Ruidoso co-op ads set for summer

"Cool it in Ruidoso," is the message that will go out to millions of Texans through tourist advertising this summer. The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce advertising committee reviewed the spring-summer campaign at a meeting Thursday morning.

This summer's advertising will be a joint venture between the village, the racetrack and the state of New Mexico. Each entity matched \$20,400, for a total of \$61,200.

Bob Epstein, of Epstein Enterprises, the village's advertising agency, reported that the cooperative project is the culmination of a year's effort. The Inn of the Mountain Gods had considered participating in the cooperative advertising, but later declined for this year.

Epstein met with the advertising committee more than a month ago to plan the preliminary campaign. Since that time, he met with Mithoff

Advertising Agency (the racetrack's advertising agency) and designed the campaign.

Epstein said the reason it had taken a month was "politics, politics and more politics." He said he felt good because he had recently signed the matching funds contracts with the state.

"There are no more ifs," he said.

In an effort to satisfy the needs of both the track and the village, the new campaign will promote Ruidoso with radio spots and outdoor billboards. Target markets in Texas include Dallas, San Antonio and Lubbock.

The theme of the advertisements will be the climate and scenery of Ruidoso.

"Put yourself in this picture for a moment. You're in cool mountain country with tall swaying pine trees, a gentle breeze. The air you're breathing is so fresh," says the soothing announcer's voice on the radio commercial. Behind his voice are pleasant outdoor sounds.

The radio spot goes on to tell

Texas listeners about Ruidoso Downs racetrack, with background sound effects of excited crowds and hoofbeats. The commercial concludes with a description of cool weather, lodging facilities and unique shopping in Ruidoso.

"We need to orient people (in Texas) to Ruidoso horse racing, so when there's racing there, people will still come here," said Epstein.

Although a proposal to allow horseracing was defeated in the Texas Legislature this year, Epstein said he feels that it will eventually pass there.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers said he was glad to see the incorporation of the radio spots into the campaign. The spots will be an effective way of reaching people when they are stuck in traffic in the Texas heat, listening to the car radio, said Jeffers.


The billboards will feature horse racing in greenery with the slogan "Cool it in Ruidoso." Billboards need to be simple to be effective, said Epstein.

The advertising committee made some slight changes in the proposed campaign, which Epstein will work into the ads. The signs will include the words New Mexico on them and a silhouette of Sierra Blanca in the background.

In addition to the existing billboards (which currently feature a winter slogan) in Austin, Dallas and San Antonio, additional 14 by 48 foot signs will be placed in Abilene, Amarillo, Lubbock, Midland-Odessa and San Angelo.

The commercial spots will be heard on two different radio stations in each of the cities of Abilene, Amarillo, Dallas, Lubbock, Midland-Odessa and San Angelo. The largest chunk of radio funds will be spent in Dallas, an important targeted market.

The advertising committee felt Albuquerque was an important market for Ruidoso. Epstein will design a commercial with a different theme which will be used to promote Ruidoso in the Albuquerque area.

DA sole spokesman on McKnight killings

District Attorney James Weldon has muzzled the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office on the subject of last November's McKnight slayings near Picacho.

An Alamogordo Daily News story published Wednesday reported that Weldon would be the spokesperson for any news regarding the unsolved murder. Weldon listed recent "erroneous" news reports as his reason for making the decision.

He was quoted as saying, "Because of that erroneous infor-

mation, I felt we had to have one source of information, and since I am the chief law enforcement officer for the district, I made myself responsible for ensuring that the information given to the press, if any, is correct."

An El Paso Times story published last week reported that Lincoln County Undersheriff Charlie Cox had revealed results of laser fingerprint tests by the Federal Bureau of Information's Washington D.C. laboratories.

Neither Cox nor Sheriff Tom

Sullivan confirmed that story when contacted by telephone last Monday. But Cox added he had been instructed not to discuss the case, and that all inquiries should be directed to Weldon in Alamogordo.


Weldon, contacted by telephone Monday and Thursday, said there are no new leads, and made no comment on the laser print test results. He also said he "had no idea" where the El Paso Times got the information contained in their story.

The murder of Thomas "Cotton"

and Judy McKnight on November 13, 1984, still remains a mystery. Their bodies were discovered on the floor of their ranchhouse kitchen the morning of November 14.

Cox, before he was instructed not to discuss the McKnight case, admitted that he hoped the FBI test results would be the missing link to other evidence that might open up the case.

Meanwhile, law enforcement agencies in the county continue their investigation.

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Crime Stoppers plan May 4 benefit party

The Ruidoso Crime Stoppers discussed the upcoming Crime Stoppers Third Annual Benefit Party at their meeting Thursday night.

According to president Richard Sandoval, the party will be from 8 p.m. to midnight Saturday, May 4, at the Prime Time Restaurant.

