Residents voice opinions on dam

Ruidoso citizens have mixed feelings about a recent Ruidoso Village Council decision. The council voted during a special meeting Tuesday not to issue bonds to pay for completing the Grindstone Canyon dam project and councillors are being both praised and condemned for that action.

"They ought to be impeached," said one resident contacted as part of a random telephone survey Saturday.

"It has to do with the economy," commented another villager who said he agrees with the decision to avoid further indebtedness in "a slow period."

"I don't even know what it is," was the answer of several Ruidosians asked for their opinions on the Grindstone Canyon dam.

The 31 people contacted as part of the survey were asked three questions and 10 declined to answer, giving lack of information as the reason.

The first question asked was:

DO YOU THINK THE RUIDOSO VILLAGE COUNCIL MADE THE RIGHT DECISION TUESDAY WHEN THEY VOTED AGAINST ISSUING BONDS TO COMPLETE THE GRINDSTONE CANYON DAM PROJECT?

When asked that question, nine respondents said "yes" and 12 answered "no."

Reasons mentioned for agreeing with the decision included a stagnant economy and slowed local growth. Many who felt the councillors made the wrong decision

mentioned the \$3 million already invested in Grindstone Canyon dam project.

The second question asked in the survey was:

DO YOU FEEL THAT A PROMISE TO THE VOTERS HAS BEEN BROKEN?

Some citizens who agreed with the councillors' Tuesday decision not to issue bonds for immediate completion of the dam, said that a promise had definitely been broken.

Of the 21 who answered that question, 11 said "yes," four said "no" and six were unsure. Those who answered in the affirmative mentioned the 1982 bond election in which voters say they were told the bonds issued were for the Grindstone Canyon dam, and not for any other purpose.

"They've already committed themselves," answered one citizen. The final question asked was:

WITHOUT THE GRINDSTONE CANYON DAM, DO YOU FEEL RUIDOSO HAS AMPLE SOURCES FOR WATER?

Respondents were nearly split on that question with nine answering "yes," eight answering "no" and five who were unsure. Several survey participants mentioned the Sierra Blanca well field, hoping that it will serve future water needs.

Those answering the question in the negative mentioned water shortages during past summers and concern for future growth.

Many citizens are eagerly awaiting the council's next move.

Groups scheduled to meet this week

The newly appointed Economic Development Committee for the Village of Ruidoso will meet at 1 p.m. today (Monday), in the Ruidoso Village Administrative Center.

New Mexico Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels will meet with the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees at its meeting at 7 p.m. today (Monday), July 8, at the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building.

Runnels will confer with the trustees about the Main Street Program. Ruidoso Downs could receive state funding for some of its beautification projects.

Other agenda items include:

- Final hearing for the 1985-86 fiscal year budget.
- Bid awards for janitorial services and sanitation contract.
- Joint powers agreement with Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.
- Computer proposal.

The Ruidoso Village Council will meet at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 9, in the council chambers of the Village Administrative Center.

Adult Recreation Board organizes

Mayor George White instructed members of the newly established Adult Recreation Advisory Board of their duties and responsibilities during the group's first official meeting Friday at Village Hall.

White distributed copies of Ordinance 85-14, in which the board was created. He stressed to the five board members in attendance that their work is "with the advice and consent of the director of the Village of Ruidoso's Adult Recreation Program."

"Everything comes through the department chairman," he said.

Bette Romans, director of the village program, will serve as an ex officio member of the board, and Village Councillor Jerry Shaw will act as adviser representing the Mayor and the village council.

The board established a regular monthly meeting time of 11 a.m. the first Friday of each month. Future meetings will be in the Adult Recreation Center behind the Ruidoso Public Library.

Shaw and board member Verna Adams both served on the ad hoc advisory committee that was the forerunner to the new board. They presented background information on the findings of that group.

"In no way were we dissatisfied with what's going on now," Shaw said. She explained that past and current programs, under the direction of Romans, have been very successful.

"We're interested in expanding," Shaw added.

Shaw said the village council has already approved several of the ad-

visory group's recommendations.

Money was appropriated for a larger sign to clearly identify where the center is located, more funds were allocated to expand transportation services and a recommendation to repair and refurbish the center's van was passed.

Members decided to read minutes of the ad hoc advisory committee before the next meeting, so that a focus for the board might be identified.

"The key to this committee is not to have a negative attitude," Shaw said. "We need to have a positive attitude and come up with some ideas to help Bette," she added.

The board will meet next at 11 a.m. Friday, August 2, at the Adult Recreation Center.



Governor to speak at chamber banquet

Use caution in Midtown traffic

Crossing Sudderth Drive in Midtown Ruidoso can be dangerous in spite of several pedestrian crosswalks.

Problems are caused by motorists failing to stop for pedestrians in the crosswalk and also by pedestrians who don't use the crosswalks, according to Sergeant Robert Kenney of the Ruidoso Police Department.

