

Progress on master plan

Progress on the Ruidoso Comprehensive Plan was outlined at a Thursday afternoon meeting between the planning firm of BRW and the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

The meeting was peppered with questions and comments from audience members, including many suggestions of how Ruidoso's growth might develop.

BRW representative Rich Unger explained that the planning firm is at the end of the data collection stage. BRW will begin taking the information and applying it over the next four weeks to the shape of Ruidoso's future.

At the end of that time, the planners will return to Ruidoso with suggestions for goals and objectives of the plan, which will be discussed with village administration and the public.

According to Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis, dealing for the plan is in August. The planners are preparing both a Comprehensive Plan and a Transportation Plan, for which the village is paying about \$85,000, Davis reported.

During the meeting, planners Unger and Rick Pilgren outlined the data that has been collected. Concerning the Transportation Plan, Pilgren said information such as traffic counts and identification of problem areas has been gathered.

When the planners return to Ruidoso in four weeks, determinations based on the plan will be presented.

Those determinations will include possible solutions to problem areas, costs of solutions, funding sources, and long-range plans for transportation projects.

The plan will be detailed "all the way down to driveways," Pilgren said.

Other data collected, according

to Unger, includes study of censuses, social aspects and population projections of Ruidoso. The planner said figures show that 77 percent of the homes in Ruidoso are single-family dwellings; that in 1979, median income in Ruidoso was \$15,000; and that in the year 2010, Ruidoso will have up to 20,000 residents and will swell to 70,000 occupants during peak times.

The planners also noted their findings that 33 percent of the residences in Ruidoso are second homes.

Colorful maps were displayed by the planners, showing zoning, land use, natural environment, transportation routes and community facilities that currently exist in the village.

Later, the planners sought audience input to identify issues for study under the category of land use. Some of those issues were establishment of a riverwalk-type district in the downtown area; easing of traffic through the downtown area by use of bypasses such as Gavilan Canyon Road or by directing shopping traffic to downtown side streets; and future development of the present airport site if the airport is moved to Fort Stanton Mesa.

Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) vice chairman H. Ray Bishop said he believed that an easement through the site of Ruidoso Municipal Airport should be secured to ensure that a route can be planned across the property to connect Bog Springs Road to Mechem Drive.

P&Z member Martin Rose said he would like to see the airport acreage carefully developed through a planned unit development. It was suggested that the land could be used as the site of a clean industry or a junior college. Meeting-goers agreed that proper development of the airport area is vital.

"The neat thing is that it is perfect land," Tommy Morel com-

mented of the site. Questioned by P&Z member Don Shaw, Unger noted that special zoning of public and private lands with parks and recreational uses will be considered.

The downtown area prompted moderate discussion. Pilgren pointed out that pedestrian movements and parking are primary considerations. Elimination of on-street parking and widening of sidewalks were mentioned as possible measures.

Gary Hall voiced his concern with the unavailability of mobile homes in Ruidoso for employees.

"We can't have all chiefs and no Indians," he pointed out. Unger reported that mobile homes are behind only single-family dwellings in number in Ruidoso.

He said popularity of mobiles is slightly higher by proportion in Ruidoso than in other communities. Pilgren indicated that other resort communities have been able to deal successfully with high numbers of mobile homes.

Unger related results of a survey conducted by BRW of business owners and residents in Ruidoso. The survey attempted to identify for study issues of major concern.

BRW randomly sent 200 business surveys and 100 resident surveys to Ruidosians, of which 33 to 36 percent were returned.

Traffic congestion in the downtown area and promotion of tourism ranked highest. They were followed by protection of the natural environment, maintenance of Ruidoso's "mountain village" atmosphere, and affordable housing in Ruidoso.

The planners will return to Ruidoso in about a month, meet with administration officials and the public to determine goals and objectives of the Comprehensive Plan, and then prepare the plan.

"This is a very preliminary stage," Unger said. "It's a long process, but it takes a commitment."

Small crowd hears planners

Fourteen residents listened attentively to a BRW presentation during an open meeting Thursday evening.

Pilgren and Unger reiterated much of what they had told the Ruidoso P&Z earlier.

The small audience had some new concerns. A question was raised about the validity of BRW's survey; with one woman stating that she had been denied a survey.

Unger explained that the survey, which named traffic congestion in downtown Ruidoso as the village's number one problem, was distributed by mail. Since it was done at random, Unger said, only those who received it in the mail could respond.

Unger explained that because of the small number of surveys mailed, it was "not statistically reliable; however, what we were looking for was major issues."

He said anyone in the area could have input by attending meetings or calling Paul Davis at village hall.

Pilgren displayed maps of current routes in, through and around the village. He has been primarily responsible for transportation studies.

"We've been at the transportation plan for over a year now," Pilgren said. Some possible solutions to the transportation problems identified by BRW are off-

street parking and alternate routes through downtown.

Pilgren emphasized that he and Unger will be back in about a month with specific recommendations. The data-gathering is the first step in a process leading up to a comprehensive plan.

Unger again displayed his maps as he set forth some figures BRW has identified thus far. He told the evening meeting that from 70 to 75 percent of Ruidoso homes are single-family dwellings; 20 percent are mobile homes; and the other five to 10 percent are apartments and condominiums.

