Anaya pledges airport support

The new airport should be in operation by early 1987, Governor Toney Anaya told more than 200 people at the 1985 membership meeting and annual banquet of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce at Carrizo Lodge Thursday night.

Anaya told the audience that the new airport is one commitment on which he intends to follow through. When the issue was before the New Mexico State University (NMSU) Board of Regents, Anaya said he based his board appointments on the applicants' feelings about the new airport.

"Some may question that approach, but I don't apologize," said Anaya, of his technique for "getting things done."

Anaya said he wanted to do "what's right for the state ... set aside personal agendas and move forward."

The governor said the new airport will be an economic shot in the arm to the economy of Ruidoso and the state.

"Economic development is our banner and salvation in the state," said Anaya.

Anaya said that Lincoln County contributes a lot to the economy of the state, and that he wanted to return funds to this area. One million dollars in state aviation funds are reserved for the new air-

port, and if additional funds are required, the governor said he would "attempt to assure that also comes about."

Celebration of the new airport was the focus of the banquet. Under the theme "Fly High, Ruidoso," the chamber staff decorated the Studio Lounge at Carrizo Lodge with pictures of planes and airplane accessories.

U.S. Senator Pete Domenici sent a video tape with his regards to the chamber and Ruidoso.

"Ruidoso will see an end to the terrible problems with the current airport," said Domenici on the tape.

James Halligan, NMSU president, said the location of the new airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa was a "tough, gut-wrenching issue," which he was pleased to have behind him. Halligan said he felt the airport would bring the community of Ruidoso and the university closer together.

"We're interested in the development of New Mexico and Ruidoso," said Halligan.

Fred Heckman, chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, said that Ruidoso has more than 600,000 tourists yearly and collects \$15 million in state taxes.

Heckman said that with the present facilities, Ruidoso is "the home of the most dangerous airport." Ruidoso also is known as "the place you can't get to" and "the ski area in the desert," he

added. Heckman gave a brief history of the airport commission and thanked Anaya for his support of the new airport.

Anaya also discussed other ways in which the state has helped Ruidoso. Anaya mentioned the cooperative (matching funds) advertising program and the state aid to the feasibility study of the proposed Swiss cogwheel railroad. Anaya said the study was expensive, but if the railroad is feasible, it would provide a "tremendous return."

With almost 18 months left to serve as governor, Anaya said he does not intend to stagnate.

"Too often, people abandon an administration at the tail end and things get lax," said Anaya. To avoid this occurrence, the governor said he will take new initiatives in advertising and foreign trade missions.

Anaya said he planned a "buy New Mexico" campaign to encourage in-state shopping and vacationing. He also hired a new film commission director and encouraged that trade.

"You obviously have tremendous, untapped potential for movie making in this part of the state," he told the Ruidoso group.

Anaya said that education will be a "watchword" during the next few months, as he sees it as the most important issue facing New Mexico today. Anaya said that companies

want to locate their businesses where there is a good educational system.

Anaya commended the chamber on their upcoming program of work. He told the businesspeople he is optimistic about Ruidoso's future. The governor said that even though the Ruidoso economy is "flat," it is doing fairly well, considering the slump in the West Texas economy.

Ruidoso Mayor George White presented the governor with a proclamation of Toney Anaya Day, for all the help that Anaya has given Ruidoso.

Outgoing chamber president James Paxton gave a review of the past chamber year. He prefaced his talk by comparing it to a football coach explaining a five-and-five season to the team's owners.

Paxton highlighted the chamber's accomplishments, including success with the Art and Aspen festivals, initiating the Business After Hours and the Ruidoso Valley Greeters and finding a new executive director, John Jeffers.

Paxton said the All American Pro Ski Race was a "learning experience," and that the "goods outweighed the bads" with the event (which lost \$20,000 for the chamber).

At the close of the meeting, Sue Snidow presented the HN' ZHU' NE' Award to the Bank of Ruidoso and The Gazebo Shopping Center.

Anaya voices concerns

The Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School eventually could be forced to close down due to lack of funds, Governor Toney Anaya said in an interview with The Ruidoso News Friday.

Anaya said that he is committed to keeping the institution open, but that "it's just a question of how long we can keep up the battle if we continue with a conservative legislature in the human services area."

Anaya said he was distressed by the closure of 11 welfare offices, including one in Carrizozo, during the past few weeks.

Anaya said that Camp Sierra Blanca does not face any imminent danger of closing.

"Anyone wanting to close that down, would need good arguments when they see me," he said, adding that he'd rather see the correctional facility improve than close down.

Education is Anaya's main priority, something he felt got "shortchanged" in past legislative sessions.

"Overall, we have to look for additional resources. This year has been the most brutal, especially in the area of lost personnel (due to finances)," said Anaya.

The governor said he felt that teachers should be more accountable, but should be remunerated for their efforts.

His education reform ideas include higher education and public schools. He described his higher education ideas as "an extremely far-reaching reform package." Anaya said he'd like to see all branch colleges become communi-

ty colleges, with local boards of directors and additional resources. The governor said he'd like the state universities to become stronger research facilities.

Anaya addressed concerns over teacher competency in the public schools. He said he felt that standards should be high, with periodic exams and close supervision. However, he would not choose to abolish the tenure system unless it were replaced with a good system of due process.

The governor said he felt the public-elected state Board of Education should merge with the state Office of Education. Anaya said that the current two-office system is inadequate because "nobody is accountable."

Anaya recently met with Texas Governor Mark White to discuss education. Anaya said that Texas expects to have success with their newly appointed (not elected) Board of Education.

Anaya said he felt his situation was similar to White's, as White was defeated the first time he tried to make his educational reforms in Texas.

Although he has not traveled to this part of the state often, Anaya said he had not traveled state-wide much at all this year. He said he would attempt to visit somewhere in the state at least once a week.