"Please use extreme caution in the Midtown area," urged Ruidoso

Police Chief Richard Swenor, when contacted by telephone Friday. Swenor said congestion in Midtown makes it hard for motorists and pedestrians alike. Although his department didn't favor placing the crosswalks along Sudderth, he does recommend that they be used.

Since Ruidoso's Sudderth Drive is also New Mexico State Highway 37, the state placed the crosswalks along the street.

"There's no law against jaywalking," said Swenor, but he urges pedestrians to walk the few extra

steps and use the crosswalks.

Swenor said motorists who "flagrantly violate" the crosswalk regulations are being cited.

Swenor, who said the crosswalk signs are often difficult to see, especially when both lanes of traffic are being used, recommended that motorists slow down through Midtown.

He gave the following recommendations for pedestrians:

- Use the crosswalks provided.
- Before stepping into the crosswalk, make eye contact with the driver of any vehicle nearing

the crosswalk. "Make sure they see you," he said.

Remember, if vehicles are in both lanes, that the center lane drivers may not be able to see you.

Swenor said a permanent solution to Midtown traffic problems is expected to be contained in Ruidoso's Comprehensive Plan being drafted by BRW, Inc. That plan won't be completed until August, and won't be implemented until much later.

In the meantime, Swenor repeated, extreme caution should be exercised in Midtown Ruidoso.


Prissy Fein captures 21st Rainbow Derby

Prissy Fein captured the 21st running of the \$515,000 Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs on Thursday, posting a half-length victory in stakes record time.

Breaking as the 2-1 choice of 6,481 on hand for the holiday program at the mountain track, leading California rider John Creager took the filly to an early jump on the 10-horse field and was never seriously threatened for the 440-yard trip.

The final time was 21.32 seconds - a seasonal best, which also eclipsed the stake record of 21.38 held by Mr Master Bug since 1983.

Prissy Fein broke from the No. 3 post, gradually drifting to the middle of the lane for a clear shot at the winner's share of \$211,149 for owners J.T. Hooten and R.D. Hubbard of Uvalde, Texas. The score boosted her lifetime earnings to \$456,956. The mutuels: \$5.80, \$3.80

and \$3.

Spring Lark and Yankee Dash, second in the wagering at a little more than 3-1, finished second and third respectively.

Spring Lark returned \$4.20 and \$3.40 with Jacky Martin aboard to earn \$96,525. Alex Baldillez Jr. booted Yankee Dash home for a show payoff of \$3.40, and third-

place money of \$49,469.

Sissys Rebel wins Jet Deck Handicap

Sissys Rebel was third in the wagering, but first across the wire in Saturday's \$11,400 Jet Deck Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The 12-race program saw the mountain track record its highest handle of the 1985 season, as 6,581 fans wagered \$746,889. One lucky player collected \$52,193, busting a four-day Pic-Six carryover pool that had accumulated over the holiday weekend.

In the featured Jet Deck Handicap, Sissys Rebel posted his third win of the year. The five-year-old son of Rebel Cause broke alertly amid a strong field of eight older

quarter horses to win by three-quarter lengths with Alex Baldillez Jr. aboard. Dwayne 'Sleepy' Gilbreath is the trainer.

The final time for the 440-yard dash was 21.44 seconds. The Five Way Club of Stamford, Texas, collected the \$6,840 winner's purse. Sissys Rebel returned \$9.20, \$4.40 and \$4 across the board.

Coda Mundi, the 9-5 favorite, got up for second in a game effort out of the No. 2 post to finish a nose in front of Easy Trek, who went postward at more than 10-1 odds. Coda Mundi's second was worth \$3.60 and \$3.20. Easy Trek's show paid \$4.80.

Amy Jo Mito (2-1) made up ground to finish fourth after coming out of the gate a step slow and then lunging toward the grandstand. Prohibition was an early scratch.

In Saturday's co-featured \$9,200 Ruffast Handicap Dare Send daylighted competition over 5 1/2 furlongs, drawing out to a widening 2 1/4-length victory in 1:08 2/5 seconds.

Kevin Cogburn rode the winner for Raymond Evans of Tullia, Texas, who pocketed \$5,520 from the Ruffast purse. The payoffs: \$7.60, \$4.20 and \$3.20. Tune Above was second, and Swoon Time finished third.

Murphy wins aboard Queen Elect

Young jockey Glen Murphy accounted for his first stakes victory with a desperate whisker win aboard Queen Elect in Sunday's featured First Lady Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The First Lady spotlighted a select field of six sophomore fillies chasing an \$11,500 purse over 6 furlongs. Ice Magic was backed down to the 6-5 favorite for the sprint, with Queen Elect - close behind at 3-2.

