



The National Weather Service in Roswell has predicted mostly fair weather except for scattered afternoon thundershowers for today. Winds are expected to be southerly from five to 15 miles per hour. Controversy builds in murder case

Some evidence gathered at the scene of a Lincoln County double murder last year would probably be inadmissible in a court of law, according to 12th District Attorney (DA) James Weldon.

Weldon, in Ruidoso for a Friday morning news conference, revealed that he will not pursue the Lincoln County sheriff's request for an arrest warrant on a suspect in the deaths of Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight, because the evidence is "well-tainted" and would not stand up in court. He aired other problems between his office and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office before about 25-30 representatives of the media, law enforcement and the McKnight family.

"No one can force me to act," said Weldon, who explained that it is his responsibility to prosecute the case. He displayed a thick document containing the sheriff's report, but he opined that the case would be "no billed" by a grand jury, and thus "lost forever" if pursued with that evidence.

Weldon said that Sheriff Tom Sullivan and his officers have failed to cooperate with the DA since Weldon took office January 2. The sheriff refused to "share" physical evidence, said Weldon.

Evidence that Weldon finds suspect includes fingerprints removed from a bottle found on the McKnight's kitchen table and a projectile or bullet that was recovered from the ranch kitchen. According to Weldon, the bottle and bullet were "forgotten" during initial investigations which began November 15 when the bodies were discovered.

Even though undersheriff Charlie Cox released the scene on November 17, the bottle was not taken from the premises until November 20, and thus was unsecured for several days, he said. The projectile was also discovered on November 20, he added.

Weldon said a large group, including two suspects, had access to the ranch house between November 17 and November 20 when the two pieces of evidence were retrieved.

Weldon also revealed that he has pursued an independent investigation into the November murders at the McKnight's ranch home near Picacho. His conclusions have taken him in a different direction than that of the sheriff.

A Colt .38 caliber handgun is listed in the sheriff's affidavit for

arrest, but Weldon revealed that he was able, during his investigation, to locate that weapon, and has custody of it now. Weldon explained that by "following through" on his investigation of the gun, he was able to "rule it out" as the weapon used for the "headshots."

Both Cotton and Judy McKnight are believed to have been shot in the head after being murdered. That has led investigators to use the term "execution-style" when discussing the killings.

The DA said he began asking for information in January, and finally received the thick report three weeks ago, but still has no access to physical evidence.

Weldon further stated that he called for a joint task force in April, but was rebuffed by Sullivan. That's when he established his own investigation, and has continued with two investigators from the DA's office spending about "90 percent" of their time on the case.

Weldon, after reading a formal statement (see following text), answered questions on evidence, communications with the sheriff and future plans. The DA, who places the blame for not cooperating squarely on the sheriff, told reporters that he is ready to work with any other law enforcement group, including the sheriff.

He revealed that he had written the sheriff a letter, which was delivered Friday. He wouldn't reveal the contents, but said the next move should be the sheriff's.

Weldon continues to be critical of the amount of information furnished to the press by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office immediately after the murders, saying "he didn't hold back a thing."

Joe McKnight, the father of murder victim Cotton McKnight, was on hand for the conference, and had some questions of his own. McKnight wonders why the New Mexico State Police were called off the case.

"I think you've done a fine job," McKnight told the DA, whom he said he had never met. He also said he had nothing to do with a petition being circulated by two other family members, calling for a grand jury to investigate the evidence in the case.

That petition, being circulated by Judy McKnight's sister Terrie Bussey and Cotton's brother Donald Frank "Pancho" McKnight, could convene a grand jury in spite of the DA's refusal to call for one. Before filing the petition, the two must secure the signatures of 200 Lincoln County

residents. Weldon insists that current evidence is insufficient, adding that a case lost in grand jury cannot be brought back without new evidence.

"I don't think the sheriff has done too damn much to help the case along," said Joe McKnight, who is critical of handling of evidence at the scene. "Everybody in Lincoln County, was in and out of that house," he said.

McKnight said that he has asked Governor Toney Anaya to reassign state police to the investigation. He revealed the names of two people he believes to be the sheriff's suspects, that he is sure are not guilty.

He wonders why the sheriff is so sure of the date of the murders, when he believes the autopsy lists "date unknown" under time of death.

"I told them one of their suspects," said McKnight.

Weldon said he's ready for a "peace conference," but when contacted by telephone Sunday, Sheriff Sullivan said he'd have to have his attorney present for any such conference after the way Weldon has "assassinated his character" and "cast doubt on the ability" of his investigators.

Sullivan, who feels sure his office maintained the integrity of all evidence gathered at the scene, is firmly convinced that he has enough evidence to seek an arrest.

"The crime scene was roped off," said Sullivan, who added that he placed a 24-hour guard at the ranch until all evidence was gathered. He said a vodka bottle found on November 20, evidently the one described by Weldon, was not included in those that were fingerprinted.

The sheriff said his office has turned over all evidence to DA investigator Leandro Vega, and has cooperated fully throughout the investigation. Physical evidence requested on April 16, was already in the hands of the laboratories where testing was being performed, said Sullivan.

He explained that lab submittal forms preclude having evidence tested at more than one facility, as recommended by Weldon.

"All the communications between us and his office have been one way," said Sullivan. He said the letter he received Friday offered no suggestions or recommendations about future cooperative efforts.

Sullivan had a press conference this morning (Monday) in the Lincoln County Suboffice.

Weldon explains action on investigation

The following is the text of the formal statement delivered by 12th District Attorney James Weldon during a Friday press conference:

"Since Sheriff Sullivan has seen fit to air in public our differences in regard to the McKnight murder case, I want to set the record straight as to our involvement.

"On January 2, 1985, the day I was sworn in, I talked to Sheriff Sullivan and said that I thought he and his department were giving out too much information in regard to their investigation. His response was, in effect, I know what I'm doing and you don't."

