Street Department gets more funds

Amid discussions of decreased revenues and budget cutbacks, the Ruidoso Village Council Friday voted to increase the Street Department budget by \$100,000.

Also Friday, councillors heard a report from village manager Jim Hine indicating a downward trend is continuing in village revenues.

The budget increase move came during a special afternoon meeting after discussion between the council and Street Department head Jack LaMay. LaMay pointed out that \$141,000 was spent this year on snow removal alone, and a large unbudgeted sum was spent on flood-related endeavors.

As a result, funds are short for budgeted projects remaining to be done this fiscal year, LaMay explained. He pointed out that future State Highway Department cooperative agreements could be jeopardized if the projects are not completed by June 30.

Spring endeavors, including a Gavilan Canyon Road subgrade and basecourse project and 1984-1985 cooperative agreement road projects, are cooperatively funded \$224,000 by the state.

LaMay said the village has been able to secure Highway Department cooperative agreements for the past seven years.

LaMay said the Grindstone Canyon Road extension project is also a priority that is budgeted but will run

short of funds under the present circumstances. Contributing to the shortfall was some unforeseen blasting that had to be done for the road, LaMay said.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said that project must be completed by March 15 to enable work to begin on the remainder of the dam project.

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter estimated \$155,000 is needed to complete the road projects as planned. It was decided that \$100,000, previously planned for the acquisition of a Gradall for a river retrenching project, now would be used to cover the Street Department projects.

Hine said he would attempt to determine by March where the remaining \$55,000 will come from.

Casting the only negative vote on the transfer of funds was Councillor Victor Alonso. He pointed out the inconsistency of hearing that village revenues are down and then voting to increase expenditures.

"The problem you point out is different from the solution," he said. The councillor argued that since there is a downturn in revenues, cutbacks must be made.

"I don't see any easy choices," he said.

Potter predicted that village government could compensate for the revenue shortage by streamlining the current level of services.

"I believe we can cut our operating cost," he said. "If we can be efficient, we can cut the mustard."

But the assistant manager was quick to point out that village employees even now are working hard.

"I guarantee you every one of them has three jobs," he said of the staff workload.

In a cost-cutting effort, the councillors directed Potter to determine what the effect would be on village insurance and liability if snow removal operations were limited. Hine said snow removal could be limited to Sudderth and Mechem drives and access to emergency services such as fire, police and hospital agencies.

Other cost-cutting measures already taken by the village include layoffs and a cutback in travel allowances. Hine said any unbudgeted purchases are being monitored closely.

"If it's not budgeted, it's not bought," he remarked.

Also during the meeting, the council discussed the impact on the village that current legislation and the upcoming gross receipts tax increase election will have.

The March 22 election will determine if one-half of one percent gross receipts tax will be collected in the village for infrastructure projects.

Mayor George White noted his recent attendance at a Municipal League meeting in Santa Fe where House Bill 511 was discussed at length.

The bill proposes to withhold, for state level expenditure, .35 cents from the 1.35 cents on the dollar of gross receipts tax revenue currently remit-

ted to local governments. To compensate for the expected loss in revenues, the bill proposes to allow local governments to raise property taxes and to share in state income tax revenue.

White said he and three other league members were the only ones who spoke against the measure, with the majority agreeing that 511 is less painful to local governments than previously proposed tax reorganization legislation.

"If 511 is all we can get, we'll take it," White described the feeling of the group.

Councillor Rick Evans pointed out that if 511 passes and the gross receipts tax increase election fails, village taxes will have to be raised.

"At least we can soften the impact of 511 by passing the one-half," he said.

Councillor Jerry Shaw noted that some confusion has risen regarding the two measures. She clarified that the two are unrelated, one being a local option and the other being up to the Legislature. Neither affects the other.

Carpenter proposed that the council prepare a statement showing how the bill will affect the level of village services. He noted that the bill will result in a \$595,000 drop in returned gross receipts taxes.

"We'll have to cut some services," Carpenter said of the eventuality of the bill passing and the one-half failing. "I don't think the people of Ruidoso would accept a stepback of services."

At a special meeting at village hall Friday afternoon, the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) discussed ways to cut its budget to adjust to an \$18,000 deficit.

The deficit is due to a shortfall of projected lodgers' tax collections. The actual collections so far this fiscal year fall 10 to 15 percent below the projections.

