

## Army trains here

Ruidoso residents looked up Saturday to see an unusual sight in the skies over the village. No, it wasn't Superman. The U.S. Army brought 12 helicopters into the area to practice "mountain flying"—and practice they did.

The brown giants circled, turned and "puttered" most of the day, with short stops at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

First Lieutenant Douglas A. Rivera explained that the group is based in Fort Hood, Texas. They are on a two-week practice mission, and the mountain practice is part of the assignment.


"It's flat where we come from," said Chief Warrant Officer Ronald R. Hauser.

Rivera and Hauser stepped out of one of the two smaller helicopters in the group that landed at the airport. They said their small chopper is used for observation flights.

Also on the mission, which reached Ruidoso by way of Fort Bliss, Texas, were eight "Cobras" and two "Hueys." The Cobras are fighter helicopters. The rockets mounted on the sides and fronts of the eight fighters were unarmed for the practice.

The other two helicopters, the "Hueys," are the large transport air vehicles. Rivera said they carry troops, supplies and equipment.

Crew members stopped in Ruidoso just long enough for lunch, and then continued their field training and later disappeared into the sunset.

## Dam bids \$7.2-9.7 million

Seven contractors submitted bids in the second call for bids on the Village of Ruidoso Grindstone Canyon Dam project. Bids were opened Thursday in the Village Administrative Center.

Bids varied from \$7.2 million to \$9.7 million. Project engineers, Boyle Engineering Corporation, estimated the project would cost from \$7 million to \$7.3 million.

Bidders were instructed to sub-

mit one bid for the dam including a facing on the downstream side, and another bid without the facing.

"Structurally there's no difference," said Leroy Givens of Boyle Engineering. Givens said the facing is mainly a cosmetic feature of the dam.

Arco Materials of Farmington was the apparent low bidder with a bid of \$7.4 million with the facing and \$7.2 million without.

Other bids include \$9.7 million and \$9.3 million on the two options by T-Brown Constructors, Inc. of Albuquerque, and \$8.0 million and \$7.3 million by Gibbons and Reed Company of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Gibbons and Reed Company was the only newcomer to Grindstone Dam project bidding. The other six bidders all submitted bids during the first call for bids, which ended April 9.

Other bids were \$8.8 million for either option by Loomis Construction Company of Albuquerque, \$9.1 million and \$8.1 million by Wayne A. Lowdermilk, Inc. of Espanola, and \$8.4 million and \$8.1 million by C.S. McCrossan of Las Cruces.

Bids received during the first call ranged from \$7.8 million to \$12.5 million. Those figures were much higher than expected, so the project was returned to project engineers

for review. The second call for bids reflected cost reductions and project modifications from the engineers.

The Ruidoso Village Council has included consideration of Grindstone Canyon Dam bids on the council agenda for Tuesday, June 25.

Bids on another village project, a metal building to cover the village trash compactor, were opened Friday at village hall.

The three bids received ranged from \$75,268 to \$144,421. Project designer, Al McChesney, was very pleased with the bids, but will review them further before making a recommendation to the Ruidoso Village Council.

Bidders had the opportunity to include seven options to the building. Lowest individual bids were for the metal building, and additional bids included various enhancements.

Firms submitting bids were Buchanan and Buchanan, whose bids ranged from a low of \$99,129 to a high of \$118,529. T.E. Arrington with bids of from \$86,200 to \$127,000, and G. D. Boyd with bids ranging from \$75,268 to \$144,421.

All bids received on the metal building were from local firms. Action on these bids is on the agenda for the Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday.

## Design signs to confines

Sign regulations are not new to Ruidoso. The village has had a sign ordinance since 1970.

Even though it has been revised several times, the basic premise remains—before installing a sign, a permit must be obtained.

Strict size and placement guidelines, enumerated in the official ordinance, must be met before village enforcement officer Paul Davis will approve the permit application.

Davis furnishes copies of the sign ordinance, #84-10, to all applicants or to other interested citizens.

Since Davis is charged with enforcing sign regulations, he would like citizens to be familiar with the rules. He says people often put up signs without obtaining the proper

permits.

According to the ordinance, a sign is "any display to the public view of letters, numerals, figures, statues, devices, emblems, pictures or any parts or combinations ... designed to inform, advertise or promote merchandise, services or activities."

Any person or business intending to use a sign may obtain an application form at Ruidoso Village Hall. Information required on the application includes the name and address of the sign owner as well as the proposed location.

A drawing, specific dimensions, description and a site plan are necessary before Davis rules on whether a sign may be installed.

The cost of a sign permit is calculated at 25 cents per square foot per sign, with a minimum charge of \$10. If Davis denies a sign

application, the fee is not collected.

An appeals process is available for applicants whose sign requests are denied by the enforcement officer. Appeals are heard by the Planning and Zoning Commission, and if denied, may be taken to the Ruidoso Village Council.

Sign types, sizes and illumination are addressed in the ordinance. Signs allowed in commercial areas are larger than those allowed in residential areas.

Even a sign placed in a homeowner's yard requires a sign permit, according to Davis.

"I can grant temporary permits, but all signs must have permits," Davis said.

Temporary signs, holiday signs and real estate signs have special provisions within the ordinance. Davis recommends learning what's allowed before commissioning an expensive sign.

## Chamber 1986-87 officers are named

Bill Hirschfeld will be the next president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. He was voted president-elect at the Board of Directors regular meeting Thursday.

Hirschfeld will take office a year from now, after the term of the new president, Paul Crown. Thursday marked James Paxton's last meeting as chamber president.

A nominating committee presented the board with a slate of recommendations which included the president-elect and four vice president positions. The committee's choices—Barbara DiPaolo for economic development, Bill Carrigan for a second term in operations and management, Sandy Dacy in community development and Bill Hirschfeld in advertising and promotion—were accepted unanimously by acclamation.

The new vice presidents will appoint committees to function throughout the next chamber year.

The board approved a preliminary budget of \$175,460 for the next fiscal year, which begins July 1. Revenue includes income from lodgers' tax funds, membership dues, the Art Festival, the Spree Party and special projects. Expenses included payoff of a \$25,000 credit line from Ruidoso State Bank.

Executive director John Jeffers told the board that the budget in-

cludes a 20-percent buffer. In planning the budget, Jeffers overestimated most expenses by 10 percent, and underestimated the revenues by the same amount.

The credit line, which will be finalized this week, was guaranteed in portions by private citizens. The \$25,000 limit will cover the chamber's deficit through the end of this fiscal year (June 30).