"In the early spring when it was obvious the investigation was going nowhere, I suggested to the sheriff that we form a task force with state and local investigators, and federal help if possible, to see if we couldn't solve the case.

"Again, the suggestion was rejected. Apparently the sheriff's concern was that if the case was solved, his office would have to share the glory.

"In April I was advised that the sheriff was threatening to go to the media, radio, TV and newspaper, if I didn't mind my own business. Well, I considered it my business, so on April 16 I wrote the sheriff a letter. In this letter I called his attention to 29-1-1 of the New Mexico statutes which makes it his duty to cooperate with and assist the district attorney. I asked that my investigator, Leandro Vega, be given the evidence, since I had made arrangements with the New Mexico crime lab to give me whatever help they could. I received a nasty letter back not only refusing my request, but also calling it unreasonable.

"Since the sheriff was dead-set against cooperating in any way, I directed two of my investigators to commence an independent investigation. As a result, and with no help from the sheriff, we have developed evidence and witnesses which cast serious doubt on the validity of the sheriff's well-

tainted and massive investigation. I will get to the specifics shortly.


"Let me say here that the so-called petition for grand jury will not upset me, but it may upset the family members if they are not made aware of the implications. If such a grand jury was convened for the specific purpose of investigating my office's handling of the sheriff's report and investigation, no problem would be presented. I'm sure such a grand jury would agree that the evidence in its present state is insufficient.

"However, if the grand jury is called for the purpose of acting on Sheriff Sullivan's report and the grand jury files a 'no bill,' the case is lost forever. New Mexico statute 31-6-11.1 says, 'after a grand jury acts on the merits of evidence presented to it and returns a no-bill, the same matter shall not be presented again to that jury or another grand jury on the same evidence.'

"This is why it behooves my office to be very careful in deciding whether any case should be presented to a grand jury.

"Neither I personally, nor my office have anything to gain by delaying this case. Except for Sheriff Sullivan, no one is pressuring me to act or not to act. As I pointed out in my recent letter to Sheriff Sullivan, the evidence presented is, in my opinion, insufficient to present to a grand jury. Prosecutorial decisions are made by me, and no one can force me to act if I feel that such action is premature. I violate no law if my decision is based upon sound logic. That is what I am doing here. I am declining further action at this time because I do not have a reasonable probability of success.

"This does not mean that we will stop our investigation. To the contrary, we intend to press ahead as forcefully as we can. We have some additional leads which we have developed, and maybe, with a little luck, we will be able to solve this case."



Heavenly wins All-American Derby in exciting weekend

Sunday

Roy Browning's speedy filly Heavenly raced to a one-length upset in Sunday's \$992,213 All American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The main event highlighted a program that saw the mountain track's Pic-Six events carry over to \$40,524. The pool will open with that amount when racing resumes at 1 p.m. Thursday - kicking off the final week of the 1985 season.

Heavenly was let loose at 10-1 odds by 6,125 fans on hand for the 11th running of the All American Derby. Eastex and Yankee Dash shared the role of favorite, both heading postward at 5-2.

Eastex was making his first stakes appearance since capturing the Golden State Derby at Bay Meadows this spring. He was the winner of last summer's \$2.53 million All American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, and named Champion 2-year-old gelding in 1984 by the American Quarter Horse Association.

Yankee Dash was trying for her first stakes victory after finishing fifth in the Kansas Derby and third in the Rainbow Derby earlier in the meet.

After eight straight starts as the wagering favorite, Sixty Chick left the gates as the third choice at 4-1. The multiple stakes winner was dubbed Champion 2-year-old filly in '84 by the AQHA.

Next on the board was Miss Miteo (6-1). Kansas Derby winner Flow Of Cash was fifth at 8-1, and Heavenly the sixth choice to win the Derby.

Rounding out the field were: Aamerican Speed, Sir Alibi, Bad And Glad and Dash For Destiny.

The field of all-star dashers was no match for Heavenly, who had her sights set on the \$424,688 winner's check a few steps out of the gate. Regular rider Steve Harris piloted the filly to an early lead on the field and was never seriously

untreated while urging her to the wire in 21.38 seconds - a new stakes record for the Derby.

Heavenly returned a handsome \$22 win payoff. Jack Brooks trains the Oklahoma-bred for Browning, a resident of Ft. Worth. The win hiked Heavenly's lifetime earnings to \$413,290.

She's won nine of her 15 career starts, finishing second in another five races.

A length back of Heavenly for runner-up money of \$177,272 was Miss Miteo, who finished a half-length in front of Yankee Dash, who collected third-place money of \$82,897.

The remaining order of finish with purse money earned was: 4th - Sixty Chick, \$58,666; 5th - Flow Of Cash, \$47,188; 6th - Eastex, \$44,636; 7th - Aamerican Speed, \$42,086; 8th - Dash For Destiny, \$40,811; 9th - Sir Alibi, \$38,260; and 10th - Bad And Glad, \$35,709.

Eastex' winnings vaulted him to the no. 1 position on the all-time earnings list, surpassing Mr Master Bug's record at retirement last year. Eastex has now earned \$1,836,179 from 20 lifetime appearances.

Racing resumes on Thursday at Ruidoso Downs, as the track moves into the final week of the 1985 season. Thursday's program features the \$10,000-added Road Runner Handicap at 6 furlongs. First post through Sunday is 1 p.m.

Monday's Labor Day program closes out the meeting with the featured \$2.53 million All American Futurity - the world's richest quarter horse event. An early 11 a.m. post is scheduled to allow for the live telecast of the Futurity by Winner Communications of Tulsa, Ok.

Saturday

Sounds Sharp flashed her patented stretch drive down the grandstand lane in Saturday's

featured Miss New Mexican Handicap at Ruidoso Downs, kicking mud in the face of Giboulee Wood to win the quarter-mile sprint easily.

