Hall tells how it was at Legislature

State Representative Ben Hall said he felt the recent session of the state Legislature was a success and accomplished "essential" matters of business.

"We did what we were sent there to do," he said. The legislator said meetings took place early in the session to ensure that bills vital to state government would be passed. Among those vital bills, Hall said, were the budget bill and House Bill 191.

Bill 191 ensures funding for efforts to protect New Mexico's water rights in the southern part of the state, Hall said. The bill provides \$900,000 for legal fees and water studies in the battle to protect water in Lincoln, Otero and Dona Ana counties from out-of-state interests.

Although it was his first term as a representative, Hall said he experienced just about what he expected during the session.

"I didn't receive any surprises," he said. "I knew basically what it's all about." Other freshman legislators were sometimes surprised or shocked at their first exposure to the workings of state government, Hall reported.

Hall discounted assertions that legislators voted as they were told, following party or "coalition" lines. He said only four votes in the House of Representatives were coalition votes. Even then, he said, individual legislators were asked, not forced, to vote with the group.

"You vote as you please," he remarked.


The legislator contrasted the workings of the House with the workings of the Senate, saying Senate business was often not as courteous or professional as that on the House side of the Legislature. He noted instances of Senate defeats of bills for purely partisan motives.

"I don't hold with what they did in the Senate at all," he said. "That's not the way to conduct yourself."

Of his personal success during the session, Hall reported that one of the eight bills he sponsored passed through both houses.

Hall was the sponsor of House Bill 374, to provide for funding for the Information Systems Council. Hall said he was asked by David King, secretary of the General Services Division, to sponsor the bill.

Hall's bill was delayed to see what would happen to 511. When 511 died as a result of the filibuster, so did Hall's bill.

Also victims of the filibuster were \$1.1 million in direct appropriation requests for Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

A complex Hall-sponsored measure to rework the state Subdivision Act was killed in the House Taxation and Revenue Committee. The bill died mainly because committee members did not understand the provisions of the bill, Hall said.

The bill would have cleaned up the language of the present act, required disclosure of real estate sales in counties, and allowed county commissions to vacate plats of old undeveloped subdivisions that had experienced no development in the past five years.

Hall said he thought Governor Toney Anaya probably would call a special session of the Legislature because of the business left undone during the regular session.

An important piece of unfinished business, according to Hall, is funding of the Legislative Finance Council and the Legislative Education Study Committee.

The two committees will cease June 30 if no action is taken in Santa Fe, Hall said. He noted that the committees provide a vital role in state government—from doing extensive research on proposed legislation to ensuring that the capitol building is properly run.

"Living with (the committees) is easier than living without," Hall commented.

Loss of funding for the committees came as a result of the governor's line-item veto of their funding from the state budget. The cut apparently came as a result of the governor's wish to have a hand in appointing the legislators who sit on each committee and oversee the activities of the committee's staffs.

"It's not his business," Hall said. He stated his belief that the appointments should be made as they traditionally have been—by the president pro tem of the Senate and the speaker of the House.

Hall said he had no specific goals for the next session of the Legislature, other than serving his constituents.

"Just to do the best job for the people I was elected by," Hall said. The lawmaker said he was enjoying his legislative experience.

"It was fun," he said. "It's an interesting ball game."

The big wind



Have you heard the one about the tree in the house on Meander Drive? People are still trading wind stories after last week's winds—estimated as high as 80 miles per hour.

The tree that fell into Gob and Mary Ruth Fitzgerald's Meander Drive home "sounded like a bomb." It fell right over Fitzgerald's head as he watched television.

Dave Parks, a 52-year Ruidoso resident, said he had never seen wind damage as bad as that sustained in the village last week.

"I don't think it's the worst wind we ever had, but it did more damage," Rita Nash commented. Nash works for Fertet-Parks and already has filed more than 40 wind damage claims for the violent winds of last Wednesday and Thursday. Many more clients are still taking

pictures and evaluating damage, but Nash said the claims already filed are for major damages.


