

## Crime Stoppers pays for information

June was a quiet month for the Ruidoso Crime Stoppers, with no rewards paid and few phone calls received.

Those statistics, revealed during a Crime Stoppers meeting Thursday, don't mean that the village is free of crime.

"The more people that are here the more problems," said Richard Sandoval, president of the local organization. He said Crime Stoppers, not a police organization, offers cash rewards as an incentive to anyone having knowledge of a crime to contact the police.

Sandoval wants to remind local citizens that Crime Stoppers always offers a \$500 reward for the magistrate court bind-over or conviction of anyone selling drugs.

"To me drugs is the one most serious problem," Sandoval said. "If you have drugs in any community, sooner or later the kids get to it," said Captain Dave Pfeffer of the Ruidoso Police Department. Pfeffer added that drugs are related to many other crimes—often violent ones.

Although drugs are not more of a problem here than elsewhere, Pfeffer said, "We consider it a serious problem."

He said that drugs are probably the most serious ongoing problem of any police department.

"Somebody knows something about drug dealings," Sandoval said. He urges them to call Crime Stoppers at 257-4545. Callers may

remain anonymous. Membership in Ruidoso Crime Stoppers is open, and anyone wishing to join may contact Richard Sandoval at 257-7341. The group meets the second Thursday of each month.

## Grindstone could be financed many ways

Every member of the Ruidoso Village Council has stated support for the Grindstone Canyon dam project.

"We're split on the way to finance," said Village Councillor Jerry Shaw.

Voters in 1982 overwhelmingly approved an \$8 million water capital improvements program, originally expected to finance the land acquisition, dam construction, water treatment plant, raw-water line, 5-million-gallon storage tank and a pumping station.

Estimates on the Grindstone dam have varied from a low of \$4.8 million to over \$9 million. A design change from earthen to rolled and compacted concrete invalidated the \$4.8 million estimate, and the current proposal before the council is for \$7.8 million.

Since only \$6.2 million is currently available from the original \$8 million, this council has been unable to award a bid to continue constructing the dam.

Village manager Jim Hine explained that state law prohibits deficit spending, and the council is constrained from awarding a bid if funds to cover the total are not available.

Councillor Shaw, during Tuesday's meeting of the council, proposed that "a resolution be drafted calling for a special general obligation bond election in the amount of \$4 million to complete the entire Grindstone project and develop the (Sierra Blanca) well field."

Shaw opined that since the dam bids are so much higher than original estimates, the dam problem should be returned to the

## Dam meetings are set, public input is sought

As a result of an informal gathering of "concerned citizens" Thursday morning, the Ruidoso Village Council will have two special meetings to discuss the Grindstone Canyon dam, July 17 and 25.

According to Ruidoso Multiple Listing Service (MLS) president Greg Masters, Thursday's meeting was called after a village councillor told MLS that the town needed to have a public hearing about Grindstone. MLS president Greg Masters said Thursday's meeting was a forum for many groups, and not an MLS function.

The purpose of the meeting, Masters told approximately 45 peo-

ple at Sutphen's restaurant Thursday morning, was to join forces in urging the council to have a special meeting to hear all sides of the Grindstone dam issue.

Councillors Victor Alonso, Ray Dean Carpenter and Rick Evans joined representatives from MLS, Spirit of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Lodgers Association, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Altrusa, Sertoma, Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Board, Rotary and other groups.

Although moderator Masters attempted to "not discuss the issue" itself at Thursday's meeting, various aspects would not wait until the public council meetings desired by the group.

Councillor Evans told the group

he felt two public meetings are necessary—one to distribute information and one to "get down and dirty" with the pros and cons of the issue.

Evans said he felt that too many people formed opinions based on street rumors, which he said had distorted the facts. He suggested having engineers and other informed people at the hearing to distribute facts and answer questions.

According to Evans, the Grindstone issue is twofold, questioning if the dam will be built and how the village will finance the shortfall in funds. The village council recently voted to call for a general obliga-

## Cree Meadows may get new owners

Ownership of Cree Meadows Country Club will be decided Tuesday in a Carrizozo courtroom.

A Ruidoso group last week purchased redemption certificates from previous owner Delbert Townsend and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, and filed about 5 p.m. Friday, July 12, in Judge Richard Parsons' court in Carrizozo to exercise those redemption rights.

Johnny Durham Trustee for Cree Meadows Country Club, Inc., a non-profit corporation and a group composed of Johnny Durham, Ralph Petty, Ben Lanford Sr. and Sam Dazzo Sr., purchased the redemption rights "for a minimal fee."

Cree Meadows, in bankruptcy since October 1984, was sold at auction Friday, June 14. Moncor Bank, holder of the first mortgage, purchased the foreclosed property.

After a foreclosure auction, the

previous owner has the right to redeem the property until 30 days after the sale.

