Pro Ski race won't be at Ski Apache

The All-American Pro Ski Classic will take place in Angel Fire this winter, not Ruidoso.

According to Paul Crown, president of the Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Angel Fire corporation already signed a contract with Peugeot, a sponsor company of the race.

Crown made the announcement during a recent chamber board meeting. He said Roy Parker, manager of Ski Apache (formerly

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort), did not want to have another race on the mountain.

When contacted at Ski Apache, Parker said he thought that having the race was not in the best interest of the ski area.

Parker said Ski Apache cannot handle the large volumes of spectators which a big race draws.

"We handle the ski crowd. A race is more of a spectator sport," said Parker.

Parker said that races interfere with skiers, whom he said are not spectators.

"It takes away from the skiers,

and that's the business we are in," said Parker.

Parker said inclement weather kept many spectators away from the race last year, but had it been a nice weekend, the resort could have had problems with parking and other crowd-related situations.

Parker said that Angel Fire has had other races there before and can handle the traffic. He said the company likes crowds to see the resort area.

"We're not dirt peddlers like Angel Fire," said Parker, explaining that the ski company also sells real estate.

Parker said he would consider future races on a year-to-year basis.

Sheriff has his say

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said Monday that 12th Judicial District Attorney (DA) James Weldon "should gracefully bow out of" the McKnight murder case.

Sullivan called a Monday morning press conference "to respond to allegations" made by Weldon during his Friday conference. He called for a special prosecutor in the nine-month-old case.

"He (Weldon) lacks experience to prosecute a case of this magnitude," said Sullivan who added that Weldon has lost the only two murder trials he has tried.

"I am really appalled that he went public with some details of the case," said Sullivan. "I think it can be salvaged," he added, saying that he would have "appreciated a call."

When contacted by telephone Tuesday, Weldon stated firmly that he will not call for a special prosecutor.

"I'm not going to abdicate my responsibility," he said. Weldon, who says he has 35 years experience, revealed that he sent a request Monday to the state Attorney General, asking for assistance on the case.

While Sullivan refused to comment on many specifics of the case, he did reveal that his investigation has led him to conclude that two suspects were involved in the November slayings of Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight.

After reading a prepared statement (see text, below), Sullivan answered questions and commented on many aspects of the investigation.

When questioned on involvement by the New Mexico State Police, Sullivan said that agency was actively involved in the murder investigation for a little less than two months and "pulled off by themselves."

He added, however that a State Police officer is married to the ex-wife of one of the victims. Sullivan said the head of the State Police agreed that the officer was "very close to the investigation."

Sullivan maintains that his office did a thorough job investigating the scene of the crime, maintained complete security of the premises until evidence-gathering was complete and has closely guarded the purity of that evidence.

"I could see no reason to add an additional link in the chain of custody," said Sullivan when asked why he refused to give Weldon the physical evidence. He said his investigators have shown Weldon's investigators everything they have.

He described a meeting in Tularosa where Undersheriff Charlie Cox met with Weldon's assistant and three investigators from the DA's office and went through every detail of the case.

"As far as I am concerned the cooperation is all one way. We have gotten nothing back," said Sullivan.

He asked Steve Sanders, attorney for Lincoln County, to refute statements by Weldon that if the case goes to a grand jury and is "no billed" it is "lost forever."

"It is untrue that the case would be lost forever," said Sanders, who explained that nothing would be lost by taking present evidence to that body.

"There would be no reason to present it again unless you have additional evidence," he added.

"Well, I don't care what Steve Sanders said," was Weldon's comment. "Mr. Sanders is hardly an authority on anything," he added.

Sullivan talked of evidence that Weldon classified as "tainted" during his press conference—a .38 caliber weapon, a projectile and a bottle.

"I never said that was the murder weapon," said Sullivan of the handgun that Weldon told reporters Friday is in his possession. Sullivan said the individual

who apparently furnished Weldon with the gun told sheriff's investigators in a taped conversation, "I don't remember who I sold it to."

A "projectile" mentioned by Weldon, was said by Sullivan to be a "bullet fragment," and unimportant to the overall investigation.

"We have the bullets that were taken from the bodies," Sullivan added.

Weldon Friday mentioned a bottle that was left at the scene and later used to retrieve laser fingerprints, but Sullivan said that bottle was not included in the laser testing. The sheriff testified that laser technology is "one of the up and coming things in law enforcement."

The sheriff stands behind his decision to send evidence to laboratories in Texas and Washington, D.C., for testing. He said those facilities were the best available.

After being tested in those laboratories, further testing in New Mexico facilities was not an option, since laboratory transmittal forms require that evidence not have been handled in another lab, said Sullivan.

"I think Charlie Cox is one of the finest law enforcement officers I've ever come in contact with," said Sullivan of his undersheriff who serves as chief investigator on the McKnight case. He detailed Cox's many years of experience and also stressed his complete confidence in deputy Mike Lee.

"I stand on the merits of what we've done," said Sullivan, who stressed his belief that he has enough evidence to convict the McKnight slayers.