The board earmarked \$3,000 of the credit limit to be used for a computer system. They also approved a planned \$1,000 raise for John Jeffers (bringing his salary to \$30,000 yearly), and a raise for Sunny Hirschfeld, who recently became the office manager.

One fundraiser is the Spree Party, planned for August 28. A \$10,000 shopping spree was chosen as a prize instead of the traditional Cadillac, due to expenses.

Board members said they wanted to lower last year's ticket prices from \$215 to \$150 or \$175 this year. The event will include dinner and dancing at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, with the shopping spree to be raffled at the end of the evening.

Board member Kim Pickett questioned the legality of limiting where the \$10,000 may be spent to chamber businesses. Committee chairman Bill Hirschfeld said he would investigate the legal issue, and remove the chamber restrictions if necessary.

One Cadillac the chamber is giving away is the 1931 car donated by Keith Mills. Mills gave the car to

the chamber, with the provision that he would receive half of the funds from sales of the \$5 raffle tickets.

So far \$7,000 has been collected from ticket sales. Paxton expressed concern that more money was needed for Mills' half.

Tommy Morel, former vice president of advertising and promotion, gave his final report from that committee. Morel said the summer cooperative advertising campaign is in place, with billboards in eight Texas cities and radio commercials in nine Texas markets.

The summer advertising budget totaled \$61,200. The money was made up of funds from the Village of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs Race Track and the state of New Mexico.

Crown told the board that a representative from the Peugeot company will be in Ruidoso next week to discuss possible plans for next year's All-American Pro Ski Classic.

In other business, the board: —Decided to host the August 22 meeting of the State Economic Development and Tourism Department. Governor Toney Anaya is scheduled to attend the meeting.

—Heard a report from Art Festival chairwoman Flodie Wilson that plans are well underway for the show. Wilson showed this year's poster, which features a Gordon Snidow painting. Wilson said that more than one-third of the 100 signed posters were already sold.

—Tabled plans for having at each chamber meeting a representative from the Mescalero Apache tribe until Wendell Chino returns from his European trip.

## Sierra Blanca inmate escapes

Harvey Whiteshield, an inmate of Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) minimum security prison in Fort Stanton, apparently escaped Friday, June 21.

Whiteshield, out on work release, evidently walked away from his job at the Ruidoso Inn, according to

Lieutenant Max Saucedo of CSB. The escapee is described as a 5' 9" male, who weighs about 170 pounds. He has black hair and brown eyes, and when last seen was wearing a blue uniform shirt, dark blue pants and a Levi's jacket.

Saucedo said that any escapee is considered to be dangerous.

# Racing wrap-up

## Arnett horse takes \$68,176 in Norgor

Trainer Bob Arnett and Preston Farms combined to win the seventh running of the rich Norgor Futurity on Sunday at Ruidoso Downs - monopolizing the half-mile stake for the fourth time.

The '85 version went down as a mild upset with My Kinda Loom taking the \$68,176 winner's share from the \$136,351 gross purse.

The dark brown colt broke at more than 5-1 behind 8-5 favorite Striding Easy, who had posted a sizzling 46-second clocking in trials for the Norgor one week ago. Jockey Jerry Nicodemus provided an added incentive in the wagering, making his first appearance on a thoroughbred at this track in more than seven years.

The 10-horse field for the Norgor broke alertly over a track left sloppy by heavy afternoon rains. Longshot Track Ambassador, J.R. Johnson and Striding Easy lined up through the backside vying for the lead to the stretch turn, with My Kinda Loom tracking the leaders less than a length back under leading rider Joe Martinez.

Striding Easy was forced wide and out of contention on the turn as Track Ambassador and J.R. Johnson continued to match strides

to the top of the lane. My Kinda Loom hugged the rail just off the pace throughout the turn, drawing alongside J.R. Johnson with one furlong to go.

The duo splashed through the final 200 yards with My Kinda Loom winning by a neck in 47 1/5 seconds. Pedro Benitez was aboard J.R. Johnson for runnerup money of \$29,997. The winner returned mutuels of \$12.20, \$5.60 and \$4.40.

Track Ambassador had enough left to save the show 2 1/2 lengths

behind J.R. Johnson, paying \$5 and \$3.80. Cuttin A Rug was a nose back for fourth and \$6.20.

Racing resumes at Ruidoso Downs with 12-race programs Thursday through Sunday this week. Thursday's card is highlighted by the \$9,400 Zia Handicap. Saturday it's the \$9,000-added Aspen Handicap for fillies at 5 1/2 furlongs. Sunday's main event features the Governor's Handicap, a \$15,000-added event for older thoroughbreds at 7 furlongs.

## Lucky Native Girl takes Rainbow heat

California rider Danny Cardozo booted Lucky Native Girl to a whisker win in Friday's opening Rainbow Futurity trial heat at Ruidoso Downs with a clocking that withstood the challenge of 110 quarter horses before being nipped on the program's nightcap.

Friday's card spotlighted the last 12 of 36 first-round trial divisions for the \$700,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity, which were run Wednesday through Friday at this mountain track.

The top two horses in each of the 400-yard divisions qualified for a second round of trials scheduled for July 3. The clock comes into play that day, with the 10 fastest horses

moving on to the final of the Rainbow Futurity on July 21.

Lucky Native Girl posted her fifth win from eight races this year, breaking alertly on the rail to post a nose verdict over Silky Plan in :19.95 seconds into a mild headwind.

In the eleventh, Dash S Shadow turned in an eye-catching performance racing to a half-length win as the odds-on choice to stop the clock in :19.99. Baldillez was aboard. But it was the final race on the program that produced the fastest time.

Loquendi, a filly by the thoroughbred sire L'Natural, kept her undefeated record intact with a

sizzling :19.94 second run over Ruidoso's straightaway - the Walter Merrick trainee's fifth consecutive win.

Jockey Roy Brooks was up for the score, one of three horses he steered to victory on Friday's program. Rider Stever Harris also rode three winners.

Also qualifying from Friday's heats were: Mighty Sinful, Vell Anyway, Muscatel, Bug Somebody, Sixarun, Valiance, Goodtime Feature, Firebreather, Sheza Danda, Easy One Fine Day, Pretty Moon Man, Better Than A Cinch, Just Six, Rocket To Rule, Bee Noble, Ask Mister Knowitall, Savy Edition and Please My Man.

## Baldillez, Gilbreath get three wins

In a rare occurrence for the sport of horse racing, jockey Alex Baldillez Jr. and trainer Dwayne Gilbreath combined to win three straight races on Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs, featuring first-round elimination trials for the Rainbow Futurity.