Moncor evidently didn't expect those redemption rights to be exercised, and sold the club July 1, to American Golf Corporation of Los Angeles, California.

That 30-day redemption period would have expired Sunday, July 14.

"Usually you have one more day if it falls on Sunday," Petty said Saturday. "We didn't take any chances," he added.

A hearing is scheduled at 10 a.m. Tuesday, July 16, in Carrizozo. Moncor Bank and American Golf Corporation will have the opportunity to "show cause" why operation of Cree Meadows should not be turned over to the corporation holding the redemption rights.

"The judge will determine whether all our redemption papers are in order," Durham explained. He doesn't foresee any problems.

"We have all our ducks in a row,"

he added. "We bought it with the intention of selling it to the membership," Petty said. "We want to protect it as a golf course."

"We took quite a gamble in thinking that the members will come through and purchase memberships," Durham said. "Our whole idea is that it ought to be locally owned."

American Golf took over operation of the golf course soon after purchasing the club. Petty said the fact that the new owners weren't honoring old memberships wasn't a major issue for local purchasers.

"We feel like the ownership should make policy decisions," Petty said.

"It did catch me somewhat by surprise," said James Atwood, president of Moncor Bank, when contacted Sunday.

"This is a matter for American Golf to address," Atwood noted. "It doesn't change anything for Moncor Bank."



## Straight Forward takes fifth win

Straight Forward made short work of nine horses in Sunday's Flying Charm Handicap at Ruidoso Downs, racing wire-to-wire under high-weighted Stuart Dolphus.

The \$12,325 Flying Charm was Straight Forward's fifth consecutive win this year, and his second stakes victory at Ruidoso this season.

Special Hank hooked up with My Going Jesse (5-1) in a race for second, trying to move on Straight Forward. But the duo put little pressure on the Lynn Lehmann trainee, who broke the tape three-quarter lengths ahead of runner-up My Going Jesse.

My Going Jesse battled Special Hank to the wire to prevail by a neck. Straight Forward's 45:56 clocking was a seasonal best. He rewarded his backers with mutuels of \$8.20, \$3.60 and \$2.60.

Owner Betty Shriever collected a winner's check of \$7,395. Straight Forward has now earned \$18,795

## Thats Incredible rockets to Saturday win

Veteran rider Leroy Coombs rated his mount to take advantage of a sizzling pace in Saturday's featured \$14,825 Jockey Club Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The stake highlighted a 12-race program that saw the mountain track's three-day Pic-Six carryover go to the wayside when one lucky fan held the only ticket with the winners of the fifth through tenth races. That ticket returned \$25,831.40.

Taking an assignment aboard 7-1 Thats Incredible, Coombs was well off the pace in the early going of the 7/8th mile showdown. Odds-on favorite Centre's Premiere led the 10-horse field through snappy fractions, going a half-mile in 45 4/5 seconds, and passing the three-quarter pole in 1:11 4/5 seconds - a tick off the track record.

Sherry's Ace and Trever Click pressed the pace through the backstretch. Challenge My Ego made a bold move into the final turn trading places with Trever

Click around the stretch turn. Centre's Premiere, Sherry's Ace and Challenge My Ego lined up coming out of the turn.

Coombs rocketed in front of the grandstand aboard Thats Incredible in the final 200 yards surprising almost everyone to win by a length, with Centre's Premiere holding on for second 2 1/4 lengths in front of Challenge My Ego.

Thats Incredible returned across-the-board payoffs of \$17, \$5.80 and \$4.20. The colt is owned by Forrest McAden of Millsap, Texas, and trained by LaVar Mower.

Centre's Premiere paid \$3.40 and \$3.20. Challenge My Ego's third was worth \$3.80.

In Saturday's co-featured Pocket Coin Handicap, Salustio Burgos brought Cesar T. in for a mild upset over favored Clever Deceit to collect \$5,730 first-place money.

ismissed at 8-1 in the wagering, Cesar T. joined forces with J.R. Johnson (5-2) tracking frontrunning Raise A Blaze to the stretch turn of the 5 1/2-furlong sprint.

Raise A Blaze tired in deep stretch as J.R. Johnson and Cesar T. drove for the wire, with Cesar T. pulling away to win by a length in 1:08.

The winner returned mutuels of \$18, \$6.20 and \$5.80. The colt is trained by Jimmie Claridge for Irvin de Cordova of Groesbeck, Texas.

J.R. Johnson finished a game second, three-quarter lengths ahead of Cloud Master, who closed strongly in the final furlong under Stuart Dolphus. J.R. Johnson paid \$3.60 and \$3.20. Pedro Benitez was aboard. Cloud Master's show was worth \$7.80.

Clever Deceit, the 6-5 favorite, was never in contention, finishing tenth in a dull effort.

