




Grindstone meeting informs large crowd

Fred Burns of Boyle Engineering told an audience of about 150 people Wednesday that "current water supplies are adequate to serve the folks that are here now."

Burns, principal engineer for the Grindstone Canyon dam project, speaking during a public meeting at Ruidoso High School, said water is a policy issue involving future growth.

Mayor George White and Village Councilors Victor Alonso, Ray Dean Carpenter, Rick Evans, Dub Holt and Jerry Shaw were among those present for the information gathering session on water resources.

The agenda listed four speakers, but citizens also had the opportunity to speak. White cautioned speakers to ask only relevant questions and avoid redundancy.

White explained that the meeting was not a public debate, but an opportunity to exchange information. He said a public meeting scheduled

for 6:30 p.m. Thursday, July 25, in the council chambers of Ruidoso Village Hall will serve as an opportunity for open debate.

Village attorney John Underwood opened the discussion by outlining village action on water issues since 1975. He said village water usage began outstripping production capabilities in 1975.

Water usage increased by 50 percent from 1975 to 1980. In 1976, a comprehensive plan was adopted in which raw water storage for Rio Ruidoso water was recommended.

In 1980, a water study committee began studying Perk Canyon, Flume Canyon and Grindstone Canyon as possible dam and storage facility sites. Perk and Flume canyons, both located on U.S. Forest Service land, were found to be undesirable.

Grindstone Canyon, besides being privately owned and apparently more easily acquired, also could receive water by gravity from the point of diversion from the Rio Ruidoso. The other two sites would have required pumping equipment.

The committee in January 1981 strongly recommended acquisition of water storage. They found that effluent credit was available if a raw water storage facility were to be built.

The point of diversion of the Rio Ruidoso was also changed.

Voters overwhelmingly approved a bond issue for water improvements in July 1982, and engineers were instructed to proceed. Boyle submitted the Grindstone plan in January 1983, and by July 1983 a contract was signed to purchase the Grindstone land from Dorman, Inc.

Protests had been filed against the Rio Ruidoso diversion, and progress on the dam was stalled until the protests were dissolved in February 1984. Engineers were again given the go-ahead.

New water sources were discovered in December 1984, and the village council pursued developing the Eagle Creek well field. Underwood stressed that money from the 1982 bond issue was never spent on the well project.

Engineers issued a call for bids on the Grindstone project in March 1985, but when bids exceeded funds available, the village council re-

quested design changes to cut costs. A second call for bids went out in July 1985, but bids were still too high.

The council has called for a \$4 million general obligation bond election to complete both projects, "and that's where we are," Underwood said, concluding.

Jack Atkins of Landfair-Atkins Engineering, project engineers for the Eagle Creek well field, took the floor after Underwood answered some questions. Atkins listed Ruidoso water rights that include surface rights and ground water rights as well as maximum effluent credit of 800 acre feet per year.

"I feel presently without developing the Eagle Creek well field the Village of Ruidoso will be facing water shortages by the 1990s," Atkins said.

Atkins told questioners that claims have been filed with the state engineer's office claiming 100 percent of the water in the Eagle Creek well field. He has had no official response, but feels Ruidoso has those rights.

Burns and fellow Boyle engineer Leroy Givens displayed facts and figures on several elaborate charts. A population chart, listing 1985

village population as 7,700, showed the population swelling to 12,600-20,500 in 2010.

Water usage, now averaging 1.62 million gallons a day, is estimated to hit 2.6 to 4.32 million gallons a day by 2010.

Boyle found the Rio Ruidoso to be the most reliable water resource, but Burns says the village must vigorously pursue ground water resources and provide a storage facility.

Burns and Givens explained that early cost estimates were prepared on an earthen dam, but soil testing at the site proved that plan to be impractical.

The roller-compacted concrete design was chosen over a rock-filled dam, even though costs were about the same, because it allows for an over-the-top spillway, Burns said.

Burns said he recommended awarding the contract for building Grindstone Canyon dam to the low bidder, Arco Materials.

Questioned on village payments to Boyle, Burns said his company has received \$382,375 from the village so far.

"We have not been paid for any work we have not done," Burns

said. Darrell Fowler, the village bonding agent, explained that New Mexico law allows municipalities to borrow money three ways.

One way is to issue general obligation bonds which must be approved by registered voters and result in a levy against all property within the village.

Cities may issue revenue bonds without an election. They are repaid from a revenue-producing source such as water or utility charges or gross receipts taxes.

Special assessment bonds may also be issued without an election and a levy for the cost of the project is made against the property affected.

"To get something started, in my opinion, it will necessitate a bond issue of some type," village manager Jim Hine said.

Discussion followed on public access to the proposed Grindstone Canyon dam. Mayor White said the developer has provided a park in the dam plans. Preliminary plans include public access and fishing.

More discussion will follow during the public forum at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, July 25, in Village Hall.

Art Festival set July 26-28

The festival kicks off at 4 p.m. Friday, July 26. It will be open until 9 that night, and from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Saturday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday. Admission is \$2 for adults, \$1 for children ages six to 12 and free for pre-schoolers. The

festival is sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Known for the fine quality and variety of work, the festival is a juried show with artists from nine states, from California to Tennessee.

This year's festival poster features Gordon Snidow's "The Kerosene Lamp." Posters are available at the chamber office, unsigned at \$10 each and a limited number of signed at \$50 each.

The festival features 17 different categories of fine works. Awards will be given for Best of Show and for the ten best booths.

