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Council pulls plug on dam

The Ruidoso Village Council turned off the taps on the Grindstone Canyon dam project Tuesday.

During a special meeting at Village Hall, council members were split on whether or not to adopt an ordinance to issue \$1.2 million in revenue bonds. Mayor George White cast the deciding vote against issuing the bonds.

Without the proceeds from those bonds, money isn't available to build the dam, said Councillor Bill Karn after the meeting. Even though the meeting was called specifically to act on project bids, none can be accepted without the funds.

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter made the motion proposing the bond issuance, and it was seconded by Councillor Rick Evans. After lengthy discussion, Carpenter, Evans and Karn voted in favor of the bonds while councillors Jerry Shaw, Victor Alonso and Dub Holt voted against issuing the bonds.

In an interview Wednesday, the Mayor said he voted with his conscience.

"I knew the facts and figures," he said. "I've been studying this for eight years. Before you build the dam you've got to have the money," he added.

Audience members took advantage of the opportunity to speak during the workshop and the special meeting.

Frank Sayner, a member of the Ruidoso Village Council that took the Grindstone dam project before the voters in 1982, spoke to the current council of an unfulfilled promise to citizens who approved \$8 million for the dam.

"If you do not proceed with the dam you should publicly say you'll go along with the promise or say publicly that you've changed your mind," Sayner said.

He said voters were told the money would be used for the Grindstone dam, or it would be paid back. Sayner stressed that voters were

promised the money would not be used for any other purpose.

"This thing was mismanaged from the first," stated Al Junge, another former village councillor.

Junge presented councillors with figures comparing original estimates with current bids for the dam.

An item included on Junge's list was the transmission line to the dam, already under construction. Junge said engineers estimated the line would cost \$400,000, but the bid was accepted at \$766,000.

"No one even asked the question, 'is this too much for the budget?'" Junge said, pointing out the lack of comments during the meeting at which the bid was accepted. He reminded councillors that the bid came in over estimates by 90 percent.

With overruns like that, Junge estimates the dam may eventually cost \$12 million.

"I don't think we can delay the dam construction but I don't think we have to sell any bonds," Junge said. He said money allocated for the Grindstone dam had been used in other places.

Village manager Jim Hine later refuted that charge.

White, who cautioned Junge to limit his remarks, asked him to conclude his statements after five minutes.

"I'm the only person in town that's treated the way you treat me," Junge said as he yielded the floor.

Councillors questioned project engineer Fred Burns of the reliability of the bid figures.

"Essentially there's nothing fixed about it," Burns said. "I'm not guaranteeing the quantities," he added. Burns explained that unit prices are the only fixed amounts on dam bids.

Karn raised questions about future water rights to the Rio Ruidoso and about the possibility of the Grindstone land reverting to private ownership if the dam isn't completed on time.

Councillors discussed the relationship between the Grindstone dam project and the recently discovered water well fields on Sierra Blanca. All agreed that both water sources are needed by the village.

Karn, who favors issuing bonds to get on with the dam, said he's looking to the future of Ruidoso.

"We can accomplish both projects," he said in a telephone interview Wednesday. Karn predicts that the council will have another opportunity to look at the dam project, perhaps in three or four months.

Darrel Fowler, bonding agent for the village, presented figures on the annual payback for a revenue bond project, and also assured the council that Ruidoso has the bonding capacity necessary.

Had the council approved the \$1.2 million in revenue bonds, the annual payback would have been about \$150,000, according to Fowler.

"This is probably the most difficult decision we'll be making," commented Alonso. The decision will affect future generations, he predicted.

"I'm not in favor of scuttling the project," Alonso said. "I'm in favor of postponing it."

Holt suggested re-establishing priorities, including the development of the new well field in any water planning.

Shaw agreed that the dam should be built someday, but said it doesn't have to be built right now.

"We've already spent over \$3 million on this project," Carpenter pointed out. He favors going ahead with the bonding issue and getting to work on the dam as well as going for 100 percent water rights on the well fields.

"It'll never be built if we fail to act today," said Evans, who cautioned the council to take a positive attitude in planning for future water needs.

Wednesday, White said the dam will be built eventually, and all or most of the \$6.2 million will be used.

Although that money probably won't be needed to develop the well fields, White said the village isn't constrained from using it for that purpose.

White opined that the 1982 bond election was for "water improvements," not just for a dam project.

White explained that a reversion clause in the dam contract, of ownership of land in the reservoir area, doesn't begin until the dam is completed. He said the contract, which he signed, states the dam must be in use within three years after completion or the reservoir land will revert back to the previous owner.

"The dam itself never reverts back," White added. "Just the land. I'd rather develop our well field which we're sure of," White said.

In other business during the special meeting the council heard:

—Tim Morris explain why he recommended that the village take over the air traffic control tower instead of contracting the service to Midwest Air Traffic Controllers.

"My main concern is saving the city money," Morris said.

Morris was instructed to review the control service contract with village attorney John Underwood.

—Heard Morris announce a joint meeting of the Sierra Blanca Environmental Impact Committee and EnviroSphere at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 16, in the Village Administrative Center. EnviroSphere is preparing the Environmental Impact Statement of the Sierra Blanca airport site on Fort Stanton Mesa.

—Heard assistant village manager Frank Potter describe a current joint powers agreement between the village and Lincoln County, and a proposed agreement between the two bodies.

A meeting between the Ruidoso Village Council and the Lincoln County Commissioners is scheduled at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 9, in Village Hall. An agreement on paving Gavilan Canyon Road will be discussed.

Cree has new owner

American Golf Corporation purchased Cree Meadows Country Club from Moncor Bank on Monday. The golf course opened for play on Wednesday.

American Golf Corporation, a Los Angeles-based company, is the largest nationwide owner and operator of golf courses. The acquisition of Cree gives the company a total of 57 golf courses, located across the country, from New York to California.

Gail Goodrich, vice president of American Golf, said the company intends to have the facility totally operational in the shortest time possible.

