## P&Z seeks reckoning

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) formulated a list of topics Thursday to discuss with the Ruidoso Village Council at Tuesday's council meeting.

The special P&Z meeting was called as a result of a council directive March 26. The commission was instructed to appear before the council and list criteria used for administrative review rezoning decisions, and to tell what part the reviews will play in the future.

P&Z members took the request a step further, assembling a list of discussion topics somewhat more involved than the list directed by the council.

The commission agreed to discuss a proposed rezoning in Palmer Gateway that prompted the original council directive; the future of administrative reviews; the Ruidoso comprehensive plan now being compiled; conflicts between the village's land use map and its zoning map; the function of the commission; and an explanation of how the commission arrives at its decisions.

In addition, P&Z members plan to direct questions to village attorney Lee Huckstep as to the legality of several issues.

Possibly of greatest concern to P&Z members was their belief that village councilors are not as well versed on planning and zoning issues as would be hoped.

Commission members expressed doubt that councilors have a pro-

per understanding of zoning, or of the upcoming comprehensive plan.

P&Z chairman Greg Masters pointed out that the commission tries to zone areas to be compatible with adjoining areas, and to provide buffer areas where differing areas come in contact. He said the council suggestion to zone according to use in the Palmer Gateway area would result in "spot" zoning—zoning lot by lot according to how the property currently is being used, without thought of how one area fits with another.

Commission members complained at the way several P&Z decisions have been returned by the council for review, apparently without a reason for the rejection. It was noted that sometimes an issue goes back and forth from the commission to the council "just like playing volleyball."

P&Z member Milt Alcorn said he had admonished the council when the present administrative review was referred back to the commission at the March 26 council meeting. He said he told the council then that P&Z probably would send the matter right back to the council.

"We've made our decision, now you make yours," Alcorn summarized.

Member Mike Callaghan, pointing out that the affected Palmer Gateway property owners do not protest the rezone as proposed by the commission, suggested that the council be asked why the rezone should not be passed.

Of administrative reviews in general, P&Z members agreed to

bring up the topic for discussion with the council and work out a decision on the future of the reviews. Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis voiced his belief that the reviews should be stopped, especially considering the bouncing back and forth of P&Z decisions on the reviews.

Of the comprehensive plan, many P&Z members voiced the belief that the councilors think the plan will be "a Godsend to this community," effectively dealing with all planning and zoning problems the village faces.

Instead, P&Z members stated, the plan will be one segment of a combined effort of the commission, council and public in planning the future of the village.

"It's not magic," Masters said of the plan.

Commission members decided to seek the opinion of the village attorney on the difference between non-conforming uses and conditional uses. Also, the attorney will be asked whether accessory buildings should be allowed in setback areas.

Also during the meeting, P&Z discussed the possibility of eliminating all real estate signs in the village. It was noted that such a ruling, which would be made for aesthetic purposes, would be fair only if all signs were included.

P&Z discussed the possibility of allowing seasonal signs for racetrack- and ski-related businesses. Davis said a local tip-sheet writer will address the commission on the issue.

## Cafeterias feel school money crunch

Money woes are the latest item on the menu for cafeterias in the Ruidoso Municipal Schools.

Snack bars have been closed and four cafeteria staff members have been laid off in efforts to bring expenses in line with income. Ruidoso High School (RHS), Ruidoso Middle School (RMS) and White Mountain School were affected by personnel reductions.

"The bottom line is that we're not getting the revenue that it takes to operate all four cafeterias," said Sid Miller, superintendent of schools.

He explained that the new high school added a cafeteria to the system, including three to four staff additions, but the number of students and teachers purchasing meals did not increase.

Another major problem for school cafeterias here and everywhere has been lessened amounts of federal commodity food items. That impacted the Ruidoso cafeterias' budget projections.

Miller said his administration went right to work on the cafeteria budget shortfall as soon as they

became aware of it.

The snack bars were closed because food sold there was not classified a "Class A" lunch. That designation is given to "tray" meals eligible for state funds. The state reimburses a school system a prescribed amount for each "Class A" or "tray" meal sold.

Miller said cafeteria menus have not been affected that much, but students all have to go through the line to purchase a tray.

The second budget adjustment came with the employee layoffs.

"A school cafeteria should operate on its own ... it doesn't," the superintendent noted. The cafeteria program began the year with a \$15,000 subsidy from the overall operating budget. Miller said most schools do subsidize cafeterias, but to a lesser degree.

"You have to run it like a business," he said.

Miller said there were no plans to raise prices on meals this year.

Students who buy ice cream bars for dessert have seen that cost rise, however, by more than 100 percent. The ice cream bars cost 25 cents last September. The cost was raised to 50 cents, and then to 60 cents.

RHS students can expect fewer

choices in their lunchroom.

Principal Tom Hansen announced over the school loudspeaker that "they are having to cut down in the cafeteria and I don't want any belly-aching."

Hansen said Thursday that he did not mean students would not be given ample portions, just fewer options.

Other financial problems for the Ruidoso schools involve an agreement in which the school system owes the Village of Ruidoso \$100,000 for the schools' share on the sewer system for the new high school.