The BRW representatives said crime statistics they were using showed that crime had gone up five percent since 1980.

"But actually crime has gone down," Unger said. He explained that better records are being kept now than in the past, making for a larger number of recorded crimes.

Population growth was discussed at the evening meeting. Unger told the audience that peak population during tourist season is projected at 60,000 for the year 2010.

The desirability of utilizing the Rio Ruidoso river corridor as an amenity prompted some audience comments.

"The river area is already taken, that's prime, that was taken first," commented village councillor Victor Alonso. He said he liked the idea of using the river, but wanted some specific suggestions.

Police officer J. T. Alston was concerned that the plan might be encouraging building in a flood plain.

Unger said the comprehensive plan definitely would contain some constraints relating to topography and the flood plain. He said utilizing the river might mean use only in a visual way—not necessarily requiring acquisition of the prime land.

"Maybe there's even a way to rechannel the river," Pilgren said. He noted that that option might be expensive but was still a possibility.

Other issues raised by the evening group included how to deal with run-down, unsightly trailers and buildings, maintaining the small-town character of the village, providing enough water for the projected peak populations, and forest fire danger.

Parks and recreational facilities were another issue raised by the evening group, and Unger said that area will be included in their next stage.

"When we're through, the final plan has to be your plan," Unger said.

"Aren't you saying, Rich, that this village can do whatever it wants to do?" asked Mike Mulholland.

The planners agreed, but said they would offer more suggestions when they return to Ruidoso in a month.

"We'll have some straight answers then," said Pilgren.

Legislature fails to act on local request

Legislation of interest to Ruidoso bit the dust in Saturday's session-ending filibuster that brought the 1985 regular session of the state Legislature to a close.

Ruidoso village councillor Bill Karn, who was in Santa Fe for the final weekend of the session, reported that the Ruidoso-Lincoln County direct appropriation request was close to being approved before the filibuster halted all legislative action.

Versions of the Severance Tax Appropriations Bill, which included the direct appropriation, had passed each house, Karn reported.

"It was very frustrating," he said of the action being stalled by the filibuster. "In either one, we would have been taken care of."

House Bill 511, the controversial "tax swap" proposal, was tabled after three senators changed their minds on the bill, Karn said. He said 511 had become an "accumulation of about eight bills" by then—including things like solar credits and state Highway Department programs. He felt the added-on measures might have contributed to inaction on the bill.

Karn was asked whether the happenings in Santa Fe affected the need to pass or not pass the special half-cent infrastructure improvements gross receipts tax to be voted on in Ruidoso Friday.

He said money generated from the tax could be used to fund the improvements specified in the direct appropriation request. He noted, however, that the direct appropriation could come up in the Legislature if the governor calls a special session.

Parks and Rec clarifies gymnastics

Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department director Bobby Bailey stressed Thursday that the department gymnastics program is viable and is not planned to be cut.

It was reported at the Monday meeting of the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Commission that the program was losing \$400 a month. Thursday, Bailey clarified the situation.

He reported that that figure reflected the cost of all programs under the Gymnastics heading in his budget, not just that of the gymnastics program.

Also included under the heading are many special interest group projects, which Bailey said are the real money-losers.

Contributing to the lagging financial picture of the Gymnastics section of the budget was a month and a half lapse in activity at the gym-

nastics facility during Christmas break.

"We basically shut that building down," Bailey said. He pointed out that although revenues during that period dried up, costs of maintaining the building continued.

As a result, Bailey said, the gymnastics program itself is not quite breaking even. But Bailey said he would like to watch the program over the next several months before arriving at a determination of its financial picture. The program was not losing money before the Christmas break.

Bailey indicated that a complete report on the finances of the program will be presented to the Ruidoso Village Council during budget hearings. He said the council then will be able to determine how much support, if any, is needed to keep the program going.

Again, he stressed the general agreement that the program is viable and should be continued.


Bailey reported that several special interest programs have been cut. In the future, he said, a different method will be used for organization of special programs.

Those interested in such programs, such as ballet, Tiny Tots and after-school care, will pre-register for the programs. A break-even point based on costs of the programs versus expected revenues will be determined.

If enough people sign up for the program to reach the break-even point, the program will be conducted, Bailey said. Otherwise, it will be cancelled.

"We're just trying to make the program a little more feasible," Bailey said of the fiscal tightening. Bailey said setting such a limit might prompt registrants to encourage others to participate in activities.

He pointed out that the gymnastics program is the main project of the department during the winter months.



Dreams coming true for Polish photographer

Margaret Chrzanowski didn't know much English when she came to the United States from Poland three years ago.

"Just Coca Cola and Marlboro, the international language," she said with a small smile. The petite young woman looks very much like a typical American teen-ager.

That look is in contrast to Margaret's story of life in Poland, an immigration camp in Austria, and starting over in the United States.

Margaret explained, in very good English, that life was very different in Poland. There she spoke six languages, but English wasn't one of them.

"I taught myself ... no teacher," she said. Her progress has been so good that she is working as a secretary at Perteet Parks. She laughed about that.

