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Congressmen are honored at reception

U.S. Representatives Joe Skeen and Manuel Lujan and Senator Pete Domenici were the guests of honor at a reception at Cree Meadows Country Club Monday evening.

The reception was the first of three sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Ruidoso Valley Greeters to thank the politicians for their help on the new airport. Each of the officials was presented with a Nambe tray inscribed with thanks from Ruidoso.

Representative Manuel Lujan told The News he felt the new airport was "needed more than anything." He said he had friends who were killed flying into the present Ruidoso facility.

Lujan said he felt the new airport would help the Ruidoso economy by bringing more people in by plane. Lujan admitted that he has not flown into Ruidoso for a long time.

When accepting the award, Lujan said he loved Ruidoso and took the time to attend the reception as "an excuse to spend three days in this beautiful area."

Ruidoso area (second district) Representative Joe Skeen had chamber director John Jeffers introduce him as the "old home boy."

Skeen said that, although the airport will benefit Ruidoso's economy, the main issue with him is safety.

"We don't want to lose any more people that visit Ruidoso," he said. Skeen told The News he has first-hand knowledge of the dangerous landing conditions, as he is a pilot himself.

Skeen said he is pleased with the project's progress, but said there is a long way to go, with funding and an environmental impact statement. Skeen said he is anxious to see construction begin.

When we see that dirt moving out there, we'll know this thing has

finally come to fruition," he said.

Senator Pete Domenici told The News that he feels the airport project is "just tremendous." The senator reported that President Ronald Reagan probably would sign the bill providing for the land transfer within four to five days.

Domenici said he felt the airport would be a major economic asset for Ruidoso and this part of the state, but that other actions such as promotion, planning and an improved American economy are needed for continued economic development.

When accepting his thank-you award, Domenici talked about the prior 26 to 28 months. He said that people visited his office to talk about the airport and left angry

with him.

"A couple of years ago, your cause was a wet noodle that wouldn't go anywhere, and I knew that."

"I knew that in due course that we'd find a time when it would be a nice solid piece of steel and we'd get this thing done," said Domenici.

The next reception, which will honor Governor Toney Anaya and the New Mexico Department of Economic Development and Tourism, will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday, August 14, at the Alto residence of Jackie and Larry Corbin.

The final reception, to honor Senator Jeff Bingaman, is scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday, August 29, at Cree Meadows Country Club.

Airport progress is made

Progress on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport gained momentum Monday as members of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission took steps to apply for state and federal funding for the facility and to hire an engineer for the construction of the airport.

Commission members heard commission chairman Fred Heckman report that transfer of the future airport location, Site B, from the federal government to the commission, awaits only the signature of President Ronald Reagan before becoming law.

"We are now through with Congressional action," Heckman said. He reported that Reagan is expected to act on the measure on Saturday, August 10.

The commission members voted unanimously to apply for \$1 million in state Aviation Fund money. The funds have been set aside for this purpose, state Aviation Division Director Bob White reported at the meeting.

He said the funds could be used as "up front" money for the initial stages of the airport, as no federal funds for the project will be available until after the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is completed. That document is expected to be completed in January.

Commission members voted to give commission chairman Fred Heckman the go-ahead to begin the process of applying for Federal Aviation Administration funds to help finance the airport.

Heckman indicated that although the federal agency cannot grant funds until after the EIS is com-

pleted, pre-applications may be received.

White pointed out that filing the pre-applications is not to presuppose the findings of the EIS. He noted that consultants working on the EIS are considering alternate sites to Site B.

"At this point, we see no adverse environmental impact which would preclude development of an airport on that site," White said.

Also during the meeting, the commission members voted to advertise immediately for applications from potential project engineers. The commission members set August 22 as the deadline for submission of applications.

Heckman stressed the need for quickness in getting an engineer started on the project.

The chairman suggested that an application that must be made to the Secretary of Interior for transfer of the future airport site should be made in mid-September. He reported that the secretary has 120 days to act on the request, so application in mid-September would mean transfer by mid-January, the anticipated time for the completion of the EIS.

The urgency for getting an engineer is due to the need to determine rights of way across federal lands that will be needed to gain traffic and utility access to the airport site, it was learned. Many commission members agreed that those rights of way should be specified in the application.

In other business, the commission

approved resolutions thanking Governor Toney Anaya, White and former state Secretary of Transportation Judith Espinosa for all their help in accomplishing the

present progress on the airport project.

—Approved the transfer of \$5,186.72 from the Lincoln County General Fund to a separate Airport Commission fund. The county is handling the commission's funds.

—Approved a resolution outlining the commission's meeting times and meeting notification procedures.

—Approved the drafting of a resolution thanking the New Mexico Congressional delegation for their help in the progress of the airport project.

—Heard Heckman report that a jet airline company has expressed interest in beginning airline service to the airport. Heckman said the airline serves airports in New Mexico, Texas and Arizona and anticipates 14,000 passengers a year at the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

—Voted to seek redesignation of the airport from "general aviation" to "commercial service."

—Voted that all members' governmental entities that are behind on their financial support of the commission should be reminded to submit the payments.

—Heard commission member Kenneth Nosker express his feelings on steps taken by the commission during the meeting.

"I'm very much enthused by the progress we've made today," he said. "This has been a long time coming."

Members Conrad Buchanan, representing Ruidoso Downs; Nosker, representing Lincoln County; Benny Coker, representing Capitan; and Heckman, representing Ruidoso were present at the meeting. Not present was member Wendell Chino, representing the Mescalero Apache Tribe.

Summer Festival canceled for 1986

A letter from incoming Ruidoso Summer Festival President Carl Anderson says that the 1986 festival has been "suspended... in order to re-evaluate the program, relating to goals, facilities, promotion, and guest orchestra."

Board member Don Shaw said the Festival has "encountered some problems over the last few years."

"First of all, when the Festival was first organized, things were a lot cheaper and easier to maintain," Shaw said. "Now we have a lack of a large enough, suitable facility. When you are promoting an extravaganza of this size, it puts a strain on the community," he said.

He cited the orchestra's preference for a better facility as well as the limited seats available in the building used in the past. "The orchestra demands a better facility; some of the instruments they play are 750 years old, or older, and temperamental. Coupled with the fact that we can't seat as many people as we'd like to, the facility has to change."

Shaw said the 1985 Festival was "very successful" in terms of ticket sales, but that there was not enough room to hold a large audience.