The school system's share for the sewer line was set at \$150,000, and the first payment of \$50,000 was made. The rest was due this spring, but the village agreed to a partial payment.

Since the state Legislature did not allocate any capital outlay, the school system is unable to make a payment at all this spring.

"We asked the village council to put the due date off until taxes come in next January," Miller said. He foresees further budget problems for schools throughout the state, since regular public school funding was just barely increased.

## Sheriff denies McKnight break

Published reports of "encouraging leads" in the McKnight murder case were "fabricated," according to Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan.

An El Paso Times story Friday quoted Undersheriff Charlie Cox as saying that the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) had found "something that might be encouraging" in evidence submitted to FBI laboratories in January.

"That's not true," Sullivan said Monday morning. "Somebody, I don't know who, put together that shocking story."

The Times story had Cox saying that federal investigators might have identified a seventh common "point" between the fingerprints of a "prime suspect" and a set found on evidence. Seven points are required for the evidence to stand up in court, the story noted.

Sullivan said that the evidence was returned, but that a written report had not been received.

"There is no new evidence," Sullivan stated.


Thomas "Cotton" McKnight and his wife, Judy, were discovered dead November 13 in their ranch home near Picacho. They had been shot in what has been called an "execution-type" slaying.

The Times story said Sheriff's Department officers "believe they nailed down the motive for the slaying." Sullivan would neither confirm nor deny that a motive has been determined.

District Attorney James Weldon, now designated as spokesperson for the McKnight investigation, had nothing new to report Monday morning.

Sullivan and his staff are continuing their investigation.

"We're just going to have to play it by ear," the sheriff said.



## Group wants to contact SIDS families

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln is conducting a research survey among families who have experienced the tragedy of the sudden unexplained death of an infant.

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) is the name given for the inexplicable death of an apparently healthy baby. SIDS strikes 5,000 to 8,000 families each year in the United States.

"We have found over the past 10 years that SIDS is a devastating crisis for families," Dr. John De

Frain, SIDS Project director, said. "The more we know about what is happening in SIDS families, the more we can be of help by building a caring, supportive community."

More than 400 parents have participated in the study, and results indicate that these families need help.

Problems common to many are suicidal thoughts, divorce, relocation, alcohol and drug abuse, violence and all-pervasive guilt. "The average parent takes

roughly three years to return to 'normal,' though life never really is the same after a SIDS death," DeFrain said.

University researchers want to send questionnaires to parents, grandparents and surviving brothers and sisters. All participants will be sent complete results of the study.

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

### April is special month for pets

April is Pets Are Wonderful (PAW) month.

What better way to celebrate responsible pet ownership than by adopting a homeless animal?

The Humane Society of Lincoln County and Ruidoso's Animal Control Office want prospective pet owners to know that there are many cats and dogs who need homes.

These animals have been neglected, abandoned or simply unwanted. Homeless animals collected by Ruidoso Animal Control are kept at facilities near Fort Stanton. If the owner or a new owner is not located, animals must be destroyed.

Animals may be adopted for a \$5 fee. New owners are required to buy a city license for \$10 and must have the pet vaccinated against rabies.

"We work closely with area veterinarians," Jan Wooldridge said. She and her husband, Jim, are the contractors for village animal control, and would like to see every homeless dog placed in a good home.

Jan keeps a list of animals at the facility, and persons wanting to adopt a dog may call her at 257-2027

to find out what is available on any day. The shelter at Fort Stanton is about a 20-minute drive from Ruidoso, so anyone who suspects that their pet has been taken there can check the list as well.

Animal Control Officer Buddy Dean is interested in seeing animals safe and in good homes. He goes to the Fort Stanton facility every day, and will take potential adoptees with him.

Another way to check out the homeless animals at the shelter is to arrange to meet Dean at the Alto turnoff and follow him the rest of the way.

"We have a lot of good luck placing puppies," Jan said. Older dogs are not always so lucky.

Animal control is required to keep impounded animals from three to five days, but Wooldridge sometimes keeps healthy animals for as long as three weeks.

The Humane Society of Lincoln County is newly reorganized and wants to help make life better for area pets and owners. The organization soon will be building a shelter, but until then the group will work closely with the village Animal Control Office.

I stopped in at Rhonda Johnston's to talk about the St. Anne's Guild Cookbook. She and other members are collecting recipes for a cookbook to be published this summer.

As much as I enjoy conversations about recipes and cooking, I had a hard time sticking with the subject with Rhonda and her husband, Hugh.

Their home is a veritable treasure chest—filled with keepsakes from their world travels.

The Johnstons and their 11-year-old daughter, Sarah, have lived in Ruidoso for eight years. The family recently spent a year in Dubai, an Arab country. They were able to visit Peking, China, during that year.

They brought back a Tang Dynasty horse that stands regally in the family living room. We sat under Sri Lanka masks from Ceylon as Rhonda served Tosca Bars, one of her contributions to the cookbook.

