Street Dept. to prioritize

Preliminary budgets for the Financial Administration and Solid Waste departments were approved at Thursday budget hearings by the Ruidoso Village Council, but action on the Street Department preliminary budget was delayed.

After extensive discussion of the department budget, councillors asked Street Department head Jack LaMay to return with a prioritized list of village street projects.

Councillors questioned the 25 percent increase in the new budget over last year's budget. They seemed particularly concerned about a 47 percent increase in personnel, which included hiring of five new workers.

LaMay indicated that the budget included all work planned on streets during the next year, and what materials, equipment and personnel it would take to do it. Much of the work is for repair of damage still left over from last year's floods, including \$105,000 for replacement of the Paradise Canyon bridge.

Several councillors indicated support of cutting back on funds for snow removal. It was learned that snow removal on Sudderth and Mechem drives is the responsibility of the State Highway Department since both roads are part of

Highway 37.

"Let the state pick up the pressure," Councillor Victor Alonso said.

But consideration of the cut lost steam when village administration officials and Mayor George White pointed out that previous attempts to bring about snow removal by the state have been unsuccessful.

"We're looking at a dead horse," White advised on the subject.

Councillor Rick Evans said he would like to see a priority put on completing the rest of the emergency repairs necessitated by last year's flooding.

LaMay and village administration officials agreed to rework the complex budget and return with a list of prioritized projects, their costs, and reasons for their priority. Also, a report on the department's vehicle take-home policy will be presented.

Financial Administration head Judy Franzer reported that she would be leaving the department in about a month. She said that through a reworking of responsibilities, the void left by her absence can be filled by existing personnel in the department. This negates the need for hiring a new worker, Franzer reported.

The preliminary Financial Administration Department budget is 14 percent below that of last year, it was learned. The budget dropped

from \$283,068 last year to \$243,067 this year.

Councillors praised the department head on her efforts.

"Very well run, very efficient," commented White of the department.

Councillors had few questions on the budget of Solid Waste Department head Leonard Corona. Corona, who was just appointed to the post a week ago, presented a budget of \$617,828—a 16 percent reduction over last year's budget of \$737,636. According to village manager Jim Hine, revenue from trash collection fees will make up about \$590,000 of the budget, with the rest coming from leftover funds from last year.

The budget includes a 47 percent reduction in capital outlay expense, due to less money going for completion of the trash compaction transfer system and for replacement of dumpsters than was spent last year.

The purchase of two new garbage trucks for the department was discussed. It was learned that such a purchase probably will come from an earmarking of revenue sharing funds if councillors decide to buy the trucks.

Al Junge proposed that use of a department flatbed truck to collect excess refuse from residences could raise more funds for the department. He estimated that yearly revenues of \$8,000 to \$10,000 are possible.

Banks and businesses aiding chamber

Local banks and businesses will aid the financially ailing Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce with voluntary contributions, reported chamber executive director John Jeffers Friday.

Ruidoso State Bank and The Bank of Ruidoso have agreed to a one-time contribution to the chamber, according to Jeffers. He said the amounts of the donations could not be revealed at this time.

Jeffers said he was awaiting word from the other financial institutions that have out-of-town headquarters.

The chamber is distributing notices stating that it is in a "serious financial bind," and asking for a one-time voluntary contribution of \$100 or more. So far, 22 businesses have agreed to par-

ticipate, Jeffers said. Participating establishments are Carrigan Realty, Mountain Productions, Inn of The Mountain Gods, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital and Century 21-Aspen Real Estate.

Also on the list are Texas-New Mexico Power, Ruidoso Travel, The Painted Lady, The Roadrunner, Lincoln County Cablevision and Ruidoso Cleaners.

Ruidoso Lodge Cabins, Morgan's Mountain Sports, Quality Inn, Brunell's, Wild West Ski Shop and Dan Dee Cabins also are donating money.

Ending the list compiled so far are attorney Ron Harris, Don's Pharmacy, Storybook Cabins, Susan and Associates and Ruidoso Management.

Other businesses have volunteered to give a portion of their daily business on certain items this week. Baskin Robbins-31

Flavors will give 21 cents on all quarter-pound ice cream cones sold from Monday through Thursday, April 22 to 25.

The AAA Car Wash will donate part of its car wash price of \$5.95 all day Wednesday, April 23. Shaver Tire and Auto will give an oil filter and lube for \$14.95 on Thursday, April 25, and donate part of the proceeds to the chamber. Nottingham's Pub will do the same for every \$5.25 prime dip sandwich sold this Thursday.

Jeffers said any other business in town that would like to be involved with this form of donation should call the chamber office.

"Nobody wants the chamber down the tubes," said Jeffers.

Jeffers said the chamber would raise at least \$25,000 through donations. He said the money would pay off the current debts and make it easier for the chamber to take out a \$25,000 loan if needed to make it through the rest of the fiscal year. The chamber originally was planning to take out a \$50,000 loan.

Jeffers said community response to the donation program has been positive from those contacted so far.

Ruidoso officials and those from the surrounding area attended the district meeting of the New Mexico Municipal League Wednesday in Tularosa.


Attending the meeting from Ruidoso were Mayor George White, Councillor Jerry Shaw, village manager Jim Hine, assistant village manager Frank Potter and village employees Laurie Durham and Donna Hendricks.

Also at the meeting were officials from Ruidoso Downs and Capitan. Representatives from most municipalities in Lincoln and Otero counties attended the district meeting.

Speaking to the members were Clarence Lithgow, director of the New Mexico Local Governments Division, and William Fulginiti, executive director of the Municipal League.