Anaya said he has enjoyed public service, despite some "frustrating battles." He said he hopes to continue in public life after his term expires in December 1986, but does not intend to run for another office in the foreseeable future. The governor said he would like to continue with economic development as a private citizen.

Police seize marijuana

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office seized more than 300 marijuana plants in two raids this weekend, according to sheriff's reports.

Ten department officers, with the aid of New Mexico State Police and Forest Service officers, seized 167 plants in the White Oaks area Friday, said Sheriff Tom Sullivan.

Ken Crenshaw, 38, and Pam Nicodemus, 27, both of White Oaks, were taken into custody at Crenshaw's family residence in White Oaks, according to police. District Judge Richard Parsons set bail at \$250,000 Friday afternoon, sheriff's reports said.

Sullivan said the well-concealed plants were growing in buckets on Crenshaw's property and on United States Forest Service land. Sullivan said the department had received a tip about the plants, which led officers to begin surveillance of the area.

The department also seized 183 plants at a Nogal residence Saturday, police said. Arrested and taken into custody was Tim Braze, 28, of Nogal, according to sheriff's reports. Parsons set bail at \$250,000 on Saturday afternoon, police said. Two other persons were charged but had not been taken into custody by Sunday, Undersheriff Charlie Cox said.

Cox said the Nogal raid was a result of routine helicopter surveillance. The department is actively engaged in a cooperative agreement with the Forest Service of eradication of marijuana growing on Forest Service land, Cox said.

Cox said department officers will strip the plants and weigh them. He said the department expects to obtain a destruction order from the judge to destroy the remaining part of the plants. The stripped foliage will be weighed, photographed and used as evidence in court, Cox said.

Cox said Parsons is scheduled to arraign Crenshaw and Nicodemus Monday in Carrizozo.

Council members explain stands on dam

Ruidoso village councillors and Mayor George White have had the opportunity to vote on issues surrounding the Grindstone Canyon dam project several times lately.

Voting "yes" might mean "no" or voting "no" might mean "yes." In efforts to clarify their positions on some issues, five councillors and the Mayor were asked the following questions Friday. (Councillor Bill Karn was out of the village.)

The first question asked was: **WHY DID YOU VOTE THE WAY YOU DID ON THE \$1.2 MILLION REVENUE BOND PROPOSAL?**

Victor Alonso, who voted "no," replied: "I believe that the \$1.2 million is not a just vote because it hides the fact that it only completes the dam, it doesn't complete the project; it's misleading."

Ray Dean Carpenter, who made the \$1.2 million revenue bonds proposal, replied: "I favored it—I feel like that's the method to go to finish the project. It would be cheaper for the general public than the general

obligation bonds, and I have the figures to prove it."

Rick Evans, who voted "yes," replied: "I felt like a vote for the revenue bonds was a vote to go on with the project. We have enough money in cash flow over the next five to seven years to complete both water development projects at the same time."

Dub Holt, who voted "no," replied: "I think the whole bond issue should go before the people. The only way to do that is to go the general obligation route."

Jerry Shaw, who voted "no," replied: "The reason I voted against that was because with the facts that we had at the time it just wasn't enough. I felt that it was a band-aid."

White, who broke the tie by casting a "no" vote, replied: "I felt as though it wasn't the council's business to be asking for more money for the dam."

The second question asked was: **WHY DID YOU VOTE THE WAY YOU DID ON THE \$4 MILLION GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND PROPOSAL?**

Alonso (voting yes): "I believe that's the balance left on the project. The people voted the \$8 million, but it's going to take \$4 million more. How do they feel about it?"

Carpenter (voting no): "I don't favor general obligation bonds at all when they will raise property taxes."

Evans (voting no): "I see it as an extension of the effort to kill the project. People will be given the opportunity to vote, but it's not a pure question. People will oppose higher property taxes, even if they don't oppose the dam."

Holt (voting yes): "I want to take it before the people. That's always been my whole concept. Why be afraid to take it to a vote? The will of the people ought to be heard."

Shaw (making the proposal): "I voted for it for two reasons. First, we had \$6.2 million left, the \$8 million project had become a \$12 million one and it looked as though it was going to take that much. Second, I felt the public should vote on it."

White (breaking the tie with a "yes" vote): "So that we could get the dam built."

The third question asked was: **WHAT IS YOUR OWN POSITION ON THE \$4 MILLION GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND ELECTION—HOW WILL YOU VOTE WHEN IT GOES BEFORE THE VOTERS?**

Alonso: "I'm going to vote yes." Carpenter: "I am adamantly opposed to it. I will fight it."

Evans: "I do not support that method of financing the dam."

Holt: "I would in all likelihood vote for it."

Shaw: "I will vote for the general obligation bonds because I can't see any other way to finance."

White: "I would have to do some soul searching." (The Mayor declined to answer whether he will vote for or against the measure, but reiterated his continued opposition to the Grindstone Canyon dam.)

Councillors, all having expressed a desire to hear from the people, will do just that during a public meeting at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, July 25, in the council chambers at Village Hall. The meeting will be a public forum on water issues.



seconds to establish a new track record. Jack Dube trains the colt for Wichita Land and Cattle Co. and Jack Fletcher of Simonton, Texas, who collected \$240,968 for the Rainbow victory.

Brigand Silk finds pot of gold

Brigand Silk blew to a 1 1/4-length victory in the \$588,000 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs on Sunday, stepping the fastest 400-yard clocking in the 39-year history of the mountain track.

The grey colt went postward as the odds-on favorite to collect a winner's check of \$240,968 after establishing a new track record in final time trials for the Rainbow two weeks ago. The Jack Dube trainee stopped the timer in 19.50 seconds that day.

Regular rider Jacky Martin trimmed that benchmark considerably on Sunday. Brigand Silk rocketed out of the gates to an early one-

length lead on the field, gaining with each stride to post a widening 1 1/4-length win in 19.37 seconds - a new 400-yard track record and the second-fastest time recorded in history of racing.