Gary Klein, regional director for American Golf, said he was not sure exactly when the food and beverage operation would be open. Klein said the operation would proceed slowly, with the snack bar open in a week, and the bar and restaurant open for lunch and dinner a few weeks later.

"It's a gradual process," he said.

of bringing Cree to its full operational capacity, a goal he hopes to accomplish quickly.

Klein brought caps, golf balls and other "bare essentials" from his Las Vegas location, to sell at the pro shop until the store can be stocked.

Green fees are close to last year's prices, said Klein. A golf game for a full cart (two people) costs \$15, including taxes. Klein said Cree would probably offer memberships, but the details have not been outlined yet.

Klein said Cree "wants to work with the community." At full operation, the club will employ between 30 and 40 people.

Dan Stills is the permanent on-site manager at Cree. Stills said he aims to get the club "in full swing" as soon as possible.

Cree Meadows has been closed since last October, due to bankruptcy. Moncor Bank became the legal owners of Cree at the public auction June 13. Moncor Bank President Jim Atwood negotiated the transaction with American Golf, the terms of which were not disclosed.

Racetrack joins regional ad program

Ruidoso Downs Race Track is participating in a statewide "Race New Mexico" advertising campaign, patterned after the state's "Ski New Mexico" program.

Like the ski areas, New Mexico's racetracks have pooled some of their advertising resources. With a 100-percent match from the State Economic Development and Tourism Department, the racetracks are concentrating their advertising on out-of-state markets including Texas, Colorado and Oklahoma.

Rick Henson, manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, said the cooperative program helped him to advertise in major markets, such as Dallas, Texas, which he normally would not be able to af-

ford. Henson said the joint campaign would go after new markets as well as "piggyback" (reinforce) existing ones.

Henson said he was glad the cooperative campaign is in place, in addition to the joint advertising program between the track and the Village of Ruidoso.

"We've been trying to do this for the past couple of years," he said.

The joint advertising programs enable Henson to stretch his advertising budget. For the \$10,000 which the track contributed to the "Race New Mexico" program, it received a total of \$70,000 in advertising, said Henson.

The New Mexico State Fair, Ruidoso Downs and the Downs at Santa Fe each contributed \$10,000 to the joint venture. La Mesa Park and San Juan Downs gave \$2,500 each. The state matched the \$35,000

with another \$35,000, bringing the advertising funds to a total of \$70,000.

Henson said he hoped the cooperative efforts would continue yearly, and grow in dollar amount.

The sum covers some television exposure, but most is concentrated on radio, magazine and newspaper advertising. Henson said the campaign follows the village advertising program, thus giving Ruidoso continuous coverage.

Steve Anaya, manager of The New Mexico State Fair, heads the joint advertising committee.

"The management of each of the tracks should be credited for embarking on this progressive venture," said Anaya. "This campaign is designed to increase awareness of New Mexico's booming racing industry, and, of course, increase the number of visitors here. It is

beneficial to the entire state."

The advertising campaign, developed by Bob Epstein, owner of Epstein Enterprises in Albuquerque, ran through June and will continue in July. The advertisements feature the toll-free telephone number of the State Tourism Department. Interested visitors may call that number for information about racing anywhere in the state.

Henson also commented on the condition of Ruidoso Downs Race Track this season.

Although the handle at the track has been down this season from last year, it was up last weekend, according to Henson.

Henson said he felt the rise in track-goers was an encouraging lead-in to the July 4 holiday weekend.

Planning & Zoning Commission denies variance request

"It's a shame they can't be fixed," said Martin Rose in voting to deny a variance request during a Monday meeting of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z).

The commission voted unanimously to deny the eight-foot, seven-inch rear lot line variance for David Scott on Lot 10E, Block 4, Hamilton Terrace subdivision, because the structure extends into the setback area and was built without the proper permits.

"They added a covered deck without a permit ... they're trying to circumvent the whole process," said Rose. "It's not kosher," he added.

The commission approved a replat of lots 10E and 10F, Block 4, Hamilton Terrace subdivision, for Scott, and referred a variance request for a structure built in 1966 on Lot 10F to P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis to be handled administratively.

Plans for a commercial development on Lot 4A, Block 1, Cree Meadows Country Club subdivision, for Greg Carey were tabled until

the next meeting because inadequate information was provided.

The commission informed Carey that the Uniform Building Code requires a professional seal for a project. Carey didn't use the services of an architect before appearing at P&Z.

He was also instructed to bring back a topographical survey with drainage, a complete parking plan including handicapped spaces, lot dimensions, a driveway design for the lower terrace and a landscaping plan.

After the regular business, Mike Callaghan, chairman of the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) study group, reported that his group is working on guidelines that might alleviate problems with requesters bringing insufficient data before the commission.

Callaghan said the APRC study group was considering the possibility of enlarging the size of P&Z to nine members, and appointing three of the nine to a site review subcommittee to work with preliminary plans.

He explained that the plan includes providing a check-off list to

be used before submitting requests to P&Z.

"You keep getting half sets of plans," he said. "(that) drags our meetings out." Callaghan said the site review subcommittee could be sure all items on the check-off list were included before a request was added to a P&Z meeting agenda.

In other business the commission:

—Was introduced to Sandy Hall who will work with Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Davis in the afternoons.

—Retabled a review of commercial building plans on Tract 2B, Pinecliff Subdivision, for C.S.D. The request is for a Firestone building and was originally tabled during a May 6 P&Z meeting.

—Approved a conditional use on Tract L, Camelot Mountain Tracts for the Optimist Club as requested by Craig Whipple. The group plans to conduct a carnival at the site and P&Z approval is contingent upon the Optimists' reaching an agreement with Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor regarding traffic control and parking.

—Rescheduled for July 13 a vacation of right of way hearing on Lot 2, Block 4, Cherokee Addition subdivi-

sion, for Mack and Ruby Massey.