Beverly Hicks and Jana Rooney, next-door neighbors in the vicinity of the Ruidoso airport, both had trees fall on their cars Wednesday.

"I just heard it and ran outside," Hicks said. "I felt pretty unlucky at first, but the more I thought about it the luckier I felt."

Hicks said her car is still driveable and nobody was hurt. Rooney's car was totaled, and the tree that destroyed the car also damaged the deck on her house.

The airport's official wind speed was recorded as 62 knots or 71 miles per hour, but damage sustained there indicated higher gusts. Several airplanes were damaged, and the skylight on an airport hangar blew off and was demolished.

"I don't want to talk about it," Nash said with a laugh. But Nash and other residents will be talking about uprooted trees and de-roofed houses for a long time.

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
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


- 1 pound round steak (3-1 1/2 inches thick)
- 1 small onion, sliced
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil
- 1/2 cup beef broth
- 8 ounces mushrooms, sliced
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon cold water
- 1 8-ounce can bamboo shoots, drained
- 1 8-ounce can water chestnuts, drained and sliced
- 1/2 cup green onions, sliced
- 1 11-ounce can mandarin oranges, drained
- cooked rice to serve six

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Wrap meat and freeze for an hour. Remove meat from freezer and slice in thin strips. Cook beef and onion in oil in wok or skillet until meat browns, about five minutes. Add beef broth and mushrooms and cook for five more minutes. Combine cornstarch, soy sauce and water and stir into meat mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in vegetables and fruit. Heat until heated through. Serve immediately over hot, fluffy rice. Serves four to six.

Bob sets two school marks

Cisco Bob shattered two school records as the Ruidoso High School boys and girls track teams competed in the White Sands Relays in Alamogordo last Saturday.

Bob, the defending state AAA-division champion in the 1,500 meters and 3,000 meters, won the shorter event in a school-record 4:03.92. Earlier he took second in the 3,000 meters, but set a school record of 8:43.90. He set the school record in both events earlier this season.

Ruidoso's boys scored 12 points to finish 10th out of 14 teams. The rest of the schools were AAAA-division schools. Host Alamogordo won with 71 points and Mayfield was second with 51.

Ruidoso's girls did not score any

points, but had some fine performances.

The 3,000 meters was probably the most exciting event of the day. Bob and winner Paul Morgan of Alamogordo were neck-and-neck for almost the entire race.

On the last turn, Morgan pulled gradually away and took the victory, beating Bob by about two yards.

But the 1,500 meters belonged to Bob. Morgan did not compete in the race.

Cisco was boxed in on the first lap, but broke away on the second. He gradually built up a big lead and was running by himself at the end of the race.

Bob was satisfied with his times, particularly in the 3,000 meters.

"I was aiming for about a 8:47.0," he said.

"Cisco did about as well as you could ask anyone to do," Warrior

head boys coach Ronny Maskew said. "If he hadn't been boxed in on the first lap of the 1,500 meters, I think his time would have been around four minutes flat or better."

The only other Warrior athlete to place was 800 meters runner Curt McClellan. McClellan took fifth with a 2:02.77 time.

The Ruidoso senior also ran anchor on the 400-meter, 800-meter and 1,600-meter relay teams.

However, the Warriors did not do as well in those events as they did at Carlsbad the previous weekend.

Ruidoso lost the baton between the third and fourth runners of the 400-meter relay.

The 800-meter relay team of McClellan, Michael Williamson, Brian Davis and Tracy Gann ran a 1:34.7, but did not place. The quartet took first at Carlsbad with a 1:33.50 time.

The same four runners ran a 3:40.0 in the 1,600-meter relay, compared to their 3:37.80 at Carlsbad.

"I was not pleased with a lot of things," Maskew said. "We're going to have a team meeting to discuss this. We'll do better next week (Friday in the Portales Invitational)."

Sophomore Jeff Willingham probably was the Warriors' top field event performer. He threw the javelin 145-8 feet for sixth place.

The throw was Willingham's best competitive toss of the season, and Maskew thinks he can throw it farther.

"I think he can make 160 feet," the coach said.