"I was a secretary in Poland, but I can speak perfect Polish," she said. She was sure her English wasn't good enough when she was offered the job, but things are going very well now. She has been there seven months.

Margaret misses Poland and Europe. But she feels opportunities are better here in the United States, not only for herself and her husband, George, but for her six-year-old daughter, Anna. Anna is in kindergarten at Nob Hill Elementary School.

Margaret, George and Anna speak Polish at home. Little Anna speaks German as well as Polish and English.

"I dream in Polish sometimes," Margaret said. "If I'm dreaming about Poland it is in Polish, but if I'm dreaming about America I dream in English."

The Chrzanowski family had to leave their native country for political reasons.

"My husband was in Solidarity," Margaret said. She explained that he had to leave first, and waited in Austria for her and their baby daughter.

"We had to stay in a special immigration camp in Austria," Margaret said. "It was awful."

The camp had been used to house Germans during World War II, and Margaret looks back on it with sadness. They were in Austria two years, and



that was a bad time for the family.

"You have to have a sponsor to come to the United States," she said. It isn't always easy to find one, but an El Paso man sponsored the Chrzanowskis.

It isn't easy being uprooted from your homeland of 22 years, and starting over.

"I think it's very hard, but I like things that are hard," Margaret said.

"I always dreamed of being a photographer in Poland, but I knew it was impossible, there were no schools, no way to learn," she said. That dream is becoming a reality for the determined young woman.

She has been studying photography and sees that as an important part of her future.

"I want to go back to Europe and maybe publish a book (of photographs) about the Polish people. There are millions of Polish people in the United States who have never seen Poland ... I want to do something for the people," she said.

"It's a hard job, but it doesn't scare me," she added.

Major differences between the old Polish life and her life in Ruidoso include acquiring the basic needs for her daughter. Five years ago in Poland, Margaret explained, special tickets were required for milk, butter, chocolate and some other food items.

"If you're working the government gives you a few tickets every month," she said. The unemployed are not eligible for the coupons, and Margaret wasn't sure how they survived.

She recalled how difficult it was to take care of a

baby on the small allocations of milk.

"Poland is a very beautiful country with oceans, mountains and wonderful people," she said.

"There's just one bad thing—the government."

Margaret found the Polish and European educational system superior to the American one. She mentioned as a benefit the number of languages required there.

However, not every citizen has access to the educational system.

"If you do well you go to college."

Medical and dental care are available to working citizens at no charge in Poland.

"Different countries—different styles," Margaret noted with a small shrug. She takes things as they come these days.

Margaret regrets that she can't safely visit friends in Poland. She is still a Polish citizen, but hopes to become a naturalized American citizen.

"If you go into Poland (as a Polish citizen), the government could say, 'welcome home, honey,'" she said. Then you wouldn't have another chance to leave.

"If you disagree with your government like we did, you can't go back," she said.

Margaret's parents also have left their home country and live in Roswell. Her mother is a nurse and her father is an electrician.

"I am young, for me it's easy," Margaret said. "My parents are older—it's harder for them."

For now Margaret is looking to the future. She sees it filled with opportunities for herself, George and Anna.

She spends as much time as she can on her photography—the key to her personal future.

"It's hard sometimes, but I like a challenge."



Want to play basketball? Go east, young man.

That's the message anyone who has watched the National Collegiate Athletic Association Tournament (NCAA) would get. All 18 of the remaining teams represent schools east of New Mexico. The University of Oklahoma is the only team which could remotely be called west or southwest.

The rest of the teams are all at least as far east as Illinois. One of the West's last hopes was ended Sunday when North Carolina State topped the University of Texas at El Paso 88-73 in Albuquerque.

The eastern domination is not surprising since the bulk of the population is east of New Mexico. The best high school basketball is probably played in the East, and most of the media exposure to the sport is in the East.

But it's doubtful the East has ever dominated the college game as much as it has this season.

Look for defending national champion Georgetown to win the East Regionals. North Carolina to take the Southeast, Louisiana Tech to win the Midwest and St.

Who will win the national championship? Probably Georgetown, although Louisiana Tech could be the surprise team of the entire tournament.

But there's still hope for the West in the National Invitational Tournament (NIT). And there's a local flavor to it.

The University of New Mexico (UNM) will attempt to stay alive in the tournament when it plays at Fresno State Tuesday night.

UNM is 19-12 on the season and Fresno State is 22-8. However, the Lobos are coming off an impressive 80-67 victory over Texas A&M last week. Fresno State had to go to overtime to beat Santa Clara.

If the Lobos can defeat Fresno State, they stand a good chance of making it to the finals Friday, March 28, in New York City.

And that would be a feather in the cap of New Mexico basketball.



Farmers Home offers loans

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) provides a source of low-interest loans to people who might not otherwise qualify for them.

Farmers Home gets its name from its original mission as a farm loan agency in the 1930s and 1940s. However, as the makeup of the rural population shifted, the work of FmHA has changed.

Now that farm families make up only 15 percent of the population, FmHA has become a rural and small town development institution. It is a sister agency of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and other related agencies.

The regional FmHA office for Lincoln County is at 1007 Mechem Drive (Highway 37). The region covered by the office goes from Corona to Dell City, Texas.