At the break, Queen Elect and High Bounds Dance (8-1) drew alongside each other in a neck-and-neck battle for the lead. The two horses matched strides around the clubhouse turn and continued to duel through the backstretch with Carlos Rivas and High Bounds Dance heading Murphy's mount by the narrowest of margins.

Stalking the leaders to the final turn were Star Arrival and Ice Magic. Star Arrival, under Jerry

Rodriguez, made his move around the final turn and caught the leaders a short distance from the top of the lane.

Rodriguez maneuvered Star Arrival off the rail to a small opening between High Bounds Dance and Queen Elect as the three horses drove home for the money. At the wire, it was Queen Elect by a nose in front of Star Arrival, who was a head the best of High Bounds Dance.

Judge Jack Frost squeaks by Barrtime

Judge Jack Frost made a bold move in the final furlong of Friday's featured allowance sprint at Ruidoso Downs, running down favored Barrtime to win a dramatic photo-finish.

The six-furlong showdown headlined a 12-race program that saw the mountain track's Pic-Six carryover climb to \$32,206, as more than 5,650 fans were unable to peg the winners - of the fifth through tenth races.

Friday's 6th race - the \$88,079 Rainbow Derby Consolation - was won by Takethecashandrun,

The Dash For Cash filly took the 440-yard dash by three-quarters of a length over Flaming Viking in 21.52 seconds. The Dwayne Gilbreath trainee returned \$3.20, \$2.10 and \$2.20 racing as an entry with Cash For Sis and Touch Of Essence.

In the main event, 3-2 favorite Barrtime matched strides with outsider Pleasure Lad to the final turn with Generalissimo and Gaelic Sam tracking the leaders through the pocketing \$19,291 for owners James Barnett and B.F. Phillips Jr. of

Frisco, Texas.

Pleasure Lad faded out of contention as Judge Jack Frost, raced wide to make his bid under rider Eugene O'Neill, chasing the frontrunner to the wire for a head verdict in 1:12 4/5 seconds. The winner returned \$11.20, \$4 and \$3.

The victory was worth \$2,700 for owner Danny Stafford of Carlbad, N.M. Barrtime's runner-up finish returned \$2.80 and \$2.40. Hidden Motive, at nearly 5-1, came in five lengths back of Barrtime to return \$3.40.

Brigand Silk breaks 400-yard track record

Brigand Silk shattered Ruidoso Downs' 400-yard track record in a stunning performance Wednesday that pegged the horse as the one to beat in the upcoming \$683,000 Rainbow Futurity.

The first eight races on Wednesday's program at this mountain track ran as time trials for the Grade I Rainbow, with the 10 fastest 2-year-old quarter horses advancing to the final on July 21.

Brigand Silk kept his undefeated record intact with a wire-to-wire victory in the 4th division under renowned rider Jacky Martin. It

was the fifth consecutive win for the Jack Dube trainee, who won his 400-yard heat by a widening 3 1/4 lengths in :19.505 seconds. The dasher is owned by Wichita Land Cattle Co. and Jack Fletcher of Simonton, Texas.

The clocking eclipsed the track record that was equaled in the opening trial heat when Sixarun marched to a 2 1/4-length margin in 19:630. Mr Crimson Bug and Oh Snaz had shared the benchmark going into Wednesday's Rainbow trials.

In an unusual occurrence, each of

the horses that won trial divisions qualified for the field of the Rainbow Futurity. In addition to Sixarun and Brigand Silk, they included: Josies Super Sound, Just Six, Easy Good Buddy, Zevis Cash Flow, Six Popper and Goodtime Feature.

Savy Edition broke into the field with a whisker second to Six Popper in the fifth heat. A special drawing between two other second-place finishers - Six Aces and My Best Talent - will be held Thursday to determine the final qualifier for the Rainbow Futurity.

Cancer—it could happen to anyone. Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan jails Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor, as he'll be jailing other participants in the American Cancer Society Jail-a-thon July 11-12. Anyone may be jailed during the ACS fundraiser. Funds to "bail out" inmates will go to the society.

Jail-A-Thon set

The American Cancer Society (ACS) wants you to be arrested. The society is planning a Jail-a-thon July 11 and 12. The event is designed to raise money to fight cancer. Anyone can be arrested for \$15.

Prisoners will have ball set at the time of the arrest and are provided with a telephone so they may solicit pledges from their friends. Each prisoner will be arrested by a uniformed, off-duty police officer. The officer will read each prisoner his or her rights:

"You have the right to remain healthy. If you give up the right to remain healthy, anything you do not try to prevent (cancer) can be held against you. If you have questions we will be glad to answer them at any time. You have the right to speak to a doctor and get a second opinion. If you cannot afford a doctor, there is guidance and aid through your local American Cancer Society."

Prisoners will be issued standard black-and-white prison uniforms and given the standard prison meal of bread and water. The jail will be at the Gazebo Shopping Center.

