Humane Society reorganizing here

The Lincoln County Humane Society will have a reorganizational meeting at 8:30 p.m. Thursday, March 7, at the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce building on Sudderth. "The major goal of any humane society would be the humane treatment of animals, and there is a strong need for that in Lincoln County," said Cyndy Livingston.

"Lincoln County is overflowing with homeless animals and animals that could be adopted. Our major goal will be to get the doors open on a facility for homeless animals.

"Every animal put up for adoption will be spayed or neutered," Livingston said. She noted that animal control and protection is another area of concern for humane societies.

Former members and new members are needed to reactivate the society, according to Livingston. She and Ellie Geiger are coordinating the reorganization.

Area veterinarians have indicated a need for a humane society.

Livingston said she was not sure what is happening to homeless or neglected animals right now. She speculated that they are being picked up by animal control or taken to other area humane societies.

Legislature

Requests: \$900 million

Available: \$60 million

The \$1.1 million Ruidoso-Lincoln County direct appropriation requests from the New Mexico Legislature were tabled Thursday without prejudice in the House Appropriations Committee.

Representative Ben Hall reported that the move came as a result of committee members' wishes to consider all bills before the committee prior to making any decisions.

The legislator said the committee has about \$900 million in requests but only about \$60 million to spend, so members must weigh their decisions carefully.

Hall noted that when asked by the committee whether cuts in the requests could be made, he indicated the items in the bills are prioritized.

The Ruidoso request seeks \$583,500 for flood-related bridge replacement and drainage repairs in Ruidoso. The county request asks for \$525,000 for the funding of repairs and improvements to Gavilan Canyon and Carrizo Canyon roads.

Twins of the bills on the Senate side are Senate bills 296 and 297. The bills passed the Senate Conservation Committee Saturday, February 24, and are expected to appear before the Senate Finance Committee soon.

Also tabled was Hall-sponsored House Bill 503. The bill proposes that counties be given the option to levy a three cents per gallon gasoline tax.

Bill 503 was tabled without prejudice in the Taxation and Revenue

committee Thursday.

Two-thirds of the money raised by the tax would go to counties, and the remaining one-third would go to municipalities. Funds raised by the tax are to go to road repairs and other services.

The first of Hall's bills to pass on the floor of the House of Representatives won a House vote Friday by 58-2. House Bill 374 provides for a four-year extension of the Information Systems Council, a body that currently oversees the purchase of all computer software or hardware for the state.

Hall enjoyed another success late last week with the passage, with a due pass recommendation, of the "Wildlife Damage Act," House Bill 503, through the Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

The bill proposes to establish a fund to reimburse farmers and ranchers for damage to their property caused by wild animals. The bill requires no direct appropriation to the Game and Fish Department. Rather, it builds the fund from any monies raised during 1985 that are greater than 102 percent of the monies raised during 1984 from the sale of hunting licenses.

A Hall-sponsored bill to amend certain portions of the Subdivision Act was not heard by the Energy and Natural Resources Committee as expected Friday, Hall reported.

The bill proposes to make changes in the Subdivision Act that will clear up some of the problems faced by county assessors. It may help curb illegal subdivisions, Hall believes.

House Bill 511 clarified

Ruidoso officials traveled to Santa Fe Friday to participate in state Municipal League discussions of House of Representatives Bill 511 and to attend a Taxation and Revenue Committee hearing on the bill.

Ruidoso village councillors Ray Dean Carpenter and Rick Evans and assistant village manager Frank Potter attended the meetings.

Friday morning, Ruidoso, Questa, Santa Fe and Rio Rancho officials were given a line-by-line explanation of House Bill 511 by Municipal League director Bill Fulginiti. The director clarified the position of his organization, saying its first preference was to leave the tax system as it is. Backup position of the league, according to Fulginiti, is to support passage of House Bill 511 over House Bill 27.

House Bill 511 is a complex measure that proposes to give the state a greater share and municipalities a lesser share of gross receipts tax revenue. In exchange, municipalities would share in state income tax revenue.

The bill also proposes to allow local governments to raise property taxes.

House Bill 27 proposes to give the state a greater share of gross receipts taxes in exchange for allowing local governments property tax increase authority. Bill 27 has attracted wide criticism and is considered dead.

Fulginiti reported that the reason the state is seeking a restructuring of the tax system is existing and expected declines in revenue from extractive industries. He indicated that because mining of copper, potash and oil is slowing down, the state must seek an alternate revenue source.

Notable among Fulginiti's comments to the assemblage of municipal leaders was his belief that the bill's income tax "Save Harmless" provision has no time limitation.