In the co-featured 1st Consolation of the \$1.25 million All American Derby, Big John Mito pulled off a major upset racing to a decisive victory at 5-1 odds.

The mountain track's Pic-Six events eluded fans for the third straight day. Sunday's program opens with a carryover of \$24,730.

Sounds Sharp broke as the odds-on choice to win the \$9,450 Miss New Mexican Handicap, which featured a field of eight 3-year-old fillies over 6 furlongs.

Second in the wagering was Giboulee Wood, who left the gates at 5-1. Tilt To Win, winner of the Aspen Handicap in June, was third on the boards at more than 9-1.

Outsider Kelly Crimmon led the field through fairly quick fractions to the half-way mark before fading out of contention. Giboulee Wood, who had been tracking the leader through the back side, made her rally rounding the stretch bend under Jerry Rodriguez.

Tilt To Win made a bold move around the final turn to challenge Giboulee Wood, and it appeared those two would have to match strides for the winner's share.

Leading rider Joe Martinez brought Sounds Sharp to within four lengths of the leaders rounding the turn and then proceeded to storm past the twosome to win by a widening 1 1/2 lengths.

Giboulee Wood held off Tilt To Win by three-quarter lengths for the place. Tilt To Win finished another 1 1/2 lengths ahead of Kelly Crimmon, the early pacesetter.

Sounds Sharp was the only horse eligible for a Breeders' Cup bonus. Owners Bill Clifton Jr. and John May of Waco, Texas, collected total purse money of \$8,910. The final time was 1:15 seconds over a muddy track.

The winner returned \$3, \$2.60 and \$2.20. Giboulee Wood paid \$3.40 and \$2.80. Tilt To Win's third was worth \$2.20.

Friday

Sitting On Go stuck his head out for a \$12,853 paycheck in the Second Consolation of the \$1.25 million All American Derby on Friday at Ruidoso Downs.

The quarter-mile dash carried a gross purse of \$86,926. The race followed the Pic-Six events at the mountain track, which carried over to \$11,300 for Saturday's program.

Jockey Markel Hardin's victory aboard Sitting On Go in the main event came as somewhat of a surprise. The 3-year-old colt was let loose at nearly 12-1 odds, well behind 3-2 favorite Miss Shuck N Jive.

Budget Approval, a 19-1 outsider, took the early lead out of the gate for the 440-yard run. Sitting On Go caught the darkhorse at the gap and hooked with 7-2 shot For Tears Only down to the wire. In the photo finish it was Sitting On Go by a head.

The winner paid \$25.60, \$11.20 and \$8 across the board. Jack Herby trains Sitting On Go for owner Robert Hnulk of Lakewood, N.M.

For Tears Only, who raced as a B.F. Phillips Jr.-owned entry with Takethecashandrunk, returned \$6 and \$3.60. Rons Intrigue was another head back in third. At 23-1 odds, he paid \$3.20 for the show.

Early leader Budget Approval faded to finish fourth, while Miss Shuck N Jive came in fifth off a dull effort out of the gate.

Sitting On Go stepped the 440 yards in 22 seconds over a course listed as sloppy from rains early on the afternoon program. It was the colt's second stakes victory this year.

He captured the Jayhawker Derby at La Mesa Park in mid-July. Friday's victory boosted his '85 earnings to \$40,133.

Thursday

Elbert Minchey, the 48-year-old jockey who rode in the first All-

American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs in 1959, showed he still has the winning touch posting a major upset in Thursday's feature dash at this mountain track.

A \$4,549 Pic-Six pool carried over to Friday when 3,493 fans were unable to peg the winners of the fifth through tenth races. That program gets under way at noon and spotlights a fine field for the \$100,000 2nd Consolation of the All-American Derby.

Minchey was aboard 9-1 outsider Noble Pride in Thursday's 440-yard headliner, breaking from the number two post next to 5-2 favorite New Years Special on the rail.

At the bell, New Years Special opened a small lead on the field under Steve Harris. But Minchey quickly made up ground, catching stride-for-stride down to the wire to prevail by a nose.

The final time was a respectable 21.98 seconds into a headwind. The track was listed as sloppy from a cloudburst earlier in the day.

Noble Pride rewarded his backers with mutuels of \$20, \$5.40 and \$3.20. Bobby Willis trains the winner for owner Audrey Carlisle of Midland, Texas.

New Years Special was a length the best of third-place finisher Rollin In Dough, who went postward as the second choice to win the main event. New Years Special paid \$3.60 and \$2.40. Kevin Cogburn was aboard Rollin In Dough to return \$2.60.

Wednesday

A matchup between Dashing Phoebe and Brigand Silk in the upcoming \$2.53 million All-American Futurity was shelved when Brigand Silk scratched from final time trials for the world's richest quarter horse event on Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs.

Brigand Silk shattered Ruidoso Downs' 400-yard track record in winning the Rainbow Futurity last month, and was undefeated in seven races.

Racing fans had hoped the grey Bedulmo colt would join Dashing Phoebe in the final field for the Labor Day classic, which carries \$1 million to the winner.

Jack Dube, who conditions Brigand Silk, notified the Ruidoso Downs Racing Office Wednesday morning that the California-bred would not be lining up for Wednesday's All-American Futurity trials.

The horse is reported to have strained suspensory ligaments and will be laid off from racing for several months.

In the absence of Brigand Silk, Dashing Phoebe shared the top qualifying spot in final time trials with Mr Trucka Jet. They both won their quarter-mile divisions in 21.83 seconds.

Dashing Phoebe is likely to head postward as the overwhelming favorite to win the 1985 All-American Futurity. The daughter of two-time World Champion Dash For Cash already has captured two Grade I stakes.

She won the Sun Country Futurity this spring at Sunland Park before shipping to Ruidoso for an impressive accounting in the Kansas Futurity - the opening leg of this mountain track's Triple Crown series.

