

Airport site transfer agreement reached

After years of debate and frustration, an agreement has been reached to transfer use of 1,667 acres of land—Site B—from New Mexico State University (NMSU) to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission. The agreement was announced by members of the New Mexico Congressional delegation Friday.

A joint statement by U.S. senators Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman and U.S. Representative Joe Skeen reported that the agreement provides for \$2.2 million in compensation to the university in exchange for moving its research from the proposed airport land atop Fort Stanton Mesa.

"It came kind of as a surprise," Ruidoso Mayor George White said. "We're just so happy about it all." Ruidoso village hall had an atmosphere of celebration Friday when local officials heard the news of the agreement. For many, the wait for a new airport has been long in coming.

"We're in the spirit of thanksgiving," village manager Jim Hine said with a smile.

The Ruidoso Municipal Airport has been the site of 17 fatal aircraft crashes over a 20-year period. It has been called one of the most dangerous airports in the nation.

The battle over location of a new airport began when Site B, which is on Bureau of Land Management property and is the site of NMSU rangeland experiments, was identified as the best site for the airport.

NMSU officials resisted, arguing that \$4 million in taxpayers' money spent on research would be sacrificed if the experiments were disrupted by construction of an airport.

The stalemate broke last

September when university regents indicated the land could be given up if NMSU were compensated for the loss. Since then, negotiations and the preparation of an environmental impact statement on the proposed airport site have continued.

Friday's announcement forms the framework of the agreement that will become law through the legislative process, according to Joe Skeen's legislative assistant, John Sneed.

Sneed reported that the agreement requires, upon completion of transfer of the land, that Ruidoso and the Department of Transportation forego any further requests for land on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Funding for the transfer is expected to come from federal sources through legislation to be introduced by Domenici, Bingaman and Skeen. As proposed, \$1.2 million will come from the Department of Agriculture and \$1 million will come from the Department of Transportation Airport Improvement Fund.

Additional legislation will effect the land transfer from the Department of Interior to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, Sneed said. It is hoped that the measures can be attached to legislation already under way in Congress in an attempt to speed up the transfer.

According to Domenici spokesman Martin Janowski, the agreement also seeks the support of Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole, Agriculture Secretary John Block and Interior Secretary Donald Hodel for expeditious completion of the agreement.

White expressed gratitude for the efforts of the three lawmakers, and reported that U.S. Representative Manuel Lujan, too, had indicated his support of the agreement. White

also thanked New Mexico Governor Toney Anaya, state Aviation Director Bob White and state Transportation Secretary Judith Espinosa for their efforts in resolving the airport situation.

Of the agreement, Skeen said, "It is critical that we get on the Ruidoso airport project as soon as possible. I hope this agreement will allow us to start construction quickly on this new airport."

Bingaman said he was "gratified that we seem to be making some progress on the issue. It is of paramount importance that we take steps to protect the lives of people traveling in and out of Ruidoso."

Domenici thanked NMSU president James Halligan and the university Board of Regents for working "almost around the clock this past year to resolve this issue."

The senator commented, "We must pass at least two bills to accomplish the desired result. I'll do

all I can to get it done."

Domenici legislative assistant Jim Hughes reported that the legislation effecting the transfer could be completed in two weeks. He said handling the transfer legislatively instead of administratively may speed the process and could shorten or delete parts of the environmental impact statement.


"We can jump a few hoops here," he said. "We could shave months off."

Hughes opined that the appropriations will face little opposition in the legislative process.

"We think we've got a real good case," he said.

After years of waiting, Ruidoso officials are happy simply to have an agreement for transfer of the land.

"When you can see the end of the tunnel, it makes a big difference," White said.

Village attorney resigns

Lee Huckstep announced Thursday that he will leave his position as attorney for the Village of Ruidoso. The attorney will join the staff of the Albuquerque City Attorney's Office in June.

Huckstep has been attorney for Ruidoso since April 1, 1981. Huckstep's Ruidoso post was his first experience in municipal representation.

"I enjoyed it very much," he commented in a Thursday interview.

Huckstep said a positive point of the Ruidoso post was dealing with the variety of legal issues of the village.

"It is rarely dull," he remarked. The attorney said he has enjoyed working with village administration and elected officials. Of the village itself, Huckstep said he will

miss Ruidoso, but is looking forward to going to a larger city.