The provision provides a payment from the state to local governments that experience less revenue from 59 percent of the net income taxes collected locally than they had experienced from a remittance of .35 percent per dollar of sales of gross receipts taxes collected. Under 511,

the state proposes to make such a trade in taxes.

It has been reported that the provision has a five-year time limitation. Fulginiti also cleared misconceptions about a credit to be returned by the state.

It was believed locally that the credit of .625 percent of gross receipts tax per dollar of sales would result in a loss of that amount of revenue by local governments. Fulginiti explained that the credit is simply a "book-keeping transaction."

"It's a wash for you," he said of the credit. He noted that it is added, then subtracted in the figuring of taxes under the bill's provisions. This results in no change, in itself, of the framework of the bill.

The director said the state stands to gain nothing immediately from the bill. It does set in place the mechanism to take over—in five years—half of the one-half percent (per dollar of sales) of the special gross receipts tax for infrastructure allowed through local elections. The other half of that tax will become regular municipal gross receipts tax at that time.

"This is not a bad deal, actually," he said of the bill.

Rio Rancho mayor Dave Bruning described the bill differently.

"It's kind of like watching your mother-in-law driving your new Cadillac over a cliff," he said of the measure.

"I'm more comfortable with it now that it has been explained," Ruidoso's Councillor Carpenter said at the meeting.

Later Friday, the bill had its first hearing before the House Taxation and Revenue Committee. Discussion there, however, was uneventful, with the committee taking no official action on the bill.

According to a published report, Taxation and Revenue chairman Jim Otts said the purpose of the Friday hearing was "to get a consensus of which way we should go with this bill."

Most comments during the hearing of the bill were negative, and it appears the bill has a long way to go before enough changes are made to satisfy all concerned.

Foundation seeks funds

"We're trying to identify what level of philanthropy exists in the community," said Ken Moore recently.

Moore, administrator of Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH), is working closely with the RHVH Foundation in efforts to raise funds for a new hospital for Lincoln County.

A. N. and Jackie Spencer, through the Hugh Bancroft Jr. Foundation, made a generous gift to the foundation in December. Spencer said he hoped the gift would generate more donations for the new facility.

"The mark of any great community is that you have people such as the Spencers that support the needs of the area," said Jack Foster, vice-president of the foundation board.

Foster reported that the foundation will raise all it can toward the new building, and then go to the voters. According to Foster, the foundation is firmly committed to building a new hospital.

"We'd like to encourage people to join the foundation," Moore said. Some innovative and practical programs will be offered for members.

One possible benefit that may be offered to members is a credit card system to simplify and streamline hospital admittance.

Moore said he welcomed questions about the hospital and the foundation. He encourages anyone with a question to call foundation secretary Joanie Coakley at 257-7381, extension 251.

She will forward the question to Moore or a foundation member.

Moore said the final decision on a new RHVH facility lies with the voters. That is why he and foundation members want citizens to have all the available information on hospital plans.

"We'll go on doing the best job we can," Moore said—whether in a new facility or in the present building.

Meanwhile, after the financial woes of late 1984, Moore said the hospital was back in a positive position in January.

"The layoffs did help us financially," he said. "We're going to keep the purse strings tight."

Moore said he had been able to retrain several staff members who were laid off, and those individuals were rehired in other areas of the hospital.

The administrator said a urologist will soon join the hospital staff. Mike Berte has been recruited to practice his specialty at RHVH.

Berte is finishing his residency program at Case Western Reserve in Cleveland, Ohio. He and his wife, Jo Ann, will arrive in Ruidoso in July.

"We feel really good about Berte, he and Jo Ann are going to fit in really well," Moore said.

Moore also confirmed that a pediatrics group out of Roswell had requested staff privileges at RHVH. They will be spending two days a week in the village, rather than just one day.

Another current project for Moore is comparing costs of RHVH health care with costs at other hospitals. So far, he said, he finds RHVH to be in line with other medical facilities.

Here's the famous cheesecake recipe:



PREHEAT CHEESECAKE

1 1/2 pounds cream cheese
1 cup dark brown sugar
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
3 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon dark rum
1/3 cup chopped pecans

SOUR CREAM TOPPING

1 pound sour cream
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

NUT CRUST

1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup graham cracker crumbs
3/4 stick melted margarine
1/4 cup sugar

Preheat oven to 350°.
In a large mixing bowl, beat together the cream cheese, sugar and flour until smooth. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each. Add the vanilla, rum and pecans and blend in. Pour the mixture into the prepared crust and bake for 50 minutes. Open the oven door and allow the cake to cool to room temperature. Chill.