A total of 112 two-year-old quarter horses faced off in 12 heats at the mountain track. The top two finishers in each 400-yard division advanced to final time-trials scheduled for July 3.

The first-round qualifiers go against the clock that day, with the 10 fastest contenders lining up for

the July 21st Rainbow Futurity, projected to offer a \$700,000 purse.

Baldillez and Gilbreath were invincible in the sixth through eighth heats on Thursday. The duo won with Queens Pie in the sixth, then qualified Ms Collinsville in the seventh, and capped the day off with Six Popper in the eighth.

Six Popper daylighted competition to post the top time of the day at :20.03 seconds against a mild headwind. The three qualifiers were the only horses Gilbreath saddled.

Also turning in impressive performances were rider Jacky Martin

with three qualifiers and conditioner Jack Dube, who popped four of his charges into the time trials.

The 24 horses who qualified in Thursday's trials: Six Aces, In Ahfront, Mr Victory Devil, Abita Dial, The Town Dancer, Trica, King Of Sting, Chick Like Pie, Zevis Cash Flow, Main Aid Broadway, Queens Pie and Jostes Super Sound.

In the final six heats: Ms Collinsville, Niko Watch, Six Popper, Discreet, Brigand Silk, My Best Talent, Spoglass Hill, Rhoda Chick, Hava Nightcap, Wind Of Magic, Easy Jets Image and Smashed Rusty.

## Straight Forward wins Master Salls Handicap

Betty Schriewer's Straight Forward fought a strong stretch drive by sprint specialist Special Hank to capture Saturday's \$10,500 Master Salls Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The winner went postward as the fourth choice of 5,414 fans on hand for the afternoon program. Special Hank, a stakes-placed winner of more than \$20,000 last season, took the role of favorite carrying 5-2 odds into the gates.

At the bell, 24-1 outsider Haboob jumped to a quick lead on the nine-

horse field from the outside, drawing up alongside Straight Forward about 200 yards off the break. Special Hank stalked the two front-runners to the turn, saving ground on the rail under Salustio Burgos.

Haboob faded from contention around the stretch turn, while Special Hank hugged the rail to challenge Straight Forward, who raced slightly wide with Kenneth Lewis aboard.

The two horses battled stride-for-stride from deep stretch right down

to the wire with Straight Forward heading Special Hank in a dramatic finish. The final time for the 870 yards was :45.73 seconds.

The winner returned mutuels of \$9.40, \$5.40 and \$4.20. The victory was worth \$6,300 to Schriewer, a native of New Braunfels, Texas. Lynn Lehmann is the trainer.

Special Hank's second paid \$3.80 and \$2.80. Bozart, only a few dollars short of being the favorite, finished third for \$6.20.

## Martin brings in four winners Wednesday

Jacky Martin booted in four winners and one second to qualify five head in first-round eliminations for the Rainbow Futurity on Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs.

Twelve 400-yard divisions kicked off the first of three days of trials for the Rainbow, which is expected to offer a gross purse of \$700,000 for its 22nd renewal on July 21.

Suzann Marney's Charging Wrangler emerged as a leading contender for the Grade I Rainbow

after stepping the top qualifying time (:19.84) among Wednesday's dozen heats.

Rider Martin moved Go Lika Rocket into the time trials, finishing second to Charging Wrangler. The jockey also qualified four winners: Easily Bestored, Bit Of Promise, Sinful Story and Throb.

Wednesday's races produced one additional Rainbow hopeful when Hypersonic and Smooth Moon Jet

finished in a dead-heat for second behind Easy Good Buddy in the third division.

# Thursday racing features Zia Handicap

Racing resumes on Thursday afternoon at Ruidoso Downs, with the \$9,400 Zia Handicap the main attraction. The first of 12 races begins at 1 p.m. Admission gates open at 11 a.m.

The 400-yard Zia is a dash restricted to New Mexico-bred quarter horses three-years-old and older. A case could be made for renaming the event the Easy Jet Handicap, as five of the nine probable starters were sired by Easy Jet, the World Champion in 1969 after winning the Kansas and All American Futurities.

In addition, one of the remaining four starters was sired by a son of Easy Jet. Saucy And Fancy is by Real Easy Jet, who has sired more than 20 stakes winners himself.

Walter Merrick owned and trained Easy Jet, and he also owns and trains Coda Mundi, who he will send out in the Zia as the highweight and probable wagering favorite.

Coda Mundi, who was assigned 123 pounds for the race, has already won a stakes race this year after going winless in 1984 as a five-year-old. He accounted for the Alameda Handicap at Albuquerque in late-

April on a sloppy track, and was second in an allowance race here last Saturday. He has earned \$20,690 already this season, and \$5,640 awaits the winner of Thursday's feature.

Set to challenge Coda Mundi are a coupled pair of Easy Jet progeny trained by O.S. Carlton. They are Easy Trek and State Of Mind. Both won allowance races at Ruidoso Downs in their most recent starts; Easy Trek on June 16, and State Of Mind last Saturday.

Also entered in the Zia is an improving three-year-old filly named Easy Chickadee, also by Easy Jet. She won her first three starts in 1985, then ran poorly in trials for the Kansas Derby on May 19. She might be expected to bounce back with a better race on Friday after a five-week layoff.

Racing will continue at Ruidoso Downs through Sunday, with 12-race programs each day. The main attraction on Saturday is the \$9,000-added Aspen Handicap for three-year-old fillies, while the \$15,000-added Governor's Handicap headlines Sunday's card.





## Masseur takes techniques to track and RAC

Charlie D'Orso spends half his time at the Ruidoso Athletic Club (RAC) and the other half at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

D'Orso works at both places, massaging his clients back into athletic health.

His clients swear by his work. "It's not a soothing massage," D'Orso warns. "It's therapeutic."

Most of his clients come to him after suffering muscle or deep connective tissue damage, such as tissue tearing or straining.

D'Orso asserts that such injuries do not merely "go away" or heal themselves after resting, but can return to further plague the athlete. In such cases, D'Orso takes the patient back to what he calls "square one."

Dale Light, a D'Orso fan and tennis pro at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, says he suffered from tennis elbow and other muscular problems before he accidentally dropped a weight and, in attempting to catch it, tore both biceps and the wing-like muscles extending through the armpits and into the back.


"Charlie's really doing double-duty here because I tore them both at the same time," Light said. D'Orso practices several techniques on Light, including deep connective tissue and stretch reflex therapy.

Deep connective tissue, D'Orso said, is a deep massage designed to open the tissue connecting muscle to bone.

"Muscle tissue and fiber tends to fuse together, creating a blockage of nutrients and some atrophy," he said. "When the connective tissue opens, it allows blood flow into the area."