The Warrior girls were sparked by seniors Stacy Ivy and Gia Rose. Both girls came close to making the finals.

Ruidoso's girls moved their record to 3-0 with a 7-2 win over Lovington. The boys fell 7-2 and are now 2-1 overall.

Ruidoso will travel to Roswell Tuesday to take on the powerful Goddard Rockets. Goddard is the defending district champion in both boys and girls competition.

Donna Mobley of Ruidoso lost the top girls singles match to Lanette Grube by a 6-4, 5-7, 6-4 score.

However, the Warriors won four of the next five singles matches and all three doubles matches to win the match.

Melissa Henderson defeated Lovington's Jill Hawthorne 6-4, 4-6, 6-4, in the second singles match.

Other singles results saw Michele Morrow lose to Donna Ritchey 5-7, 7-6 (8-6 tiebreaker) 6-3; Mikke Roller beat Schuyler Marks 6-0, 6-2; Lori Morrow top Ginger Blanton, 3-6, 6-2, 6-1; and Candice Makowski defeat Stacy Taylor 6-1, 6-2.

Mobley teamed with Henderson to beat Grube and Hawthorne 6-3, 7-6 (7-2) in the top doubles match.

Other doubles matches saw Michele Morrow and eighth-grader Amy Thornton top Ritchey and Marks 6-4, 6-4; and Lori Morrow and Makowski beat Blanton and Taylor 6-1, 6-3.

Ruidoso was without number four singles player Glenn Westergren in boys competition, and most of the matches were close.

The Warriors' Jim Smith won the top singles match, defeating Shannon Wood 6-4, 4-6, 7-6 (8-6).

But Jim's brother Mike fell to Gabby Rodriguez 6-4, 6-6, 6-2, in the second singles match.

Other singles match saw Zach Swalander fall to Dominic Vega 2-6, 7-5, 6-3; Mitch Rhodes lose to Chris Maurer 3-6, 7-6 (7-0); 7-6 (7-5); Eric Collins fall to Benson Atkins 6-1,

6-1; and Clay Grimes drop a 6-1, 6-1 decision to Jeff Wood.

Mike Smith and Swalander continued their excellent doubles play by topping Shannon Wood and Rodriguez 7-5, 6-4 in the top match.

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

It's time for a 45-second shot clock in New Mexico high school basketball.

The National Basketball Association (NBA) has a 30-second shot clock, and some of the college leagues have a 45-second clock during the regular season.

Why shouldn't high school basketball teams have a shot clock, too?

When a team has a lead with a few minutes left in the game, it can stall with the ball and force the other team to foul.

This tends to slow the game down and makes the last couple of minutes take forever. The game turns into a constant trip to the free throw line, which isn't the most exciting aspect of basketball.

The best thing about basketball is its grace and quickness. A team's ability to work the ball around quickly and outfox the other team is basic to the sport's popularity.

When a basketball game turns

into a free throw contest, the action slows down and the fans get turned off.

Of course, you can go too far in the other direction.

A 20-second clock would require teams to race down court and put up wild, careless shots. That would turn the game into a shooting contest and would take away the "strategy aspect" of the game.

So a 45-second clock is the best way of making the game more exciting and enjoyable to the fans.

A 45-second clock would give a team time to work for a good shot, but not enable them to stall most of the remaining time in the game.

Any high school basketball team should be able to put up a good shot in 45 seconds.

Basketball when it's played well is one of the most exciting games in the world.

Using a 45-second clock in high school games would make it even more exciting.

The Chiefs capped an excellent season by defeating the Shockers 95-86 for the Village of Ruidoso Adult Men's Basketball League Tournament title Sunday at White Mountain School.

Atwood: Moncor 'safe and sound'

Despite rumors that revolve around a cease and desist order, Moncor Bank is "perfectly safe and sound and continuing business," according to Ruidoso bank president Jim Atwood.

At the year's end, Moncor, a holding company with six New Mexico banks, reported a \$10.7 million loss. Moncor president and chief executive officer Tom W. Kerl recently said the loss was greater, because of additional provisions for possible loan losses.