Preheat oven to 450°.
Gently stir together the sour cream, sugar and vanilla. Spread the mixture over the top of a warm cheesecake and bake for five to seven minutes, or until set.

Preheat oven to 350°.
Place crumbs in mixing bowl, add margarine and sugar and blend well. Press crumb mixture onto the bottom and partly up the sides of a greased nine-inch springform mold. Smooth along bottom to an even thickness. Bake for 10 minutes. Cool before filling.

Warrior girls, boys beat Cobre

A clutch-shooting senior girl and a pair of aggressive sophomore boys provided the heroics Saturday night as the Ruidoso High School Warriors took back-to-back girls and boys varsity basketball wins over visiting Cobre.

Gia Rose made just three free throws as the Warriors had a very cold night from the charity line—hitting four of 22 attempts. But she made those three count, icing a 32-27 victory in the final seconds.

In the boys game, Carl Lueras sparked the Warriors after Brian Davis fouled out as the third quarter ended. The Warriors, who had trailed for most of the game, rallied in the fourth quarter and wound up on top 57-46.

Girls coach Sergio Castanon called his team's win, "Probably the best game of the year." He said he felt going in that the key would be his players' "emotional buildup."

"And they did (build up)," he said. "They came ready to play."

Castanon credited his players with excellent defense—individually and as a team.

"They shut down all of Cobre's offense," he pointed out. The Indians had beaten the Warriors 76-39 two weeks before.

The Warriors raced to a 12-6 lead in the first quarter. A deliberate slowdown in the second quarter resulted in Ruidoso adding just two points to its total. The home team led 14-10 at the half.

"We were very emotional—we were getting tired," Castanon explained the slowdown.

Cobre caught up to the Warriors and tied the score at 17 at the end of the third quarter. But the Warriors then ran off eight unanswered points, and held on.

The Indians rallied and had a chance to tie at 29 in the final minutes. But Rose stole the ball and was fouled. She sank the first of two free-throw attempts to put Ruidoso up 30-27.

She missed the second and Cobre took possession. A traveling call against the Indians gave the Warriors the ball, however, and Rose again was fouled.

This time she sank both attempts for the final 32-27 margin.

Castanon thinks his team is ready going into the district tourney.

"It seems like they're peaking at the correct time," he said. The coach gave credit to the Warrior fans Saturday.

"The crowd seemed to get into it—that sure did help us."

Diane McClure led the Warriors with 12 points. Katherine Sanchez and Krystal Enjady each had six. Rose had five, and Stacy Ivy rounded out the scoring with three points.

The Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team finished fourth in District 3-A and will play Cobre at Cobre at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the opening game of the district tournament.

If the Warriors win, they will play Friday against the winner of the Truth or Consequences-Deming game. If Deming is the opponent, the game will be in Ruidoso.

The Warrior boys conclude the regular season with a game at Silver City Friday. Their district tourney is next week.

THE WARRIOR BOYS played Cobre close in the first half but were unable to pull ahead. The Indians led 10-9 at the first-quarter break.

Employing a full-court press, the visitors prevented the Warrior offense from developing any momentum. Cobre ran off six points from 17-all to lead 23-17.

As the final seconds of the half ticked away, the Indians led 27-21 and had the ball. They failed to get off a shot, however, so the Warriors were looking at a six-point halftime deficit.

Ruidoso went to a press in the second half, but the offense continued to have trouble putting the ball through the hoop. Cobre increased its lead to nine points—37-28.

Then Davis came alive. His consecutive steals helped the Warriors pull back to within six at 37-31. But he also picked up a fourth personal foul during the rally.

Number five came just as the quarter ended, after Davis converted a steal into a layup that brought the Warriors to within four at 39-35.

Though it appeared the loss of Davis might deflate the Ruidoso surge, the Warriors kept their momentum. A Lueras layup closed the gap to 39-37, and moments later Lueras converted an offensive rebound to a bucket that put the Warriors up 42-41.

Cobre tied at 42, but back-to-back jump shots by Patric Pearson from the top of the key put the Warriors ahead 46-42.

That was to be all the margin Ruidoso needed. Russell Easter scored on a free throw, a follow-up on a missed free throw, and a charity toss on a technical foul. Score: 50-44 Warriors.

The final two minutes saw a succession of fouls by Cobre, and the Warriors were able to convert enough free throws to achieve the final 57-46 margin.

Lueras and Davis wound up with 11 points each. Jeff Willingham had five, as did Pearson and Kirk Ryan. Justin Smith, Trent Tolbert and Dion Lopez each had three points.

The Warriors are now 4-17 on the season.

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

Heavyweight Phillip Herrera came closest in the final four in his class (heavyweight), winning two matches.