Huckstep opined that the position of Ruidoso attorney has changed significantly in the four years he has had the position. When he began, it was possible to learn as things came up. Now, as the village deals with much more complex issues and situations, the new attorney must be well-versed in the workings of a municipality.

"The job has expanded greatly," Huckstep pointed out. He said the village will call for sealed proposals Monday from prospective attorneys to fill Huckstep's post. Experience, especially in local government representation, will be stressed in the call.

Huckstep noted that his decision to leave Ruidoso is in no way a bitter one. Huckstep's Albuquerque position begins June 3.

"The opportunity came along at the right time," he said.

Building inspector's office adds plans checker

The Ruidoso Building Inspector's Office has added Sandy Hall as plans checker. Hall reviews plans and applications for building permits, schedules inspections, and issues permits.

According to building inspector Jimmy Neeley, Hall occasionally accompanies him during inspections.

Hall has a background in drafting—she operated a home drafting business while living in Florida and has an educational background in the field. Soon after Hall and her husband moved to Ruidoso, she was hired by Neeley. Hall said some of her family here is in the building business.

The plans checker reviews plans in accordance with the Uniform Building Code book. Hall said the most important aspect of well-drawn plans is that potential problems with a building's design can be foreseen and corrected in the plans—before construction.

Hall said plans she saw did not have common problems, but showed a myriad of minor mistakes. Neeley agreed that a lack of detail showed up in many plans.

"A drawing is supposed to be non-

verbal," Neeley explained. He pointed out that many who come in with incomplete plans are forced to explain the elements of the drawing to him and Hall, instead of relying on the accuracy of the plan to inform.

Hall and Neeley stressed that their purpose is to help those wanting to build homes or businesses.

The plans checker said she spent about a half-hour redrawing plans that needed minor revisions. Plans that need extensive reworking are returned to the applicant for revision.

Neeley said he saw the office as a focus of education for drafting knowledge. He and Hall keep themselves updated on all developments in building, and attempt to pass the information on to local draftsmen and builders.

The inspector reported that the incidence of red-tags—notices to stop construction due to improper construction or no building permit—has been especially high recently.

Neeley attributed the rise to the number of minor residential additions and alterations being constructed. He reminded builders and homeowners that any construction over \$500 in valuation requires a building permit.

When a project gets red-tagged, the building permit fee is automatically doubled, and a fine of up to \$300 may be issued in Municipal Court. Neeley said that such penalties are unnecessary, especially when compared with the ease of obtaining a building permit in the first place.

He compared the Ruidoso time of 24 hours to obtain the permit with the two to six weeks it takes in many major cities. Also, he pointed out that the plans often can be drawn quickly, right in the inspector's office.

"Everybody has to play by the rules. We don't want to go to court," Neeley stressed. He said having to go to the extent of issuing a red tag is unfortunate.

"It's just not fun," he said. "People get real angry."

One goal of the office is to protect the interests of the builders and the building owners. A new project Neeley and Hall are working on deals with one of the most prevalent problems in Ruidoso—the failure of retaining walls.

Neeley said the problem is so bad that the Building Inspector's Office requires an engineer's report on all proposed retaining walls. In an attempt to circumvent unnecessary engineering fees of \$200 to \$1,000 for

each proposed retaining wall, Neeley and Hall have arranged to provide builders with samples of retaining wall designs.

The pre-drawn plans meet specifications, and will cost builders just \$3 to \$5 per plan. Neeley said the program will be in effect in about two weeks.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Who's the doctor when government gets sick? It's a question for which we'd better find an answer.

In Washington, we've got a government that can't bring itself to deal with the ticking time bomb called the national deficit. That Domenici budget, the closest thing we have to an effort to grapple with the problem, passed the Senate last week by a bare one vote—and now the efforts start to tear it to pieces.

When this writer asked four lobbyists from the Washington scene a simple question, at just about the time the Senate was preparing that vote, he got a simple answer.

"If the special-interest group you represent will be hurt in any way by budget cuts, what do you propose to do?"

"To fight to keep my special-interest group from losing a single dollar. That's what I get paid for."

It's probably the position of almost every lobbyist in the country, and they will all be there to see that their particular clans do not get hurt.

But if no one gets hurt, our deficits will continue. And if our deficits continue, we are in for the kind of tough times that will make the Great Depression seem like two weeks on the beach at Walkiki.

Almost nobody in Washington wants to face up to our problems. Like you, they are tired of hearing folks sing the blues. Nobody wants to make any personal sacrifice.

So who is the doctor when our government gets that sick?