Lithgow outlined steps necessary for proper submission of local governments' budgets to the state. He reminded officials that budgets must be kept in line with revenues. "Deficit spending in New Mexico is prohibited," he cautioned.

Fulginiti reported on legislation from the recent session of the New Mexico Legislature that affects

municipalities. He pointed out that the low number of bills passed during the session resulted in few changes in the law for municipalities.

Of House Bill 511—the so-called "tax swap"—Fulginiti reported that the stand of the League always has been that taxes should remain as they are, but that if a change had to be made, 511 was acceptable.

"We could have lived with it," he said. The director expressed doubt that the measure would be brought up again for discussion during the

upcoming special session.

In response to a question from Potter, Fulginiti predicted that no specific parts of the capital outlay bill would be heard during the special session unless picked out by Governor Toney Anaya in his session call. The \$1.1 million Ruidoso-Lincoln County direct appropriation request is part of the capital outlay bill.

Also during the meeting, members heard League personnel discuss procurement and municipal elections.

Children's home organizers find land

"We've got a place, and that's really exciting," Carl Foerstner reported. He is organizing a children's home in Lincoln County through REACH, INC.

Foerstner and other home organizers have located 35 acres six miles from Ruidoso Downs, and are arranging financing for the property.

"We're going to purchase it from the owner at a greatly reduced price," Foerstner said. Billy Francis of Louisiana owns the riverfront land, and has told Foerstner he is very interested in working with REACH.

"I didn't find him, I found the land," Foerstner said with a laugh. He has looked at land throughout the county. He was thrilled to find the perfect land, and then discover the owner was interested in helping children.

The irrigated riverfront land is ideal for the home. REACH intends to use the land as a learning tool for "hurting youngsters" who become its residents.

They will be caretakers as well as residents of the land—with vegetable gardening and animals.

Foerstner said REACH will run the children's facility through a board of regents. "Anyone interested in being a friend of the home is invited to become involved," Foerstner said.

Although REACH plans to do much more than serve the home's residents, Foerstner explained that getting the facility built and operational will be the first priority.

The first phase will include a water system, roads, two dormitories, the director's home and purchase of two 15-passenger vans. The phase will begin as soon as the land purchase is finalized.

The director's home will be a multi-use facility. It will serve as a reception area for visitors and will

be used for counseling sessions and meetings.

That philosophy of getting the most use out of every part of the facility is consistent throughout Foerstner's plans.

Phase two will include a dining hall and kitchen, two more dormitories, two more vans, an outdoor recreational area, administration buildings, gardens and shop complex. That phase is set to begin in 1997.

"For right now we need to get the place developed and get a couple of dorms out there," Foerstner said.

Although pet adoption week was set as the first week in April, that activity is ongoing. A goal of the local Humane Society and village animal control is to place homeless animals in good homes.

Pets are nearly always available at the Fort Stanton shelter, and adoptions also can be arranged through the Humane Society. Call 257-2027 or 257-9128 for more information on pet adoptions.

The Clutter Shop is offering specials on pet-care products throughout April.

Dr. E. C. Leslie of Mountain View



Animal Clinic offers the following advice to families contemplating adopting an animal:

—1. Analyze why a pet is being added to the family, and select a suitable animal. A different kind of pet might be selected for a child's playmate than for an adult's companion.

—2. Remember that a new pet takes a great deal of time for housebreaking and discipline.

—3. Find out as much as possible about an animal to be adopted. If possible find out where it came from, and why it is at the animal shelter.

—4. Spend some time with the animal before taking it home.

—5. Take a new pet to a veterinarian and have it checked out as soon as possible.

—6. If the animal is pronounced healthy by the veterinarian, then have it vaccinated.

Once an animal is adopted or purchased, Leslie advises implementing sound nutritional and exercise habits. He recommends feeding dogs a "high-quality commercial dog food."

Although good canned and dry foods have about the same nutritional values, the dry food promotes healthier teeth and gums.

"Exercise is definitely desirable and very important to pet health," Leslie said. He explained that overweight animals are more susceptible to arthritis, heart disease and other serious health problems.

There are lots of things to consider in the care of an animal. Cindy Livingston, president of the Humane Society of Lincoln County, offers the following common-sense pet-care tips:

—1. Don't give cats aspirin or Tylenol.

—2. Don't spray, dip or shampoo a cat, kitten or puppy with or in anything not specifically labeled for use on pets.

—3. Don't leave a dog or cat in a hot car.

—4. Keep laundry detergent, bleach, insecticide, fertilizers, antifreeze and mothballs safely secured from animals. Remember that some houseplants are poisonous to animals. Some that might endanger pets are philodendron, English ivy, dieffenbachia and caladium.

—5. If a pet swallows a toxic substance, don't induce vomiting until consulting a veterinarian.

—6. Animals don't need to bathe very often; excessive baths dry their skin.

—7. Don't give a dog or cat a small bone.

—8. Have pets checked at least once a year for worms.

—9. Don't scold or correct a pet for making "puddles" if nobody was home to let the animal outdoors.

—10. Keep electrical cords out of reach of new puppies. Livingston and other Humane Society members want to ensure healthy and safe living conditions for animals.

Other PAW activities they have planned include a Pets and People Photography Contest to highlight Animal Bond Week April 21-27.

Girl netters pick up fifth victory; boys defeated by Lovington Wildcats

The Ruidoso High School girls tennis team took an easy win over visiting Lovington Saturday, but the Warrior boys lost to the Wildcats in action at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Ruidoso raised its girls' district record to 5-1 with a 9-0 win over the Wildcats. Some of the Lovington girls did not show up for the match, so only three matches were played, with Ruidoso winning all of them.

