Half percent tax would raise \$500,000+

(Editor's note: This is the first in a series of articles examining the proposed one-half of one percent gross receipts tax. Ruidoso voters will decide on the tax in a special election March 22.)

A special election is scheduled for Friday, March 22, to determine whether a one-half of one percent special gross receipts tax is to be collected in Ruidoso.

According to village clerk Leon Eggleston, the tax would raise \$500,000 to \$600,000 per year in the village. All funds raised by the tax would be earmarked for infrastructure improvements in Ruidoso.

New Mexico Municipal League deputy director Sotero Sanchez explained that projects eligible for fund-

ing by the tax include repair and replacement of existing sanitary sewer lines; storm sewers and other drainage improvements; streets and alleys; acquisition of rights of way for such improvements; and related facilities to such improvements.

Sanchez reported that all funds collected by the village would be returned by the state for the projects.

Eggleston said the raise would put Ruidoso at a six percent gross receipts tax rate. That is the highest in the state—provided other municipalities nearly as high do not elect to raise their gross receipts taxes.

Municipalities have had the option of raising the one-half percent since legislation passed by the 1984 Legislature went into effect July 1, 1984. Municipalities may either pass the whole one-half percent or elect to pass two separate one-quarter percent increases.

According to Sanchez, if a community brings the issue to election and voters defeat the measure, a year must pass from the time of the election to the beginning of the process to again bring the matter before the voters.

Several communities around New Mexico have elected to take advantage of the tax. Nearby, Capitan and Ruidoso Downs have passed the one-half and Carrizozo has passed one-quarter.

Other communities that have passed the one-half are Cimarron, Fort Sumner, Bayard, Questa, Red River, Taos, Clayton and Los Lunas. Las Vegas has passed the one-quarter.

According to Eggleston, numerous New Mexico communities have scheduled special elections, as has Ruidoso, to allow voters to determine whether to impose the tax. If passed, the tax raise will go into effect July 1.

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RHVH charity care much in demand

Ruidoso's hospital uses funds created by legislation three decades ago to administer charity care.

The Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) Hill Burton charity care obligation for the 12-month period beginning April 1, 1985, and ending March 31, 1986, is \$72,057.

During the current 12-month period the amount was \$69,713; for the last full period it was \$62,504.

This obligation is a part of the 1950s Hill Burton Act. During the fifties any community was able to borrow funds for hospital construction, and the payback was to be in charity care obligations.

"The feeling then was that every community, even those too small to pay for one, had the right to have a hospital," said Ken Moore, RHVH administrator.

This payback through Hill Burton charity care will continue until June 1992.

RHVH's total yearly obligation is divided into quarters, and one-fourth is released at the beginning of each quarterly period. For instance, on the first day of April 1985, the accounting office will record a little over \$18,000 in available charity care at RHVH.

Patient eligibility is determined by current poverty income guidelines established by the Community Services Administration. Local hospitals do not set guidelines, but are expected to use them in determining eligibility.

Moore explained that a formula is used. Basically an individual with income below \$4,960 is eligible for charity care. For a family, the income ceilings are: \$6,720 for two; \$8,480 for three; and \$10,200 for four. Income ceilings are incremented by about \$1,740 for each additional family member.

"It's usually used up the first day of each quarter," Moore said. "We've had people camp out on the hospital doorstep to be first on the list."

Moore said that RHVH does much more charity care than the Hill Burton amounts. He estimated that a quarter of the hospital's business is in charity care, employee discounted care and write-offs for bad debts.

Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements aren't related to Hill Burton.

Some patients pay part of their bill, and the rest has to be written off as charity care.

Moore explained that a financial disclosure statement is filled out for patients to determine the amount they reasonably can pay.

"Charity care to us is different from a bad debt," he said. "If someone doesn't have the money, that is charity; if they do and won't pay, that is a bad debt."

Healthy skin needs water

"The nicest thing you can do for your skin is to drink eight glasses of water a day," said Glennis Rainer, skin care expert at the Crazy Horse Hair Shop.

Wendy Doyle of New Beginnings, Diana Hankins of Merle Norman and Pamela West of Pamela's Hair Affair all agreed that drinking water is very important for healthy skin.

"Most people do need a moisturizer," said Doyle. She explained that even those with dry skin need a moisturizer, but it needs to be specialized.

There are moisturizers for every type of skin.

"A good cleansing program is good to get problem skin back in shape," said Hankins.

West emphasized the importance of good eating habits for healthy skin.

"The skin is nourished by nutrients in the bloodstream. A well-balanced diet is a form of health insurance for the skin," West said.