Whoever he is, somebody ought to ask him to make a house call on New Mexico. We need his help here as well.

Everybody knows the American system of government works well because of the checks and balances built into it; each part of government is designed to act as a corrective on the others.

But when things get so bad that no part is balanced within itself, how can it act as a balance for the other

parts? And when every part runs unchecked, how is it able to check the others?

That's the condition New Mexico is in right now.

Anyone who thinks all we have to do is hold a special legislative session and all our problems will disappear is missing the point about how deep the illness goes. In our state, a special session is just a kind of down-home remedy, like mercurochrome used to be on kid-size cuts and bruises. It does nothing to cure the deeper malaise.

That consists of a degree of polarization never before seen among us, constantly being exacerbated by self-centered elected officials for their own purposes.

As Republican gubernatorial candidate Frank Bond said last week, "Political bickering and confusion have torn New Mexico apart."

Not "threaten to tear it apart," please note, or "are going to tear it apart." Instead, "have torn it apart"—past tense.

When the body politic is torn, a doctor is called for. But who ministers to ailments like these?

Bond and others who plan to run for office will tell us they can do so. That may be true. But can we wait till the time of the next election to see our sickness healed?

Sure, sure. You get tired of columns like this one, where somebody is always moaning low. Anybody likes to read something on the bright side now and then.

But the very fact that all you read about is problems, not solutions, is a comment on the kind of shape we are in.

Who will bring us the solution? Ronald Reagan, who does not like to face up to the tough decisions, isn't likely to do it in Washington. Local people who care more about injuring their adversaries than about helping our citizens aren't likely to do it here at home.

If there is a doctor in the house, he or she should now step forward.

Message to dad: Give love, encouragement, not a kick. It was one of those warm, spring days that little boys most enjoy being little boys—except that Billy made a small mistake.

He swung at a bad pitch. It wasn't a real bad pitch. A shade inside and chin high, but when you took into account that Billy had fouled off two good pitches before he missed the bad one, it meant that Billy had gone down swinging.

He had struck out. Since it was a Little League game, and such a beautiful day, you expected the words of encouragement that streamed down from one section of bleachers.

The fans of Billy's team said what you probably are supposed to say to a 10- or 11-year-old kid when he strikes out and feels the whole world is looking over his shoulder.

"That's OK, Billy."

"You'll get 'em next time, Billy."

"Shake it off, Billy. Don't worry about it."

Naturally, it wasn't that easy for Billy.

He tapped the dirt lightly with his traitorous bat, whirled out of the batter's box and kicked up a bit of dirt that turned into dust and drifted toward what appeared to be an adult coaching third base.

Except it wasn't an adult.

Not in this case.

In this case, it was a father. A father who stepped through the cloud of dust wearing a Billy Martin scowl and maybe even thinking that this tiny, little field was Yankee Stadium and the kids at his command were professionals and not little kids playing what was once a little kids' game.

"—, Billy." The coach said thrusting his reddenng face down into Billy's face.

"What the — are you doing out there. What the — are you swinging at — like that for. That — ball was over your head. Is that what I've taught you? You let the whole team down when you do — like that. Get your — in that dugout and think about it."

With that, the coach muttered a few more words that must be deleted

from a family newspaper, and Billy took up a spot at the end of the bench and lowered his bushy, brown head to hide eyes that were now moist and glistening.

It was no longer a beautiful spring day.

It is not fair to say that even though this scene has been repeated numerous times that it is a typical father coaching his son. And is not fair to say it is a typical Little League coach. It is neither.

It's just that some men shouldn't coach their sons, just like some men shouldn't be fathers.

Those are things we cannot control.

But a game that should be fun often is tainted by fathers who make too much of it all while forgetting something much more important. Forgetting what a son really needs from a father.

This father happened to be on the field where the damage and the silliness are more noticeable, but these fathers are everywhere.

There are fathers in the bleachers leaning toward anyone who will listen explaining how bad this kid is and how bad that kid is and how his son should be playing short.

There are fathers reaching into wallets and buying the uniforms so their boy can pitch, and there are fathers trying to shove their sons into a limelight that they could never reach themselves—and it is all so wrong.

A son needs a father's encouragement, but it shouldn't be a rock-hard push to make someone into something you weren't. Encourage him to play baseball, if he wants to—if not, let him swim, or play soccer or do whatever else allows a smile to climb all the way to his eyes.

Let him live his life and chase his dreams. He will be the better for it and so will dad.