Airport study accelerated, results due in January

A sense of "urgency" surrounding plans for a replacement for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport led Envirosphere project members to push forward the timetable for an environmental impact study (EIS).

Robert Lytle, project leader for the Golden, Colorado-based company, during a public briefing Tuesday told the audience of about 25 people that "considerable progress has been made on the EIS" since the first public briefing in March.

Envirosphere was awarded a contract by the FAA to complete an eight-month study on the potential impact of an airport on Fort Stanton Mesa. This, the second public briefing, is just one step in a series

of events leading up to a final published EIS.

According to the accelerated project schedule, a final EIS will be published in January 1986, rather than March 1986. The final EIS will be made available to the public before final airport plans are implemented.

In the meantime, Lytle and project members will continue investigations and analyses on proposed sites for a new airport.

Two sites on Fort Stanton mesa are being considered as possible locations for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, Site A and Site B. Jerry Trujillo of the Federal Aviation Administration in Albuquerque, told the small group Tues-

day that legislation introduced in the United States Senate by Senator Pete Domenici to effect transfer of Site B, if passed, would have little effect on the timetable.

"We're still required to do an environmental assessment," Trujillo said.

Lytle gave a rundown on studies Envirosphere has conducted in the categories of biological sciences, land use and archaeological and visual resources. He explained that the FAA has provided Envirosphere with several reports that have also been reviewed and included in the EIS draft.

Tuesday's hearing was designed to gain further input from the public, but the small group in atten-

dance had little to say.

When asked about a conflict between Site A and the Ruidoso landfill, Lytle replied that there definitely is a conflict, but that isn't an issue for Site B. "We're still studying both," Lytle added.

The present Ruidoso airport has been the site of 17 crash deaths in the past 20 years. That statistic alone, coupled with increased air traffic throughout the summer, makes the airport issue an urgent one.

Lytle said an EIS draft document will be available in mid October. Public comment on that document will be solicited in late October through December.

Youths to be charged with \$67,000 forest fire cost

Last Friday afternoon, fire blackened 35 acres of timber and brush one-half mile southwest of South Fork Campground near Bonito Lake in the Lincoln National Forest.

The fire started at approximately 2:30 p.m. by four juveniles playing in the area, Forest Service officials reported. The youths had made a warming fire and failed to suppress it properly, the officials said.

According to Bill Leonard, fire management officer for the Lincoln National Forest, the juveniles will be cited for allowing a fire to go out of control and may be charged with the fire suppression costs—approximately \$67,000.

Parents of the juveniles will receive a bill for the suppression costs. Leonard said the actual payments will be up to United States attorneys.

Patrols at the Mon Jeu Lookout Tower were the first to spot the fire.

With the aid of slurry (fire retardant) dropped from planes and local Forest Service crews, the fire was brought under control by 7 p.m. on Friday.

Crews worked around the clock throughout the weekend, containing and extinguishing the fire. Smokey Bear District forest ranger Steve Makowski said that two organized firefighting crews from Mescalero "did an outstanding job" in helping control the fire during the hot afternoon burning period.

"The quality and proximity

(Mescalero) of the crew helped us establish a control line during the hottest, driest part of the day," said Makowski.

Of the 35 acres involved in the blaze, half was completely destroyed and half received scattered damage.

Leonard said recent rainfalls have helped lower fire danger, but have not been heavy enough to make a big difference. Overall fire danger now in the Lincoln National Forest is moderate to high.

Cree Meadows is now under local ownership

In an open courtroom in Carrizozo Tuesday, a local corporation became the owners of Cree Meadows Country Club.

Ralph Petty, Johnny Durham, Ben Lanford Sr. and Sam Dazzo Sr. formed Johnny Durham Trustee for Cree Meadows Country Club, Incorporated, a non-profit corporation. The group purchased the redemption rights to the club last week.

Cree Meadows, which went bankrupt in October 1984, was sold to Moncor Bank (the lienholder) at a public auction on June 14. After a foreclosure sale, the previous owner has the right to redeem the property within 30 days after the sale.

American Golf Corporation of Los Angeles, California, purchased the club from Moncor on July 1, during that 30-day redemption period. Petty said that the court pro-

cedures were amicable with everyone agreeing to the takeover. Petty said the organization hired Norman Smith to manage the club, which opened under the new ownership Tuesday.

"We feel that Cree Meadows should remain a golf course and country club, owned locally," said Petty.

Petty said the corporation will approach a group of prior Cree members and offer to sell them the

club at cost. Petty said the corporation is hoping to have a membership meeting soon and have the members elect a board of directors to run the club.

"The members will be shareholders, so they'll be protected," said Petty.

Petty said that memberships under the previous owners were cancelled under the bankruptcy, but that the legal question is still under investigation.

Zoning Commission approves developments

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) approved commercial development plans on three major projects Monday during their regular meeting.

That approval paves the way for construction to begin on facilities for Wal-Mart, Firestone and Lincoln County Cablevision.

The commission approved development plans on Tract 1, Replat of Tract A, B, C, D and part of E, Pinecliff subdivision for Wal-Mart. That request had previously been tabled while Leroy Givens of Boyle Engineering reviewed drainage plans.

That drainage had also been a problem for C.S.D., Inc., requesting approval on Tract 2B, Pinecliff subdivision, for a Firestone building. The commission approved that request, too, after getting drainage approval from Givens.