—Approved changes in a previously approved apartment project, Camelot Place Apartments, for Tim Collins representing Jeffrey Smith Investments.

—Retabled a review of commercial development on Tract 1, Tracts A, B, C, D and a part of Tract E, Pinecliff subdivision, for Wal-Mart Properties. The request was first tabled April 15, and a drainage report has been submitted to Boyle Engineering for review.

—Approved a replat of La Tierra Condominiums, Lot 8, Block 5, White Mountain Estates subdivision, Unit 4, as presented by Tim Collins for North American Developments, Inc., Moran Partnership and William Jourdan.

—Scheduled a meeting of the APRC study committee for 7:30 a.m. Friday, July 5, at Whispering Pines Restaurant.

—Scheduled a P&Z workshop at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 3, at Sierra Development Company on

Mechem Drive, to continue reviewing BRW proposals.

—Heard P&Z chairman Greg Masters ask whether amended plot plans for Ruidoso Financial Center have to go back to the building inspector. Consensus was that they should return to the inspector and then come back to P&Z.

The next regular meeting of the commission is scheduled at 3 p.m. Monday, July 15, in the Village Administrative Center.

Utility council unearths issues

Utility Council members compared notes on the one-call system during a regular meeting Wednesday.

Paul Crown, president of the group, said the system is working well, and although other members agreed, several told of bad experiences involving cut lines or incorrect excavation locations.

Any utility company, Ruidoso Village department or contractor doing excavation work must call 253-KATY to report when and where digging will take place. All eight utilities are notified so that they may mark the area if underground lines might be affected.

Crown said that while scheduling may be a problem, the system still saves the village and utility companies a great deal of time and money.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter agreed, saying cut lines used to occur much more frequently than they now do.

Members discussed proposing an amendment to the Utility Council Ordinance in which the excavator would also be required to mark the area of the proposed cut.

The council voted to obtain legal representation and Crown was instructed to ask village attorney John Underwood to represent the Utility Council.

Happy Birthday to David Bonnell

Today, the "Glorious Fourth," is the birthday of Bert David Bonnell, born on this date in 1931 in Roswell to Ralph Bonnell and the former Jewell Coe Allison.

He went to Capitan High School a while and then graduated from Ruidoso High. He is a descendant of the Coes and Bonnells, Lincoln County pioneers, and has lived at the Bonnell Ranch all his life, except for some time overseas in the United States Air Corp.

On December fourteen, 1958, he was married to the former Della Joiner, present-day postmaster of Glencoe. They have raised three of the finest children in the world: Ruthie, Joel and Paul.

David matches his birthday well, being a true-blue American—in other words "a Yankee Doodle Dandy" like another Fourth of July birthday man, the beloved American composer, George Michael Cohan.

In 1942, James Cagney played the part in the life story of George Cohan, in which Cagney rose to his full height as an actor, being perfectly cast for the role.

Quite understandably, George Cohan was proud of his birthday, which added an extra touch of patriotism to his character. At the outbreak of World War I, he offered to volunteer, but was turned down on account of physical disabilities.

However, he began writing patriotic songs, the most famous of which is "Over There." This song captured the spirit of the day, a time when American patriotism was at one of its high tides.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt personally presented George Cohan a Congressional Medal for composing this song.

George Cohan, now gone to his reward, and James Cagney, in a battle with falling health, both hold high places in the hearts of Americans. And David Bonnell holds a fond spot in all of us, and we

are proud to have him as a neighbor and friend.

Mescalero Ceremonies

By the time you read this, the Mescalero Apache annual four-day celebration will have already begun with the Sunrise ceremonies and the raising of the sacred tepee. Four more days of ceremonies and festivities will follow.

I have told you this before, but, if you will forgive me, I will mention it briefly one more time.

We first became acquainted with the Mescaleros on the second of July, 1926, when we (Mother, Mark, Joe, Lynn and myself) arrived at the old feast grounds just as our 1917 Velle automobile broke down. Here we stayed all four days of the celebration.

There was coffee, Indian fried bread, boiled beef, and barbecued beef, all free. And this was only the beginning. To go with this traditional Indian fare, there were marshmallows, hot buns, bananas, ice cream, oranges, pies and cakes.

We played all kinds of games which brought great laughter from the crowd.

The all-night chanting of the singers lulled us to sleep, and the rhythm of these ancient songs kept ringing in my ears for a day or more after. The songs, the ceremony, the people captured part of my heart on those days, which somehow do not seem so long ago.

One thing that has stayed with me is hearing Asa Duhlagie speaking to an especially large crowd one of

the evenings just before dark. As I remember, he said the Mescalero Apaches were holding their sacred ceremonies during the Fourth of July both as an honor to their ancestors and present-day people, and also as a symbolic act of honor to our country.

And it is true that these people, among the very last to lay down arms against the United States troops, have become citizens of the highest patriotism.

We are fortunate indeed in being able to celebrate the season of the Fourth of July with our Mescalero Apache fellow Americans and good neighbors of many years.



But they've also had a lot of fun, playing in the summer basketball league.


Calling themselves the Red Devils, the gridders are winless in three attempts. However, they've shown some improvement against teams made up of regular basketball players.

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
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

Fort Stanton pool remains inoperational

The Fort Stanton swimming pool is still empty.

According to Mark Delgado, administrator at the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, the pool was used for only eight months since it was constructed in 1981.

Too much humidity in the indoor pool building damaged the ceiling and interior walls, said Delgado. A ventilation fan was installed in the building when it was constructed to prevent the humidity problem. However, according to Delgado, "no instructions were sent with it, stating the fan had to be operating 24 hours a day."

Delgado said the original building plans called for an alert alarm to be installed with the fan, in case the fan failed. The alarm was never installed, Delgado said.

Charles Nolan, an architect with Nolan and Associates of Alamogordo, designed the Fort Stanton pool-gym complex with the aid of mechanical engineers with the firm of Copeland, Powell and Moran of Albuquerque. Contractor on the project was Service Contractors of Ruidoso Downs.