The sheriff opined that politics may be involved in Weldon's refusal to act. Sullivan said that the DA's chief investigator, Leandro Vega, was a candidate for sheriff in 1982. He lost that election to Sullivan.

Sheriff calls for special prosecutor

The following is the text of the formal statement delivered by Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan during a Monday press conference:

"The purpose of this news conference is to respond to the allegations made by the District Attorney of the 12th Judicial District at a recent news conference concerning the murders of Cotton and Judy McKnight and to respond in a fair and impartial manner. Also, to let the public know what the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department has been doing in this particular case.

"I will not divulge information at this particular point in time that I think would cause a murderer to flee or to be able to alter his defense in some way as to escape punishment for the murders of Cotton and Judy McKnight.

"I, as Sheriff of Lincoln County feel that it is my duty to the citizens of Lincoln County to investigate the murders of Cotton and Judy McKnight. I was sworn to uphold the law and it is my duty to make certain that the people of the County are safe. It is my duty to try to find that particular killer. I am telling you right now that it is my firm belief that I have a case against the people that killed Cotton and Judy McKnight and I believe I can get a conviction if I have the help of a good, competent criminal prosecutor.

"My main concern all along has been the protection of our citizens and the solving of this heinous crime and I regret the day that the District Attorney comes here and because of his political paranoia or his desire to aid one of his investigators in becoming the next Sheriff of Lincoln County or for whatever reason he has made these allegations, I regret the day that he did that. Politics should have absolutely nothing to do with this case. What we needed all along is cooperation between the District Attorney's Office and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office. The Sheriff's Department has honored every request the District Attorney's Office has had concerning this investigation except one and I will get to that later.

"They have yet to examine all of our evidence. They now have their investigators working on this case. I have no idea what they are doing. The District Attorney's Investigators have been ordered by the District Attorney not to communicate with our Department. It is absolutely ridiculous that this is occurring.

"I feel that we need a grand jury investigation into the District Attorney's handling of this case and into the way the case has been handled by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

"I think a special prosecutor should be appointed to investigate not only this case but other crimes that have been committed during the course of this investigation. I have absolutely no fear of an investigation by a grand jury or an investigation by a special prosecutor.

"I would extend an appeal to the District Attorney to at least show me the courtesy to agree to a special prosecutor being appointed to handle this case. One we can both work with in an effort to get a conviction in this case. I am willing to do that. I am willing to commit my personnel to do that and I hope Mr. Weldon is willing to do that.

"The District Attorney has made certain allegations about news releases. When the District Attorney ordered me to tell my Chief Deputy not to make anymore news releases concerning the McKnight case or we would 'blow the case,' I asked him what particular news release had we made that was detrimental to the investigation and his only reply was 'you tell that (explosive deleted) Charlie Cox to keep his (explosive deleted) mouth shut.' We have made no derogatory news release.

"About sitting on the case, I have never accused the District Attorney of sitting on the case. But what we need right now is a competent special prosecutor to move on with this case because I know who killed the McKnights and I want them brought to justice.

"Never in my career have I ever heard of a District Attorney going public with the sensitive parts of a

criminal investigation before the suspects were arrested. Never have I heard a District Attorney attempt to publicly ridicule a police agency's investigation of a crime and to cast discredit upon its employees.

"Mr. Weldon thinks we do not have a case. That is ironic because I have talked to competent criminal attorneys with more courtroom experience than he has and these attorneys think we have an excellent case and with the aid of a competent prosecutor, we could get a conviction.

"We do not possess any tainted evidence as Mr. Weldon alleges. However, if I commented at this time as to the seizure of any physical evidence, I would have to reveal more intimate details of the investigation and even further jeopardize the case. Mr. Weldon has already revealed too much about the seizure of evidence.

"I can assure you that all physical evidence in this case has been properly seized and the chain of custody properly maintained and that all physical evidence that we plan to use in court will be admissible.

"In summary, it is my opinion that Mr. Weldon did a great disservice to the citizens of Lincoln County by intentionally damaging this case. He should gracefully bow out of this case by permitting a special prosecutor to be appointed to take over so we can proceed with the investigation and subsequent prosecution."

Council accepts Zoning chairman Masters' resignation

Mayor George White accepted the resignation of Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Commission chairman Greg Masters during Tuesday's regular meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

"Serving on P&Z is not an easy job," said White in accepting Master's resignation, which, according to the letter, was because of increased "business schedule demands."

"They get knocked on the head more than they get patted on the back," said Village Councilor William A. "Dub" Holt, with a laugh.

Village enforcement officer Paul Davis told the mayor that P&Z has asked that the size of the commission be increased to nine members from the present eight. Village clerk Leon Eggleston, who had reviewed the ordinance, said such a change would be legal.

Murder case talk is withheld

"I've got an order from the court that says I'm not allowed to talk about this," said Lincoln County Undersheriff Charlie Cox when contacted by telephone early today (Thursday).