Much of the lodgers' tax revenue goes toward funding advertising and promotion. The committee had budgeted \$27,000 for spring and summer advertising.

The committee tried to devise ways of cutting the budget in other areas so

it could have \$25,000 to join the proposed advertising cooperative with Ruidoso Downs Race Track and the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

If the racetrack, the Inn and the Chamber of Commerce Advertising Committee agree on an advertising campaign, they will each contribute \$25,000 to share \$75,000 worth of advertising. The \$75,000 might be eligible for a percentage of matching funds from the state.

LTC chairman Budgie Green told his committee he felt that joining the cooperative effort was very important and should outweigh other spending.

"I think it's the greatest thing that could happen," said Green of the pro-

posed cooperative effort.

The board considered cancelling billboards now contracted in Austin, Dallas, and San Antonio, Texas. But after learning that cancellation would cost too much in penalty fees, the committee decided to cut in other areas.

Ruidoso village clerk Leon Eggleston proposed a series of line item cuts totaling approximately \$16,200. That would combine with \$9,000 left in the budget to give the committee the \$25,000 needed for the cooperative venture.

Eggleston proposed cutting \$2,500 from Chamber of Commerce trade show funds, \$3,000 from the Ruidoso Business Association trade show, \$3,224 from the Ruidoso Art Festival

\$4,000 from the auto hill climb race and \$1,140 from Spirit of Ruidoso.

Eggleston said he felt lodgers' tax should not be used to fund events.

"If people are really interested in that event, they'll raise the money in the private sector," said Eggleston.

LTC planned a meeting for 10 a.m. Monday, February 25, to meet with representatives of the groups that would be hardest hit by the cuts. At that meeting, LTC will formulate recommendations to present to the Ruidoso Village Council at Tuesday night's council meeting.

"When you have to cut, it hurts everybody," said Green. "The LTC is not picking on any individual or particular organization."

Golden Age Club hears police officer

A busy meeting of the Golden Age Club last week included topics of discussion ranging from taxes to neighborhood watches.

The Wednesday lunch meeting featured a presentation by Ruidoso police officer Mark Paz. Paz outlined the Ruidoso Neighborhood Watch program and the development of such a plan on a countywide basis.

Also during the meeting, Ruidoso Mayor George White outlined the ramifications of New Mexico Legislature House Bill 511 and the local special election to raise gross receipts taxes.

White pointed out that Bill 511 could result in an increase in property taxes. The gross receipts measure will raise revenue for infrastructure, if passed.

After the meeting, many Golden Age members voiced their opposition to any property tax increase. Many said they would rather see passage of the special gross receipts tax to raise

revenues.

Of the Neighborhood Watch, Paz said an upcoming meeting of the group is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Thursday, March 14, at Ruidoso village hall. The officer said the meeting may take place jointly with the Ruidoso Crime Stoppers.

An open forum with three Ruidoso police officers is tentatively scheduled for the meeting.

Paz encouraged the Golden Age members to become involved in the Neighborhood Watch program. The

program in the Upper Canyon and White Mountain V areas of Ruidoso as evidence of the program's worth.

Membership in the group, according to Paz, is available for \$1 a month. The \$1 covers the costs of preparing notifying Neighborhood Watch signs and the costs of the home security system that goes with the program.

That system provides for surveillance of a member's home when out of town or on vacation.

Paz said he was coordinating an effort with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office in setting up a countywide program.

Also during the meeting, members agreed to send a letter of thanks for the use of the Ruidoso Public Library while the Senior Citizens Center's new kitchen facilities were being built.

Member Cal Cowden reported that the March 20 meeting of the group will feature van rides to the eye doctor's office for a free vision screening clinic.

Ruidoso direct appropriations bill clears committee

The \$1.1 million Ruidoso-Lincoln County direct appropriation requests from the New Mexico Legislature came closer to reality Saturday afternoon as they passed the Senate Conservation Committee.

The bills now go on to the Senate Finance Committee for hearing.

According to Senator James Martin, the Ruidoso bill, Senate Bill 297, passed the committee with a "do pass

recommendation" for the Senate Finance Committee.

The Lincoln County bill, Senate Bill 296, which did pass the committee, did not receive a do pass recommendation, only because some minor points remained to be cleared up, according to Martin.