Charlie Kemp, president of the Lincoln County branch of the society, said she hopes to raise \$10,000 during the two-day Jail-a-thon. She suggested those wishing to have someone arrested be prepared with a mock charge, such as frowning on a Thursday afternoon or repeatedly making bad jokes.

Those wishing to have a friend, relative, boss, employee or spouse arrested should call Kemp at 378-8573.



Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Writers in the old days sure used to come right out with it.

This quote comes from the Santa Fe Weekly, where it ran after the close of the 1968 legislative session. (We stole it from the newsletter of the Association of Counties.) Here's what it says:

"The Legislature adjourned on Thursday and the city is now free from the presence of that herd of notabilities that composed that body and which have made such striking exhibitions of their legislative ignorance and mental darkness during the last 60 days past.

"We trust that New Mexico never again will be represented in the capacity of lawmakers by such a combination of ignorance, prejudice and dishonesty as that which has just adjourned after having by the puerile and factious proceedings disgraced the territory and made the word 'legislator' a mockery and a by-word in our midst. Boys of 10 years who would show as little intelligence would be dismissed from any normal school in the country."

What could one possibly add to the magnificent tirade—except perhaps to say jokingly, of course that things haven't changed a bit?

You won't see it happen, but some of us here have played with an interesting scenario.

It works like this: Governor Anaya, who gets to name the successor to Francisco Gonzales, who resigned as Senator from Taos-Mora-Santa Fe counties, could pull an interesting coup on some of those he doesn't much like now serving in the Senate.

All he would have to do is name a Republican instead of a Democrat to fill the vacancy in District 6.

If he did that, the Republicans, now deadlocked 21-21 with Democrats for control of the upper house, would have a true majority. If they had that, they in turn could rid themselves once and for all of the heavy hand of irregular Democrat Les Houston, who voted with them to organize the Senate only after they agreed to select him their president pro tem.

That's a thought that should have considerable attraction for Toney Anaya, who has every reason to consider Houston a turncoat and a rascal. Certainly it would be a relief to the Governor not to have that particular man still the *de facto* power in the Senate for every moment of the waning Anaya term.

All that isn't going to get done, of course. Governor Anaya, being a true party man, will almost certainly name a Democrat to the post.

If he does, some of us hope it won't be some party hack who gets the job by promising to vote always and everywhere just as Toney wants him to.

But naming a Democrat just for appearance's sake is too bad. It means that a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity will go begging.

People talk much these days about our state being too well supplied with post-secondary education. What's the real story?

Well, we actually have six four-year, degree-granting universities; 14 branch, junior colleges; and three technical-vocational schools, all being funded in part by the state.

All but one of those degree-granting schools ante-date 1900; the

only one established in this century is Eastern, which was started in the 1930s. Oldest institutions at the junior-college level are New Mexico Military Institute and Northern New Mexico Community College, formerly the Spanish-American Normal School at El Rito; both were in existence when New Mexico became a state in 1912. Everything else, including the TVIs and the rest of the two-year institutions, are post-World War II. Some may have been created in part

because of the GI Bill of Rights, but the major factor leading to their establishment is more likely to be the fact that the state provides its funding on the basis of headcount.

Pay more money for more students, some say, and you encourage expansion.

If you were an unfortunate legislator faced with responsibility for recommending which schools to close, which would you pick? Certainly not the one in your district.

On the Village Beat with Darrell Pehr



You can't turn left from Sudderth Drive during the busy summer season in Ruidoso. Get used to it—it's a fact of life here, an event as reliable as the fading each year of the yellow line down the middle of the street.

The no-left-turn phenomenon has returned again this July. No matter where you are on Sudderth's length, whether you want to use your "dinker light" or signal by hand, you just can't turn left off Sudderth Drive without a long wait, sheer luck or nerves of steel.

The stream of cars that makes turning left so difficult is generally regarded, of course, as a good sign in this town. So we should be thankful that so many visitors are here in town, spending lots of money, giving the local economy a good shot in the arm.

One positive way to think of the never-ending line of cars is to think of Sudderth Drive as a huge artery in the bloodstream of Ruidoso. Think of that long line of metal cars as a strong dose of Geritol, giving a healthy boost to Ruidoso's iron-poor blood.

Does that make you feel better while you continue to watch for a break in traffic after spending a half-hour waiting to turn left? Probably not, huh?

There are things we Ruidosans can do to better handle the situation of not being able to turn left on Sudderth.

One driver told me her secret technique for dealing with the no-left-turn situation. She revealed that, on errand-running trips in Ruidoso, she does all errands on the right side of the street first, then turns around down by Gibson's and does all her errands on the other side of the street.

Ingenious!
 This is the type of battle-planning that is necessary to assertively deal with the no-left-turn situation. Military analysts here have suggested that a "high-tech" approach be adopted to deal with this serious problem.