Cox said the order applies to the sheriff's office, the district attorney and other attorneys involved in the ongoing McKnight murder investigation.

Judge Richard A. Parsons handed down the order yesterday, according to Cox, however Parsons was

unavailable for comment early this morning.

"I don't have anything yet," said 12th Judicial District Attorney James Weldon when asked about the ruling in a telephone interview today. He had no other comment on the McKnight case.

The judicial order followed two press conferences on the case—the first called last Friday by Weldon and the second called Monday by Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan.



Sullivan speculated that Weldon may be paving the way for Vega to make another attempt to gain the office of Lincoln County Sheriff.

Sullivan read portions of the letter he received Friday from Weldon, which, according to the sheriff, offered no suggestions for solutions to the problems between the two agencies.

The sheriff said he'll wait for Weldon to make the next move, but in the meantime his office will aggressively pursue an end to the case.

"I need all the help I can get," said Sullivan as he made a strong plea for information from the public.

Also present at the press conference was Terrie Bussey, sister of Judy McKnight, Bussey and Donald Frank "Pancho" McKnight, the brother of Cotton McKnight, are circulating a petition calling for a grand jury.

The petition, which will be filed with the Lincoln County Clerk, must be signed by 200 county residents in order to convene a jury over Weldon's refusal to act.

Bussey, who said she has received threatening telephone calls since she initiated the petition, said she has more than 100 signatures on her copy of the petition. There are other copies out, and she said they had many signatures, too.

A Saturday morning caller told Bussey that he would "harm" her children, whom he called by name, if she doesn't stop what she's doing, she said.

Bussey stated emphatically that she will go forward in her efforts to end the family nightmare.

Sullivan called The News Wednesday to respond to comments by Weldon in some other publications.

"Weldon referred to me as an idiot," said Sullivan. "I'd just like to say that I'm not going to stoop to his level and engage in a name-calling episode."

"That kind of conduct is not characteristic of a professional," he added.

"I'll have some names ready for next meeting," said the mayor.

Also during Tuesday's meeting, the council heard a request from James Paxton of the Lincoln County Transportation Company, a non-profit corporation, for a \$20,000 contribution toward a feasibility study on a proposed cogwheel railway system.

"We'd like to let you have the opportunity to participate," said Paxton as he listed other sources of funds as \$20,000 in cash and services from the state, \$5,000 from Ruidoso Downs, \$5,000 from area banking institutions and \$10,000 from the private sector.

Paxton, who said the study is already under way on a month-to-month contract, stated that the corporation also is requesting funds from the Mescalero Apache Tribe

and from the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

"I don't know where the \$20,000 would come from," said Village Councillor Jerry Shaw, as she asked village manager Jim Hine if there are "any loose funds" in the village budget.

Hine said he was still searching for the \$20,000 that the village needs for paving Carrizo Creek Road. He also revealed that the village received a letter from the state along with the current fiscal year budget, and that letter warned that Ruidoso "is getting close to overextending itself."

Councillors, who stated their support for the project, postponed a decision on a financial contribution until September 10.

Much of Tuesday's meeting involved a lengthy presentation by John Greening on his request to rezone Lot 2, Block A, Navajo Sub-division from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (commercial).

The request was denied by P&Z on July 15, and the denial was

reconfirmed on August 5.

Greening was before the council for a public hearing on the matter.

Councillor Shaw declared a conflict of interest, stating that she is a "dissenting property owner," and declined to enter into the discussion or vote. With just four councillors present (Councillors Ray Dean Carpenter and Rick Evans were absent), and only three of those members voting, the council was constrained from being able to act.

Eggleston told the governing body that only three votes would be required to uphold the P&Z decision, but that four votes would be needed to overturn their ruling.

In other business the council:

—Heard Shaw announce a series of workshops for the council, P&Z and village planners BRW at 4 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, September 16-18.

—Agreed with Councillor Bill Karn's suggestion that the village sponsor legislation to allow surplus supplemental gross receipts funds to be used for debt service.

—Waived the sign permit fee for a Ruidoso High School football schedule sign.

—Approved using the council's budget line item of lodgers' tax funds to pay \$1,500 requested by Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor for additional manpower during the motorcycle festival. The request was previously denied by the Lodgers' Tax Committee.

—Approved an alternate site reciprocal agreement for data processing with First National Bank of Lincoln County.

—Accepted the low bid of \$37,000 each for two truck cabs and chassis from Ed Black's Chevrolet.

—Accepted the low bid of \$22,216 for a refuse container body from Richardson Sunbelt of Albuquerque.

—Heard Hine report a preconstruction conference on the Grindstone Canyon dam project at 1 p.m. Wednesday.

—Acknowledged a letter of thanks from the Humane Society of Lincoln County.

Commission considers airport engineering bids

"The Congress of the United States has given us three sections of land on Fort Stanton Mesa and two sections of land over Three Rivers Ranch," said Sierra Blanca Airport Commission chairman Fred Heckman Tuesday.