Quarterhorse specialist Alex Baldillez Jr. brought 13-1 Six Popper in for runner-up money of \$110,157. And Sixaru, the 4-1 second choice for the Grade I dash, finished another half-length back for the third and \$56,455.

Brigand Silk now stands undefeated from six lifetime races. Owners Wichita Land & Cattle Co. and Jack Fletcher have earned

\$250,930 for the colt's efforts. Brigand Silk is nominated to the \$2.53 million All American Futurity, which offers a winner's purse of \$1 million. First-round eliminations for that stake are scheduled August 7, with final time trials on August 21. The final will be run on Labor Day.

Ruidoso's Pic-Six carryover pool was busted on Sunday when one ticket had the winners of the fifth through tenth races to return \$43,328. Racing resumes at Ruidoso Downs on Thursday, with 12-race programs scheduled through Sunday.

Fill Mackis Cup takes Sierra Blanca Handicap

Mack Yates' Fill Mackis Cup, reunited with rider Joe Martinez, narrowly won the \$14,750 Sierra Blanca Handicap on July 20 at Ruidoso Downs, and snapped a seven-race losing streak in the process.

Fill Mackis Cup was voted Horse of the Meet here in 1984 when he won three stakes and also established a new track record for seven furlongs (1:24 2/5) in an allowance race in mid-July. One of his three stakes triumphs came in the Sierra

Blanca, when he defeated Scots Sissy and Curribot.

Fill Mackis Cup and Martinez duplicated that trick in '85, as Scots Sissy and Curribot were two of the eight left behind as Fill Mackis Cup got to the finish a nose in front of 11-1 outsider Release The Wind. Another 2 1/4 lengths back in third was 60-1 shot Flint Fire.

Fill Mackis Cup's owner, Mack Yates, lives in Cherokee, Texas, and campaigns a large stable of horses here.

Martinez winner on Home Partner

Preston Farms' Home Partner drove to a daylight victory in Thursday's feature race at Ruidoso Downs, while the field for the \$107,000 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic was set from four trial divisions on the 12-race program.

Leading rider Joe Martinez rated Home Partner through the first five furlongs of Thursday's three-quarter mile allowance headliner, taking the even-money favorite around horses in the final turn and storming down the lane for a two-

length margin in 1:14 3/5.

Sandpiper, pegged at 7-1 by 3,700 fans in attendance, raced forwardly from the break under Mike Lidberg to lead the field through the backstretch, with outsiders Bueno Iris (29-1) and Lady Rounder (20-1) stalking the leader for the entire trip.

The fourth through seventh races on Thursday's program ran as 440-yard trial divisions for the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic scheduled for July 28.

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Heavenly favorite in Rio Grande trials

Sharp quarter-horse filly Heavenly heads a field of short-course specialists in Thursday's 400-yard headliner at Ruidoso Downs. Also slated for the 12-race program are three trial divisions for the \$60,000 Rio Grande Futurity.

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Trailbuilders reshape forest pathways

Imagine five Easterners and one El Pasoan volunteering to help rebuild deteriorating horse trails in the Lincoln National Forest.

Guy Moffat, Marybess Skaletsky, Eric Smalley, Phil Baram, Chip McIntosh and Nancy Yellin, all either students or workers in what they call "sedentary jobs," spent two weeks below South Forks campgrounds, rebuilding trails and living in the forest, as part of the Appalachian Mountain Club's program to restore trails in the forest areas of the country.

Moffat, a veteran trailbuilder in the East, came to the Lincoln National Forest after his three years of "professional" trailbuilding were used in New Hampshire. "I came from a professional trail crew. Back in New Hampshire, we would go into the woods for a week at a time, carry all our gear, food and tools on our backs. We'd take in 30- to 90-pound loads," he said.

Eastern trails are built exclusively for hikers and backpackers, not for horses, he said.

"I had been leading pro crews for three years," he said. "The whole thing about trailbuilding is this: we live in rags, we smell a lot and we have a real good time. I like the wood work—felling trees, chopping trees. I also like the rock work—moving huge rock to use as steps. I like to be able to see my accomplishments right away. It's a lot of hard work, but it's fun."

As the leader of this group, Moffat said he likes to start early. "We're up at 7 and start work by 8:30," he said. "We usually quit around 4:30 and go on hikes after dinner, like on the ridge to watch the deer and the sunset."

Moffat said he was not working the other volunteers too hard. "It really depends on who you ask," he said.

Moffat, an engineering student during the school year, has two other jobs to do this summer. The first is in Utah and the second in Wyoming. "I like staying in shape."

Marybess Skaletsky, a 19-year-old factory worker from Rhode Island, said she read about the job in Parade Magazine. "I had to do something with my summer," she said, dimpling.

"It's a little harder than I thought but it's worth it," she said. "I really like the challenge."

Like most of the volunteers, she says she will probably sign up next year. "Everything's really good—being outdoors, the camping. I drove through New Mexico once, but until now, I've never stayed. I really like it."

Skaletsky lives with her parents. "They thought it was a good idea for me to come out," she said. "They helped with a lot of the travel plans but I paid for it all myself. I'd say that if anybody likes hard work and the outdoors, they should do this—it's great."

Eric Smalley of El Paso is the lone Westerner in the group and, just before his junior year in high school, the youngest volunteer.

"I read about it in Parade Magazine, too," he said. "My parents loved it, they even paid for me to come out here. I'm ready to get back, but I'd do it again. I like being out in the forest." He said the first thing he wants to do when he gets home is to learn how to drive.

Phil Baram, 46, is the executive director of the Israel Cultural Institute in Boston. "This is my vacation. Last year I did volunteer work for the army in Israel. This is like garden work to the nth degree—a lot of bending and lifting."