"This is not the end of the Summer Festival," Shaw emphasized. "We are suspending one performance so we can bring it back better than ever. We're going to shoot for a new beginning."

Although Anderson's name was on the release, he had not signed it

and said he had not "even seen it. I don't even know what's in it."

Shaw said input from the Ruidoso community is "vital" to the board's ultimate decisions regarding festival changes. "We are hoping that some kind of private or public facility will be usable by then," Shaw said.

Ted Bennett, also a board member, said the decision was new and that no steps have been taken as yet. "We just decided this yesterday (Tuesday). We haven't even appointed any committees yet," he said.

Shaw said members of the public are "more than welcome" to contact him or any other board member with suggestions for the re-organization of the Summer Festival.

Solution to murder case may be close

The McKnight murder case "is under active investigation," according to District Attorney James Weldon.

"I think we're going to solve it," Weldon said. "I'm not going to predict when," he added.

Weldon said his office continues to confer with representatives from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office

"We are hopefully nearing the end," he said.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan has predicted that the case will be solved before the end of the year. Sullivan revealed, in a July speech before the Lincoln County Democratic Women, that his office is "pretty sure who did it."

Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight of Picacho were shot November 15, 1984. Their bodies were discovered November 16, on the kitchen floor of their remote ranch home.

An intensive investigation has continued since that date.

Officials search for contamination sources

The state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) is continuing an investigation of gasoline pollution in the Rio Ruidoso.

Douglas Earp, a hydrologist and groundwater specialist from the Santa Fe EID office, was in the village Tuesday and Wednesday to perform tests at Ruidoso Chevron service station, located at 2804 Sudrorth Drive near the affected area of the river.

EID already had taken samples of the polluted river water, and photographed the "oil slick" on the river near where the substance was apparently entering the river.

Underground tanks at the service station were drained last week. Workers have excavated several tanks, but were unable to remove the last one late Wednesday, according to Jim Edwards of the EID.

Earp said early Wednesday that he had found a small hole in one tank, but no holes in two other tanks. No soil discoloration was detected around the hole, but some discoloration was present around the other two tanks, Earp said.

The project will continue when equipment needed to dig up the last tank arrives, but Earp had to leave Ruidoso for work on another project. Edwards said Earp will return to the village over the weekend, and

is expected to make a determination on the case.

"They have some strong indications that those tanks were indeed leaking," said Edwards.

Earp added that the owners of the tanks have been very helpful throughout the investigation.

L.C. Duke of 214 Anetta Drive detected a strong smell of gasoline about two weeks ago as he was fishing outside his riverside home. After discovering a petroleum-like substance pouring from the ground into the river, he alerted authorities, and the extensive investigation was launched.

A report will be issued by the EID as soon as the investigation is completed, according to Edwards.

In another water-related development, the EID is continuing the investigation into the source of the contamination of the Hollywood well. Earp reported that holes will be drilled around the well to determine from where the contamination is coming.

After that determination is made, more holes will be drilled in an attempt to trace the line of contamination back to its source.

Earp said if it is found that the sources of contamination can be identified in the two cases, anyone responsible can be charged with the cost of clean-up efforts.

Charges are filed in traffic death

Formal charges were filed Wednesday against Jonathan Frederick Taylor for the felony crime of vehicular homicide, according to Ruidoso Police investigator Lanny Maddox.

Taylor was charged in the death of Gary G. McSwane, resulting from a one-car rollover that occurred about 10:30 p.m. Sunday, August 4. Taylor, a 28-year-old Ruidoso resident, also was charged with reckless driving, Maddox said.

After appearing before Magistrate Judge Jim Wheeler Wednesday, Taylor was released on

his own recognizance, while the investigation continues.

Taylor and McSwane apparently were traveling down Gavilan Canyon Road in a 1982 Datsun 280ZX, when the car flipped over three times, according to police reports. Maddox said police investigations indicate that McSwane was thrown from the vehicle.

The official cause of death in the case is listed as "chest failure" or "injuries to the chest area." McSwane's body was transferred to the state medical examiner's office in Albuquerque, and Maddox ex-

pects the examiner's report by early next week.

Maddox said samples taken from the vehicle were sent to the state crime laboratory in Albuquerque. Those test results, as well as findings from blood tests on Taylor, should be available early next week.

"I had to determine the driver of the vehicle," said Maddox. After making that determination, Taylor was arrested and formally charged, Maddox said.

John Underwood, Taylor's attorney, had no comment on the case when contacted late Wednesday.

Planning and Zoning holds firm on zoning

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission during a regular meeting Monday voted to expand the stated reasons for denying a rezone request for Hitomi Greening. The application to rezone from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (light commercial) Lot 2, Block A, Navajo subdivision was denied during the July 15 meeting.

Greening appealed the denial, and the Ruidoso Village Council has scheduled a public hearing for August 27.

P&Z originally denied the request because members said the lot is surrounded by residential zoned areas and doesn't have access to Sudderth Drive. Greening took exception to those reasons in the appeal.

"It (the lot) is just not conducive to commercial development," commissioner Martin Rose said Monday. Although Greening stated in an appeal that the lot adjoins commercial property, commissioners stated that most surrounding property is residential.

Commissioner Mike Callaghan opined that the access Greening lists in his appeal is not a dedicated road, but an easement, and is not publicly maintained. The reason for denial was changed from "no access" to "limited access."

P&Z findings will be sent to the council for consideration during the August 27 public hearing.

The commission, after lengthy debate, approved a front lot line variance for Lot 16, Block F, White

Fir subdivision for Barbara Bradley.

Commissioner Don Shaw, casting the lone dissenting vote, voted to deny Bradley's request because it entails new construction within setbacks, causes problems with setbacks and the construction was started without a permit.

Rose questioned Bradley as to why the project contractor, Jay Goodman, failed to obtain a building permit before beginning the project.

"He was doing a 'no no' and he was trying to sneak it by us," said Rose. Rose suggested that contractors be fined for such practices.

Village enforcement officer Paul Davis told the commission that building permit fees are automatically doubled on projects that are started without the necessary permits.

In other business the commission:

—Approved a replat of the west portion of Lot 8, Block 6, Hamilton Terrace subdivision for Larry Montero.

—Tabled a request by Tim Collins for a replat of La Tierra Condominiums, Lot 8, Block 5, White Mountain Estates, Unit 4 for Johnny F. Mobley and William Jourdan. Collins was instructed to present density requirements, green space plans and variance requests when the request is considered again.