"We've got a little problem," he said as he explained that apparent-

ly the Congress made a typographical error in the legislation designed to release land for the proposed regional airport, and gave the wrong land.

Heckman told the three commissioners present that he felt the problem could be easily solved.

Commissioners Conrad

Buchanan, Benny Coker, Kenneth Nosker and Heckman discussed state and federal regulations, costs and future procedures for the airport and reviewed maps of the airport area during the regular meeting. Commissioner Wendell Chino did not attend.

Heckman announced that the

commission will meet with representatives from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) soon to work out details of the land transfer. He said BLM representatives have revealed that it may take them as long as six months to complete that transaction.

Present plans include beginning airport construction by January 31, 1985, so a compromise will have to be reached to accomplish the BLM transfer in time.

Items the group will refer to the Lincoln County Commission for review include airport hazard zoning information and regulations that disallow having a sanitary landfill within two miles of an airport.

The commission went into executive session to review 11 proposals for the engineering design, supervision, inspection and miscellaneous engineering services related to the construction of the airport.

"We're going to need to be brutally frank and we need to do that in private," said Heckman in calling for the closed meeting.

Downs Trustees vote to build fence

The Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso Downs voted to install an additional fence around the village dog pens at their regular meeting Monday evening.

The fence will stand six feet high, with three strands of barbed wire around the top. It will encircle the pen area.

The reasons for the fence are to keep children from petting the dogs and vandals from tearing up the pens. Police dispatcher Joanne Jenkins reported that the pens were vandalized between 3 and 6 one morning.

"This would help us out and save the village a lawsuit if a kid got bit," said Police Chief Skip Hazel.

In an effort to streamline village operations, Mayor J.C. Day suggested the possibility of hiring a part-time person to read the water meters. Day said that, currently, four employees and two vehicles are utilized during meter-reading periods. The board will consider the proposal.

Day also discussed the possible hazards in underground fuel tanks. Trustee Conrad Buchanan suggested checking the village's tank daily to make sure it does not leak.

In other business, the board:

—Allowed Red Meador to move a

small building to the Hughes Body Shop property, pending advice from the village attorney. Meador will dispense tire sealant from the building.

—Approved T.E. Arrington's request to do repair work on the Frieden Bloom and Entrance Road bridges.

—Transferred \$27,732 from the beginning balance of the Sanitation Department to capital outlay for the purchase of poly-carts.

—Approved the resignation of Leonard Joseph, the hiring of Todd East (police officer) and the hiring of Janet Willis (dispatcher).

—Tabled personnel action.

Art show profits are high

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce set records with this year's Ruidoso Art Festival, bringing in more than \$22,000 in profits—nearly twice as much as ever before.

Archer Wilson (husband of Flodie Wilson, art show chairperson) presented the chamber board with a check for \$22,000 from festival funds at their regular meeting Wednesday. Wilson said more funds would be forthcoming after outstanding bills are paid.

Nancy Radziewicz reported on another annual chamber-sponsored event: The Aspen Festival (known this year as Aspenfest). Radziewicz said that recently added events include a high school band contest and frontier village. The chamber voted to allocate funds to make old-time photo reprints and chili cook-off T-shirts to sell at the festival.

Crown told the board that one event would not happen in Ruidoso this year. The All-American Pro Ski Classic will be in Angel Fire. Bill Carrigan, vice president of operations and management, reported that the chamber did not lose as much money on last year's race as originally projected. Adjusted bills and merchandise sales reduced the ski race deficit from \$23,000 to \$10,749, with one outstanding bill in question.

The bill is for the repair or replacement of a tent borrowed from the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival, incorporated. The board voted to obtain a legal opinion in the matter of the damaged tent.

Carrigan also told the board of his committee's plans for this year's membership drive, to take place during the first week of October.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers said the committee would

form an ongoing membership drive to call on new businesses as they open.

"Hopefully we can do away with an annual membership drive," said Jeffers.

Barbara DiPaolo, vice president of economic development, reported that several people agreed to chair various committees within her responsibility.

Bill Hirschfeld will chair the Southern New Mexico Film Commission development task force; Ray Dean Carpenter will head the legislative review committee; Bill Dean will lead the small business seminar group and John Shaw will head the transportation task force.

Prompted by requests to use the chamber's meeting room, the board adopted a policy for conference room use.

In other business, the board:

—Discussed the Spree Party, which Jeffers said had not raised as much money (as of Wednesday afternoon) as they had hoped.

—Heard Crown announce that Governor Toney Anaya would draw the ticket for the 1931 Cadillac on Labor Day. Board member James Paxton reminded everyone to turn in their ticket stubs by noon Saturday.

—Decided to have Candy Garrett design a new sign for the chamber office.

—Decided not to participate in a televised conference planned by Senator Jeff Bingaman.

—Voted not to sell Sertoma coupon books.

—Heard Pat Breedlove tell the board of the winter advertising campaign which will feature a contest for a Texas family to win a trip and represent Ruidoso.