Baram said he was surprised by the difference between a horse trail and a hiking trail. "We're making the trails safe for horses. We have to be a lot more careful to make the path wider and remove all the rocks. Eastern trails, which are not built for horses, are much more rugged."

He said he was also surprised by the greenery in the mountains. "They remind me very much of Vermont and New Hampshire. It's just lovely."

He said he would "probably do it again, but next time in the Boston-Blue Hills area. Between the work and the forest and the corny jokes, it's been a nice experience."

Chip McIntosh, a geology student when he is not repairing trails, is, like Moffat, an "old hand" at trailbuilding. "I applied for the job because I wanted to spend my summer working outside," he said. "I'd worked on a crew before in the Catskills of New York and I volunteered last year in Wyoming. I said, 'more!' and got teamed up with Guy. We got this group together."

McIntosh will go with Moffat to Utah and Wyoming later this summer. "It's been demanding work and long hours," he said.

"Sometimes it makes you realize the simpler things in life. Most of these people are not doing manual labor all the time and they see the feeling of accomplishment when you know what has to be done and the best technique to do it."

McIntosh said the fact that the volunteers used hand tools exclusively was noteworthy. "It's all by hand. Of course, using a chainsaw or something would be easier in some ways, it would be hard to get the thing up here."

"I've spent some time hiking the adjoining area," he said. "I've never really been in southern New Mexico before."

Of the trail work here, McIntosh said he liked the group. "It's a little different here. In New England trail work the people were younger, almost all male, a real young psych. Here we are more people oriented and are trying to enjoy

ourselves. It's been an experience for me, getting to know different people and work with some who are twice my age."

Nancy Yellin, 37, a school administrator who formerly worked with emotionally disturbed adolescents in Massachusetts, said this was her first attempt at physical labor.

"It's different than anything I've ever done. It's a good way to get rid of a lot of stress, meet new people and get rid of the city stuff. It's been a challenge to me and I've proved to myself that I can do some physical labor."

She said she was afraid of hiking with a full backpack when she had to do it, but overcame the fear. "I've never successfully hiked with a full pack before. I did it and found that it wasn't a painful experience after all."

"We understand each other's job," she said. Pfeffer has taken advantage of


educational opportunities within the department. Besides attending the state police academy and in-service training sessions, she has attended several seminars at the academy designed especially for policewomen.

She currently serves as a training officer for the department. Part of that job entails riding with new officers.


Corporal Pfeffer will have added supervisory duties, but wants to maintain her basic role as an officer on the street.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Speeches sometimes give us a glimpse into the private parts of the speaker's mind.

Take that keynote speech at last year's Democratic national convention. It was pure Mario Cuomo; and when, if, was over, we may have known more about the man and what he values than he meant us to.

That's probably true also of the address Governor Toney Anaya gave to the annual convention of Jesse Jackson's PUSH organization in Memphis last week. Copies of the text, made available to the media at home, tell us things about our man and how his mind works that go beyond the words he said.

What we have here is Anaya as he truly is—a sincere man, somewhat buffeted by his months in office, who still would like to be some kind of crusader for the people in our country who have tough lives.

That's the laudable side of his character; but the man, like the speech, is uneven, fragmentary and inconsistent. He wants to stir us to see the vision he sees, but his manner of doing it is so unstructured that it never builds to any satisfactory conclusion.

Does that sound like his record in office?

In this speech, we find some new gleanings. Anaya has become much less strident than he was when he began his term. He can even apparently sympathize, at least a little, with problems faced by Ronald Reagan, a man he used to delight in tongue-lashing at every opportunity (including one when Anaya was outside the country.) Now he seems to be less purely partisan, even before this audience, which probably was nothing but partisan.

And as usual, Anaya's speech is

sprinkled with sharp observations about the state of affairs today—for instance, the points he makes about the officially poor in our country now being more white than black or Hispanic, and the rate at which poverty is encroaching on white families. That, needed saying, and, this audience probably needed to hear it.

The trouble is, these insights stand isolated and unconnected in his discourse; he doesn't really take them anywhere. In what was evidently meant to be a major summary of what Toney Anaya is all about, we end up perceiving him only as a collection of unrelated enthusiasms, like a space capsule moving across the solar system in a series of bursts of small-rocket power that remains essentially directionless.

If you are looking for evidence to suggest what the last 17 months in office are going to be like, that may be it. This is a man of intermittent enthusiasms, most of which do not last long, and we might as well accept it. We have never before had a governor in office whose emotional temperature was so closely watched by his staff and so wide in its effects on his conduct of state business.

As these words are written, he's up, but maybe by the time you read them he will be down again. Whichever he is, he seems to take all his administration with him.

We know, for instance, that he still wants to be remembered for his contributions to improving the health of the state's economy. But his off-again-on-again efforts in that regard, one moment involving himself too deeply in affairs of the agency entrusted with that assignment and the next distancing

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himself from the projects entirely, make accomplishment difficult and unlikely.

That situation won't get better during the closing days of his term. Any governor will tell you that last year, while the electorate is distracted by a statewide primary and a general election, is not the time in which you make your mark on history. If it's not done by then, it's not likely to get done, especially if experience has not taught the chief executive how to smooth out his act and build consistent forward momentum.

It looks like Toney, no matter how emotionally moved by the good will

bubbling up inside him, is not the man to change the course of New Mexico history. He wanted to, but suffered from two serious problems: He didn't understand how the system really works when he started, and he failed to learn much from his experiences.

There will be good spots between now and the end of 1986, brief periods in which the sun will shine on Anaya's efforts, but they will be interspersed through long stretches in which the man's influence on government outside his diminishing official family will be all but nonexistent.

Who wants to stay home all the time, especially on the weekends? Heck, not me!

See the countryside, meet new people, support the petroleum industry, seek out new worlds and new civilizations, boldly go where no man has gone before—this weekend, why not take a road trip!