Racing resumes on Sunday at Ruidoso Downs with the \$10,000-added Flying Charm Handicap, spotlighting both quarter horses and thoroughbreds at 870 yards. Racing gets under way at 1 p.m.

## Joe Martinez rides Kelly Crimson to victory

Jerry Rheudasil's Kelly Crimson showed the way past every pole to post a one-length margin in Thursday's allowance feature at Ruidoso Downs.

The sprint highlighted a 12-race program that saw the mountain track's Pic-Six carryover climb to \$3,543, as more than 3,100 fans were unable to select the winners of the fifth through tenth races.

Racing as the even-money favorite, Kelly Crimson went to the front of a nine-horse field in Thursday's 6-furlong main event, with 7-2 Lawton Prince and outsider Step Aside pressing the pace around the opening turn and through the backstretch.

Leading rider Joe Martinez attached Kelly Crimson to the rail for the shortest path around the oval. Lawton Prince raced just to the right of the leader, while Step Aside held the far outside path a quarter-length back. Gaelic Sam, dismissed at 9-1, saved ground on the rail directly behind Kelly Crimson to the final turn.

Jockey Carlos Rivas urged Gaelic Sam around the two pacesetters in the stretch turn as Step Aside faded from contention. It was a race for place between Lawton Prince and Gaelic Sam in front of the grandstand.

Kelly Crimson drove to a length victory to return \$4, \$3.40 and \$3. Rheudasil pocketed a winner's check of \$2,580. Edwin Hanna trains Kelly Crimson. Gaelic Sam was another length the best of Lawton Prince at the wire. The runner-up paid \$6.80 and \$3.80, while Lawton

Prince's third was worth \$3.40. Barbara Seville, the second choice at 5-2, raced an even fourth.

Three back-to-back allowance races highlight Friday's program. The main event brings out a strong band of 3- and 4- year-old thoroughbreds chasing a \$4,000 purse over 6 1/2 furlongs. In the co-featured 10th race, juveniles meet at 5 1/2 furlongs racing for a \$4,200 prize, and the ninth spotlights a full field of short-course specialists facing off at 400 yards. First post is 1 p.m.

# Trials set for championship classic

Futurity, derby and handicap champions take to the track Thursday at Ruidoso Downs, matching muscle for a chance at a \$100,000 grand prize in the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic.

The 12-race program features short-course veterans meeting in four quarter-mile trial divisions for the Championship Classic. Only the 10 fastest horses from 40 entrants will advance to the final on July 28. The 440-yard heats are slated as the fourth through seventh races.

Home Partner heads a full field of 3-year-old fillies in Thursday's feature, chasing a \$4,300 purse over 6 furlongs. Racing gets under way at 1 p.m. The moutain track's gates open at 11 a.m.

Several contenders for the classic could emerge from Thursday's sixth race, which brings out nationally-acclaimed runners On A High, Racy Roman, Meganette, Mr

Suspenders, Oh Snaz and Sgt Pepper Feature.

Racy Roman, 1984 Kansas Derby winner with earnings of more than \$250,000, last raced on June 29 going up against track-record holder Oh Snaz in a 400-yard allowance test.

Oh Snaz went into that dash off a strong accounting in the \$9,400 Mr. Kid Charge Handicap, where he was wire-to-wire in 19.83 seconds to set a new track record.

The Gordon Steinmiller trainee showed the same form against Racy Roman on June 29, making short work of the stakes winner with a one-length margin in 20.09 into a headwind.

Meganette makes her bid off a widening half-length score in the \$144,560 Rainbow Silver Cup on June 16. The victory was worth \$72,280 for the San Jose Cattle Co. of Pleasanton, Texas.

On A High, 1983 All American

Futurity winner, last raced in a trial division for the Rainbow Silver Cup, qualifying with a second to Mr Suspenders. But the horse was scratched from the final.

Sgt Pepper Feature was fourth to allowance company at 550 yards his last effort. The seven-year-old is listed 11th in all-time earnings for quarter horses (as of June 6), with a lifetime bankroll of \$896,408. On A High is eighth on that list at \$1,135,043.

Racing continues through Sunday at Ruidoso Downs. Saturday's program spotlights the \$100,211 Rainbow Futurity Consolation. Also carded for Saturday is the \$12,500-added Sierra Blanca Handicap at 6 1/2 furlongs. Sunday's topper is the \$586,170 Rainbow Futurity. The fastest horse over Ruidoso's 400-yard straightaway earns \$240,233.

## One orchard harvests a big cherry crop

Cherries. We do all kinds of things to those delicious little orbs. We marinate them and set them on fire. We can them. We candy them. We put them in pies, mash them into preserves and put them in ice cream. But one of the favorite ways to eat them is fresh off the tree, by the handful.