The Ruidoso request asks for \$583,500 for flood-related bridge replacement and drainage repairs in Ruidoso. The county request seeks \$525,000 for the funding of repairs and

improvements to Gavilan Canyon and Carrizo Canyon roads.

Ruidoso village councillors Bill Karn, Jerry Shaw and John Underwood traveled to Santa Fe to attend the Saturday hearing.

Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox and county clerk Jané McSwane represented the county request at the capitol.

Contacted Sunday, Karn said the councillors felt very positive about the progress of the bill so far. He noted Martin's active support of the

bill as one reason the appropriation request has fared so well. Also, Karn reported that three Senate Conservation Committee members are members of the Senate Finance Committee—a positive sign.

"It gives us a foot in the door," Karn remarked.

No date has yet been set for the Senate Finance Committee hearing of the bills.

Twins of the bills will be scheduled for hearings in the House of Representatives.



EMS teaches CPR

"Since 60 percent to 70 percent of sudden deaths caused by cardiac arrest occur before hospitalization, it is clear that the community deserves to be recognized as the ultimate coronary care unit," the "Journal of the American Medical Association" stated in August 1980.

That is why Jim Stover and his staff at Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services (EMS) are committed to teaching cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) techniques to as many area citizens as possible.

Stover, director of Ruidoso EMS, said that he would like to see CPR as a high school graduation requirement in Ruidoso schools. It is a required course in some school systems.

Ruidoso High School biology teachers Mike Speck and Nell Davis have asked EMS to teach CPR techniques to their students. Bill Koegler and Jim Varnadore are teaching the class to more than 180 high school students.

Students will hear lectures, participate in practical sessions, and be tested before receiving CPR certification.

Students of CPR learn how to tell whether a collapsed victim has fainted, stopped breathing or had his or her heart stop.

Before being certified in CPR, students learn how to keep a cardiac arrest victim alive with mouth-to-mouth ventilation and closed chest cardiac compression until medical help arrives.

More than half of heart attack victims who die either don't make it to the hospital or die within two hours after the onset of symptoms.

Heart Attack

Signals

Know the signals: an uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness, or pain in the center of the chest, behind the breastbone, which may spread to the shoulder, neck, or arms (the pain may not be severe). Other signals may include sweating, nausea, shortness of breath, and a feeling of weakness.

Actions for Survival

1. Recognize the "signals."
2. Stop activity and sit or lie down.
3. Act at once if pain lasts for two minutes or more: Call the emergency rescue service or go to the nearest hospital emergency room with 24 hour service.

Many deaths might be prevented by prompt, appropriate treatment by laypersons trained in CPR.

CPR techniques are also appropriate for some victims of drowning, electrocution, suffocation, drug intoxication and automobile accidents.

According to a 1983 survey, one

Place victim flat on his back on a hard surface.

1. If unconscious, open airway. Head tilt—chin lift or head tilt—neck lift

2. If not breathing, begin artificial breathing. 4 quick breaths if airway is blocked, by back blows, abdominal or chest thrusts, and finger sweep until airway is open.

3. Check carotid pulse.

4. If pulse absent, begin artificial circulation. Depress sternum 1 1/2 to 2". One Rescuer: 18 compressions (rate 80 per min.) 5 compressions (rate 60 per min.) 2 quick breaths

Continue uninterrupted until advanced life support is available.

Herrera star as seven matmen qualify for state meet

Phillip Herrera won the heavyweight division to lead the Ruidoso High School wrestling team to fourth place in the District 3-AAA Tournament Saturday at Silver City High School.

Deming won the team title with 167 points. Cobre was second with 143, Silver City had 128, Ruidoso scored 77, New Mexico Military Institute had 57, Goddard scored 54 and New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped tallied eight.

Besides Herrera, six Warrior wrestlers will compete in the state AAA-AA division championships next weekend at Los Lunas High School.

Kevin Jameson took second in the 189-pound division, James Herrera was third in the 169-pound division, Zach Swalander was third at 140 pounds, Jeff Schmidt took fourth at 100 pounds, Kyle Jameson finished fourth at 147 pounds, and Manuel Montano took fourth at 128 pounds.

"The kids did fairly well," said Warrior head coach Gerald Ames.

"The competition was tough. I figured we'd take fourth."

Herrera won both his matches by pins. The Warrior junior pinned Silver City's Sal Ramos in the first period of the semi-final match.