Changes to plans submitted include a retaining wall, additional parking and moving canopy and pump islands. The commission approved the project with those changes.

Commercial development plans on a leased building to house Lincoln County Cablevision on Lots 23 and 24, Block 4, Wingfield subdivision, were approved with a commission request that additional landscaping and two additional parking places be provided.

Herb Finney, speaking for Finney-Danielson-Coulston, agreed to the additions.

In other business the commission:

—Denied a request to rezone from R-1 (residential) to C-1 (commercial) Lot 2, Block A, Navajo subdivision for Hitomi Greening, Commissioner Mike Callaghan, in moving to deny the request, said the lot is surrounded by residential developments and has no access.

Greening's husband spoke in favor of the request, citing proximity to commercial areas as a reason for approval. Half a dozen citizens were on hand to protest the change, fearing it would change the nature of the residential area.

—Denied a vacation of right of way adjacent to Lot 2, Block 4, Cherokee Addition subdivision for Ruby Massey. Commissioner Don Shaw, in voting to deny the request, said P&Z doesn't like to vacate rights of way.

—Approved commercial development plans for Lot 4A, Block 1, Cree Meadows Country Club subdivision for Greg Carey. The request was tabled at the July 1 meeting because of lack of documentation. Carey was commended Tuesday for addressing all the problems from the last meeting.

—Approved Phases 2 and 3 of Jira Plaza, lots 3A, 4 and 5A, Block 11, Cree Meadows Country Club subdivision for Bob Alexander. Master plans for the project were previously approved.

—Denied a continuation of a previously approved variance of the sign ordinance for Buck's All American Ford as requested by Keith Totten. The sign in question is 49 square feet over that allowed, and the one-year variance expired June 16.

Totten requested another year on

the variance, saying the company is planning to move.

"We gave them a year—how long does it take?" commented Callaghan in voting to deny the request.

—Observed that a member of the Ruidoso Village Council was not in attendance at the meeting. Becky Morris, village P&Z secretary, reported that Rick Evans was the councillor scheduled to attend and that he had been reminded.

—Discussed, upon an earlier request by Village Councillor Bill Karn, possibilities for a river walk in the Ruidoso Springs area. Commissioners decided to delay investigating such a possibility until the BRW comprehensive plan is adopted.

—Formed four subcommittees with two members each to review BRW proposals. Paul Davis, P&Z enforcement officer, warned com-


missioners that BRW will not be able to complete the comprehensive plan on time without immediate feedback.

—Heard commissioner H. Ray Bishop question the legality of outdoor displays, such as dresses hanging in front of shops. Davis reported that outdoor displays are permitted as long as they don't block line of sight or extend into the public right of way.

—Was asked by Davis their feelings on increasing the commission's size from seven to nine members. Members felt the present size is adequate.

—Heard Davis report that commissioners Greg Masters, Martin Rose and Reed Stirman, who were not in attendance, were excused.

The commission will meet again at 3 p.m. Monday, August 5, in Ruidoso Village Hall.

Paz gets promotion

Mark Paz of the Ruidoso Police Department is originally from Cleveland, Ohio. He says he came to Ruidoso by way of San Diego, California, "with about 20 stops in between."

Paz, a member of the department since 1983, was recently promoted to corporal.

Becoming a police officer was the last thing on his mind when Paz went to work for the village Water Department in 1981. Paz explained that a bad experience as a child had led him to dislike policemen.

"I avoided police officers," Paz said.

In spite of his aversion to police officers, and because of his deep concern for children and youth, Paz while a civilian was instrumental in forming the Police Athletic League. Wrestling and other athletic programs were offered.

"Back then there was nothing but soccer and us," Paz said. The League was serving close to 100 youth and making news all over the state. The police department was helping out, and Paz found himself working alongside members of the law enforcement community.

Paz said the department was a great help, and even though the league no longer actually runs athletic programs, the department continues to support youth programs. Since Sertoma basketball, Little League baseball and Little League football have been organized the league's function has changed.

Paz was so impressed with the officers he encountered working with

youth, that he said he changed his mind completely about law enforcement officers.

"These are all good people," Paz said. Chief Richard Swenor was the primary reason he decided to join the force.

Since he's been a patrolman, Paz has been active in Neighborhood Watch, Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD), Students Against Driving Drunk (SADD) and Crime Stoppers. He also serves as a training officer for the department.

While doing research for a new training manual, Paz recently visited 11 different police departments.

"I've never seen organization and administration like this one," he said. He attributes much of the excellence to good leadership.

Besides attending the state police academy, Paz, along with other local officers, participates in weekly training sessions.

"What probably helps the most is having officers you work with know what they're doing," Paz said.

Paz admits that his job is very stressful. "Exercise should help," he said, but he's not sure it really does.

Someday, he said, "I'd like to buy a big boat and sail around for about six months."

His hobby, in the meantime, is motorcycles. "Harleys, the only motorcycle," Paz said with a grin.

In his new role as corporal, Paz expects to continue to provide Ruidoso with excellent police protection.

Advertising committee ponders fall ad campaign

The new advertising committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce met for the first time Tuesday, under the direction of the new vice president in charge of promotion and advertising, Bill Hirschfeld.

Hirschfeld told the group that the meeting was an introductory session to gather input and ideas for advertising and promotion. Hirschfeld said he wanted to plan a two-year budget and advertising strategy.