A local cherry orchard is having an extraordinary crop this year, said owners Leonard and June McCutcheon.

"As of today, we've pulled out 10,000 pounds of cherries," McCutcheon said. "Four to 5,000 are left to go, and of the 10, we've probably lost around two to three thousand pounds."

The crop is about eight times bigger than "anything we've ever had here before," he said. Generally, the volume of cherries the McCutcheons pull in is the same as they

are forced to throw away this year. "When we've got a crop this big, we have to cull anything that looks just a little bit bad," he said. Most of the lost fruit is the victim of handling, he added.

McCutcheon said that the last of his cherries should be picked by the end of this week. "The season lasts about two to three weeks after the start of the picking," he said. "By the time we're done, the cherries will be real ripe and won't last long unless they're cooked."

About half of what he has pulled out of the trees was sold to local markets and the other half is sold out of his garage. "It works out pretty well at about half and half," he said. Most of the people who buy directly from him learn of the cherries by word-of-mouth, he said.

The source of the bountiful cherries is a mystery to McCutcheon. "We thought we had lost our cherries this year," he said. "We got a cold snap and all the fruit just fell

off, little bitty things. Somehow, though, they survived a 16-degree morning and a 21-degree morning." In previous years, a good crop was considered to be around 2,000 or 3,000 pounds. "We were just picking what we were selling, then," he said.

"The cherries we cull are good for jams, jellies, juice and all different things. We've been trying out all sorts of things, but there's too much to keep up with," McCutcheon said.

And, for all of their efforts, the McCutcheons have not found a recipe for cherry cider. "I'd like to find a good recipe," he said. "Most places around here use concentrate or get it from Washington State." But the orchard does not stop

with cherries. Pears, the next in the seasonal line, appear in September.

"We've got a big pear crop coming on, too," McCutcheon said. "Not as big as the cherries, maybe, but pretty big. After that, in late September or early October, we get the apples. The apple crop is pretty weak this year."

"I guess you can't win 'em all." McCutcheon said the orchard, originally owned by his father-in-law, was planted in 1954 or 1955.

"We came here not too long after that. I can't remember the date, but we have a box in one of the bedrooms from a store in Greentree, New Mexico."

Greentree changed its name to Ruidoso Downs in the late 1950s or early 1960s, McCutcheon said.




innings. In Saturday's contest, Mario Portillo started on the mound for Ruidoso. Steve Dankert relieved him in the second inning.



## Collector journeys to Capitan

Bob Baldwin traveled 1,000 miles out of his way to visit the Smokey Bear Museum and Park in Capitan. Out-of-town visitors are not so unusual, said museum curator Willie Hobbs, but Baldwin has a special passion—bears.

Baldwin and his wife, Connie, and daughter, Jennie, from Fountain Valley, California, were among the 2,700 visitors at the museum during the first week of July.

"I couldn't wait to get here," Baldwin said. He showed Hobbs his collection of Smokey Bear souvenirs—pins, patches, cards and two of his Smokey dolls. Connie said her husband's Smokey Bear collection covered an 18-foot table at their home in Fountain Valley.

The Baldwin family has what they call a "bear passion." They belong to two national and international bear clubs and collect anything and everything that has to do with bears. Baldwin said they have only eight actual Smokey Bear dolls, but his wife said a bear of some type sits on every chair in their home.

Baldwin's passion for collecting Smokey souvenirs keeps him looking for whatever he doesn't have in his collection. Baldwin showed Hobbs a set of baseball cards printed by the Forest Service in California. The cards feature Smokey Bear and the San Diego Padres baseball team.

Hobbs said Baldwin had written an inquiry about the museum before coming to visit. Baldwin said he was so impressed with the information Hobbs sent him, he decided to visit the museum and park.

Baldwin satisfied his Smokey

Bear souvenir collecting passion as he purchased several items from the museum.

Baldwin admitted he has been a Smokey fan since childhood. "I was a junior ranger and I had a bear that I can't find now," Baldwin chuckled.

The Baldwins have returned to their home now, but left their names in the thick book at the museum.

Curator Hobbs proudly shows the many names in the visitors book. Since October 1984, visitors from 24 foreign countries have toured the museum, showing that Smokey's popularity has not faded.

The museum is open 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. every day. Located next to Capitan Village Hall, the museum is connected to the Smokey Bear State Park by a recently installed boardwalk.

## Hobbs to leave museum

Willie Hobbs has welcomed more than 200,000 visitors to the Smokey Bear Museum since she became curator in 1974. This year alone, visitors from 49 states and 24 countries visited the log cabin built more than 20 years ago by Capitan residents.

The museum houses a collection of original Smokey Bear pictures, posters and old souvenirs. Smokey Bear souvenirs are sold in the museum.