—Voted to allow the Ruidoso Downs Ladies' Auxiliary to use the chamber's ticket booth for their upcoming arts and craft fair.

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



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

Ruidoso opens 1985 grid season in Bulldogs' lair

Ruidoso High School's varsity football team will open the 1985 season Friday night against the same opponent it finished the 1984 season against.

Only this time the Warriors hope the results will be different.

The Warriors will travel to Artesia for an 8 p.m. contest. Last year the defending state AAA-division champions topped Ruidoso, 21-6, in the semi-finals of the state playoffs. The Bulldogs also defeated the Warriors during the regular season.

"We're not trying for revenge," said Ruidoso head coach Cooper Henderson. "We want to beat a good team and they're the defending state champions."

Both teams are considered by many observers to be among the favorites for the state title this season. Ruidoso was 8-3-1 last season and Artesia was 11-1-2.

But the Warriors have more standouts back from last season than do the Bulldogs.

All-district 3-AAA quarterback Russell Easter will direct the Warriors' Wing-T attack. Tailback Michael Williamson scored 18 touchdowns last season and was the Warriors' leading rusher.

James Herrera, a second-team all-district center last season, has been switched to guard this year. The 175-pounder will be a key part of the Warrior offensive line.

Senior Phillip Herrera is the biggest Warrior starter at 230 pounds. The only other starter on either offense or defense to weigh over 200 pounds is defensive tackle Shayne Fedrick (205 pounds).

Bobby Dickinson was a second-team all-district middle linebacker last season, but has been switched to the outside this season.

Senior Jeff Maxwell will start at middle linebacker against Artesia.

Junior Jeff Willingham will lead the Warrior defensive backfield from his strong safety position. He made all-district first team last season and also did a good job at

quarterback when Easter was hurt before the playoffs.

Artesia lost a number of outstanding players from last year's excellent team.

Coach T.W. Harvey has 10 lettermen from last year's team, but has fewer players out for the team this season.

"We're so inexperienced and so few in numbers," he moaned.

But Artesia will still suit up 35 players for the game, the same as Ruidoso.

Shaun Standard will start at quarterback. The 5-9, 160-pounder played junior varsity quarterback and back-up varsity quarterback last season.

Trent Boneau has some talent at fullback. The 5-11, 160-pounder was the second-string quarterback last season.

Monte Carlo, Bill Glass, Tony DeLeon and T.C. Abbott are top linemen. DeLeon is the biggest of the bunch, going 5-10, 195 pounds.

"We've got to reduce the number of turnovers we have while on offense," Harvey said.

Henderson agrees. "We have to have ball control and limit the number of turnovers," he remarked. "I think it will be a close, hard-fought ballgame."

The NFL season will begin the following weekend, with every team optimistic.

Here's the way I see the division races. Predictions on the playoffs will come later.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Eastern Division: Washington, 11-5; St. Louis, 10-6; Dallas, 10-6; New York Giants, 8-8; Philadelphia, 5-11.

The Redskins have improved their chances with the addition of running back George Rogers and some good rookie defensive prospects.

The Cowboys are tough on defense, but have offensive line problems. St. Louis has plenty of offensive strength and some defensive stars, but's lacking in big-game pressure.

Both St. Louis and Dallas have good shots at playoff berths.

Central Division: Chicago, 11-5; Green Bay, 9-7; Tampa Bay, 7-9; Detroit, 5-11; Minnesota, 4-12.

The Bears have an outstanding defense and all-everything running back Walter Payton. Their big question is how quarterback Jim McMahon will perform after a late-season injury last year.

Cleveland could surprise. It had the best statistical defense in the American Conference last season.

football program will have signups at Nob Hill Elementary School tonight, beginning at 7.



The fees will be \$20 per family, regardless of the number of players.

The minor division is for youths eight to nine years old. The major division is for youths 10 to 12 years old.

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

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

P&Z discusses subdivisions

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) lacked a quorum at their meeting Tuesday night in Carrizozo.

The four members present discussed the items on the agenda. Mack Bell, Walt Wilson, Sid Goodloe and Ben Hall reviewed plats for Mountain Lakes Subdivision, Rancho Ruidoso Village, Unit 1 and Eagle Creek Acres, Unit 2.

P&Z also reviewed the replat of Magado Creek Estates and Tall Pines subdivisions. The commission agreed to meet at 11 a.m. Friday, August 30, to inspect the reviewed subdivisions.

AAP Investments of Ruidoso proposed Mountain Lakes Subdivision, to be located off the Fort Stanton road. P&Z questioned the developer's covenants which allow commercial areas within the subdivision.

Wilson and Goodloe stressed the need for the developer to restrict livestock on the lots. The lots drain into a running stream.

Eagle Creek Acres again came before P&Z for review. P&Z previously tabled action on the subdivision because of a long cul-de-sac, which served as an access, and the lack of a fire escape route.