According to Arthur D. Baca, FmHA county supervisor, two main programs are administered from his office. The programs cover rural housing and farmer loans.

The rural housing program of subsidized loans is designed for people who earn less than \$15,500 yearly adjusted family income. FmHA verifies income of all applicants. Loan interest varies from one percent and up.

"We're a service agency," said Baca. People have to be unable to obtain funds from conventional sources to be eligible for FmHA loans.

The goal of the program is to help people get into a house with subsidized payments, and eventually transfer their loan to conventional lending agents, said Baca. Every three years, FmHA reviews each case to see if the borrower has become able to secure a loan from another source.

The housing loan caseload is 220 for this region, which includes Otero and Lincoln counties. The program is for rural areas only. Alamogordo is not eligible.

The subsidized farm loan program is divided into three categories: farm ownership, operating loans and disaster loans. The low-income loans are designed for family farmers who depend on farming for a majority of their family's income. Baca stressed that the loans are not for hobby farmers.

The farm ownership program is to help the farmer acquire land. The operating loans are for the purchase of necessary stock, equipment, utilities and feed.

The disaster loans provide funds for areas hit by natural disasters. Although Lincoln County was declared a disaster area after the recent flooding, Baca said most of the area's farmers do not live in flood-damaged areas.

However, farmers are eligible to apply for disaster loans if their farms suffered physical damage in excess of 30 percent.

FmHA is in the process of making changes in its regulations to encourage commercial lenders to help farm borrowers with guaranteed loans. Baca said that the trend seems to be moving away from direct government loans to government-insured institutional loans.

Baca stressed that FmHA was a "lender of last resort." By the time someone comes to FmHA, he must have exhausted all other sources of funds.

Baca's office currently has a farm loan caseload of 60. Although the office is short-staffed, personnel review every request that comes in and try to meet the demand as much as possible.

Although Baca was optimistic about the future of family farmers, he was also cautious about general conditions.

"Inevitably, there will be some family-type farms to go out of business when unfavorable expenses (such as irrigation costs) exceed commodity prices," said Baca.

"But, there will still always be family farms."

Church has new home

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (LDS), more commonly known as the Mormon church, has a new home in Lincoln County.

The congregation recently dedicated their new building, which is north of Angus off Highway 48.

For eight years, the congregation met in different places in the area. They first met in Mesalero, then at the Ruidoso Woman's Club. They also met in their homes, until they finally raised the money to purchase the three acres and begin construction.

The Ruidoso branch of LDS was responsible for four percent of the total cost of the land and construction. The main LDS church in Salt Lake City, Utah, donated the remaining 96 percent of the money needed for the building project.

The present multi-purpose building is the first in a three-phase project. Phase two is a chapel to be completed by next year. Phase three is to be a cultural hall with a stage and a basketball court.

Mike Gray is the Ruidoso branch president. He serves as an overseer of the congregation, primarily the youth. He also has authority from the church headquarters to serve as the "common judge in Israel."

The congregation meets at 10 a.m. on Sundays. They hold a sacrament meeting together, then separate into priesthood study for the men and Relief Society for the adult women.

Children under 12 years have primary classes. The young men and young women have separate classes but combine occasionally for special programs. The congregation meets until 1 p.m.

The women's Relief Society gets together at 7 p.m. one Wednesday a month for a homemaking meeting.

The men's priesthood study meets at 7 p.m. every Tuesday.

The congregation is beginning a genealogical study. Genealogy work is important to the LDS, as a means of recognizing ancestors in the afterlife.

The Ruidoso branch is now large enough to begin phase one of the genealogy study. They will receive a microfilm reader and access to microfilmed information from the genealogical library at LDS church headquarters.

The library is one of the largest in the world, according to Gray. A genealogy consultant will help those interested in seeking their family trees.

As the group grows, they will have additional microfilm readers and, eventually, a library at the branch church.

The LDS is a missionary-oriented church. Children and their parents save money toward missions. When the children are 18 years old, they have the option of participating in a two-year mission. The main church selects the place for the mission.

The missionaries are always paired as they proselytize within a community.

Two young people from the Ruidoso branch are currently on mission. Daron Armstrong is in Berkeley, California, and Melissa Patrick is in Tokyo, Japan.

LDS church members study the King James Bible and the Book of Mormon. They consider the Bible to be the account of the Lord's people on the European continent and the Book of Mormon to be the account of the Lord's people on the American continent, said Gray.

Members believe Joseph Smith began the religion as a direct order received from God in a vision. Smith was persecuted, then martyred by a lynch mob in Ohio.

Brigham Young, who the church believes had been selected to lead

after Smith, took his group west to escape persecution.

Gray explained that after seeing the Salt Lake Valley, a barren desert, Young said, "This is it." The valley was settled and pro-

spered. Salt Lake City has become the headquarters of the worldwide LDS group of more than three million members.

LDS has temples throughout the world, with the newest ones to open

in Dallas and Denver. The nearest temple to Ruidoso is Mesa, Arizona.

LDS families can be consecrated in the temple upon recommendation of their branch president. This creates an eternal marriage and

bond of the family, Gray said.