In the finals, Herrera overcame a 2-0 deficit and pinned Ben Correll of Goddard in the first period. Herrera managed to roll Correll and then pinned him.

"That was by far Phillip's best effort of the season," Ames commented. "He got psyched up for the matches and was ready for them. I

was very impressed with his performance."

Kevin Jameson, a senior, won his first match with an 8-4 decision. However, Jameson lost in the finals to Deming's Tony Villodosa on a second-period pin.

"Kevin wrestled well in both matches," Ames said.

James Herrera won his first match with a second-period pin over a Silver City wrestler.

Herrera then lost a hard-fought 9-6 decision to eventual champion Patrick Garcia in the second round.

James came back to pin a Deming wrestler and top a Cobre matman 11-5 for third-place honors. He led 11-2 in the third-place match before the Cobre wrestler closed the gap.

Herrera has the Warriors' best season match record. The junior has a 16-6-1 mark.

Swalander lost to a Cobre matman in the first round. The Warrior junior qualified for state by beating an NMMI matman 12-3 and pinning a Silver City wrestler in the second period.

Jameson all wrestled well in qualifying for state.

Jameson lost his first match, won his second match, and lost his final match. He is a junior, while Schmidt is a freshman and Montano is a senior.

"It's hard to say who has the best chance of doing well next week," Ames said. "I say James and Kevin."

"I don't know much about the heavyweight division."

The state tournament will be Friday and Saturday. Ruidoso finished 12th in last year's state championships, scoring 39 1/2 points.

The young Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team found the going tough over the weekend, losing to District 3-AAA foes Deming and Hot Springs.

Ruidoso, now 1-5 in district play and 3-17 overall, played powerful Deming tough Friday night before losing to the visitors 51-41.

Saturday the Warriors lost to Hot Springs 51-42 on the winners' court.

The Warriors came through with a strong effort before falling to the Wildcats Friday night.




Ruidoso outscored the hosts 15-11 in the third quarter for a 41-37 lead entering the final stanza.


Seeley said he was pleased to see the continuing education requirement adopted.

Hall Brothers Development Company received approval from the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Thursday to begin the legal process on a proposed subdivision.

At the regular February meeting, P&Z reviewed plans presented by the developer for a subdivision to be built west of the dump road near Capitan.

The land is not within Capitan village limits, but developer representative Tom Hall plans to petition the village for annexation.

Hall reviewed the disclosure statement. The subdivision, to be called Salado Creek Flats, will be 41 lots, one-third to one-half acre in size, and will have water provided by two community wells.

P&Z questioned the use of septic tanks on a watershed area—the area proposed for development.

Hall stated that he had investigated hookups with the Capitan sewer system. He said the village wanted \$1,500 for each hookup, as opposed to \$500 for a hookup within the village.

P&Z member Sid Goodloe expressed his desire to see a covenant not allowing grazing animals in the subdivision. Chairman Bill Seelbach agreed with Goodloe and told Hall that overgrazing was a problem in terrain management.

Hall reviewed possible covenants—no house under 1,200

square feet, no mobiles less than three years old. Hall plans to construct a mobile park within the subdivision.

P&Z approved the request from Hall Development to begin on the next phase toward final approval.

The commission put the Hall brothers on the agenda for next month.

County manager Suzanne Cox reported to the commission about a state House of Representatives bill proposing changes in the present state subdivision regulations.

Cox recently presented a copy of the bill to P&Z for review and recommendations.

She told P&Z that all the suggestions members made were to be accepted as part of the bill.

Seelbach felt the experience the Lincoln County P&Z has gained over the years of trial and error will benefit other rural counties that have not dealt with development in the past.

In other business, P&Z: —Tabled final review of Eagle Creek Acres Subdivision, because of questionable access into the subdivision. Field review was planned.

—Discussed possible master planning and zoning plan for Lincoln County and the topic for the next meeting: off-road vehicular damage.

P&Z members present were Modesto Chavez, Bill Seelbach, Mack Bell, LaMoyné Peters, Sid Goodloe and Betty Schreengost.

Mayor says CSB closure won't hurt

Mayor David Cummins of Capitan said he felt the proposed closure of Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) would not hurt the village or his family business.

According to Cummins, few CSB employees live and shop in Capitan. He said some commute from Alamogordo and many from Carrizozo.