Also winning matches were Zach Swalander in the 135-pound class, James Herrera at 165 pounds and Kevin Jameson at 185 pounds.

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Bankers optimistic about Ruidoso economy

Although they have varying viewpoints and different opinions, the heads of the five Ruidoso financial institutions seem to have a general consensus. Despite a drop in gross receipts, Ruidoso's long-term economic future is a bright one.

To compile the statistics and bankers' opinions, The News recently interviewed Richard "Buz" Browning, president of Ruidoso State Bank; Ralph Petty, president of Bank of Ruidoso; Jim Atwood, president of Moncor Bank; Grant Gist, manager and vice president at Pioneer Savings and Loan; and Richard Parsons Jr., manager of First Federal Savings and Loan.

During the interviews, the officers reviewed deposit amounts for the past three years, and discussed the trends and outlook of the economy of Ruidoso.

Ruidoso experienced a big growth spurt in the late 1970s and early 1980s. The decline of economic action over the past year has sparked pessimism and even rumors of depression.

"When you look at the market as a whole, the negativism isn't warranted," said Petty.


Ruidoso fared well even when the rest of the country faced serious economic problems. "We've been isolated from the 'real world' in Ruidoso," said Browning.

"We're not in a slump, we're more like the rest of the country now," Petty said.

Petty, the most optimistic of the group, said he felt that Ruidoso would continue to fare better than the rest of the country. The nationwide growth rate is 4.9 percent. "I'll bet Ruidoso will show a 20 to 25 percent growth," Petty said.

Petty, Gist, Atwood and Browning noted that Ruidoso's economy is largely dependent

"I would hope that 1986 is a year that would shine brightly," said Browning. However, Browning said he felt that some type of external factor—such as the new airport, highway improvement or expansion of the racetrack or ski area—was necessary for growth.

"Unless we improve what we offer, the best we could hope for is a zero percent growth," said Browning. Because retail sales dropped 20 percent last year, the zero percent figure would represent a 20 percent increase, he noted.

Browning said he felt the long-term outlook for Ruidoso was excellent.

Most of the banks reported a healthy growth in loans as well as a growth in deposits. Parsons said interest rates seem to be holding steady at a stable rate.

Deposit growth is shown in the accompanying graph. (Note that the graph is for the local branches of the statewide institutions. For example, First Federal's total assets total \$125 million, of which Ruidoso deposits are \$7.3 million.)

All of the bankers interviewed projected a healthy long-term growth for Ruidoso. Petty cited the coming of such stores as Wal-Mart as an indication of expansion.

Many of the banks themselves have undergone recent expansion. Pioneer built a new headquarters on Mechem Drive because additional space was needed.

Gist said recent deregulation laws have allowed savings and loan institutions to offer more services—such as checking accounts—and Pioneer needed more space to accommodate customers and employees.

The newest bank, Moncor, came to Ruidoso in 1982 because the company's marketing research indicated that Ruidoso had a growing economy.

Bank of Ruidoso recently completed

on the condition of the West Texas oil, gas and agricultural business.

In the years from 1979 to 1982, the oil economy in West Texas saw a big boom, which ended on January 1, 1982.

"It was like someone turned the lights off in West Texas," said Browning.

Browning said oil prices started a tremendous decline on that January day. Drilling activity was cut in half, from more than 400 rigs to 200.

"The West Texas economy didn't slow down, it stopped," said Browning.

Ruidoso consequently felt the effects of the oil crash. West Texas visitors make up a major market for Ruidoso. During the past two years, West Texans have had less money to spend on vacations and second homes. Thus, Ruidoso did not see its usual influx of West Texan dollars.

Petty said oil prices are starting to stabilize and recover.

"I think we'll see more people here (this summer) than last summer," he said.

The depressed agricultural economy of Eastern New Mexico and West Texas also

impacted Ruidoso. Petty said he felt that with the proposed aid bills now in the United States Congress, the agricultural economy might start to pick up.

Another factor that contributed to Ruidoso's recent slowdown was the devaluation of the Mexican peso.

With the decline in value of the peso, Ruidoso saw a decline in Mexican tourists. Now, "the Mexican nationals (citizens) are getting a grasp on the problem," said Browning.

Petty made a similar observation. He said there was a period of time when Mexican visitors bought homes here. When their peso became devaluated, they no longer were able to come here to vacation.

Petty said he felt the Mexican economy was on a gradual upswing. He believes this was illustrated by the influx of tourists during the past Christmas season.

Another contributing factor in Ruidoso's economic slowdown was the oversaturation of the real estate market.