In a recent telephone interview,

Nolan said his firm had experience with pool design previous to the Fort Stanton project.

Nolan said the alarm, which comes equipped with a warning light, was not installed.

The humidity trouble began after the fan first ceased working, about six to eight months after the pool opened in September 1981. Delgado said the Fort Stanton maintenance department did not know that the fan was critical to the proper operation of the pool structure.

The fan was not repaired by the contractor until September 1982.

According to Delgado, the fan failed again about four months after the repair, and the humidity problem started again. When the ceiling deteriorated, pieces of ceiling fell into the water and on the floor, Delgado said. The pool was then drained and has not been used since.

Delgado said officials from the New Mexico State Properties Office and Nolan have inspected the building. Nolan said the cause of the fan failure has not been determined.

Nolan said the contractor has agreed to install an alarm, with the warning light, on the exterior of the building. The original plans called

for the light to be in the interior. Nolan said the new alarm would be easier to notice if problems develop.

Nolan said he offered his assistance and donated two sets of additional designs to make the pool functional.

"I want to see the project succeed and become operational," Nolan said.

Delgado said he recently sought a second professional opinion about the pool from architect Jim French of Lincoln. French suggested that the interior gypsum board walls be replaced with water-resistant, spray-on insulation.

Delgado said the state Properties Office has not replied to the architectural proposals he submitted for repair of the pool. He said he sent the proposals two months ago.

Delgado said the Fort Stanton

Maintenance Department was not entirely at fault for the pool problem. Delgado said he felt the fault was divided equally among the designer, contractor and the Fort Stanton Maintenance Department.

Delgado said there are sufficient funds in the Fort Stanton budget to pay for repair of the pool.

"I don't care who's at fault (for the pool problem), as long as we get it repaired," Delgado said.

Delgado clarified a statement of his, which was published February 28 in an article in The Ruidoso News. In the article, Delgado reported that the state Property Control Board was initiating a legal process against the company that constructed the pool. Delgado said his statements at that time were his own opinions, and were not those of the state Properties Division.



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

Fire departments learn rope rescue

Area firefighters leaped from cliffs and hoisted each other up and down rock faces recently in a High Angle Rope and Rescue class taught by the state Fire Marshal's Office.

Fifteen members of the Ruidoso Fire Department, Bonito Volunteer Fire Department and Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department participated in the three-day class. The class objective was to train the firemen in the rescue of people stranded or injured on steep mountain terrain or cliffs.

Skills learned included knot-tying, belay techniques, delayed and Prusick rappelling, stretcher rigging and stretcher tending. Emphasis was on safety during the execution of these maneuvers.

"The importance of this kind of rescue training for our area has been demonstrated already,"

pointed out Barry Cole of Ruidoso Fire Department. "We took a kid with a broken leg off a cliff here in town and assisted with a rescue in Alamogordo."

"Our department has been involved in three rope rescues in the past three years," said Lester Lanell of Bonito Volunteer Fire Department. "Two were off Ski Run Road and one was at Bonito Lake."

For Ruidoso Fire Department members this was a review of skills learned last year. "Our department now has enough equipment for 10 persons," reported Ruidoso Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds.

"In addition, many men have their own harnesses," he said.

Reynolds was instrumental in setting up the class. "It's important for as many persons in the area as possible to be trained for this," he

said. "That's why we included Ruidoso Downs and Bonito in this class."

The course was taught by Dave Rubio, senior fire protection instructor for the Fire Marshal's Office. He was assisted by Robbie Hall, Ruidoso firefighter, and Lewis Trujillo of Gallup Fire Department. Trujillo and Hall will be teaching the course for New Mexico firefighters at the fire marshal's annual training school in August. The field portion of the class was videotaped for use at that time.

Rubio teaches "about 15 of these classes a year" around the state. His goal is to "teach the fire departments the safest mode" both for the rescued and the rescuer. Although the class involves "glamour elements" such as rappelling sheer cliff walls, the emphasis is on

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techniques, skills

checking and re-checking, back-up systems and respect for the task. "We don't do any hot-dogging here," he maintained.

The first day of the 20-hour course was spent in the classroom of the main fire station in Ruidoso as students became familiar with equipment and learned knot-tying.

"Each of these knots is important," stressed Rubio, as he demonstrated high strength figure eights and double-sheet bends. "Each has a particular function in the rescue."

The second and third days were spent in the field on the cliffs below the lookout tower. Under the watchful eyes of Rubio, Hall and Trujillo, students practiced rappelling with a belay line (two-line system), rappelling with a Prussick line (single-line system) and carrying a Stokes litter (metal rescue basket), both empty and with a mock victim.

Rescue work uses only high quality equipment. "Everything must be high strength," said Rubio. For example, the nylon webbing used for Swiss seats, the harnesses used by climbers, has a tensile strength of 4,000 pounds. Carabiners and figure eights, steel rings that attach ropes to climbers and other hardware, can withstand loads of 10,000 pounds. Ropes are special static (non-stretch) lines that will hold 9,000 pounds. "This stuff isn't

cheap, either," Rubio said. "Rope costs a dollar a foot."

Students were taught to treat their equipment well because their lives depend on it. Ropes especially deserve extra care. Students were cautioned against even stepping on them. "Dirt and rocks can get in and weaken the fibers," he said.

Teamwork is essential to a safe, successful rescue. For example, men at the anchor points who worked the pulleys coordinated with several safety men on the edge. These monitored the ropes as well as the climber, who in turn coordinated with rescuers below and above. Radios facilitated communication.

In addition, students were taught to check each other's knots and equipment before every use. Rubio, Hall and Trujillo constantly monitored each climber's progress and checked ropes.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor visited the training site at the cliff and summed up the feeling of many in the community.

"Emergency services recognized a bona fide need and took it upon themselves to get the training and maintain their skills through constant practice. This demonstrates the high caliber of emergency support systems in our area. Our community can have confidence and pride in their emergency support systems."