—Denied a request by Tim Collins for a change in covenant language for La Tierra Condominiums. Collins said project attorneys want to eliminate language

calling for land dedication for underground utilities.

—Approved a replat of Vista Del Lago, Phase 1 and 2 into High Sierra Condominiums for Carvel Development, Inc. Tim Collins, speaking for the project, said full development plans will be brought before P&Z later.

—Approved a sign variance for Robert Beavers. Beavers plans to place a 20 by 16-foot billboard on First Presbyterian Church property adjacent to the "Y" at Highway 70 and Sudderth Drive. The sign will list the Ruidoso High School football schedule.

Approval was contingent upon receiving a letter from the property owners, a letter from the Ruidoso schools and complete maintenance plans for the large sign.

Beavers, who explained that the sign is being purchased by individuals interested in school athletic programs, said plans may include using the sign for other seasonal sports.

P&Z voted to waive any further fees if the sign is changed.

—Scheduled an August 21 workshop with BRW, the company drafting the village comprehensive plan.

—Heard reports from P&Z subcommittees on the BRW comprehensive plan. Masters instructed those groups to submit suggestions for BRW to P&Z secretary Becky Morris by August 14.

—Heard Davis announce that Morris will soon be leaving the village, and moving to Amarillo, Texas. "We're going to miss Becky," said Callaghan.

Erosion raises concern of resident

Ann Crumbley's back yard gets a little smaller each time it rains.

"Our property is just eroding," said Crumbley, who lives at 118 Birch Drive, directly behind Ruidoso True Value Home Center. Crumbley said she isn't sure how much of her lot has sloughed off.

"We had a fence back there and the fence has fallen down," she said. "It is really bad."

Crumbley explained that excavations for the construction of True Value's building left her property level with the roof of the building. She said Wayne Dacy, project builder, told her he would build a retaining wall "over a year ago."

Paul Davis, village enforcement officer, said that the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) required a retaining wall for the project. He explained that the back wall of the building is designed to serve as a retaining wall.

The problem is caused by the space between the combination back wall/retaining wall and the adjoining property owners' land.

Greg Masters, P&Z chairman, said the developer was instructed to use backfill in the empty space. Masters said he recalled making approval for the Sprouse Reitz phase of the development contingent upon filling in that area.

Dacy said he intends to fill the area, and expects to complete the backfill "not later than August."

"In fact, we're gearing up on it right now," he said last week. "I've just had to do it when I could."

Dacy expects to be able to work on the backfill this week.

In the meantime, Crumbley's yard and trees continue to fall into the crevice between her property line and the True Value Home Center building.

Other items the group will discuss in September include a proposed amphitheater at School House Park. Bailey will present a season's end report on the municipal swimming pool and announce fall activities.

Parnell helps young people deal with problems

Truancy and alcohol are the two major reasons children end up in her office, said Jane Parnell, Children's Probation Officer for Lincoln County.

When a county juvenile gets in trouble with the law or breaks school regulations, that young person is referred to Parnell.

"I need a referral to talk with a child," she explained. Those referrals come mainly from the Ruidoso Police Department, other county law enforcement agencies and from schools.

Parnell, a Lincoln County native, has been children's probation officer for 10 years. Problems for young people haven't changed much during that time, she said.

"I'm seeing more children involved in felonies now," she added. That's mainly because of population growth, Parnell speculated.

Except in felony cases, Parnell determines whether or not the youth goes to court. Cases involving felony crimes are all sent to the District Attorney, whether the accused is a youth or an adult, Parnell explained.

"There's no such thing as a typical day," said Parnell. She is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and is often called in the middle of the night. Busiest months for the probation officer are October, April and March.

Often those nighttime calls involve runaway calls, and they can be a big problem since no youth facilities are available. If a runaway is not involved in any delinquent act, he or she cannot be detained, Parnell said.

Parents are notified when a runaway child is identified, and if the parents choose not to come get the juvenile, the "kid is turned loose," Parnell said. Alamogordo has the nearest youth shelter, but it is normally full to capacity, she said.

"I like kids ... I like teenagers, and I like working with them," Parnell said. She taught vocational home economics in Fort Sumner for seven years, and when an automobile accident made a career change necessary she looked for a way to be involved with youth.

Even though Parnell sees troubled youth every day, she continues to be optimistic about all people—young and old alike. "Most people are good," she said firmly. Her personal evidence of that is the fact that she seldom sees the same client more than once. While there are "hardcore" offenders who continue to break the rules, most "graduates" of the probation office mend their ways.

"It is depressing when I have to send a kid to Springer," Parnell said thoughtfully. Three juveniles have been sent through Parnell's

office to that state facility since January.

Sessions with children and parents vary according to the people and the offenses, Parnell said. Most conferences begin with completing paperwork and explanations of the law, and from there Parnell said she plays it by ear.

Not all referrals involve delinquent acts. Parnell explained that a delinquent act is anything that would be illegal for an adult. Some referrals are classified as "child in need of supervision" (CHIN).

Truancy and failure to obey parents fall into the CHIN category.

Parnell, a graduate of Ruidoso High School and Eastern New Mexico University, spends a great deal of her time on community activities. She is actively involved with the local Boy Scouts of America, is a member of the Inter-

Agency Council and is on the board of directors for Crime Stoppers.

She heartily recommends that youth become involved in school, church and civic organizations. Parnell said she seldom gets referrals on youth who are actively involved and busy with school, clubs and work.

"I very seldom see children from families that do things together," Parnell said. Even though visible problems may not show up until the child is older, they really begin in early childhood, and that's when the family togetherness can begin.

Parnell said that all children will rebel in one way or another, but most don't end up in court.

"The youngest child ever referred to this office was five," Parnell said. "I have had months when I didn't see anyone over 13," she added. Many clients are older teens.

About a dozen times a year, Parnell has a client who requires long-term detention. Those cases involve a detention hearing, a petition by a district attorney and transfer to Alamogordo.

During July, Parnell had 17 juveniles referred for 22 offenses, 19 delinquent acts and three CHIN acts. The Ruidoso Police Department referred eight cases; Ruidoso Downs Police Department referred one; other police departments, three; Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, one; and the New Mexico Game and Fish Department, four.

June referrals numbered 29 juveniles for 37 offenses, 27 delinquent acts and 10 CHIN acts. The Ruidoso Police referred 15; other police departments, four; Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, six; New Mexico Game and Fish, two; and schools, one.