The party will feature cocktails, dancing and live country music and thousands of dollars' worth of door prizes. Tickets for the event are \$6 each and are available at several locations around town.

Sandoval said a mailing will be going out to all members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce seeking donations, door prizes and support for the party. The president reported that he will approach members of the Spirit of Ruidoso for help in soliciting donations and selling tickets. Rotary, Altrusa and Lions club members will also be addressed.

Sandoval noted the \$2,500 the group has paid out in Crime Stoppers rewards for information since the last party in November, 1984.

"The program works and continues to work," Sandoval said of Crime Stoppers.

Sandoval predicted the Crime Stoppers phone number in Ruidoso will receive a call on a major crime sometime shortly before or after the party due to the amount of exposure the group receives during the preparation and putting on of a party.

Crime Stoppers Board member Paul Davis pointed out the benefit of having the party during the slower times of the year so local people can enjoy it without the pressure of crowds of visitors to the village.

"I've never failed to have fun at them," commented audience member Elmer Pirelli.


Sandoval reported that about a dozen State Crime Stoppers officials are expected to attend the Ruidoso party.

Also during the meeting, Board member Wilma Sandoval reported on her and Richard Sandoval's attendance at the recent State Crime Stoppers Seminar in Albuquerque. Wilma Sandoval said the seminar was very informational, with many different aspects of crime discussed. At the meeting the Coordinator of the Year award went to Detective Jerry Fariss of Las Cruces and the Program of the Year award went to the San Juan County Crime Stoppers.

Richard Sandoval said he indicated during the seminar that the Ruidoso Crime Stoppers would be willing to sponsor next year's seminar here.

Ruidoso Police Department coordinator Mike Lovelace informed members that five Crime Stoppers calls were received during the past month, none of which resulted in any arrests. He reported that activity in Ruidoso is at a slow pace.


Mix cheeses together and spread on bottom of pastry shell. In middle layer add egg and 1/2 cup cheddar. Pour over cheese-covered pastry.

HINTS FOR PERFECT QUICHE

1. Prick pie or pastry shell with fork and bake at 400° for seven to 10 minutes or until lightly browned.
2. Brush crust with egg wash (egg white and a few drops of water) and let dry. This will keep the crust from becoming soggy when filled.
3. Fill pastry about 3/4 full with egg custard mixture and place a cookie sheet under it in the oven to catch any overflow.

Ruidoso boy thinclads take sixth at Las Cruces

A well-balanced team effort enabled the Ruidoso High School boys track team to finish sixth in the Dona Ana Relays in Las Cruces Saturday.

The Warriors scored 26 points and beat six teams in the 12-team field. Mayfield won the boys championship. The teams were mostly from AAAA and AAA-division schools.

Senior Cisco Bob again led the way for Ruidoso. He won the 3,000 meters in 8:50.05 and took the 1,500 meters in a school-record 3:58.90. It was the first time the state defending champion had broken the four-minute barrier.

But the Warriors also got good efforts from the 800-meter and 1,600-meter relay teams, sophomore distance runner Gabe Tam, and school records from 800-meter runner Curt McClellan and javelin thrower Jeff Willingham.

But it was Bob's 1,500-meter victory which provided the top War-

rior highlight.

Bob had to beat off a tough challenge by Mayfield's Johann Marmolin.

The Warrior runner took about a two-yard lead at the end of the first lap, but could never pull away from the Mayfield runner.

Bob held a slight lead the rest of the race and broke across the finish line about four yards in front of Marmolin.

Was breaking the four-minute mark a season goal?

"Oh yeah, this is what I've been trying to do all season," Bob said after the race.

"We've set a new goal of around 3:55.0, 3:56.0 this season," said Warrior head coach Ronny Maskew.

Bob's strong victory in the 3,000 meters helped Tam. Tam ran well throughout the entire race and put on a strong finishing kick for second place and a personal best of 9:22.02.

Cisco ran almost the entire 3,000 meters by himself. He has a best of 8:43.90 this season.

McClellan ran a personal best of 1:59.79 to finish fourth in the 800 meters. He ran a 1:59.95 while finishing second in last season's AAA-division state meet.

The Warrior senior was hampered on the last curve of the event when a rubber thigh cap he was wearing fell down and he had to kick it off. He was in third place at the time.

McClellan has been bothered by injuries all season and was held out of the 400-meter, 800-meter and 1,600-meter relays.

Willingham had a best of 151-2 in the javelin, although he did not place. He broke the school record by two inches.

Despite running without McClellan, the Warrior 800-meter and 1,600-meter relay teams each took fourth place.