The Warrior boys fell to Lovington by a 7-2 score. Ruidoso is now 3-3 in district action.

Ruidoso's Michele Morrow topped Ginger Blanton 6-0, 6-1, in one of the two singles matches. Warrior teammate Marnie Warlick defeated Donna Ritchy 6-3, 6-3 in the other singles match.

"Michele just played real well," said Warrior coach Mike Crocker. "She's been working on her serves all week and her forehand looked real sharp. Her backhand is always good."

In the only doubles match, Ruidoso's Donna Mobley and Melissa Henderson defeated Ritchy and Blanton 6-2, 6-2.

But the Warrior boys found the going tough against the Wildcats, who equaled their 7-2 victory over Ruidoso in the first meeting between the two teams.

Mitch Rhodes had the only Warrior singles victory, taking a 6-4, 1-6, 6-2 decision over Chris Mauer.

In other singles, Ruidoso's Jim Smith fell to Shannon Wood 6-2, 6-2, in the top match; Mike Smith was beaten by Gabby Rodriguez 7-5, 6-2; Glenn Westergren was defeated by

Dominic Via 6-2, 6-3; Eric Collins fell to Benson Akins 6-4, 6-1; and Clay Grimes dropped a 6-2, 6-2 decision to Jeff Wood.

Zach Swalander, who usually plays at number four singles for Ruidoso, was sick and could not compete in the singles action.

Swalander was able to join teammate Mike Smith in the top doubles match. The Warrior pair lost a 7-5, 6-7, 6-4 decision to Wood and Rodriguez.

Jim Smith and Westergren took a 6-1, 6-7, 6-4 win over Via and Mauer. Rhodes and Collins lost 6-2, 6-1 to Akins and his partner.

"Wood and Rodriguez are real good players," Crocker said. "I felt the match between Wood and Smith (Jim) was a good one."

"I was proud of the level of play in that match."

It was a windy day at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. While Crocker did not want to say that is why the Warrior boys lost, he felt it could have been a factor.

"Those flatland schools are just more used to playing in wind than we are," he said.

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Warriors get good marks, few points in Roswell meet

Ruidoso High School's boys and girls track teams recorded some good times, but found points hard to come by in the 22nd annual Roswell Invitational Friday.

The Warrior boys scored 13 points and the girls scored one. Some of the toughest AAAA and AAA-division teams in the state competed in the invitational.

Cisco Bob again led the Warrior boys, winning the 1,500 meters in a school-record 3:58.12, and taking second in the 3,000 meters in another school record, 8:37.00.

In the 1,500 meters, Bob fought off the challenge of Mayfield's Johann Marmolin for the second straight week.

Marmolin stayed close to the defending state champion for three laps, but Bob pulled away on the final lap for the win.

Ruidoso's Francisco Olvera finished sixth with a 4:23.02 time, a personal best.

In the 3,000 meters, Bob lost to Alamogordo's Paul Morgan, who had beaten the Warrior runner in their first meeting this season.

Bob took the lead at the start and held it until the second-to-last lap. Morgan took a brief lead, but Bob

came back to retake the lead.

However, the short Alamogordo runner overtook Bob on the last turn for the victory. Morgan was timed in 8:37.13.

Sophomore Gabe Tam of Ruidoso was fourth in 9:17.17 and Olvera took sixth in 9:37.01.

"I think Cisco ran well," said Warrior head coach Ronny Maskow. "We think he can get down to 3:55.0 or below in the 1,500 meters, and at least as fast as 8:37 in the 3,000 meters."

Although the Warriors did not score any more points, they had a number of fine performances.

The 1,600-meter relay team of Michael Williamson, Tracy Gann, Brian Davis and Curt McClellan finished sixth in a seasonal best 3:34.70.

Earlier, McClellan had been bothered by a thigh injury and finished with a 2:06.0 in the 800 meters. He has a best of 1:57.79 in that event.

Verlan Edwards improved his best in the pole vault with an 11-0 effort. His previous best had been 9-6.

Jeff Willingham had a throw of 149-10 in the javelin, his second best effort of the season. Russell Easter and Mitch Mullican ran personal bests of 43.4 and 44.4, respectively, in the 300-meter intermediate

hurdles; and Brian Davis ran a 23.7 in the 200 meters, his first competitive effort in that event.

Sherril Alexander picked up Ruidoso's point in the girls competition by finishing fifth in the 3,000 meters. She had a 13:37 time, below her best of 13:21.

Alexander added a personal best of 5:53 in the 1,500 meters. Teammate Yelena Seelbach recorded a personal best of 6:54.

The Warrior 800-meter relay team of Amanda Samuels, Gia Rose, Sheila Shelton and Stacy Ivy ran a 1:56.35, four seconds better than the Warriors' previous best this season. Although it was not a state-qualifying meet, the time was two seconds under qualifying time.

The same quartet ran a Warrior seasonal best of 4:40.0 in the 1,600-meter relay. Ivy cleared 4-7 in the high jump, an inch below her best. She just missed at 4-9.

"I think we're steadily making progress with the district meet coming up," said Warrior girls coach Sergio Castanon. "We're looking forward to competing at the state-qualifying meet in Artesia."

The Artesia meet will be Friday. It will be an afternoon-evening competition, and will be the first state-qualifying meet of the season.

In last year's Ruidoso tournament, Goddard won the AAAA-division title and Socorro took the AAA-division crown. Ruidoso's varsity finished eighth in the AAA division. The Warrior B team was 11th.

Soccer matches postponed


The season-opening Ruidoso Soccer Association matches scheduled last Saturday have been postponed until this weekend.

If Wednesday night's National Basketball Association (NBA) first-round playoff game between Philadelphia and Washington was an accurate indication, the 76ers won't regain the championship they won in 1963.