The Swedish pastry is one she first tasted in a Konditori (pastry shop) when she lived in Sweden for three years. She also has lived in Spain, Ethiopia, Egypt and Oklahoma (that's right, Oklahoma). "Seasoning for All Seasons" is the name chosen for the guild's publication. The cost is \$10.95, and members encourage pre-publication orders. Delivery will be sometime this summer, but the book will go to the publisher this month.

#### TOSCA BARS

##### Basic pastry dough:

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 1/2 cups flour

##### Filling:

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 8 ounces almond paste
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder

##### Topping:

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 cup sliced almonds
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 tablespoons milk

To make dough, cream butter and sugar together.

Stir in egg yolk.

Add the flour and work dough with hands until well bleaded and smooth.

Press dough out in a buttered 13- by 9- by 2-inch baking pan.

Beat butter, sugar and almond paste to form filling.

When smooth and creamy, beat in eggs one at a time.

Bleed in flour mixed with baking powder.

Spread filling on top of pastry.

Bake at 350° for 15-20 minutes.

To make topping, melt butter in a saucepan.

Add remaining ingredients and bring to a simmer, stirring constantly. Do not boil. Remove from heat.

When cake is done, spread with warm topping and broil until golden brown. Let cake cool in pan.

Cut into 1 1/2- by 2 1/2- inch bars. Makes 30.

Paint bottom and sides with melted chocolate if desired.

## Bob takes distance races; Ruidoso runners take fourth

Despite two first places by Cisco Bob, the Ruidoso High School boys track team finished in a tie for fourth in the Portales Invitational Friday afternoon.

Ruidoso scored 38 points, along with Artesia. Lovington won the meet easily. Goddard was second and Tatum took third. New Mexico Military Institute was sixth with 27 points, and Portales scored 21.

The young Warrior girls team scored seven points in the meet.

Bob, the defending state AAA-division champion in the 3,000 meters and 1,500 meters, took the shorter event in 4:06.0 and the longer race in 9:05.0.

He ran an 8:43.90 in the 3,000

meters and a 4:03.92 in the 1,500 meters last week, both school records.

"It was kind of windy at Portales," said Warrior head coach Ronny Maskew.

Bob led a Warrior sweep in the 3,000 meters. Francisco Olvera took second with a 9:45.0 time and Gabe Tam was third in 9:50.0. Olvera took third in the 1,500 meters.

Curt McClellan had a slight pulled muscle and did not run the 800 meters. McClellan finished second in the state last season and has a best of 2:02.77 this season.

But the Ruidoso senior anchored three relay teams scoring points.

The quartet of McClellan, Michael Williamson, Brian Davis and Tracy Gann took third in the 1,600-meter relay (3:40), third in

the 800-meter relay (1:35) and fourth in the 400-meter relay (45.6).

Davis added a fifth place in the 100 meters. It was the first time the Warrior sophomore had run the 100 meters in competition.

"He did a pretty good job," Maskew said of his sophomore sprinter.

Junior Russell Easter finished fourth in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles. Mitch Mullican qualified for the finals of both the intermediate hurdles and 110-meter high hurdles. He had a personal best of 16.66 in the high hurdles.

Ruidoso did not score any points in the field events.

Maskew was disappointed with his team's performance.

"We didn't do very well at all," he commented. "Some of our guys just didn't run well."

"Hopefully, it was because they were tired and ready for the spring break. If not, we could be in trouble."

The Warrior boys will compete in the Las Cruces Invitational next Saturday at Mayfield High School. The Ruidoso girls will be idle.

"We plan to resume practice Tuesday and prepare for the meet," Maskew said.

Some of the teams in Ruidoso's district, 3-AAA, will compete in the meet.


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
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
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# Around Sports

It could be one of the best seasons in baseball history. The league playoffs will be extended to a best-of-seven series this season, as opposed to the former best-of-five series.

The Detroit Tigers are the defending World Series champions and are a good bet to be among the leading contenders this season.

Detroit is the team to beat in the American League East Division. The Tigers have everything—pitching, hitting, defense and speed.

But the Tigers are in the toughest division in baseball, and the defending champion always has a tough time repeating there.

Toronto, Boston, Baltimore and the always-tough New York Yankees should be strong contenders in the East.

Dwight Gooden alone is enough to make the New York Mets a tough division contender. Gooden is one of the best pitchers in baseball.

The Mets don't quite have the balance to topple the Cubs, but they should make it an interesting pennant race.

Philadelphia, St. Louis and Montreal could be tough over the long run, but the Mets and Cubs are the teams to beat in the NL East.

The National League West Division was once the toughest in baseball. It's not nearly as strong anymore, but there are some good teams in it.

Defending champion San Diego should be tough again. However, the Atlanta Braves may just have enough to top the Padres in the stretch run.

The Los Angeles Dodgers aren't the team they used to be, but still should be a factor in the division race. So should the improved Houston Astros.

The Cincinnati Reds and the San Francisco Giants are rebuilding and don't figure to be factors in the division race. Both teams are at least two years away from serious pennant contention.

But who will play in the World Series?


Look for the White Sox to edge past the Royals and play the Tigers in the American League playoffs.

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

## Gallacher commemorates birthday with fond memories

Few people can remember 1899, when the railroad came to Carrizozo, but pioneer rancher Bill Gallacher can.