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
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Pool revenues are up

Swimming pool revenues are up while pool staff salaries are down, according to Bobby Bailey, director of the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department. Bailey compared June 1985 revenues and salaries with those of June 1984 during a meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission Monday. Total pool revenues for June 1984 were \$12,666. During June 1985 those revenues increased by \$4,902 to \$17,568. Salaries for June were listed by Bailey as \$4,461 last year and \$4,938 this year—a decrease of \$1,523. One way salaries have been reduced, according to Bailey, is by eliminating overtime. "We schedule lifeguards so that they can get in 40 hours, but not more than 40 hours," Bailey said. Participation has increased, even though admission prices were raised from \$1.65 per person last season to \$2 per person this season, Bailey said. He also told commission members that the swimming program is going well. Another pool offering that Bailey said is being well-received is the group package for evening parties. Any group of 25 or more may reserve the pool in the evenings. The cost for a group of 25 is \$50, and each additional person is charged \$2. A lifeguard is provided by the pool as part of the cost. Bailey also reported that progress is being made on the softball complex. Materials have been received for three backstops for the three fields, fencing for all three fields and lighting for the complex. "We've got all this stuff stockpiled and stored and now we're waiting for the land to be cleared," Bailey said. The village Street Department is clearing the land, but that project is in addition to other department priorities. "Our biggest concern is to have them playing on 'it next year,'" Bailey said. Commission member Dick Shaw initiated discussion on an idea he has for an amphitheater to be built into the side of the mountain near School House Park. "We've just got hundreds of uses for something like that," Shaw said. Some mentioned include melodramas, concerts and seasonal events. Village Councillor Jerry Shaw, a visitor at the meeting, commended Bailey for the department's summer programs. "My big goal right now is to increase the activities to a 12-month program," Bailey said. The commission will visit the softball complex as part of the next meeting set for 1 p.m. Monday, August 5.

Arson, murder investigation continues in Lincoln County

Bill Risen, 57, of Lincoln remains in custody as the state fire marshal's investigation continues into the cause of a fire at Baca Campsite near Lincoln. Risen is charged with arson and murder in the fire that resulted in the death of Mattie Jo West, 71, of Roswell, and severely injured her husband, Lee West, 72. Criminal proceedings against Risen have been postponed while the investigation progresses, according to Lincoln County Under-sheriff Charlie Cox.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It's easy to come up with sweeping and original ideas when they don't have to be turned into reality. What's tough is making them work in real life.

That paper in which Governor Tony Anaya proposed changes in our system of higher education, for example, is full of good suggestions, which ought to get serious consideration. How many of them will ever be brought out of the purely intellectual realm, however, is quite another thing.

(The Anaya paper on this topic, it should be noted, is far superior to the one circulated by Senator Les Houston, in both originality and completeness. Of course the Senator wrote his for himself, as an expression of his own beliefs, while the Governor's was drafted by the professional staff at the Board of Educational Finance, which has been considering the topic for a long time.)

There are some statements in the Governor's proposal which are almost guaranteed to turn the hair of certain of the state's educators grayer than it already is. They are sprinkled through the paper like so many raisins, waiting to be pounced on.

Take the very first sentence: "The community colleges should be recognized by the state as the preferred way to deliver lower-division undergraduate course work." If that's true as written, why not make the community colleges the only deliverers of the first two years of university training and save that much time and money at the upper-level institutions?

This is admittedly a tightly written set of propositions, and the folks who prepared it might make it more convincing when they expand on this brief paper; but the Governor released it to us as is, so we must be forgiven for reading it that way.

For example, who could disagree with a sweeping thought like this one: "New Mexico's research universities should be allowed to develop beyond mediocrity into genuine greatness?" But the sentence may generate more questions than it answers. Are UNM, NMSU and Tech considered to be mere mediocrities at present? That could

be inferred from what is said here. And what is this "genuine greatness" to which we aspire? Does that mean like Cambridge and Oxford in the time of Duns Scotus, or like Coimbra in the fifteenth century, or are they merely to equal MIT today?

You can also take the places where such suggestions move a little closer to concreteness, and even there find room for argument. Just take the call for a flat 10 percent increase in all university salaries. Is that flat figure, applied across the board, the real answer? Shouldn't some salaries rise more and some less, and don't we have to take the trouble to discriminate?

If you think all this is hairsplitting, just wait till you hear what the legislators, first, and the educators, second, do to it.


They will want a little more specificity than this: "Tuition rates should be set which will maximize revenue while minimizing adverse effects on enrollment."

Some will claim that's what we've been trying to do all along. Others will ask where exactly is that magic point at which we get lots of money out of students without discouraging them from signing up for classes. Nobody will disagree with the statement. It's just that some will maintain you haven't advanced the field of knowledge much by making it.

The Governor and Senator Houston will agree (though they seldom do) that their papers are not meant as anything but launching points for further discussion. They will not be surprised to have some of the statements each one of them has made challenged and queried and dissected and nit-picked. If they cause that effect, the brief papers have done what they were meant to do.

What would be bad, on the other hand, would be for either of these people to say, "I've given you my views on the points at issue. Don't ask me any further questions."

The fact is that the questioning has only just begun; and it will go on unceasingly until every proposal has been refined into something the majority of New Mexicans, in and out of the university community, can live with.

Club women hear SADD program

Members of the Ruidoso chapter of Students Against Driving Drunk (SADD) spoke about the organization during a recent meeting of the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County (FRWLC).

"When you're dead at 17, you're dead at 17," is the phrase the SADD chapter has adopted to warn others to stay sober if they drive, SADD President Kristi Douglass and faculty adviser Gerald Ames said.

Douglass, who became involved in SADD after a 17-year-old friend was killed by a drunk driver, said the largest decrease in deaths because of drunk driving is in the high school age group. She said SADD activities are partly responsible for that.

"We do not fight drinking because we cannot win," Ames said. "We fight drinking and driving."