Road trips are those journeys, often by automobile, from one place to another. Going from home to the grocery store doesn't count, road trips are more of an excursion, a quest to go somewhere new and maybe see something different. A typical road trip would be from, say, your house to somewhere different and new at least 100 miles away.

Even if you live 100 miles from the nearest grocery store, it still doesn't count—unless the grocery store is new and different, like if it has the new "voice" cash registers as they do in the big city. Hearing "change, 30 cents" coming from a small black box at the check-out line is certainly worth driving 100 miles or so to experience.

When preparing for a road trip, a decision has to be made whether to take the kids, leave them with the sitter or have them placed in a state of suspended animation and shipped by truck to your destination.

One consumer tip—if you go the suspended animation route, make sure you go with a reliable trucking company, one that offers "full replacement value protection."

Of packing, when you have to enlist the entire weight of the family to get the trunk closed, it is full. A key element to the success of the road trip is an adequate supply of good sunglasses. Proper sunglasses for all members of the family who make the trip can really set a Hawaiian-holiday-in-the-tropics sort of mood, even if you're traveling in the dead of winter between snow-covered Feaststeek, Montana, and Boardumm, North Dakota.

Entertainment while you drive, especially if it is to be a long trip, is vital. Hours of staring at the center yellow line without outside stimuli of some sort can lead to a hypnotic state that is undesirable on major interstates.

Music is a good choice for enter-

tainment. Checkers, Nerf football and frisbee golf tend to be distracting to the driver, so are not strongly recommended.

Another way to avoid the danger of becoming tired and maybe even sleepy while you drive is the use of stimulants. Caffeine works pretty well, the problem comes in the choice. New Coke, old Coke, Pepsi—who can make such a difficult, controversial selection? Do you want to be traditional, daring or a supporter of the "other brand?" It's a tough decision for each of us to face.

One way to enjoy the trip even more is to travel on highways that are under construction. The pretty orange signs and orange-striped barrels can spark hours of stimulating conversation among passengers and driver.



Does the call of the open road appeal to you? Do you wish to experience the thrill of cactus candy and imitation Indian jewelry at a billboard-strewn roadside establishment? Does all this sound like a lot of fun? Well, it is. So why sit at home all the time when you can have some real adventure—on a road trip!

Influenza a danger to tots

A vaccine for a potentially deadly disease is now available from local doctors.

Dr. Arlene Brown, a family practitioner, said the new hemophilus influenza vaccine has been in her office for about a month. Hemophilus influenza spreads rapidly among children and can lead to meningitis and death.

"A kid who has it is contagious about three to four days before he gets sick," Brown said. It is recommended that children as young as 18 months who attend day care centers get the vaccine for this reason, she said.

"Adults seem to be not as susceptible," Brown said. "Kids are a big

risk because of the meningitis, and it's the meningitis that kills them."

About five percent of the children who get the disease die. Other complications include diseases of the throat, infections of the skin that can lead to loss of limbs, infections of the heart and pneumonia.

More than 60,000 doses of the vaccine have been administered with only one serious reaction, Brown said.

She added that parents with children between 18 months and two years should make an appointment to get the vaccination as soon as possible.

Immunization against polio, measles and rubella is also required. Children will receive a series of four doses of DPT, three doses of polio vaccine and one com-

bined vaccination against measles, mumps and rubella. Although included in the vaccine, mumps shots are not required for admission to school.

The Ruidoso Field Health Office offers immunization clinics each Monday from 8:30 a.m. to noon and from 1-2 p.m. Children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.

But the players who don't play football will participate in off-season programs in preparation for the high school competitive season.





Lincoln Pageant corporation leases Wortley

The Lincoln Pageant and Festival Corporation, at the invitation of New Mexico State Monuments, has assumed the lease of the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln. According to corporation vice president Glen Dennis, the membership voted to take the lease

about three weeks ago. Dennis said the lease has since been approved by the state Museum Board of Regents. It now is subject to a public hearing before the New Mexico Board of Finance, July 30, in Santa Fe. The corporation's lease, at \$50 a month, will run for 36 months with a renewal option. The corporation is non-profit,

organized four years ago as a means to purchase grounds and operate the Lincoln pageant. Its membership and officers are Lincoln area residents. Dennis said the Wortley is "very important to the little community of Lincoln." The Wortley provides the only food and lodging services within the town. Lincoln draws the largest

crowds of all the state monuments, Dennis said. The corporation plans to run the Wortley as a business. Managerial plans will begin after the hearing in Santa Fe. Presently the Wortley Hotel is in the final stages of renovation.

Planning and zoning reviews ordinance

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) approved a subdivision variance and reviewed a proposed condominium regulation during the commission meeting Thursday night in Carrizozo.

Gene Duvall, developer of the Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates subdivision, met with P&Z to review the construction plans on the water and sewer lines for the subdivision, as requested by county manager Suzanne Cox.

The plans were approved by the Environmental Improvement Division. P&Z approved the recommendation to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners that the roads within Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates be used for sewer and water lines.

Duvall also requested that P&Z discuss a variance for the non-conforming cul-de-sacs in his subdivision. After considerable discussion, P&Z recommended that the county commissioners grant a variance for the cul-de-sacs in Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates subdivision.

Duvall previously had sought a variance but was denied because the turn-arounds were too far from

conforming to the 100-foot requirement.

Duvall said he was unable to widen the cul-de-sacs to 100 feet because underground electrical lines already were installed, with above-ground pedestals, within the platted roadway. Duvall said that Otero County Electric Co-op had placed the lines without consulting him.

P&Z member Betty Shreengost said the conformity problem arose from inadequate inspections by a former county engineer. The subdivision plat showed the cul-de-sacs with 100 feet of space, but the actual turn-arounds were 60 to 70 feet.

Duvall said he would enlarge the turn-arounds to 80 feet, if he were granted a variance to the regulations. He said he knew of no cul-de-sacs in the county that are 100 feet, as required in the 1981 subdivision regulations.