Gallacher remembers when the railroad did not come to White Oaks. Because of right-of-way complications, railroad promoters ran the tracks west of White Oaks, in the Carrizozo flats. The town of Carrizozo was soon established, and White Oaks began its decline.

W.W. "Bill" Gallacher Sr., celebrated his 98th birthday on April 1.

Gallacher was born in 1887 in the mining town of Carthage, about six miles east of San Antonio, New Mexico. Carthage, now just a faint memory along United States Highway 380, was on the stagecoach line that ran from Lincoln and White Oaks to Socorro.

Gallacher's family moved to White Oaks soon after his birth. There, his father mined and his mother operated a boarding house.

His parents, John and Jane Malcolm Gallacher, had emigrated from Scotland before they were married. Their oldest son, John Jr., was born in Illinois before they came west.

Gallacher Sr. was killed in a mining accident at White Oaks, leaving a widow with four children—John, Harry, Bill and Margaret.

There were many stories about Jane "Nana" Gallacher and her boarding house in White Oaks.

The women in White Oaks were extremely competitive about who had their wash hung up on the line first in the morning. Nana, thinking she might be a little late, used to get up and hang out unwashed clothes. So when the sun rose over the mountains, her clothes were already on the line, ahead of the other women's.

Nana served meals for 70¢ and rented her one room for \$1.50 a night.

White Oaks was a roaring mining camp, where everyone was a millionaire but nobody had any money. It was an exciting place for Bill as a boy. He would catch wild burros in the flats. Then he would

ride to Nogal, about 15 miles as the crow flies, to visit the girls in the Pete Johnson family.

Baseball was a very popular sport in White Oaks, Fort Stanton and the new towns of Carrizozo and Capitan. Bill was a star pitcher for the White Oaks and Carrizozo teams.

Bill started college at New Mexico Agricultural College in Las Cruces (now New Mexico State University) in 1904. In those years, Gallacher didn't jump in his car or pick-up to speed over the San Augustine pass for Alamogordo and Carrizozo. He caught the Santa Fe train in Las Cruces and rode it to El Paso. There he caught the El Paso and Southwestern train to Carrizozo.

If he was lucky, his family might have left a horse in town so he could ride the twelve miles to White Oaks. Often he caught a ride on a mine wagon or walked from Carrizozo. He didn't mind—that was the way one got around.

Gallacher recalled the day he witnessed the death of Pat Garrett, known for shooting Billy the Kid. He and his squad of ROTC boys from the agriculture college were marching on the road to Organ City, east of Las Cruces. They had stopped to rest when two men on a wagon approached.

A lone horse and rider approached from the east, meeting the wagon. The rider was Wm Brazel, who worked for Garrett. In the wagon was Garrett and Karl Adamson. An argument about goats led to gun play. Gallacher said Garrett reached for a shotgun, but Brazel beat Garrett to the draw, shooting him in the head.

When the sheriff from Las Cruces came, "the whole town of Las Cruces came also," Gallacher said. Gallacher and his squad testified in court the next day.

Gallacher graduated in 1908. He is the oldest living graduate of New Mexico Agricultural College, now NMSU. He is honored at homecoming, which he attends when he can.

In 1909 the family homesteaded a ranch at Indian Tank, about 15 miles north of Carrizozo. Their brand, still being used, was "M" for brothers John and Harry.

Bill played professional baseball in San Francisco in 1909 and 1910. But a letter from home brought him back to the ranch.

Gallacher left the ranch again to serve in Europe during World War I. He came back after three years.

Bill and his wife, Edna, live at Indian Tank. They first moved to Indian Tank after being married in Carrizozo in 1915.

The tank is a natural volcanic depression where water collects. It

is an oasis in the dry land north of the lava flows known as the Malpais.

They had nothing in the little rock sheep-camp shack, but made do with boards and bricks, Gallacher said.

The ranch runs cattle now, but the Gallachers first ran a sheep operation. It was Bill's job to visit the sheep camps and the herders weekly, to count the thousands of

sheep.

The range was unfenced then, and the sheep would often move in to the Vaughn area searching for grass and water.

The ranch is still a family operation. Bill Jr., his wife, Joy, and their children live at Indian Tank. His daughter Jane and her husband, Bob Shafer, as well as their son and his wife, live about six miles east of Indian Tank.

His daughter Annie and her husband, Wallie Ferguson, live at Black Hills on the western side of the ranch, near Highway 60. His grandson, Scott Shafer, is president of the United New Mexico Bank in Carrizozo.

Bill Gallacher is an ardent supporter of the schools and the town of Carrizozo. He served as a Lincoln County commissioner and as

president of the Carrizozo school board. As chairman of the county commission, his job was to grade the main road in Ruidoso, now Sudderth Drive. He served three terms on the commission.

He is a lifetime member of the Carrizozo Masonic Lodge and one of the two living charter members of the Carrizozo Country Club.

Gallacher helped establish ranch boundaries for the Taylor Grazing Act. He still lives at the ranch.

"I've been around the world once and seen almost every country and every state in the U.S.," he said.