West said cigarette smoking and caffeinated drinks are harmful to the skin.

The following suggestions, gathered from the four, are part of a good skin care routine.

FIND OUT YOUR SKIN TYPE. Most local skin care experts will analyze and evaluate skin for clients and make recommendations on skin care.

NEVER GO OUT WITH A NAKED FACE. Always wear moisturizer and sunscreen whatever the weather. Some foundations contain sunscreen,

but read the label to be sure.

The skin around your eyes is very thin, so it is especially important to moisturize there. Remember that dry skin causes wrinkles.

GIVE THIRSTY SKIN A GOOD DRINK AFTER CLEANSING. One way to do this is to fill a basin with warm water and splash your face 20 times, then replace the warm water with cooler water and splash five more times. This process hydrates the skin and replaces moisture lost through wind and weather exposure.

REPLACE MOISTURE INTERNALLY. Drink at least eight glasses of water daily.

"I drink distilled water that I keep at room temperature," said Rainer. That much water is easier to get down at room temperature than it is when it's very cold.

EAT A HEALTHY, NUTRITIONALLY SOUND DIET.

AVOID CIGARETTE SMOKE AND LIMIT LIQUOR INTAKE.

IMPLEMENT A GOOD CLEANSING REGIMEN, especially for your own skin type.

"Never use soap, it is terrible for your face," said Doyle. Use a specialized cleanser.

BE SELECTIVE IN THE PRODUCTS YOU USE ON YOUR FACE.

"Wear a 5.5 pH balanced makeup," said West. Read labels carefully to be sure what you buy is what your skin needs.

Best of all, the experts agreed that these daily skin care procedures will not only maintain healthy skin, they will restore skin that is damaged by exposure to sun, snow and wind.



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


Warrior girls lose to Tigers, Colts

The Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team found the going rough over the weekend, losing to Hot Springs and Silver City.

Ruidoso, now 4-11 overall and 1-2 in District 3-AAA play, lost to visiting Hot Springs 42-39 Friday night. The Warriors traveled to Silver City Saturday night and dropped a 73-53 decision to the Colts.

The game with Hot Springs was close all the way. Hot Springs held a seven-point lead midway through the final period, but had to hold off a Warrior rally. Ruidoso closed to within two points with two minutes left, but couldn't catch the Tigers.

Ruidoso had an early lead in the first quarter, but the Tigers came back to take a 13-10 edge at the end of the quarter.

However, the Warriors' inside game worked well in the second quarter and Ruidoso took a 24-20 lead into the locker room at halftime.

But Hot Springs came back in the third period, outscoring the Warriors 13-6 for a 33-30 lead going into the final stanza.

Diane McClure led the Warriors with 14 points on seven field goals. Susan Davis added 10 points and Katherine Sanchez had seven.

Carrie Trujillo led the Tigers with 17 points, hitting eight field goals and one free throw.

Against Silver City, the Warriors met probably the best team in the district.

The Colts jumped off to a 20-9 first-period edge, and the Warriors could never catch up.

Ruidoso played the hosts evenly in the second period, each team scoring 16 points for a 36-25 Silver City edge.

The Warriors closed the Colts' edge to eight points twice in the third period. However, turnovers stopped the Ruidoso comeback.

Silver City had a 54-39 lead going into the final period and led the rest of the way.

McClure again led the Warrior at-

tack, scoring 15 points on six field goals and three free throws. Sanchez added 10 points, while Gia Rose and Stacy Ivy each tallied eight points.

"I felt the team played very well against Silver City," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "They've got a lot of depth and are a very powerful team."

"We had a real good effort, particularly in the first half. It was probably one of the best efforts of the year by all our kids."

The Warriors will play non-district foe Tularosa Tuesday night in the Ruidoso gymnasium. The junior varsity game will start at 5. The varsity contest will follow. Ruidoso beat the Wildcats in both varsity and junior varsity action last week at Tularosa.

Ruidoso will resume district play Friday night when the Warriors travel to Coora. The Warriors will return home Saturday night to play Silver City.

Playing without any seniors, the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team fell to visiting Hot Springs 69-43 Friday night.

Ruidoso is now 0-2 in District 3-AAA play and 1-14 overall.

The Warriors started a lineup of all underclassmen, as the team's seniors were held out of the game for disciplinary reasons.

But the underclassmen, who also started last week's game against Deming, did a good job against a much taller Hot Springs team.

"The kids had a good effort," said Warrior head coach Gene Segura. "If they can play like this all the time, next year the team should be a lot better."