And if he is good at it, and even if he isn't, put your arm around him and give him what a father should always give his son first. Give him your love and allow him to give it right back.

"LETTER TO A DRUNK DRIVER"

On April 19, 1985, around 10 or 11 p.m. as my 26-year-old son was driving home from rehearsal at Little Theatre, you crossed over into his lane at a high rate of speed and crashed into him head-on, causing his car to roll over and over before finally coming to rest on its top. Do you care?

When I got back home around 3 a.m. I called the police to try and learn what had happened. I had been with my son in I.C.U. I saw his cut and mangled body. His hair was stiff with dried blood, he was covered with bits of glass, he had a concussion, and possible internal injury. His left leg is shattered. I remember feeling thankful—because you hadn't killed him. Do you care?

The police couldn't tell me much. They can't violate your RIGHTS. But you had already been bailed out. My strong, healthy, handsome, gentle son was and still is in the hospital, with a broken body, and you were and still are, free and walking around on your two good legs!

My son's first coherent thought was whether his best friend had been in the accident with him. What was your first coherent thought? Do you care?

All weekend, as I watched my son's suffering, I hoped that you were an irresponsible teenager. I can forgive youth a lot. But I cannot express the despair I felt when I bought the accident report and read that you are 40 years old, have no liability insurance, and no driver's license. Do you have a child?

My son is in surgery for the second time as I write this. He will be in the hospital at least four more weeks. He will be in a cast and at home for months after that. Warrior boy tracksters qualify five, set school records

State qualifying marks and school records were the rule as the Ruidoso High School boys track team finished third at the Lovington Invitational Saturday.

Ruidoso qualified five more athletes for the state meet, bringing the total number to eight with the District 3-AAA meet (Friday on the Warrior track) still to come. Ruidoso set four school records.

Ruidoso's girls competed in the Mayfield Relays Saturday, but no Warrior athletes qualified.

Ruidoso scored 46 points at Lovington, finishing behind champion Lovington and second-place Goddard. Seven teams participated in the competition.

Tracy Gann leaped 20-7 in the long jump for fourth place, a state qualifying mark and a school record.

Gann also ran on the 400-meter and 800-meter relay squads which qualified for state. Curt McClellan, Michael Williamson and Brian Davis were the other runners on the team.

The Warriors ran a 44.47 in the 400-meter relay, finishing second and set-

ting a school record. Ruidoso finished second in the 800-meter relay with a 1:32.16 time, another school record.

Francisco Olvera was the other Warrior qualifier, running a 9:21.0 for a second in the 3,000 meters. Teammate Cisco Bob, who qualified last week, won the event in 8:51.05.

Bob also won the 1,500 meters, taking the event in 4:01.0. The defending state champion has seasonal bests of 3:57.88 and 8:37.80.

Sophomore Gabe Tam, who had already qualified in the 3,000 meters, was in an automobile accident Friday morning and did not compete. However, Tam is okay and will run in the district meet.

Javelin thrower Jeff Willingham qualified last week with a 164-4 toss. He finished fifth at Lovington with a best of 157-0.

Pole vaulter Verlon Edwards continued his improvement with an 11-8 vault, his personal best and a school record. He finished fifth.

Ruidoso had a seasonal best in the 1,600-meter relay, running a 3:34.0 for second place. Justin Smith replaced Gann on the quartet.

Smith had a good day, taking fourth in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles (43.0) and fifth in the 110-meter hurdles (36.9). He qualified for the state meet in the intermediate hurdles last season.

Ruidoso would have qualified in the medley relay, the quartet running a 3:39.0. But the Warriors were disqualified for taking too many steps inside the line.

"Just about everybody who went down there improved their times," said Warrior coach Ronny Maskew. "They all did a real good job."

The Warrior girls did not score a point in the Mayfield meet. However, they did get some seasonal bests.

The medley relay team of Amanda Samuels, Shannon Lee, Dari Stierwalt and Gia Rose ran a 2:04.0. The qualifying standard is 1:58.0.

Ruidoso's 400-meter relay squad ran a seasonal best of 54.2, the 800-meter relay team ran a 1:58.0, and the 1,600-meter relay team ran a 4:44.0.

Rose equaled her seasonal best in the long jump with a 16-1 effort. The state qualifying mark is 16-6.

Tabby Williamson improved her best in the 3,000 meters by over a minute, running a 15:21.0.

