers with a resounding 4 1/4-length victory, taking advantage of an extremely fast pace in the early going.

Veteran rider Salustio Burgos placed his mount third in the backstretch behind Waltzing Wiki and Giboulee Wood, who matched strides in the first half-mile, setting fractions of 21:3 and 43:3.

Burgos made his move in the stretch turn, going around the pacesetter and moving alongside Giboulee Wood as Waltzing Wiki began to fade out of contention. Araman took command of the sprint in the final furlong just as Flight Dr. made a strong stretch drive to catch Giboulee Wood.

Araman continued to daylight the field to return mutuels of \$3.80, \$2.60 and \$2.60. The final time was 1:10 3/5.

Giboulee Wood had enough to shadow Flight Dr. in the final yards to a dead heat for second. Flight Dr., an 80-1 darkhorse, paid \$9.80 and \$3.20. Giboulee Wood returned \$3.40 and \$5.

The winner is trained by Fred Danley for owners Gus Barakis Jr., Carl Dodd and Frank Jackson of Decatur, Texas.

In Friday's Pic-Six events, one ticket held the winners of the fifth through tenth races to return \$17,891. There were seven tickets with five winners in the consolation, each returning \$430.20.