The championship series should be the same as last season, with the Boston Celtics playing the Los Angeles Lakers. Philadelphia had to struggle to get past the Bullets, with Washington actually ahead in the early stages of the final period. The 76ers are a veteran ballclub which probably won't get better, either in this year's playoffs or next season.

Philadelphia has been rated as one of the league's "super teams" for a number of seasons, but only once—in 1983—did the 76ers really play to their potential.

Boston should win the Eastern Conference and the Lakers will capture the Western Conference.

Actually, the Celtics' main challenger in the Eastern Conference could be Central Division winner Milwaukee.

Milwaukee had a better regular-season record (59-23 to 58-24) than Philadelphia had, and did a good job rebuilding its team this season.

The Detroit Pistons could also be tough in the Eastern Conference playoffs.

In the Western Conference, Los Angeles figures to have a fairly easy time of it.

The Lakers won the Pacific Division by a whopping 20 games over Portland. Los Angeles' 52-20 record was the second best in the league (behind Boston) and was 10 games better than Midwest Division winner Denver's 52-30 record.

Denver might be the only team in the Western Conference with a reasonable chance of defeating Los Angeles. However, the Houston Rockets could be tough in a couple of games with "twin towers" Ralph Sampson and Akeem Olajuwon.

However, the Rockets have won only one of five games against Los Angeles this season.

So it looks like a Boston-Los Angeles rematch in the NBA title series.

No team since the 1969 Celtics has won the title two straight years. But if one team has a chance to break that streak, it's the 1985 Celtics.

Larry Bird and his teammates know how to play team basketball, both offensively and defensively.

Look for Boston to beat the Lakers in seven games.

Other workshops include a discussion of how women's issues affected 1985 legislation, and how twin plants will affect industry in New Mexico.





School board to discuss track suspensions

Suspension of three members of the Capitan High School boys varsity track team will be the subject of a special meeting of the Capitan Board of Education at 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 23, in the administration building. The board will meet at 6:30 p.m. for an executive session prior to the open meeting. According to attorney Richard Askew, three Capitan students were suspended by principal Jay

Dark and superintendent Leonard Hays from participating in varsity track for the rest of the season. Askew stated that he was hired by the mother of one of the students. The suspension allegedly resulted from a beer-drinking incident in a private car returning from the Dexter track meet April 13. Hays said Monday that the three boys had signed an affidavit on Thursday, stating that an adult had purchased the beer for them. The superintendent acknowledged that supervising track coach John Blea has been suspended from

coaching duties for the rest of the season. Blea was in class when The News attempted to contact him Monday morning. Askew filed for a restraining order last week in Otero County District Court. The order sought to allow one of the boys to participate in the state qualifying track meet at Carrizozo this past Saturday. Presiding Judge Sandra Grisham did not sign the restraining order that would have allowed the athletes to compete at Carrizozo. According to Askew, she did not state a reason for her actions.

Askew said he would ask the school board to rescind the decision to suspend the students for the remainder of the season. If the board does not take action, Askew said, a suit will be filed against the school administrators, challenging the legality of the suspension. The pending court date is scheduled for 10 a.m. Friday, April 26, in Otero County District Court at Alamogordo. The Capitan school board is represented by State Board of Education attorney John Kennedy.

P&Z to force compliance of subdivision roads

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) discussed the problem of subdivision roads that do not comply with county regulations. At their regular meeting Thursday night, P&Z approved sending letters to subdividers, requesting compliance to road regulations. P&Z agreed to send letters to developers of subdivisions which had been approved from 1972 to the present time. The subdivisions presenting the most recent and biggest problems will be dealt with first. County manager Suzanne Cox said many non-complying subdivi-

sion roads had not been inspected by the engineer hired previously by the county. Many roads were not dedicated to the county. County attorney Steve Sanders told P&Z that government entities, such as the county, were responsible for enforcing their own regulations. P&Z decided to investigate the issue of road compliance after Ed Pearson, developer of the Pines of Gavilan subdivision, requested a variance on a 75 foot cul-de-sac. The cul-de-sac was a part of a preliminary road inspection. The county subdivision regulations state that a cul-de-sac must be at least 100 feet. Pearson said to comply with regulations would create erosion problems.

P&Z members Walt Wilson and Betty Shreengost had made the on-site inspection. They reported the subdivision road did comply with regulations and that the cul-de-sac was large enough for vehicles to turn around. Cox said she wanted to be sure the school bus and county grading machines would be able to turn around in the cul-de-sac. P&Z recommended the county commissioners grant a variance on the cul-de-sac. Noncomplying roads in Wolf Springs and Wolf Creek Estates Subdivisions were also discussed. P&Z requested Sanders write the subdivider, Dulin Properties and Investments of Lubbock, Texas, inviting a representative to appear at

the next county commissioners meeting concerning the roads. P&Z has contacted the subdivider about the roads three times before. Wilson said the subdivider did not respond to the last two requests sent. If a subdivider does not comply, the county commissioners can revoke the approval of the plat, which would suspend sales in the subdivision. P&Z approved the preliminary plat for Salado Creek Flats subdivision. The Hall Brothers Development Company said they had no claim to water rights. Ben Hall, who is a partner in the company, as well as a P&Z member, did not vote.

On the Village Beat

with

I was very impressed by the presentation BRW planners John McNamara, Rick Pilgrim and Rich Unger made last week at village hall.

BRW is the firm preparing the comprehensive plan for the Village of Ruidoso, and the meeting was sort of a combination progress report/public input hearing/question-and-answer session.

Four "key planning areas"—land use, transportation, public facilities and services, commercial development—will be addressed in the master plan.