May referrals included 22 juveniles for 42 offenses, 36 delinquent acts and six CHIN acts. Referrals were by Ruidoso Police Department, 12; other police departments, two; Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, one; and schools, seven.

Foreign Exchange Students Well-Received at Rotary Meeting.

My brother Mark, of Houston, and I were guests of Ken Green at a very interesting meeting of the Ruidoso Rotary Club held last Tuesday at Prime Time.

A packed hall of Rotarians, among whom were quite a number of visitors, were treated to the inspiring experience of listening to a group of exchange students telling of their experiences on this side of the Atlantic, and of their impressions of our country and its people.

There were ten young ladies and gentlemen from Austria, four from Belgium and one youth from Brazil.

They have already been to New York, Michigan, Louisiana, Wisconsin, Texas and are looking forward to San Francisco, and especially to Alaska.

All the young people were high in their praise of the United States and its people, speaking in remarkably

good English.

An eloquent spokesman for the entire group was a lad named Kris, from Austria. In introducing himself he said he would give a prize to anyone who could pronounce his name. There were a few takers, who came close. But you know the old saying that close counts only in playing horseshoes.

Kris said that the main thing that impressed him about the American people was that they were very warm, as he put it, in contrast to the Europeans, whom he called cold. In this he included his own country.

The group was especially pleased to visit the Mesalero Apache Reservation, where they saw real live Native Americans and learned that the Whites and the Indians are no longer fighting.

Kris, in comparing his country of Austria with our own, said that:

"Our country is two-thirds mountains and one third what we call flat but which you call hilly. Also, over

here everything is so 'wide.' You have to have a car to go to the places you need to be. In Austria I can go anywhere I want with my bicycle or on foot."

Asked if he got homesick for Austria, Kris said:

"When I am in America I am homesick and when I am in Austria I am homesick. I am two people. I do not know what I am going to do."

Kris ended his remarks by saying a great deal in few words:

"The Rotary exchange program has done more for world freedom and peace than all the demonstrations in the world."

Meeting Old Friends


Mounsey enjoys work and play of golf


Don Mounsey likes to combine work and pleasure. Mounsey, a paper carrier for The Ruidoso News, has a business repairing golf clubs in back of his house. "I started doing the repairs about five years ago in Tucson, Arizona," Mounsey said. "I wanted some additional golf clubs, so I built them. "Some friends of mine wanted some like them, so I built them some. From there, it started as a hobby and became a business." Mounsey started playing golf 15 years ago in Texas where he was stationed in the Air Force. Mounsey moved to Ruidoso about a year ago and started the local business. He worked out of his father-in-law's house until his present shop was built about a month ago. He builds and repairs clubs, repairs them and refinishes them. "Just about anything that can be done to a golf club, I do it," he said. He also adjusts the loft and lie of clubs. The loft is the angle of the iron. The lie is the way the club lies on the ground when a golfer addresses the ball. "It's important for someone to have the loft and lie looked at at least once a year," Mounsey said. "Of course, before a person even buys some clubs, they should have them checked out." Golfers also should check their clubs' swing weight, total weight and shaft flex. Mounsey's shop has a large variety of tools he uses. The shop was built by Blaney Construction. Mounsey has done golf repairs for Alto Lakes Golf & Country Club this year. Last year he did repairs for both Alto Lakes and Cree Meadows Country Club. "If people sent their golf clubs to say, Santa Fe or Albuquerque, it might take two or three weeks for the clubs to come back," Mounsey said. "But I probably could have them done the next day after they gave them to me." Mounsey has not played golf much this year because of his schedule. However, he still loves the game. "I think it's a challenge," he remarked. "I think it's more of a challenge than any sport I've ever played, and I've played a lot of them." "You get just one shot each time. Where it ends up, you have to play it from there." Mounsey's telephone number is 258-5067. He would like his customers to call ahead of time to arrange appointments.

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

Cooking like a pro Local recipes make up cookbook

Terri Flores has been working since January to put together a cookbook containing recipes from the Ruidoso community. It became a much larger project than expected.

"It was supposed to be 250 pages long," Flores said. "It ended up being 450 pages long and we had to cut 100 pages out of it."

Flores estimated about two recipes per page, but with some dishes, the figure may vary, she said.

"We tried not to get duplications," she said. "Usually, when a cookbook like this is put together, you end up with 15 recipes for enchiladas that hardly vary at all."

Fast and easy dishes are mingled with complex French cuisine and tasty Chinese food. "We tried to get as much variation as we could," Flores said. "We have just about every kind of cookie there is and we have Greek and Italian food."

Unforeseen complications arise when compiling a cookbook, she said. "We had to decide whether or not to abbreviate measurements, and whether to use the word 'divided' when talking about using the same ingredient twice." For that reason, if an ingredient is used twice, it is simply repeated on the list, Flores said.

She did not use credit lines on the recipes, either. "We got at least seven recipes for the same chocolate cake. I decided that it was easier not to use names because somebody might call and say they made the recipe themselves and that it is impossible for anyone else to have the same thing. It just seemed simpler to leave the names off."

The book includes a table for high altitude cooking but is not exclusively a high altitude cookbook, she said. "High altitude directions are needed for cakes, breads and candy." Helpful substitution guides also are included. The book has illustrations and small bits of Lincoln County history as well.

Although the following menu is generally used in

the Flores household for New Year's Eve parties, the meal is tasty any time. "Chinese food at New Year's isn't traditional, but it's a great change," Flores said.

MOO GOO GAI PAN

- Two whole chicken breasts
- One-half teaspoon salt
- One-eighth teaspoon pepper
- One teaspoon cornstarch
- Two tablespoons oil
- Two tablespoons green onion, chopped
- One six-ounce package of frozen snow peas
- Three to four ounces of sliced mushrooms
- Two tablespoons pimento
- Two tablespoons preserved ginger, finely chopped

One-half cup chicken broth
One tablespoon water
One teaspoon cornstarch.

Skin and bone the chicken and dice finely. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and one teaspoon cornstarch. Let stand a few minutes.

Heat the oil in a skillet and add a small amount of chicken at a time. Stir fry until white all the way through. Remove the chicken as cooked and repeat until all is done.

When all the chicken is cooked, add the onions and stir fry for one minute. Add the peas, mushrooms, ginger and pimento and stir rapidly until the peas are crisp-tender. Add the broth and heat to a boil.

Mix the remaining cornstarch with the water and blend until smooth. Add to the skillet and cook over medium heat until bubbly and clear, then add the chicken and heat until piping hot. Serve with or over rice. The dish serves six.