Trainer Don Farris announced after the Kansas that Dashing Phoebe would pass the Rainbow Futurity to concentrate on the more lucrative and prestigious All-American Futurity. The filly appears to be coming on strong off the two-month rest, having daylighted competition in both rounds of trials for the Futurity.

Mr Trucka Jet surprised a few of the 4,018 fans on hand for the afternoon program. Although he went postward as the favorite to win his division, the Easy Jet colt was not expected to equal Dashing Phoebe's quick clocking earlier on the program.

Joining the top three contenders for the All-American Futurity on Labor Day will be: Six Fortunes, Racin Image, Easy One Fine Day, Muscatel, Sixarun, Timeto Get Tuff and Digging For Gold.

State to pursue film industry

Paul Lazarus, newly appointed New Mexico Film Commissioner, said he will aggressively pursue the production of films, television shows, commercials and videos in New Mexico.

Lazarus was in Ruidoso recently for a meeting of the state Board of Economic Development and Tourism. He told the board and the Ruidoso audience that the market is extremely competitive for bringing films into states.

Lazarus said that Texas and other states actively work on bringing the film industry to their locations. He said he hoped New Mexico would follow that lead.

Lazarus recently moved to Santa Fe from Los Angeles, California, where he produced five movies—including "West World," "Barbarella" and "Capricorn One"—and worked as production head for three studios.

Lazarus told the group that movie executives in Los Angeles and New York choose locations for their productions on the basis of aesthetics and economics. He said he feels New Mexico meets both criteria.

According to Lazarus, New Mexico has a good labor history and comparably low taxes. Combining the economic factors with the

"Land of Enchantment" scenery makes New Mexico an attractive package for production companies.

Lazarus said he would like to see New Mexicans become skilled in the technical aspects of production, so companies do not have to bring in a lot of workers from other areas. Having local professionals would not only save the companies money (making the state a more favorable location) but also would create jobs for locals.

"There's a great deal of business out there," said Lazarus.


The former movie producer said he felt his background gave him a special perspective into the problems of location production and integrating a film crew into a local community. Lazarus said necessary parts of his job will be making communities aware of the benefits of capital infusion and showing film companies how to work with communities.

Lazarus said one problem with location work is (price gouging, something he hopes New Mexico businesses will not do.

The new commissioner said his immediate goal is to increase the amount of production in New Mexico. His long range goals include building sound stages and serving as an intermediary between venture capitalists and film crews.

Lazarus said he would promote film production statewide.

"New Mexico is more than Albuquerque and Santa Fe," he said. "All you have to do is look out of the window to see the benefits of the Ruidoso area."

Tax amnesty is granted

If you have not paid your state taxes yet, you may do so without incurring late penalties for the next 90 days, announced Governor Toney Anaya during a recent visit to Ruidoso.

Anaya discussed the tax amnesty program at a meeting of the state Economic Development and Tourism Board. The program, which went into effect on August 14, gives businesses and individuals until November 13 to pay their taxes without penalty or charges, no questions asked.

"We'll just take their money and say 'thank you,'" said the governor.

The tax amnesty program is preliminary to the new computerized system that the state will implement by the end of this calendar year. According to the governor, non-payers will be easier to identify with the new system.

Anaya said the new system will initiate a comprehensive program to make sure that everyone registers and pays taxes.





Lincoln Town drills well

Water is a vital resource to any community, no matter how large or small.

Lincoln Town, although not officially an incorporated village, is made up of a group of residents with common needs, including water. Last year when the community well began to show traces of pollution, the residents took action.

According to Edward Penfield, chairman of the Lincoln Water Association (a non-profit volunteer group) the residents had a new well drilled with private funds. The well was engineered by Jack Atkins of Atkins-Landfair Engineering of Roswell.

Penfield said the new well is in a higher strata of water than the old one, decreasing the chances of pollution.

The well was drilled, but the

funds were short, Penfield said. He said that the association applied for Community Development Block Grants and was granted \$60,000 this spring.

The association is responsible for paying \$20,000 toward the water system, as part of the grant agreement, Penfield said. Work has progressed on the water system, with rehabilitation of many old water lines. A storage tank also was included in the system updating.

The Lincoln Water Association began in 1957, with the installation of the well and system for \$9,000, Penfield said.

Penfield said the Lincoln water system cannot increase the number of users because of the limited water rights the association owns for the well.



Committee to seek new cemetery site

Ruidoso's Cemetery Advisory Committee will ask the Ruidoso Village Council to appoint a committee to identify possible sites for a new cemetery.

During a committee meeting Thursday the members reviewed a map of the current cemetery and agreed that most plots are sold, and soon the village will need a new cemetery.

Bob Jarvis, the village employee charged with overseeing the municipal cemetery, recommended that land between Alto and the Sierra Blanca Airport site be considered. "I'd get at least 20 acres," he said.

Alma Russell suggested that Lincoln County be invited to participate in a joint project.

Jarvis reported that he is attempting to maintain and care for cemetery grounds, but added that new curbing is complicating that process. Some curbs are too high, and lawn maintenance equipment can't go over it, said Jarvis.

J.D. James suggested that the committee ask the village to purchase a smaller backhoe and a new lowering device.

Jarvis agreed that the backhoe would help, but said a lowering device has already been ordered. He is currently using a device which belongs to Clarke's Chapel of Roses.

"We couldn't do without Clarke's, they help us all the time," added Jarvis.

Helga Haake recommended that hillside sites, which are very rocky, be considered as sites for burying cremation urns. Billee Clarke opin-

ed that there's not much interest in cremation in Ruidoso.

"We haven't put anybody in the wrong place," said Jarvis as he reported on progress he's made as cemetery caretaker. "They were putting people in the wrong places and having to dig them up," he added.