The Office of the Comptroller of Currency (OCC) issued cease and desist orders in January to the banks in Ruidoso, Hobbs and Roswell, and amended an existing order to the Carlsbad Moncor.

The orders require, among other things, that the banks implement an internal loan review to ensure an adequate loan loss reserve. They require that the banks maintain a five percent equity capital.

Although the Hobbs and Carlsbad banks required additional funds to maintain an acceptable equity level, Atwood said the capital structure of the Ruidoso bank was well within OCC requirements.

Atwood said the cease and desist order was an agreement, signed by

the bank, stating it would practice more conservative banking.

Atwood stressed that a cease and desist order does not mean that the bank will cease operations. Such orders are frequently employed by regulatory authorities to require corrections of deficiencies that they believe exist in banks they supervise.

"Basically, we're going to return this bank to basic banking principles," said Atwood.

A major item, he said, is to be more conservative on loan requests. Currently, the bank has non-accruing loans on its books that bank officers are working to collect.

"We may have been somewhat over-aggressive in the first 18 months of operations," said Atwood.

Atwood cited the downturn of the economy of West Texas as a reason why some people are unable to repay loans. Several loans were made to purchase and improve land. Atwood felt the outlook could improve and turn around this summer.

Atwood said the bank would be more conservative overall, but particularly with commercial loans.

The bank's financial difficulties will not hurt its depositors, said Atwood. He said the loss hurt the stockholders. However, since the announcement of its losses last Monday, Moncor stock rose one point, he added.

"The people that analyze banks and their performance are saying they like what we're doing," said Atwood of the rise in stock value.

Atwood assured customers that their money was perfectly safe at Moncor. He said rumors of the bank closing are "totally unfounded."

All accounts are insured up to \$100,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC).

Atwood said he had not seen a drop in depositors and that people are opening new accounts every day.

"In my opinion, at the present time, I don't see that Moncor (all six banks) can't pull out of its present difficulties," said Atwood.

Local veterans remember Bataan

Three local men recently received the Bronze Star Medal from the United States Army for their service in the Philippines in 1942.

John West, Lellon Barnes and Sam Roper Jr. received the medals in a ceremony held during the American Legion District 5 meeting in Capitan Sunday, March 24.

West is a Capitan resident. Barnes and Roper are from Carrizozo. Roper accepted the medal for his brother, Sergeant Ollin Roper, who died in a prison camp during World War II.

The medals are awarded to men that were in the Philippines from December 7, 1941, to May 10, 1942, and whose units received the Distinguished Unit Citation. This includes much of the New Mexico National Guard's 200th Coast Artillery (CA) Regiment, in which West, Barnes and Roper were members.

The 200th CA was comprised of New Mexico and West Texas men who joined the guard before World War II started. The War Department sent the 200th CA to the Philippines because the threat of war was great in September of 1941.

They joined units from California, Minnesota and Kentucky in San Francisco. There they embarked on the USS President Coolidge for a voyage across the Pacific Ocean to the Philippine Islands. Little did they know their story was soon to become a tragedy.

The guards were hometown units, manned by local soldiers and leaders. They were dispatched to the Philippines as they were, without combat training.

The War Department believed

that soldiers from the the Spanish-speaking southwest could orient themselves to the culture and people of the Philippines.

As it evolved, duty at Bataan and Corregidor were small-town National Guard tragedies. The troops were cut off from reinforcement by the Japanese. They were outnumbered eight to one, deficient in air power and exhausted by short rations, disease and constant battle. The courageous group of 36,000 men was forced to a bitter, but inevitable, defeat.

On April 9, 1942, Lieutenant General Jonathan Wainwright ordered the first corps to counterattack a Japanese invasion. Lack of ammunition, and the troops' poor physical condition, made it unsuccessful. Bataan fell to the Japanese.

The Japanese were eager to clear the peninsula to begin their offensive against American forces on Corregidor. Their orders were to evacuate the Americans as quickly as possible. Thousands of Americans were forced into the 100 mile long "Death March" out of Bataan.