Moo goo gai pan can be served with wonton soup, egg rolls and fried noodles. Serve hot Chinese mustard and sweet and sour sauce on the side as well as tea and wine. Flores said she usually cooks pepper steak and sweet and sour pork with her meal.

The oldest couple and long-time residents of Lincoln, Mr. and Mrs. Christobal Zamora, were voted the best couple in the parade. Nancy Barone won the best frontier person award for riding side-saddle.

The Army of New Mexico Territorial Militia was the best frontier group. The group has members from Capitan, Roswell and Carlsbad.

The Chavez County Sheriff's Posse took the prize for the best mounted group. The group is well-

The parade judges were Cecelia Apodaca, Howard Tate, Dub Williams and Cathy Echols.

Parade chairman James Sanchez said the parade was one of the best that Lincoln has seen.

Trust receives grant

The Lincoln Heritage Trust, which owns several buildings and properties in Old Lincoln Town, has received a grant from the Institute of Museum Services (IMS), a federal agency in Washington, D.C.

The \$25,688 grant is basically for operation, such as salaries, maintenance and repair, said trust supervisor Gary Miller. The trust applied for the grant in January and received it in July.

Miller said IMS helps small museums which have no other operational funds. The trust is a private museum which has restored a number of old Lincoln buildings.

The trust also operates the Visitor's Center. The center houses displays of relics from Lincoln's past. The displays are 80 percent complete, Miller added.

The grant allows the trust to spend donation and admission dollars on additional displays. Miller said the trust hopes to create educational programs about Lincoln area history.

IMS received a budget increase for the 1986 fiscal year from the U.S. Legislature, Miller said. The grant is available annually.

The trust is gearing down for winter, when maintenance and work on the displays will take place. Miller said the Visitor's Center will remain open seven days a week throughout August, and will open on weekends until late October. The trust charges a \$1 admission for adults.

Miller said the trust has tentative plans for a Billy the Kid film festival next June.

Copeland from Corona was selected to attend the National 4-H Congress in Chicago for his outstanding record book in beef cattle.

Sandra Copeland, from the Corona 4-H club, won second place in tailoring. Tammy Sultemeier, also from Corona, placed third in Teen Wardrobe III. Jennifer Cooper of Hondo was fourth in Teen Wardrobe II.

Melody Hefker of Carrizozo was third high-point individual in entomology and fourth in wildlife.

Travis Lightfoot, RoAnn Alford and Sandra Copeland, all from Corona, placed third as a crops judging team.

In the meat judging contest, Curtiss was the high-point overall individual. Troy Hollis, also of Carrizozo, was seventh high-point

individual.

Curtiss, Troy Hollis, Melody Hefker and Marsha Hefker, all from the Carrizozo club, won third place as a horse judging team. Curtiss was fourth high-point individual in the horse judging.

Bob Curtiss of Carrizozo received the Honorary Member Award from the state 4-H office for his help with 4-H and the state 4-H horse school.

ORDINANCE NO. 85-14
AN ORDINANCE CODIFYING AND REVISING THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, THAT:

Section 1. TITLE AND ADOPTION
A. There is hereby adopted by the Village of Ruidoso a newly codified and revised code of Ordinances entitled "Municipal Code of Ruidoso, New Mexico, 1985" containing Chapters 1 through 8, which code shall be treated and considered as a new and comprehensive original ordinance. This Code, for the purpose of prosecutions in the Municipal Court, may be cited as "M.C. 1985."

Section 2. RULES OF CONSTRUCTION AND DEFINITIONS
A. In the construction of this Code, and of all ordinances, the following rules shall be observed and the following definitions shall apply, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

- "Generally"—In the interpretation and application of any provision of this Code, it shall be held to be the minimum requirements adopted for the protection of the public health, safety, comfort, convenience and general welfare. Where any provision of the Code imposes greater restrictions upon the subject matter than the general provisions imposed by the Code, the provision imposing the greater restriction or regulation shall be deemed to be controlling.
- "The Village" or "this Village" shall mean the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico.
- "Council"—Whenever the word "Council" is used, it shall be construed to mean the Governing Body of the Village of Ruidoso.
- "Council"—Whenever the word "Council" is used, it shall be construed to mean the Governing Body of the Village of Ruidoso.
- "Counselor"—Whenever the word "Counselor" is used, it shall be construed to mean the Counsel of the Village of Ruidoso.
- "State"—The words "the State" shall mean the State of New Mexico.
- "Computation of time"—Unless otherwise provided in computing time, the first day shall be excluded and the last included unless the last falls on Sunday, in which case the time prescribed shall be extended to include the whole of the following day.
- "Judge or Municipal Judge"—The words "Judge" or "municipal judge" or any like

term shall be construed to mean a Judge (or an acting Judge) of the Municipal Court of the Village of Ruidoso.

- "Oath"—"Oath" includes an affirmation in all cases in which by law, an affirmation may be substituted for an oath, and in such cases the words "swear" or "sworn" shall be equivalent to the words "affirm" and "affirmed." (Sec. 12-2-2, NMSA, 1978 Comp.)
- "Owner"—"Owner" when used in relation to real property means any part owner, joint owner, tenant in common, tenant in common, tenant in partnership or joint tenant of the whole or of a part of such real property.
- "Person"—"Person" means any corporation, company, partnership, association or society as well as a natural person. (Sec. 12-2-2, NMSA, 1978 Comp.)
- "Written"—"Written" or "in writing" may include printing, engraving or any other mode of representing words and letters excepting those cases where the written signature of mark of any case is required. (Sec. 12-2-2, NMSA, 1978 Comp.)
- "Year"—"Year" means calendar year.
- "Month"—"Month" means a calendar month.
- "Gender"—"Masculine" includes the feminine. (Sec. 12-2-2, NMSA, 1978 Comp.)
- "Number"—"Number" includes the plural. (Sec. 12-2-2, NMSA, 1978 Comp.)
- "Tense"—Words used in the present tense include the future tense. (Sec. 12-2-2, NMSA, 1978 Comp.)

Section 3. CATCHLINES
A. The catchlines of the several sections or subsections of this Code are intended as mere catchwords to indicate the beginning of the section and shall not be deemed or taken to be the titles of such sections or subsections, nor as any part thereof, nor shall they be deemed when any of such sections or subsections including the catchlines, are amended, or reenacted, unless expressly so provided.