Michael Williamson, Brian Davis, Tracy Gann and Billy Harrison made up the 800-meter relay quartet which ran a 1:34.15. Russell

Easter joined Gann, Davis and Williamson on the 1,600-meter relay team which recorded a 3:38.00.

The 400-meter relay team of Williamson, Davis, Gann and Harrison finished second in its heat and sixth overall with a 45.30 time.


Gann almost tied the school record in the high jump, leaping 5-10 to finish in a fifth-place tie. He narrowly missed at 6-0, which would have tied the school record.

The tall senior also had the Warriors' best long jump effort, leaping 19-7.

"I think the kids did a real good job," Maskew commented. "I was real pleased with the effort. They did much better than they did the last two times."

Ruidoso's girls team did not compete in Las Cruces. However, the Warrior girls and boys will participate in the Roswell Invitational Friday. It will be an afternoon-evening meet and should provide plenty of tough competition for the Warriors.

Following the Roswell meet, Ruidoso will compete in the Artesia Invitational Friday, April 26. It will be the first state-qualifying meet.

I bought a fishing rod last week.

That in itself is a news story. I haven't gone fishing in something like six or seven years. I don't remember much about what kind of bait or hooks to use.

Not that I dislike to fish. It's just that I don't usually have the patience to go through a day of standing by a lake or river and not catching anything.

Oh, it may be exciting for a few minutes, hoping for a big trout to hook onto my line. But after that, I lose my desire if I don't catch some fish or at least get some bites.

I've been on some fishing trips that have lasted three or four days. Usually, I'm the first one to become disinterested.

I went on one trip in the late 1970's near the California-Oregon border. There were five people in our party, and we camped about one mile from a river.

I didn't catch a thing, and probably didn't have more than five or six bites the entire trip. Other people were catching trout and even salmon along the river.

But we had bad luck. I think between the five of us, three or four trout were caught and they weren't very big.

To make matters worse, it rained a couple of nights and we

had a leak in our tent!

I came back from the trip with a cold that lasted almost a week.

When I was a young boy, I enjoyed fishing off piers on the California coast with my father, grandfather and cousin. We used to catch perch, kingfish, sole and other fish.

There was usually a wide variety of fish we could catch and it didn't take long to catch them. Sometimes I even caught two fish at one time!

But I've always had trouble catching fish in mountain streams of lakes.


There seems to be more of a challenge to fishing in mountains or streams. Unless I catch something, my patience wears thin after about an hour.

But I plan to develop more patience in the next few weeks.

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

As a Rotarian, Hemphill said he will be preparing enchiladas on Tuesday, April 16. But on April 17, he will have his long awaited day on the golf course.




Moncor has new officers

Contract renewals fuel school board controversy

Personnel action at the Capitan Board of Education meeting Thursday created an evening of controversy which carried over to a special meeting Friday night.

The controversy began with the recommendation not to renew football coach Gary Thompson's contract. His contract was not renewed at Friday's special meeting.

Contracts for John Blep, E.C. Jenkins, Jane Callahan and Sue Carter were also not renewed.

The board decided to hold the special meeting Friday night to deal with Thursday's unresolved personnel recommendations.

The Thompson recommendation was debated by parents and students who attended Thursday's meeting.

Schoolboard president Mark Delgado told the group they could not legally give the reasons for recommending non-renewal.

The board had discussed personnel in a special session Tuesday night. The parents and students said they felt that changing coaches was damaging to the team spirit.

Thompson came to Capitan at the beginning of this school year.

Capitan has had a high turnover of coaches.

Pat Huey, a Capitan parent, stated he felt the school was trying to kill the sports program.

"Us kids are hurting," said student Tiffany Huey.

The board and attending parents and students reviewed grade standards in a discussion of academics versus athletics. Many parents did not know a that a student is required to pass four out of six required classes, with a minimum grade of "D."

Superintendent Leonard Hays said national studies showed that students involved in activities excel.

"They have drive," Hays stated. The group appealed to the board to reconsider Thompson's contract.

Parent-Teacher Organization president Linda Fuchs said she felt the issue went beyond one man's contract, to the question of the board's trust in the people.

"This is not the most comfortable chair I've sat in, or made decisions out of," said board member Preston Stone.

Parent Bob Marrs suggested the board meet with Thompson in a private session to satisfy questions about his qualifications.

The group requested Thompson be called to meet with the board. Thompson was not available on Thursday, so the board tabled action on all unrenewed contracts until the Friday night meeting.

At Thursday's meeting, the board announced the renewal of several contracts, including tenure for three teachers: Sherry Ford, Kendal Lawlis, and Pam Noriega.

Contracts were approved for Mecca Aldridge, Becky Angel, Jim Bizzell, Mary Cates, Ann Dark, Mark Daugherty, Rosana Delgado, Diane Effthimion, Richard Effthimion, Idy Eldridge, Mary Halkins, Laura Jones, Bill MacVeigh and Dottie MacVeigh.