American and Filipino prisoners died at a rate of 500 per day. They marched in scorching heat, numb with fatigue, burned with fever and gaunt from hunger and thirst.

The survivors of Bataan left the battleground on April 9, 1942. For nine days, they marched without rest to San Fernando. There, many were loaded into railroad cars. The prisoners were packed so densely that they could not sit down. They were moved to Camp O'Donnel, a prisoner camp held by the Japanese.

Hundreds died daily. Those who

showed enough strength were moved to Cabanatuan to work.

600 men were returned to Bataan to salvage and clean up. About half of them were never seen again.

Men were beaten and tortured. Many died of malnutrition, dysentery, malaria and other tropical diseases. Some spent as many as 39 months in prison camps in Japan and Korea.

The idea of awarding the survivors began with Colonel Gerald Schurtz, whose father died on a Japanese prisoner-of-war ship. Major Paul Schurtz was among the 1,100 who died when American planes bombed the unmarked ship.

It was common practice for the Japanese to put prisoners on unmarked transport ships. Japanese troops were transported on ships marked with red crosses which were supposedly designated for prisoners. Unknowingly, the prisoner ships were bombed and torpedoed by the Americans.

Gerald Schurtz began his medal project when he learned his father was eligible for the Bronze Star. His project has grown to include a search for all veterans who are eligible for the honor.

Schurtz began looking for others from the 200th Coast Artillery, and has found 69 so far. The three awarded in Capitan were among those.

John West was a hand on the Will Ed Harris ranch near Claunch. When talk of a draft began in 1941, he decided to join the Guard. He became a member of the 200th Coast Artillery, Battery E, out of Clovis.

Promoted to corporal, he became a heavy machine gunner and left with the group for the Philippines. The 200th arrived in the Philippines in September, 1941.

West said they knew the war was coming. They saw Japanese planes and ships traveling by the islands before the Pearl Harbor attack.

West does not like to remember his time in the Philippines. He prefers to remember the men who served with him.

His unit received the Presidential Citation award. West received an award for good conduct and the Purple Heart for being wounded twice. He returned to the United States in 1945—four long, horrifying years after he left the open plains of Claunch.

The Bataan survivors used to meet every April 9, West said. They last met in 1971, in Alamogordo. Of the 2,200 survivors, about 330 are still alive.

West is proud of his seven children and his wife, Leticia, of 25 years. He retired after 16 years of working for the government at Holloman Air Force Base.

West was born in Roswell on October 12, 1914. He will never forget Bataan, neither will the others.

Schurtz has not forgotten those years, either. He is searching for other survivors or their next of kin. He urges those who believe they are eligible to find the documentation to prove they were in the Philippines. The separation document received when they were discharged from the Army is the most preferred.

The second half of Lincoln County property taxes are due in the County Treasurer's office by April 5. Property owners have the option of paying all or half of their taxes in


December. The remaining half is due in April. The taxes become delinquent after May 5.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—News stories being filed to tell us what legislative leaders think ought to put quotes around the word "leaders."

Some who designate themselves in that fashion appear to have lost a good part of their following—and what's a leader if nobody is behind him?

Most dramatic evidence of that loss of leadership came on the floor of the Senate in the closing hours of the session just past. There sat affable but not very effective Bill Valentine, officially designated leader of the Senate majority, unable to make a move to stop a filibuster by his own forces. Behind him was Les Houston, who had tried to arrogate to himself most of the power in that body; he couldn't lift a finger to change things either. And in the third row was Jack Morgan, boss of the Senate's most powerful group, the Finance Committee. He couldn't do any more than the others—and it was his bill his own former buddies were talking to death.

All three were impotent when action was needed, yet they are now giving us their opinions as "leaders" in the Legislature.

Their loss of control appeared to be sudden and dramatic, but it had been a long time coming.

To understand the root of their troubles, all you have to do is compare the way they tried to run things with the way the U.S. Congress operates. There, neither the Republican majority in the Senate nor the Democratic majority in the House demands ironbound discipline. Each, as they did last week in a key vote on MX missiles, allows room for its members to follow their own minds and consciences. There are probably no more than two dozen votes a year on which there is a call to stay inflexibly with the party line.