Tim Collins, the engineer representing the developer, said the subdivision was designed to have private roads. He said the developer improved a road used by the Alto Water Association employees as the fire escape route. Bell said he inspected the site with county manager Suzanne Cox and found the route "very adequate."

The developer also requested a width variance for the access road since no county equipment or school buses would travel it.

Bob Blumm, of the Rancho Ruidoso Corporation, presented the plans for Rancho Ruidoso Village, located off Fort Stanton road. Blumm said the development would feature smaller lots with medium-priced homes for average-income families. He said his corporation studied the need for such housing in the Ruidoso area and found it to be great.

Blumm added that the houses would be constructed by the developer and would not be "just lot sales."

Bell said he thought the developer "was on the right track," with the subdivision.

A replat of a tract of land in the Magado Creek Subdivision again brought the comment from Goodloe to place restrictions on horses. Goodloe said that overgrazing by horses on small plots of land contributes to the erosion problem.

P&Z also reviewed the plat of lots previously sold in the Tall Pines Subdivision, as requested by Cox. Collins presented a plat which showed the lots and their descriptions and roads. Tall Pines has been a subdivision since the 1960s, Collins said.

P&Z discussed the need to approve the proposed condominium ordinance. Also, two models for airport zoning were presented as guidelines for a future ordinance.

P&Z meets September 25 for their next regular meeting.

County has new trash dumpsters

Many small Lincoln County communities which had no public solid waste services are now served by the county. Solid waste containers, which hold up to 20 cubic yards, have been placed in five county locations.

Residents in the Baber's Loop vicinity may dump trash into the container on the east end of the Hondo Valley road. In Hondo, the container is located behind the school.

Lincoln residents may dump their trash into the container at the fire station. Another dumpster is located beside the fire station in Nogal. In Tinnie, a container is at

the Silver Dollar Restaurant.

County road superintendent Earl Kreigs said another container is on order for the Sun Valley area. He said the containers are loaded onto a special trailer pulled by a county truck. Since there is one extra container, an empty one is left at the site whenever a full container is taken for dumping.

The containers are dumped by lifting them on the special hydraulic lift trailer. The doors on the containers are opened and the refuse spills into the landfill trench.

Kreigs said the containers are dumped whenever they are full, as some communities fill the dumpsters more frequently than others. County Road Department employee Albert Hernandez has

operated the service since its inception in early July.

The Lincoln County Commissioners approved the purchase of the containers at their May meeting. They modeled the trash service after the Chavez County solid waste project which uses similar containers.

There is no charge to residents who use the containers. Kreigs asked that trash be bagged. Construction and yard refuse should not be put into the containers, Kreigs said.

The trash is dumped at the Fort Stanton mesa landfill. It is the only landfill operated by the county in the area.

Capitan village hall is computerized

The Capitan Village Hall has a new addition—an International Telephone and Telegraph (ITT) computer.

The computer was purchased with capital outlay funds that were budgeted this year, said village clerk Virginia Spall. The trustees approved \$12,000 to purchase the computer system.

Former village trustee Bill Allred was authorized, at the regular June trustees' meeting, to investigate the different computers available. Allred said he selected the ITT system from Computerland in Albuquerque because of the options available for the funds budgeted. The trustees approved the purchase at their meeting in July.

First proposed to aid with filing information on the new water filter plant, the computer eventually will have all village records transferred to its files. Billings also will be computer-processed, Spall said.

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

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

Summer evenings in Ruidoso are cool, quiet and romantic. What could be nicer than a walk through the downtown area with a good friend and then dinner in a fine restaurant?

Probably nothing. Our choice was La Lorraine, a French restaurant relatively new to Ruidoso. Proprietors Richard and Pascale Girot, however, have been in town for about two years. The restaurant is quiet and sleek. Candlelight plays off the subdued

blue walls and classical music is piped in when the guitarist is not performing.

Haitian guitarist Alix Beaulieu plays weekends only. His repertoire includes Mexican and French ballads and a few American folk songs. His music is a bittersweet blend of the sad and romantic, even if the words are not understood.

But the atmosphere is a mere complement to the food. We both ordered a veal dish, served on a bed of fresh spinach, with a dinner salad and spinach noodles on the side. Accompanied by a chilled white wine (two bottles) and an ap-

petizer of deliciously garlicky escargot, the meal was divine.

Pascale cooks all the food and bakes a variety of desserts each day. We were seated in what our waitress called the "willpower seat," a table not more than a yard away from the dessert display. Cheesecake, mocha mousse cake, tortes and other dieter's nightmares tempted us throughout the evening, but we resisted. Drat the luck.

For a special, intimate evening in Ruidoso, La Lorraine provides a local spot for fine dining.

DASHING PHOEBE—Chestnut filly; Texas bred by San Jose Cattle Co. from Dash For Cash-Phoebie's Moon Bug, by Lady Bug's Moon; owned by San Jose Cattle Co., (Art Shahan) of Pleasanton, Texas; trained by H. Don Farris; trial rider-Jerry Nicodemus.