P&Z also recommended that the commissioners contact Otero Electric to request cooperation with the county regulations when placing underground lines in the future.

P&Z reviewed a proposed condominium subdivision ordinance written by county attorney Steve Sanders. The ordinance will be an amendment to the Lincoln County Subdivision Act. P&Z approved sending the ordinance, with some

amendments, to Sanders for revision.

The ordinance would apply to any subdivision or part of a subdivision intended to be developed by the construction of multiple units. The proposed regulations would require developers to submit blueprints and proposed articles of incorporation to P&Z. The builder also would be required to have a detailed description of proposed financing available to the purchasers.

The ordinance also details building height restrictions and solar access. A minimum of 2,200 square feet per unit would be required, as well as two off-street parking spaces per unit.

P&Z requested that Sanders review the ordinance to conform to state condominium laws. Sanders and Cox were not present at the meeting.

A public hearing will be called to review the proposed ordinance. P&Z also requested the same hearing be used to review the proposed amendment to the subdivision regulations, which would make an approved plat null and void if the developer does not file the plat within 30 days of approval by the county commissioners.

In other business P&Z: —Accepted the recommendation that the commissioners withdraw

their approval of Los Chozas, Vera Cruz and Manzana subdivisions unless the plats, fees and other documents are filed within 30 days from the meeting, July 30. Notification of the commission's pending action will be given to the subdivision owners.

—Approved the recommendation to the commissioners that they accept the preliminary road inspection of Wolf Creek subdivision, provided the vegetation in the roadbeds is removed and the roads are maintained by the developer for the required two years.

—Approved the preliminary road inspection of Wolf Springs subdivision, with two years of developer maintenance.

—Directed the developer of the alleged illegal subdivision, Tall Pines, to draw a plat with a description of the properties already sold, and to build a road that conforms to regulations in front of the lots in question.

—Considered correspondence from the state Highway Department concerning driveway regulations and permits. P&Z appointed member LaMoyné Peters to meet with Cox to pinpoint rural driveway problems, and directed that a letter of thanks for cooperation be sent to the department.

Commission grants variances

The Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission (ETC) granted two variances to allow mobile homes in county subdivisions that adjoin Ruidoso.

At their regular meeting in Carrizozo Thursday, Darlene Smith asked ETC to grant a variance allowing a mobile home in a lot zoned R-1 (single-family dwellings) in the B.J. Watkins subdivision.

Mark Deters, resident of the subdivision, protested the variance, claiming that the dwellings in the subdivision are predominantly per-

manent. Deters said he feared that the variance would encourage more mobiles in the R-1 subdivision.

"The character of the neighborhood needs concrete direction," Deters said.

A site inspection had been made by commission member Mike Callaghan, who said the lot is so narrow it would not permit a permanent dwelling. He reported that the lots in the Ruidoso subdivision, across the street from Smith's lot, are mainly for mobiles.

ETC granted the variance by a two-to-one vote, with member Walt Wilson casting the negative vote.

ETC chairman Milt Alcorn told

Deters to contact the appeals committee if he wished to protest the variance. Appeals committee members are Bill Elliott, Ken Nosker and Ray Dean Carpenter.

ETC also granted a variance to allow a mobile in the Paradise Canyon subdivision for Betty Chism. The subdivision is zoned R-1, but according to Callaghan, the majority of adjoining lots are occupied by mobiles.

Commission members Alcorn, Bell, Callaghan and Wilson approved meeting next month at 2 p.m. Thursday, August 22, at the Ruidoso suboffice.



Officials contemplate overruns

How would you feel if you decided to buy a new car with a \$4,800 price tag on the window, and the salesman explained that it would cost \$8,000 with radio, air conditioning and a few extras. And further, the price would escalate to \$12,000 with tires?

Add a few more zeros, and you might be talking about the Grindstone Canyon dam project.

Original estimates on the dam, submitted by Boyle Engineering Corporation soon after Ruidoso voters approved an \$8 million bond issue earmarked for water improvements, were for \$4.8 million. That estimate has risen over the past three years, and the dam is expected to cost over \$7.4 million now.

For that \$7.4 million, Ruidoso gets a dam—only a dam. In order to make use of the dam a storage facility and a treatment plant must also be constructed. Add \$2.5 million to the price tag.

One portion of the project has already been completed. A bid was awarded on the pipeline for \$766,000. It was originally estimated to cost \$320,000 and amended to \$346,000, but in fact is costing more than twice that.

The \$8 million project will cost at least \$12 million and some citizens are asking why.

"They (project engineers) ab-

solutely admit that the dam came in millions of dollars over the estimate," said assistant village manager Frank Potter.

The first major difference between original estimates and actual bids was on the dam itself. Fred Burns, principal engineer with Boyle in Albuquerque, explained that the \$4.8 million estimate was for an earth-filled dam.

"The estimates were made before any of the engineering or design was done," Burns said. He explained that using published figures, which Boyle did, is standard practice for engineering firms bidding large jobs.

"Changes have been honest ones, in the interest of good engineering practices," Burns said.

"You use your best judgment based on your knowledge of the area," he added.

Burns said soil testing showed that there was not enough dirt at the Grindstone site to build an earth-filled dam. That entailed a major design change.

Frank Potter, assistant village manager, confirmed those soil findings and further explained that stripping the soil to the level that would have been necessary might have caused the dam to leak.

Burns said that cost estimates were then figured on a rock-filled dam and a roller-compacted concrete dam. The village council voted to build a roller-compacted

concrete dam.

Bids opened April 9, 1985, were higher than expected, and councillors directed Boyle engineers to refigure costs and rebid the project.

"I hope Fred (the engineer) won't be low bidder again," quipped village manager Jim Hine as bids were opened June 20, 1985, after the second round of bidding. As it turned out he was—with the low bid coming in at \$7.2 million compared to a \$7.0 million engineers' estimate on the alternate bid.