Hobbs will leave the museum August 15, when her lease contract expires. She came to the museum as a village employee under the federal CETA program. When the program expired, she was retained as a village employee.

Hobbs leased the museum in 1980 and began to expand the line of Smokey Bear souvenirs. She said the post cards, patches and hat pins were the most popular items of the more than 200 souvenirs offered for sale.

Hobbs and the museum were awarded a certificate of merit from then New Mexico Representative Mickey McGuire for helping make people aware of fire prevention. The award was given during the Smokey Bear Day celebration in 1984. During the time that Hobbs has been curator, the Museum won eight trophies for parade entries.

Hobbs said she will miss the museum and the many visitors. "I've enjoyed meeting so many nice people and so many people from foreign countries," Hobbs said.

tion bond election to raise funds for the completion of the dam.

"People may not vote against the dam, but against the tax increase," said Evans, adding that he felt "there are alternative methods of funding that can be pursued."

Councillor Alonso added some comments, claiming that Evans had not told the entire issue. To Alonso, Grindstone represents a "bigger picture: water."

"When Grindstone was planned, the city was desperate. Since then, the village council voted to develop other water sources," said Alonso.

Alonso said he was concerned with "the big picture" of solving Ruidoso's water needs. Alonso said that Sierra Blanca wells could produce drinkable water in six months, whereas production of Grindstone water would take another six years.

Alonso said he was torn between a legal and moral issue. He said that legally, the village could spend

the dam money on developing the field wells, but morally, he was "on the side" of the voters who had been promised the dam.

Realtor Barbara DiPaolo said she felt Ruidoso needed to store the effluent water from the Rio Ruidoso.

"History repeats itself. If we let this one (Grindstone Canyon) go, we might let another Bonito Lake get away," she said, adding that Alamogordo uses Bonito water.

Pat Breedlove, president of Spirit of Ruidoso, said a lake at Grindstone would provide another tourist attraction in Ruidoso. He also said he felt the council faced a "credibility problem."

"People won't vote to build a barbed-wire fence in Ruidoso," said Breedlove.

Everybody will have a chance to express and hear all sides of the issue at the special meetings. The first meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 17, at the Ruidoso High School Gymnasium. The second meeting is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Thursday, July 25, at Ruidoso Village Hall.

## Maddox becomes police investigator

Lanny Maddox, who joined the Ruidoso Police Department July 1, 1984, as a uniformed officer, was recently promoted to investigator.

Maddox is active in the 12th Judicial Law Enforcement Association.

Besides law enforcement organizations, Maddox is also involved in community activities. He is the newly elected president of

Ruidoso Sertoma, on the board of directors of the Lincoln County Mental Health Association and also of the Otero County Mental Health Association.

He is involved in the youth programs at St. Eleanor's Catholic Church.

He is a nationally certified instructor of martial arts and self-defense, and has taught a self-defense class for women. He plans to offer the class again, soon.


"It will be free and open to all," Maddox said.

## Tinnie Silver Dollar gets new owners, changes

The "food warriors" have come to the Tinnie Silver Dollar. A favorite steak house 30 miles east of Ruidoso on Highway 70 in Tinnie, the Silver Dollar has seen exciting new changes come with its recent sale.

Cynthia and Les Price, of Seattle, Washington, and Roswell-Artesia, and Jerrold Flores, formerly of San Francisco, California, formed the Tinnie Corporation to buy the Silver Dollar from Tom Denton on May 4.

Flores said the term "food warriors" describes their concepts about the restaurant business. Flores said the corporation believed the customers should be offered more than the usual steak-house fare.

Open from 5 to 10:30 p.m., the Silver Dollar continues to serve many of its traditional dinner dishes, such as steak, lobster and prawns. However, the new management is expanding the menu to include international cuisine.

New to the Silver Dollar is lunch, served from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. each day. According to Flores, customers have been delighted with

the luncheons.


Luncheon dishes include Mandarin grilled chicken salad (chicken breasts marinated in mandarin orange juice), beef bourguignon (a French dish featuring beef marinated in wine), albondigas (a meatball dish from Mexico), avocado salad-Argentina style and the Hondo Valley burger—a quarter pound of meat served with long green chile and cheese.

An addition to the Silver Dollar kitchen is the gelato-sorbe machine. Diners have their choice of freshly made, creamy-rich gelato or fresh-fruit sorbe, both frozen dessert dishes.

Flores said the Sunday lunch has been very successful. The Silver Dollar is not subject to restrictions of Sunday liquor sales and offers a full-service bar and wine list. Flores also said the full-service bar on the veranda will be available during lunch on the weekends.

Flores and manager Mark Raines have expanded the Silver Dollar wine list to include superior varietal California wines.

Cappuccino and espresso coffee, as well as fresh fruit daiquiris, are also available at the bar.