The advertising committee plans to promote Ruidoso with money collected from lodgers' tax and matching funds from the state. Hirschfeld told the group that the budget for the current fiscal year (through June 30, 1986) includes \$105,000 in lodgers' tax funds and an undetermined amount from the state match.

Committee members shared ideas for upcoming advertising campaigns. Pat Breedlove suggested "Fall in love" for the autumn season. He proposed putting together a package with airlines, motels and car rental

companies.

"(We need to) bring the middle-class, upper-echelon person to Ruidoso—go after the high-dollar, upper-middle-class people," said Breedlove.

Budgie Green said Ruidoso needs to target new areas because the summer visitors are spending less money (in his and some other shops he has consulted) this year. Green said that Ruidoso has always counted on West Texas, a region that is now hurting economically.

Herb Brunell suggested that advertising and promotion focus on special events, such as the Ruidoso

Art Festival and the Aspen Festival.

Other ideas included emphasizing the coolness of Ruidoso in the summer (as in this year's Texas campaign) and the beauty and romance of Ruidoso in the fall.

The committee next will meet at 2 p.m. Monday, July 21, at the Swiss Chalet Inn.



Governments announce bank totals

Village of Ruidoso and Lincoln County officials reported Wednesday that they feel their public funds deposited in Moncor Bank are adequately safeguarded.

Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine said the village has worked out an agreement with Moncor in which the bank has made security pledges for 70 percent of village funds deposited there. Hine noted that state law only requires security pledges for 50 percent of deposited public funds.

The village has \$921,800 deposited with Moncor, \$3,561,659 deposited with Ruidoso State Bank, \$2,714,433 with Bank of Ruidoso, \$85,000 with Pioneer Savings & Trust and \$100,000 with First Federal Savings Bank of New Mexico, Hine reported.

Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox said she feels county funds deposited with Moncor are completely secure.

The county has \$1,276,000 deposited with Moncor, \$876,000 deposited with Ruidoso State Bank, \$253,000 with United New Mexico Bank and \$300,000 with Bank of Ruidoso.

Public visits Trinity site

In July 1945, a handful of scientists joined two pieces of plutonium and exploded the first atomic bomb in the New Mexico desert, thereby ushering in a new age for the world.

In July 1985, White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) personnel opened the Trinity Site, where the bomb exploded, and the George McDonald Ranch House, where the scientists lived while assembling the bomb.

WSMR officials opened the site at 9 a.m. Wednesday and closed it at 2 p.m. Officials there estimated 400 people had come to view Ground Zero and the ranch house at noon, but expected about 200 to 300 more by the time gates closed.




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



Catholics have oldest village church

Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Capitan is the oldest Christian congregation in the village. The mission began in 1930, after the original building was constructed.

Long-time Sacred Heart members recall times when the group met for Mass in the adobe building that was located on Fifth Street. Toni Otero recalled that Father Salvatori, who originally came from Italy, served the area missions—Capitan and Lincoln—from Santa Rita Parish in Carrizozo during the 1930s.

"The church was an odd shape," said Otero "like a fish, with adobe walls. It was quite small. It seated maybe 70 people at the most. It was beautiful." The old adobe church was vacated when the new block building on Third Street was

completed in 1950. "The old building was condemned because the adobe walls had cracks in them," Otero said. "But then it stood for several years before it was demolished, and it did not fall on anyone," she added.

Ceil Annaratone of Capitan also recalled that she attended Mass at the old building about "once a month." She said her family would often attend church at Fort Stanton because Mass was said there every Sunday.

When the new building was completed in 1950, the Sacred Heart Parish purchased new altars and statues with parishioner donations.

The parish expanded in 1982 when the members donated materials and labor to construct the parish hall onto the back of the existing church. Father Dave Berg, the parish priest at the time, was instrumental in organizing the project.

Berg was parish priest until February of this year, when Father Ed Griffith came from the Truth or Consequences Mission to take over the Santa Rita-Sacred Heart Mission. Berg transferred to Saint Eleanor's Church in Ruidoso and continues to say Mass at the Fort Stanton and Lincoln missions.

Sacred Heart sponsors the Catholic Youth Organization and other religious classes during the fall and winter months. The Sacred Heart Women's Society meets at 10 a.m. on the last Thursday of each month at the parish hall. The parish council meets at 7 p.m. the first Thursday of each month, also at the parish hall.

Mass is said every Sunday at 9 a.m. at Sacred Heart Church, which is located on the corner of Third and White Oaks streets in Capitan.

July forest fires hit Capitans

Lightning played havoc in the tinder-dry Lincoln National Forest recently. Crews from Arizona and New Mexico, including nine Forest Service smoke-jumpers from Silver City, extinguished three fires in early July.

Lincoln National Forest ranger Tom Guck said the smoke-jumpers assisted with a 25-acre fire in Pierce Canyon, on the south side of

the Capitan Mountains, July 5. Guck said this was the first time in the history of the Lincoln National Forest that smoke-jumpers have assisted with fire operations.

Guck said the rough terrain kept the ground crews from reaching a hot spot on the mountain above the main fire. The jumpers were called to extinguish the spot to prevent it from spreading to the main fire.

On July 7, the extra ground crews put out a 14-acre fire on the Patos Mountains, north of Carrizo Peak,

and a 5-acre fire on Carrizo peak.

The Lincoln National Forest fire crews were short-handed, since the entire Ruidoso hot-shot crew was fighting the fires in California when the local fires began.

Guck said visitors and residents should be aware that conditions in the forests and grasslands are extremely dry, despite the recent light rains. Extra care should be taken while camping or passing through the areas.