Some of the language in the "Goals and Objectives" technical draft is high-sounding but insubstantial. For example:

"Allow urban growth only in a planned, orderly manner to encourage high quality development and create a compact, cost-efficient urban development pattern.

Sounds like something a candidate for village council would say.

But many of the stated aims are meatier. For example:

"Actively promote the use of undeveloped land within the Village which is already served by public facilities and utilities."

This so-called "infill development" makes sense. If water, sewer and other utilities and services are accessible to a property already, that property should be developed before one to which services would have to be extended.

A suggested policy would have the village work with property owners to "resolve any physical constraints" on vacant or underutilized land in the village. I take this to mean that the village might go in and move some earth for a developer, or perhaps install a lift or pressure-reducing station if needed on a water line.

Under the goal of "Develop Sound, Stable Neighborhoods," BRW suggests the objective of creating neighborhoods with a full complement of supportive commercial, institutional and public facilities.

My interpretation is that an isolated subdivision would include commercial property, so people who live there could have a convenience store right in the neighborhood. Other examples of things that could be made part of a subdivision plan are a branch library and a public park.

Ruidoso with a branch library? There aren't enough books in the main library, you say. But one observes something significant watching BRW at work. In many respects, they treat Ruidoso as a growing city—unencumbered, if that's the right word, by any conception of a mountain village.

The planners repeatedly invite community input and stress that the village council will have the final say on the master plan through a public hearing process this summer. But since one basic

premise holds true—that Ruidoso is a growing city—the finished product undoubtedly will reflect BRW's big city bias (if that's the right word).

And I think that's as it should be. After last week's meeting, I mentioned to a longtime resident that BRW had some interesting ideas for Ruidoso.

He said he thought it was good that an outside group had come in to take a look at things.

"There are a lot of us here who are awful close to the trees," he said.

"And can't see the forest," agreed village enforcement officer Paul Davis when I told him the quote.

Paul has worked closely with BRW—helping the planners obtain data—and is looking forward to completion of the comprehensive plan.

The 1976 master plan, which Davis has worked with until now, has been modified so many times that he "wouldn't take it outside in a heavy rainstorm."

Davis acknowledged that it would be nice for the village to have a planner on staff to shepherd the master plan. But he feels the present village staff and "aggressive" Planning and Zoning Commission will be able to implement it.

He did state a concern—that the village might start off by granting a bunch of variances to the plan. We have to give the plan a try first, he said.

Though the nuts and bolts stuff of land use, traffic patterns and such is important, BRW's venture into an image enhancement for Ruidoso really gets one thinking.

Downtown merchant Gary Hall (Nottingham's Pub) was very optimistic about the concept of a unified design theme for that part of town.

He thinks that before anything else is done, however, sidewalks have to be widened. People now cannot walk two abreast or push a baby carriage through midtown, Hall pointed out.

Gary thinks the fact that downtown Ruidoso's architecture lacks a distinctive character contributes to people visiting one time only. Tourists come, look around, say "Big deal," and vacation somewhere else next time.

I drove through downtown after the BRW meeting and looked at the buildings. While many are nice, it's true that they are a collection of styles and colors.

"It's got a long way to go," Gary said. "And we need somebody to give us direction."

That somebody is BRW, and they stand ready to work with Ruidoso on what Ruidoso wants. Paul Davis seconded the planners' suggestion that interested individuals talk to village councillors, P&Z members and village staff.

"There's no such thing as a stupid question," said Paul. "Unless it isn't asked."

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Lobbyists are the silent but powerful minority.

Since nobody appears to have asked their opinion of what is going on in legislative politics, this column decided to do so.

The result is nothing but what ad people call "a mother-in-law survey"—that is, it's small in scope and worth exactly as much as you think it is.

It turns out, however, that the opinion most often expressed can be fairly summarized in the words of one veteran of the lobbying wars: "What do I think of the people now in power in the House and Senate? Not much. You make your pitch to them and think you've got them convinced, and they aren't there when the vote comes. They try too hard to govern by headline. If the media shift position on any point, they're so insecure they shift also. There's nothing a lobbyist hates more than a legislator who tells you one thing and then votes differently."

Another point of view heard with frequency from those paid to lobby legislators was dissatisfaction with the performance of Gene Samberson.

Samberson is normally a diplomatic sort of operator, who offends almost nobody. That's more or less how he manages to remain House conservatives' perennial favorite in races for the Speaker's chair.

So how come this year he was pushing bills you wouldn't expect? More than one of those who contact lawmakers as representatives of firms or associations asked that question. "How did that 'tax exchange' bill suddenly become a Samberson measure?" one asked. "It came out of Eddie Lopez's interim committee, and Samberson had nothing to do with it, unless you consider Jerry Sandel (part of the Lopez group) to be his surrogate."

Another said: "I just found Samberson reacting much more than previously to the pressure this year. He never even turned the chair over to a substitute—maybe because there was nobody else around he trusted to run things properly."

If the health of Bob Moran, House minority floor leader, requires his replacement in that post, look for a sharp and lasting split among his fellow House Republicans.

Bernalillo county's Hal Stratton is expected to make a move toward the job—and more than one member of the GOP has already sworn that will happen "over my dead body."

Some people think the problem with legislative leaders at present is that they have no sense of New Mexico history.

One sharp observer said, "They all act as if this was the first Legislature the state ever convened, and they the first to lead one."