Hot Springs jumped off to a 6-0 lead in the first quarter. The Warriors closed the margin to three points (9-6) at the end of the period, helped by some good free throw shooting by

Russell Easter and Brian Davis.

But the Tigers steadily built their lead up in the second quarter, taking a 28-16 lead at halftime.

Hot Springs' front line went 6-5, 6-3, 6-3, while the tallest Ruidoso player was 6-2.

The Warriors shot better in the second half, scoring 28 points. However, Hot Springs scored 41 points and locked up the victory.

Ruidoso got an excellent effort from sophomore Garret Henson. Henson scored 10 points.

Easter added nine points and Davis scored eight. Davis also blocked three shots and forced jump balls several times.

Chris Harrison led Hot Springs with 22 points. Travis Henry added 16 points and Todd Mannon scored 12.

Segura got to look at a lot of players in the game and liked the team's overall effort.

"The guys played good defense and seemed to enjoy themselves out there," he said.

Getting off to a fast start, the Ruidoso High School girls junior varsity basketball team topped host Silver City 42-35 Saturday night.

Ruidoso, now 6-4 on the season, took a 15-3 lead at the end of the first quarter. Silver City came back to close the Warriors' edge to one point (20-19) at halftime.

Silver City took a 29-27 lead going into the final quarter. However, the Warriors outscored the Colts 15-6 in the last period for the victory.

Kristal Enjady led the Warrior scoring with 20 points. Katherine Sanchez played only one quarter, but scored seven points. Amanada Samuels added seven points.



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

The outstanding athletes of the National Basketball Association (NBA) and National Hockey League (NHL) are showing their stuff now with little competition from other professional sports.

But very little attention has been paid to these sports, even though some of the athletes who play basketball and hockey are among the highest paid and most skilled athletes in the world.

Why? Probably because both sports begin their seasons while the football season is still on. They end with the basketball season over a month old.

The NBA and NHL championship series don't attract the attention that the World Series and Super Bowl do. The World Series is an ancient tradition, while the Super Bowl is just one game with an intense buildup to it.

Neither hockey nor basketball attracts the broad range of fans that football and baseball do.

Hockey is more popular in Canada than the United States, and many of the top hockey stars are from our northern neighbor.

Basketball is an American sport, but many sports fans have a tendency to identify more with people who resemble them.

Black players dominate the NBA, but the majority of paying customers at professional sporting events are white.

While white sports fans like to watch the talents of Julius "Dr. J" Erving and "Magic" Johnson, many of them identify more with Larry Bird.

Thus, pro basketball does not attract as large a following of the overall population as football or baseball.

The last two years, basketball and hockey have also had to compete with United States Football League (USFL) games during the spring.

The USFL doesn't offer football fans a high caliber of competition yet, but it's attracting some of the top college players and could improve in the next two years.

Although the USFL will change to a fall season in 1986, it's still competing for the sports fan's dollar this spring.

So you just don't hear people talking very much about the classic battles between the Philadelphia 76ers and the Boston Celtics, or who will win the NHL's long playoff battle.

And that's sad. There are a lot of talented athletes in exciting action to be seen in pro basketball and hockey this spring.

The Ruidoso Middle School boys and girls basketball teams ended the season Friday with different results.

Ruidoso's boys took a 36-22 win over host Tularosa. However, the Brave girls lost 30-28. Ruidoso finished with a 12-3 record in boys play and a 10-5 record in girls action.

The Brave boys jumped off to a 9-0 edge over Tularosa in the first quarter. Tularosa came back somewhat in the second period, cutting the Braves' lead to 19-12 at halftime.

But Ruidoso finished strong, outscoring the Wildcats 17-10 in the second half.

Dusty Beavers and Charles Smith each scored 11 points to lead the Braves. Ron Sanders added four points.

Last Tuesday the Brave boys defeated visiting Capitan 53-33. The Tiger girls topped the Brave girls 20-16.

Ruidoso led all the way in the boys game, taking a 13-8 edge at the end of the opening quarter.

The Braves opened up a 32-12 advantage at the end of the first half and breezed in from there.

Beavers scored 14 points to lead the Braves. Smith added 12 points. Chris Long tallied nine points, while Sanders and Sam Chee each scored six points.

"I felt the kids played very well in the last three games," said Brave boys coach Dean Hood. "They passed well, executed well and we had a balanced scoring attack."

Ruidoso wrestlers defeated by tough district foes

The Ruidoso High School wrestling team lost to three District 3-AAA foes Saturday in Alamogordo.