Such thinking was the source of the Sudderth Strategic Defense In-

itiative, a plan to meet the challenge of turning left, no matter what the price!

The Initiative, known commonly as "Car Wars," emphasizes pre-planning and early-warning systems. The use of high technology in Car Wars is A-OK.

Some items to take along on a Car Wars trip in which you are planning to turn left include a fingernail manicure set, a Trivial Pursuit game, a sack lunch, a "Plasti-Pointer" and an emergency locator beacon.

The set, Trivial Pursuit and lunch are to keep you occupied while waiting to turn left. The "Plasti-Pointer" is a new Car Wars product developed especially for Ruidoso motorists whose turn signals don't work. The prosthesis-like plastic device, developed to save hours of strenuous hand-signaling, is molded to resemble a human arm in the proper hand turn signal poses. The Pointer mounts on the side rear-view mirror and is available in all colors, including life-like flesh tones and a Malibu Ken tan.

The beacon, similar to those installed as standard equipment in all airplanes, follows much the same function in Car Wars automobiling as it does in aviation. In planes, the beacon sends out a distress signal indicating the plane has suffered some sort of calamity. In Car Wars, the beacon sends a laser distress signal to the home of the person who is stuck trying to turn left, indicating that person will be late for dinner.

Other high-tech items promised for next year's summer traffic are bucket seat sleeping bags and portable stoplights.

But what if you're against military solutions to the problems of the world? If you are anti Car Wars and anti high tech, then the best advice I can give you is to hope for mutual dis-automot. But I don't think getting everybody to walk is a solution. Most people in Ruidoso favor the build-up of traffic in the summertime.

Well, then we had better get used to it—in the busy summer season in Ruidoso, you just can't turn left!

The Pumas began the tournament with an exciting 9-3 victory over the Silver Bullets Thursday afternoon.


Thursday night, the Pumas were edged by Alamo Pipe and then were eliminated with a 3-2 loss to the Black Sox Saturday morning.

Pan-O-Rama Rampage and the Nads were the other Ruidoso teams to compete.


After losing to Alamo Pipe Thursday, the Nads were edged Friday by the Silver Bullets, 10-9.

As I was writing this column Friday, guess who was in first place in the American League's Eastern Division? The Toronto Blue Jays.

Guess who was in second place in the National League's Eastern Division, trailing St. Louis by just half a game? The Montreal Expos.

Both of these teams happen to represent Canadian cities, a fact which probably won't amaze many people.

But could you imagine a World Series where both teams are from that large country just north of the United States border? Not that there's anything wrong with that. It's just that the national anthem has been played at every World Series.

If the Blue Jays and Expos meet in the World Series, the national anthem will be played all right.

But it will be the Canadian national anthem.

I mean, baseball has always been considered an American sport. It's more American than apple pie.

If the World Series was an all-Canadian affair, I doubt if baseball would have as large a following in this country as it has in the past. Oh, the die-hard baseball fan will watch it. But lots of other fans who watch the World Series just because it's always been the thing to do may turn the television off.

And that will hurt the series' television ratings.

The bulk of the television market for the World Series is in the United States, not Canada. That's simply because there are more people here and the sport has been popular longer here.

Besides being Canadian teams, the Blue Jays and Expos just don't have the traditional drawing-card power that teams like the New York Yankees, Boston Red Sox, Chicago Cubs and Los Angeles Dodgers do.

The Yankees, Cubs, Red Sox and Dodgers have large followings all over the country. Even if the Cubs' and Red Sox' World Series appearances have been few and far between, their popularity has always been high.

The Expos and Blue Jays play in cities where the most popular sport is hockey, Canada's national sport.

Besides, Montreal's weather in late October probably resembles arctic weather more than the warm shirt-sleeved weather people generally associate with baseball.

The Expos and Blue Jays have never been in the World Series, so some people might say it's their turn.

But it just wouldn't be the same.

Nunley gets ready for Lobo season

He is remembered as one of the greatest football players Ruidoso High School has ever had.

When he wasn't blocking in the offensive line, he was running up the middle as a fullback. On defense, he always was in the middle of the play, stopping ballcarriers cold from his middle linebacker position.

It does not seem possible that Lon Nunley will enter his final season of play for the University of New Mexico (UNM) football team this fall.

But the former Warrior athlete is ready for his senior year at UNM.

"The key to our season this year is to work hard during the summer," the 6-1, 225-pound defensive tackle said. "We have to keep improving during the fall. Our young people will have to come through."

"I'm sure I'll start this season."

UNM, which had a 4-8 record last season, has only seven seniors on the 1985 roster. This will be Nunley's fourth year on the varsity.

The Lobo defensive line is small, but quick, according to Nunley.

Besides Nunley, the only other Lobo defensive linemen who have played a lot are Fred Mady and Tom Bradford.

Nunley has been working out six days a week at the Ruidoso Athletic Club (RAC), using different weight-training exercises.