The stretch reflex technique involves stretching the muscles into the position they were in during the injury, D'Orso explained.

D'Orso was introduced to natural massage healing techni-

ques after being paralyzed from the waist down. Now recovered, he says the opening of physical tissue opened many emotional "blocks" he initially had against recovery.

"Denying that you're ever going to get better is easy to do and hard to stop. When I realized that I had responses to pressure points in my feet and legs, I didn't know what to think. Gradually, it dawned on you that you have to change the way you think about your body and yourself."

At the racetrack, D'Orso's clients are jockeys and soon, he

injuries and work before the races begin. Since he began at the track at the beginning of the season, D'Orso has made several new believers in his trade.

"I came to him with problems from a couple of crushed vertebrae," one jockey said. "Haven't had any troubles since and never rode so good either."

The jockeys agreed that pre-race tension can be cured through a visit to D'Orso. "It relieves a lot of stress," said jockey Darrell Blevin. "Tension is the worst; it just leaves you in a knot."

"Sometimes," D'Orso said, "they get too relaxed. They have to be a little worked up before they go out there or they can get into a lot of trouble. I try to keep an eye on them, and if they seem too far down, I take them aside and put a little pressure here and there to pick them up."

D'Orso stressed the fact that he is neither a physician nor a chiropractor. "I don't do bones," he said.

As for physicians' attitudes toward him, D'Orso said, "They vary, but most don't try to argue with success."

D'Orso found his way to Ruidoso after Racing Commissioner Ron Baserra suggested he come to the Ruidoso and El Paso, Texas, area.

"I work here at the track independently, as a kind of concession," he said. "It's working fairly well and the area is nice."

Although he has yet to work on a horse at Ruidoso Downs, D'Orso said that his success record with them is as good as with humans.

"They're not too thrilled by it at first, but pretty soon they gentle down and let me work on them." He grinned.

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

## Commission hears variance problem

Discussion of cul-de-sacs occupied much of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) meeting Thursday night at the courthouse in Carrizozo.

Gene Duvall, president of the Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates subdivision, reported he could not comply with a recent county commissioners' decision. The commissioners had agreed to grant Duvall a variance for non-complying cul-de-sacs, only if he amends all the disclosure statements for the properties located on the turnarounds.

The commissioners wanted the disclosures to state that the county would not maintain any cul-de-sac with less than 100 feet of turning space.

In Duvall's subdivision, 25 cul-de-sacs did not comply with the county cul-de-sac size regulations.

Duvall told P&Z he could not widen the cul-de-sacs because utilities are located underground in the turnaround easements. Duvall said he did not want to cover the

utility lines with asphalt.

Duvall said he felt there is no reason the county would need to maintain the cul-de-sacs, since the roads will be asphalted.

Lincoln county manager Suzanne Cox said the county provides snow removal services, but the equipment could not turn around in the small cul-de-sacs.

Duvall said he already sold 400 lots with disclosures that stated the county would maintain the roads. He said he could become bankrupt if he had to buy back properties because of an amendment in the disclosure statements.

Cox said the cul-de-sac problem was a result of improper on-site inspections by the county's former engineer. The subdivision was platted with complying cul-de-sacs, with utilities planned on the back line of each lot.

Duvall said Otero County Electric Co-op placed the lines in the easement because they had a "right-of-easement along every county road."

Cox said that the company does not have that right.

P&Z chairman Bill Seelbach said the problem—of Duvall being unable to widen the turnarounds because of the utilities—was "the utility company's fault for not placing the utilities in the proposed (plat) easements."

Cox said she felt the county needs stricter inspections of roads and cul-de-sacs.

Seelbach acknowledged the economic hardship that would be placed on Duvall if P&Z requires the utilities to be moved to the platted back-lot easement.

"I logically cannot re-do millions of dollars worth of work," Duvall said.

Duvall told Seelbach he would have preferred that the utilities would have been located on the back of the lots, but Otero chose the road easements.

Seelbach said Duvall appeared to be earnest in trying to comply with the road regulations, but was hampered by the location of the utilities.

P&Z member Ben Hall suggested P&Z meet with the county attorney and utility company represen-

tatives about the easement problem. P&Z deferred action on the Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates subdivision until after that meeting. P&Z will report the findings at special meeting, which will be scheduled as soon as possible.

After an executive session Thursday, P&Z approved a resolution requiring subdivisions that have been approved by the Lincoln County Commissioners to be filed with the county within 30 days. The commissioners may rescind their approval if the plat is not filed within the time limit.

In other business, P&Z: —Approved final road inspection reports on Coyote Mesa Subdivision and Shauna Downs Estates Subdivision.

—Approved a replat of Lot 9, Block 3, of Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates subdivision (making two lots from one), with the stipulation that the lots either have separate water meters or the purchaser of the new lot have an agreed share of water from the original meter.

## Board hires coach, building complex contractor

The Capitan Board of Education hired a new coach and approved the bid of a contractor for the new cafeteria-library complex at their rescheduled meeting Wednesday.

After meeting in executive session, the board hired David Zane Woodward as coach for the 1985-86 football, basketball and track seasons. Woodward will also teach drivers education.

Woodward coached at Corona for two years, where he was responsible for the sports program. Prior to his coaching position at Corona, Woodward was in the U.S. Army. He has a bachelor's degree from Eastern New Mexico University.

Also at Wednesday's meeting, the board awarded the cafeteria-library construction contract to Hepler-Hodge Construction of Capitan. The company had the lowest bid—\$476,269.

The company will have 57 days to complete the cafeteria. The contractor will pay a penalty of \$100 per calendar day that the job is not finished after August 19.

The board stressed that the cafeteria must be ready before school begins on August 19. Ar-

chitect Jim French said the contractor will have until December 15 to complete the library.

Ray Hodge, contractor for Hepler-Hodge, told the board he will begin the project immediately and be on the site by next week.

The school board heard a complaint by administrative aide Joan Pumphrey. Pumphrey requested to meet with the board in open session, instead of in executive session, as are most personnel discussions.

Pumphrey said she wanted to speak to the board to clarify statements made during the budget work sessions, about a certificate of deposit (CD) which was cashed prematurely in 1982. Her statements, which appeared in an article in The News last month, stated that the board discussed hiring a business advisor because of past problems with investments.

Pumphrey presented two letters concerning the certificate of deposit, to show the board that she was not responsible for the decision to cash the CD.

Also at the meeting, McDaniel questioned Pumphrey about the computer which was purchased for the administration office. Presently, the office is not using the

computer.