"Lincoln County is one of the very, very best, with the very, very best and considerate people I've met," he added.

Happy birthday, Bill Gallacher, you've helped make this part of the world one of the very best.





## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Two words nearly everyone must be tired of are "special session."

No matter what paper you're reading this in, chances are great it has editorialized on that topic—should we or shouldn't we call one?

Even those citizens who are least concerned with matters of that kind must realize by now that we face some kind of problem on this point; it would appear impossible to have isolated oneself from all discussion of the matter.

Because it's an on-going problem, it has become an on-going news story. Now and then it appears to be on its way to dying down, but just at that point one of the politicians is bound to give it another verbal nudge, and we are off on a discussion of it once more.

You can make a good argument that we'd all be better off if we let the story die, but that's not how it's happening. Instead of dying, it appears to be expanding, until there is danger we will be inundated with it. As usual, the media will say, "Don't blame us. We don't make the stories, we only report them." And this is truly not a story the news people expanded on. It's the politicians who are causing it to burgeon.

What they do is keep shifting things around. One day Governor Anaya is telling us there is no sense in considering calling a session, and the next he's planning one to raise taxes to fund education. One day the conservatives who ran things here during the regular session are saying they did such an exemplary job during the 60 days they already put in, there is no need for more attention. The next, some of their members are talking about their plans to return here.

They appear to be making all this needlessly complex.

Instead of changing the topic under discussion every time it's raised, we need to keep our eyes on the ball. Instead of introducing a lot of new material, the powers-that-be

ought to be attempting to strip this subject down to its essentials.

These come down to very few:

—Because of butt-headedness on the part of our Governor, the conservatives in power and the liberals out of power, the first session of the 37th Legislature left many essential actions untaken.

—Since it did not find time to complete those essentials, it should come back into session long enough to get those done.

That does not mean it should come back for the purpose of doing more fighting.

It does not mean it should come back to take up exactly where it left off.

It means all parties to this mess, on the fourth floor and in House and Senate, should be prepared to start afresh to consider only a small amount of legislative material. They should come here resolved to get those things, and nothing else, done.

As for Governor Anaya and his talk about education, if he's smart, he'll shut up on that topic. Tough as it will be, the schools can get along till 1986. At that time, if he'll just have patience, legislators with House members up for election that year, will prove a lot more obliging on the subject than they will be when he calls them back this year. (They'll also be more receptive if he gets somebody other than himself to broach the topic.)

They are not going to want to raise taxes in 1986, an election year, any more than they are in 1985. But the leaders, at least, and probably most of the followers as well, realize that is going to be inevitable. Maybe when the next governor takes office will it turn out to be the year.

Now certainly isn't.

Any special session we get will be for purposes of repairing what didn't get done last time. That's enough to ask for. Those who insist on demanding more are only dooming themselves and the rest of us to frustration and disappointment.

DEAR EDITOR:

As one of the Village Councillors who has been blasted in letters to the editor about the used car lot on Sudderth Drive and the cutting down of the trees to accommodate the lot, I think it is time for the whole story to be told. That particular area on Sudderth was zoned commercial by the 1976 Master Plan; however, there was no commercial activity, as such, due to the fact that the restrictive covenants did not allow commercial development.

The party decided to sell the property located next door to the now famous used car lot but in order to get a commercial price, they went to a great deal of time and money to hire a lawyer to have the restrictive covenants broken. Now they could sell their property at a commercial price! But then they decided that due to the depth of their lot, why not subdivide the lot and sell off the front, keeping the house in the rear. The first obstacle they faced was to get Planning and Zoning to grant them permission to do so. Planning and Zoning turned them down. Planning and Zoning felt that it would cause a problem by setting a precedent of having those lots divided. They wanted to study the area further.

Then the party, with their attorney, appeared before the Village Council to argue their case to divide

the lot. They said that their intentions were to put an office building there (which incidentally could have caused them to have to remove some trees). The Council granted their request.

They listed their property for sale with the same realtor that had the property next door for sale. That property next door was not divided and was listed for less money than the front half of the party's property. Since the party had broken the restrictive covenants, that left the door wide open to the realtor to sell the lot for any kind of commercial development. The lot next door sold and became the used car lot. As to the cutting of the trees, we have no ordinance against this. I hear from people of this community all the time that we have too many controls and do not allow people to do what they wish with their own property. If the same party had not been allowed to divide their lot, that would have been too much control. If that party had actually built an office building and had to take a one or two out, and had been told that they could not, then that would have been too much control. Now, we have trees cut down and a used car lot in a part of town that could have been developed in a much more attractive way.

So, what is the answer—more control or less control? I sit on that Council making those tough decisions every month. I have nothing to gain by the decisions I make. One decision that the Village Council did not have to make was whether or not those trees came down—since there is no ordinance, it was not brought before the Council!

### "Asbestogate"

Rather than go to a chemist, I decided to call the local office of the state Environmental Improvement Division. I asked the fellow there if his office had anything to do with inspecting water pipe used by municipalities.