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Ono art work still at Sheriff's office

The rough sketch of Yoko Ono, confiscated early this year at the site of a Lincoln County drug raid, is still in the possession of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

Lincoln County Undersheriff Charlie Cox reported in March 1985 that the abstract drawing, signed by former Beatle John Lennon, was valued at \$1.4 million. As plans were being made to return the artwork to Ono, its authenticity was

questioned.

The drawing was hanging in the Bonito-area home of Gary and Rhonda Covington when they were arrested in a drug raid. The two didn't offer any information as to how they acquired it, said Cox, but they voluntarily relinquished possession.

The Covington's attorney later contacted the Sheriff's office, and stated that the drawing was a print,

not the original.

Two art experts, hired by the Sheriff's Office, have examined the drawing, and pronounced it to be authentic.

Ono and Lennon were between flights at Dallas-Fort Worth Airport in 1980 when the picture was lost or stolen.

He said his office will retain custody of the sketch until it can be returned to Ono.

"The most we got to keep someone in jail was \$200 for Rick Henson," Kemp said. "The track paid to keep him in an extra hour." She said that although most people were surprised when arrested, everyone was "a real good sport." "One of the cutest things we did was jailing five of the jockeys' wives," she said. "I went with one of the Ruidoso Downs police officers and got them out of the Turf Club."

Kemp said she plans to "shoot for at least \$25,000 next year," and added that jailing the track people on the first day might bring in more cash. Before this year's Jail-A-Thon, Kemp said the most money raised for the American Cancer Society in Lincoln County was \$800 at the Longest Day of Golf last year. "I'm real pleased with everybody's help and participation in the Jail-A-Thon," Kemp said.

SATURDAY-My Best Talent looks like the one to catch in the \$100,212 Rainbow Futurity Consolation, featuring the second-fastest horses from final time-trial eliminations held two weeks ago.

Saturday's main event spotlights some of the region's top veteran thoroughbreds in the \$12,500-added Sierra Blanca Handicap, for 3-year-olds and up at 6 1/2 furlongs.

Nominations closed last week for the stake and racing Secretary Harold Payne has put top weight on Southwest champion runner Curribot at 126 pounds.

SUNDAY-The middle jewel of the Triple Crown is decided as the 10 survivors from two rounds of trials meet in the \$586,170 Rainbow Futurity. The fastest horse over Ruidoso Downs' 400-yard straightaway earns \$240,234.

Curriobot favorite in feature race

Charismatic Curriobot takes another heavy assignment in Saturday's featured Sierra Blanca Handicap at Ruidoso Downs, spotting seven pounds to handicap star Scots Sissy in the 6 1/2-furlong stake.

Complementing the main event in the co-featured 10th race is the \$100,000 Rainbow Futurity Consolation. The fastest quarter horse down the mountain track's straightaway earns more than \$20,000. First post is 1 p.m. Gates open at 11 a.m.

Since taking up residency in the Southwest, Curriobot has devastated competition, garnering champion honors and setting track records almost every year.

The son of 1974 Preakness and Belmont Stakes winner Little Current earned \$63,580 last year, collecting the winner's share in six of

15 races. He opened his '85 campaign with three straight scores at Albuquerque, accounting for the inaugural and Albuquerque Handicaps for purse money of more than \$45,000.

Trainer Doyal Roberts Sr. shipped his charge to Sunland Park for the May 4 Sunland Park Handicap, where he romped to a two-length margin collecting \$13,470 from the \$22,000 gross purse.

Since that score, Curriobot has raced three times at Santa Fe. His first start found the Pennsylvania-bred beaten 9 1/2 lengths going 6 1/2 furlongs. Stretching out to a mile, Curriobot again was back 5 1/2 lengths. He finally managed a narrow victory at 1 1/16th miles on July 4 toting 126 pounds.

Scots Sissy heads into the \$12,500-added Sierra Blanca off a

dull effort in the \$17,250 Governor's Handicap on June 30 at Ruidoso. The Bob Arnett trainee tried to close in the stretch turn of that 7/8th mile test, but tired at the top of the lane to finish sixth.

Scots Sissy entered the Governor's off eight straight races where he was no worse than third. On June 16, the son of Native John cruised to a 1 1/4-length win in the \$13,350 Mescalero Apache Handicap. He was second to Code's Draconic in the Winsham Lad Handicap at Sunland last December, and raced to a half-length margin in the E.T. Springer Handicap at Albuquerque in October.

Five of the remaining Sierra Blanca entrants met in the Governor's Handicap. Wordsworth came from well back in a stunning stretch drive to capture second three-quarter lengths back of winner Copper Case.

Makum Trimble was two lengths back of Wordsworth for third. The Lewis Germany conditioned son of True Balcony was second to Curriobot in the Sunland Park Handicap in May, and has hit the board for 10 straight races.

Fill Mackis Cup will seek to improve off his fourth in the Governor's 'Cap. The stakes champion set all of the pace to deep stretch before fading in the final furlong. Trainer Bill Leach will be trying to boost the Kentucky-bred's lifetime earnings past the quarter-million dollar mark.

Rounding out the field for Saturday's featured Sierra Blanca Handicap are: Flint Fire, a James Havens trainee who's faced Curriobot on several occasions; The Girl I Love, the only filly in the field and most recently fourth to Queen Elect in the \$11,500 First Lady Handicap; and Release The Wind, off a sharp three-quarter length win over \$25,000 platers at Saturday's distance.