"My favorite one is the bench press," he remarked. "I can lift 425 pounds. I'm trying to build up both my strength and speed. I hope to weigh 230 pounds for the fall."

"I'd like to thank the Whitwams (RAC owners Paul and Jeannie) for letting me use their facilities."

Nunley regards defending national champion Brigham Young University (BYU) as the Lobos' main football rival in the Western Athletic Conference.

"I think they were the best team in the nation last year," he said. "They had a lot of good players, and when they play their game, they are awfully tough."

Nunley says the 10-1 record UNM had in his freshman season has been the highlight of his college football career.

UNM will open fall practice Tuesday, August 13, and begin the season September 7, at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Nunley made the AAA-division all-state team as a linebacker his senior season at Ruidoso High School. The next summer he played on the South All-Star team which defeated the North 16-7 in Albuquerque.

Ruidoso had an 8-2 record in Nunley's senior year (1981) and a 7-3 record in his junior season. The 7-3 record was gained in Ruidoso's second year in the AAA-division.

The 1981 Warrior team lost a chance to win the District 3-AAA title and win a state playoff berth when they fell to Silver City 21-14 in the final game of the season.

Ruidoso gained a playoff berth last season and Nunley thinks the

Warriors will do well again this year.

"I think they could do really well," he said. "I think the state title is a realistic goal."

Nunley wasn't able to get a state title when he was at Ruidoso. However, he accomplished just about everything else a high school football player could do.

Now he's doing more at the University of New Mexico.



New subdivision is open

The Pines of Gavilan, a new subdivision located one mile from

Ruidoso High School on Gavilan Canyon Road, opened its first phase on June 21.

Ed and Janet Pearson own the development. The subdivision is zoned for mobile homes, as well as commercial properties along the Gavilan Canyon Road frontage.

"We feel the commercial area will be an ideal situation for light industry, such as building trades," said Janet Pearson. Southwest Specialties already has its office in The Pines.


Danny Fifer and Miles Dyson also competed in match roping. Fifer won the match with a total time of 74.56 seconds.



Building permits reflect continuing slump

Building permits issued in the village during June showed a sharp decline from those issued during May and reflected an ongoing decline from levels of last year.

Total permits issued in June numbered 57, with a valuation of \$1,522,634, compared to 78, with a valuation of \$2,116,078, during May.

Total permits issued so far this year number 344, with a valuation of \$9,918,614. At this time last year, 298 permits had been issued, with a valuation of \$20,448,826.

The Ruidoso Building Inspector's Office issued 15 permits for new single-family dwellings during June, with a total valuation of \$1,243,374. Permits in that category during May numbered 19, with a total valuation of \$1,583,756.

Nearly twice as many single-family dwelling permits were issued in June 1984 as were issued in June 1985. June 1984 saw 29 single-family dwelling permits issued for a total valuation of \$2,324,649.

Year-to-date permit valuations on single-family dwellings are down by more than 50 percent compared with last year. Last year's mid-year total valuation for single-family dwelling valuations was \$12,460,489, compared with the 1985 six-month valuation total of \$5,950,928.

A 1985 trend toward more permits being issued for residential alterations and additions continued with 33 issued in June for a total valuation of \$226,632.

That compares with the May total of 42 permits issued with a valuation of \$209,568, and the total in June 1984, when only 24 permits were issued for a total valuation of \$352,833.

No permits for new commercial buildings were issued during June. In June 1984, the village issued six new commercial permits with a total valuation of \$523,545.

The half-year mark in new commercial permits found the village down in number of permits issued

and in total valuation. Through June 1984, the number of new commercial permits issued was listed at 30 with a valuation of \$4,249,804; for June 1985, permits issued totaled 11 with a valuation of \$1,346,042.

One permit was issued during June for an apartment addition/alteration, with a valuation of \$1,500. None were issued in May, and none in June 1984. The total for the year in that category is four permits valued at \$351,990.

Halfway through 1984, the inspector had issued just one apartment addition/alteration permit with a total valuation of \$21,000.

The All-Star game: Where legends play

Striking before the July 16 All-Star Game in Minneapolis would hardly be in the best interests of the Major-League Baseball Players Association. Why forfeit the \$2.1 million in receipts the owners are expected to contribute to the players' pension fund? In fact, the All-Star Game was created 52 years ago by Chicago Tribune sports editor Arch Ward as a means to generate money for former players found destitute during the Depression.

The fans chose the stars they wanted to watch in 1933. Fans didn't vote again until 1947, then lost the vote in 1957 (when Cincinnati's ballot-stuffing faithful nearly kept Henry Aaron and Willie Mays off the squad), then gained it back in 1980 when the then-new commissioner, Bowie Kuhn, sought to boost attendance by resuming the fan-selection process. The public has dutifully punched holes in those Gillette cards ever since, continually incurring the wrath of sport-scribes who insist they could select more equitable starting lineups.

