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## Council tables dam bids

Bids for the Grindstone Canyon Dam project were tabled at the Tuesday meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council until the council can conduct a workshop session to discuss the bid situation more thoroughly.

In other action, the councillors accepted the bid of \$81,084 from G. D. Boyd for the construction of a metal building over the village trash compactor.

The council delayed a decision on the Grindstone bids to allow time to determine if revenue bonds may be issued to cover part of the cost of the project. Apparent low bidder, at \$7.2 million and \$7.5 million, was Arco Materials of Farmington. The bids ranged from the low Arco bid to a high bid of \$9.7 million by T-Brown Contractors, Inc. of Albuquerque.

Each of seven contractors submitted two bids—one for the dam without a facing and the other with a facing. Grindstone Dam engineers Boyle Engineering reported that the addition or lack of the facing will present no structural difference.


Village manager Jim Hine reported that \$6.2 million is available now for the dam from the earlier issuance of bonds. Hine noted that the addition of a \$1.2 million bond, plus the interest gained from the investment of the bond money, would bring the project within \$95,000 of the projected cost, "as close to zero as we can get."

Councillors voted to set a special workshop meeting for Tuesday, July 2, to make a final determination of whether to go ahead with the project. Fred Burns of Boyle Engineering advised the councillors that the low bidder must be notified by July 20 if the low bid is accepted.

Burns pointed out the necessity for developing the Grindstone project.

"Water is the life line of the existence of Ruidoso," Burns said. "In the past, the council has been very prudent in the development of their water."

The engineer stressed that both the Grindstone project and the newly discovered wells on Sierra Blanca must be developed to satisfy the future water need for Ruidoso.

The bids were the second set of figures the council has studied on the Grindstone project.

Also during the meeting, the councillors heard trash compactor building architect Al McChesney express his pleasure at the outcome of the call for bids on the metal building project. He noted that three local contractors submitted bids.

McChesney suggested that the installation of overhead doors and three "dead man" tie backs be added to the basic bid, bringing the Boyd bid to \$81,084. Councillors unanimously approved the low bid.

In other business, the councillors: —Accepted, provided state Aviation Division matching funds are still applicable, the proposal by Gary Havens of Midwest Air Traffic Controllers to provide services to the Ruidoso Municipal Airport for \$72,000 next year.

Havens undercut the \$76,000 estimate provided to the council earlier by Airport Manager Tim Morris for air traffic control of the airport.

Believing costs could be cut compared with the price of control last year, Morris had sought direct control of the service through the hiring of village-employed controllers.

But Havens pointed out that he can get insurance much more cheaply than can the village, since

Midwest is a "large carrier," and so his costs are less.

—Approved the line-item changes to the 1985-86 lodgers' tax budget as suggested by Lodgers' Tax Committee Chairman Budgie Green.

Green noted that \$55,000 will be generated next year by the increase in the tax from two percent to three percent. He proposed that \$10,000 of the increase be added to the contingency fund line-item and \$45,000 be added to media advertising.

Councillor Bill Karn raised the question of whether a Lincoln County representative will be appointed to the committee since the county has recently enacted a county lodgers' tax. Village Attorney John Underwood opined that distribution of the two taxes will probably be done through two separate committees.

—Voted to approve the request for a conditional use permit by Ruidoso Optimist President Craig Whipple subject to Planning and Zoning Commission concurrence. Whipple reported that the permit will be used for a carnival next month at the vacant lot between Sierra Blanca Motors and Camelot Theater.

—Heard Underwood report that attempts to curb the recent flurry of handbill distributors in Ruidoso will be enforceable through regulations prohibiting the obstruction of public rights of way.

—Agreed to discuss at the July 2 special workshop meeting the possibility of a joint powers agreement with Lincoln County on the paving of Gavilan Canyon Road.

—Approved Resolution 85-16, providing for final 1984-85 budget changes.

—Conducted an executive session to discuss pending litigation.

—Heard Underwood clarify the councillors' options when declaring a conflict of interest. He reported that a councillor may simply state the conflict then abstain from voting or discussion, or may state the conflict and allow fellow councillors to decide by voting whether the conflict merits abstention.

—Approved the appointments of Mayor George White to the Annexation Policy Committee. Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter, Jim Hine, Frank Potter, Barbara DiPaolo, Buddy Bundick, Leon Eggleston, Karon Petty and Councillor Rick Evans will serve on the committee.

—Approved White's appointments of Slover Cape, Sid Miller, Preston Issacs, Councillor Jerry Shaw and Ralph Petty to the Economic Development Board.

—Approved White's appointment of himself to the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association. White noted that he has served on the association for eight years.

—Approved White's appointments of Noel Bowley, Benny Coulston, Bill Carrigan and Lori Griffin to the Appeals Board for the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings. White reported that he will appoint another person to the five-member board at the next council meeting.