Contracts were also renewed for Deanne Outhouse, David Collins, Amy Riddle, Louella Roberts, Aurora Sanchez, Mary Shanks, Sornie Silva, Linda Smith, Susan Smith, Bill Stowe, Pat Sullivan, Linda Turnbow and Richard Valenzuela.

At Friday's meeting, the board accepted architectural proposals from Jim French for the new cafeteria and library buildings.

Safe bus driving awards were presented to Johnny Johnson and Cotton Baker for one year's safe driving records.

Roger Garner received a two-

year award and Ruby Trost was given a three-year award. Rosa Montoya and Gwendia McDaniels were given eight-year awards.

Nora Silva was honored with 17 years of accident-free driving.

The 1985-86 calendar was approved with classes set to begin August 19. Holidays (days off) will include Labor Day on September 2, hunting day on November 15 and Thanksgiving, November 28-29. Christmas break was set from December 23-January 3.

Other days off will be Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday on January 20, President's Day on February 17, Good Friday on March 28 and Memorial Day on May 28. Spring break is scheduled March 31-April 4. May 28 will be the last day of school.

Snow make-up days will be January 20, February 17 and March 28.

An appraisal was given for the property proposed for exchange with the United States Forest Service. The property which the school wishes to acquire and trade is north of the school and belongs to United New Mexico Bank.

The property was appraised at \$6,100 an acre. The building on the land was appraised at just below

\$100,000. The board approved the report to be offered to the Forest Service and to the bank.

Policy handbook changes were approved. Certified personnel will have substitutes paid by the school for jury duty. Mileage and anything past eight hours of duty will be paid to the person. Snow days, salary schedule for non-certified personnel, jury duty and court-leave changes were approved. Policy for reporting child abuse and neglect was also approved.

In the fiscal report, Hays said the cafeteria would have enough money to finish the school year, but would have nothing to begin next school year.

He also reported the cut of 12 cents per federally financed school lunch, beginning next year. Lunches currently cost \$1.10 for the school to make. The report was approved.

Other school board business included:

—Approval of the low bid from auditors McKay and Company of Clovis for the 1985 audit.

—Approval of budgeted athletic fund.

—Approval of unbudgeted activity fund, which included a report on the senior trip to Disneyland.

—The quarterly cash report of

\$207,240 was approved. Hays said this would cover salaries for the rest of the year.

Hays reported his cancellation of the proposed trip to Columbia University this summer.

—Board President Mark Delgado reported on his recent trip to California to attend the National School Board Association Convention.


As state school board president, Delgado attended the convention as a delegate. Although he was unable to attend the many workshops, he said he gained ideas from his experiences that he will use in dealing with the state board.

He said all his trips and activities are not paid by for the Capitan school board, but by the State Board Association and Fort Stanton Training School and Hospital.

—A request was made for input into options in health and life insurance, which now must be bid.

Just as things were looking really hopeless, and dark storm clouds of misinformation were closing in, a suggestion at the Tuesday night Ruidoso Village Council meeting revealed a ray of sunlight and the promise of proper communication between members of the council and the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission.

The suggestion, by Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) chairman Greg Masters, is to have at least one member of the council present at all P&Z meetings and at least one member of P&Z at all council meetings.

Hurrah!! At an earlier meeting, P&Z members expressed willingness to go along with the plan. For each council member, if they agree to the plan, it will mean attending a P&Z meeting just once every 12 weeks—a small investment in time for a great gain in communications.

And why do I think it will be such a great gain in communications?

Recently, it was learned that some friction between the two groups was developing over the issue of administrative reviews to rezone property in the village. Several recommendations from the commission to the council for action on rezones had been returned

to the commission for more study, often without reason for the return.

In addition, councillors questioned the need for the administrative reviews and specifically asked the commission to explain their reasons for a decision on a recent review.

Apparently, those council actions aroused the ire of some commission members.

Comments by commission members at a recent P&Z meeting such as "They (the councillors) are the ones that don't know what's going on," "We've made our decision, now you make yours," "I'm not sure they understand zoning," and "If they want to be informed, they can come to our meetings," seem to indicate building friction.

But at Tuesday's council meeting, commission members either remained silent on the issue or downplayed and denied that any friction exists.

So comes the need for improved communications. A member of each group at the other's meetings will certainly help to clear up apparent misconceptions and misunderstandings and provide for more efficient working of village government.

Hopefully, councillors will think so too, and take the time to fit P&Z meetings into their busy schedules.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Let's try to separate and simplify some things that lawmakers and Governor have gotten all snarled up together.

Point One: We can't allow the state capitol to be shut down.