A base bid was solicited including a concrete facing on the downstream side of the dam. The same bidder was low on both options, bidding \$7.4 million on the dam with a facing, compared to engineers' estimates of \$7.3 million.

Burns and another Boyle project engineer, Leroy Givens, both said the facing wouldn't affect the stability of the dam structure. However, they recommended to the village council that the \$7.4 million bid be awarded, rather than the \$7.2 million low bid.

"We want to provide something that the village is going to be proud of," Givens said.

Burns said the concrete facing also was recommended because of new information on construction methods. He said the village would risk additional construction costs as high as \$200,000 building the dam

without the concrete facing.

Burns also explained differences in the cost of the pipeline, estimated at \$320,000 and costing \$766,000. He said the estimates were figured on 10-inch iron pipe, while the design was eventually changed to utilize 16-inch asbestos concrete pipeline.

That design change resulted in the huge increase in cost.

"That (pipeline design) was changed after hearings with farmers on effluent credit," Potter said. More effluent credit can be used with the increased capacity in the larger pipe, he said.

Potter said the shortage of large construction jobs this year may have affected the cost of the project. He explained that construction companies often work on several large jobs at once, and if one has been figured too low, they can expect to compensate for that on another job.

With few jobs available, Potter said, contractors were figuring very cautiously.

"I feel sorry that we're kind of the butt of the questions," Burns said of discussions on dam overages.

"Perhaps I should have kept a cost appraisal done on a more frequent basis so that we could have addressed these problems as we went along," he added.

"I can't defend every charge, but there's been no bad practice," Burns said.

Potter, who has worked with Burns and Boyle Engineering Corporation on village projects since about 1974, said he has a great deal

of confidence in the engineer and the firm.

"In fact Fred Burns is one of two noted water experts in the state," he said.

"Why they missed it, I don't know," he added.

Burns and Potter both said construction costs seem to be higher in

Ruidoso. That may have impacted the project, too.

Burns said dams that are costing \$25 a cubic yard elsewhere, evidently would cost \$30 a cubic yard in Ruidoso.

"I think it's honest circumstance that's brought us to where we are," Burns said.

Railway study progresses, committee to form

Wheels are turning in the development of a cog-wheel railway system in the Ruidoso area. A group of representatives met Friday morning to discuss the formation of a committee to serve as the local liaison during the present feasibility study.

James Paxton, acting chairman during the formation of a railroad commission, told the group he'd like to see an organization made up of representatives of the various entities involved with the railroad project.

Organizations represented at Friday's meeting included the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, United States Forest Service, Ski Apache ski area and the New Mexico Department of Transportation. Ruidoso Downs Race Track and Lincoln County also will be among the many entities involved with the railroad.

Ron Sheek, of the state Department of Transportation, updated the group on the progress of the Swiss-style railroad project. Sheek said the feasibility study is being conducted in two parts.

The first part of the study, done primarily through his office, is a travel demand survey that studies potential use of the mountain railway. Results of the study also will be used for advertising and other purposes.

Sheek said the railroad would link four major points—the new airport, the racetrack, Ruidoso and the ski area. The Department of Transportation is studying travel patterns and tourism in Ruidoso.

As part of the study, the chamber recorded license plates at the racetrack during the July Fourth weekend. Paxton said that 85 percent of the cars were from Texas.

"We feel we're getting a good handle on travel patterns," said Sheek.

The travel pattern phase of the feasibility study will be completed by August 1. The second phase will analyze the technology and

economics and form possible plans to implement the project. That phase will be finished in December.

The feasibility study carries an \$80,000 price tag, which will be funded by a combination of public and private resources. The state has contributed \$20,000. Paxton reported that local funds so far include \$5,000 from the Village of Ruidoso Downs and \$10,000 from private donations.

Sheek said he felt the Department of Transportation's role was as a catalyst for the project.

"We helped you get started, but we feel the time has come to throw

the ball in your court as far as the feasibility study is concerned," said Sheek.

Sheek suggested the possibility of forming a non-profit industry development board, such as he'd worked with in Albuquerque and Santa Fe. Another alternative would be to form a committee similar to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission.

The group will meet again at 9 a.m. Monday, July 29, at the new United States Forest Service office, to review documents about other boards and to finalize formation of a railroad committee.

School board approves checks

The Ruidoso Municipal School Board approved checks Thursday in a special eight-minute meeting called for that purpose.

Board member Lynn Willard questioned checks he thought were duplicates, but was told by Sid

Miller, superintendent of schools, that teachers are paid with two checks for the months of May and June.

The checks were not available for approval during the regular monthly meeting.

'Santa Barbara' still has a way to go after one year

"Santa Barbara" is celebrating its first anniversary this week, amid speculation that its first anniversary could also be its last.

To its credit, "Santa Barbara" has elaborate, eye-catching sets and does numerous quality on-location shootings.

And the writers deserve kudos for the light humor they have injected into the Augusta-Lionel (Louise Sorel and Nicholas Coster) story line. Watching these two performers deliver their dialogue is a treat.

But most "Santa Barbara" story lines have left a great deal to be desired. The "Who Killed Channing Capwell Jr.?" saga plodded along for nearly the entire year. One interesting aspect of the lengthy murder investigation was the arrival of Dominic, Sophia's male counterpart, who was portrayed to perfection by Rosemary Forsyth. But after just a few months, Miss Forsyth was mysteriously relieved of the role and replaced Judith McConnell. From then on, Dominic was easily recognizable as Sophia — to everyone except the "Santa Barbara" characters, anyway.

Natural disasters have been an all-too-common phenomenon in "Santa Barbara." Characters have been trapped in a cave, shaken by earthquakes,

threatened by an underground tunnel explosion, and terrified by a high-rise hotel fire. The characters are real survivors, but the staying power of the audience has been severely tested.