A former lawmaker puts the thought into a letter, like this: "The thing I find most ironic is looking back to the early 60's, when I served. We had the John Mershons and the Aubrey Dunns, who were on top of things; and the budget was done properly and without any 'grandstanding,' or with everyone wanting to grab a newspaper reporter and tell the world how smart he is. In addition, those were the days when the state had plenty of money. Now that funds are tight and we really need a steady hand at the controls, the heavyweights have retired—understandably—and we have everyone with an oar paddling in a different direction."

Several of the thoughts there are especially accurate.

That one about some people wanting to grab reporters and tell them how heroic they are is something we saw lots more of than ever before this year. (See lobbyist's comment on the same topic—how it distorted both judgment and action—above.)

The metaphor about everyone paddling in a different direction is also right on the button.

But the best part may be that about heavyweights. That's shrewdly observed. The replacements for those who once merited that title are in nothing like the class of those mentioned. Instead, this year we have lightweights indeed.



Ruidoso Police investigated a two-vehicle accident Friday that resulted in the injury of a Ruidoso man.

Transported to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital with leg and head injuries was Mark Womack, 26, of Ruidoso. Womack was the driver of a vehicle traveling south on Mechem Drive near the intersec-

tion of White Mountain Drive.

According to police, a vehicle driven by Richard Hieberg, 40, of Alto, was traveling north on Mechem Drive when it crossed the centerline of the road about 11:45 p.m. Friday and struck the Womack vehicle head-on. The force of the collision resulted in the Womack vehicle coming to rest on its top.

Womack was listed in stable condition Monday morning at the hospital.

Hieberg was not injured in the accident. Hieberg was cited for driving while intoxicated, reckless driving and no insurance, police said.

Swenor clarifies high accident rate

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor reported last week that traffic accident figures released recently by the New Mexico Transportation Department are somewhat misleading.

It was reported that Ruidoso and Espanola have the highest accident rates in the state. Swenor pointed out that the rates are based on census population, however, presenting a distorted picture of the Ruidoso accident rate.

Swenor said the Ruidoso rate is based on the population here, and not on the number of people who use Ruidoso's streets.

He said the most recent population census figures put Ruidoso at about 5,000 residents. Swenor said

the average "service population" served by the department is about 12,000 to 15,000. That swells up to 70,000 people on some race weekends, he said.

Other contributing factors to the high accident rate are the weather and the fact that Ruidoso streets were not built to handle the heavy volumes of traffic. Swenor said weather extremes cause traffic problems other areas do not encounter.

Additionally, since many of the motorists are unfamiliar with this area, the problem is compounded. People looking for a place to stay or shop on the busy Ruidoso streets are often not as attentive as other motorists.

Swenor reported that most of the more serious accidents happen when the streets are less crowded.

When Ruidoso thoroughfares are heavy with traffic, motorists are kept to lower speeds and any accidents are usually less serious.

The chief also noted that when traffic enforcement is high, the accident rate will decrease. When enforcement lessens, the traffic accident rate jumps back up. Swenor indicated that personnel shortages in the department can lead to less enforcement on the streets.

Karen Tillman will be principal on a half-time basis at White Mountain Elementary School, starting next fall. She will continue as special education director for Ruidoso Municipal Schools, but on a half-time contract.

The Ruidoso Board of Education announced the contract changes as members approved all other certified and non-certified personnel contracts at last week's school board meeting.

Board members quickly approved checks, budget transfers and other routine business before opening bids on athletic supplies and

equipment for the 1985-86 school year. Bids from six suppliers were turned over to Ruidoso High School athletic director Cooper Henderson for review.

Three bids were received for the reroofing project at Ruidoso Middle School. Superintendent Sid Miller reviewed the bids with the school architect before the meeting, and recommended that the board accept the low bid. They did.

Nulf-Jones was awarded the bid to audit district books. The local firm offered the only proposal.

The school board issued calls for bids for janitorial supplies, instructional supplies and used equipment. They also approved the sale of a used

pickup truck and a used dishwasher.

Jackie Branum, eighth grade science teacher, brought five students and presented a slide show on the students' recent week-long marine biology trip to the Texas Gulf Coast.

"Every place that we stayed we had managers and other people coming up and telling us how well behaved the group was," Branum said. She thanked the board for letting students take the trip.

Frank Cannella reported that 190 projects were entered in the Ruidoso Science Fair. Thirty-four local projects qualified for the regional fair, but only seven students were able to attend.

Ruidoso High School students Lance Willard and Carter Hamilton both won second places for their projects. Jennifer Parker, a Ruidoso Middle School sixth grader, won first place in the junior microbiology division. She also won a special \$50 award from Kodak, and a United States Air Force Award.

"As a matter of fact, the Air Force wants Jennifer," Cannella said. The three science students qualified for a state fair.

The board spent two hours in executive session before reconvening to approve the personnel contracts.

The next regular meeting is scheduled at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 8, in the administration office.

Extraterritorial Zoning Commission handles inquiries

The Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission answered two inquiries but did not take any action at its regular meeting Thursday in Ruidoso.

Joe Zagone approached the commission concerning the Pines of Gavilan and Valley East Estates subdivisions. Zagone said he owned lots in Valley East Estates and was

under the "mistaken" impression that the lots on the west side were zoned commercial. All of the lots in the subdivision are zoned residential.

Lots on the west side of the adjacent Pines of Gavilan subdivision are zoned commercial. Zagone said he was concerned because one of the lots was torn up and trees were removed.

He noted that both subdivisions utilized water wells. He said he was

worried that someone might put a filling station on the commercial land.

Zagone said he wanted to have a small cabin operation in the future, and told the commission he would return to request a rezoning at a later date.

Bill Pippin approached the commission about some land he had sold prior to the formation of the commission. He was told Thursday that the land was "grandfathered"

for whatever use it had at the time it was zoned. However, if the owner wanted to change the use of the land, he would be required to go before the commission.