Pumphrey said the computer was not in operation because the budget software package included with the computer "would not work." The computer was subsequently loaned to another office, Pumphrey said.

Board president Mark Delgado suggested Pumphrey make a purchase request for the proper software. The board said the computer should be made operational with proper budget software for the administrative office.

Board member Preston Stone said he wanted to see "a little more professionalism" from the administration office. He directed Pumphrey to work closely with Leonard Hays, Capitan school superintendent. Stone pointed out that Pumphrey, as an administrative aide, worked for Hays and that Hays worked for the board of education.

Also on Wednesday night, the board approved an eligibility system presented by activities director Bill MacVeigh. The system requires students to maintain a minimum of a "C" average in all classes if they wish to participate in extracurricular activities.

Any student with an "F" in any of the four major academic

areas—mathematics, English, science and social studies—will not be eligible to participate in extracurricular activities.

The board met Wednesday morning with Rebecca Delgado, from the state Office of Finance, to review the Capitan school budget. Hays reported that Delgado approved the budget with minor changes.

In regular school business Wednesday night, the board:

—Approved the academic letter program. The letter requirement will be an annual grade average of 95 or better.

—Approved Saturday, May 24, as the high school graduation date for 1986.

—Approved a requested leave of absence for third-grade teacher Pam Noriega, to complete a master's degree study.

—Approved budgeted athletic funds for May.

—Approved the unbudgeted activity fund, after discussion of the payment of debts by the band and Future Farmers of America.

—Approved the state group health plan.

—Approved a Chapter 1 budget transfer.

—Approved the cafeteria report for May.

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# Fire Department stresses training

There's a lot more to fighting a fire than just pouring on the water, said Danny Garcia of the Ruidoso Fire Department.

Garcia, who joined the department when he was just 16 years old, is responsible for training village fire fighters. He has ongoing programs for paid employees and for volunteers.

He'll soon be busy training four new fire fighters who will become paid firemen July 1. The new fire fighters, all currently members of the volunteer fire department, are Jessie Reynolds Jr., Sam Firelli, Andy Willingham and Mike Coker.

"There's a hundred different obstacles in getting to a fire," Garcia said. Preparing fire fighters to overcome those obstacles is part of the overall training.

Garcia takes his responsibility very seriously, and spends a lot of time observing new fire fighters before turning them loose with department equipment.

Learning about the equipment is first and foremost on Garcia's training agenda. He explained that the department has five different trucks, the oldest a 1955 GMC, and the newest a 1983 model.

Just learning to drive the five powerful trucks is a big job. Besides differences encountered in driving the trucks, each one has a different series of gauges and pumping apparatus.

Garcia and other fire department personnel make sure the trucks are properly maintained and spotlessly clean.


"We keep these trucks for 30 years," Garcia said proudly. "We take care of them." Garcia displayed the oldest truck, shiny white and in perfect running order; evidence of the care the firemen provide.

Besides the trucks with their gauges, pumps and ladders, Garcia teaches fire fighters how to use air-packs and bunker gear. The self-contained air tanks are designed to last through 30 minutes of even, steady breathing.

Garcia explained that air in the air-pack tank can be depleted very quickly if the user doesn't know how to breathe properly.

Bunker gear, which weighs about 40 pounds, is the fireproof protective coats, helmets and boots the fire fighters wear to fires.

Garcia conducts daily run-throughs on trucks and equipment with paid personnel who are on duty. The department also conducts twice-monthly workshops on various phases of fire fighting.

First aid training is included in Garcia's training program. He said most paid members of the department are "certified first responders." Those skills are reviewed often, and taught to new fire fighters.

Daily two-hour workouts are a new addition to the training regimen. Garcia has designed the fitness routine, and will teach it to department members beginning July 1.

Weekly volunteers' meetings are extended training sessions. "I have films and videotapes on everything from rolling hose to driving trucks," Garcia said. He shows them during the weekly meetings.

Garcia keeps extensive training records on volunteers and department staff members. He has designed a card system so that he

can pull any fire fighter's file and know what skills have been introduced and practiced, and for how long.

Training is also available through the state, and Garcia said someone from Ruidoso usually attends a yearly week-long fire school sponsored by the state. New Mexico also provides instructors to present on-site workshops several times each year.

Garcia says all are welcome to visit volunteer fire department meetings at 6:30 p.m. each Monday in the downtown fire station. The volunteers number about twenty, and the organization has an open membership.

"We've never turned anyone down," Garcia said. He praised the volunteers for their knowledge and dedication.

# Airport safety up

Ruidoso Municipal Airport is accident-free so far this year, according to airport manager Tim Morris. Morris, who has managed the facility for seven years, is proud of two recent improvements in airport services. One is the full-time air traffic control tower. The other is the addition of a certified airplane mechanic to the airport staff.

A tower facility with air traffic controllers on duty from daylight until dark was added less than a year ago, and Morris says pilots are pleased with that service.

Morris attributes the accident-free beginning of a busy summer to the addition of the tower.

"We had so much traffic, we couldn't control it," Morris said. Complete records aren't available on past years' traffic, but the airport has 96 airplane parking slots, and Morris says they've had to find places for as many as 144 planes on busy weekends.

The addition of an airplane mechanic should make life easier for pilots using the airport, said Morris.

Richard Stegall, a certified airplane mechanic, is a full-time member of the airport staff. Stegall received most of his training in the military, but went back to school for refresher training before becoming the airport mechanic.

A yearly inspection is required of all private planes, and Stegall can do those in the airport shop. He has a complete shop and does major and minor repairs.

Morris said in the past airplane owners had to fly in qualified mechanics or even have airplanes towed to other cities for repairs. Stegall has simplified airplane maintenance for local plane owners and for others utilizing local facilities.

The Ruidoso Airport is a great deal safer than it's ever been, said Morris.



## Low income housing opens in Downs

Inspiration Heights, a low to moderate income apartment complex on the corner of B Street and Spring Road in Ruidoso Downs, is now completed and accepting tenants.

The eligibility requirement for occupancy is that the applicant household must have an annual total income of less than \$20,500. Applicants are required to submit income verification from their employers.

Rental costs are figured on 25

percent of the applicant's adjusted monthly income, or a basic rental rate, whichever is greater. The basic rate for a one-bedroom unit is \$204; two-bedroom unit, \$243; and \$296 for a three-bedroom apartment. Tenants must pay their own utility bills.

The rental project, managed by RHA Management Company, was funded jointly through the Farmers Home Administration and private entities. Of the units, 14 are government subsidized for very low income tenants.