Cummins stated that some of the workers shop for a few items in his family's grocery in Capitan, but he did not feel the closure would be much of a loss.

Closure of Fort Stanton would affect the community greatly. Cum-

mins noted.

CSB has been a source of concern in past years. Stricter criteria for minimum-security inmates resulted from public meetings held by the Corrections Department to gather public opinion.

CSB has long been a source of workers for qualified employers, and presently is involved in a furniture industry.

The woodshop at CSB is considered by the Corrections Department to be a design shop, with the furniture project now being extended to the central prison in Santa Fe.

Corrections will open an advanced furniture manufacturing plant at the Penitentiary of New Mexico near the capital city.



Murder investigation at standstill

Things are at a standstill for the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department in the investigation of the McKnight murders.

Ranchers Cotton and Judy McKnight were murdered in their home near Picacho in November 1984. An intensive investigation has been pursued by the Sheriff's Office since that day.

Handguns recovered from friends of the murdered couple were sent to the Texas Department of Public Service ballistics laboratory soon after the murders. No results have been received from those tests.

Laser fingerprints retrieved from the murder scene were hand-carried to the Federal Bureau of Investigation

(FBI) Washington, D.C., laboratory in January.

"I've paced a trench in this floor—we haven't heard beans from those boys (FBI)," said Charlie Cox of the Sheriff's Office.

"When you deal with the federal government it's a long slow process."

Cox explained that it has been six weeks since a deputy flew to Washington with the laser prints.

"It ordinarily takes from six to eight weeks," he said. "I guess I just fooled myself, when we hand-carried that stuff down there I thought it might expedite things."

Cox said he was on hold until the test results are back.

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
Editorial

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—It's been an ugly time in Santa Fe—some parts of it as ugly as the Ku Klux Klan.

It doesn't take a sharp eye—or ear—to discern the strong strain of ethnic feeling running through the battles that have gone on here.

Politicians aren't supposed to notice things like that, or if they do, they are not expected to mention them out loud. Do so, and you get accused of "raising the ethnic issue."

The objection to that, it seems, is that you have said publicly what some people want said only privately. In other words, it's not the fact people are disturbed by; it's that you want to discuss it in front of God and everybody.

But raising that issue may be just what it needs. What appears to have happened in our nation in recent years is not the great social revolution some thought they saw. Instead, our prejudices and antagonisms against those who are different from ourselves are simply no longer discussed as openly as they once were. As a result, they get buried deeper and become more ingrained. Maybe, it helps to bring them to the surface and shine a little light on them, unpleasant as they may be to contemplate.

There are certain facts about the legislative-gubernatorial wars that are too obvious to miss, even if the dirty little remarks did not constantly remind you of them.

The coalition that controls each vote in the Senate with an iron hand includes none of that body's members who are of Hispanic extraction (though one or two members, like Francisco Gonzalez, may vote with the coalition now and then for selfish purposes).

The Cowboy Coalition that runs the House has exactly three members whose last names are Hispanic. Two of them are women who apparently got their names with their marriage papers, and the third is Bobby Aragon, who has his own reasons for joining those who may not be absolutely sincere in the welcome they give him.

Many who read these lines will say that's the way things should be. They thought those Mama Lucys who once controlled the House (a group of mostly Hispanic hotshots, who became friends at Highlands University, that bastion of Northern New Mexico culture) needed to get their comeuppance. They rejoice to see the remaining members of that little band brought low.

That attitude's okay if you are talking about the people as people. What's bad is to dislike and oppose them because of their family's extraction—and there's a lot of that going around this year. Believe a columnist who prides himself on the fact that he has never lied to you.

This space, for instance, has been used to pound Toney Anaya about as hard as anyone has ever pounded him. But he knows, and the writer knows, that not one of those words has been written because of his nationality (as we once used to call it).

How do we know that isn't true of others who oppose him? They will assure us it is not so.

Examine their actions to see whom they fight most vigorously. If virtual-

ly all those they are against are Hispanic, or representatives of largely Hispanic groups (like those who have been frozen out in our Senate and House), that tells you something. Above all, listen to their off-duty jokes and find out what amuses them. That will tell you even more about what they are like inside.

All bigots, of course, deny that they are bigots. Probably they couldn't live with themselves if they didn't. It is therefore inevitable that they will assure you what has been said here is so much poppycock. They love all mankind.