Ruidoso, now 4-5 on the dual-match season, lost to Cobre 42-24, fell to Silver City 38-24, and dropped a 49-12 decision to Deming.

The Warriors' 169-pound James Herrera was the most successful of the Ruidoso wrestlers. He won all three of his matches, two in competition and one on a forfeit.

Herrera defeated his Cobre opponent with a second-period pin, took a forfeit win against Silver City, and had a first-period pin over his Deming opponent. He is now 12-4-1 on the season.

Ruidoso's only other win against Deming was a forfeit victory by heavyweight Phillip Herrera.

The Warriors had to forfeit the 114-pound and 129-pound divisions in all three matches.

Against Silver City, the Warriors picked up a first-period pin win by Phillip Herrera and a 20-1 victory by Kevin Jameson in the 189-pound class.

Besides James Herrera's forfeit win, the Warriors also had a forfeit victory by Zach Swalander in the 140-pound division.

Cory Garner wrestled well at 121 pounds, but lost a tight 10-9 decision.

Against Cobre, James Herrera and 105-pound Scott Yeatman picked up victories. Yeatman pinned his oppo-

nent in the second period.

Phillip Herrera and Jameson picked up forfeit victories against the Indians.

"We always have problems with these matches," said Warrior head coach Gerald Ames. "But we usually

come back and do much better in the district tournament.

"These were all tough teams."

Ruidoso will compete in the Pecos Valley Tournament at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell Saturday.

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

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

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

School board decides policy changes

School policy changes occupied a large part of the five-hour February meeting of the Capitan school board Thursday.

Board members officially canvassed the votes from the February 5 school board election. Voter turnout was 80 percent of registered voters. The voters elected Tom Trost and passed the mill levy and bond issue.

With all five members present, the canvass was approved and the certificate of election was presented to Trost.

The board adopted the public purchases policy after clarification of wording on the policy. The original policy presented for approval was worded "office of the superintendent." Mark Delgado felt the wording should be "superintendent" specifically.

Superintendent Leonard Hays agreed with the suggestion.

Small direct purchases can be made without going to bid, Hays informed the board.

The policy was adopted unanimously.

The board reviewed policy concerning court leave and decided to table it until the board could have more information concerning the legality of the proposed changes.

The changes called for court leave at regular salary for certified and non-certified personnel.

Cheerleader policy was next in line, with discussion concerning which out-of-town games the cheerleaders would attend.

Presently, cheerleaders may attend five out-of-town games, not limited to boys varsity.

Board member Isidro Peralta expressed his desire to have the board make the decision on which games the cheerleaders can attend. Presently, the games are scheduled by principal Jay Dark.

Board president Delgado said he did not want to see any restrictions placed on the cheerleaders as to which games they could attend.

Peralta said he felt "old traditions" were broken by letting the cheerleaders attend volleyball and girls basketball as well as boys varsity ball games.

Dark stated that girls' sports were as important as boys' sports. He noted that the girls were under the same activities association as the boys, and that Title 9 prohibits discrimination against girls' activities.

"You've been breaking our traditions since you've been here," Peralta told Dark.

Peralta moved to make it policy that cheerleaders attend only boys out-of-town ball games.

The board defeated the motion. Bus space is to be made available for cheerleaders for the choice games, the board agreed.

A question concerning certification of the activity bus driver was laid to rest.

Board member James McDaniel reported to the board that the bus driver chosen for a recent activity was proven certified. There had been a question about the driver's qualifications.

To avoid a similar situation, Hays

told the board, 10 staff members are now certified. Activity bus drivers must meet the same qualifications as regular route drivers.

Student bus suspension was discussed. Delgado said he wanted any student suspended from the bus to be suspended from school activities.

Since students must travel to school activities in the activity bus, the board felt the policy was clear. If a student were suspended from the bus, there would be no way to get to the activity.

Presently, group and team sponsors are responsible for discipline on the activity bus.

The board unanimously approved the changes in policy.

Snow policy, as applied to staff, was discussed and approved.

Hays said he chose to delay school based on road conditions and weather on a given morning. Staff are expected to be at the school at the time specified in the delay.

"If the buses run and a teacher is unable to get to school, the absence will be counted as a personal day," Hays stated.

Teachers presently get two personal days with pay. After two days, the person will be docked in pay. Teachers now receive one personal day with a substitute teacher paid by the school. The teacher must pay for the substitute the second day.

The board approved the snow policy.

Personnel hiring policy was reviewed.

The board tabled action on pay schedules based on three years' previous experience. Dark said he felt experience had to count for something.