Yet these same writers tortured a perennial All-Star fan hero for 20 years before granting him Hall of Fame status in 1975. Ralph Kiner led the National League in home runs and slugging percentage seven straight years, from 1946-52. Yet during a 10-year span with the Pirates, Cubs and Indians, his team finished last or next to last seven times. For him, the midsummer classic was his sole chance at national exposure.

"Walking into an All-Star clubhouse is always an overwhelming experience," says Kiner. "Since I never had the benefit of playing on a decent team, I was probably more overwhelmed than most."

But the slugging outfielder never let it show. Kiner is the only player ever to hit homers in three straight All-Star games. In '49 he hit one out in Brooklyn. In '51 he tagged a solo shot in Detroit. But it was the 1950 connection in the top of the 9th at Chicago's Comiskey Park that he rates as his favorite among his 369 lifetime dingers.

"Because it sent the game into extra innings," Kiner says. "In front of the whole country."

Among Red Sox fans, however, Kiner is equally infamous for indirectly costing their boys the pennant. Earlier in the game, Kiner had sent their leftfielder, Ted Williams, back to the wall.

"It was a low liner and Williams broke his elbow on the scoreboard. He claims I ruined his swing. He only hit .388 the next year."

But in 1950, a Williams-less Red Sox squad finished four games behind the Yankees. And to this day, many a Sox rooster still chokes when watching now-broadcaster Kiner work a Mets game.





Movie Nostalgia

In 1951, director-writer Joseph L. Mankiewicz was on a roll. He had won two Oscars (Best Director and Best Screenplay) the previous year for "All About Eve" and two Oscars the year before that for "A Letter to Three Wives."

His 1951 follow-up, "People Will Talk," didn't reach the heights of his earlier masterpieces, but it still holds up quite well.

Cary Grant is his usual charming self as Dr. Praetorius, the dedicated physician and teacher. Jeanne Crain plays the pregnant — and unmarried — patient, whom Dr. Praetorius marries himself when he finds that neither he nor she can bear to tell her gentle father about her condition.

It sounds pretty grim, but "People Will Talk" is actually a much-better-than-average comedy.

Matters are complicated by an investigation being run by a jealous colleague, who is convinced that Dr. Praetorius, who has always been rather vague about his background, is hiding a dark secret, and a genuine mystery surrounding someone extremely close to the good doctor.

Question: Who is the mysterious person?

Answer: Shunderson (Finlay Currie), Dr. Praetorius's unusual (and fiercely loyal) manservant.







A chiller from Bradbury

Ray Bradbury's "The Crowd," airing July 17 on HBO, is a chilling finale to the three-part series "Ray Bradbury Theatre."

It stars Nick Mancuso as Joe Spallner, an artist who leaves a party one night and has a car accident a few minutes later. As he crawls out of the wreckage, a crowd gathers around him. Their faces move closer and closer to his own, take on a sinister appearance, and haunt him long after the accident is over.

Spallner begins to watch the crowds at other accidents and notices that some of the same faces keep appearing at different accident sites. He becomes obsessed with searching out those people. And when he tracks them down, he learns a horrible, supernatural truth about them — the hard way.

If you like tales that send shivers down your spine, "The Crowd" is as good as they come. Bradbury manipulates us into believing one thing and then — wham! — he gives us something else.

Cary Grant, one of Hollywood's most elegant leading men, may — at 81 years of age — be somewhat out of his prime, but his screen image will stay with us forever. The Movie Channel has dedicated the month of July to Grant

and will air four of his films.

In "People Will Talk" (July 14 and 19), Grant plays a dedicated physician who falls in love with an unmarried pregnant woman (Jeanne Crain). Also this week, on July 15, Grant plays a diplomat looking for the perfect wife in "Dream Wife," with Deborah Kerr and Walter Pidgeon.

"Crisis" and "The Bishop's Wife" will air later this month, on July 22 and July 29 respectively.

This week, athletes will be featured on Lifetime's talk shows. The highlight has to be Dr. Ruth Westheimer's "Good Sex!" on July 15. The good doctor and former Yankee Jim Bouton (the author of "Ball Four") discuss the negative effects baseball has had on his life.

COCOON (PG-13 20th Century-Fox) Starring Don Ameche, Wilford Brimley, Hume Cronyn ★ ★ ★ 1/2 ★

In "Cocoon," a trio of elderly gentlemen sneak out of their retirement home and go swimming in the indoor pool at the deserted house next door. That would be fine, if it weren't for the fact that the renters of the house happen to be from another planet and happen to be using the pool to revive some of their comrades, who were left behind centuries ago. Since the pool is full of their special elixir of life force, it becomes a fountain of youth for the three geriatric musketeers. Illnesses go into remission, slow dancing at the old folks' home turns into late nights at a disco, and sexual appetites long thought dormant spring to life.