"In 1980 through 1982, you had people waiting in line for condos," said Petty. The

rapid growth in building led to an oversupply. The supply changed in an opposite direction to the demand.

Gist said that not many new homes are being built right now, but there has been more action in purchasing of existing homes. Gist feels that more of these sales have been permanent residences.

Browning reported a large decline in the construction of speculative houses. He said no more than two speculative homes were on the books in the bank's real estate portfolio right now. Last year, that number was closer to 35 or 40, he said.

Browning expressed concern with the decline. To go from 40 to two units could imply that construction and related-industry workers are not making money to spend in Ruidoso.

Most of the bankers acknowledged that due to the general economy, people are conservative about spending money.

"People are hanging on to their money, waiting to spend it more carefully," said

Parsons. "They'll use it to a better advantage than before."

Parsons said he felt this caution could account for the rise of savings deposits. He and the other bankers said Ruidoso's future economic growth will be more consistent than it has been in the past.

"The peaks and valleys will level out," said Petty.

"The steady growth will be a stronger one than the rapid ascent in the past," said Parsons.

Petty thinks Ruidoso is in the midst of a stability period and will be back on a level by the middle of 1985.

Gist projected that the summer of 1986 would be the turnaround, and that Ruidoso would be back up to a full market in 1987.

He said the housing oversupply should be down by that time. He also cited completion of the planned four-lane Highway 70 from Roswell to Las Cruces and proposed new airport as factors that could contribute to Ruidoso's growth.

remodeling and expanding its main office on Sudderth Drive. The bank plans to open a branch in the new Ruidoso Financial Center when it is completed.

Bank of Ruidoso is technically a new bank, although it had been here since 1970 as Security Bank. In 1984, Petty and two associates formed a holding company and purchased the bank.

"It is our intent for (the bank) to remain a locally owned, independent bank," said Petty.

Ruidoso State Bank will soon expand to Las Cruces and open the Bank of the Rio Grande. Browning said the bank had excess capital base and chose to diversify in Las Cruces.

The banking industry is alive and well in Ruidoso. The present level of activity is at a good, constant pace, said Browning.

"Without any question, the board and management of the bank feels strongly about the long-term prospects (for Ruidoso)," said Browning.

"Ruidoso has nowhere to go but up," concluded Gist.

Cox manages Lincoln County with 'open door' policy

"An open door" describes Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox and her attitude toward her job.

The first woman manager for Lincoln County, Cox has worked for the county since September 1982.

A native New Mexican, Cox worked previously for county government in Sierra County, which includes Truth or Consequences. There she familiarized herself with county government problems, mainly roads and taxes.

When Lincoln County commissioners Ben Hall, Cotton McKnight and John Rightower selected her from 19 applicants, Cox thought the job would be similar.

As administrative assistant to the Board of Commissioners, the manager acts as personnel officer, fiscal director, budget officer and planning officer.

Cox's office is responsible for all purchasing, payment of accounts, budget preparation, preparation of the county commissioners' agenda and coordination of efforts for the commissioners and other elected officials.

As Lincoln County manager, she also helps organize land use planning with the Planning and Zoning commission. She also is involved with ambulance service and the Carrizozo health clinic and sponsorship of the senior citizens program.

She has helped appropriate funds for a secretary for the soil and water conservation district. All of these services, she pointed out, are necessary services utilized by Lincoln County residents.

Cox supports the federal government's effort to return to local control.


"I began to realize that if we want local control, we had better be ready to accept this responsibility," Cox stated.

She appreciates the convenience of conducting business on a local level, compared to dealing with agencies in Washington or Santa Fe.

Cox stated that only seven percent of the Lincoln County budget is from federal funds.

The third-fastest-growing county in New Mexico, Lincoln County is faced with maintaining 1,499.9 miles of county road.

Many of these roads, maintained mainly with funds from motor vehicle fees paid by Lincoln County

residents, are used heavily by tourists year round. The county is hoping to find other funds to augment those from vehicle registrations.

A proposal now under consideration is an increase in gasoline taxes.

The county Road Department has all roads and related work filed on the county computer.

Cox also has directed the computer filing of information from the offices of the clerk, treasurer, assessor and manager.

The use of IBM computers has allowed Cox to have instant information concerning all county functions.

"It freed all the county employees to do a better job," Cox commented. The IBM System 34 was programmed by Triadic, Incorporated, from Deming.

Cox said the company was sensitive to county needs because of its past experience in county government.

The Lincoln County budget stands at \$3,699,253 for fiscal year 1985. Cox is responsible for managing that money.

Cox's first experience in county government was in the Sierra County treasurer's office. She could see how difficult it was for some citizens to pay property taxes, and she keeps

those people in mind now when preparing budgets or planning some service.