Ruidoso was hurt by the absence of Sherri Alexander in the 1,500 meters and 800 meters. Alexander was sick.

Senior Stacy Ivy ran in two relays, but was bothered by a sore leg.

"We will have to have outstanding performances to qualify for state at the district meet," said Warrior girls coach Sergio Castanon.

Ruidoso to host district meet

Anyone who has never seen the Ruidoso High School boys and girls track teams compete will get a chance Friday when the Warriors host the District 3-AAA meet.

Competition will begin at 11 a.m. on the Warriors' new track.

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

This year's increased interest in Little League baseball raises hopes that a league for older youths will be operating in the future. In fact, the Ruidoso Little League plans to have registration next March for a 1986 Senior League. Youths 13 to 15 years old would be able to compete.

"There's a definite commitment to that," said Ruidoso Little League president Karen Moore.

The reason for optimism rests with the increased number of youths involved in Little League. There are 153 youths involved in the program this season, 48 in the major division and 105 in the minor division. There are four major division teams and seven minor division teams.

Last year the league had four minor division teams and four major division teams. Only 98 youths participated in the program.

"There's just more interest this year," Moore said. "The younger kids are really interested."

"That's good and if it keeps up, we should have a fantastic major division group and all-star team in two or three years."

Ruidoso has been competitive in the district all-star tournament the past three seasons. The team has won at least one game in each of the tournaments.

But the prospects of a Senior League should bring joy to a lot of middle school and high school youths. And improve the whole baseball program in this area.

A few high school athletes play in the softball league, three-sport star Jeff Willingham a notable example.

An attempt was made two years ago to have a Babe Ruth program in the summer. However, turnouts were mediocre at first and interest dropped off after that.

But if the current interest in Little League baseball lasts, baseball for Ruidoso teenagers could become a reality in the near future.

Treasurer discusses banking

"A bank needs a heart as well as a head," United States Treasurer Katherine Ortega told a group of bank officers at the recent National Association of Bank Women (NABW) state conference at the Inn of The Mountain Gods.

Ortega said the most important asset of any bank is not the cash in its vaults, but the human confidence of its customers. In this age of computers, video recorders and television, people still seek the human touch, she said.

With the emergence of automated tellers, banks have tried even harder to market their industry with advertisements that emphasize the personal touch, said Ortega. The industry is seeking to personalize an institution that historically has appeared remote.

Ortega told of a New Jersey bank that had experienced negative customer reaction when it installed an automated teller. Customers vandalized the machine by jamming cards and hurting the system. In an effort to change customer attitudes, the bank personnel gave the machine a personal touch. They dressed it as Santa Claus in December and decorated it with hearts for Valentine's Day. Ortega said this touch gave the customers what they needed—they responded positively and even gave the machine get-well cards.

Ortega emphasized how much people need human contact. Even with home video, people still go to movie theaters to share the experience with a community. Ortega said studies have shown that after the workplace and home, shopping malls are the most popular places

because people require human interaction.

Recent government deregulation has brought new challenges to the banking industry. According to Ortega, banking is no longer in the safe harbor of the past, now that it has to compete with free enterprise.

To keep up with the competition, banks have begun to offer more services—such as catalog shopping—to their account holders.

"Times of change are times of challenge," said Ortega, reflecting NABW's "Challenge of Change" seminar theme.

Ortega said bankers must keep up with the new attitudes about the role of government and the responsibility of the private sector. Banking and government are undergoing transformation, she noted.

"These days, Uncle Sam is tightening his belt," she said. Ortega said that women are destined to play a larger role in the economy in general and banking in particular. She attributed women's continued success to "muscle, brainpower and good old-fashioned women's intuition."

Ortega said that as the old rules break down, the old barriers will follow. She said for women, change is an ally.

"Believe me, I speak from personal experience," she said, as a rider of what she called a "wave of professional females."

Ortega quoted business writer John Nesbitt ("Megatrends") saying that females will join, and may pass, their male counterparts in the professional world.

In a later interview, Ortega said that in her travels around the country, she has seen women making progress on all fronts. Ortega said women are going into their own businesses at a rate of five to seven times that of men.

"That's very exciting to see," she said.

Ortega said she felt the economy was much stronger than it had been three or four years ago.

Ortega has held her position since September 1983. As Treasurer of the United States, she oversees the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, the United States Mint and the U.S. Savings Bonds Division.

Ortega is an honor graduate of Eastern New Mexico University, where she received her bachelor's degree in business and economics. When she was president and director of the Santa Ana State Bank in California, she made history as the first woman bank president in the state.