He referred me to the EID engineers in the Roswell office. Have you ever noticed the difference between trying to get information from the office of an elected official, such as a U.S. senator, and trying to get it from an agency bureaucrat?

The attitude of the former is "How can we help you?" The attitude of the latter is "Who can I shuffle this guy off to so I won't be bothered?"

The term asbestos refers to some civil servants, you know. It means fireproof.

I must pointedly exclude the administration of the Village of Ruidoso from that nasty summation. The people at village hall are always very helpful.

The EID runaround dulled my eagerness to sniff out the scandal in a roundabout way. I went to the direct approach. I called village infrastructure man Frank Potter. (We all ought to keep "infrastructure" in our vocabulary, even though we voted not to improve it.) Our conversation went something like this:

Me: "I have been led to believe all that water pipe in the Upper Canyon might have asbestos in it."

Frank: "It does. It's asbestos-cement water pipe."

Me: "Oh."

To be exact, the village bought 16,205 lineal feet of "AC pipe"—asbestos-cement pipe is known—for the Grindstone project.

"They've been using AC pipe forever," Potter said last week. He told me that Ruidoso's first water system, circa 1952, consisted of cast iron and asbestos-cement pipe.

Some of the older subdivisions in town are served by AC-lines still. Water superintendent Richard Sanchez estimated that 10 to 15 percent of the village gets water through AC pipe.

The asbestos-cement pipes in the Grindstone project will carry raw

water from the river to the reservoir. After being treated in the treatment plant below the dam, the water will go into the system via ductile iron pipe.

Ductile iron pipe is fairly new for water lines, Potter said. He described it as "iron that will bend." Ductile iron is used in the Ruidoso water system—at the twin Alto Crest storage tanks and in Gavilan Canyon.

It is heavier and more expensive than AC pipe.

Another widely used water pipe is PVC (for polyvinyl chloride). Environmental concerns have been raised about PVC, Frank told me, because of "residual synthetics." This has to do with components of the material leeching into the earth and causing contamination.

The advantages of AC pipe are that it is non-conductive—immune to electrolysis and resistant to corrosive fluids and soil. It is also light in weight. Asbestos fiber gives the pipe its tensile strength.

Richard Sanchez thinks the general "scare" about asbestos—particularly in roofing and flooring—has created a concern about asbestos-cement water pipe.

The "1984 Public Works Manual" has some comments on asbestos-cement.

"It is noted that the Environmental Protection Agency is seriously considering a ban on products containing asbestos," the manual states.

"There have been several reports indicating that the ingestion of asbestos fibers does not increase one's risk to any particular disease (a fear of some users of the pipe) although the substance is a known carcinogen."

It goes on to say that manufacturers are seeking substitutes for asbestos. The report concludes that regardless of their success in finding an alternative material, "it is very likely that asbestos-cement pipe will go the way of the dinosaur in the near future."

So what about Ruidoso's supply of "an intimate mixture of portland cement or portland Puzzolana cement and asbestos fiber ... free of organic substances," as Boyle Engineering specifications refer to it.

"It's not gonna kill anybody," promised Richard Sanchez. He and Potter pointed out that the pipe has been tested and approved by the American Water Works Association, the American Society for Testing and Materials and the American National Standards Institute.

The AWWA established a committee on AC pipe in 1949. The product was introduced in North America in 1931. The organization's standards are quite rigorous, from what I could tell glancing through its manual.

Frank Potter had one more reassuring comment about the material. He pointed out that the city of Los Angeles receives water through a 52-inch aqueduct made of asbestos-cement.

So it seems there was no "Asbestogate" after all. But I'm glad I was tipped off to the story. Thanks to Frank and Richard, I learned more than I ever knew about water pipes!

And I found no evidence that the village is trying to poison the citizenry of Ruidoso.

## Clipped Comment

Let a dead horse be buried forever. Pari-mutuel betting is dead. It should be buried permanently. And maybe, just maybe, the overwhelming vote against it in the Texas House will do exactly that.

Wednesday, members voted 96 to 52 against pari-mutuel betting on horse races. They made their voice even louder by voting 94 to 52 to keep the issue from being raised again in the House unless two-thirds of the members want it reconsidered. House Speaker Gib Lewis pronounced the measure dead—at least for this legislative session.

The Times has been against the bill from the start for some very self-serving reasons. El Paso makes a lot of money from nearby tracks, particularly Sunland Park in New Mexico. Their workers live here, pay taxes here and spend money here. People from the area

and other parts of Texas spend money in hotels and restaurants when they spend the weekend at the tracks. If Texas had other tracks, we'd lose some of that business. And we wouldn't profit by building a new track in El Paso.

The bill also had a lot working against it. Many were against it for moral reasons. Minorities regarded as meaningless a provision that required 15 percent of track construction contracts go to minority businesses. Some conservatives believed the same provision interfered with enterprise. And so, the measure went down with a resounding thump—instead of the two-vote squeaker that it just missed by in the last legislative session.

Now, the Legislature should get on to more important business—namely balancing the precarious Texas budget.

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# Word on water find coming

An offer of judgment from the State Engineer's Office to the Village of Ruidoso regarding the Ruidoso water find near Sierra Blanca on U.S. Forest Service land is expected "well within six months," according to State Engineer's Office area supervisor John Couzens.