"I've even planted flowers for people," said Jarvis, who stressed the importance of maintaining the cemetery.

James complained that artificial grass is not being used to cover excavated dirt during burial services, but Clarke disagreed. More grass has been ordered, she said.

"Let's get busy and find some land," said Clarke as the meeting adjourned.



Council hears lively debate of senior topics

The Ruidoso Village Council and the Adult Recreation Advisory Board discussed the future of the Ruidoso Senior Citizens Center Friday during a joint workshop.

Mayor Pro-Tem Jerry Shaw opened the meeting with background on the ad hoc committee that was the forerunner of the advisory board. Shaw explained that ad hoc recommendations were presented to the council and some budget items were increased to allow their implementation.

Funds were included to increase usage of the center's van and for postage so that a newsletter could be mailed, said Shaw. She said she became concerned when those things weren't happening.

Future options for the center might be to continue with present activities, close the center or put it in the Parks and Recreation Department, said Shaw, before she invited comments from the council and the audience.

"Seniors are quite independent," said Barney Waldrop, chairman of the advisory board. He opined that senior citizens would be very reluctant to volunteer at the center.

Waldrop explained that senior citizens often feel rejected, and need a place to go, adding that he feels the present center adequately serves such a need.

"We feel very fortunate in having Bette (Romans) and Angie (Garmes) as our personnel because they really care about us ... they love us," he said. Romans is director of the center and Garmes is her assistant.

Waldrop warned councillors that senior citizens make up a strong voting block, and intend to keep Romans and Garmes at the center. "Any movement of them would be detrimental to them that start it," he stated emphatically.

Shaw, who assured Waldrop that she "is not counting votes," said she intended to allay his fears. She said that the small "nucleus" of regulars who participate at the center don't necessarily justify the

\$50,000-a-year budget. Burdette Stampley, a member of the advisory board and minister of the Episcopal Church of the Holy Mount, stated that senior citizens provide a great deal of volunteer service in his church. Stampley talked of centers in other cities which provide both recreation and direct services.

"I have a feeling that there is some resistance to adding direct services, ... to staffing by adding volunteers, ... and to the frail elderly," said Stampley. He advocates that the center "evolve changes as needs are discovered."

Dick Shaw, who stated that he is a senior citizen and formerly directed two senior citizens centers, stated that "all we need is more activities and more people."

Shaw's statement that he would be amenable to having coffee with friends at the center "if there was a coffeepot there," was greeted by an outburst from audience member Flora Elliott, who stood to demand the floor.

Before yielding the floor, Shaw

went on record as offering the services of his band to play for two center dances at no charge.

Elliott, who declined to take the microphone, informed Shaw, the council and the audience that there is a coffeepot at the center, and there are dances.

Verna Adams, executive director of Home Health Services and a member of the advisory board, said that she is completely satisfied with current center activities, but stressed that "we need more."

Transportation to doctors, the hospital and shopping is "desperately needed," she said. Sybill Riddle, a member of the advisory board, said she thought that board was organized to "reactivate the center. We have nothing going on," she added.

Jay Riddle said he was asked to serve on the advisory board, but declined after being told by the director (Romans) that she would not work with the board.

Romans stated that she didn't say that.

P&Z approves all items, discusses livestock in village

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) approved every item on the agenda during Thursday's special meeting in Village Hall, and then discussed "livestock in subdivisions."

Commissioner Mike Callaghan voiced concern over the fact that Ruidoso has no ordinance that prohibits raising livestock in the village limits.

Restrictive covenants in some subdivisions address that issue, but the village has no authority to enforce those covenants, opined village enforcement officer Paul Davis.

Some village properties have been designed as suitable places to raise animals, said commissioner Reed Stirman. Discussion continued on lot size and enforcement.

"I can't see arbitrarily banning animals," said Village Councillor Bill Karn, who also brought up the question of future annexations of

areas with animals in residence.

"I wouldn't think you could grandfather in animals," said commissioner Don Shaw, who acted as chairman during the meeting.

P&Z chairman Greg Masters, vice-chairman Ray Bishop and commissioner Mill Alcorn didn't attend the meeting, which was scheduled to replace Monday's regular meeting, at which a quorum was not reached. Five members, a quorum, attended Thursday.

Commissioner Martin Rose suggested that P&Z recommend to Mayor George White that the size of the commission be increased to nine members. Rose also suggested that the mayor should begin considering replacements for some current members.

"It looks like we may be losing some," added Rose.

In other business, the commission:

—Approved a replat and rear lot line variances for La Tierra Condos, Lot 8, Block 5, White Mountain

Estates, Unit 4, for Johnny F. Mobley and William Jourdan, as requested by Tim Collins.

—Approved the division of Lot 6, a tract of land in Lot 6, Block 6, White Mountain Estates, Unit 4, for BJT Partnership, as requested by Collins.

—Approved a replat of lots 1-7, Block 12, White Mountain Heights, for Don F. Reynolds, as requested by Collins.

—Approved a plat of lots 14A and 15A, Block 1, Camelot Mountain Tracts for TES Investments, Inc., as requested by Collins.

—Reviewed commercial development plans for a building addition on Lot 3, Block 1, Airport West for Stan Jackson.

—Reviewed commercial development plans for an office/reception center on a part of Tract L, Pinecliff subdivision for Crown Point Corporation, as requested by Don Voss. The double-wide mobile home was approved for six months with the stipulation that it be skirted and landscaped.

—Heard Davis remind commissioners that the next P&Z meeting will be at 3 p.m. Tuesday, September 3, because the first Monday of September is a holiday.

—Heard Davis announce that Shaw is scheduled to be the P&Z representative to the Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday.

—Heard Davis report a three-session workshop with BRW, P&Z and the council beginning at 4 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, September 16-18, in council chambers of Village Hall.

—Approved moving the starting time on P&Z's September 16 meeting from 3 to 2 p.m.