Women make up 70 percent of the work force in the banking industry, according to NABW Southwestern Regional Director Kay Landen.

More than 100 women attended the regional conference. NABW is a nationwide organization with more than 30,000 female bank officers as members.

Officials explain property tax assessment

"When people vote for a bond issue or mill levy, they should look at it closely because it could really raise their taxes," said Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox at a property tax forum Thursday.

The discussion was sponsored at the Ruidoso Public Library by the Ruidoso Board of Realtors as part of Private Property Week.

Other panel members were county commissioner Bill Elliott, county assessor Paul Baca and Toney Baird, from the State Property Tax

Division. Although the turnout was small, the panel answered questions posed and explained parts of the taxation system.


Lincoln County currently assesses land at 1975 values. They will re-assess at 1980 values in 1986.

Baca explained the re-assessment will not necessarily raise taxes. He said as the valuation goes up, the total rates will drop. There is a statewide yield control formula on property taxes. "Governments are not in

business to make money," said Elliott.

Many present at the forum said they would prefer assessment to be at the current and correct values. When asked if he feels the State Legislature will pass such an act, Baird said it probably will not happen until 1988 or 1990.

"I personally feel that the Legislature doesn't understand about rates and the effects on taxes," said Baird.

Loomis announces for governor



BILL LOOMIS

The first in what will surely be a procession of candidates in the 1986 New Mexico Governor's race visited The Ruidoso News recently.

He is Republican Bill Loomis, who lists his residences as Albuquerque and Las Cruces. Loomis is a Las Cruces native, but has lived in and/or conducted business in more than 100 New Mexico communities.

Loomis is a senior engineer with the Albuquerque-based Loomis Construction Company. The highway and heavy contracting firm was founded in 1959 by Loomis' father, W. J. Loomis Sr., along with Floyd Haake of Ruidoso.

The company has done highway projects in the Hondo Valley, and paved the highway from the Inn of the Mountain Gods to Highway 70, Bill Loomis said.

The candidate is a graduate of New Mexico State University in mechanical engineering. He has been involved in a number of civic, social and professional organiza-

tions, beginning with Boys State—where he was elected youth governor.

Loomis noted a statement by the late Congressman Harold Runnels that more business people should get involved in politics.

"It struck home," said Loomis. He said he had discussed the possibility of a gubernatorial run with Southern New Mexico legislators in recent years. With input from lawmakers in the north, he made the decision in November to seek the nomination.

Loomis has been involved in the legislative process. He lobbied in Santa Fe for a stadium for NMSU, and testified to the Legislature on having an engineer head up the State Highway Department.

A former National Ski Patrol member at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, Loomis is the father of three children. His wife, Rae Nell, and he are the parents of Kristy, 16, Paul, 13, and Jay, 9.

Spring Stepping Lightly into Full Stride

Like the runner, feeling himself out for the early stretches of the race, the season of Spring has been coasting along, testing the weather; and has now got up on its toes and swung into full stride—running for the sheer joy of the run.

In mid-afternoon, here at Storm's Bend, the temperature is an even eighty—the hottest of the year—even though the wind is blowing straight down the valley, straight off the still-considerable drifts of snow still shinning on the mountain.

On the Echo Cliff across from the old corral, all in a day, that queen of the cactus family, the cliff cactus, has come out in full bloom, a scarlet circular mass of glistening blooms high on the face of the perpendicular rock wall. And close by is the waxy white bloom cluster of the cousin of the yucca, the mescal, which through the years has been gaining a toe-hold in a crevice on the sheer cliff and now sends forth—to celebrate this banner year for the children of mother earth—a cluster of blooms, all the more lovely in contrast to the sharp green daggers which surround it on all sides.

The Oak Brush Ventures Out For reasons best known to itself, the oak brush on the hillsides some years does not shed its leaves but keeps them on all winter, lending a pinkish cast to the spaces between the pinoon-and-cedar on high.

Most cautious of all the plants to leaf out—except the mesquite, that Texan of the plant world, which blooms on the sunny dry points on the north side of the river—the oak brush seemed more leery of leafing out this year than most.

In mid-April you looked up there one morning and saw a patch or two of green tinted with light red among the dull pink. The next day a few

more patches appeared. Toward the end of April the hillside fairly glowed with the rapid-growing oak brush leaves, as the sun shone through their delicate tissues of light crimson and yellow-green.