SADD membership in Ruidoso has grown from 20 in 1983-84 to about 300 last year, Ames said. He said the Ruidoso SADD chapter is planning an area convention next year.

Ames then circulated a copy of the agreement that students and parents may sign to ensure safe passage home for students who might drink.

In other business, members heard Judy Nakamura, voter registration chairperson for the New Mexico Republican Party, stress the importance of continuing to register voters in order to maintain the Republican majority in Lincoln County.

August 10 is the tentative date to celebrate that Republican voter registration majority, announced Pat Hume, county chairperson. Specific plans will be announced later.

Nettie Hug presented a wreath to be given to the winner of a drawing scheduled November 28. Tickets are being sold by FRWLC members for \$1.

Immunizations are state requirement

Children registering in New Mexico schools must show proof of immunization against diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough). Proof of the DPT vaccination is required to enter public schools and day care centers.

Jim Coan of the state Health and Environment Department said a recent shortage of the DPT vaccine has been resolved.

Immunization against polio, measles and rubella is also required. Children will receive a series of four doses of DPT, three doses of polio vaccine and one combined vaccination against measles, mumps and rubella. Although included in the vaccine, mumps shots are not required for admission to school.

The Ruidoso Field Health Office offers immunization clinics each Monday from 8:30 a.m. to noon and from 1-2 p.m. Children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.

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Natural birth setting is planned

Over the years, controversy has surrounded various childbirth methods. Hospitals and natural childbirth advocates have reached a kind of compromise, however, and have begun offering "birthing rooms" for mothers who wish to have childbirth in a more natural setting.

At the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, the trend toward natural childbirth conditions is apparent. A birthing room for women with uncomplicated pregnancies and anticipated normal births should be available by the end of the summer. Ken Moore, hospital administrator, said the birthing room will be an enhancement to the \$900 delivery plan that is already in effect.

"We ask for \$900 before labor starts. Non-paid delivery bills end up on the rates for the next year, so we thought this might keep bills down," Moore said.

Women participating in the program must see a participating physician at least three times before the baby is born, Moore said. Ruidoso obstetrician William Harrison, a plan participant, said

the three prenatal visits are for the protection of both the patient and the hospital.

"We want to make sure that the patient population is being served," he said. "We don't want people coming in from Alamogordo to have a cheap delivery. Also, it helps us to know the patient population is being cared for by the local physicians."

He said the visits also screen out women who have complications and should not participate in the program.

"We're seeing more patients take advantage of this," Harrison said.

Since delivery must be natural using only local anesthesia, LaMaze classes are required of the patients.

The birthing room will be furnished with emergency equipment, Harrison said. "The bed looks like a real four-poster bed, but can be used for emergencies. The whole room will be equipped this way; there's oxygen behind the curtains and so forth."

Physicians refer their patients to LaMaze classes. Sally Canning, an area LaMaze instructor, said she favors the birthing room environment.

"Statistically, the birthing room

environment, when it's offered, has been shown to improve the outcome of delivery and helps in the mother developing maternal feelings," Canning said.

"I call it holistic medicine," she said. "Getting the mother and father involved with the birth really makes everyone more comfortable with it."

Canning said the next step would be what she calls "family-centered medical care."

"This allows siblings in the birthing room," Canning said. "Again, it's holistic medicine."

Members of Canning's childbirth class expressed interest in the possibility of a birthing room, but most said they felt having other children present during labor and delivery was inappropriate.

"I don't think our two-year-old would handle it well at all," one class member said.

As for the concept of the birthing room, expectant mothers said the homey atmosphere would be important to them. "I would think that if you're relaxed, you won't have as much trouble with the labor," said Greta Carrico.

"If you don't seize up from nervousness, you're probably going to do a lot better," she added.

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Experienced volunteers join full-time staff of Ruidoso Fire Department

Ruidoso's four new paid firemen bring a combined total of 18 years experience to the Ruidoso Fire Department.

Mike Coker, Sam Pirelli, Jesse Reynolds Jr. and Andy Willingham became full-time paid staff members of the department Monday, July 1. All four served as volunteers before joining the professional staff.

Pirelli is just 22 years old, but has already served seven years on the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department. He worked for Ruidoso State Bank for two years before joining the fire department.

The Ruidoso native has missed only three of the weekly volunteer meetings during his seven years of service.

"I've been to some of the biggest fires in Ruidoso," Pirelli said.

He has augmented that practical experience by attending the New Mexico state fire school for four years.

"I like this kind of work," Pirelli gave as the reason he applied for the full-time job. Even his first full day of training hadn't dampened his enthusiasm.

Reynolds comes from a fire-fighting family. His father, Jesse

Reynolds Sr., is assistant fire chief and his uncle, Virgil Reynolds, is chief of the Ruidoso Fire Department.

While that may have influenced the 19-year-old to become a volunteer five years ago, he said that had little to do with his decision to join the full-time paid staff. He found out first-hand what fighting fires is all about, having answered calls on perhaps a thousand fires as a volunteer.

Reynolds has been a Ruidoso resident most of his life and is a graduate of Ruidoso High School. He attended the state fire school last year and excelled in the competition.

Even though the work may be long and hard, Reynolds said he's looking forward to working with the department staff.

"They're all great guys," he noted.

"I'm looking forward to it all," he added. He said the more he learns the better fireman he can be.

"We're all here for the safety of people," Reynolds said. Helping to safeguard the community was another reason he chose fire fighting as a vocation.

Willingham, who has five years experience as a volunteer, is another Ruidoso native. The 20-year-old fireman says he's

aware of the dangers involved in fire fighting, but the excitement outweighs the danger.

"I think it all sounds pretty exciting," Willingham said. He'll be attending state fire school for the first time in August.

"We've been through it all before," he said. Willingham and other volunteers undergo extensive training during meetings at 8:30 p.m. every Monday.