The apartment complex has six buildings with a total of 48 apart-

ments. The grounds are landscaped and will include two play areas and a basketball court.

Apartment manager Alisa Day said many units are still available. She said she is excited that the complex is open and people can start moving in.

"When most people hear 'low income apartments,' they think of a dump, but not with me," she said. "This is brand new—my home and their (tenants') home. The place will be kept up," said Day.

## Water study finds no giardiasis

Ruidoso's municipal water supply got a clean bill of health during a recent study.

Barbara Lindsay, a graduate student in civil engineering at New Mexico State University (NMSU), included the Ruidoso water system in a master's degree study.

Lindsay and NMSU colleague Ricardo B. Jacquez, who worked with her on the project, will present the results of their research during a public meeting at 2 p.m. Thursday, June 27, in the Village Administrative Center.

The title of the project is "Selective Evaluation of New Mexico Water Supply Systems to Determine the Potential for Outbreak of Giardiasis."

Village water technician Becky Durham invited Lindsay to include Ruidoso in the project after two cases of giardiasis were confirmed in village residents last summer. It was never proven that the giardiasis came from the village water.

Durham, who tests for bacteria once a month, but has no laboratory test for giardiasis, explained that she contacted the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) after the cases were identified. She asked them to do extensive testing on Ruidoso's water system.

She said EID officials told her

they didn't have facilities nor did they know of any facilities to test for giardiasis. That's when Durham and other village employees decided to contact Lindsay.

"Nobody else does it (giardiasis testing)," Durham said. Lindsay and Jacquez, using state-of-the-art laboratory techniques, were the village's only source to test for giardiasis.

Jacquez explained that giardiasis is a water-borne microorganism that lives only in cold, mountainous streams or lakes. At temperatures above 15 or 16 degrees Celsius, the protozoan can't survive, he added.

Since municipal water supplies come from mountain lakes and streams, Ruidoso is a prime target. This was a reason the researchers agreed to include Ruidoso in the study.

The infectious form is actually a non-active cyst that is transmitted by water. When ingested, the cyst changes to its active form as a trophozoite.

The trophozoite infects the intestines of the animal or human who drank the water.

Symptoms in infected humans include stomach cramps and intestinal discomfort, Jacquez said the symptoms usually last several days, and he recommends seeking medical attention.

"We're not finding that it is a real severe problem," Jacquez said. "We didn't find any cysts in the Ruidoso system," he added.

Jacquez said Ruidoso's new treatment plant is very modern and no problems were identified there. He said the older plant had some potential problems, but they were corrected during the study.

Durham said a turbidimeter was installed in the old plant before the summer of 1984. Water usage increases drastically in the summer.

Turbidity is the cloudiness or muddiness of water, and can be a clue that there is something unhealthy in the water. Flooding in 1983 caused the river to be muddy, and that caused a much higher turbidity level in village water.

The turbidimeter shuts down the water being supplied when a prescribed level is reached. The Environmental Protection Agency sets limits for turbidity in municipal water systems.

Durham said that upper level is reached when the river gets especially muddy, as it did during 1983 summer floods.

Besides monthly bacteria tests, Durham does daily turbidity and fluoride tests. She also responds to calls from village water users who suspect problems in their residential or commercial water supplies.

Durham participated in the field testing performed by the NMSU team. They took samples back to Las Cruces for laboratory work.

Durham invites all village water users to hear Lindsay's complete findings during Thursday's meeting.

Cora and Art Blazer had attended a family reunion of Cora's people, the Carpenters, last weekend at the Nazarene campground on the Bonito River.





**Care necessary**  
Sloppiness has no place in the handling of nuclear materials or in the production of power from radioactive sources. We live in the nuclear age whether we like it or not. Nuclear energy has to be a part of the world's future when fossil fuels run out.  
Ignorance of the dangers in handling nuclear materials is part of our problem today. An example is the tragedy in Juarez where a

discarded x-ray machine sold for scrap in a junkyard was blended into steel products sent to 40 U.S. and 14 Mexican states.  
The death of a child is being attributed to that incident. The boy was exposed to radioactive steel rebar contaminated with cobalt 60.  
We read of leaks at atomic power plants or of other major crises such as at Three Mile Island. Some laxity by operators of such plants has

been indicated. With proper attention to business and to possible hazards, there should be no foulups.  
Perhaps a mini-course on the many facets of nuclear energy at high school level should be mandatory across the land. Not only would tomorrow's citizens be more aware of the hazards in handling radioactive material, they would be more aware of future benefits. They would be better qualified to

assess any future contact with a potentially dangerous situation. They would know, for instance, that a discarded x-ray machine might pose a hazard and could blow the whistle.  
Education is the key. Handled correctly, nuclear energy and devices promise much for the future. But the dangers must be recognized and widely understood.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—An older and plumper David Cargo (one-time governor of New Mexico, remember?) is back, and manipulating Albuquerque television stations as skillfully as ever.  
He doesn't just provide one of those stereotyped and boring sit-down interviews, with the camera peering alternately over each person's shoulder. Not our Dave. With Cargo's panache, he struts in a leisurely fashion with the reporter in the summer sunshine, and then chats affably on a park bench like some minor-league Bernie Baruch.  
That's one of the most marked differences between chief executives—the way they work with (or against) the news gatherers.  
Those around Jerry Apodaca sometimes thought it was a little risky to let the press get at him. He had—and has—a fiery temper, and the lightning would sometimes flicker and the thunder crash right in the middle of a news conference if the question asked got close to the bone.  
But he bravely exposed himself regularly. During his four years in office such news conferences were held at least once weekly.  
By temperament, Apodaca is such a contender that he always rose to the challenge and enjoyed matching wits, if the media types may be said to have such.  
With Bruce King it was almost too easy.  
Bruce, of course, likes people—or if he doesn't, he has sure trained himself to act as though he does. He always seems ready to pause and chat a little, in preference to performing those gubernatorial duties which frankly bore hell out of most occupants of the job after 18 months or so on duty.  
Almost every morning, King would wander out, entirely on his own hook, to drink a cup of coffee with those of us who are regular denizens of the Roundhouse. We love to chat almost as much as he does, so that served all our purposes very well indeed.  
When Toney Anya took office, the word was that he had here a Dave Cargo *redévisus*. Now, it was thought, we would see somebody operate who knows how to handle the media like Casals handles a cello.