The Ruidoso claim is included in the adjudication of the Hondo Underground Basin suit, since the state engineer recently enlarged the basin to include the Ruidoso

find. The suit, filed in Chaves County District Court, has been under way in this area for about 10 years.


Adjudication of the Hondo basin is part of another larger suit that has been in the courts since the 1950s, Couzens said. Purpose of the suit is to ascertain who holds the water rights in the areas covered by the suit.

Couzens said he expected the court to establish the water right that Ruidoso has the opportunity to develop. The supervisor pointed out that to ensure a water right in New Mexico, the water must be put to

beneficial use. For that reason, he noted, the Ruidoso find will be guaranteed only if the village utilizes the Sierra Blanca wells.

Couzens said the State Engineer's Office is awaiting test results of the capacity of the Sierra Blanca wells before the offer of judgment can be completed. The supervisor explained that results of the test will be used to set a quantity limit on the Ruidoso use of the wells.

The Ruidoso Village Council is scheduled to accept a bid for the test-pumping of the four wells at the council meeting Tuesday.

## Alterations, additions top building

With wintry weather giving way to summer-like conditions, Ruidosans turned their attention during March to home improvement projects.

The Ruidoso Building Inspector's Office issued the highest number of permits for residential alterations and additions in over a year, excepting November 1984.

March saw 25 permits issued for residential additions and alterations with a valuation of \$253,947. During November 1984, 26 such permits were issued with a valuation of \$322,047.

Sharply down last month when compared to March 1984 were most other categories, most dramatic of which was single-family homes. Just 10 permits for the construction of single-family homes were issued in March, with a valuation of \$924,590. In March 1984, 38 such permits were issued, with a valuation of \$2,767,932.

For all categories, a total of 44 permits were issued in March, with a valuation of \$1,359,850. In February, 17 permits were issued, with a valuation of \$1,466,077.

In March 1984, 68 permits were issued, with a valuation of \$3,668,437.

So far this year, 103 permits have been issued, with a valuation of \$4,559,356.





## Nostalgia

In the early 1960s, two completely different TV doctor shows, "Ben Casey" and "Dr. Kildare," battled it out for viewers' affections. Casey (Vincent Edwards) was a method-actor medic, a surly, aggressive neurosurgeon battling the medical establishment, while James Kildare (Richard Chamberlain) was a naive, wholesome intern. Both had mentors guiding their lives. Casey was checked by Dr. Zorba (Sam Jaffe), who looked like David Ben-Gurion and acted like he owned a pants-pressing store on Flatbush Avenue. Kildare was monitored by the stern Dr. Leonard Gillespie (Raymond Massey). Both young doctors had legions of female fans.

"Ben Casey," that "virtuoso of the scalpel and master of psychiatric insight," as Variety put it, made its debut in October 1961. The New York Times reviewer immediately sued for malpractice: "There is a calculated element of shock in this new series that is extreme and unnecessary. Dr. Casey needs a quick tranquilizer."

Was he ever wrong! The show became one of the most popular programs on ABC, then the poor-cousin third network. "Kildare" led the ratings in 1961-62, but Casey vaulted ahead during the next season.

Serious viewers were attracted to the show because of its lean, well-written scripts, often dealing with controversial subjects. "Casey" finally checked out in 1966.

Growing up as a teenager in America is tough, as recent films like "Breakfast Club" and "Flamingo Kid" keep reminding us. But most of the adolescent traumas of getting a date for the prom or the latest pair of designer jeans pale when compared to the true story on which this film is based.

Rocky is a kid from Southern California who was born with a genetic birth defect. Calcium deposits are accumulating around his skull, enlarging his head, distorting his facial features and leaving him horribly disfigured.

The doctors continue to give Rocky only a few months to live, but he manages not only to survive, but to thrive. His grades at school are superb, and he has many friends. Rocky even plans to ride a Harley-Davidson motorcycle across Europe.

Much of, if not all, of Rocky's ability to deal with his affliction stems from his mother. He has no idea who his father was, but his mother has taught him that he is what he is, and to make the best of it.

Cher plays this mother in a role that fits her like a pair of the skintight leather pants she wears in the film. She is a nonsense lady, ready to spar with doctors, school-board administrators or macho motorcycle suits. Yet with her son, her jaggedness gives way to a warmth and tenderness any mom would be proud of.

Director Peter Bogdanovich is making something of a comeback with this film, and he is wise to let a moving story tell itself. Eric Stoltz gives an incredibly moving performance as Rocky. It is all the more incredible when one considers that his facial expressions were limited by the severe makeup.

The movie is not flawless. The boy and his mom are part of a Harley-Davidson motorcycle gang who seem more like boy scouts in black leather. We also have no idea what his mom does for a living, but the story is so powerful, and the performances so affecting, that the final impact is potent. Bring hankies.

Bruce Springsteen's bittersweet new video "I'm on Fire" tells the story of a grease monkey who yearns for a wealthy married woman. After fixing her car, he drives it to her place and, in a great moment of decision, turns away and walks home, not wishing to rock the boat.