That's because Congressional leaders are really that. They understand that free citizens can only be led, not dictated to.

The latter approach is the one those named to top positions in our Senate tried, and that is why they could not hold it all together. Even some of those carefully chosen for membership on the Senate Finance Committee because they were expected to be most pliable finally

began to question why every vote there had to come out 9 to 5. That's convenient for those who are calling the tune and seeing their wills being carried out, but it isn't the way the system is expected to operate.

Even over in the House there was much less "give" this year than on previous occasions when that anti-urban coalition ran things. If not, why would so many members vote for Dan Berry's "fix" on federal money in lieu of taxes when the bill was clearly disadvantageous to their own school districts?

Oh, sure. Freshmen members who went along with the coalitions got bills passed that way that would never have been passed otherwise. You can do that when Big Daddy snaps his fingers to indicate how all the troops are to vote—as long as you go along with Big Daddy. But you give up a lot for that privilege.

That's why Les Houston was looking more like Jabba the Hutt to those who had originally supported him by the time the session had run its course. Some, like freshman Joe Carraro, discovered that obligation sometimes seems to run one way but not the other. Others, like veteran Jack Morgan, simply felt they had been had.

Senator Houston went out of his way to try to convince this commentator that all those caucuses his group called were not for purposes of tightening the screws. "They're just educational," the Senator maintained. One of his most loyal followers, Senator Ellen Steele, also challenged us. "You shouldn't write about our caucuses without attending one," she said. We wanted to, but Houston naturally told us that was not possible.

He should have known that some who did attend them were growing restive and discontent. Such people almost always talk—like the one who said "Sure, I got my bill passed by agreeing to go along with the clods, but I had to violate my own conscience by supporting Houston's bill to allow betting on out-of-state horse races."

It's no wonder the "leaders" lost their followers. They demanded too much and gave too little.

You shouldn't have to sell out to be able to function successfully in the legislature.



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

Ordinance targets dangerous buildings

Steps to deal with several dangerous residential and commercial buildings around town have been taken by the Ruidoso Village Council at the suggestion of village administration officials.

At the March 12 meeting, the council passed Ordinance 85-5, adopting the Uniform Code for Abatement of Dangerous Buildings.

According to Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis, any action against burned-out or structurally unsound buildings will originate in his office, whether by a complaint from a citizen or by his observation.

The ordinance is an attempt to deal with the danger posed by a scattering of dangerous commercial and residential buildings throughout the village, Davis reported. The enforcement officer

noted that the problem is concentrated in older subdivisions in the village.

Previously, only a lengthy process through state government was available to address the problem.

Davis said abandoned buildings pose a threat to the community—especially to young children who often are attracted to such structures.

"They pose a threat to the health, safety and welfare of the community," Davis commented.

Upon receipt of a complaint, Davis said, he will organize all state and local inspections, whether the threat is thought to be from fire, faulty wiring, faulty plumbing or another problem.

Prior to the inspections, Davis said, all efforts will be made to contact the property owner for permission to enter upon the land. If the owner of the property does not cooperate, Davis will obtain a court

order to conduct the inspections.

Upon completion of the inspections, if a dangerous condition is found to exist, the village building inspector will issue an order to repair or tear down the offending building.

A "board of appeals" will be set up by the council or will be included in the duties of the Planning and Zoning Commission, which will give the property owner an avenue for appeal.

If demolition becomes necessary, Davis said, the village will place a lien against the subject property to pay for costs of demolition. The enforcement officer said he was researching methods of funding used by other communities for such a program.

The ordinance will go into effect July 1. Davis said he expected the council to set up the board of appeals sometime in May.



Mary Lou Retton eats a bowl full

Mary Lou Retton now eats "what the big boys eat." In fact, she's now even on the box of what they eat — eating what they eat.

"She's a champion," says Kathryn Newton, a General Mills spokeswoman. "And the product has always been associated with champions."