Most disappointingly, perhaps, "Santa Barbara" had promised to prominently feature minorities in its story lines. But within a very short time, all but two members of the two Mexican-American families that had initially been showcased had disappeared or had been killed off. Since then, "Santa Barbara" has adhered to the standard soap-opera premise that pitting the rich against the rich is what the viewers really want to see. It ain't necessarily so.

Still, "Santa Barbara" is slowly but surely making its own mark in the daytime soap opera world, and we wish it a happy first anniversary!

NFL '85 takes to field; five greats enter Hall

After a two-week hiatus, pro football is back on the tube. This Saturday, in Canton, Ohio, the New York Giants and the Houston Oilers play in the National Football League Hall of Fame Game, a sweltering, half-speed look-see at vets and free agents. The game takes place two hours after five men have been presented with bronze busts of themselves and officially inducted into the Hall.

The inductees: Frank Gatski, Joe Namath, Pete Rozelle, O.J. Simpson and Roger Staubach. Gatski, a center, anchored the Cleveland Browns offensive line from 1946-56. Joe Willie Namath was a gimpy-kneed, slump-shouldered New York Jets QB who popularized white cleats. Rozelle, as NFL Commissioner and negotiator with the networks, is the man most responsible for the promulgation of pro football into American's media consciousness. And Simpson and Staubach are the first Helmsman trophy winners ever to be inducted into the Hall.

To be inducted, former players must work through a convoluted voting process that weeds out those whose character rubs some writers the wrong way.

Don Smith, of the Hall of Fame, says, "There are no rules about moral conduct.

We instruct our voters to vote on a candidate's pro football record only. We can't control what they think or feel, however, or how they vote in private."

Hence, some players get tripped up on their way to the hall. Like Paul Hornung, the Green Bay Packer Golden Boy. And many thought Jimmy Cannon, an AFL star receiver, had a decent chance at induction until he was arraigned last year on counterfeiting charges. Forget Cannon.

As for the game on ABC, the Giants approach this '85 campaign with great expectations following their second post-season appearance in 21 years. And Coach Bill Parcells is content: During the off-season, he acquired Maurice Carthon, former running mate of USFL New Jersey General Herschel Walker; George Adams, a fleet halfback from Kentucky; and a new, four-year, \$1.3 million contract.

The Oilers have improved gradually. They won only once in '82, twice in '83 and three times in '84. On offense, the plan is for Warren Moon to set up behind a line supported by heavyweights Dean Steinkuhler and Mike Munchak and toss to sticky-fingered Tim Smith; on defense, it is hoped that draft picks Ray Childress and Richard Johnson create some some havoc.




Each era is depicted with appropriate costumes and sets. The voices are excellent, and the imitations of artists like Billie Holiday are superb.

Kevin Peter Hall considers his height (7' 4") an asset

In a little over a month and a half, another television season will be upon us, bringing, as usual, some very unusual attempts at creativity. One of the most unusual characters on NBC's most unusual entry, "Misfits of Science," is a character named Elvin Lincoln, who is played by 7-foot-4 actor Kevin Peter Hall.

"Can you believe the name they gave me?" joshes Hall. He explains that he and Dean Paul Martin play scientists working for the U.S. government "investigating human oddities. I'm ill at ease at being so tall, so I work on a serum to make me small, and it all goes wrong. When we get into trouble, we kinda have someone who can shrink down to size so I can get into small places. Being big is kind of taken care of," he says, poking fun at his stature.

Obviously Hall's height has always been a decisive factor in his life. He claims that he has wanted to be an actor since he was 8 years old, but basketball has always been a subsidiary diversion. He played high-school basketball in Pittsburgh (his home town) and attended George Washington University, where he studied theater, on a basketball scholarship.

Upon graduation ("as a present," he kids), he accepted a year's contract with a South American basketball team, and played throughout Colombia and Venezuela. "Most struggling actors wait tables to play the rent. I play basketball," he says.

In Los Angeles, his stature helped him get numerous roles in horror and science-fiction movies. For example, he played a deformed bear in "The Prophecy" and the title role in "Monsters in the Closet."

"It's pretty hard playing a monster. You spend a lot of time getting in and out of rubber suits, and it's hotter than you can imagine. As an actor you can't do much with latex, but I was glad to have the work and the money. But I always wanted to do something more creditable."

Ironically, he was recruited for the "Misfits" role while playing Queequeg in a Los Angeles repertory production of "Moby Dick Revisited." (The role Hall also performed regularly in Los Angeles comedy clubs with partner Jay Fenichel, a college friend who is also his manager.) He admits that his new show is "rather off the wall — but it's got some great humor. I'm kind of Spock-like — rational and dogmatic, the one who keeps everyone on a straight track."

As for all the shrinking scenes, taped on a special stage, Hall says, "It's a lot of fun being little, but I wouldn't want to trade in my height on a permanent basis."

He was the silent screen's most sensual star and the idol of a whole generation of women. His untimely death in 1926 at the age of 31 set off a wave of national histrionics, and fans, eager to get one last look at their idol, actually rioted in front of the funeral home.

Spoilsports have since claimed that the power Rudolph Valentino exudes on screen is simple overacting and that those long smoldering glances are caused by a nearsighted squint, but Valentino definitely had something. It's still in evidence in such movies as "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," "The Sheik," "The Eagle" and "Son of the Sheik," his last movie.

Ironically, the screen's greatest lover had little success with women in his private life. His first marriage, to actress Jean Acker, broke up on their wedding night, and his second wife, Natacha Rambova, seemed to exert a Svengali-like influence over him.

A third woman — a prominent movie star — claimed that she was engaged to him at the time of his death (and played the role of grieving fiancée to the hilt), but since the actress was a notorious publicity hound and Valentino had never breathed a word about the "engagement" to any of his friends, most people have tended to discount her story.