Outgoing board member Robert Rannels commented that an employee with more experience would be better at his job.

The board was unable to decide on the matter and tabled it.

Disparity of hours by different staff members was questioned by Peralta. He wanted staff to work a full eight-hour day.

Hays clarified hours with the time schedule: 7 a.m. - 2:45 p.m. for cooks; 7 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. for janitors; 8 a.m. - 3:15 p.m. for aides and 8 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. for teachers.

There was a question of cooks leaving before the scheduled quitting time. Hays said the cooks had been informed about the problem.

The board took no action because of the conditions of employment, which set salaries until July 1.

The board unanimously agreed not to conduct phone polls, since this was specific in state statute. Temporary hiring may be approved by the superintendent until the board can meet.

The subject bringing the most audience participation was policy concerning the Sierra Blanca ski program.

Jodee Damron of the Alto Ski Shop requested that the board consider changing the present school policy that counts students participating in the ski program as absent.

Damron stated there were few students in the program because of school policy.

"Financially they are passing up a great opportunity," Damron stated.

Fee for the program is \$4 for a half-day lift ticket.

Capitan previously supported the program with work completion as a student prerequisite. High liability costs made the board drop the ski program and adopt present policy.

Dark stated the need to set a priority - "academics or social."

Audience discussion covered prerequisites such as a certain grade point and proof of attendance at the ski program. Many felt this area was unique and that students should have the opportunity to participate in the winter program.

The board carried a motion to not count students participating in the final three half-days of the program absent, and to work toward adopting a ski-program policy for next year.

"Those who want to learn should be able," board member Preston Stone said.

In executive session, the board approved hiring Janet Leslie as custodian.

Action on Hays' contract, as requested by Peralta, was tabled.

Old business included utility cost comparisons. Natural gas increased by 1.9 percent over last year and electricity was up 6.6 percent. Both increases were reported not due to increased consumption.

The fiscal report was not completed in time for the meeting, and the budget report given was for December 1984, because of equipment failure. The budget showed the school deficit at \$7,500, with transfer of funds at \$49,103.

The school must show the state Board of Finance that it is making an honest effort at transferring funds to cover the deficit. The school will have \$27,000 available from state emergency funding.

Athletic director Bill McVeigh announced the upgrading of status from A to AA, beginning with the 1986-87 season. Capitan athletic teams will play Jal, Eunice and Dexter as now scheduled.

Rannels asked why Capitan did not play Corona. McVeigh stated that he would try to arrange basketball games with the school.

McVeigh reviewed the charges from the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA) concerning unsportsmanlike conduct at the recent Weed basketball game. The News stated in a recent article that "players" were cited.

McVeigh said the letter from NMAA referred to one player.

Capitan has 10 days to reply and must show progress being made to correct the situation.

McVeigh explained that Capitan plays Carrizozo as a final game out of "tradition." He also reviewed a state change that allows schools to schedule as many games in tournaments as the school wants. The purpose is to save transportation costs.

Athletic patches were discussed, with a report that volleyball patches were ordered. Players have paid for patches in the past. Gym banners were considered.

Final business concerned a financial error by the state, which would require schools to reimburse the state for funds allocated in 1981. Capitan school received \$1,600 in the fund that year.

The board adjourned at midnight.

Superintendent decides snow days

By 6 a.m., Capitan schools superintendent Leonard Hays might look out his window and decide school is off for the day - if it is snowing, that is.

Hays has no set criteria for closing school, but uses personal judgement. If there is snow on the ground and it is continuing to snow, Hays will delay class for two hours, due to the danger to the buses.

Within the next two hours, roads must be made passable by the State Highway Department. If it appears the storm will continue, school may be canceled.

Delays and cancellations are phoned by Hays into KREEE 1390 AM radio in Ruidoso as early as 6 a.m. Announcements are made regularly, but Hays admitted that radio reception was not available to everyone in the Capitan school district.

On the northern side of the Capitan mountains, bus drivers communicate by phone. School staff notify each other through a phone chain organized by the principals. Public information is mainly available on the Ruidoso station.

"People are accustomed to turning on the radio," Hays said.

Capitan has had two snow days so far, with winter's end six weeks away. The days have been rescheduled. One is to be made up on February 18 (Washington's Birthday holiday), and the other will be counted as a teacher in-service. The in-service day occurred when the buses did not run but teachers and a few students came to class.

Day closure can be tricky. According to Hays, it takes 30 to 45 minutes to get the bus drivers back to the school. The sun can be shining by then.