—Directed Underwood to draft an ordinance changing the Utility Expansion Charge from a per-lot charge to a per-unit charge at Karn's suggestion.

—Agreed to consider naming a "sister city" for Ruidoso in a neighboring state or Mexico.

—Approved the request to rezone from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (light commercial) three lots in McCarty subdivision for Ken Carr. Evans cast the single negative vote, citing his concern for the traffic safety of Brady Canyon Road.

—Approved the request to rezone from C-1 to C-2 (general commercial) a lot in Palmer Gateway for LeVerne Cole.

## Bob takes national title

National champion.

That is the title former Ruidoso High School distance runner Cisco Bob wears after winning the Athletic Coaches Association All-American Prep National Boys Cross-Country Championship in Aurora, Colorado, Tuesday.

Bob won the race in 15:46.45, beating the second-place finisher by 100 yards. The course was scheduled to be three miles long, but was actually 200 yards longer than that.

"I feel pretty good about it," Bob said. "This is a big thrill, much bigger than winning the state championship."

"I felt good before the race started. I had a good night's sleep and felt real good the day before." The competition was open to the top recently graduated high school seniors in the country.

Bob won the state AAA-division 1,500- and 3,000-meter championships the past two seasons. He finished second in the state cross-country championships last fall.

James Jackson of Lewisville, Texas, was second with a time of 16:02.20. Paul Morgan of Alamogordo finished third with a 16:13.80 time. Shelton Morgan of Crownpoint was the other New Mexico boy runner, finishing 30th in 17:34.

Bob took the lead with about a mile left in the race. He was in third or fourth place most of the first two

miles.

The former Warrior athlete took the lead on a sandy part of the hilly course.

"It didn't bother me," Bob said about the sand. "I just decided to go out and pass the other runners then."

The race was contested at an altitude of over 5,000 feet, over rolling hills in the Denver suburb. Bob ran and trained in high school at altitudes as high or higher than Tuesday's course.

"He ran a good, smart race," said Warrior head track and cross-country coach Ronny Maskew. "He did just a terrific job."

Following the top three runners in the boys race were Stacy Sutter of McCullough High School in Woodland, Texas; Erik Koskinen of Swartz Creek, Michigan; and Chris Kitzler of Bedford, Ohio.

Sandra Baldwin of DeValls Bluff, Arkansas, won the girls championship. Andrea Broad of Amphitheater High School in Tucson, Arizona, was second.

Bob will be busy the rest of the summer preparing for college at Texas Tech University and participating in an Olympic training camp at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

The training camp is for high school athletes who have Olympic potential.

And Cisco Bob will be going to that camp with a national championship to his name.

## Suspect held in murder

Arson is suspected in a fire that occurred early Wednesday at the Baca Campsite between Lincoln and Capitán. The fire resulted in the death of a Roswell woman, according to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

Lee and Mattie Jo West of Roswell, whose camping trailer burned in the fire, both sustained second- and third-degree burns, police said. Mrs. West died late Wednesday from those injuries, and Mr. West remains in critical

condition at University of New Mexico Medical Center in Albuquerque, police said.

Lincoln County Undersheriff Charlie Cox stated that a suspect, Bill Risen, 57, of Lincoln, is in custody and has been charged with aggravated arson and an open count of murder.

Cox said the charges were approved by District Attorney James Weldon, and that Risen will be arraigned sometime today (Thursday) in Magistrate Court.

# BRW reports on comprehensive plan

"Think of this as for your grandchildren, not for yourselves," said Rich Unger of BRW, Inc. during a public hearing Monday on a proposed master plan for the Village of Ruidoso.

Unger and BRW associate Rick Pilgren spoke to the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) at 3:30 p.m. and then made a public presentation at 6:30 p.m. The two stressed that the plan they're designing won't be implemented overnight.

BRW, Inc. has been commissioned by the Village of Ruidoso to collect data and submit a Comprehensive Plan and a Transportation Plan. Unger and Pilgren, who have completed the data gathering phase, were in Ruidoso Monday to present preliminary findings and hear input from village officials and citizens.

Unger and Pilgren displayed a huge array of maps and charts as they presented a four-phase program including land use, transportation systems, public facilities and a plan concept for the downtown area.

"You're very close to not having enough land within the corporate limits for the projected population of 2010," said Unger during his land use presentation. BRW estimates that Ruidoso's population will swell to 15,000 permanent residents by 2010.

Unger explained that some areas will have to be zoned to allow for higher density or the village will have to consider annexing fringe areas to handle the increased population.

Annexation, Unger explained, would be a useful tool in protecting

Ruidoso's image, but it would also incur responsibilities for fire protection, water, sewer and law enforcement.