Today the hillside oak is out in full leaf, turning emerald green even as you look.

The Wild Cherry The best I can tell, on the slopes of the White Mountain, there are two main kinds of wild cherry.

Mostly by the riverside grows the ancestor of the sweet cherry—varieties such as the black cherries, the Bing and Lambert; and the pure yellow cherries; and the yellow cherries with red cheeks, such as the Queen Anne, and the Royal Anne. This is strictly a tree and grows to be a giant. The fruit comes in clusters the same as the cultivated cherry.

What must be a more ancient ancestor of the cultivated cherry is a wide-ranging variety that takes many forms, called the "choke cherry" on account of semi-sour "whang" to its flavor that remains until it is completely ripe.

This takes the form of short bushes a couple of feet high to tall ones six or eight feet in height, on up to trees which grow to great size. You will see this tree away out in the wilderness in the dry country, and when you do you may be sure water is near the surface. Around the springs it grows along with the walnuts and oaks.

The fruit, as distinguished from the other type of wild cherry, grows on a cylinder, like corn on the cob, so that you can rake off a handful at one reach.

The first type is already into small cherries; but the choke cherry "did not come down with yesterday's rain" as the Mexican saying goes. It lives by the sure thing, is no gambler, and takes no chances with the frost. The little white buds are only now beginning to open.

The choke cherry makes wonderful jelly and was highly prized by the Native Americans to be eaten ripe, or stored away to dry, or mixed with meat or other food for carrying on journeys.

The cherry is only one of the fruits of the wilderness. And by the way, the fruit in the orchards is making a good beginning.

Miss McConnell says of her character, "Sophia is a dynamic lady who is emerging as one of the core characters on 'Santa Barbara.' I see her as a woman with charm and yet with a chilling determination to get things done, such as finding out who killed her son, Channing Capwell Jr."

Miss McConnell was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., and decided she wanted to be an actress at an early age. She studied at Carnegie Mellon University and spent several years in New York City before she was chosen to co-star in the 1967 series "Judd for the Defense."

Miss McConnell is single and shares her Los Angeles home with her two cats, who have traveled with her from coast to coast.

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

Cheryl Ladd stars in 'A Death in California'

"I like characters that grow and can find an inner strength within themselves," says Cheryl Ladd. "And with everything I've done, I've learned a little about myself."

On Sunday, May 12, and Monday, May 13, on ABC, Miss Ladd co-stars with Sam Elliott and Alexis Smith in "A Death in California."

Miss Ladd plays Hope Masters, a young Beverly Hills socialite who agrees to her boyfriend's request that a "newspaper reporter," D. Jordan Williams (played by Elliott), spend the weekend with them at her mother's ranch.

The weekend turns into a nightmare of rape and murder. Desperate to save her family, Miss Masters appeals to the tender and protective side of Williams and begins to feel a deep sense of gratitude toward the cold-blooded killer.

"The depth of Sam Elliott's character is so amazing, and he plays the character so well," Miss Ladd says of her co-star. "I had wanted to work with him before, and this movie was a terrific opportunity to do so."

The most physically exhausting aspect of her role was psyching herself for the rape sequence. "We shot one whole continuous movement from beginning to end. I just let it happen, and it was pretty terrifying."

Miss Masters' agony becomes more excruciating when she is arrested for the murder of her boyfriend, and Williams — a man she has sworn to protect — is named her co-defendant. Their strange love/hate relationship leads to one of the most bizarre trials in the annals of crime.

Meeting her real-life counterpart helped Miss Ladd make her role more believable. "I met Hope Masters near the end of filming. Having met her, I'm pretty sure I captured the essence of how she dealt with the situation."

The big draw for Patrick Ewing

On Sunday, May 12, Patrick Ewing learns which basket case he will be expected to transform

The humble seven who missed out on the playoffs — the Atlanta Hawks, Golden State Warriors, Indiana Pacers, Kansas City-Sacramento Kings, Los Angeles Clippers, New York Knicks and Seattle SuperSonics — will each present NBA Commissioner David Stern a card with their respective logo. The cards will be sealed in identical envelopes, dropped into a barrel and then chosen one at a time. The team whose envelope is picked first wins the rights to Mr. Franchise. CBS will televise the lottery live from New York.

Until this year, the two worst teams in each conference flipped a coin to determine who would receive the first pick in the draft. And during the last 16 years, one man has dominated this event. He is Ray Patterson, president and general manager of the Houston Rockets, the only GM to take two different NBA franchises to the championship round. He is also the only man to have had the rights to four different first picks.