That's a simple declarative sentence, and it is meant to be so. It is put that way to imply that the opposite cannot be true—that those who believe closing the capitol is in any way an acceptable action are wrong, totally wrong.

Just imagine the three major television networks here covering the first state capitol in American history to be locked up, and you can see we would become the laughingstock of the nation if we let this happen.

Therefore, the Legislature must enact and the Governor must sign legislation to fund operation of the building. They must get that done at the special session the Governor has called even if they do nothing else whatsoever.

That would imply that it must be the first order of business, not the last.

Point Two: We need interim legislative committees.

This is a different subject, and the reasoning to support this statement is different. The two items should not be joined, as legislators tried to do to force the Governor to approve both.

To consider operating a Legislature without its support staffs is to pretend that we can move back to the days of the high collar and button shoes. This writer, like some others, knows from experience what lawmaking was like when we had no such supporting operations; we must not allow childish stubbornness to cripple the legislative process by sending it back to the dark ages.

The Governor should remove himself from this battle entirely. He only got into it on behalf of some crybaby liberals who don't want conservatives, while they are in power, treating liberals the way liberals treated conservatives when the liberals were in power.

Therefore, the legislators should, between themselves, arrive at a solution to this problem that both

sides can live with. That will require some giving from each. Both should remember that when we talk of compromise, we do not mean total capitulation by the other side.

This, too, should be settled and set to one side before lawmakers take up any other business.

Point Three: The citizens of the state do not want another session of juvenile squabbling about who are the good guys and who are the bad guys.

What the citizens want is sensible, positive lawmaking for the good of all.

The self-gratifying rhetoric that does nothing but exacerbate differences has to stop, no matter whose mouth it is coming out of.

Beside this writer's desk is a stack of paper that is nineteen and a half inches high. It contains nothing but the bills which were introduced into the early 1985 legislative session, substitutes for those bills recommended by committees and amendments to them that were proposed. It makes up a pile of 1,823 cubic inches of almost pure futility. Few of those bills were passed, and most of what did pass was unimportant or only minimally helpful.

The people do not want any more of that kind of thing—this year or any other year. They do not take lightly the activities of men and women who ask to be elected so they can serve, and then fall to do so. They do not want to hear any more alibis or attempts to blame others for what has gone on; they will only be satisfied if Governor and legislators cease acting like children and begin acting like responsible elected officials.

People who ask us to vote for them would be wise to heed these words. In fact, they could do a lot worse than to meditate on them. These ideas accurately express the sentiments of the majority of New Mexicans who concern themselves with such matters.

Again, to put things as simply and clearly as possible, if the sorry spirit which prevailed before ruins another legislative session, sudden political death faces those responsible when they next come before the electorate of New Mexico.

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Sense & Nonsense

Here is a recipe for disaster. Fold in two cups of Congressional good intention into a mix of business tax deductions. Add three tablespoons of new Internal Revenue Service regulations. Mix together with spices of lack of public awareness and Congressional oversight. Allow to stand for several months till it comes to a boil.

What Congress and the IRS hoped for was a tasty dish that would close a business depreciation tax loophole for the rich. What actually came out of this recipe was a poorly prepared stew of angry taxpayers and confused citizens which has left a bad taste in

everyone's mouth.

The problem all started when Congress tried to close a loophole which allowed individuals to depreciate and take large investment tax credits on luxury automobiles used for business purposes on their tax forms. Congress' intention was that this tightening of the law would prevent abuse by businessmen and professionals who routinely took tax write-offs from their personal vehicle. These cars were, in many cases, expensive luxury automobiles.

But somewhere between Congressional intent and the Internal Revenue Service, a problem occurred. The IRS suddenly required that all vehicles used for any business purposes carry a detailed daily log of mileage traveled on business. Furthermore, if a log was not kept on vehicle use, the taxpayer could not claim a depreciation deduction on their vehicle for business purposes.

This got everyone's attention in the farming and business community because it made everyone angry. Farmers and ranchers were angry because they had little or no spare time available to be scribbling in a log book when there was work to be done. In fact, many of their farm vehicles were so old that the odometers were broken.

Employers who had company vehicles which were used by employees during working hours, such as repairmen, construction

workers and oil field workers, were angry because they found it extremely difficult to get their workers to keep a detailed log for them. It was unnecessary since their vehicles were surely used only for business purposes; few employers would allow their employees to take the company vehicles home with them.

I received in my office so many letters on this problem from so many different New Mexicans in every sector of the economy, that it exceeded mail flow on any one issue ever, including Social Security reform. I would bet that every Senator and Representative received as much comment on this issue as I did, and many of us contacted the IRS to get them to back off.

The IRS did, and under their new rules, there is an easing of this strict logging of mileage on vehicles used for business purposes. For farmers, those who make 70 percent or more of their gross income from farming, the IRS gives the option of either keeping records of personal use of farm vehicles only or keeping no records and treating 80 percent of the vehicle mileage as business use and 20 percent as personal.