Wildcatter seeks oil

Oil wells are not common to Lincoln County, but occasionally someone comes along to drill a "rank wildcat" well.

A wildcat well is one drilled in an unlikely place by an independent sponsor. The area north of White Oaks seems to be one of those unlikely places.

Not necessarily so, said Dalton Kincheloe, independent well sponsor from Roswell.

Kincheloe theorized that the sedimentary rock layers were deep in the area, perhaps leading into an oil bearing strata. His theory partially held true, when the drill hit granite at 3,140 feet.

The well, dug on March 11, was deeper than the two other wells in the White Oaks area.

The sedimentary layers are determined by a "mud-logger," a well site geologist. Kincheloe contracted with Explorations Services, Incorporated, from Midland, Texas.

The mudlogger, Bryant Holman, studied the grit taken from the mud coming from the hole. The samples are taken fresh every time a new

section of pipe is added to the bit stem.

The grit is tagged, washed and examined microscopically. It is then analyzed for the amount of gas dissolved in each sample.

Every minute of drilling is logged on a clock-powered graph. Once the rig has started drilling, it is in constant operation. If the rig is stopped with the bit and pipe in the hole, it can get stuck, Kincheloe said. Then it could take days or weeks to get it out.

The rotary drill rig, leased from Artesia Fishing Tool Company of Artesia, works on high-pressure hydraulics. A stream of soupy clay

or mud is forced through the drill stem to the rotary bit at a pressure of 35,000 pounds per square inch. Combined with the weight of the pipe and the turning tri-cone roller bit, the rig can drill a 3,000 foot well in a few weeks. Each 60 foot section of pipe weighs about 10,000 pounds, and the bit weighs 35,000 pounds.

The "roughnecks," the men who work on the drill rig, guide the pipes and massive hoist. They grease each connection and twist it on—plumbing on a massive scale.


Kincheloe leased the mineral rights from John Arnold for more acreage than the drilling site required. Since his well site was on the Lincoln National Forest, Kincheloe had to complete an environmental impact study and an archaeological study. The studies had to be approved by various agencies before Kincheloe began drilling.

The well site was limited to a 400 square foot area, in a place where few juniper and pinon trees had to be removed.

Now that drilling is finished, Kincheloe is legally required to return the site to its prior condition. Kincheloe said the site will take three to four years to heal.

The drillers did not hit a rich, oil bearing layer. Only small traces of oil were detected by the mechanical analyzer. The machine detects oil by burning the gases dissolved in the mud.

To further check for the presence of oil before the well was sealed as a "dry hole," Kincheloe contracted the services of the Electric Logging Company of Roswell. The company crew lowered a probe that determined the porosity and

resistivity of the layers by bombarding each with radiation.

The well will be completely sealed with concrete, if the probe does not detect an oil flow. This prevents the migration of any oil into the water bearing layers. It must be approved by the United States Geological Service (USGS).

Kincheloe said he did not consider his dry hole a total waste.

The records of the sedimentary layers, based on rock shavings, will be sent to the Oil Well Library at the New Mexico School of Mines in Socorro. The records will be available to the public at no charge.

The Capitan girls basketball team took fourth place in the state Class A basketball tournament, held last week in Albuquerque.

The girls started the tournament with a win over Reserve 45-42, on Wednesday night.

Thursday night, the Tigers met Grady and lost by three points, 54-51.

In the final playoffs, the Tigers found themselves in fourth place, with a loss to Cliff, 66-44.

The Capitan boys lost to Fort Sumner 52-44 at the regional games held in Cloudercroft on Thursday night.

The Tigers played a hard game, leading Fort Sumner at the end of the first quarter, with a score of 10-8. By halftime, Capitan was still ahead 20-19.

Fort Sumner moved ahead of Capitan by the end of the third quarter, 34-31.

Fort Sumner played strong in the last minutes, beating Capitan 52-44.

The loss dented the Tigers' spirit. They lost 60-45 to Carrizozo on Friday night, in the final game of the regional playoffs.

The Tigers ended their season fourth in the region.

Editorial

"In this world nothing is certain but death and taxes," wrote Benjamin Franklin in 1789.

The latter will be the subject of a special town meeting at 6 Wednesday evening, called by the Ruidoso Village Council.

This meeting comes nearly on the eve of Friday's election on the proposed half-cent sales tax for infrastructure improvements. The reason for cutting it so close is that actions of the state Legislature could weigh on the merits of passing the special tax.

If the Legislature passes the much-discussed House Bill 511, the opportunity for the village to impose the half-cent infrastructure improvements tax could be lost indefinitely if the tax fails to pass Friday.

HB 511 also carries a provision to allow a municipality to increase property taxes by 344 percent, to help make up for the fact that the state would be helping itself to a bigger share of the sales tax.

Village manager Jim Hine said last week that whatever the Legislature does, voters must make their decision based on whether they want the village to maintain its level of infrastructure maintenance and improvements—particularly in the area of streets.

He also noted, however, that revenue from the special tax would allow use of money in the village General Fund for other things, like parks and recreation.

Our inclination, now, is to advocate a vote against the special sales tax; however, there are still unanswered questions. We are going to the town meeting Wednesday to make our final decision.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The way things are going here in the closing hours, the peak experience of the first session of the 37th Legislature may turn out to be the day the Senate debated the diaper bill.