Flores' restaurant talents come from a family background in the food business. His mother, Inez Lucero, successfully ran the La Poblama restaurant in Capitan until 1940.

Flores grew up in San Francisco, where he was well known for his artistic abilities. He showed his oil paintings in numerous galleries before turning his artistic talents toward creating environments during his last years in California.

A family death brought him back to New Mexico. He said he liked it here so much that he stayed and opened the Hotel Chango restaurant in Capitan.

Creating environments still occupies much of Flores' time. As conceptual engineer, he is working with architects and the Prices to make the Tinnie Silver Dollar a part of a bed and breakfast complex. The Silver Dollar plans to coordinate with the Polo Club in San Patricio to create a place for the club members to stay.

Cynthia Price, president of the Tinnie Corporation and an artist herself, plans to open the Tinnie Mercantile Store as a gift shop. Flores plans to open the gallery, featuring artists from California, New York and Chicago, as well as local artists.

Many more changes will come to the Silver Dollar, Flores said. The main room, formerly known as the Red Room, still features the Murano stained-glass mosaic, taken from the bar of the old Mills Confectionery in El Paso, but has been re-painted and will be re-carpeted. The antique salad bars have been removed and will be used in the gallery and shop, Flores said.

Flores said many of the changes cannot be seen, such as plumbing and new electrical wiring. What

can be seen is much of the old flooring on the gazebo wing which has been replaced. Flores said the corporation is working toward a time when the wing can be used for open-air jazz and chamber concerts.

The old stone and adobe building saw its first customer in 1892, when the Tinnie Mercantile Company began operations as a general store and post office. In 1961, Tinnie Mercantile became the first in a chain of restaurants featuring fine food surrounded by fine art. John Meigs, New Mexico artist and designer who resides in San Patricio, was commissioned to restore the original building and to collect the furniture, art and stained glass.

Four stained-glass windows from an old El Paso Presbyterian church decorate an entire wall of the Crystal Room. Above the fireplace is an 1800s stained glass window from a San Francisco seafood restaurant.

The Victorian room was once the general store and post office. The room is scheduled to receive new wall finishes, and a new entry is being considered in the sitting-room between the Victorian room and the bar.

Flores said the formal lawns will be expanded to accommodate lunches, outdoor wedding receptions and croquet games.


Flores is the former chef of the Hotel Chango, which he still owns. Kathy Overly, former chef at the Atlantic Cafe in Dallas, now prepares the Central and South American and Southwestern cuisine at the Chango, Flores said.

For now, Flores is turning his energy toward creating an environment at the Silver Dollar—one that takes the customer back to the Victorian times with gracious decor and fine cuisine.

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE**—A grizzled old veteran of the political wars, who listens closely to New Mexicans as he travels the state, says he thinks he knows how our people are assessing blame.

"When they talk about the mess the state is in," he says, "they blame Tony Anaya most of all. In recent months, they put in second place for blame the Legislature—just the whole, undifferentiated Legislature, as a body. Recently they have added, in third place, Senator Les Houston as a villain whom they can mention—and hate—by name."

Just shows how discerning New Mexicans are. Those would be our picks too, and in just that order.

Comes now an absolute insider from behind the double doors in the Governor's suite to talk on "deep background"—which means that the name can't be mentioned and no quotes attributed to the person.

What is said turns out to be something like this: The Anaya administration may not be the smartest in the world, but it's not a dumb as McCaffrey says it is.

It didn't literally blow that last abortive legislative session by failing to have the votes needed to get action on an education bill, as this column has more or less directly accused it of doing. Instead, it had the votes on Thursday night before the session, but some of them evaporated between then and Saturday, when the legislators came to town.

Why didn't the votes stay hitched? Well, that, this source maintains, is something that ought to be blamed on the Democratic leadership in the Senate, where the defections occurred. That leadership, if what we are being told is true, is both too gentle and gentlemanly to bring even slight pressure to bear

on those we might expect to be Anaya supporters. By making no effort to hold what had been pledged, those "leaders" set up a situation in which the egg appeared to be solely on the Governor's face.

One mistake some of those now gearing up to run for high office make is to fail to understand how the human brain works. They expect some people to be utility players who can do anything.

No such luck. Such people are few and far between.

Those who are good at making political and other types of surveys, for instance, are almost always left-hemisphere-of-the-brain people. They are numbers-crunchers, whose lives are built around hard and fast facts.

That's fine as long as you keep them in their place.

That place is not involving themselves in the creative side of the campaign, which is almost totally a right-hemisphere-intuitive, "poetic"—activity.

Any campaign needs both types of people, but it's rare to find them in one body.

That's worth remembering when the candidates are hiring consultants, as most of them are at this time.

People who reach high office often find the position does not satisfy all their desires.