Section 4. AMENDMENTS TO CODE
A. All ordinances passed subsequent to this Code, which amend, repeal, or in any way alter this Code, may be numbered in accordance with the numbering system of this Code and printed for inclusion herein. In the case of repealed chapters, sections, subsections, or any part thereof by subsequent ordinances, such repealed portions may be excluded from the Code by omission from reprinted pages affected thereby. The subsequent ordinances as numbered and printed or omitted, in the case of repeal, shall be prima facie evidence of such subsequent ordinances until such time as this Code and subsequent ordinances numbered or omitted are reprinted as a new Code of Ordinances by the Council.

B. Amendments to any of the provisions of this Code may be made by amending such provisions by specific reference to the section number of this Code in the following language: "That section—of the Code of Ordinances, Ruidoso, New Mexico, is hereby amended to read as follows:—". The new provisions shall then be set out in full as desired.

C. In the event a new section not heretofore existing in the Code is to be added, the following language may be used: "That the Code of Ordinances, Ruidoso, New Mexico, is hereby amended by adding a section, to be numbered—, which section reads as follows:—". The new section shall then be set out in full as desired.

D. Amendments to ordinances, regulations, or codes adopted by reference to this Code shall be the same procedure provided by Law for adoption of codes by reference.

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
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Thoroughbred qualifiers

Centre's Premiere (top) and That's Incredible are winners of July 31 trials for the \$27,476 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby. The final of the one-mile Derby is set for Sunday, August 11. The winner earns \$13,738. Centre's Premiere won his trial

by over seven lengths, and That's Incredible was eight lengths ahead when he crossed the finish line. When they last met, in the Jockey Club Handicap on July 13, That's Incredible defeated Centre's Premiere by a length.

Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

PINCH-HIT JOCKEYS had a remarkable week at Ruidoso Downs. Beginning on Thursday, a series of injuries forced several riders off their assigned mounts, and into the breach stepped jockeys Mike Lidberg, Leroy Coombs, Eugene O'Neill, Kevin Cogburn and Stuart Dolphus, each riding at least on pinch-hit winner.

In the three-day period Thursday through Saturday, there were 33 late-rider changes, seven resulting in wins and another eight either second or third.

Benefitting most was Lidberg, the defending champion at Ruidoso Downs. When current leading-rider Joe Martinez could not answer the call on Saturday, Lidberg stepped in to ride Lead Shot (\$6) to victory in the second race. Then, in the fourth race, Lidberg substituted for Casey Lambert and booted Mac Askus (\$5.40) into the winner's circle. Again riding for Martinez in the sixth event, Lidberg remained perfect when he scored with Nells Little Caper (\$4.60).

RUIDOSO DOWNS Nominations Secretary Dorothy Dillard reports that seven two-year-olds have been supplemented to the All-American series (Futurity, Derby and Gold Cup) at a cost of \$30,000 each. That payment was due on June 15.

Only three of the seven—Margin Of Cash, Chick Like Pie and Discreet—were named to the All-American Futurity trials when entries were taken on Saturday. Three other supplementals—Keep On Turning, Mango Moon and Doluino—will remain eligible for the 1986 All-American Derby and the 1987 All-American Gold Cup. Late supplementals are not allowed for either race.

The seventh supplemental payment was made for Willful Te, who subsequently died following a Rainbow Futurity time trial on July 3.

He was owned by Harold Gouker of Meeker, Oklahoma.

Margin Of Cash, an allowance race winner here on July 14, will go in Friday's sixth heat. Chick Like Pie, two-for-four in her brief career, comes out in Thursday's second race.

USUALLY among the most formful of horses are the stakes-runners, but on consecutive days the applet cart was overturned by steeds given little or no chance by the betting public.

On Saturday, 93-1 shot Easy Pass Request finished in a dead-heat for the win with Straight Forward in the \$12,325 Big Profit Handicap. She returned across-the-board mutuels of \$78, \$65.40, and \$9.20.

Not to be outdone, 54-1 outsider Captain Smokey won a desperate decision in Sunday's \$59,948 Rio Grande Futurity to return \$110.20, \$46.60 and \$10.80.

Still, the seasonal record for a win payoff remains the \$180.60 bonanza generated by Master Delivery when he won a Rainbow Derby trial on June 13.

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
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

Those two locked horns in the Mr. Jet Moore Handicap earlier this season with Bar Forth missing the winner's check by a whisker to Mr Suspenders. Racy Roman was several steps slow out of the gate to finish ninth.

Bar Forth lines up in the Gold

Cup trials off a sixth-place effort in the \$107,000 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic on July 28. Racy Roman was scratched from his Classic division.

Dashes Dream is expected to make short work of Saturday's second division field, which includes Classic finalists Tyns Rose Bud and On A High, and Board Chairman, most recently fifth in the \$11,400 Jet Deck Handicap.

The third Gold Cup division is headed by Countin The Cash, top qualifier to the Classic and fourth to Oh Snaz in the final of that Grade I stake. He'll be going up against recent allowance winner Burnell, Classic finalist Patti Dash and the stunning Dash For Cash mare Meganette - third to Oh Snaz in the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic and Rainbow Silver Cup champion.

The final Gold Cup trial

spotlights former track record holder Mr Crimson Bug matching strides with Mr Suspenders. Mr Suspenders has been no less than spectacular in his four-year-old campaign capturing the Mr. Jet Moore Handicap, running third to Meganette in the Rainbow Silver Cup, and collecting seventh-place purse money in the Classic.



Jockey / Trainer Of The Week

In an amazing display of one-upmanship, jockey Mike Lidberg rode 13 winners over the weekend at Ruidoso Downs to top his brother David, who had ridden five winners in one day the previous week at Santa Fe.

For Lidberg, the week-long tear was his best of the season, vaulting him well into the standings and winning him Jockey of the Week honors for the first time this summer. He now sits third in the standings behind season-long leader Joe Martinez.

Lidberg began his streak on Wednesday by booting home three winners, then scored with two more on Thursday. He was shut-out on Friday, but came back on Saturday with four more firsts, including three in a row.

On Sunday, the talented reinsman tallied four more times with a series of picture-perfect rides. His bid for five wins on the afternoon missed by inches; he and Duck Stuff lost the \$59,000 Rio Grande Futurity by a head to 64-1

longshot Capitan Smokey. Then, in the nightcap, Lidberg again finished second, aboard Ho Chi's Star, this time by three-quarters of a length.