While capitol hangers-on were buzzing from one to another asking whether Toney Anaya was going to veto the General Appropriations Act, thus reducing the whole session to a pile of rubble, two cautions became evident:

—First, it's dangerous to give much credence to those who leave the Governor's office convinced that he will or will not do something because of some tiny item they note while talking to him. More often than not, this supposedly telling factor turns out to be something nobody else even adverted to. Thus there were lots of "He's going to veto" and equal numbers of "He's not going to veto" based on such elusive evidence as the tone of voice Toney used while discussing the matter.

Fact is, Toney Anaya's performance is tough to predict, even for those who like to believe they know him intimately.

—The second thing to be careful about has much to do with the first.

It is that lots of little gremlins, almost all of them anonymous, have something to do with the way the Governor comes down on any issue. Since he talks to these people behind closed doors, none of us has any way of knowing what they said; yet their counsel is often apparently headed far beyond that of better-known and possibly more qualified voices.

All the arguments in favor of that bill to require us to use seat belts while in our cars had to do with saving our lives.

The bill was amended to say, however, that those driving trucks do not have to comply with it.

Should we conclude that legislators do not care whether pick-up riders scrag themselves or not? Could we say there are now so many of them that lawmakers don't think they deserve equal protection?

It's all very well to say that people who engage in adversarial actions, such as legislative matters often are, learn to keep their emotions out of things. We are often reminded that attorneys, being a special breed of cat, can rant and rave at one another all day long and then go out together for a cozy drink after their current trial recesses.

Some expect legislators to do likewise, but it isn't always possible.

One very objective observer (neither a lawmaker nor a news person) says attendance at all those parties various cities and lobbying groups give for House and Senate members was not much fun this year. There was, this person claims, too much clear evidence of both the breadth and depth of the animosity developed on the floor still hanging in the air even after hours to make partygoing with these folks a pleasure.

So conscious was everyone here this year, from the fourth floor of the Roundhouse down to the depths of the basement, of the common citizen's hatred for new and increased taxes that the idea itself almost never got mentioned.

Instead of "tax increases," all anyone was willing to talk about was something they kept calling "new revenues."

Somehow, the changed phraseology did not seem to improve the palatability of the notion by even the slightest degree.

Watch: When the session's over, Les Houston will be around to tell us how exactly everything went according to the game plan he developed—and which, of course, only he knew about.

That's common with Legislatures, where no one can quite disprove such improbably statements.

These and golf are the only games in which you get to keep your own score, and people lie about golf, too.

After the March twelve Council meeting, I returned home and told my wife, "I'll bet that the tape of tonight's meeting won't be played on television."

I was only kidding! I'm sure it was an accident and wasn't done intentionally to make the council look good or bad, but since the tape machines had problems and the questions and objections were not fully reported in the newspaper, I would like to capsule my objections to the transfer of \$100,000 to the street department which occurred at a special council meeting on February 21—a meeting I could not attend as I was in Santa Fe lobbying for our direct appropriation.

At that meeting by council action with Victor Alonso casting the only No vote, a list of eight street

priorities were approved and funded. Number five on this list is the Ruidoso Athletic Club's parking lot. I felt that, with the upcoming tax election, we needed to clarify what was happening. This matter came up in an earlier executive session. I asked at that time if the final decision would come back before the council. I was assured that it would. At the March twelve meeting of the council I asked for clarification and was told that the parking lot was not settled, yet, the minutes of the special meeting of February 21 reveal that the council took action to make it number five on a list of eight priorities and they were funded and approved.

I do not believe the Village should spend the money while we are asking the voters to pass the 1/2% infrastructure tax. I am aware of parking problems between the Police complex and the Ruidoso Athletic Club, but I do not believe a monthly rental or the paving of a private parking lot at Village expense is the solution.

I would like to invite the public to the Special Council meeting 6 p.m. Wednesday at City Hall to ask questions about the infrastructure tax and how House Bill 511 will affect it, and our Property Taxes. Paul Crown will tape the meeting.

Sense & Nonsense

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici



The automobile, the internal combustion engine and gasoline are as closely linked to our nation's land transportation as the flag, the national anthem and hot dogs are to organized baseball.

In fact, the internal combustion engine has been such a fact of life for our parents, grandparents and even great-grandparents that we simply accept the present reality and expect it to go on forever.

But unless we prepare for the future, we as a nation will be ill-equipped to live and prosper in it. As chairman of the Subcommittee for Energy Research and Development of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, I've had an opportunity to oversee the authorization of funding for many worthwhile and exciting new projects and get to view the results of some of them as the work moves toward completion.

Recently, I had an opportunity to see for myself a brand-new kind of engine for the automobile, called the Stirling, which I supported for funding through the Department of Energy, in the Automotive Propulsion Research and Development Act of 1978. If testing continues as well as it has so far, this could be the engine found in our descendants' automobiles as they drive around during the 21st century.

What is so remarkable about this new engine? Well, first it is not really a new idea at all, but rather the re-creation of an old idea patented in 1816 by Reverend Robert Stirling, a Scottish minister.