The weekend's racing action is topped on Sunday as the 10 survivors from two rounds of trials meet in the \$586,000 Rainbow Futurity. The fastest horse down the mountain track's 400-yard straightaway earns more than \$240,000.

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

With his frontrunning ability, Be My Partner is sure to press the pace against Bulverde. The Bob Arnett conditioned son of Staff Writer duelled with Bulverde throughout the Mescalero for runner-up money, crossing the wire three-quarter lengths back for third. 

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

Hoofbeats

JOCKEY JOE MARTINEZ is running away with the riding title at Ruidoso Downs. After 37 race days, Martinez has ridden 43 winners, which is 18 more than runner-up Jacky Martin, and Martinez leads defending champion Mike Lidberg by 29 wins with only 33 racing days remaining.

Martinez won the riding crown at Ruidoso in 1980 and 1983, and was second in 1984 when Lidberg caught him in the last week to win the title 53-52.

At his present pace, Martinez would ride in the neighborhood of 80 winners. The last rider to score 80 wins in a season was Carlos Rivas, who booted 84 home in 1977. Rivas also won 90 races in 1976. Jockey Larry Byers rode 90 winners in 1971, but accepted 486 mounts to do so.

Martinez would accept approximately 350 mounts for the season if he continues at his current pace and avoids injury, and it appears as if an injury would be the only thing that could prevent the 24-year-old rider from capturing his third Ruidoso Downs jockey title.

SEASONAL BESTS AT TWO distances were established over the weekend.

On Saturday, Bennie Wester's Reverend Blu Jeans downed a strong field of \$15,000 claimers over six furlongs in 1:12, just two-fifths of a second off the track record for three-quarters of a mile shared by three horses.

Reverend Blu Jeans has now won five races in 1985, and has been third or better in 16 of his last 19 starts. Bobby Willis trains the 6-year-old Nebraska-bred, and Arturo Vallejo was in the saddle.

On Sunday, 4-year-old quarter horse Straight Forward won the 870-yard Flying Charm Handicap in 45.56 seconds to eclipse Gaelic Prince's previous seasonal best of 45.67. The track record for the distance is 44.74, set by Fine Loom in 1971.

Straight Forward has now won five races in a row, including two stakes, for owner Betty Schriewer of New Braunfels, Texas. Lynn Lehmann is the trainer and Stuart Dolphus did the riding.

Joe Martinez rode nine winners over the four-day weekend at Ruidoso Downs to easily win recognition as the jockey of the week.

Trainer Jimmie Claridge saddled three winners during the same period, including Pocket Coin Handicap winner Cesar T., to win the trainer of the week honors.

Martinez began his week with three wins on Thursday, when he accounted for the ninth, tenth and eleventh races in succession. He

came back with three more on Friday, then doubled on Saturday. He accepted only four mounts on Sunday, but still managed to win one and finish second twice.

For the week, Martinez had 26 mounts, with nine wins, three seconds and four thirds, and he now leads Jacky Martin by 18 winners with the season now past the half-way point. Martinez has visited the winner's circle 43 times this summer.

Martin is still in second with 25 wins to his credit, while another quarter horse specialist, Alex Baldillez Jr., is third with 23.

For trainer Claridge, the Pocket Coin win on Saturday capped a week which saw him climb into a tie for sixth in the standings. Claridge now has sent out 12 winners and is tied with Don Farris. They trail season-long leader Bill Leach by 14 wins.

Claridge is the son of trainer Brooks Claridge, who is also enjoying a fine meet. The younger Claridge won the \$9,550 Pocket Coin with Cesar T., and Brooks Claridge was second with J.R. Johnson. Thomas Riley also sent out three winners for the week. Claridge won the trainer of the week award by virtue of a better winning percentage. He started seven horses; Riley started eight.

Down at the Sentinel Ranch here was a large print handsomely framed, three feet by two feet eight inches, one of her father's most beloved paintings.

It shows the Wyeth children playing on the sands of the ocean beach on a day when the sky was filled with many-colored floating clouds. The children, during a lull in their play, are looking up into the sky at the immense figure of a giant—tall as the sky, club over his shoulder—plainly made out amongst the flying colored clouds.

In the picture from left to right are cousin Ralph Sergeant, Henriette, sister Ann, brother Andrew Wyeth, brother Nathaniel C. Wyeth, and sister Carolyn.

This family treasure is a tribute to a fond friend of the Wyeth children, William C. Ender, who spent many hours telling them wonderful stories.


N.C. Wyeth was commissioned to paint the picture by the Quaker College of West Town, Pennsylvania, where Mr. Ender went to school.

The title of the picture is "The Giant"; and in this masterpiece, N.C. Wyeth rose to his full height as a painter.

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

The danger of fire in the forest is ever present. Even though it may seem sometimes that the danger is diminished, it can suddenly become a real threat.

Such was the case last week when 35 acres of forest near the Bonito Lake South Fork Campground were scorched after a warming fire got out of control.

Although the forest in this area has seen a heavier than normal winter snowfall and fairly frequent spring and early summer rainfalls, the forest is still very susceptible to the danger of fire. Forest Service officials point out that recent rainfalls have been spotty, leaving some areas still very dry.

So susceptible are some forest areas that 35 acres of this valuable and beautiful resource were destroyed in a few short hours, even though the fire was spotted early and the best firefighting efforts of the Forest Service were brought to bear on the early stages of the blaze.