But hold to that line from Scriptures that says, "By their fruits you shall know them."

One fruit of a strain of disguised but virulent emotion that seems to distort the thinking of some who have been elected to office could be the very kind of chaos that has overtaken our government in recent days.

Anyone watching things here who is truly honest must observe an unusual depth of hatred that cannot be accounted for on purely political grounds.

Short Shrift
Dr. Steven Owens had a good point at this week's city commission meeting—Why won't the city let non-motorized boats on Bonito Lake.

He is a fisherman and wanted more extensive activity that boating out in the lake could offer.

Before he came to the commission, he did his homework, talking to Don Briner of the city Water Treatment Plant, and the Environmental Improvement Division.

No one could see any problems if the boats had no gas-burning motors as Bonito Lake is an integral part of the city's water system.

Dr. Owens came seeking answers—and left with none, and in all likelihood, a bad taste in his mouth.

Commissioners referred him to staff—exiling the request to figurative municipal "Siberia."

The handling of Dr. Owens' request is not unique.

Requests not popular among commissioners or staff get sent into space and never returned. For example, from time to time, Commissioner Guy Gallaway remembers requests he's made that have never been answered.

Requests come from people—and people deserve answers and positive handling of requests—even if eventually, the plan may not go through.

Citizens deserve better than to leave wondering "what in the world happened to them."

An Open Legislature
Rep. Max Coll, D-Santa Fe, is championing an idea whose time has come: extending the Open Meetings Act to cover the Legislature.

For too long there has been a sense of the old parental "do as I say, not as I do" in the Legislature's attitude on open meetings.

Requirements for government in the sunshine were prescribed for virtually all governmental bodies except the Legislature. With its flaws and loopholes, the Open Meetings Act has helped to make the workings of government more accessible to the average citizen.

Opponents of extending it to cover the Legislature argue that that august body hasn't abused its immunity, that most legislative business is done in open sessions anyway. Their observations are accurate.

But they could just as easily be arguments in favor of ending the legislative exemption. Since the immunity isn't that much used, it would not be that much missed. And the self-imposition of the rule of openness

would send an unmistakable signal to the people that the substance of their government is being done in the hearing rooms and on the legislative floors—not in the smoke-filled back rooms of another era.





Why has Australia produced such a large number of fine films and fine film makers? During the last few years, filmgoers have been treated to an Australian film invasion, which has produced films such as "The Last Wave," "Gallipoli" and "The Year of Living Dangerously." Now comes the first American film by the director of the aforementioned three "Witness" by Peter Weir. And with this film, Weir sets his mark as one of the best directors working in any country.

The evidence is visible in almost every frame of "Witness." The story is essentially a crime-and-cops tale, with much of the action taking place in an Amish community. What sets this film apart from most is that Weir has filled the screen with emotion, passion and sentiment. Yet every response he elicits from the proceedings is drawn with such an easy-handed grace and style it seems as though he were letting us discover this tale naturally and not creating it artificially. In an era of sledgehammer manipulation, Weir's direction is a breath of fresh air.

The Amish people are a religious group who don't believe in the modern conveniences. They still till the land with animals and lots of hard work. When a young widow and her son set out to visit a cousin, the boy accidentally witnesses a murder. To divulge more than that would be to give away the entire plot of the film.

But it's the atmosphere that's important here. Two lifestyles clash in a mixture of old and new. As the police detective in charge of the case, Harrison Ford is the veteran cop, wisecracking at the scene of a murder with the jocular of a Han Solo. From the Amish mother, played superbly by relative newcomer Kelly McGillis, Ford learns that there is life of a different sort beyond the streets of Philadelphia. Opposites soon attract.

From a feeble twig of a plot, director Weir has cultivated a moving, captivating, nearly seamless story that is eminently satisfying on its own, and gives rise to hopes for even better films when the stories match Weir's prodigious talents.

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

Video nightclubs

Videos in nightclubs started out as a novelty. They were used to fill in the time between live bands. But now it's almost a necessity for any new club to have some kind of video system. Some new clubs offer nothing but videos, like New York's Private Eyes, while most offer it as part of their entertainment mix.

The two basic things to look for in a video club are the layout and the programming. How well can you see the screens and/or monitors? Can they be seen from everywhere? Does the color and contrast look professional? Are the blacks and whites muddy?