His engine was powered by heating and cooling gases within a closed system. The pressure created by heating the gases would move the piston in a cylinder, much like the explosion does in an internal combustion engine. The cooling of those same gases would move the cylinder back down again. By re-using the heat through the closed system, this type of engine was much more efficient than any other type of engine, and competed with the early steam engines.

But there was a problem with the early engines. The metals that were available in those days were not strong enough to stand the stress of the great heating and cooling of the Stirling Engine. So because of this flaw, these engines were set aside in favor of the steam engine and later the internal combustion engine.

But despite the one large drawback, there remained several distinct advantages to the Stirling Engine. It was quiet-running, had little or no waste product or emis-

sions, and ran on just about any kind of fuel one could imagine, including the sun. In those days, the Stirling Engines ran on coal.

It took the scientists of today to develop the metal alloys strong enough to withstand the high temperatures of the Stirling Engine and the scientists, through their research, have improved on Reverend Stirling's engine. It is more and more efficient and able to produce ever larger amounts of horsepower.

One of these is now in an automobile, the one I saw here in Washington. Initial tests have been completed and the automobile meets all test requirements for emissions, even in California, without any air pollution equipment. General Motors has tested the device on their Chevy Chevette. This, mind you, is only the early prototype. The engine would have much lower maintenance costs since it would have no spark plugs or carburetor in its closed system.

But there are more applications than these. The Defense Department is currently testing these Stirling Engines for their use as field generators for electric power. Their advantage in the field is that they give off virtually no sound beyond 100 meters under normal conditions, have very low maintenance and high reliability and give off little or no heat, so they would be hard to detect by infrared surveillance equipment.

NASA is also checking out the possibility of its use in space vehicles. By attaching a solar receiver to the engine, this long-lasting engine could last many years in space and require little maintenance. Solar powered Stirling Engines could have many practical applications here on earth as well.

All of this means that the Stirling Engine is on the threshold of becoming a major new source of power for vehicles, generators and space. At the very least, we should put them in practical use soon as silent generators in recreational vehicles, silent motors for fishing boats, or even lawnmowers, or generators for Third World countries because of their versatility in fuel use.

What could be possible is uses for the Stirling Engine as high as the stars, or far beneath the earth in underground mines or generating electricity on a remote military post.

Who knows? A Stirling Engine might be in your family car in the 21st century.



Christopher Reeve has taken to the skies again, this time without funny blue tights, a red cape and a big "S" on his chest. But alas, even Reeve needs a plane to soar in "The Aviator," an adventure-romance that barely gets off the ground.

In "The Aviator," Reeve plays a 1920's airmail pilot, a pioneer of commercial aviation. Many of the airmail pilots were World War I veterans, and flying was their addiction. They had to be up in the air, and it didn't really matter what they were carrying — so long as they could enter a cockpit and take off into the wild blue-yonder, even if most of their planes barely flew 200 feet off the ground.

Reeve suffers a tragedy during the War. It leaves him an embittered loner, so when his boss says he has to carry a passenger (Rosanna Arquette) along with the sacks of mail, he is not pleased. The fact that the passenger is a spoiled little rich girl doesn't quite set his propellers spinning, either.

And so two people from different worlds are thrown together when their plane

throws them into the side of the mountain. In order to survive they have to get along. Sound hoaky? It is, and the intended high drama nearly soars to high camp.

Ever since his "Superman" days, Chris Reeve has been an actor in search of a good role. They were not to be found in such soap operas as "Somewhere in Time" and "Monsignor," and only "Deathtrap" and the recent "Bostonians" gave Reeve any substance with which to work.

"The Aviator" is based on the book of the same name by Ernest T. Gann, the same man who gave us such stratospheric tales as "The High and Mighty" and "In the Company of Eagles." The film's director is Australian George Miller, who gave us "The Man from Snowy River," one of the most successful of all Australian films. With such talent, the material here should have been much better. Even gorgeous scenery can't elevate a cliché-ridden script, one-dimensional characters and some awful acting. Scrub this mission.

'Forbidden' falls flat

HBO aims high with its newest premiere film, "Forbidden," airing March 24, 27 and 30, but falls short of its goal: The film is the true story of a German countess who was active in the Berlin underground during World War II and hides the Jewish intellectual she loves. But by making a grand sweep of World War II, the drama becomes superficial on all its story lines — the war, the underground and the love affair.

Jacqueline Bisset and Jurgen Prochnow star as the countess and her lover, while Irene Worth plays his mother. The cast, which is mostly likable and sympathetic, is not the problem. It's the story itself, taken from Leonard Gross's book "The Last Jews in Berlin," which is too large for a two-hour TV movie.





Movie Nostalgia

Despite its weak plot, "An American in Paris" is a classic motion picture; the quintessential example of poetry on film. Thanks to their creative input on "Paris," director Vincente Minnelli and Gene Kelly reshaped the American movie musical, elevating it to risky and dizzying cinematic heights. Today, 34 years after its release, the 1951 spectacle still leaps across the screen, filling viewers with joyful wonder and \$450,000 worth of breathtaking movement. Paris never looked lovelier in Technicolor.