Commission members also decided to research the question of what types of units could be put on C-1 land.

County manager Suzanne Cox presented a log of commission-related expenses incurred from September 10 through November.





Getting ready to play Robert Tyrone is no easy task. Morris must undergo a one-hour makeup session, involving the application of layer after layer of makeup, and don a wig.

To adopt the proper attitude, Morris, who admits that "playing white" isn't as difficult as it might seem, depends on his own background.

"I went to Beverly Hills High School," says Morris. "I'm not totally unfamiliar with the white culture. To me Robert Tyrone is an upper-middle-class, well-educated, well-spoken, ambitious guy."

"In some ways he's like me. But he's smarter than I am," quips Morris with a quick, charming smile.

Ed Marinaro of 'Hill Street Blues'

Any number of football players have tried to use their gridiron exposure to launch acting careers. Ed Marinaro, who plays Officer Joe Coffey on the highly-acclaimed "Hill Street Blues" (Thursdays on NBC), can consider himself one of the lucky ones.

The former NFL running back decided to pursue acting after he was sidelined with a foot injury. He served a stint on the series "Laverne & Shirley," as Hollywood stunt man Sonny St. Jacques, and after he was released from that show tried out for "Hill Street Blues." The rest is history.

Originally, Officer Coffey was scheduled to make a limited appearance on the series and die during a two-hour segment. But by some twist of fate, the script was rewritten, and Marinaro became a regular. "When I auditioned, Coffey was a lot different from what he turned out to be," the actor recalls. "I was a guest star in the last episodes of the first year because the writers needed another guy in uniform, and it was a good way to get Lucy Bates (Betty Thomas) on the streets."

The actor shows no hesitation when it comes to expressing what he feels has helped carry the show to the top. "There are so many reasons — the authenticity, the interaction of the men in blue. It's a very real show, there's no formula to it. It's different from what people usually see on television, and it's uniquely shot. The writing is good, and the legal end seems so real. It's also an ensemble piece where no one is the big star."

"I think Coffey is now ready to make some upward movement," Marinaro says of Coffey today. "He's serious about becoming a sergeant."

"I just want to be a better actor and go wherever that takes me."



National Geographic winner

Somehow, the National Geographic Society always manages to present a much larger scope of the world than most of us consider in our day-to-day lives.

Nickelodeon is host to a new cable-TV series, "National Geographic Explorer," that premiered earlier this month. The show airs every Sunday evening for three hours and is made up of several segments, ranging in length from 10 minutes to one hour. If what we've seen so far is any indication, they have a real winner. The narration is insightful, and the photography is beautiful.

Tonight, April 28, the show opens with a colorful segment on the Cuttichios, an Italian puppeteering family that handles every angle of the business, from carving and painting the puppets to acting out the stories. There's also a long segment on Irving Johnson, who reflects on a life of adventure on the high seas; a segment on the frozen land of Siberia; and a segment on the craft of a 79-year-old Pennsylvania woodworker. And finally, there's a segment called "In Pursuit of the Boar," which depicts the day-to-day lives of the boars of the French countryside. Only the National Geographic could tell the story of the wild boar with such grace and beauty.





BOWLING ALONG — What do millions of sports

fans do on Saturday afternoon after they've finished the yard work, taken their wives shopping or the kids to the ball field? According to ABC's publicists, the fans tune in the "Professional Bowlers Tour" and watch bowling.

ABC says the show, which has been on the air for 24 years, featuring the same announcer, Chris Schenkel, continues to reach bigger audiences than weekend telecasts of regular-season college and professional basketball, golf and tennis on other networks.

In the first 10 weeks of the show's season, it drew the competition nine times. The only exception was when it opposed a St. Johns-Georgetown basketball game.

Why?
 "It's easy," says the show's expert commentator Nelson Burton. "Bowling is it. I used to play other sports in high school, but I enjoyed bowling more. It was my first choice and apparently the first choice of a lot of people."

"To me," he went on, "people watch television to be informed or entertained. Bowling does both."

Peter Englehart, one of the show's producers, agrees with Burton. "Bowling is largely a participant sport and the average bowler picks up hints when he watches the pros each week," he says. "It always amazes me to see the number of bowlers in the audience heading for the lanes when the show is off the air. They want to try out things they just saw. I've often seen Nelson give them pointers."

The sudden-death format of the show is also a plus. There are no split decisions, no tricks for the viewers.

"Our show is 90 minutes long," Englehart continued. "It's a one-game elimination and every 20 minutes you're back to sudden death. If the first match is one-sided, the viewer doesn't go away because the next game could be close. It's not like a blowout in basketball or a 9-0 score in baseball. There's an element of suspense."

So that's why millions of sports fans are crazy about the "Professional Bowlers Tour."

"Ladyhawke" is the tale of a man and woman — ever apart, yet ever together. An evil spell has been cast on them which — well — perhaps it's better not to give away too much.

Obviously, a movie like "Ladyhawke" presents the film makers with several problems (1) How does one present a relatively simple fairy tale so it will please all ages? (2) Will the "Star Wars" generation accept a tender fantasy that is largely devoid of special effects? and (3) Are there enough fans of "Dungeons and Dragons" to make the film a hit?

Problem No. 1 was the toughest for "Ladyhawke." At times the film is a bit too bloody for the tots, but it's still too simplistic for adults.

The hero and heroine are nicely played by Rutger Hauer and Michelle Pfeiffer. Hauer, the veteran of several villainous roles (most notably as the deranged robot opposite Harrison Ford in "Blade Runner"), is attired in black throughout the film, but he is as staunch as any legendary hero. And one look at Michelle Pfeiffer as

a damsel in distress would turn the most fainthearted coward into a hero.