Any vehicle that an employee uses during working hours, but leaves on the employer's premises during non-working hours and only uses it for brief personal stops such as lunch breaks, does not require a log book. This IRS provision should help small

businesses, repairmen, oil and gas employees, and construction workers.

For police officers and those that are on call 24 hours a day and have to take their company vehicle home, then the IRS requires that the vehicle not be used personally, except for short trips. In this case, the employer treats the commuting as a taxable fringe benefit and adds an amount to the employee's income. The IRS suggested \$4 a day.


For everyone else not qualifying for the above, such as realtors, salespersons and other businesses where time is spent in their personal vehicle visiting clients, job sites or making calls, the IRS allows an option to either keep personal use records of the vehicles or treat 70 percent of the use as business and 30 percent as personal. If the vehicle is a commercial vehicle, the IRS allows an 80-20 split between business and personal use.

This is a good start by the IRS in correcting what has been a horrendous nightmare for many taxpayers. I have joined 53 other Senators in co-sponsoring S-260, which would remove the requirement that a taxpayer must maintain logs on business vehicles to claim a tax deduction. Congress' intent was to correct abuses of the law for business vehicle deduction, not to place an additional burden of written proof on the individual or small business taxpayer.



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
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
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
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Book amnesty announced

Service Club attempts reorganization

When the Ruidoso Service Club Council (SCC) met recently, the minutes of the previous meeting were dated February 1, 1979.

Barbara Duff presided over the reorganizational meeting. She asked representatives from 15 groups if they felt there was a need for a council. She explained that the SCC was active in the late 1970s, until it "became an arm of the Chamber of Commerce, got shoved aside and forgotten."

That explained the six-year time lapse between meetings.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers has pledged his support for the new SCC, and even offered the use of a meeting room in the chamber building. Duff explained that the group was not obligated to return to its former status as an arm of the chamber, but declared her appreciation for Jeffers' support.

Duff said the SCC has a constitution and bylaws that include a stated meeting the first Thursday of each month. Local organizations may join, pay dues and become eligible to send a voting delegate to each SCC meeting.

The documents will be revised after delegates to the recent meeting report back to their organizations and decide whether or not to be involved in the organization.

A major part of the monthly meetings was to review activities of each club. A calendar of events was distributed among member organizations.

Those things were in keeping with a major objective of the SCC, which was to encourage cooperation among service groups and avoid duplication of effort. That will remain a goal of the new group.

Duff gave a short history of the

"old" SCC's accomplishments, which included an early 1970s town meeting to solve a problem with gangs.

"By the time the meeting was over the word was out and we had no more trouble with gangs," Duff stated. She shared her view that a united group could accomplish most anything.

Representatives at the meeting were Carl Foerster, who is organizing a children's home and training to become a police chaplain; Kerry Boyd, representing Sertoma; and Jean Shillman for Spirit of Ruidoso.

Others were Nancy Radziewicz, an SCC organizer who also works with Special Olympics; Mary Lou Gooch, representing Friends of the Library; and Cal Cowden, a delegate from the American Legion, the Evening Lions Club, the Boy Scouts and senior citizens.

Also present were Rod Adamson from the Rotary Club; Bill Rawlins of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association; Ann Goodwin from Rio Ruidoso Lioneses; and Gwyneth Jones, representing the Lincoln County Democratic Women.

Attending the meeting for the Inter-agency Council was J. L. Wilson; for the Altrusa Club, Wilma Sandoval; and representing the Humane Society of Lincoln County, Cyndy Livingston.

Other representatives at the organizational meeting were Ruth Moore and Blanche Love of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary; Orby Neatherlin of the Extension Club; and Bonnie Richardson of the Ruidoso School of Gymnastics and Creative Fitness.

Delegates reported on happenings in their organizations, and commented on the desirability of meeting as a "clearing house" for ideas and help.

"I learned that there's a lot of energy in this room," Radziewicz

commented after hearing a long list of projects from the representatives.

Duff charged attendees to report to their clubs and appear at the next SCC meeting ready to make a decision on the fate of the council.

Muddle Through."

There are times in every winter when we have to "muddle through"; and have now done this in fine style. Now we are out on the level ground with the green grass all around, the air filled with the sweet perfume of many blossoms and all the hillsides and glens echoing with the songs of birds, their melodies in harmonious tune with the rejoicing in our hearts.

Birthday of John
Our Eldest Brother

In April, the month of awakening of new life—when the apple blossoms are in their prime pink and white and their fragrance brings you sacred memories; when

the perfume of the purple lilac casts a benediction around the yard; when the robin's springtime serenade echoes "from glen to glen"; and the baby calves go dancing and prancing over the green fields beside their proud mothers, falls then the birthday of our elder brother, John, on the fifteenth, today.