The Alto bus often does not run when the others do, since Angus Hill can be treacherous.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—They want to give us "bread and circuses"—without the bread.

Most of the stir being made here about a state operated lottery is a circus act to distract us from more serious topics. The lottery itself, if we ever have one, will be nothing else.

In other words, a lot of blue smoke and mirrors, so we won't be asking lawmakers to spend their time on tough decisions. Those conservatives who bay at the moon about no taxes increases of any kind, any time, know things like this, for instance: If the price of crude oil falls another buck, even the most tightfisted proposal on what the state should spend, the one from the Legislative Finance Committee, would leave us deeply in the hole.

You can see why they'd rather talk about a lottery, which brings to the citizens' minds the picture of all those happy winners elsewhere, jumping up and down and shouting about how they won permanent happiness on an investment of two dollars and half.

That's why so many legislators solemnly affirm that "the people of New Mexico want a lottery."

So if a lot of New Mexicans want the state to get into the "numbers" game, which is all a lottery is, does that mean the state should do it?

A few more questions: —Does the government have the obligation to provide entertainment for its people?

—If the people wanted state-operated poker parlors, would that mean we should fund their operation?

—And, as one witness before legislative committees has been asking, if the state is allowed to do just about anything if it makes money, how about where houses? They are rumored to throw off a tidy profit.

Lottery proponents, of course, don't like that kind of talk. They prefer to emphasize other aspects of the issue—which means that, like circus performers, they point our attention where they want it to go instead of where we prefer looking. They talk about how much good can be done with the money raised by why they insist on calling "a voluntary tax."

(Isn't that a contradiction in terms?) They positively glow when they promise us 34 cents of every dollar raises by this method would go for "human needs." Where does the rest of the money go? Some goes to support state employees and outside firms necessary to make this unusual form of "taxation" work. The rest goes to those beatifically happy winners—who, at these odds, would be shamefully few in proportion to the money invested.

So who's doing most of the pushing for a lottery here these days? Why, those who would make bucks operating it for us, of course.

After all, if you had a company that made its money providing machinery for state-operated lotteries, you would only have 50 prospective customers, wouldn't you? So if there was enough money to be made even in small states like ours, you'd spend the bucks to get to be the sole-source supplier.

That's probably why those sorts of people have almost as many paid lobbyists in town as the Reverends and others opposed to this program have unpaid ones.

And you might just hold to this charming thought: If the state of New Mexico legalizes a lottery, that in effect legalizes lotteries on all Indian reservations and pueblos in the state. Seeing how things are going in the bingo business, can you doubt what would happen to competition for the lottery dollar? At more than one pueblo, the bingo parlor has already, sadly, become much more important than the kiva. Just think what it would be like if the Mescaleros ever decided to go after the same gamblers the state is cherishing and encouraging.

This column will net the writer lots of letters; every unkind judgment pronounced on this topic does that. People say, in effect, that they don't care about how lousy the odds are, they just want a chance to have a little flutter down at the seven-to-eleven. What harm can that possibly do, they ask.

That's the reverse of the question from here, which is this: What good can it do?

"Technically I'm a sports writer," said Martin Frenzel when I asked him about his job.

Martin's byline in the Albuquerque Journal has him as "Outdoors Writer." I got him to expand on his job description while he was here covering the pro ski race.

Skiing is one of the outdoor activities he covers. The UNM men's and women's varsity ski teams are on his beat. He writes a weekly ski column.

"We get a million news releases and I sort of throw 'em all together," he explained.

Although he enjoys covering alpine skiing, Martin prefers cross-country skiing for his own recreation. He is excited about learning the esoteric XC pastime of telemarking.

"It's too expensive for me," he said of downhill skiing. Spoken like a true journalist, Martin.

This was not Mr. Frenzel's first visit to our part of New Mexico.

"I killed a gobbler (wild turkey) near Cloudcroft," he said. With a secretive laugh he added, "I won't tell you where."

Another hunting trip down south netted Martin a young Barbary ram in the Two Rivers area west of Roswell.

Hunting and fishing are what outdoors writers mostly write about. Outdoors writers are usually—if not always—outdoorsmen. This makes them members of that select group of people who get paid for doing what they really like.

"My hardest part is convincing people that it really IS a job," said Martin.

He pointed out that his work days are sometimes "horrendously long"—starting at 3 a.m. and ending at midnight.

"Those 21-hour days are kinda hard on you," he said.

But is he happy?
 "Oh yeah... It really is nice."

Martin told me he learned to read by reading hunting and fishing magazines when he was five or six years old. Not too long afterward, he was collecting rejection slips for his own stories.