That training, along with answering many calls during his five years as a department volunteer, prepared Willingham well for the tests required to become a paid fireman.

He said the tests were pretty easy. Besides written tests, aspiring firemen underwent a number of practical tests. One involved climbing a 65-foot ladder.

Willingham spent his first full day on the job Wednesday.

Coker is the only new fireman who is married. The 23-year-old and his wife Kody have a 4-month-old son named Derek. Coker also works at New Mexico Glass.

Coker moved to Ruidoso five years ago from Dimmitt, Texas. He has been a volunteer fireman for a year.

"I just loved being a volunteer," Coker said. He thought being a full-time fireman might prove even more interesting.

His first day on the job was Monday, and he said it was as interesting as he expected. Coker admitted that the training, even with his previous training and experience, was long, hard and intense.

Coker is looking forward to attending the state fire school for the first time this summer. In the meantime he's learning all he can from the department's in-house training.


The four now join the experienced paid staff in providing full coverage at both village fire stations. Each of the firemen is scheduled to work a 24-hour shift and is off the following 48 hours.

Two staff members are scheduled around the clock at each station, so that four firemen are on duty at all times. In addition the chief and the assistant chief are scheduled from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

When the alarm goes off, the number of fire fighters immediately swells to include all paid staff and about 25 volunteers.

Most of the wild ducks left after the winter was over, but Conley said he gained several new tenants after Easter ducklings "outgrew their cuteness."

Currently, there are about 50 ducks at the condos, Conley said. Although the condos and the lake hosted a few geese, Conley said he "evicted" them. "They like to try to kill the smaller ducks or the ducklings," he said.

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
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Paula Morgan wears crown as Miss Mescalero 1985

Paula Morgan, Miss Mescalero 1985, poses in June and her interests include basketball and beadwork.

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
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
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

Sunland season begins October 12

Sunland Park Race Track will open its 1985-86 season on Oct. 12 following the recent approval of proposed racing dates by the New Mexico State Racing Commission. The Commission endorsed 90 race days running through May 4, 1986. The schedule calls for programs Friday through Sunday, with one Monday card slated for Feb. 17 - Washington's Birthday. Ruidoso-Sunland Inc., the firm that operates the track, announced Sunland Park will not close for the Christmas holidays as it has in past years. Horse racing programs will be offered throughout the 30-week schedule. The fall portion of Sunland's '85

meet is highlighted by four stakes offerings for thoroughbreds: the Thoroughbred Sale Futurity, Texas Open Futurity, Texas Derby and the Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity. Quarter horses are featured in the Sunland Park All American Sale Futurity, the Grade III Fall Quarter Horse Derby and Grade II Fall Quarter Horse Futurity. The 1986 spring thoroughbred

fare includes the Sunland Park Derby, Riley Allison Derby, Sunland Park Handicap and the prestigious \$350,000 Riley Allison Futurity, which traditionally closes out Sunland's season. Also on the new-year agenda, short-course specialists take the spotlight in the Grade II West Texas Futurity and Derby, and the Grade I Sun Country Futurity, offering a purse projected at \$250,000.

Rainbow Derby highlights Ruidoso Downs racing

Twelve-race programs are scheduled Wednesday through Sunday, with first post at 1 p.m.

SATURDAY—It's a double header as veteran quarter horses meet in the \$10,000-added Jet Deck Handicap (440 yards), and juvenile fillies chase an \$8,000-added purse over 5 1/2 furlongs in the Ruffast Handicap.

SUNDAY—The holiday card is capped as the ladies take center stage in the First Lady Handicap, for older thoroughbreds at 6 furlongs, offering a \$10,000-added purse.



While trainer Bill Leach and jockey Joe Martinez continue to lead in the standings at Ruidoso Downs, several others have impressed with excellent performances, including conditioner Terrell Davidson and rider Ramon Apodaca, who won weekly awards as the track completed its seventh week of summer racing. Davidson was named Trainer of

Mike Lidberg also had a good week in the saddle. He scored doubles on both Friday and Saturday, but did not ride here on Sunday, as he was in Santa Fe for a stakes engagement.

Another doing well is Ricky Walker. The young reinsman was shut-out in his first eight rides at Ruidoso Downs, but has bounced

back to win with five of 21 since then.

On the trainer front, Cecil Crabtree and Clifford Lambert Sr., both sent out three victors last week. Crabtree was three for six, and all three wins came on Saturday, from as many starters. His perfect day was capped by Tilt To Win's score in the Aspen Handicap. Lambert was three for 12, and sent out Copper Case to win the week's biggest race, the \$17,250 Governor's Handicap on Sunday.

Two trainers making waves with small stables are Lavar Mower and Lea Short. Mower has three wins and three seconds in 10 starts, while Short has two wins and three places in only seven starts.



Coda Mundi fires back off a neck verdict in the \$9,400 Zia Handicap last week to shoulder high weight in Saturday's featured \$11,400 Jet Deck Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The Jet Deck shares the spotlight as part of a double-stakes offering as eight 2-year-old fillies match strides over 5 1/2 furlongs in the \$10,200 Ruffast Handicap - Saturday's sixth race.

Coda Mundi stretches out to a quarter mile in the Jet Deck after capturing the 400-yard Zia in 19.70 seconds. The clocking was only seven hundredths of a second off the track record shared by three horses.

The New Mexico-bred ran out a lackluster campaign last season, earning a little more than \$12,000 in 10 starts. Coda Mundi opened his

6-year-old season with two straight handicap victories at Albuquerque. Shipping to Ruidoso, owner/trainer Walter Merrick set the runner with tough company in the Mr. Jet Moore Handicap, where he raced an even seventh.

Coda Mundi went on to finish a neck back of stakes standout Bar Forth in an allowance tune-up 10 days later, before boosting his '85 earnings to more than \$26,000 with the Zia Handicap win.