"The money we spend is theirs and I serve them. Care must be taken so we do not mispend or overspend," Cox stated.

Cox does not oversee the Road Department, but does get a lot of the complaints.

"Most of the complaints to my office are for roads," she said. Cox can only make suggestions on roads, but she will take complaints.

Cox feels Lincoln County has a very active group in Planning and Zoning. She was honored that the group's recent recommendations to the state Subdivision Regulation Committee were approved.

Suzanne Cox has been interested in government since junior high school. At that time she never dreamed she would end up involved so deeply.

Of her six children, the youngest has shown interest in politics, she said.

"Most people don't realize how important county government is," Cox summed up.

With her wholehearted support of local government, Cox spends most of her day taking care of the public by keeping her door open at all times.

CSB to be prototype

The Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) woodshop is scheduled to become a pattern and prototype shop for the Correctional Industries (CI) furniture manufacturing project. CI director Jim Mickelson reported this development in a phone interview last week.

Correctional Industries is in the process of expanding the furniture manufacturing program. The main prison, near Santa Fe, will house a rough-mill complex and will be responsible for cutting lumber for furniture assembly at the Central New Mexico Correctional Facility in Los Lunas.

CSB will become the design shop for the entire Corrections Industries furniture program.

However, the woodshop at CSB is presently idle. CI is in the process of changing the line of furniture. CSB will become the research and development center, Mickelson stated.

The woodshop at CSB is small, with small machinery, unlike the commercial-size machinery to be used in the other prisons. As research and design center, the CSB woodshop will create designs adaptable to the bigger shops. Adjustments to expensive machinery take a number of days, Mickelson said.

The CSB woodshop is currently without a director. Jim McSwane, who

ran the shop recently, was promoted to the central facility.

CI is currently training all their people involved with the new program. The training period will help the staff make the transition to the new project.

CI has the legal ability to sell the furniture to wholesalers for retail to the public. Mickelson said furniture will not be sold to wholesalers until back orders for the state are filled.

Full furniture production is estimated to take nine months from the opening of the rough mill complex at the penitentiary this month.

Because of the small size of their shop, CSB will make custom design furniture, Mickelson said.

CI, which reported to have been bankrupt seven months ago, revamped its furniture industry. It hopes to employ 950 inmates in all four prison facilities within a year.

CSB warden Bob Marrs said the woodshop program is very popular with the CSB inmates. Inmates employed in the shop receive "good-time" credit, which is applied to their sentences.

The possible closure of CSB will not affect the design shop. Mickelson said the shop will be moved to another facility if CSB is closed.

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
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

Lennon drawing recovered

A rough sketch of Yoko Ono, signed by former Beatle John Lennon, has been recovered by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

A tip to Ruidoso Crime Stoppers led to the discovery of the abstract drawing, which is valued at \$1.4 million. Richard Sandoval of Ruidoso Crime Stoppers said this was possibly the largest dollar-value recovery ever for Crime Stoppers in New Mexico.

The drawing was hanging in the Bonito-area home of Gary and Rhonda Covington when they were arrested in a drug raid. Officers did not confiscate the drawing at that time.

"If you could see it, you'd know why," said Lincoln County Under-sheriff Charlie Cox. "It could be anybody."

"It is signed by John Lennon, though, and that's what makes it valuable."

Yoko Ono was very pleased with the discovery. Ray Gardner of the Sheriff's Office has talked with her several times to confirm details about the drawing.

Evidently Ono and Lennon were between flights at Dallas-Fort Worth Airport in 1980 when the picture was lost or stolen.

The Covingtons did not offer any information as to how they acquired it, said Cox, but they voluntarily relinquished possession. Drug charges are still outstanding against them, but further charges are not expected, according to Cox.

Cox said his office will retain custody of the sketch until it can be returned to Ono.

Ray Duran of the state Crime Stoppers office confirmed that the \$1.4 million is the largest dollar value ever recovered through a Crime Stoppers tip in Lincoln County.



On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



Biased by the response to last week's column on comics, which was excerpted in the Alamogordo Daily News (thank you, Al Stubbs), I have decided to comment on another fixture of newspapers—opinion columns.

Let me qualify what I am going to write. If this were a graduate school research paper, I would read months' worth of columns from each columnist I wanted to critique.

In front of me as I write today, I have just one or two samples from each. It should be noted also that I am not a regular reader of any columnist.

I am a regular "glancer-at" the columns. If a glance attracts my interest, I will read on.

GEORGIE ANNE GEYER was voted a favorite columnist by El Paso Times readers shortly after that paper picked up her column.