Four young people have been identified as the careless keepers of the warming fire, and Forest Service officials report that they may be charged with the cost of the firefighting effort—about \$67,000.

So mistakes in the forest are costly. Don't let recent rainfalls fool you, the forest is always a place where fire is a danger. Let's all remember to protect that fragile resource of ours—the forest.—DJP

DEAR EDITOR:
THE GREAT RUIDOSO RAID
Imagine yourself at an annual private party in a private home. It is the Fourth of July weekend. There are over 100 people in attendance, 90 percent over 40 years of age. These people are from all walks of life—doctors, lawyers, politicians, real estate investors, horsemen, retired couples, etc. You have just finished eating dinner which had been catered by a private club in Ruidoso.

After dinner, people break up into small groups, either talking, drinking or playing various games. Some ladies are playing gin rummy for one cent a point, \$1 a game. A man and woman are playing pool for 25 cents a game. Six women are playing blackjack with chips and their husbands and boyfriends are observing. A few older men are playing poker with chips (they play together at each other's homes every weekend). In another location, various people are shooting

dice on a homemade dice table for minimum amounts (\$1 to \$5).

At approximately 10 p.m., various groups are laughing, telling jokes and having a good time. Visualize, if you will, the Keystone Kops arriving. A crash is heard as one policeman hits a glass door with his head. Another officer thinks to open the door before entering, does so and the two officers race into the room, Elliott Ness close behind, gray suit on and walkie-talkie in hand. The words, "Stay where you are, this is a raid," are heard at full volume.

Now enters the following cast of characters: two FBI agents, state troopers and Ruidoso police equipped with bullet-proof vests, sawed-off shotgun, walkie-talkies and a video camera. The shotgun was shortly returned to the police car when it was discovered the ladies were not going to shoot because

their gin game was disturbed.

The FBI agent in charge was asked if he had a federal warrant to which he replied that he did not. When asked why he was interrupting a private party, he replied that it was a gambling raid. When asked why the federal government was interested in gambling, he replied that it was interstate transportation of gambling paraphernalia. He pointed to a table leaning against the wall and was told that the table had been made by a Ruidoso man, in fact, the same man that was so graciously parking cars for the guests at the party. Then he changed the story. It is now a drug raid. The police then began the process of searching everyone. When police were asked what they were searching for, they said "weapons."

Granted, some of the elderly ladies playing gin are pretty tough, but I have never known them to arm themselves before a gin game.

They may though after the local police. The female police officer, searching the ladies, failed to look in anyone's handbag—the logical place to carry a weapon if you are female and so inclined to do so. Meanwhile, the man and woman continue their pool game but we don't know who won the quarter or if the quarter was confiscated.

When law enforcement people failed to turn up anything in their search, they seemed quite perplexed—like the kid caught with his hand in the cookie jar—and there are not even any cookies in there.

The man in charge of the local police stated that he had a search warrant which had been taken out on information from an anonymous tipster that drugs were involved in the party. From personal observation of the three previous annual parties, I have never seen, smelled or encountered anyone using any drugs other than alcohol, usually abundantly consumed as it is gratis.

Since some of the more prominent people of Ruidoso objected strongly to this disruption of a quiet and enjoyable lawn party, they were arrested. The 100 or so remaining people wanted to be arrested also but they forgot the school buses to transport them to jail. The only crime that I personally observed was the interruption by the police causing all of the excellent food to have to go to waste.

The crowd made the best of the situation and after being searched and told to go home, many went to the Win, Place and Show rather than follow orders.

In all seriousness, if there were suspicion of an international drug ring operating in the midst of a party of over 100 people (in itself, rather far-fetched), why didn't police send one plainclothes officer to attend the party, let the parking attendant park his car, have a cocktail, eat a nice meal, look around and if anything is out of line,

use the telephone to call the proper authorities. This would be much more discreet than 20 law enforcement officers intruding into a private home in the manner of Hitler's storm troopers followed by the Gestapo. What would have happened, if at this time, someone would have walked away with the Ruidoso bank?

The bodysearch of the elderly ladies must have been embarrassing and degrading. Most handled it like the ladies that they are.

Ninety percent of the visitors who come to Ruidoso do so for relaxation and recreation—horse racing, skiing, golfing, etc. At any gathering of people, especially with 150 or 200 people, a means of entertainment will be found and most of the time it is some form of gambling, whether it be for 25 cents, \$1 or \$100. When you remove these various forms of relaxation and recreation, all you have left in Ruidoso is the cool pines. I, for one, wouldn't spend five hours looking at a cool pine and I am sure many others feel the same way.

There were people attending this party who traveled over 1,000 miles to visit with friends and relatives and attend this party every year. The minor gambling which occurred at this party, and does at many other parties, was head-to-head gambling. If your police spend all their time breaking up gin games and gin tournaments, pool games and pool tournaments, poker games and poker parties, etc., the amount of break-ins to private homes and cabins would probably double or triple due to lack of protection by your local police. The break-ins in the Ruidoso area are already among the highest in the nation per population. Some of the finest people in the U.S. reside in Ruidoso the entire year. Their tax money is being wasted by trivia such as this and could be put to better use.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Our Governor flew off to Texas to learn it in a few brief hours: "All You Ever Wanted To Know About How To Change an Educational System but Were Afraid To Ask."

One of the major messages is that you can't do it quickly.