And so the new Governor began with great enthusiasm. We were summoned to the governor's conference room regularly—almost as frequently as in Lonesome Dave's day, when, the rumor had it, it was not unusual to hold two press conferences a day.  
But in Toney's time, that frequency fell rapidly, because, one suspects, he was reading his own clippings. Within a few months taking over the job, he was publicly complaining that somehow his message was not getting across to the citizens.  
Sometimes he said that was his fault and the fault of his administration, but always the feeling left with a listener was that he truly believed we had set out to misrepresent him.  
That wasn't necessary. The fact is he talked too much, on too many topics, as he and those around him now know. Many of the unfortunate things said about him in the public prints came from one source—his mouth.  
Nowadays, of course, he seldom if ever calls us in to let us range freely over any subject matter. When there is a news conference (and three weeks to a month go by without one being held here), it is often on a single pre-chosen subject, and reporters are warned in advance that he will not answer question on any other topic.  
Visits to the coffee bar in the early morning hours have also ended, possibly out of worry on the part of his public relations people that he will blurt out something the public might be better off not knowing.  
Now he prefers one or another of two different devices. He takes his news conferences on the road, holding them outside Santa Fe, where he will not have to face a news corps that follows state government closely. Or if he grants interviews to people here, they are on a one-on-one basis, perhaps so that one reporter's questions will not spark embarrassing queries in the minds of other members of the media.  
As reporters say when they complain about President Reagan's record, which is probably better than Anya's, it is the public that gets shortchanged when the media get frozen out.

## On the Village Beat


What is the most popular social event in Ruidoso? Is it a dance, show or sports event? Nope.  
Probably the most popular social event in Ruidoso is going to the post office.  
Ruidoso is different from most larger towns in that much of Ruidoso's mail must be picked up at the post office. Home delivery in the village is limited by several factors. So most of us have to go there, at least once in a while, if we want to see what comes for us in the mail.  
Visiting the post office regularly is a social must. Plan to set aside about an hour a day of post office time. That will allow plenty of time for visiting with friends, catching up on all the latest "poop" in town and doing a proper job of an old Ruidoso post office tradition, the "poke and peer parade."  
The poke and peer parade is when you are on your way out of the post office with a big stack of fresh mail that you absolutely have to "poke" through as you walk slowly down the post office hallway and out into the parking area. Of course, it is necessary to occasionally raise your eyes and "peer" over the stack of mail to make sure you're still heading in the right direction.  
If you're not in such a big hurry, you can do all your poking right there at your box. The longer you stay at your box, casually examining your mail, the better the chances are for someone you know to come along, or to hear some interesting local news tidbits.  
A big part of the socializing is to go buy stamps at the counter. Conversation is usually flowing from one postal patron to another and it's always fun to join in the banter.  
One tip to newcomers—make sure you stand close enough to the person in front of you in line, or you may find others stepping in front of you and taking your place. For some strange reason, normal

distances between people standing in lines, like at the bank or grocery store, do not apply at the post office.  
Why? Who knows. It's just another of the Great Mysteries of Ruidoso.  
The paramount rule at the post office, like at the dentist's office, is to visit regularly. Sometimes I have broken this rule, much to my regret.  
If you forget to go to the post office for, let's say, a week, you will find on your return that disaster has struck your mail box.  
Like an unrestrained pair of mice, your mail will have multiplied in population by leaps and bounds.  
Removing the seemingly hundreds of pieces of mail from the box is kind of like excavating delicate archaeological ruins. You don't want to pull the stuff out too quickly or ... WHOOPS! ... mail avalanches out all over the back side of the wall and some poor postal worker has to retrieve your mail.





**Movie Nostalgia**

Jack Nicholson, no stranger to Hollywood lunacy, gave one of his most stunning performances in "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest," a black comedy about life in a ward for the insane. The film was adapted from Ken Kesey's 1962 novel. The book had been adapted for Broadway soon after its publication, but it wasn't until 1975 that "Cuckoo's Nest" made it to the screen.

Nicholson starred as McMurphy, a (literally) irrepressible Irishman who commits himself to an asylum to avoid the drudgery of a penal camp. Soon he clashes with Nurse Ratched (Louise Fletcher), a stickler for rules and regulations, but he succeeds in shaking the other patients out of their nodding complacency. In the end, though, Nurse Ratched suppresses him with some of the less comic features of asylum life — straitjackets, shock treatments and finally lobotomy.

The film swept all five of the top Academy Awards in 1975: Best Picture, Best Actor, Best Actress, Best Screenplay and Best Director. Its director, it seems, wins his Oscars in bunches. His most recent film garnered eight of the awards for its portrayal of another, more artful, kind of lunacy.

**Billy Hufsey's life reads just like a movie script**

The first 26 years of Billy Hufsey's life read like a movie-of-the-week. A middle-class kid from what Hufsey describes as "a rough neighborhood of Cleveland" uses boxing to make a name for himself.

And when a bum elbow knocked him out of the ring, Hufsey reacted like any plucky movie hero. He chose dancing as his new ticket to stardom, and kept plugging away.

His friends supported his choice, but his family wasn't so sure. "I'd always been a physical person," says Hufsey. "But after boxing everyone in my family said, 'Hey, get a job.'"

Hufsey stuck with dancing. He was good enough to be named the U.S. Singles Disco Champion in 1979, and he eventually got a job — as a dancer in the 1980 movie "Graduation Day."

From there, he won a role on "Fame," just in time to find that NBC had canceled the series. But the show was then "uncanceled" by its producer, MGM/UA, and picked up for syndication, where it has continued to attract a solid audience.

Now Hufsey is ready to start his third year as Christopher Donlon, and viewers soon will get to see a new side of the character. "I play five instruments," says Hufsey, "so Donlon will be playing them, too."

Hufsey is excited about doing another 24 episodes of "Fame," but he is even more excited about his debut as a poster boy. Hufsey even predicts that the poster, in which he is clad in a white towel that barely covers his loins, will outsell similar efforts from Richard Gere and Tom Selleck.

**UH-ONE, UH-TWO** — This week, champagne toasts will be made to the toast of champagne music. Thirty years ago, on July 2, "The Lawrence Welk Show" made its television debut.



What exactly is the message of "Martin Mull Presents the History of White People in America" parts I and II? Is it that similar, on-the-level documentaries about various population groups are racist in nature? That generalizations about ethnic groups are absurd?

The problem with this new Cinemax Comedy Experiment (Part I airs June 30 and Part II on July 4) is not the actors. Martin Mull and Fred Willard are fine and Mary Kay Place can do no wrong in this viewer's eyes.

The problem is the material. The points are all made in the first five minutes. After that, how long can we listen to dry, tongue-in-cheek narration about the blandness of "white people"?

Look for cameo appearances by Teri Garr, Steve Martin and Bob Eubanks. Those are highlights in an otherwise un-stirring hour.