Gene Kelly chose Leslie Caron, then just 19 years old, as his co-star; the actor had seen Miss Caron perform two years earlier in France's prestigious dance company, Ballet de Champs Elysee. Kelly's talents as a choreographer were also showcased in "Paris": Who will ever forget the film's 17 minute-plus ballet sequence to George Gershwin's sweeping suite? No wonder the film won the Oscar for Best Picture of 1951.

Zen and the art of home run hitting

In Japan, baseball's regular season has begun, but the Tokyo Giants and the Hiroshima Carp will not be making any American network appearances this year. For the inquisitive fan interested in the Eastern approach, here is a book explaining how one superstar played the summer game.

The application of the Japanese psyche to an American sport constitutes the core of "Sadaharu Oh: A Zen Way of Baseball" (Times Books, \$14.95), the autobiography of baseball's most prolific home-run hitter. Oh is the Tokyo Giant first baseman who retired in 1980 after exceeding Henry Aaron's dinger total by 113. For 19 of his 22 seasons, Oh waited for the pitch balanced on one foot, like a flamingo. Such a stance represented the culmination of hours spent collaborating with his batting instructor-cum-mentor, Hiroshi Arakawa, who, like a godsend, had entered Oh's life just when it seemed his third year in the bigs would be his last.

Floundering at the plate and consoling himself with frequent trips to the Ginza bars, Oh opened himself to Arakawa in the desperate hope of untapping the potential he had demonstrated in high school. Oh's recounting of how Arakawa

Incorporated into his method of batting concepts from Noh theater, Zen theory and Aikido sword technique reads like a methodical yet impassioned search for a cure to a deadly disease. "Our work was not to triumph over natural forces, but to become one with them, to discover that what was in and outside of my body were part of a single force, even when they seemed to be divided opposition."

Eventually, the home runs came. For this son of a Chinese father and Japanese mother, hitting from his unique stance evolved into a way of being which afforded him a greater understanding of his game and himself. Disappointment over not being even his team's most beloved player was channeled into an obsessive resolve towards hitting even harder and farther. Eventually, Oh began to handle pressure with a sense of composure and regality befitting both his position in Japanese society and his name, which in Chinese means "king."

Oh is currently the manager of the Tokyo Giants. He has sought his lessons in life with a willing spirit but a guarded heart. He has learned "the meaning of waiting on one foot." His serenity shows he is prepared to give.

Reckell's devilish Brady is soaps' hottest hunk

It's amazing what long hair and a beard can do for someone's acting career. For Peter Reckell, 28, it took him out of the overpopulated ranks of being "just another boring All-American boy" and turned him into the devilish Bo Brady of "Days of Our Lives."

Reckell's current status as the hottest hunk on daytime television does have its drawbacks. While most soap stars enjoy a sometimes leisurely work schedule, the Serpico-esque actor puts in almost as many hours as the star of a weekly hourlong series. Twelve-hour days at the studio are commonplace for the Lansing, Mich., native. His character is so popular that he tends to monopolize the soap's daily story line.

But there is more to Reckell's climb to the top of the soap world than his shaggy appearance.

"The transition to long hair and a beard not only changed my career, but my life," explains Reckell. "I used to do things to please people, thinking that to work I had to look and act a certain way. Then when I wasn't getting work, I figured why not do what I want to do?"

After 21 months of playing short-haired, goody-goody Eric Hollister on "As the World Turns," Reckell joined "Days of Our Lives" last May. He has since been voted the most popu-

lar male on daytime TV by the genre's fiercely loyal fans. But the soft-spoken actor admits that he is not like Brady.

"Sure the hair and the beard can't come off when I'm not Bo, but the tattoo and the leather jacket aren't me," Reckell says. "I have a separate self."

"Bo is outgoing but obnoxious and doesn't get along with everybody. I have a good time playing him because of the variety. I never know what will happen with him. But by being so unpredictable he has helped me come out of my shell because of the attention the show has brought to me," he says.

Reckell also hopes to get the attention of movie producers. Although he has a year remaining on his "Days" contract, he admits he is already looking ahead.

"Bo is just a character," says Reckell. "And I want to keep him that way. There are plenty of others I can play."

Compilations make their mark

Videocassettes featuring compilations of music videos and-or live concerts have been a steadily growing part of the expanding home video market. After the success of "The Making of Michael Jackson's 'Thriller,'" most bands and music-record executives have been looking for different ways to package their music for a public that is as interested in seeing music as the movie audience in 1926 was in hearing movies.

One of the best recent music videos is "Video Rewind, the Rolling Stones Greatest Hits" (Vestron Video, \$29.95). This collection goes back to the very beginning of the music video form and through it we can trace the development of a medium.

The tape starts with "Angie," released in 1973, and "It's Only Rock 'n' Roll," released in 1974, and continues right up to the current "Too Much Blood."

Another historical tape is "The Doors - Dance on Fire" (MCA Home Video, \$39.95). In this video, Jim Morrison reads his poetry between music-video clips. One of the poems, "The Unknown Soldier," was originally banned. The video also includes some rare appearances of the


band on "The Ed Sullivan Show," "The Jonathan Winters Show" and "The Smothers Brothers Show."