Ms. Geyer, I think, deals exclusively with international issues. I suspect she is a diligent student of history, and the historical perspective she writes from gives her commentary a high credibility rating. For example:

"We (the United States) always were driving the Spanish out of one steamy place or another, and we congratulated ourselves that the arrangements we left behind allowed people to be largely free to determine their fates. We were the permissive colonialists."

For the internationalists among us (would that there were more), Geyer is our eyes on the world.

GEORGE WILL wears an asterisk, thanks to the revelation that he was a paid hand of Ronald Reagan in the 1980 campaign. Thus he was victimized by the "appearance of wrongdoing" that was the Waterloo of Burt Lance and the Vietnam of Edwin Meese.

But darned if the guy doesn't write well. Will is an intellectual conservative in a time when that is no longer a contradiction in terms. He is witty; witness:

"The Einstein samples reportedly came from the part of the brain responsible for 'the deepest thinking'—presumably the part we use to ponder the infield-fly rule."

Anyone who is a sports fan can't be all bad, though I must admit that the fact Will was in the owner's box at RFK stadium when the Bears beat the hated Redskins gave me pleasure as I watched on TV.

Asterisks mean less than they used to, though. Roger Maris's is fading with time, and no one even mentioned one when Eric Dickerson broke O.J. Simpson's record.

DAVID S. BRODER, I know, has been around for a while, and the fact that the Times and the Albuquerque Journal both carry him says he commands respect.

I found that I had to work at reading Broder, but the payment was worth the effort. I felt better informed when I finished.

Different columnists have different styles of dealing with complex issues. Broder's style is to tackle the issue head-on, which means the reader has to concentrate.

But he simplifies commendably. He does a workmanlike job of compiling the comments of governors, senators and an economist into a column questioning why it should be any harder to eliminate the federal deficit than it is for the states to live within their means all the time.

Having built his case, Broder concludes by challenging the president. He takes off from a farm state governor's warning that the deficit could cause the rest of the economy to explode the way agriculture has.

"If a freshman governor in Bismarck can figure that out, why can't the president?" the columnist asks. "Maybe because the governor has no 'glide path' (of gradually declining deficits) to a mythical 'soft landing' available to him."

I must make-it a point to read Mr. Broder more often.

JAMES J. KILPATRICK is another columnist you can read in both the Times and the Journal. Kilpatrick, like Will, is a conservative enjoying his day in the sun of the Reagan reign. I believe that Kilpatrick comes across in his writing as the more "human" of the two. He did a sensitive piece last week on a visit to Governor George Wallace in Montgomery, Alabama.

Kilpatrick, I know from his reputation, is a man who cares deeply about the English language. Anyone who writes or edits for a living must sooner or later come to share in this concern for words and their correct use, if he is worth his salt.

I will let Mr. Kilpatrick's writing speak for itself:

"And in a minute, there he is, George Corley Wallace, 65, governor of Alabama, looking as he has looked for so many years, like Edward G. Robinson playing the role of an old club fighter. When we first met, 17 years ago, he had a head of glossy black hair; the hair is mouse brown now. Then he moved with the restless grace of a welterweight contender; now he sits immobile in his wheelchair. He wears a hearing aid in his right ear."

Well, darn it, I have come to the end of my allotted space after covering just four columnists. That means I will have to resume this treatise at some future date, perhaps next week.

You see, it is not enough to write as well as you can. The biggest obstacle a columnist faces, in my experience, is figuring out what the heck to write about!

This particular exercise has been most enjoyable for me. Suffice it to say that your quarter will buy some very fine writing on the opinion pages of the Daily newspapers.

Reading the columnists will give you added insight on the stories in the news sections, too.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Honestly now, aren't you, more-or-less-average citizen, a little hazy on what all this fighting between Governor and Legislature has been about?

A regular reader says, "Why don't you remember that most of us don't have Ph.D.'s in New Mexico politics and haven't watched that zoo in Santa Fe in operation for decades? Why not come right out and tell us, in words we can understand, what's really up?"

A sterling suggestion.

So here's our response, worded as simply and clearly as possible:

Governor Anaya doesn't like the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC). The reason is that this group ordered that massive audit of his favorite department, the one that handles economic development and tourism. That audit made the Anaya administration look very bad indeed. It also focused attention on the fact that the area of economic development, which Toney had chosen as the one in which he would star, has been a bust, despite those junkets to the Far East and other points.

What's worse, in the year of 1985, the LFC came in with recommendations on funding state government that were considerably lower than those the Anaya administration was making. The Legislature, dominated by people who want to cut the size of government, tended to accept the LFC's figures and reject Anaya's. Thus, the fourth floor (which includes not only the Governor but all those who group around him and whisper temptations into his ear) resented the Legislative Finance Committee more and more.