The land use plan, as presented by Unger, outlines four categories of residential development based on density. Population density varies from 1/2 unit per acre to 20 or more per acre.

Other land uses identified in the plan include commercial, mixed use and industrial. Unger said the plan includes only a small industrial core because most village industry is suitable for commercial areas.

Unger said the airport land, when it is vacated, will be prime for mixed use. Some examples of uses for the airport land include a community center, a convention center, multi-family dwellings and lodgings.

The comprehensive plan suggests a separate economic analysis of the airport land to establish a master plan for its future development.

That land became a major topic during the evening meeting. About a dozen neighborhood residents were on hand to comment on the future zoning of the airport strip.

Unger explained that the land use study was not a zoning plan. He said zoning still would require another process.

Neighborhood residents still were not pleased, demanding reassurance that the airport strip be changed on Unger's land use map.

"All I see is high density and business," said Bonnie Coe.

Village Councillor Bill Karn, who stated in the public meeting that his comments were not for the press, interjected a lengthy explanation of what impact the zoning of the land might have on the village's obliga-

tion to reimburse the Federal Aviation Agency for airport grants.

Karn explained that the FAA may demand that Ruidoso sell the present airport site and put the funds generated through such sale into the new airport.

"We only owe the federal government for what they put in," Karn said.

Unger and Pilgren then explained BRW's transportation system plan. It is a three-tiered system of major arterial streets, minor arterial streets and connector streets. Sudderth and Mechem drives and Highway 70 are classified as major arterials.

Collectors will be used to carry traffic from minor arterials, such as Gavilan Canyon Road and Carizo Creek Road, to major arterials.

Pilgren, who explained Midtown traffic options during an April meeting here, unveiled BRW's proposal for downtown traffic control.

The proposal calls for a downtown one-way pairing of Sudderth Drive and Wingfield Street, with Sudderth a westbound one-way street and Wingfield an eastbound one-way.

The cost to implement the proposal is estimated at \$2,017 million.

Other downtown proposals include utilizing the river as an amenity, perhaps by designing a riverwalk, and making storefront improvements.

Unger then addressed zoning and public facilities issues. He displayed a map of current public facilities and proposed future public facilities.

BRW will present a final report in August. The village governing body is expected to make decisions then and act on the report.

## Cadillac tickets are available

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is seeking salespeople to sell tickets for a 1931 Cadillac to be given away at the end of the summer.

An advertisement placed in today's issue of The News offers "unlimited income potential" to anyone willing to sell chances on the car. There are no requirements on age or sales experience, only an eagerness to earn money and to help the chamber.

The chamber is offering a \$1 profit on each \$5 raffle ticket sold. They suggest checking out 25 tickets, selling them to "any person or persons of your choice" and returning to the chamber, \$25 richer.

A 19-inch color television set will be given to the person who sells the most tickets. Sales training programs are offered upon request, at no charge.

The salesperson recruitment campaign was initiated in an effort to sell more tickets on the Cadillac. The car was donated, as a fundraiser for the chamber, by Keith Mills. Mills agreed to let the chamber sell chances on the car, in exchange for one-half of the \$5 ticket price.

The classic car is valued at \$50,000. So far, only \$7,000 has been

generated from ticket sales.

Chamber president Paul Crown said the two problems with ticket sales are manpower and places to take the car where large volumes of people can see it.

Crown said he and former chamber president James Paxton would take the car to Elephant Butte during the July 4 weekend. An estimated 80,000 people will be available to buy tickets on the car. The car also will be displayed at the

grand opening of the Sierra Mall and at other local events.

Crown said the car has been restored to its original condition.

"If you haven't seen the interior and the exterior of the car in person, you can't appreciate it," said Crown.

When the car is not being trailed to various display places, it is parked at the Triple A Car Wash on Sudderth Drive.

## Groups hung up on utilities problem

Utility Council president Paul Crown told the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday that the city Street Department is not cooperating with the utility group.

Crown reminded village councillors of his two previous appeals. He said he appeared at two council meetings on behalf of the Utility Council asking lawmakers to encourage the Street Department to abide by Ordinance 83-10, the "one-call" ordinance.

"They're still not abiding by the ordinance," he said.

Village assistant manager Frank Potter explained that Ordinance 83-10 addresses when and where individuals, municipalities and utility companies may excavate. It also defines excavation.

Potter said that the Utility Council was set up soon after the ordinance was adopted. It is designed to protect against cut cables which can result in loss of utility services and possibly in bodily injuries.

Crown, who has been president of the Utility Council since its beginning, said that any person or company planning to dig or excavate, is expected to call the one-call number, 258-KATY, and report when and where they'll be digging.

Callers must make the call 48 hours before they plan to dig. They also must furnish a clear description, normally the legal description, of the spot they'll excavate.