John Whippo Storm was born April fifteen, 1907, in Denver, Colorado in the home of his maternal grandparents, to Lynn Whippo Storm and the former Bertha Catherine Kennedy. He was named for his grandfather, John Calvin Kennedy, captain in the 18th Illinois Cavalry in the Civil War, and later Adjutant General of the state of Colorado.

His middle name is handed down from Quakers of English descent who settled in Pennsylvania and were active in what was called the "Underground Railway," made famous in the novel by Harriet Beecher Stowe, "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

At the age of one year and nine months, he set sail with his mother from Seattle on the steam ship, Yucatan, bound for Valdez, Alaska.

In late January, 1909, they arrived to see this northern-most, all-year port city all but buried in one of the heaviest snowfalls on record up to that time, and long afterwards.

Our father had gone ahead a few months before, and there was a warm welcome at the dock. Young children were scarce in the little pioneer city of the northland, and the people made much over John and our mother.

Excitement and hope was in the air, for gold had been found around Valdez and on across Valdez Pass in the interior.

You have heard it said of a town that the people were "all one big, happy family." This was not just a by-word in Valdez of 1909. Practically the whole town turned out to meet the boats from Seattle and San Francisco; many were at the dock to bid the journeymen fair sailing.

I came into the picture October twenty-seven, 1909, and John

became my guardian. Beginning when I was around two years of age, we would walk down town to Mr. Hunt's drug and candy store. (In those days entire stores were devoted to nothing but candy.)

I remember on winter days, John would go ahead and about "rush" to the Malamute sled dogs lounging on the sidewalk in their harness. The dogs, looking the size of horses to me, would very obediently get up and make way for us.

At the store we bought taffy in three colors; vanilla white, chocolate brown, and strawberry pink. People would buy us jelly beans, striped peppermint candy, apples and oranges. Everything you could want came up on the boats.

Loaded down, we would make our way back home and John, age four or five, would clear out the Malamutes again. From those days practically through our lives, John was my protector and guardian.

All his boyhood and youth, John was an altar boy in the Episcopal church and studied for the Episcopal priesthood at Kenyon College in Gambler, Ohio. He later studied architecture, art and engineering at the University of Texas.

In World War II he served as a lieutenant in the Army Engineers in the Pacific.

As I write this on the eve of John's birthday, I feel his presence close, and I know that from Heaven he is my guardian brother still.

Miss Johnson lists Lena Horne, Robert Wagner, John Forsythe, Jimmy Stewart and Linda Evans as her favorite interview subjects.

During a break in the filming of a recent televised interview at Miss Evans' home, the "Dynasty" star said to her interviewer, "I can't believe I'm telling you these things."

Miss Johnson's eyes widen as she tells the story. "That's the greatest compliment I could ever get," she says.

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



Lavish Biblical epics seem to have gone the way of the expensive Hollywood musical. Perhaps the trend ran its course; perhaps today's movie audiences simply aren't ready to accept ancient heroes; perhaps religion is too touchy a subject for "liberated" Hollywood impresarios.

Yet the TV miniseries "Masada" was quite successful a few years back, so there seems to be a market for a well-told Biblical epic. Unfortunately, this semi-lavish version of "King David," starring Richard Gere, doesn't fit the bill.

The story of David facing Goliath is as classic a tale as any in Western culture. And the story of his fall from grace when he becomes infatuated with the married Bathsheba should provide enough tension and drama for any movie.

But no matter how timeless the story, its success depends on how it is told.

In this version, Australian director Bruce Beresford is at the helm. On the surface, the choice looks good. Beresford

has dealt successfully with the themes of faith and justice in "Tender Mercies" and "Breaker Morant."

But those movies were made on a much smaller scale, and when it comes to handling large crowds, chariot races, and epic battles, Beresford is no Cecil B. DeMille.

Anyone who has read the Bible can tell you that it is filled with a lot of beheading and beheading. So is this film. Even before the opening credits, heads are lopped off in gory detail. The battle scenes may be void of epic expanse, but they are filled with colorful carnage worthy of "Conan the Barbarian."

As for Richard Gere, he does his best in a role in which the action sometimes jumps forward several years between scenes and the motivation for his character is provided by some half-hearted narration.

"King David" may be part of the greatest story ever told, but this time out, it could have been told better.

CBS will bring the action on the Augusta National Golf Club, supplying five-and-a-half hours of air time. This will be the network's 30th year of Masters Tournament coverage.

But the Masters seems to be the only big tournament CBS has grabbed for some time, while ABC has been cottoning to golf the way it once threw its arms around boxing.