Dashing Phoebie is 5-1 in six career starts with earnings of \$311,426. She won her qualifying race in the seventh division on August 21 with a time of 21.830-tying her for the fastest qualifying time with Mr Trucka Jet.

Dashing Phoebie already has two Grade I stakes victories under belt with wins in the Sun Country Futurity and the Kansas Futurity earlier this year.

Dashing Phoebie is the leading money winner in the final field and the odds-on-favorite (6-5) to win the prestigious race. She also was the fastest qualifier in the Kansas. She is trained by Don Farris who is winding down his last season at Ruidoso Downs and is still looking for his first All-American Futurity victory.

MR TRUCKA JET—Chestnut colt; Oklahoma bred by Wade C. Navarre from Easy Jet-Truckahla, by Trully Truckle (TB); owned by Darrell D. Kissee (lessee) Miami Cattle Co. and Navarre (lessors) of Miami Okla; trained by Jack W. Brooks; trial rider-Jacky Martin.

My Trucka Jet is 4-1 in six career starts with earnings of \$22,632. He qualified in the ninth division of trial races on August 21 with a qualifying time of 21.830-tying Dashing Phoebie for top honors.

My Trucka Jet comes into the race with no stakes victories, but with only one start worse than third. He was conditioned by John Brasseaux in Louisiana. His sire Easy Jet won the All-American back in 1969. Jack Brooks trains My Trucka Jet and comes into the finals already with two All-American victories with Jacky Martin aboard both his horses, Moon Lark in '78 and Mr Master Bug in '82.

BOMBAY NATIVE—Brown colt; Oklahoma bred by George E. Middleton from Raise A Lady (TB)-Bunnykin, by Pigglin Chick; owned by G. M Breeding Farms Inc., (George E. Middleton) of Arcadia, Missouri; trained by Charles W. Cascio; trial rider-Bruce Pilkenton.

Bombay Native brings in a 1-3-1 record in five career starts with earnings of \$1,648. He qualified in the ninth division of races on August 21 with a time of 21.975.

Bombay Native comes into the race with no stakes wins and the least earnings of the finalists. He was the fastest of three horses qualified by trainer Cascio who is seeking his third All-American victory.

SIX FORTUNES—Brown colt; Texas bred by San W. Rankin from Streakin Six-My Fortune Cookie, by Timeto Thinkrich; owned by Chris and Charlane Cox of Austin,

Texas; trained by Charles W. Cascio; trial rider-Bruce Pilkenton.

Six Fortunes has a 4-2-1 record in eight outings with earnings of \$164,931. He qualified in the fourth division of races on August 21 with a time of 22.000.

Six Fortunes brings no stakes victories with him but has never finished worse than third under Pilkenton. He is one of three Streakin Six progeny in the final. Both Pilkenton and Cascio are based in California. Pilkenton can become only the second jockey to win back-to-back All-Americans. He was aboard Eastex last year. Sire Streakin Six finished second to Pie In The Sky in '79.

RACIN IMAGE—Brown colt; Texas bred by San Jose Cattle Co. from Streakin Six-Reller's Image, by Go Man Go; owned by Bill Eiland and Billy Max West of Snyder, Texas; trained by Charles W. Cascio; trial rider-Bruce Pilkenton.

Racin Image comes in with a 4-1-1 record in 10 outings with earnings of \$81,677. He qualified in the seventh division of races of August 21 with a time of 22.000.

Racin Image also comes into the race with no stakes wins, but enters the race with the most starts. He is a product of the Ruidoso Super Select Sale.

EASY ONE FINE DAY—Brown filly; Oklahoma bred by Travis Ranch from Easy Jet-One Fine Day, by Azure Te (TB); owned by Travis Ranch (Paul Travis) of Norman, Oklahoma; trained by Hugh L. Tucker; trial rider-Jeff Williams.

Easy One Fine Day brings with her a 5-3 record in nine outings with earnings of \$120,896. She won the sixth trial division on August 21 to qualify with a time of 22.030.

Easy One Fine Day has one stakes victory under her belt, that being the Oklahoma Futurity. Tucker has never one a major Ruidoso futurity but sent Racy Roman to the 1984 Kansas Derby. Jockey Williams is also looking for his first major win at Ruidoso Downs. He was a last minute replacement for Steve Harris in the time trials.

MUSCATEL—Sorrel colt; Oklahoma bred by Roy Browning from Easily Smashed-Sweet Selection (TB), by Swoon's Son (TB); owned by Roy Browning of Fort Worth, Texas; trained by Jack Brooks; trial rider-Steve Harris.

Muscatel brings with him a 3-5-1 record in 10 outings with earnings of \$21,257. He won the 11th division of trial races on August 21 to qualify with a time 22.055.

Muscatel has never won a stakes race but has ten outings (tied with Racin Image) to credentials. Muscotel is from the first crop of racing age from the sire Easily Smashed. Trainer Jack Brooks is seeking his third All-American win and jockey Steve Harris his second after having rode On A High to an upset victory in '83. Owner Roy Browning will be starting his first All-American finalist after having been involved with breeding and racing stock for many years.