You can see something of that in Senator Les Houston, mentioned above. He is reputedly the most powerful man in the state Legislature at the moment and appears to relish that power. Yet you get clear signals that this alone is not what he has in mind.

More than a politician, Houston seems to want to be a guru.

## Editorial

A positive spirit of cooperation is usually a good step toward accomplishing a goal. Such a spirit is evident in the decision by Ruidoso Village Councillors and Lincoln County Commissioners to cooperatively accomplish improvements on Carrizo Creek and Gavilan Canyon roads.

The two county roads, long the victims of heavy traffic as major arterials, have been troublesome responsibilities of the financially pressed county and the thinly spread county Road Department. Efforts to complete the repaving of Gavilan Canyon Road have been repeatedly set back and patching efforts on poorly constructed Carrizo Creek Road last just until the next heavy rainshower.

But a joint-powers agreement discussed Tuesday could be a giant step toward solving the problem of the two roadways. The proposed solution is to use county funds and village equipment and personnel to effect a rebuild of Carrizo Creek Road and use village equipment and state Legislature direct appropriation funds to complete the paving of Gavilan Canyon Road.

Well-built roads are an asset to our community. Gavilan Canyon Road serves as a major route for through traffic, including large trucks, to bypass Midtown Ruidoso. Carrizo Creek Road is well-traveled by those visiting our community.

Let's be thankful that our officials have adopted a spirit of cooperation in the effort to accomplish these important projects.—DJP

## On the Village Beat with Darrell Pehr



The Seven Wonders of the World are listed as the Egyptian pyramids, the hanging gardens of Babylon, the Mausoleum at Halicarnassus, the temple of Artemis at Ephesus, the Colossus of Rhodes, the statue of Zeus by Phidias at Olympia and the Pharos or lighthouse at Alexandria.

A very impressive slate of the accomplishments of man across the world, but what do these wonders really mean to us Ruidosians?

Probably not very much. Among the many things to wonder about while living in Ruidoso, the topic of the Seven Wonders of the World undoubtedly doesn't come up very often.

"In my opinion, the hanging gardens of Babylon were not so much a wonder as they were a scientific marvel," would be an unlikely conversation to overhear while walking through the Midtown area.

Besides, all the Wonders of the World either don't even exist anymore, like the hanging gardens, or they're so far away—who cares?

Things here in Ruidoso are fairly wonderful, at least as wonderful to the people who live here as the Colossus of Rhodes was to the people who knew and loved it.

Maybe, if one looks very carefully, it could be determined that Ruidoso has wonders of its own.

I would say that four, maybe five, six at a long-shot, wonders are here in our very midst, and we don't even realize it!

The Four, Five or Maybe Six Wonders of Ruidoso could become a tourist attraction at least as wonderful as the Egyptian pyramids, don't you think so?

Possible candidates as Wonders could include the bridge over the Rio Ruidoso at Paradise Canyon Drive, possibly the most re-built bridge of its kind in the Northern

Hemisphere. When state money, allocated by the Legislature, provides for the complete replacement of the river crossing, the old bridge could be tugged out of its resting place and be displayed on the riverbank as a veteran of Ruidoso's many floods.

Another candidate could be the cliffs on Lookout Mountain. The view from the top of the cliffs under a beautiful blue sky of the village of Ruidoso is certainly a wonderful sight to experience.

Another wonder could be the roads in Ponderosa Heights. Those convoluted roads, twisting and turning through pine-studded hillsides, are an engineering marvel. If stretched out and laid end to end, the Ponderosa Heights roads would probably go all the way to Ojo Caliente and back. Well, maybe not that far.

Another candidate would be the Golf-Ball-Groping Gardens on the ninth hole at Cree Meadows golf course. The Gardens, an extremely mushy expanse of marshy grass across the middle of the fairway, is no doubt responsible for the loss of millions of golf balls. Legend has it that an unfortunate golfer who paused a little too long in the middle of the Gardens to contemplate his next shot sunk from sight in the mush and was never heard from again.

**The BOX SEAT**  
**A French Tour:**  
**on the road again**

Two million Frenchmen, women, children, their poodles and CBS will line the Paris streets on Sunday, July 21. They will be welcoming cyclists finishing a 2,519-mile, 24-day trek around their country. Within hours of the 72nd Tour de France's completion, the French economy should rebound from its customary 10 percent to 15 percent July dip, and newspapers such as Le Monde will return to reporting politics. The odds are also quite good that a Frenchman from Brittany will have been certified a legend, or his young American teammate will have become the most recognizable Yank on Parisian street corners since JFK.

Bernart Hinault and Greg LeMond both ride for the La View Claire bicycling team. Entering a 22-stage race like the Tour, a cyclist on a 10-man team normally knows who is the real meal ticket. On La View Claire, the situation these past 24 days has been somewhat unique. At 30, Hinault is a national treasure. At 24, LeMond is a world champion, and only the second American ever invited to the world's most prestigious two-wheeled race.