Now he is outdoors writer for the state's largest newspaper.

"I guess it's a dream come true," he said. "But it IS work."

"Be sure to put that in there. It is a job and it is a lot of work."

I felt sort of like an outdoors writer after we went a week with no running water at our house. The "big freeze" about 10 days ago put quite a few people in the same predicament, from what I heard.

The experience prompted me to compile a list of things that are good and bad about having to go without water.

A good thing is being able to fantasize that you're on a camping trip, in the (relative) comfort of your own home.

A bad thing is that little tasks like brushing your teeth are just not as easily accomplished with water from a jug. You know what I mean?

You never feel like you've gotten all the toothpaste out of your toothbrush when you rinse it by pouring water over it. And of course you can't use too much water from the jug, because you might wake up in the night with a killer thirst and find the jug empty.

For some reason, being without water makes you thirsty all the time.

Hollywood Post Office vandalized

As a result of recurring vandalism, the Ruidoso Hollywood Post Office will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. only, Postmaster Bernie Lechman announced this morning. Formerly, the

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January building tops \$1.7 million

Building permits issued by the Village of Ruidoso Building Inspector's Office were at their highest level in January since October 1984, totaling \$1,751,161.

By comparison, total valuation of the 22 permits issued in January 1984, was \$1,658,174. In December, 20 permits were issued with a valuation of \$751,719.

Two reasons for the rise were building permits issued for two commercial projects. The Reddington Investments conversion from motel to condominiums of the Ruidoso Inn on Highway 70 recorded a valuation of \$251,400.

Construction of the JIRA Plaza shopping center on Mechem Drive across from the new Safeway accounted for a \$7,000 valuation foundation permit and a \$199,644 valuation shopping center construction permit.

Other permits issued during January included nine permits issued for the construction of single-family dwellings, with a valuation of \$838,639. Permits for residential additions or alterations numbered 21, with a valuation of \$192,023.

Four permits for the construction of commercial buildings were issued, with a valuation of \$315,737. Commercial additions or alteration projects numbered four, with a valuation of \$17,660.

One permit for the construction of an apartment or condominium was issued with a valuation of \$135,702. The Reddington Investments project was the only apartment addition or alteration permit issued in January.

Two grading permits were also issued. Total permits issued during January numbered 42.







Don Johnson adds style to Miami

Some shows take that liberty, we don't take that liberty. It was invaluable training and added to its authenticity."

The actor also considers the detectives' relationship to be a plus for the series. "I feel the fans have unanimously agreed that Philip and I have a real strong chemistry. From the moment we met something magical happened. We strike a strong bond and relationship that comes across on the screen. People like to see that kind of friendship and dedication."

And then there's the dyspeptic 8-foot alligator named Elvis. "Working with Elvis is a very tense situation," Johnson says. "This is one of the wildest jobs tossed at me."

Christopher Boyce and Daulton Lee sold top secret documents concerning U.S. spy satellites to the Russians. Both boys, barely into their 20s, are currently ensconced in a federal penitentiary.

Why did these two affluent teenagers sell secrets to the Russians? This question is never completely answered in "The Falcon and the Snowman," but the events surrounding this tale of espionage make for a fascinating film.

Boyce and Lee, native Southern Californians, attended high school together. Lee turned to drugs. He had a \$500 a week heroin habit and was arrested several times for dealing. He is the "snowman."

Boyce worked for a secret project at TRW. He logged in spy satellite information. He also owned a pet falcon. He is the "falcon."

Boyce was disenchanted with his life. He looked at Nixon and Watergate and CIA activities in Chile and decided

to sell his secrets to the Russians. Friend Lee, simply looking for a way to make some easy cash, became the messenger who made contact with the Russian Embassy.

This spy story is stranger and often stronger than fiction. The key word here seems to be ineptitude. Security at TRW was so lax that Boyce was able to leave each day with secrets in his briefcase. And Lee, although a convicted drug dealer, continually crossed the Mexican border with ease.

Director John Schlesinger and screenwriter Steve Zaillian are not long on motivation and causes, but they are superb in presenting details and events. Were Lee and Boyce misguided idealists, playful showoffs or just plain greedy? The filmmakers let the viewers decide.

Timothy Hutton and Sean Penn are both especially fine. They may well be rivals for Academy Awards in 1986.

There has been a rash of politically oriented videos lately that range from silly to serious. This is nothing new. Videos from groups like the Clash have always been openly leftist, and Billy Joel's "Goodbye Saigon" made more impact than most documentaries.