"All eight utility companies are then called," Crown said. The utility companies are expected to go to the site of the excavation and mark spots where cable is buried.

Crown said the Street Department isn't calling and isn't giving

locations.

Jack LaMay of the Street Department said the 48-hour notice is often a problem when maintaining streets. He explained that weather, particularly rain, affects when his department can complete jobs.

"If we don't do our work within 24 hours we're supposed to call them back," LaMay said. That would entail another 48-hour wait.

"There's not one of my men that I know of that'll go out there and cut anything purposely," LaMay added.

Representatives of other utility companies reported that the one-call system worked very well for them. John Van Tussenbroek, local telephone service manager, reported the 48-hour notice is no problem for his company.

"You just schedule your work accordingly," he said. He cited the Street Department as the only problem for the one-call system.

Potter told both councils that a major problem encountered by the Street Department is misplaced utility lines. Very strict design standards were enacted in 1976, Potter said, but lines are still placed in bar ditches, in rights of way and at shallow depths.

"If you listen to this you'd think these guys came along with a road grader and just chopped up the cables," Potter said. "(This) is absolutely not true," he added.

Potter singled out Lincoln Cablevision as the worst offender, and showed councillors pictures of cables improperly placed in bar ditches.

Crown, speaking for Cablevision, said he never bills the village for

cutting his cables if the cables are improperly placed.

"I know I have a problem," Crown said, when contacted by phone Wednesday. He said that a tenth of Cablevision's yearly budget is assigned to capital improvements, including burying cable at the required depths in the required locations.

Potter said the village will abide by the letter of the law. That will include requiring utility companies to relocate any lines that are outside the standards set in 1976.

Mayor George White ended the lengthy exchange by instructing the president of the Utility Council to meet with village administration and staff to begin to work together.

In a telephone interview Wednesday, Potter said a Street Department representative will attend future meetings of the Utility Council.

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

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**Lieutenant governor to visit Downs trustees**

New Mexico Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels will attend the next meeting of the Village of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees, reported Mayor J.C. Day at their meeting Monday night.

Day told the trustees that Runnels will visit the Downs to outline the New Mexico Main Street Project, a state program for the

beautification of major streets in communities around the state.

The lieutenant governor and his staff will explain the program and determine if Ruidoso Downs is eligible to apply for state funds from it. Enforcement officer J. D. Knops has been in contact with the state in efforts to bring the program to the Downs.

In a related clean-up effort, Knops sent letters to owners of dilapidated buildings, requesting

them to clean the areas and remove dangerous structures. Village attorney Don Dutton said that two partially burned buildings are potential hazards to the community.

Dutton told the trustees that in accordance with state law, the building owners would be requested to remove the debris within 10 days of receiving notice, or file an objection with the municipal clerk to request a public hearing. If the trustees vote to tear down the structures, the property owners would be charged for the labor.

Police dispatcher Joanne Jenkins made a presentation on behalf of the Police Department and all village employees, requesting overtime pay for employees who have to work on legal holidays. The board approved a motion to grant the overtime pay of time and one-half, with regular reviews of total overtime hours.

The board tabled a request by Trustee Jake Harris for a variance to place a trailer on a lot smaller than the required 7,000 square feet. Harris was to have appeared before the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Committee (P&Z), but P&Z did not have a quorum for its last meeting.

The trustees advised Harris to obtain a ruling from P&Z, and return to the board with that decision. Dutton advised caution in granting a variance to a village trustee.

"I imagine we have several small lots that don't meet the village requirements," said village clerk Wilma Webb.

Harris said he needed to move the

trailer as soon as possible. P&Z member George Smith said his board will call a special meeting to discuss the issue.



Monday night the United States Football League (USFL) concluded its final spring regular season. In the fall of 1986, the USFL will begin a fall campaign. That, in itself, should make the league more interesting.

Watching football in the spring is like playing golf in the snow. It just wasn't intended to be.

I've only watched three or four USFL games this season. Even in those games, I couldn't sit through the entire contest.

Sure, the USFL has gradually improved over the past two years. But it still has a long way to go before matching the National Football League (NFL) in talent.

The USFL has some excellent running backs, but the league falls far short of the NFL at most other positions.

Only the Oakland Invaders, Birmingham Stallions and the defending champion Baltimore Stars appear even to be close to the NFL teams in talent. Baltimore started slowly but has come on strong in the past few games.

However, a shift to the fall might prove beneficial to the league. It will be in direct competition with the NFL, and although it would suffer in comparison, the league probably would be more motivated to improve its caliber of play.


But the biggest asset to the USFL would be a national audience interested in football.

During the spring and summer, most team sports fans are interested in baseball. If they don't like baseball, they're doing other things, like playing golf or tennis.