"LeMond joined the team with the promise that Hinault would help him out," explains Eric Heiden, once a gold medal-winning speed skater and now, among other things, a cycling analyst for CBS. "LeMond helped Hinault

win the Italian Tour in June. But Hinault has a chance of winning the Tour for the fifth time. And if he does, he will be considered equal to riders like Jacques Anquetil and Eddy Merckx."

The French Anquetil and the Belgian Merckx are the only riders to ever rule their sport the way Heiden did his. Only Heiden's domination crystallized with a one-week, five-gold medal performance in Lake Placid in 1980, after which he switched gears and began flexing his massive thighs for pedal-pumping purposes.

"Skaters use the same muscle groups as cyclists," says Heiden, "so they can be competitive right off the bat."

For years, however, it appeared that Heiden's 180-pound muscle-bound body and his five medals were too much for his bike frames to carry. But in Philadelphia this June he surprised his professional teammates as well as himself by winning the first and most expensive one-day road race in the world, the 156-mile U.S. Pro Cycling Championship. His decision to concentrate on road racing finally showed dividends.

"For me," Heiden says, "the essence of cycling is road racing. I enjoy point-to-point racing, or racing where you get to see the surroundings. I didn't want to race in circles anymore."







**Candid look at Boston Pops**

"The Classiest Juke-Box in the World: The Story of the Boston Pops," airing July 26 and 27 on the Arts & Entertainment Network, is considerably more than the sugar-coated celebratory documentary one would expect on the orchestra's 100th anniversary.

Both the current conductor, John Williams, and the associate conductor, Harry Ellis Dickson, speak candidly about Arthur Fiedler, the famous former conductor of the Boston Pops, and his legacy.

Fiedler is described as a man who combined dignity and devilishness. He was a musical anti-snob who carried humility into his private life as well. Each year, when he had a party for the orchestra, he went down to the store to pick up the 60 pounds of hot dogs himself.

On the other hand, he is described as honest to the point of tactlessness and lacking in warmth and sentiment. Says Dickson, "He loved the audience in bulk; individually, he didn't care too much for people."

But the great following he built for the Boston Pops is indisputable. Williams, who never met Fiedler or saw him work, discusses the differing opinions about whether a symphony orchestra should play popular tunes.

But even the skeptics will have to admit that it is exhilarating to see an

audience full of young teens clapping and kicking up their heels as they listen to the Boston Pops' rendition of "Flashdance."

**Mary Frann owes it all to the Junior Miss pageant**

Buried in the backwoods of television's Vermont lies what appears to be a pastoral inn. One finds within a deadpan innkeeper, a semi-senile handyman, a chambermaid who's also an heiress, a trio of country bumpkin brothers (two of whom are mute and named Daryl), and the innkeeper's wife, who is so gloriously beautiful she looks like a misplaced movie star. This is the setting for "Newhart," the sitcom built around comedian Bob Newhart, who plays innkeeper Dick Loudon.

That his wife, Joanna, is so gorgeous is no surprise, since she's played by Mary Frann, who's a former beauty and soap-opera queen.

"But comedy is really what I love," insists Miss Frann. "When I was 16, I used to do comedy and musical sketches in the Crystal Palace, which is a theater in my hometown of St. Louis. I'd stand backstage and watch Nichols and May and the Smothers Brothers and Phyllis Diller." At about the same time, Miss Frann entered and won the America's Junior Miss competition. The scholarship prize money sent her off to Northwestern University, where she studied drama.

"If it wasn't for Junior Miss, I would have never have had the money to go to Northwestern. I've been a judge in the pageant and I've hosted their state competitions. But this year, I co-hosted the national competition (held last month) and it was wonderful! They never had a woman co-host before, and I was happy to be a 'first.' And it was all on live television. I love the edge and the excitement of live TV."

After working as a local newswoman and doing live theater in New York, Miss Frann went to Hollywood, where she became known for her work on daytime soaps, such as "Days of Our Lives." "I was playing a gut-wrenching role on a nighttime soap, 'King's Crossing,' and two weeks after it was canceled, I got the role on 'Newhart.'" She says she loves the role of Joanna because "she has a sense of humor and she can see life's absurdities, just like I can." She also says she enjoys playing a character who has been safely married for a long stretch of time. Last year, Miss Frann was divorced after a ten-year marriage.

In the coming season, Miss Frann has asked the writers of "Newhart" to do an episode about her personal passion — aerobics. "I've been doing it for six years and I'm quite advanced," she says. "We have an instructor who comes to the set twice a week to lead a class. I think there's lots of humor inherent in all that jumping around."