Weighted second to Coda Mundi is Amy Jo Mito, second to Game Doll in the \$10,950 Go Together Handicap May 26, and second to track record holder Oh Snaz in the \$9,800 Mr. Kid Charge Handicap June 8. The Mito Paint mare has finished in the top two in all of her four races this year.

Also making their bid in Saturday's Jet Deck Handicap are; Probition, fourth in the \$288,074 Kansas Derby; Easy Trek, a half-length back of Coda Mundi in the Zia 'Cap; Sissys Rebel, who ran third to Oh Snaz when he equalled the track record in the Mr. Kid Charge; Board Chairman, a winner of \$104,000 last year; Rainbow Silver Cup finalist Barbarys Pokey; and Viking Mist.

My Sweet Ten, a 3-year-old daughter of Jim J., ships in from a sharp campaign in the Texas bushes, finishing no worse than third in seven starts this year.

Racing resumes on Sunday at this mountain track with the First Lady Handicap, spotlighting veteran fillies and mares racing for a \$10,000-added purse over 6 furlongs.

Derby Consolation set Friday

Hidden Motive comes off the road to tangle with Norgor Derby finalist Barrtime in Friday's three-quarter mile allowance headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

Friday's card is the third program in an expanded holiday format at this mountain track. Racing opened on Wednesday and continues through Sunday, with first post at 1 p.m.

Also slated for Friday's program is the \$88,000 consolation of the Rainbow Derby, which will run as the sixth race. The winner earns more than \$18,000.

Hidden Motive and Barrtime head a field of eight 3-year-old thoroughbreds vying for a \$4,500 purse in Friday's main event.

Barrtime shipped to Ruidoso off a lackluster campaign at Oaklawn Park in Arkansas, where the Bill Leach trainee was fifth his first start with high-dollar allowance

company, and dead last in the Mountain Valley Handicap - both at seven furlongs.

Leach set the Kentucky-bred with tough competition in the \$11,600 Memorial Handicap for his Ruidoso debut. Barrtime set all of the early fractions in that one, but tired midway to finish ninth among 10 entrants.

His next assignment came in a trial division for the \$37,000 Norgor Derby on June 15. Barrtime looked sharp in a wire-to-wire score for his heat, but was left at the gate in the final of the Norgor and finished a disappointing fifth - more than six lengths back of winner Centre's Premiere. Friday's feature will be his first start since that dull effort.

Preston Farms' Hidden Motive last raced in New Mexico on Jan. 26 at Sunland Park, finishing third to speed burner Lord Rubic at 6 furlongs. The race marked the

opening of Hidden Motive's '85 campaign. He was first or second for three of five outs in 1984.

Trainer Bob Arnett shipped the New Mexico-bred to Oaklawn off the Sunland tune-up, where he won at Friday's distance in an allowance race on Feb. 15.

Judge Jack Frost is a threatening addition to Friday's feature field. Also trained by Arnett, the son of Jack Frost has lit the board for eight straight races. He ran fourth his last appearance to undefeated Whose That Guy, beating three others entered in Friday's main event.

Lucky Yard was fifth in that allowance sprint, after running third to Flemish Slipper in the Memorial Handicap, and then coming back for runnerup moneys at 7/8th of a mile.

Active Spirit and Gaelic Sam were 8th and 9th respectively against Whose That Guy. Pleasure Lad makes his first appearance at Ruidoso after breaking his maiden at Santa Fe in May.

Generalissimo deserves mention after pocketing more than \$31,000 his first year on the track. But the New Mexico-bred son of Ross The Boss has shown little in three races at this meet.

Racing resumes on Saturday at Ruidoso Downs, with the \$10,000-added Jet Deck Handicap spotlighting older quarter horses at 440 yards. Sunday's topper brings out the ladies, as veteran thoroughbreds match strides over 6 furlongs in the \$10,000-added First Lady Handicap.





Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

Trainer Cecil Crabtree was undefeated on Saturday afternoon at Ruidoso Downs, as each of the three starters he sent out returned to the barns via the winner's circle. For Crabtree, the three-bagger was his second of the meeting; he also won a trio on May 24, when he sent out five starters.

Crabtree's remarkable spree began with Saturday's sixth race, when his 2-year-old gelding Native Red upset a good field of allowance horses to pay \$72.20. In the next race, Crabtree was back with Rebelle, who won an 870-yard dash to pay \$10.50.

Then, in the featured \$10,150 Aspen Handicap, Crabtree-trained Tilt to Win proved best by 1 1/2-lengths under jockey Mike Lidberg, and paid \$15.60 to complete the trainer's perfect day.

Crabtree has now won 11 races on the season from only 38 starters.

The stewards suspended 24-year-old jockey Kenneth Lewis for the balance of the meeting, plus 30 days, for "possession of a good and/or implement", and referred his case to the New Mexico State Racing Commission.

Lewis' final mount came on Friday, aboard a 7-year-old mare named Black Clipper, which finished seventh in the seventh race at 49-1. Lewis was removed from two mounts later that day, and the stewards handed down their ruling on Saturday morning.

Four horses set seasonal-bests at three distances on Sunday. The series of quick times began with the second race, for \$3,200 claimers, which was won by Spare Rib in 1:19 3/5 for 6 1/2-furlongs. That time

was two full seconds off the track record, but on a full second better than Mighty Momentum had run the distance on June 9.

Then, in the ninth race, Patti Dash sped 550 yards in :28.75 to miss Big Profit's 13-year-old track record by only one-tenth of a second. The 4-year-old mare eclipsed Gears Pat's seasonal best by more than half a second.

Finally, in back-to-back races, the winning time for seven furlongs was 1:25 1/5, more than a second faster than Release The Wind had run the distance on May 25.

Sherry's Ace was the first to go the seven-eighths in that quick time. He won the tenth race over a good allowance field which included Memorial Day Handicap winner Flemish Slipper. In the eleventh race, the Governor's Handicap, old-pro Copper Case rushed home to tie Sherry's Ace's mark. Both horses missed Fill Mackis Cup's track record by 4 1/5ths of a second.