It's hard to watch a football game in 100-degree weather, even if you're a die-hard fan.

In the fall, the weather is cooler, even in the Southeast and South. People go to games and enjoy the cool, crisp weather. That's always been part of the football scene. The fall weather is uplifting to the fans and it adds to the excitement of the game. And baseball ends in the fall. Thus, football has the spotlight. People who never watched a USFL game in the spring might watch it in the fall because the sport has the limelight.

If the USFL can continue to improve its quality of play, the league might be a long way in the fall after all.

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

## Goodwin dead at 68

Vernon Goodwin died suddenly on Saturday, June 22, in Capitan. Goodwin was involved in many community projects during the five years he lived in Capitan.

According to Louise LaRue, a founding member of the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, Goodwin will be missed greatly by the chamber.

"He was active in everything the chamber did," LaRue said.

Last year, Goodwin helped organize the Smokey Bear Parade and was chairman of the Smokey Bear Stamp Day in August. He not only organized the activities connected with the stamp day, but he also wrote a poem about Smokey Bear. Copies of the poem were sold with the first-day postmarked envelopes featuring the stamp.

LaRue said that since Goodwin joined the chamber in 1982, he did "everything you can imagine."

Goodwin already had been working within the community when he joined the chamber.

Goodwin came to Lincoln County in 1980 from Seagraves, Texas. He retired from the cotton ginning business and moved to Capitan, where he began his land development plans, said Benny Coker, Goodwin's friend and associate.

According to Coker, Goodwin saw the potential for development in Capitan. He purchased acreage next to the town limits and began working on the Mountain View Subdivision.

Goodwin worked closely with the Village of Capitan on improving the water system in the subdivision. He upgraded the pressure system to provide water to his subdivision, which in turn benefited other residences in the area, Coker said.

According to Coker, former Capitan Mayor Don Stark, appointed Goodwin to the newly formed Capitan Water Advisory Board in 1982. Goodwin chaired the board until his resignation in 1985.

"He was always working for improvement of the Capitan water system," Coker said. "He certainly is going to be missed, not only as a personal friend, but as a friend of Capitan."

Mayor David Cummins, who was appointed mayor in March 1983, after Stark resigned, said Goodwin was instrumental in getting the new water well for the village.

Cummins said Goodwin was very involved with the water project to help the village improve the water system.

Goodwin resigned as chairman of the water board in April. Coker said Goodwin was working on some development plans and felt he did not have the time to devote to the board.

Goodwin was buried at his family home in Paducah, Texas, as he had requested. He is survived by his wife, Ann.

Vernon Goodwin undoubtedly will be missed by his friends and associates. Yet, he has left a legacy to the village of Capitan—the promise of water.



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


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

### Ruidoso man arrested for drunk driving

James Wimberly of Ruidoso was arrested for driving while under the influence of intoxicants after his car was involved in a head-on crash about 6:25 p.m. Thursday, June 20, on Gavilan Canyon Road, according to a Lincoln County Sheriff's Office report.

Undersheriff Charlie Cox said that Wimberly was driving a 1984 Chevrolet van that collided with a 1974 Mercury driven by Didi Payne of Ruidoso Downs.

A witness at the scene told Sheriff's deputy Pete Escovil that Wimberly's car was seen weaving, and that Wimberly apparently drifted off the right side of the road before reentering the roadway, crossing the center line and colliding head-on with Payne's vehicle, according to police.

Escovil reported that evidence at the scene confirmed the witness's statement.

Cox said both drivers were taken to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital with minor injuries.

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Early tests indicate that pargyline, a drug to treat high blood pressure, may be effective in blocking the progression of Parkinson's disease. Neurologists are working with animals now.

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# Luxury offices are planned

Plans for a luxury office complex on Mechem Drive have expanded, bringing the total cost of the Ruidoso Financial Center to \$2.8 million.

The complex will feature the first commercial elevator in Ruidoso. Construction is set to begin July 1. "There is no other office space like this in Ruidoso," developer John Hall said of the elaborate, multi-level project.

The Financial Center, to be located between the new branches of Pioneer Savings & Trust and Moncor Bank, on the opposite side of Mechem Drive, will feature an indoor atrium and cluster offices.

The complex will be the future home of the new branch of Bank of Ruidoso (subject to regulatory approval). Other businesses in the Center will be Thomson-McKinnon Securities, Territorial Abstract, Sierra Securities, Downey Sisneros Accounting and the law offices of Mel B. O'Reilly.

Hall said the complex is about 65 percent leased, but spaces of 500 to 8,000 square feet are still available in the 34,000 square-foot complex.

Hall, Gary Lynch, Greg Masters and Jace Ensor are general partners in the project. Limited partnerships—local and summer residents—number 18, with 30 total shares.