These questions are easy to answer, but the programming is much more subjective. Unfortunately, many clubs have more interest in buying expensive equipment than in carefully planning their music and videos. A good video presentation should not be erratic; it should flow smoothly. You should be more entertained than if you were home watching TV.



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



TV Nostalgia

Has there ever been a more bizarre bunch of cab-drivers gathered under one roof than the zany crew seen on "Taxi," the popular late-'70s sitcom?

Alex Rieger (Judd Hirsch, l.) was the only full-time driver and was perhaps the most normal of the bunch. On the opposite side of the spectrum was "Reverend" Jim Ignatowski (Christopher Lloyd, r.), a wacky and wired former hippie.

In between these two extremes were such oddballs as Latka Gravas (Andy Kaufman), the mechanic who spoke a bizarre language that was a cross between Serbian and Venutian; Louie DePalma (Danny DeVito), the frazzled, pint-sized dispatcher; Tony Banta (Tony Danza), a two-bit boxer; and Elaine Nardo (Marilyn Henner), an art-gallery receptionist.



What becomes a classic most

In addition to a \$90,000 check, the golfer who wins the Honda Classic is presented with a Honda. That makes sense. The winner of the Isuzu/Andy Williams San Diego Open gets an Isuzu. And while it is not known if the lady who wins the Nabisco/Dinah Shore Invitational receives a year's supply of Nilla Wafers, one thing is certain: Sponsors of golfing events televised by NBC are obligated to hand over the prizes. The fourth and final round of the Honda Classic airs Sunday, March 3 live from the Tournament Players Club at Eagle Trace, in Coral Springs, Fla.

Last year's Classic featured Bruce Lietzke defeating Andy Bean on the first hole of a sudden-death playoff. Whether posterity recalls Lietzke's victory as "classic," or whether we now consider Honda a maker of "classic" cars, is all irrelevant; that Honda sponsors a tournament whose suffix is "classic" simply says there is an astute marketing division behind it.

In 1983, the first weekend in March was reserved on the PGA Tour calendar for a tournament at the Inverrary Golf and Country Club, in Lauderdale, Fla. It

was called, for the second and last time, the Honda/Inverrary Classic. Before that it had been known as the Jackie Gleason/Inverrary Classic. From Gleason to Inverrary to Honda: The road a classic must hoe is not always onomatopoeically scenic.

Like all TPC courses now built, the 4-year-old, sparsely treed and constantly windy Eagle Trace is a "stadium course." "The tiered amphitheaters and spectator mounds are intended to put the spectator following the course in the forefront," says PGA media official Ric Carlson.

Yet another example of sports making itself more tube-translatable?

"It's not golf's answer by design," says Carlson, "although it could turn out that way. When TV zooms in on the 18th hole and there are 20,000 fans surrounding the green, the viewing experience is naturally enhanced."

The throng's unimpeded view of the final putts and the award ceremony spell doom for the poor guy who sold those periscopes—you used to see bobbing around the elevated greens. His was an idea whose time has come and gone: Not the definition of a classic.

'MacLaine' disappointing

Shirley MacLaine takes her Broadway show to cable this week as she sings, dances and acts her way through an hour and a half special. "Shirley MacLaine," airing March 5 on Showtime, is a tad disappointing. The first half of the show is slower and less dynamic than Miss MacLaine usually delivers. There is too much singing and not enough dancing. But the pace picks up later as Miss MacLaine and her dancers kick up their heels in a number that salutes the diverse styles of different choreographers she has worked with.

She also shines in excerpts of some of her dramatic roles. Segments from "The Turning Point" and "Terms of Endearment" — bring depth and substance to this performer.

"Splash," airing on cable in March, is everything a successful, light-hearted film should be. This entertaining movie has personable characters and a funny plot. It airs on HBO March 3 and 10, Showtime March 3 and 8, Cinemax March 8 and The Movie Channel March 9.

Daryl Hannah and Tom Hanks star in a story about a beautiful mermaid who comes to New York City seeking the man she loves. The couple actually

fell for each other 20 years earlier when he accidentally went overboard and saw her in her natural environment. How the mermaid keeps her secret and learns to adapt to the city is a great tale. It helps that her tail turns into legs when she is on dry land.

Hanks is excellent in light comedy and is one of the reasons the movie is so good. Miss Hannah proves herself to be more than a mere beauty — she's a great comic actress. John Candy also stars.