There's a surprise or two in store for the new season on "Paper Chase: The Third Year." Hart (James Stephens) is now running the Law Review and plans to challenge some old traditions.

And then there's Rose Samuels, a 40-ish housewife and mother who returns to law school after separating from her husband. Rose Samuels is played by Lainie Kazan,

whose varied career includes films ("My Favorite Year"), stage ("Seesaw") and nightclubs (just about every venue in the country).

Of course, the young law students immediately take to her, and one even asks her to sew on a pocket. Episode 2 of the new season airs June 30 on Showtime.

If you didn't get enough Olympics last year, there's a chance to watch them again. For 16 days on ESPN, beginning June 29, "Spirit of Excellence: The 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games" will air 175 hours of athletic prowess from last summer. Gold medalists will host the encore showing and 25 events will be aired in their entirety.

It's a small compensation for having no new Olympic games, but it's better than nothing.

## 'A-Team' and classical theater mix, Schultz finds

Every profession has its snobbism — and Dwight Schultz, who plays "Howling Dog" Murdock on NBC's violent action/adventure series "The A Team," would seem to be fair target of scorn from his higher-minded classical-acting colleagues.

"Not at all," Schultz insists. "My theater friends are wonderful and supportive. If it's one thing that unites actors, it's that we all share 10 or 15 years of struggle. They couldn't be more happy for me."

"I have the best of both worlds doing TV and theater," says Schultz, who most recently starred in Ibsen's "Peer Gyn" at the Williamstown (Massachusetts) Theatre. "The series has afforded me the opportunity to play Peer and to produce my own plays (in Los Angeles). I could never have done that before. Also, theater is so expensive that producers are very careful about who they cast, and they look for a TV draw. Six months after "The A-Team" started, when it looked like it was a hit, I got an offer to take over Edward Herrmann's lead role in the Broadway production of "Plenty." That had a lot to do with my TV recognition."

But Schultz, who is very different from the ebullient Murdock, admits that he rarely is recognized. "I'll go out to dinner with (co-star) George Peppard, and everyone will recognize him, but no one knows who I am. Most of the time it's a pleasure."

Schultz is the national chairman of the American Juvenile Association, and on a recent appearance, "a child asked to see my I.D. cards because he couldn't believe I was Murdock." As a skilled character actor, Schultz considers the incident a backhanded compliment.

Schultz, who is married to actress Wendy Fulton, grew up in Baltimore and graduated with a degree in theater from Towson State University there. He started his own theater ensemble company in Baltimore and went on to perform with some of the most well-respected theater companies in the country. He received the "A-Team" offer while working in Off-Broadway shows. Although he says, "The pilot script made me laugh out loud," he didn't think the show would be a hit until the pilot was shot in Mexico. "Mexican civilians just kept coming up to stare at (Mr.) T. It was phenomenal. I knew that was it."

Pirates. Buried treasure. Maps in attics. Bank robbers. Unexplored caves. Evil villains. Booby traps. Ice cream. The Hardy Boys. A first kiss. Secret clues. Skeletons. A giant underground water slide.

"The Goonies" is all that and much more. In fact, almost everything a 12-year-old dreams about is in this movie "The Goonies" (written by Chris Columbus, but based on a story by Steven Spielberg) is "Raiders of the Lost Ark" for the preteen set.

Is that so terrible? That depends on your perspective. "Goonies" is definitely kid stuff — a comic-book melange of thrills and chills, with more than enough humor thrown in to insure that none of it is taken seriously. Seriously, however, has nothing to do with corny, and several of the scenes in this film are so blatantly cornball that one wonders how even an 8-year-old can watch some of it without cringing.

Richard Donner directs, but there is little doubt that Spielberg is the guiding force behind the project. Along with the aforementioned "Raiders"

connection, there are also references to other Spielberg films, and the quick pacing is that of a Spielberg or Lucas. Even the ogre (played with gusto by pro football's John Matuszak) looks like a cross between Yoda and the Elephant Man.

Donner tries to put some new wrinkles on old twists in the film. Some work, some don't. The story concerns a motley group of young boys and two girls, and Donner employs the method of overlapping dialogue that was used so effectively by Howard Hawks in "His Girl Friday." But not all of the young performers have Rosalind Russell's and Cary Grant's elocution, so dozens of lines are lost in the frenetic pacing.

But that won't present much of a problem to the kids in the audience. The visuals will keep them occupied, and if they miss a line or two, they'll probably catch it the next time around. Or the next. Or the next.



New categories added to this year's Emmys include Outstanding Ingenue in a Drama Series, Outstanding Juvenile-Young Man in a Drama Series and categories for Music Direction-Composition, Hairstyling and Makeup.

## Tears for Fears and a studio full of extras

'Shout' along

Tears for Fears' latest video, "Shout," is one of two versions made when the single was released a while back — before "Everybody Wants to Rule the World" turned the group into a household name.

The clip builds in intensity, going from long sweeping pans of the band on mountain cliffs, to close-ups of the instruments during the instrumental break and a climax that includes a studio full of extras. By the end of the song, you may want to shout along yourself. Why not?

Stylistically consistent?

The Power Station's video version of the old T. Rex classic "Bang a Gong (Get It On)" is shot in the same style as its first clip, "Some Like It Hot." The band's use of high-contrast shots in both videos could be praised for stylistic consistency or condemned for unimaginative reliance on one gimmick, depending on your viewpoint. This clip happens to work for me, but it may not work for everyone.

Letting go

In Animation's second video, "Let Him Go," the song lyric, which is actually about letting your lover go, is used to make a wider statement — and suggest that we should "let go" of

the pressures of society.

Stock symbols, like a running horse and a soaring bird, are used to denote freedom, and a grinding wheel and men in business suits are used to signify work and conformity.

The clip ends with the band happily playing in a studio, which brings up an interesting question: Who are they to tell us that our work is dull and theirs is fun? Think about it.

They won't pay

You can expect to see fewer videos from CBS record labels, including Epic, Columbia and Portrait, on local music video shows.

CBS recently decided to start charging a significant price for clips that these local shows had been getting for free, so many shows are pulling these clips in retaliation.

Since many of these shows are tied in with radio stations, you may be hearing less from CBS recording artists as well. CBS artists include Cyndi Lauper, Michael Jackson, Culture Club, The Hooters, Bruce Springsteen, 'Til Tuesday and many others.

CBS is merely trying to recover some of its expenses, but since many local video shows are just breaking even, they are hardly willing to pay for clips, especially after MTV has had exclusive use of them for as long as three months.

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