But he doesn't turn away in anger, and that's the beauty of the video. Its message is that just wanting the better things in life is enough to keep us going. "I'm on Fire" is as powerful as anything Springsteen has done, including his haunting first video, "Atlantic City."

Ure takes charge  
Midge Ure, the leader of the English synthesizer-oriented band Ultravox, learned to direct videos by watching Russell Mulcahy, one of the pioneers of the clip world. This time out, Ure decided to take the helm himself.

In "Love's Great Adventure," Ure takes us into a world where things happen so fast that at one point he stops the action — and the song — to catch his breath. In the end, of course, he gets the girl and, with the help of the band,

beats up a mean bunch of motorcycle hoodlums.

It's like a good Saturday-morning cartoon come to life.

**Overshadowed by manikins**

This time out, Godley and Creme, who directed "Rockit" and "Two Tribes," introduce Go West, two cute guys who, given the right material, would have made an impressive debut. Unfortunately, the show is stolen by a group of manikins, animated to dance like the Motown groups of the '60s.

The manikins so overpower "We Close Our Eyes" that I still can't tell you anything about Go West, except that one of the guys plays a guitar, the other holds a large wrench as if it were a guitar and the song has a good hook.

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



## Ken Venturi: A Master golfer

For three days during April in 1956, Ken Venturi led the Masters Tournament as an amateur before shooting a final round of 80 to finish one stroke off the pace. In 1958, Venturi three-putt the 14th hole and lost the green jacket by two strokes. And in 1960, after entering the clubhouse with a one-stroke lead, Venturi listened to the roars as Arnold Palmer birdied the last two holes to win by one shot.

Three Masters lost by a total of four strokes.

"Timing," says Venturi. "When you do what you do has as much as anything to do with it. I think about (Palmer's charge) when I see a player in a situation similar to mine. But it's not something I try to dwell on. The Open rectified a lot for me."

It's the 1964 U.S. Open, at Washington's Congressional Country Club, and Ken Venturi is returning from the golf dead. In over 100-degree heat, suffering from heat prostration and guzzling iced tea, he hangs on to win his first ever Major tournament, his first victory of any kind after four barren years.

By the time an auto accident in '61 wrought havoc with his shoulder, Venturi had accumulated 10 tour wins in a four-year pro career. But efforts to compensate for the pain short-

ened up and flattened out a swing once considered as classic as Ben Hogan's. The public brooks a winner's arrogance, but will not tolerate a journeyman's brooding.

"I was so mentally dissatisfied with my play," says Venturi. "Only now do you realize players often heal faster physically than mentally."

For this year's final round of the Masters, airing April 14 on CBS, Venturi shares co-anchoring chores with Pat Summerall. But for a twist, Venturi will report from the course once the leaders reach Amen Corner, the cozy nook encompassing the 11th green, 12th hole and 13th tee. Here was where Ben Crenshaw last year pulled away from Tom Kite and Larry Nelson to win his first Major.

Leading by two, Crenshaw had just bogeyed the 11th hole when he heard that Nelson had hit his 12th tee shot into Rae's Creek and had come away with a double bogey. Granted the reprieve, Crenshaw then birdied the 12th by sinking a 12-looter, after which Kite followed Nelson's example by plopping his own 12th tee shot into the drink that moats the green, commencing his own triple bogey.

If Augusta's magnolia's are on the tube, then spring has truly sprung. Amen.



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

## Stage work gets Kettle through on TV

The ladies who watch daytime dramas are becoming addicted to handsome actors with accents. Newcomer Ross Kettle, the actor who portrays Lord Stewart Markham Cushing on "As the World Turns," comes complete with an authentic British accent, and certainly fits the bill as a potential heartthrob.

Kettle was born in South Africa and raised outside of London. Except for an uncle who was a set designer, the young actor comes from a non-theatrical family. "When I was 11," remembers Kettle, "my uncle worked for the Catholic Players' Guild and he got me a small part in a production of 'The Passion Play.'"

Kettle later enrolled in Corolla Academy where he learned what goes on behind-the-scenes in a theater. He can still recall evenings spent "lugging scenery" for various English theatrical productions.

Kettle studied at the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art before landing roles in TV commercials. The actor also appeared in "1922," an eight-part series that was featured at last year's Cannes Film Festival.

After living and working in South Africa for several years, Kettle moved to Hollywood, where he eventually found an agent and


auditioned for his role on "ATWT."

"I auditioned several times for the role of Stewart," remembers Kettle, who claims he was nervous for several months after his screen tests. "One day, the show called to tell me I had the part. I had only two months to move to New York City."

Of his first stint in daytime soaps Kettle says: "The fast pace has taken some getting used to. There's a lot of dialogue to learn every day. I think my theater work has helped me though," says Kettle, "because I seem to learn my lines pretty quickly."

For the future, Kettle says he'd like to direct and make feature films. He's studied music and has even written scores for some of the European plays in which he has appeared. On "ATWT," Stewart's future seems destined to become enmeshed with that of Marcy Thompson, played by Marisa Tomei.