In 1968, Patterson's expansion team, the Milwaukee Bucks, finished the season with a 27-55 record. The Bucks flipped a coin with the Phoenix Suns for the rights to draft Lew Alcindor

"It was conducted over the phone," recalls Patterson of the low-key proceedings. "Their GM, John Erickson, called heads. It came out tails. I figured we'd be champions within three years." And it came to pass that with Kareem Abdul-Jabbar at center and Oscar Robertson running the show, the Bucks swept the Baltimore Bullets for the 1970-71 NBA title.

In 1983, two years after Moses Malone had led the Houston Rockets to the finals against Boston and one year after leaving for Philly, Patterson's Rockets finished 14-68. They flipped against the Indiana Pacers. This time, "our Chairman of the Board called heads." Heads it was, and Ralph Sampson was a Rocket.

But a year later the Rockets were still the worst in the West. So last spring they flipped with the Portland Trail Blazers for the rights to Akeem Olajuwon. The Blazers had obtained their position from the Cleveland Cavaliers, who had won a furious battle with the Indiana Pacers for the worst record in the East.

But now the coin flip is gone and a lottery is in place. As for the Blazers, they chose wrong and Patterson became the architect of the Twin Towers. "Stay around long enough," he advises the Ewing 7, "and you're bound to win."

And Malle's latest movie, "Alamo Bay," uses the tension between Texas fishermen and recent Vietnamese immigrants to examine the pursuit of the American dream.

In "Alamo Bay," Ed Harris is a shrimp fisherman on the coast of Texas. He and his family have made their living there for generations. But now, Vietnamese refugees are working the same waters. They work hard, put in incredibly long hours and don't understand unwritten "territorial rights." They also are threatening to change the lifestyle of the small town.

Harris is running into hard times. The waters are not as productive as they once were, and his marriage seems to be

headed for the rocks. His boat (only a touch too obviously named "American Dream Girl") is repossessed, and he blames the Vietnamese. The tension mounts, and racial violence is the obvious outcome.

Malle takes a low-key but powerful approach to the proceedings, telling the simple tale in unsensational terms. Harris gives an intense, brooding performance. Amy Madigan plays Harris's childhood sweetheart and occasional mistress. She's also the woman caught in the middle. Her father needs Vietnamese workers to keep his business afloat, but Harris would like them all sent "someplace else."

The film is filled with irony. The title reminds us of the heroic stand at the Alamo in which all the defenders were killed. The local Ku Klux Klan leader quotes Martin Luther King as he tries to organize the fisherman against the Vietnamese.

The film is disturbing and eloquent. This is how a perceptive outsider views of the state of the American dream.

The new Cannonball tries to capture original's spirit

The rules for the "Cannonball One Lap of America" are simple: "You get in your car (in Detroit)," says Brock Yates, the race's creator and editor-at-large of Car and Driver magazine. "You drive to Helena (Montana), then on to Portland (Oregon), then you make a left and go to San Francisco..."

Eight days, 28 states and 8,800 miles later, the first car to return to the Motor City takes home the \$15,000 first prize.

The second annual "One Lap," which took place this past March, airs Sunday, May 12 as a one-hour "SportsWorld" special on NBC. It is an offshoot of the infamous "Cannonball Baker Sea-to-Shining Sea Memorial Trophy Dash" of the 1970s, since glorified in Burt Reynolds' "Cannonball Run" movies. But Jim Millman, president of Millsport and producer of the program, is quick to point out the differences between the two competitions.

"This is not a race," he says. "It's a time-distance rally. The competitors will average approximately 52 miles per hour over the course of the event, and they will follow a specific route with designated checkpoints."

Eighty vehicles, including a 1959 Rolls-Royce driven by "Benihana" boss Rocky

Aoki, started this year's "One Lap."

Millsport used two camera crews to capture the swashbuckling style of the event. One crew — the team of Paul Page and John Harrison — was an unofficial participant, while the other team hopped-scotched the course, looking for interesting moments to film.

"In terms of producing," says Bob Basche of Millsport, "this was one of the most intriguing undertakings ever, because the participants were spread out all over the country."

Unlike its predecessor, the "One Lap" is a legal event. Uniroyal is its sponsor, and many local police departments cooperated.

"It's quite a navigational challenge," adds Millman, "and it still keeps up the spirit of the original Cannonball."