The product, of course, is Wheaties, once considered not only the breakfast of champions, but also the champion of ready to eat breakfast foods. And the "big boys" are ad agency Needham Harpers' creation, all-American beefcake leaping and lunging through the hyperactive Wheaties commercials in an effort to revitalize wiling sales. In the mid 60's, Wheaties controlled 6.5 percent of all RTE sales; recently, however, the figure has slipped to less than 2 percent — or 2.1 billion pounds.

Since 1939, when General Mills was the first spon-

sor of the first televised baseball game between the Cincinnati Reds and the Brooklyn Dodgers, Wheaties has had the best-known athletes giving it the occasional plug. Babe Ruth, Joe DiMaggio and Ted Williams all suggested we start out our day with their favorite breakfast food. But in the cereal's 51-year association with sports, only two actual athlete-personalities until Miss Retton had graced its orange cover: pole vaulter

Bob Richards from 1956-70 and decathlete Bruce Jenner from 1976-80.

"She should appeal to a broad range of consumers," says Miss Newton. "It's apparent she's got a special vitality and magnetism. Plus that extraordinary ability to communicate."

It was inevitable that after her glorious Olympics, Miss Retton should begin to reap the big bucks from prime endorsements. Yet what was no less than inspired marketing was her

selection as spokeswoman of a product whose pitch allows her to consume it with the same zest and exhilaration that she demonstrated while vaulting and tumbling in Los Angeles. Mary Lou is an aggressive eater.

As for the modern stable of big boys, they've become advertising cult heroes, poster pinups. Their athletic endeavors on various courts and fields are rhythmically interspersed with tantalizing images of hearty wheat flakes, of robust strawberries bouncing in and out of the breakfast bowl, of velvety milk splashing down from the heights. They wink, mouths full of Wheaties, a drop of white dancing on the lower lip — and the morning meal enters a new realm of nutrition.

Listen to Mary Lou communicate. "Watch out, big boys!" She sounds like Mae West.

NBC's Tony Kubek: A pro in the booth

Family and cheese were to be Tony Kubek's prime concerns following his nine-year career as a New York Yankee. Home-town doctors in Milwaukee advised him to retire after the 1965 campaign on account of a neck injury, and the then 29-year-old three-time all-star shortstop — possessor of the most infamous Adam's apple in World Series history — had no intention of spending the next 20 summers as color commentator for NBC's "Baseball Game of the Week."

But Kubek caught a timely bounce when, in the spring of '66, NBC needed a partner for their No. 2 game play-by-play man, Jim Simpson. And so a jock who, by his own admission, "was never much of a watcher of sports, or a student of broadcasting technique or style; I was always busy participating," now had the chance to let his throat help earn his keep.

Granted, there are those who can't bear the timbre of his laugh. Then again, there are others who root for rain to tail Vin Scully and Joe Garagiola (NBC's No. 1 baseball broadcasting team) so that the Costas/Kubek tandem can perform in their living rooms. These are folks who might sleep through "The Tonight Show," then wake up for an hour of "The David Letterman Show."

Kubek used to bring into

the booth 3-by-5 index cards filled with information on every major (and many minor) leaguer. "Now I've got my Apple IIe and those floppy discs let me cross reference," says Kubek.

The scheduled christening of up to six new franchises by 1990 means longer hours at the keyboard for Kubek. "But where will the players come from?" he wants to know. "True, there are more good athletes today, but fewer are going into baseball. People see big salaries, but money can be made in law or medicine or basketball. And the minor leagues are shaky. The flood of great black talent from cities like Mobile has dried up. The kids are playing other sports instead. Same goes for Puerto Rico. Fortunately there's the Dominican Republic.

"As it is," Kubek continues, "those who show potential are rushed up, so they're making their mistakes on national TV; pitchers can't cover their position or hold a man on base. On the other end of the spectrum, older players whose skills have diminished are fattening their numbers on thinner competition. Look at the very first year of expansion. In '61, Rocky Colavito hit 45 homers and finished fifth in the American League. Expansion means more jobs for players and broadcasters. But how inferior a product can you foist on the public?"