Aliens and the underwater world are no strangers to director Ron Howard. His last film, "Splash," dealt with a mermaid who falls in love with a mortal. But "Cocoon" is hardly a repeat of "Splash," and Howard tells the tale with an understated simplicity that lets the inherent power of this

heartwarming story come through.

He also knows enough to let veterans like Don Ameche and Jack Gilford, who were performing decades before little Opie (Howard) wandered into Mayberry on "The Andy Griffith Show," do their stuff with great gusto. Their ensemble performance shows that acting talent knows no age limits.

But the story itself is not without blemishes. It draws heavily on "E.T." and "Close Encounters of the Third Kind." The pool at which the elderly trio bathes away decades is flawlessly maintained, but the house and grounds look like they've been deserted for years. And the aliens themselves are as inept a group of creatures as ever spun down this side of the Milky Way.

But only the most cynical would dismiss this film for these reasons. Anyone who isn't enough of a child to overlook a few flaws is easily the oldest person of all.

Ed Begley Jr. doesn't mind playing a jerk

Victor Ehrlich isn't likely to be listed with Dr. Kildare, Ben Casey and Marcus Welby as one of television's most dedicated doctors.

In fact, the "St. Elsewhere" medico will probably be remembered as "Television Doctor Most Likely to Be Named in a Malpractice Suit." But that doesn't bother Ed Begley Jr.

"I don't mind playing a jerk," says Begley. "It's fine with me because it gives me a high profile." He is happy, however, that Ehrlich's Health Spots — vignettes the doctor gave for a fictitious Boston television station — are now past history.

"I had some funny stuff last year," Begley says. "But those Health Spots made me the master of poor taste on television. I'm always giving the writers ideas and they're very open. They thank me for my stuff and then they write what they want."

Begley says, decidedly tongue in cheek, that he gets even with the writers by doing what he pleases once he's on camera. He comes by his profession naturally. His father, Ed Begley Sr. (who died in 1970), was an outstanding character actor for three decades and won an Oscar in 1963 for Best Supporting Actor in "Sweet Bird of Youth."

His father supported young Ed's desire to act,

although he also warned him about the rough road ahead. Young Ed made his TV debut in 1967, at age 17, on "My Three Sons." The episode was directed by Fred deCordova, a good friend of Begley Sr. Begley followed that with "six or seven" episodes of "Room 222" and a regular role on "Mary Hartman, Mary Hartman."

Begley spent his recent hiatus from "St. Elsewhere" in Yugoslavia, working on the feature film "Transylvania 5-6000," in which he plays a National Enquirer-esque reporter and co-stars with Jeff Goldblum.

But when the comedy wrapped, it was back to the operating room and the garish Hawaiian shirts of Victor Ehrlich, M.D.

"I really love the character," Begley says, trying to sound sincere for just a moment. "He has really evolved. In the beginning, I had little to do."

Tim Reid has thoughts on a serious subject

Tim Reid started his career as a comedian, in the comic team of Tim and Tom (Dreesan), achieved fame as DJ Venus Flytrap on the sitcom "WKRP in Cincinnati," and now plays the serio-comic role of detective Downtown Brown on "Simon and Simon." In real life, however, Reid is a serious man who is passionately devoted to an extremely serious cause — de-glamorizing the use of drugs in film and on TV.

"I believe in standing up for what you believe in," says Reid, who is on the board of directors of the Entertainment Industries Council for a Drug-Free Society, along with his "Simon and Simon" co-star Gerald McRaney.

Reid got involved in the cause in 1969, when he and his partner, Dreesan, would go to schools and lecture against drug abuse. "Back then (the cause) didn't get any publicity. Everyone thought drugs were relegated to the ghetto. But that was a myth. It was something middle-class kids were into. It runs rampant through every sector of the world."

He stays involved today "because I've got (three) teenage kids and I want them to see what I'm out there fighting for and hopefully they'll think twice." He also says he's never personally used any hard drugs.

Reid believes that "drug use is the same among all groups — whether it be actors, or lawyers, or dentists — but the high visibility of people in the entertainment industry glamorizes drugs and contributes to the problem." Reid feels that TV has cleaned up its act somewhat in the last few years, doing strong TV movies on the subject and producing anti-drug series-episodes. "But we've got a long way to go in films. Youth films today are deplorable — they're all motivated by producers' greed."

In the last two years, Reid has testified twice before the Senate Subcommittee on Special Investigations about the way in which celebrities serve as role models for youth. "Very few people know Macky (MacRaney) and I testified. When stars get arrested for drugs, that's when they get publicity," he says bitterly.

Reid desperately wants Hollywood to hear and heed the anti drug message now and to move toward self-regulation. "There's always the possibility that some ultraconservative group will come out here and try censorship. We should pull back. We should not let greed ruin this industry."