And to top it all off, while recommending cuts in the budgets of other agencies, the LFC asked for something like 29 percent more than last year for its own use.

Why did it want that extra money? So—get this!—it could perform more audits on more Anaya agencies, reveal their shortcomings and embarrass the Governor even further.

(Would that have happened? Well, Alex Mercure, the boss at Economic

Development, consistently told the legislators, in a strangely reverse-type defense of his own shortcomings, that if they would look at the rest of government, they would find it was as poorly run as his establishment.)

That's what all the Anaya vetoes of bills to fund interim committees of the Legislature were really about, despite all the verbiage the Governor used in his veto messages about geographical and philosophical balance on committees, and insufficient scrutiny of their budgets. That was all window dressing.

Just to give him plenty of chance to make his position perfectly clear, the lawmakers sent him essentially the same measure in three separate bills. He vetoed every one of them.

And why did some of the Democrats in House and Senate go along with the Governor in his repeated killing of these measures?

Partly because they suffer from frustration. They have had their own way in the Legislature—particularly in the Senate—for so long they have forgotten what it is like to be out of power. That sometimes causes them to act like spoiled children.

And then there's the fact that they suspect the Anaya administration has already done sufficient harm to the Democratic party. They certainly want to minimize any further loss of face for their group, which might be the result if the LFC did more audits and turned the results over to those presently in power, who would trumpet them to the skies.

Does that make the scenario sufficiently clear?

One hopes so.

And what is likely to ensue during the closing days of this legislative session?

One has opinions, but it would be silly to spread them on the record here and possibly cause some people who aren't expert schemers to go off and try to put them into practice.

Stick around. You can depend on this column to explain them clearly—but not till after they've happened.

Editorial

Good reasons to keep the national 55 miles per hour speed limit still exist, and they outweigh the reasons advanced for its repeal on all or part of the nation's highway system.

This is an unfashionable attitude out here in the wide-open West, but think about the reasons the law was imposed in the first place.

Fuel economy has been downplayed by proponents of faster speeds. But isn't it a fact that automobiles still use more fuel at 70 mph than at 55 mph?

A world oil glut and falling gasoline prices do not change the fact that petroleum is an exhaustible resource that continues to be used up as if there were no tomorrow.

Safety, of course, is the other consideration. Driving a car at 70 or 75 mph requires significantly greater concentration on the driver's part than driving 55 or 60.

Those long stretches of highway that Westerners lament having to "creep along" at about 60 (the approximate observed speed limit) tend to drain a driver's concentration. The effect is compounded at faster speeds.

Driving is a crapshoot however you look at it. The toll of 50,000 lives lost a year is a national shame, though recent movement against drunk drivers and toward seatbelt use offer some hope.

The people in a hurry turn on their fuzzi-busters and go as fast as they can get away with, anyway. For everyone else, 55 remains "a law we can live with."—TP

THE BREAKFAST CLUB, (R-Universal Pictures) Starring Emilio Estevez, Molly Ringwald and Ally Sheedy * * *

"The Breakfast Club" is a teenage group-therapy session on film. Five kids from a suburban Chicago high school meet during a Saturday detention hall held in the school's library. Over the course of the day they laugh, cry, smoke marijuana and generally bare their souls with gusto.

The five kids represent particular character types. There's the brain, the jock, the criminal, the weirdo and the princess. Each is struggling for an identity, fighting individual stereotypes.

"The Breakfast Club" is unique in that there is very little action and no exploitive sex or violence. The film is talky, and as 90 percent of it takes place on one set, it would almost fare better as a play.

Writer/director John Hughes initially places most of the blame for the teenager's problems squarely on the shoulders of the parents involved. And here is where the cliches come in. There's the "winning-is-everything" father of the jock

and the "straight A's is everything" father of the brain. The criminal's father beats him up, the princess's mother is an alcoholic, the weirdo's parents just ignore her, and so on. Not that these problems don't exist, but everything seems a little pat; the armchair analysis is too neatly wrapped up in prepackaged psychological bundles of angst.

On the other hand much of what goes on here is very true, often disturbing, and probably highly recognizable by most high school kids. The sex, the drugs, the peer pressure and the parental inadequacies are all very real concerns. But Hughes gives these kids a sensitivity, vulnerability, openness and depth of awareness that makes the proceedings seem artificial and contrived. Thus, this juvenile version of "The Big Chill" may not meet with popular success, but will probably be used to spark discussion by every high school guidance counselor in America.