One problem with mixing politics with videos is that often the political message is confused with a fashion statement. In Culture Club's "War Song," Boy George seems worried about what he would wear in a war. The video shows that beautiful people can look good in military garb from either side. Other clips are too nebulous about their political message. In "If I Had a Rocket Launcher," we see Bruce Cockburn surrounded by frightening imagery. But all we can get out of the video is that he's angry. Angry at who? And why?

One of the best new political videos is "Five Minutes" from Bonzo Goes to Washington, the musical collaboration between Bootsy Collins and Jerry Harrison. The duo added a rhythmic background to a voice-over of President Reagan's joke about bomb-

ing Russia. The video mixes an assortment of old atomic bomb-related footage culled from the film "The Atomic Cafe" with news footage of Reagan. The eerie juxtapositions in "Five Minutes" are much harder to dismiss than the overtly stronger message in the slick Frankie Goes to Hollywood clip "Two Tribes." This video has Reagan and Soviet leader Konstantin Chernenko look-alikes fighting it out in a ring.


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

DRIVER'S VIEW — CBS gets a chance to use its now-famous RaceCams again next Sunday (Feb. 17) when it presents the Daytona '500' stock-car race from Daytona Beach, Fla., from noon to 3:45 p.m.

The RaceCams are 11-pound cameras that are mounted on the roll bar cages approximately where the right-side rear passenger would sit. They are capable of providing a 360-degree view from inside the car and can zoom in so tightly that the gauges are visible on the dashboard.

The cameras were developed by Australian engineers, and have become more refined and produce better pictures each year.

In the last two Daytonas, the RaceCam — and CBS viewers — were first across the finish line when Cale Yarborough took both checkered flags. This year the cameras will be carried by three racing veterans, Geoff Bodine, Benny Parsons and "King" Richard Petty.

For Petty, the winningest driver in NASCAR racing history, it will be his second time carrying the clever camera.

Benny Parsons is not only a veteran driver, but also an old hand at providing viewers with a driver's view. In the 1979 Daytona, he made racing history when he carried the first in-car camera for CBS. The camera was made by Racevision, but it had only a straight-ahead view.

Carrying a camera is nothing new to Geoff Bodine. It will be the third time he will be equipped with a RaceCam.

Last season CBS started using an audio hookup that enables the viewers to listen in as the drivers talked to Ken Squire, CBS Motorsports commentator. This is used only when the race is under yellow "caution" flags, however.



Back-seat driving: Racecam rides again

Two years ago, entering the final lap of the Daytona 500, Cale Yarborough trailed leader Bill Elliott by less than 4 inches. But unlike previous broadcasts, spectators weren't restricted to a view from up in a tower. Instead, they were treated to a look from inside Yarborough's Hardee's Chevrolet, courtesy of Racecam, a 25-pound camera unit mounted to the driver's roll-cage and capable of zooming, panning and articulating every which way. Now, in Racecam's unblinking sight was Elliott's left-rear bumper as Yarborough set up his Turn Four draft and managed to bomb on through to victory. And last year, Yarborough won the 26th running of the 500 with Racecam once more rendering back-seat drivers bug-eyed.

The gadget is a gas. Invented by electrical engineers at Channel 7 in Sydney, Australia, its capacity to stupefy was first realized by CBS motor sports editor Ken Squier, who was on assignment in Melbourne when he first caught some Racecam footage on the telly. Squier brought the tape to network executives. "They were amazed," says Bob Fishman, director of CBS's Daytona coverage. "CBS was supposed to be working on something similar, but we hadn't come up with anything nearly as good."

The system works via radio signals. A cameraman controls Racecam's operating functions by fiddling a joystick from inside a CBS production truck. A flat-trunk antenna sends the camera signals to a heli-copter hovering above the track, which in turn beams it back to the CBS truck where it begins the journey towards home screens.

One of Fishman's responsibilities is to demonstrate Racecam-vision restraint, and to "marry it up with the other pictures and speed shots," says Fishman. "You can't always be in the car."

But just consider Richard Petty and Benny Parsons, both of whom will be video-equipped, neck and neck: On one side of the screen viewers will share Petty's peripheral view of Parsons; on the other side of the screen, Parsons view of Petty. Just two guys humming along 140 mph faster than what's legal, making tiny wheel adjustments, neck and shoulder muscles bulging.

"Once we go inside," notes Fishman, "you only get a sense of the speed if we point Racecam out the window and the crowd is passing by. But you do get a sense of the closeness, and the trust these guys have for each other; the way everyone knows what everyone else is going to do when they're going that fast that close."