For the week, he accepted 32 mounts, with 13 wins, four seconds and five thirds, for a win-rate of 40 percent and an in-the-money record of 69 percent. Lidberg is the defending riding champion at Ruidoso Downs, and also won the title at Sunland Park in 1982-83.

Lidberg's performance overshadowed a good week by Eugene O'Neill, who rode five winners. Kevin Cogburn and Leroy Combs each had four firsts, and Ramon Apodaca won the week's richest event; he was up on Capitan Smokey.

On the trainer front, Bill Leach saddled five winners to win the Trainer of the Week award. He also strengthened his grip on the training championship. With 20 days remaining, Leach leads runner up Dwayne Gilbreath 35 to 28. Jack Brooks and Bob Arnett are tied for third with 22 wins each.

Fred Danley sent out four victors on the week and is fifth in the standings, while Gerald Marr scored three times, all on Friday.

Jimmie Claridge saddled Capitan Smokey for the Rio Grande. Earlier, he won stakes races with two-olds Cesar T. (Pocket Coin Handicap) and Dare Send (Ruffast Handicap). Claridge is tenth in the standings with 14 wins.

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

Wingfield's Wharf has tradition, good food



It's always nice to start a Night on the Town with some friendly, homey atmosphere.

Throw in a little history and you've got a real interesting setting.

I started last Thursday by having dinner at Wingfield's Wharf on Sud-derth Drive.

The restaurant, owned by Linda Ward and managed by Mike Tellez and Lori Ward, is one of the oldest buildings in Ruidoso. It was originally owned by the Wingfield family, pioneers of early Ruidoso.

The restaurant has numerous photos of Ruidoso in its early days on the attractive brown wall paneling. One of the photos shows the Wingfield home in the 1920s along with several other old buildings.

Other artifacts from earlier days are displayed around the restaurant.

It's a two-story building that

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

SANTA FE—A couple of points ought to be made early, before we New Mexicans face the problem of choosing candidates for the job of being our next governor.

It's best to raise them now, so they won't be read as pleas for support for any particular individuals.

As usual, we should test those who solicit our votes for the characteristics always needed in a good public official. To our own regret, we don't always apply these criteria in our state, and those we elect sometimes turn out to be unfortunate demonstrations of how important it is to do so.

So let's agree, even before the active campaign season starts, that both major political parties would be well served if those who come forward for the selection process have at least these qualities: intelligence, integrity, open-mindedness and the ability to use the system to achieve agreed-upon aims.

Those should be considered prerequisites, and anyone not possessing all of them should be written off immediately as a serious candidate.

But there's another special point we should raise at just this time in the state's history.

We should scrutinize each applicant closely to see if he or she fulfills this increasingly necessary requirement: being a person who will generate the atmosphere that encourages economic development. What the state needs desperately now is economic diversification. Everyone knows that, including the man who now occupies the governor's chair. He wanted to go into the history books as the man who began that process.

Unfortunately, here, as in so many other instances, his actions managed to defeat the objective he was publicly proposing. The image the state has put forth during the

years Toney Anaya has been in office has been much more one that would scare off any potential entrant who might bring new jobs to New Mexico.

So bad is our position in this matter now that it will almost surely take the full term of the next governor, and maybe more, to repair the injury that has been done us.

That makes this particular ability a matter of highest moment in the person we select to move in behind Anaya when he goes. We can't overlook the basic abilities a governor always needs but we must give extra emphasis to this one because of present circumstances.

Don't hesitate to test and measure everyone who tells us he wants the governor's job on this point. If we choose wrongly again, we will be so far behind we may never catch up with the rest of the Sun Belt states.

Well, they're at it again. The members of the Board of Finance—or almost all of them—want to have another go at re-funding the state's outstanding severance tax bonds. When they tried that recently, you will recall, the Supreme Court shot down their big plans.

The new proposal rests on pretty much the same ground as the last one; it is expected, we are told, to save the state from \$8.5 million to \$9.6 million by getting us lower interest rates and reducing our future debt service. Once again, however, we have the basic problems that almost all those involved in the proposal, the folks who are reassuring us that it is a bully program, are themselves going to profit financially from its executions.

That's the kind of thing that kept one member of the Board from voting for the new proposal. He's the newest member of that group, Al Pitts, a Santa Fe attorney who was one of Toney Anaya's

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assistants in the Attorney General's office. He objects to the fact that E. F. Hutton, the brokerage house that was retained as financial advisor to the state in such matters, drew up plans for the refinancing and then resigned to take part in the execution of the project as underwriter at a hefty prospective profit.

We can count on the fact that former state bond attorney Walter Kegel will be scrutinizing the new plan as carefully as he did the one the courts turned down. He will almost surely be communicating with us through his ally in this matter, State Auditor Al Romero.

These folks in Santa Fe just don't quit—which means we have to keep our eyes on them at all times.

One thing that struck me when I moved here last summer was the western history and culture in this area.

Growing up back East, I read tales of the Old West in books and saw images of it on television, but being out here really gives me a feel for the era. Sure, we had our share of history, but I think that cowboys and shoot-outs are more exciting than pilgrims and Plymouth Rock, and definitely more colorful.

The Old West lives on everyday in artifacts, structures and people throughout this region. Even commonly-worn cowboy hats and boots convey that western flavor. (Growing up in Rhode Island, I never saw anyone in pilgrim garb during my daily interactions).

Last weekend, the Old West came alive with the Pony Express Race, Lincoln Days parade and "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid!" pageant. Old Lincoln Days kindles the pioneer spirit in everyone and brings it to life around us: the sights of men in chaps and ladies in long dresses, the sounds of the muskets and the smell of the gunpowder mixed with the scent of an open campfire.

The Old West continues on stage this month as Ruidoso Little Theatre (RLT) presents "The Death and Life of Sneaky Fitch," a western farcical tragedy by James Rosenberg which opens tonight (Thursday) at the patio area of the Gazebo Shopping Center.

The play is set in Gopher Gulch, Out West, a town which the narrator says could be in Arizona, Colorado or New Mexico. Unlike the Billy the Kid pageant, "The Death and Life of Sneaky Fitch" is about mythical characters in a fictional western town.

"Gopher Gulch is the epitome and the essence and, yes, dag nab it, the quintessence of the Old West ... the world of folklore and fiction," the cowboy-narrator tells the audience at the play's beginning.

Gopher Gulch is an exciting little town with a colorful collection of residents. Sneaky Fitch (played by Jack Muhn) is the town's cowardly bum who is transformed into a gun-wielding bully. Rackham (Jett Crouse) is a fast gun who struts slowly and purposely, with his hand at his holster.