—Said good-by to P&Z secretary Becky Morris, and welcomed new P&Z secretary Linda Mallett.

Airport commission opens engineering bids

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission opened 11 engineering proposals at the Lincoln County courthouse in Carrizozo Thursday afternoon.

Although the commission did not have a quorum, the proposals were opened to list the firms that had submitted bids. Commission members Ken Nosker and Conrad Buchanan aided Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox in opening the proposals.

Leadshill-Herkenhoff of Albuquerque; Pettigrew and Associates of Clovis; Burton Engineers of Albuquerque; Pajo Engineers of Las Cruces; Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Lubbock, Texas; and Nims, Calvani and Associates of

Carlsbad were among the firms who submitted proposals.

Molzen-Corbin of Albuquerque; Flatow, Moore, Bryon and Associates of Albuquerque; Isbill and Associates of Denver, Colorado; Boyav Engineers of Albuquerque; and Burke-Collins of Ruidoso also submitted proposals.

The proposals were for the engineering design, supervision, inspection and miscellaneous engineering services related to the construction of the new Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

According to the bid specifications, the project consists of the development of a 100- by 8,100-foot paved primary runway and a 60- by 6,500-foot graded and turfed crosswind runway, along with associated taxiways, aprons, terminal area, parking and lighting.

In addition, access roads, utilities and other required facilities are included in the project.

Project designs must meet Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) criteria. The designs are subject to review and approval of the airport commission, the FAA and the New Mexico Transportation Department Aviation Division.

According to the bid specifications, the proposals will be evaluated on technical ability and approach to the project and the experience in airport design and project management. Understanding site and project problems and the cost also will be considered in the evaluation.

A meeting will be called for the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission to review the proposals, Cox said.

Village manager Jim Hine and assistant manager Frank Potter were in Albuquerque Thursday to meet with representatives of McCarty Construction Company and the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID).

Hine said plans for a cleanup were discussed, and McCarty revealed that the Dan Stevens and Associates geohydrology firm of Socorro has been hired for the project.

EID will oversee the extensive cleanup required of the area around Ruidoso's Hollywood well which has been contaminated by about 10,000 gallons of diesel fuel. The agency revealed last week that the contaminant leaked from an underground tank which belongs to McCarty Construction.

A determination on where to take the large volume of contaminated materials has not yet been made, according to Hine. A site will have to be located and included in any

final plans, he said.

The contamination was discovered when the Hollywood well was turned on July 29 to provide supplemental water for the overworked municipal system. The well was turned on at 11:30 a.m. and about 16,000 gallons of contaminated water was pumped into the distribution system before the well was shut down at noon.

"Time was of the essence," said Hine, as he commended "competent" village employees for their prompt response to the crisis.

"They didn't blink an eye ... they got right on it," he continued. "We are geared to work in times of emergency," he added.

Potter was assigned full-time to the water problem, and Hine said he stayed on it until the crisis was over.

"It's strictly a management game," said Potter, who not only

worked with crews investigating problems at the Hollywood well, but also coordinated the Eagle Creek well project. One of the new wells was called into emergency service, he said.

"Water would have been rationed without that new well," said Potter. He said production has still been a problem.

"We're trying to get Alto Lake in condition, not for this month, but for November and December," he said.

In the meantime, village residents are reminded that if water has an odor or appears to be contaminated, they should call Village Hall at 258-4014, and report the problem. EID has reported that because of "pockets" in the distribution system, water may become reaffected for several months.





Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—That great statewide reform of our educational system we were led to expect is likely to be put on hold.

Two things turn out to be true: The ordinary New Mexican proved not so clamorous in demands for reform of the schools as certain ambitious politicians had hoped; and the whole enterprise turned out to be altogether tougher than those who set out upon it so insouciantly had thought.

Here's how one of those "insider's newsletters" published in Santa Fe puts it and this one is known to be in frequent contact with Senator Les Houston, the Grand Panjandrum himself, who plants with its editor rumors Houston wants to get out to the general public: "The controlling forces in the state legislature (i. e., the conservatives) don't plan much real action this year in the higher education field. Their game plan is to focus on the public schools, their reform and reorientation. That will take the balance of this year, and if the legislators have their way, there will be a special session next Spring to be devoted to the schools."

Get that "next Spring." That's already pushing back the confrontation on this topic and once you start procrastinating, no telling where you stop.

The editor then goes on to add: "Some legislators don't expect too much to happen until 1987, but in that year the legislators expect to

concentrate on the fragmented system of higher education."

By 1987, please note, Toney Anaya, the man the conservative lawmakers love to hate, will have duly faded away. Thus, whatever plan for improving the state of schools finally emerges will not have his brand on it in any way.

That dust-up at the Penitentiary of New Mexico last Sunday night probably did little to make prison officials, already nervous about security in the new buildings scheduled to go into use next month, anxious to start transferring the population.

The troubles were brought to a quick end, without major bloodshed—which means they were handled as wardens and others should handle such experiences.

Prisoner complaints at the time had to do with the quality of food, always a touchy subject where men have little else to think about; the way visitors are hassled—at least as those who held the hostage see it; and the hourly wages paid for work in the food service and prison industries.

There would appear to be some justification to the complaints, though taking a corrections officer hostage and demanding a helicopter and plane are obviously not the way to go to solve problems.

Ever wonder why New Mexico has more alcohol-related traffic

fatalities than the national average? Try these numbers on for size: In a calendar year, New Mexicans drink 39,550,206 gallons of beer, 2,712,672 gallons of wine, and 2,352,713 gallons of other sorts of booze.

And those gross numbers don't really paint the true picture, because 75 percent of those totals are drunk by the 25 percent of our population that can legitimately be called serious drinkers.

And remember, if you fit into that category of imbibers but don't touch one of those particular categories of drink, somebody else is scarfing up your share.