ABC announced back in January that it signed three of golf's four Grand Slam tournaments — the Masters, the U.S. Open, the British Open and the Professional Golfer's Tournament — to a multi-year agreement that will carry through to the end of the decade.

The network has been televising the U.S. Open for 20 years, and in 1977 started covering all 18 holes of the tournament's final day. For the past eight years, ABC has televised the entire 18 holes of the last two days, making it the only network to give fans such complete coverage.

The British Open has been televised by ABC since 1962, when it appeared as part of the "ABC's Wide World of Sports." This will be the fifth consecutive year in which live coverage of the historic tournament's third and final rounds will be presented.

ABC has been televising the PGA Tournament since 1965.

Does the helmet make the team?

Now that they've been paraded about the gridiron for nearly three years, are the uniforms worn by the USFL franchises finally seeping into your spring fashion tube-consciousness? Granted, no single article of clothing as hideous as the original Denver Broncos' vertically striped socks has been unveiled. Nor any concept as wrong-headed as the WFL's color-coded-by-position pants. But isn't that commendable?

hand, were, for better or worse, students of the NFL. The reverberating maroon stars on the Stars' gold dome recall the Dallas Cowboys insignia, albeit seen during a drunken and dizzy stupor. The Bulls, in their silver and brown, extend the Seattle Seahawk logo beyond its capabilities by joining the hindquarters of their matching rampaging bulls with the word "BULLS" — in case their fans forget.

Two teams did get their money's worth. The Houston Gamblers get to strut around in blue/black helmets that have a bodacious bright red "G" on the sides and a silhouette of Texas ensconced within the curl of the letter. It's a headpiece worthy of Jim Kelly.

Then there is the helmet destined to be remembered, even after the USFL is long gone. It belongs to the Portland (nee New Orleans nee Boston) Breakers. Coincidentally, the expressionistic aspect of this helmet alludes to the Breakers' eternal search for a permanent resting place. A Breaker moves about with gray and blue waves rolling across his entire skullcap. You almost expect a gull to perch on a Breaker's head. You can hear the boom and sizzle of the surf emanating from a Breaker's body. The Breakers have yet to make the playoffs.

Movie Nostalgia

The year was 1934, and the Marx Brothers were in trouble. "Duck Soup," considered a classic today, had flopped at the box office. In April, The Los Angeles Times described the funny men as "washed up." Several months later, The New York Times reported that movie studios were looking upon the brothers "with a degree of disinterest." Indeed, Paramount, the studio where Groucho, Harpo, Chico and Zeppo had made such classics as "Animal Crackers" (1930) and "Horse Feathers" (1932), was reluctant to renew their contract. The Marx Brothers were in trouble. You could have bet your life.

The next year at M-G-M, "A Night at the Opera" re-established them as Hollywood's funniest funny men. Today, many critics hail "Opera" as the greatest Marx Brothers film ever made. Its plot isn't important — the film revolves around the zaniness that takes place when the stuffy worlds of opera and high society tangle with the Marxes — but the cast's highly disciplined performances are.

"Opera" boasts several classic scenes, but the most famous is the celebrated scene in which person after person after person is stuffed into a small stateroom. It was Marx lunacy at its best.

Damon's and Loring's personal stake

A lot of the daytime serial actors donate their time and energies to charities, but Stuart Damon (Alan Quartermaine of "General Hospital") and Gloria Loring (Liz Curtis on "Days of Our Lives") have very personal reasons for devoting as much time as they do to the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation.

Miss Loring's son Brennan and Damon's son Christopher are victims of the disease. Both parents were recently very much in attendance at the First Juvenile Diabetes Foundation national telethon in Atlantic City, N.J.

"We raised close to \$2.5 million, and our phones rang for days after the telethon was over," says Miss Loring, who was the celebrity chairman for the telethon, which was held at the Tropicana Hotel.

"We're already setting a date for next year, and we're hoping to have the 1986 telethon in the Tropicana's new 1,700 seat theater," continues Miss Loring, who has been donating all the proceeds from her current record album, "A Shot in the Dark," to the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation. "We got a lot of feedback from people who said they hadn't understood diabetes, and they were grateful for the information the telethon provided them with. That was one of the most impor-

tant things we felt we were going to do this first year."

"We're trying to help find a cure for diabetes," says Damon. Damon and his wife Deidre are both on the board of directors of the Los Angeles chapter of the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation.

"We're trying to raise a lot of money for the scientists and the doctors that are presently working to find a cure for diabetes. If we can keep up the intensity of the work, we're all convinced that within five years there's going to be a cure," says Damon, who related that his son Christopher's condition has leveled off in recent months.

Says Miss Loring, "We hope that the telethon drew attention to the seriousness and the complexity of diabetes as well as to the enormous progress and hope (for a cure) that we have directly in front of us."