Maroon (Julia Bates), the saloon girl, is said to have "morals of base metal, but a heart of gold." Doc Burch (Joe Maloy), on his

broomstick horse, enjoys a bit too much medicinal alcohol.

Other characters include the town sheriff, undertaker, banker-preacher (I guess they moonlighted back then, too) and their gossipy wives.

The play begins with the mellow strains of a western guitar. The moonlight over the towering pine tree at the Gazebo creates a magic atmosphere that begins the show.

The lights come on, revealing a western town. The delightfully detailed set includes a jail, saloon, apothecary and red-bricked bank.

The play is classified as a horse-opera, a western farcical tragedy. I won't give away the plot, but I will tell you that the show has many funny and exciting moments.

Director Betsy Muhn has done the show twice before. Muhn said that audiences usually enjoy the play a lot.

"It's fun to do. Most people would like to visit the Old West—this is their chance to do it," said Muhn. "It's a fun show."

I always enjoy seeing new people on stage, and this play has been no exception. As the business reporter, I cover the Ruidoso Lodgers Association and their president, Bill Rawlins. Until this week, I didn't know that Bill could play such a great cowboy (it's a shame he gets shot, but he dies well).

The cast contains many newcomers as well as RLT regulars. Tom Muhn, who designed and created the sets, is the narrator. Mark Wornack strums the guitar. Other cast members include Bill Don, Sandy, Cisco and Nikki Knox, Dave Whatley, Bill and Sandra Weber, Bonita Baker, John Raulerson and Ham Hamblin.

As with any production, this one has not been without frequent rehearsals. Passers-by occasionally think they've stepped into a time warp, or something worse.

A co-worker, Kristie Jones, lives behind the Gazebo. She came to work one morning, reporting on a houseguest's observation of her "neighbors."

"You have weird neighbors, they play with cap guns and hoot and holler at night," Kristie told me her visiting friend said.

No, not strange neighbors—just actors having a good time preparing a play for audiences to enjoy.

"The Death and Life of Sneaky Fitch" opens at 8 p.m. today in the Gazebo. The show will run for three weekends.





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
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
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Bennett is a theater person from the beginning

In the tradition of the Oscars and the Tonys, Ruidoso Little Theatre (RLT) will present the Betty Awards in September. The awards are named for the co-founder of RLT, Betty Bennett.

Bennett grew up in Ruidoso. Her parents, Helen and Clayton Bennett, have had Bennett's Indian Shop for 59 years.

A member of the first class to go from seventh through 12th grade in the "new high school" (now Ruidoso Middle School), Bennett recalled that her "large" graduating class of 18 took a trip to Long Beach, California.

"It was my first and last trip on a roller-coaster," laughed Bennett, a lady who loves to laugh.

Bennett studied drama at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales and has lived in various places all over the country, including Florida, Arizona and Wisconsin. No matter where she has been, Bennett calls Ruidoso "home" and has always returned here.

In her cheerful home, decorated with Indian art and theater memorabilia, Bennett discussed the origins of RLT. Bennett and friend Joan Marie Griffith started RLT in 1980, however, Bennett traces the theater's origin back 30 years before that.

"It started with two little girls in the 1950s. We decided that when we grew up we wanted a theater in Ruidoso," said Bennett of herself and Griffith.

The girls grew up and went their separate ways, but re-joined forces five years ago. Bennett, who was working as a cashier at K-Bob's, talked with owner D.H. McIlwain about the lack of activities around K-Bobs on Monday nights. They came up with the idea of dinner theater.

Bennett thought McIlwain was kidding. He wasn't.

"Okay big mouth, what next," she laughed, recalling her first thought when she realized the plan was for real. She called Griffith and RLT was born.

The two chose "Hanky Panky in Harmony Valley," a melodrama written by Bennett herself, for the first production. They called for auditions, had a large turnout and cast "The Astonished Heart," and both plays were rehearsed simultaneously.

Bennett recalls building the set for "Hanky Panky."

"Five women showed up with two screwdrivers, a little hammer and a wrench," she laughed. "We put plywood and two-by-fours together and funny-looking legs that wobbled," with the help of a workman who lent them a "real hammer."

They performed the show for five Mondays, putting up the set on Sundays and taking it down on Mondays, after K-Bob's closed each night. Bennett said the after-dinner audiences were good, especially for Mondays.

After the K-Bob's stint, the troupe moved to The Chaparral. At this time, they were called the Back

Door Theatre "because people were afraid the whole thing would fall on their heads if they came in the front door," said Bennett.

"We kept stumbling along, but by this time 'Hanky Panky' had made a name for itself and we started doing it on Friday and Saturday," said Bennett, describing the theater's progression.

One of her favorite anecdotes was when the upstairs plumbing broke. Bennett noticed from the stage that a man in the audience was holding a newspaper over his head to keep dry. Before she had a chance to apologize to the man, he approached her.

"Oh, I loved your play, but I don't know how you did it—how did you make it rain on cue?" Bennett recalled the man asking, in full seriousness.

Bennett said her favorite thing about RLT is the people.

"There's so much talent in Ruidoso," she said. She said she enjoys seeing all the new people who

continually get involved with RLT. Everyone in RLT volunteers their time and talent. Sometimes, during 3 a.m. set-building sessions, Bennett would pop up and remind the tired workers that they are "having fun."

"I've been threatened, but never killed yet," she chortled.

As Bennett's first love is comedy and laughter, her second is mystery. After a year hiatus from RLT, she will direct Agatha Christie's "A Murder is Announced," in November. Bennett is excited about the play, which features Miss Jane Marple, "an adorable little lady who knits and observes human nature."

Bennett works as a communications officer for the Ruidoso Police Department (nightly graveyard shift) and volunteers her time to the White Mountain Search and Rescue team.

Bennett said sometimes her two volunteer organizations work together. For example, RLT helped

the White Mountain group do a haunted house and other fundraisers.

"That's typical of Ruidoso. We always find time to help those who need it," she said.

Bennett's hopes for the future of RLT include a permanent theater building. She'd also like to see the group do an older classic, such as

"Harvey," and a George Gershwin musical.

For now, the theater has the First Annual Betty Awards Ceremony on September 14. How does it feel to have an award named after you?

"It's a neat, neat thing. I couldn't believe it when they told me," said the special lady for whom the award is named.