That's why our traffic fatalities in which alcohol is involved are 65 percent of all such deaths each year.

Some words you might want to

keep in mind, from one of America's wisest essayists, E. B. White:

"I have yet to see a piece of writing, political or non-political, that doesn't have a slant. All writing slants the way its writer leans, and no man is born perpendicular, although many men are born upright. The beauty of the American free press is that the slants and the twists and the distortions come from so many directions, and the special interests are so numerous, the reader must sift and sort and check and counter-check in order to find out what the score is. This he does. It is only when a press gets its twist from a single source, as in the case of government-controlled press systems, the reader is licked."

On the Village Beat

Recently, President Reagan called for the greatest scientific minds in the country to put on their huge scientific thinking caps and come up with the know-how necessary to implement the President's "Star Wars" program.

This is intended to outsmart the Ruskies once and for all by making their missiles useless against our defenses. The spectacular system apparently will feature lasers zapping across the blackness of outer space and other such excitement.

Well, all that is certainly interesting, but what does it really mean in our daily lives?

Oh sure, nobody wants to get blown up by the Commies, but do we really worry about getting reduced to atoms as we do those things that are vital to our daily lives—like making sure we're getting our minimum daily requirements of essential vitamins and nutrients?

Probably not. So what we really need the scientific minds of the world to concentrate on are the problems of everyday life.

Getting up in the morning on time is a major world issue when thought of in terms of what's important in our daily lives. Collect a fee from those using the Village sidewalks (read premises) say, after 7:00 P.M. The money should go a long way toward defraying sanitation costs. The contribution to the Village General Fund may even allow for flying the Dallas Cowboys in for the next ski party.

UB40 has teamed up with Chrissie Hynde from the Pretenders for a reggae-style video of "I Got You Babe," the old Sonny and Cher hit.

The entire clip was filmed before and during an actual concert. Director Jonathan Demme ("Stop Making Sense") starts it off with the sound check during the day. Anticipation builds with shots of the traffic outside the theater, and the clip concludes with nighttime footage of the actual concert, highlighted by fireworks.

The music is superb, but the video as a whole is disappointing. A demme did capture one classic moment, however — a cleaning woman dancing to the music during the sound check.

Pepsi, anyone?
 The new WHAMI clip bears an uncanny resemblance to a soft-drink commercial. The dynamic duo take in the major sights of China, do a little people watching and have a press conference.

The clip climaxes with the boys playing live. Like WHAMI's other live clips, however, the sound is not necessarily in sync with the action. The boys simply dance around on stage while the song "Freedom" blares in the background.

Fans may argue that this clip shows a Disneyesque sense of music's universal appeal. But from this corner, it's nothing but naive escapism.

Mass confusion
 Oingo Boingo's "Weird Science" clip is based on the movie of the same name (about two nerds who create the "ideal" woman with the help of a computer), but it only makes sense if you've seen the film. Clips like this one don't wet your appetite; they just confuse.

The one saving grace in the clip is Danny Elfman, lead singer of the Boingo clan. He has a madman quality that pierces through the raster lines of the screen.

Tunes on Your TV
 On Saturday, the film "Rock, Rock, Rock," with Mr. Rock 'n' Roll Scandal, Alan Freed, will be shown on the USA Network's "Night Flight."

It doesn't quite deserve a place in rock 'n' roll's hall of fame, but it does include some classic Chuck Berry moves. And anyone who thinks that the camera has only recently become a factor in music should take a close look at this film.

Jill Whelan is almost (but not quite) your typical teenager

Nineteen-year-old Jill Whelan, who's spent the last seven seasons growing up on "The Love Boat" as Captain Stubing's (Gavin McLeod) daughter Vicki, hasn't led the life of a typical teenager. Yet she's written a new book, "Just for You," aimed at the female teen audience. It will come out this fall, kicking off a series of "Just for You" books written by others. (All will be published by Pinnacle Books.)

Talking with Miss Whelan, however, it becomes apparent that she really did experience many of the problems of a typical teen, despite her show-business background.

"Teenage girls are the absolute worst," she remembers. "They are the meanest. They go through all kinds

of changes and growing pains and insecurities, and they won't listen to anyone, especially their parents. I was pretty terrible. But the older I got, the more I came to see that what my mother said and predicted was really right."

In her book, Miss Whelan covers all kinds of teen problems, from dating to friends to beauty. "This book isn't a do and don't book, though. What I'm saying here is that this is what I was like and these are the mistakes I made. Here are the relationships I've had, the friends, and the enemies, and how my parents treated me."

In the past few years, Miss Whelan has used her position as a "Love Boat" star to do a host of good works. She's hosted several Variety Club of American telethons, which have raised millions of dollars for charity. She has also worked closely with Nancy Reagan's Action Against Drug Abuse organization, touring the country and lecturing to groups of young people.

"The publishers wanted someone to write a book like mine, and I think they chose me because through teaching courses against drugs I've really been able to get through to kids."

Miss Whelan vehemently denies a published report in a respected national television magazine that her character, Vicki, will become involved with drugs this season. "Doug Cramer (the show's producer) says he never told the magazine that. And I'd doubt it anyway. Everyone knows that I would never take drugs, and my character is supposed to be based on the real me."

She does hint, however, that there will be a parallel between her real and reel lives in an upcoming episode. "It's our fraternity episode, which we just finished taping. Wow! What fun! I'm not going to tell you who I'm dating right now, but if you watch that episode closely ..." She giggles again, sounding exactly like your typical teen.

The great white hope retires from boxing

Things have gone to pot in the fight world since Howard Cosell gave up his pugilistic broadcasting duties. This summer, for instance, the big sweet science news was the retirement of once-defeated heavyweight contender Gerry Cooney.

The 28-year-old Cooney lost only one professional fight in his career of 27 victories, 23 by knockout. That one loss was when Cooney challenged champion Larry Holmes for the title and got knocked loose-kneed in the 13th round on June 11, 1982.