Unfortunately, Matthew Broderick doesn't fare so well. He has turned in good performances in the past — as Marsha Mason's son in "The Return of Max Dugan," as the computer hacker of "WarGames" and as the young Neil Simon in the Broadway play "Brighton Beach Memoirs" — but he's out of his element in this one. He's supposed to play a puckish young rogue, the kind who comes up with snappy wisecracks when he's faced with the gravest danger, but he goes through this medieval tale looking and sounding as if he just left a Coney Island High School dance.

Vittorio Storaro's superb cinematography, and some well-staged swordplay help pass the time.

"Ladyhawke" is both silly and sumptuous, but give it the benefit of the doubt. Throw away any intellectual pretensions, sit back, and do your best to enjoy this two-hour mini-epic. You just might.

Michael Spound likes his 'Hotel' work

Because Michael Spound plays one of the world's most visible bellhops — Dave Kendall on ABC's "Hotel" — he is bombarded with advice from hotel personnel whenever he travels.

"They really critique the show a lot," admits Spound as he walks through the lobby of a New York hotel. "I'm always asked, 'Who was the biggest tipper on the show?' The answer is Robert Stack. He gave me \$100. The cheapest was Dick Van Patten, a quarter. But usually it's a buck a bag."

Spound and his character have accumulated quite a few bucks — on and off the screen — working Wednesday nights at TV's swanky St. Regis Hotel. But despite the new-found affluence, Spound retains a profound respect for the first buck that was given to him.

It was during the fourth week of the show's first season. Executive Producer Aaron Spelling handed Spound, who admits that he was a little apprehensive about his performance since "Hotel" was his first big television break, a dollar. Spound was confused. After all, he wasn't even carrying a bag. Then on the bill he found written, "Michael — Give this back to me in the fifth year, Aaron."

The tip from the boss proved to be the confi-

dence buldler the Massachusetts native needed. It's hard sometimes, Spound admits, to feel you belong on "Hotel" when the show is built around a never-ending list of glamorous guest stars and your character's main duty is to carry the bags of the aforementioned. But Spound says he won't be carrying bags — or feeling like excess baggage — forever.

"I did get to take my shirt off this season," he says with an equal mixture of pride and humility. "It's the first time I ever had to do that. Boy, it's tough to walk around holding your breath and trying to act, but it opened up a lot of opportunities to do talk shows."

Don't get him wrong, though. Spound is not lobbying to get his name added to the ever-expanding list of television hunks. He's just happy for the exposure, even if what's exposed is his bare chest.

A year after he ended his role as indefatigable defense attorney Perry Mason, Raymond Burr returned to series TV in the starring role of "Ironside." Burr was still fighting for justice — this time as a former chief of detectives who was forced to leave the police department when a would-be assassin's bullet left him paralyzed from the waist down.

"Ironside" became a special consultant to the San Francisco Police Department; a wheelchair-bound crimefighter who was assisted by Det. Sgt. Ed Brown (Don Galloway) and Mark Sanger (Don Mitchell), a former juvenile delinquent. The series ran on NBC from 1967 to 1975.

"Ironside" was part of a particularly odd sub-genre of detective shows that flourished in the early '70s: the detective who was at a distinct disadvantage against his opponent. In addition to the paralyzed Ironside, there was the overweight "Cannon" (William Conrad), the blind "Longstreet" (James Franciscus) and "Harry-O," (David Janssen), who used public transportation to nab criminals because his car never worked.





The BOX SEAT

From the Plaza to the Kentucky Derby

New York City horse and buggy hacks take their passengers on a one-and-a-quarter mile loop that normally lasts 15 to 25 minutes. Tourists hop in at Grand Army Plaza, across the street from the Plaza Hotel, and are leisurely clip-clopped about the southeastern tip of Central Park before being deposited off Fifth Avenue. The cost? \$17.

The horses doing the pulling are not the most promising 3-year-olds in America. But the carriage drivers won't stop work on the first Saturday in May to watch the one-and-one-quarter mile horse race normally called "the most exciting two minutes in sports." The prize money? A guaranteed \$250,000.

Paul Albert won't be tuning in. He wears black tie and tails to work. A few buttons are missing from his sleeves. He kicks a lamppost to scatter the pigeons who might dirty his maroon and black 100-year-old carriage. Rocky, a 12-year-old black horse, has pulled Paul's carriage for two years.

"If you knew much about racing," says Paul, "you wouldn't watch either." Paul has never worked in a racing stable, but he is adamant. "Only the Amish treat horses worse."

"Buggy-ride, miss?"

Rocky was bought by Paul's boss at Chateau Stables, on 48th Street, when he offered the auctioneer \$20 more than the butcher. Other horses working around Central Park were bought in Pennsylvania. Stevie is a gray horse with white feet who used to pull a plough in New Holland. Mike Fels drives him. Mike tugs his long red beard as he talks about his great uncle, a hack long before World War I. Mike's longest ride lasted almost five hours.

"I drove this couple all over the park. It was spring. Night. They had baskets of food. Pate. Crackers. Champagne. The whole 9 yards. For five hours they discussed nothing but their impending divorce. Never opened the champagne. Gave it to me as a tip."

A blond rider with crooked teeth fills a bucket of water underneath a statue of General Sherman on horseback. She is the only hack dressed in black hi-top Converse all-stars. She's never been to the races in her life. "Never even stepped inside an OTB office." Slurping his water, her brown horse lifts up his rear right foot, often a sign of a hyper-extended ankle.

"I ride six days a week," the blond hack says. "Why would I want to go watch horses on my day off?"