Permanent financing of the Financial Center will be through Kentucky Central of Lexington, Kentucky.

Masters reported that all Village of Ruidoso approvals have been acquired, and issuance of the building permit is the only step left before construction begins.

The Financial Center builder will be Pioneer Western Construction, Inc. Architect on the project is Nims Calvani & Associates. Completion of the project is expected in nine months.


Masters also noted that the Center will be the first project on Mechem Drive to be extensively planned for the future widening of the roadway. He said close work with the state Highway Department resulted in well-planned access to the development, complete with acceleration and deceleration lanes for traffic.

"I think this will help Ruidoso's economy," Hall said. "I think this is a good show of confidence in Ruidoso."

be built on Mechem Drive, will feature the first commercial elevator in Ruidoso.

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
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


ice for so long. She has been a part-time worker for eight years.

morning of the Fourth will be the traditional sunrise ceremony and erection of the sacred tepee, followed by a meal honoring the maidens.

Ten-thirty to twelve-thirty: games for all ages. One till three: White River, Arizona, dance group. Three to three-thirty: Zuni dance group. Three-thirty to four: San Juan Pueblo dancers. Four till five p.m.: Plains Indian dances.

From five to six: Apache social dances. And at dusk, the Dance of the Mountain Gods, a highlight of the ceremonies. The maidens will dance in the sacred tepee.

On July sixth, at ten-thirty, a parade will start at the old post office and go up the old road ending at the rodeo grounds. There will be a daily rodeo at the rodeo grounds beginning at two o'clock.

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

## Gov's Handicap to cap weekend



Fill Mackis Cup, voted Horse of the Meet last summer, will race in Sunday's Governor's Handicap at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The seventh week of summer racing begins at Ruidoso Downs on Thursday afternoon, with an \$11,935 Pic-Six carryover an added attraction. Twelve-race programs will be presented each day through Sunday, and the week will be capped by the \$15,000-added Governor's Handicap on Sunday afternoon.

Racing begins each day at 1 p.m., and admission gates open at 11 a.m. The \$11,935 Pic-Six carryover will be added to Thursday's pool. Should no one hit the wager that day, the pool would be carried-over to Friday, and so on, until some lucky fan or fans correctly picks all the winners in the fifth through tenth races.

Here's a day-by-day preview of this week's racing action:

**THURSDAY**-Walter Merrick's Coda Mundi is the highweight and probable favorite in the \$9,400 Zia Handicap for New Mexico-bred quarter horses at 400 yards.

Merrick is a veteran trainer who owned and conditioned 1969 world champion Easy Jet. Ironically, five of the nine Zia entrants, including Coda Mundi, were sired by Merrick's great champion. The other four are Easy Trek, Easy Chickadee, State Of Mind and Leading Jet.

Easy Trek and State Of Mind,

both trained by O.S. Carlton, will race coupled in the wagering. Both won allowance races in their most recent starts, and they should offer Coda Mundi a stout challenge for the winner's purse of \$5,640.

**FRIDAY**-Consistent Stash It Now tops a full field of 10 in Friday's best race, a \$4,300 allowance test for three- and four-year-olds at six furlongs.

Stash It Now has only been worse than third once in his career, and will benefit from the addition of leading rider Joe Martinez, who is off to a blazing start at Ruidoso Downs. He has ridden 30 winners in just 24 days of racing.

Speedy What A Beau and injury-plagued Fancy Walker also have solid shots in Friday's feature. What A Beau has finished first five times in 10 starts. Fancy Walker is a four-year-old who has raced only twice, but he has shown much promise in both races.

**SATURDAY**-The \$9,000-added Aspen Handicap has attracted eight nominees for its renewal on Saturday afternoon. The Aspen is a 5 1/2-furlong affair for sophomore fillies, which was captured in 1984 by Queen Elect.

Leading the nominees is Old Broad, a recent allowance winner

who also won the Ruffast Handicap at Ruidoso last summer. Also expected to run is Mel's Christian, voted the best two-year-old filly last summer after running third in two futurities.

Giboulee Wood, a very quick miss, is also on the list of nominees. She was outrun in last Saturday's 870-yard Master Salls Handicap against older males, but before that set most of the pace in the Memorial Day Handicap.

The remaining five nominees for the Aspen are Featherwolf, Home Partner, Tilt To Win, Braided Silk and Sound Sharp.

**SUNDAY**-The \$15,000-added Governor's Handicap is expected to lure most of the top local handicap stars out of their barns on Sunday afternoon. Included on the list of nominees for the seven-furlong event are Fill Mackis Cup and Scots Sissy.

Fill Mackis Cup was voted the Horse of the Meet last summer, but is still looking for his first win this year for leading trainer Bill Leach. Scots Sissy won for the first time this season when he captured the Mescalero Apache Handicap at six furlongs on June 16. That win broke a string of four consecutive seconds for the Bob Arnett trainee.

## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

**KANSAS FUTURITY CHAMPION** Dashing Phoebe, who also won the Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park, was scratched from the Rainbow Futurity trials here on Friday, and will be pointed towards the \$2.53 million All-American Futurity on Labor Day.

With \$309,426 already in the bank for the speedy filly's owners, the San Jose Cattle Company, and a million-dollar payday in store for the All-American winner, the decision to bypass the Rainbow was not surprising. Trainer Don Farris had indicated after the Kansas that making all three races was "awful tough."

Dashing Phoebe's defection eliminates the chance of a Triple Crown winner. Only one horse, Special Effort in 1981, has swept the three-race series (Kansas, Rainbow, All-American) since inception 21 years ago.

A **RACING ODDITY** occurred in the Rainbow trials on Thursday, when two horses went postward at 4-5 odds—in the same race.

Ms Collinsville won the seventh race that day as the slight favorite over Niko Watch, who ran second. The third choice in the field of nine was Lady Door, at more than 20-1. Of the \$3,949 wagered to win on the race, \$3,358 went to one of the two favorites. Only \$151 was bet on Lady Door.

Ms Collinsville and Niko Watch combined for a \$2.80 quiniela payoff, a seasonal low. The seventh was only one of a series of races won by heavy favorites; the Pic-Six

on Thursday paid \$112.40, the lowest ever at Ruidoso Downs.

**TRAINER BROOKS CLARIDGE** reports that Norgor Derby winner Centre's Premiere will remain at Ruidoso Downs, with the \$12,500 added Jockey Club Handicap on July 13 his next objective.

Earlier speculation had the Kentucky-bred shipping to California for stakes engagements following the Norgor.

Centre's Premiere has won seven times and earned \$83,470 in 18 races. His Norgor win at six panels was accomplished in stakes-record time of 1:12 1/5.

## Saturday features Aspen Handicap

K.M. and Betty Brown's Old Broad comes off a frontrunning daylight score to shoulder top weight in Saturday's featured \$10,150 Aspen Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The Aspen goes as the 11th event on a 12-race card that begins at 1 p.m. The headliner spotlights seven of the region's finest sophomore fillies over 5 1/2 furlongs.

Old Broad looked much like her old self matching strides with the ladies at Saturday's distance two weeks ago. The Pass Catcher filly showed the way past every pole to a 3 1/2 length margin with Casey Lambert aboard.

It was the first win for Old Broad, who was making her second appearance this year. The Richard Fry trainee was rested for the winter, to recover from knee surgery off an impressive juvenile


**Stephen C. Vowell**

Arrangements were by Clarke's Chapel of Roses Mortuary.

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

## Editorial

Keeping government's role as minimal as possible is usually a good idea, especially when government gets into a position of competing with private enterprise.

The Ruidoso Village Council struggled through a series of motions Tuesday night, then voted to continue the services next year of Midwest Air Traffic Controllers at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

The council debated whether to go with airport manager Tim Morris' plan to have the village hire its own controllers—for \$76,000—or to have Midwest control for \$72,000.

During budget hearings earlier this year, when Morris recommended to go with village-employed controllers, he calculated that significant savings were possible when compared with last year's Midwest cost. Also, he indicated that he would prefer to have direct control of the controllers.

But Midwest president Gary Havens presented the council with a counter-proposal Tuesday that beat Morris' estimates by \$4,000.

The councillors juggled following their airport manager's recommendations on one hand, and saving \$4,000 on the other hand. But the issues of keeping government from competing with private enterprise and keeping at a minimum the role of government never really developed in the discussion.

A positive side effect, though, of the council's decision to keep Midwest is that the role of government in our community will not expand in this case. That is good.

Let's hope the Ruidoso Village Council keeps in mind during future decisions that the role of government in our lives should be kept to a minimum, and that government has no place competing with private enterprise.—DJP

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Nothing in politics is ever the same twice; things are always changing.

Take next year's race for the Democratic nomination for governor. With four candidates already in or getting in—Ray Powell and Jack Harkleroad, already announced; plus Bruce King and Frank Andrews, likely to announce at any moment—you'd think the roster might be closing. Not so.

Taking a close look at the run at the moment is former Santa Fe mayor Sam Pick, native New Mexican and lifelong member of the party, who loves nothing more than shaking hands and dancing with the ladies. He was a big man in the Municipal League in his city governments days, and is more than ordinarily well known around the state.

Pick plans to take 30 days to test the water. If response is good, look for him to announce formally in September.

Dilemma facing all Democratic candidates next year: Is it better to have the open support of Toney Anaya or to let somebody else have it?

At the moment, most candidates would probably prefer no public embrace from the incumbent governor.