Cooney never recovered from his one defeat. He even apologized to his fans after the knockout. He didn't enter the ring for 27 months. Last September he came back to deck Phil Brown, an old sparring partner, in four rounds, and two months later Cooney finished veteran George Chaplin in two rounds. But that was it.

But the 6-foot-7-inch Long Island native's heart wasn't in the game. In his bout with Holmes, he was welcomed as another "Great White Hope" of

mythical proportions, even sharing a Time magazine cover with the fictional "Rocky."

The trouble was most of Cooney's winning streak was almost as fictional as "Rocky." His knockout victims were mostly either never-were or washed-up fighters. Until he stepped in the ring at the title fight, he had yet to go 10 rounds. He went eight rounds three times, but most of his fights were real quickies.

Cooney's career was hampered by injuries and personal problems, although many of his injuries — sore shoulders, back problems, eye troubles — were thought to be excuses. His personal problems were due to difficulties with his managers.

Still, you had to give Cooney credit: He certainly looked good in the ring. Like a real fighter. And he knew how to make money.

While never a champion, he did become a millionaire, thanks in part to his fight with Holmes. Their bout alone meant more than \$10 million to boxing's latest retiree.

Holmes claims Cooney retired from the ring years ago.

Cable television captures 'Red Dawn'

It begins as one more perfectly ordinary day for the citizens of Calumet, Colorado, a serene community that stands in the shadows of the Rocky Mountains at the edge of the Great Plains.

At Calumet High, a history teacher's lecture is abruptly interrupted by the gentle drone of high-flying aircraft. Suddenly, hundreds of parachuting soldiers appear outside in camouflage uniforms. Curious students run to their classroom windows, imagining that some sort of Army maneuver has drifted off-target. Then the soldiers open fire.

From its startling opening, *Red Dawn*, premiering this month on cable, turns into an action-packed adventure, the story of eight high school students whose lives are changed forever one peaceful morning when the American heartland is invaded without warning by forces from Russia, Cuba and other Soviet-bloc countries.

The archetypal American town is turned into a zone of socialist occupation. Such familiar institutions as a drive-in theater and a McDonald's restaurant are transformed into a "re-education center" and a fast-food mess hall. An old luxury hotel becomes the headquarters of the occupying army, revolutionary posters and banners line the streets, and the local theater mar-

quee advertises the film *Alexander Nevsky*.

A handful of students, though, escape into the rugged mountain wilderness and wage a desperate guerrilla battle against the invaders. Starring as the patriotic teenagers are Patrick Swayze, C. Thomas Howell, Lea Thompson, Charlie Sheen, Darren Dalton, Jennifer Gray, Brad Savage and Doug Toby.

Witnesses to the first occupation of American soil by a foreign army in modern history, these children are transformed by the ferocious conflict -- a long-term siege fought with conventional weaponry. They see war in all its brutal futility, and are nevertheless inspired to deeds of courage and heroism as they fight for survival and for a way of life they have lost forever.

Director John Milius explains that *Red Dawn* is inspired in part by the exploits of Yugoslavian and Greek resistance fighters during the Nazi occupation of World War II. Milius says *Red Dawn* is "a film about the struggle that goes on, almost unnoticed, behind the lines in any war, as seen through the eyes of its most tragic children -- the children.

"This is also a film about the country itself -- about our sense of invulnerability, about our deep identification with the land, and our attachment to where we live. We are no different than anyone anywhere in the world. And, unlikely as it seems, were events similar to these to unfold here someday, I suspect this is how we would react. Because we live here."

IN STEREO — NBC has some good news for anyone who has gone out and

bought a stereo television set. The network will be broadcasting a number of shows in stereo this coming year.

The bad news is that only 31 NBC stations and affiliates are equipped to transmit in stereo. These 31 stations cover a little more than one-third of the country, but if you live in the other two-thirds, you're still out of luck.

Already being broadcast in stereo are the musically oriented Friday Night Videos and The Motown Revue Starring Smokey Robinson, and the Tonight show and Late Night with David Letterman. (Both shows often have musical guests)




The pairing of John Candy with Carl Reiner is a natural. Their careers may be separated by several decades, but they had similar beginnings. Candy's apprenticeship with Chicago's Second City comedy troupe parallels Reiner's early work with Sid Caesar and Mel Brooks on "Your Show of Shows."

Reiner went on to create the legendary "Dick Van Dyke Show" and has, more recently, teamed with Steve Martin for four films.

Candy's movie efforts include supporting roles in "Splash" and "Brewster's Millions" — and a small part in "National Lampoon's Vacation."

Actually, "National Lampoon's Vacation" is what "Summer Rental" starts out to be. Substitute John Candy for Chevy Chase, Karen Austin for Beverly D'Angelo, and you have a virtual remake — for the first 30 minutes or so, anyway.

But this film makes an important break with National Lampoon's style of film making — by including something called a plot. (It must be the Carl Reiner "old school" influence.) What unfolds is a rather

warm and almost tender family tale that includes some clever situations and colorful characters.

The best of the characters is Rip Torn, who plays a modern-day buccaneer in pirate hat and dress, who greets all who come aboard his ship-turned-restaurant with an "Avast me hearties" and a wave of the hook. Torn could easily have descended into silliness with such an appellation, but he plays it almost straight, and turns in a delightful characterization.

The villain of the piece is Richard Crenna, an arrogant yacht racer who does everything he can to spoil Candy's vacation. But Candy and family team up with Torn and other members of his motley crew to give Crenna a run for his money.

The story eventually turns into a nautical version of "Rocky," but Candy is a lovable lug, Torn is just great, and Reiner gets the most out of each situation.


At the risk of damning with faint praise, a person in search of a summer movie rental could do a whole lot worse.