'We are the World' has its joyous moments

Any time you have a video with performances with mega-stars Bruce Springsteen, Cyndi Lauper, Michael Jackson, Diana Ross, Lionel Richie, Tina Turner, Huey Lewis, Ray Charles, Stevie Wonder, Hall and Oates, Kenny Rogers, Willie Nelson, Smokey Robinson, Billy Joel, Paul Simon, Steve Perry and even Bob Dylan, it most likely will be a memorable clip.

And indeed, USA for Africa's "We Are the World" is. It starts off with an animated shot of the earth that gives way to the autographs of the stars. The video builds with each voice sounding more pained than the last, until the tension is released when the group is assembled as a whole in a what looks and sounds like a gospel choir.

The highlights of the clip are a set of visual duets. The first, with a tall Kenny Rogers and a tiny Paul Simon is at first funny, but then it seems to tell us that when "we are the world" size doesn't matter. When Diana Ross and Michael Jackson sing together, it almost sounds and looks like a Pepsi commercial (and that's said without an

ounce of disrespect).

But the real joy is the Stevie Wonder and Bruce Springsteen scene that seems to embody the passion that video and record are striving for.

This video has to be compared to the Band Aid "Do They Know It's Christmas" video by our brothers across the sea. "We Are the World" is technically a smoother video and it's better constructed to pull at our emotions. But the Band Aid video was held together by immediacy.

With cynics taking potshots at this project, we have to remember that this video, in addition to raising money for this important cause, is also teaching some positive values to an MTV audience that often gets messages of another kind.

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

Betty Thomas of "Hill Street Blues"

A policeman or policewoman's job is a tough one. He or she must learn to withstand the elements of everyday life within and without the precinct. One of television's most honored series, "Hill Street Blues," (Thursday on NBC), has since 1981, focused on the human frailties and strengths of law enforcement officers and the citizens they protect and serve.

One of the "Hill Street" officers, Sgt. Lucy Bates, played by Betty Thomas, has made numerous strides in her position at the precinct. In the years that she has worked alongside Officer Joe Coffey (Ed Marinaro), Miss Thomas has seen Sgt. Bates experience the ups and downs of a policewoman's life. The actress notes a difference in her role today as compared to her first season. "Lucy is certainly a better cop," says Miss Thomas. "She's learned a lot. She knows how to handle situations better. And her personal life is important to her and she's after some kind of home life."

Sgt. Bates had another serious adjustment to make last season, taking over roll call to fill the void after the death of fellow cast member Michael Conrad. This season she was replaced by Sgt. Stan Jablonski (Robert Prosky). "I felt like I was doing a stand-up monologue," the actress recalls. "I think Michael Conrad would have liked to have seen me doing it. It's very hard and you don't get to go outside when you're doing it. I thought 'Here I am a sergeant and they're putting me behind a desk.' That would really do something to women's views. It would have been better to go outside to work in the streets."

Miss Thomas has received several Emmy nominations as was honored in 1983 with an award from the National Commission of Working Women for the best portrayal of a woman in a non-traditional role. With the airing of the series 100th episode this Thursday, April 11, how does she find working on such a popular series? "I think of the show as moving. There has never been a show where I have cried or which has moved me. I just think it's interesting, there's so much happening. There are so many people, so many little things all at once. You also get involved in the characters — and people can relate to the characters as real people."

After more than three years of self-imposed semi-retirement, Spencer Tracy was reunited with Katharine Hepburn for the 1967 film "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner." It was their ninth film together; unfortunately, it was also their last. Tracy died two weeks after the film was completed, yet he won a posthumous Academy Award nomination.

The fact that the legendary actor was ill during most of the production — his illness is apparent in many of the movie's crucial scenes — does not deter from the slickness of the Stanley Kramer comedy drama. Four days after the film was completed, Tracy told Kramer, "I read the script again last night, and if I were to die on the way home tonight, you can still release the picture with what you've got."

The film was a poorly planned pastiche of post-puberty problems — false pregnancies, say-goodbye-to-summer love, all-night let's-pierce-the-ears-and-get-drunk-slumber parties. 