Republican candidate-to-be Colin McMillan is getting some mileage out of Bruce King's failure to let the media know what his highly touted poll showed when the nose-counters asked about a head-to-head race between Bruce and Colin.

Since King didn't release results of such a run, the McMillan folks are saying, their tiger must have looked very good indeed.

To Bruce's good excuse that he didn't reveal some of the figures because he didn't want to discourage any of those who did poorly, McMillan says in effect, "That surely can't apply to me. I'm in the opposition party, and it's Bruce's bounden duty to discourage guys like me as much as he can. All I can conclude is that I ran against him like gangbusters and he doesn't want the public to know about that."

Land Commissioner Jim Baca probably doesn't do his own cause much good when he says, apropos of complaints about his plan to raise grazing fees on state-owned land: "I can't understand this crybaby stuff. An increase of 150 percent over five years is not a bad deal after ranchers have been on a gravy train for so long."

Most who make their living off livestock don't see their lives as a continuous gravy train, and they tend to resent anyone who does.

Here's what Baca told those same people back in the days when he wanted their votes to help him get into office: "The only thing I advocate at this point concerning grazing fees is that they should not go up. The agriculture industry is on its knees and there is no sense in kicking a man when he's down. I think that looking into the future, some sort of indexing system might be arranged so that when the cattle markets are down, then the grazing rates should be down. I would plan on meeting with ranchers and experts in the area to try to come up with an equitable manner of achieving this."

One of many thoughts that swirl through this capital city like smoke at a tobacconist's convention says George Fettingter, named state Democratic chairman with the aim of rebuilding the party, may have found the reconstruction effort tougher than he thought it might be.

It is now reported he counts on being out of the job by the end of this year's third quarter, because he does not look for things to get better for Democrats in New Mexico during the next 18 months.

The sort of things which Fettingter might be worried about include the case of the Taos County disaster-aid money. That story hasn't been fully told yet, and the return of John Ramming to the Governor's staff doesn't mean the investigation is over.

And that mess at New Mexico magazine hasn't been spread on the public record either—and it also includes grave embarrassment for those who should have been in charge of things.

## Pasta-makers plan church bazaar


Lasagna, fettucini, spaghetti ... Sound good? Saint Anne's Guild members are making all of them for the Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount bazaar.

They'll also have spinach noodles, antipasto, salad and Italian ice cream at the bazaar scheduled for Saturday, July 20, in the church on Junction Road.

Carolyn Hall, a "biochemist by profession" and one of the Guild pasta preparers, fixes a basic pasta recipe that she says can be flavored with any kind of vegetable, including chile.

"Green chile pasta is delicious," she contends. So is spinach.

Below is Hall's spinach pasta recipe.

### HALL'S SPINACH PASTA

#### PASTA:

- 5 ounces spinach (fresh or frozen)
- 3 whole eggs
- Dash of salt
- Drip of olive oil
- About 2 cups of flour

Cook spinach slightly, and squeeze out liquid until it is nearly dry.

Mix everything but the flour in a food processor.

Add flour slowly until the mixture forms a doughy ball.

Knead the dough through a pasta maker, keeping it slightly floury, until it becomes about two millimeters thick.

A long, wide strip of dough can be used for lasagna, or thinner slices can be turned into spaghetti or simple dinner noodles.

Makes about 12 ounces or four to six servings.

# Straight Talk

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In Mescalero, Saint Joseph Mission's cavernous interior spreads out from the forward altar under an exposed-beam ceiling. In the late afternoon, sunlight streams from the stained glass windows, softening lines and corners of the church interior.

## A stone church of stately charm

Nestled in the hills and pines of Mescalero stands the mission church. Built in a distinctly European style, Saint Joseph Mission is a sharp contrast with traditional New Mexico architecture.

The cornerstone bears the date 1920, but the church was not dedicated until 1939. Father Larry Gosselin, the mission priest, said the church was built after Albert Braun, Mescalero mission priest, was wounded during World War I in France.

"He promised he would build a church as beautiful as the ones in France if he could ever get back to Mescalero," Father Larry explained. "And he did."

Braun's tribute to the first World War is in the form of a small bronze plaque on the outside, to the right of the door. One of the few memorials to that war in this country, it stands as a rarity.

Father Al helped build the church himself. After the dedication, World War II began, and Braun found himself in the service again.

Upon his return home, Braun erected another memorial. This time, the dedication was more specific. The World War II plaque is for those who died in or were part of the Bataan Death March, which Father Al survived.

Braun returned, eventually, to the Mescalero Apache Reservation, and died there two years ago at the age of 94. His tomb is inside the church, near the altar, and bears the legend: "Apostle to the Mescalero Apache."




Built in 1920, the mission church is decorated with Native American and European religious art. The cultural blending is startling and beautiful.