Yet Toney Anaya, kinetic personality, hopes to come up with his reform proposals "within the next 10 days" and have them adopted in about six months.

If our ambitious and hard-driving Governor missed that essential point in his conversations with Governor Mark White and the Texas Board of Education, it's possible to likely he fails to appreciate other conclusions to which a study of the Texas plan leads.

—You have to sell a plan to the public—which means you have to listen to the public first. Anaya has never done that. His only major contacts on the subject were extravaganzas designed with the prime aim of stroking his ego before introduction of his first abortive educational improvement plan in 1984. Legislators don't plan to listen now in their committees on which only lawmakers serve.

—You have to get involvement from the business community. Mark White credits much of the success in selling his proposals to Ross Perot, an extraordinary man of extraordinary wealth, who took on the project as a crusade. Is it likely Anaya or Les Houston can enroll the New Mexico analogue to Perot now to push plans he has had no hand in shaping? (In Texas, Anaya said he "now wishes he had included prominent businessmen in his earlier reform efforts. He plans to ask New Mexico business leaders to support his school improvement plans." Good luck.)

—There is not the slightest possibility of any major modification for the better in the state's educational system without a sizeable tax increase, which must therefore be thoroughly understood as essential and almost requested by the majority of New Mexico citizens. Such a change in the mind of the public is not likely to be brought about by a Legislature

most of whose members prevailed on voters to elect them by promising mistakenly that taxes would not rise. Nor is it likely to be effected by a Governor whose views and wishes are considered almost totally irrelevant by the majority of New Mexicans.

—You don't get all this done by issuing executive orders and then standing back. Each step takes time, time, time. Anaya and the legislators, by their quibbling and squabbling away of six months of the current year, have painted themselves into a corner. They hunger to come up with a major success on this topic for 1986, but they didn't leave themselves enough margin.

—New Mexico isn't Texas, nor are the conditions which prevailed there when Governor White began his push the ones which prevail here today.

Hey, almost everybody agrees we have a deep and continuing education problem in our state. Nobody who believes that wants to do anything but solve the problem. But the process can't be turned into some big hero act to make politicians look good.

If we approach it that way—which is exactly what is going on at present—the job will never be satisfactorily done.

Are we coming around again in staffing the office of Governor Anaya?

Sally Rodgers, who started out as one of those "policy aides" (remember those?) in the original Anaya hierarchy and then resigned to campaign for her husband Max Coll, is now back in the Governor's suite on a part-time basis.

Those who consider her a proponent of the protect-the-environment-at-any-cost movement will now expect Anaya to resume writing those long and heavy letters to the federal government about the dangers of the WIPP project.

Another school of thought has it that she actually dampens down and attempts to make realistic some of the more outlandish ideas Anaya comes up with.

Either way, she's back on the job.

That's not the case for many women and children, though.

Home for some families is a battleground, a place of fear and pain. I learned a lot about that as a volunteer for Women's Protective Services (WPS) in Lubbock, Texas, and later for the Transnational Living Center (TLC) in El Paso, Texas.

As a volunteer in Lubbock, I learned that many women are beaten regularly by their husbands or companions. I also learned that these battered women often had no place to go, and no trusted person with whom to share their pain.

I was lucky enough to receive training as a volunteer with WPS, to serve as a telephone volunteer from 12 to 24 hours a week and to be on the board of that organization when a shelter was put into operation.

In El Paso I answered the telephone hot-line, and spent some time visiting with women and children living in the TLC. Family problems in El Paso were not any different than those in Lubbock.

Living in Ruidoso, "the most enchanting part of the land of enchantment," it's easy to forget that family violence is occurring here, too. After all, even though many of us work and live here, Ruidoso is a resort town, a place to come and have fun.

While in Ruidoso Municipal Judge John Cupp's office the other day, he mentioned a rash of family violence cases in the village lately. I can't avoid talking about it any longer. It's time to admit it—family violence occurs in Ruidoso, too.

That problem has no respect for the peaceful serenity of mountain retreats and vacation resorts; it's as prevalent here as it is in Lubbock and El Paso.

"I'm calling from a phone booth; I don't know what to do," was not an unusual beginning for a telephone call to WPS or to TLC. I came to expect those calls, and was alert to find out if the caller had an immediate need.

Sometimes the need was for medical attention, often the need was for protection and quite often the caller just wanted to talk, and hear perhaps that there are alternatives to being battered.

That brings me to my purpose in writing this column. Open discussion of family violence is the first step to combatting it.

We have to admit that women are being beaten, and by so doing, provide an atmosphere in which they can speak up and look for alternatives to a life of fear and pain. Children suffer, too, whether they are physically abused or witnesses to violence and mental abuse.

While Ruidoso has no "safe home" or shelter, there are places that victims of family violence may call for information.

The Counseling Center is open from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. weekdays, and will provide information and referrals to those who call 257-5038. After office hours, Ruidosans may call the Alamogordo hot-line, 437-8680, collect. Those calls are referred to the counselor on call.

The Alamogordo women's shelter, 437-COPE, will also accept collect calls.

Local women who find that they must leave their homes to be safe are referred to a shelter in Alamogordo, Roswell or Albuquerque. Knowing that they will have to leave not only their home, but their hometown, makes a decision to seek safety even more traumatic for women in crisis.

Isn't it time Ruidoso addressed the problem locally? Perhaps there isn't a need for a shelter in the village, but wouldn't a network of "safe homes" be possible?

Ruidoso, let's wake up and take care of our own.

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