SIXARUN—Sorrel colt; Texas bred by L. Newmayer and

Don Brooks from Streakin Six-Chickarun, by Chick's Deck; owned by Preston Carter and Robert Boston of Dallas, Texas; trained by Dwayne Gilbreath; trial rider-Kenneth Hart.

Sixarun comes into the finals with a 4-2-2 record in nine starts with earnings of \$137,849. He placed second in the sixth division of trial races on August 21 to qualify with a time of 22.060.

Sixarun brings one stakes victory, Futurity at Manor Downs, with him into the finals. Owner Preston Carter is no stranger to the All-American winner's circle having won with On A High in '83 along with partners B.F. Phillips Jr. and Jerry Rheudasil.... and On A High was trained by Gilbreath, Sixarun's trainer for the finals. Jockey Kenneth Hart has never won this prestigious race though he has been aboard five finalists. Sixarun is a full brother to 1984 champion two-year-old filly Sixty Chick, who was a finalist in the All-American Derby last week. Sixarun is the only horse in the '85 Futurity to qualify for each of Ruidoso's major futurities.

TIMETO GET TUFF—Brown colt; California bred by R. Jelderks from Timeto Thinkrich-Tuff To Dial, by Tuff Boss; owned by C. Vincent Fister of Westerville, Ohio; trained by Julie Jewson; trial rider-John Weghorst.

Timeto Get Tuff enters the finals with a 1-0-2 record in 6 career starts with earnings of \$2,102. He placed third in the ninth division of trial races on August 21 to qualify with a time of 22.115.

Timeto Get Tuff enters the finals with no stakes victories to his credit after never having qualified for any stakes races before this one. He is the son of '73 All-American Futurity winner Timeto Thinkrich. Jockey Weghorst and trainer Jensen have never won the All-American. Fister is starting his first horse in the quarter-mile classic. He was the longest shot to make the final field after being a 24-1 longshot in the time trials. He was the only horse to qualify after finishing worse than second in the time trials.

DIGGING FOR GOLD—Bay colt; Oklahoma bred by Robert Moore from Victory Stride (TB)-Prissy Gold Digger, by Easy Jet; leased by Ray Hoover of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; trained by Blane Schvaneveldt; trial rider-Kenneth Hart.

Digging For Gold brings with him a 3-2-1 record in six outings with earnings of \$16,815. He won the fifth division of trial races on August 21 to qualify with a time of 22.120.

Digging For Gold has never one a stakes race. None of his connections have ever won the All-American Futurity. Breeder Robert Moore has had two finalist on '66 with Mr Deck Moore and in '71 with Mr Jet Moore. Digging For Gold is out of Prissy Gold Digger, daughter of '69 Futurity winner Easy Jet. Should Digging For Gold win the '85 Futurity he will be the 11th Oklahoma -bred to capture the classic in 27 years. He has never finished worse than third in six career starts.

The All-American Futurity—a look back at quarter horse racing's richest race

1959-The first All-American Futurity purse of \$129,686 was the richest in quarter horse history (at that time). Galobar, a filly owned by Hugh Huntley of Madera, Calif. took control shortly after the break and never looked back. Galobar covered the 400 yards in 20.5 seconds. Cliff Lambert, later to become a well-known trainer in the Southwest, was in the saddle. Galobar earned \$64,843. The filly, a 7-2 shot, was trained by Newt Keck. The favorite, Miss Olene, faded to third after dueling for the early lead. The track was fast.

1960-Tonto Bar Hank, an 8-5 favorite owned by C. G. and Milo Whitcomb of Sterling, Colo. broke smartly and pounded out a two length win. The colt earned \$65,122 out of the gross purse of \$130,244, and the return was quite an improvement over his rock-bottom original purchase price of \$900. Curtis Perner was the winning pilot. Pat Simpson was the trainer. The track was fast.

1961-Pokey Bar became Trainer Newt Keck's second All-American success by steaming in with a 1-length lead in 20.1 seconds. The colt lead all the way at near 9-1 odds. Kenneth Chapman was in the saddle. Pokey Bar earned \$101,212 for his owner, Hugh Huntley of Madera, Calif. The gross purse was \$202,425. Pokey Bar became the first horse in quarter horse racing to earn over \$100,000 in one race. The race, on a delayed basis, was shown nationally on ABC-TV. The favorite, Bunny's Bar Maid, finished second.

1962-Hustling Man bagged a winner's slice of \$95,425 out of the gross jackpot of \$222,850. The colt was owned by J. B. Ferguson of Whartley, Texas. Clifton Dettiege was up. Hustling Man led from the break and hit the wire with a ¾ length lead on a fast track. The winning time was 20.3 seconds. The win was Hustling Man's fourth in a row.

1963-Goetta, another product of owner Hugh Huntley and trainer Newt Keck, stayed with the pack in the early going, then moved out briskly for a ¾ length win. The filly collected \$127,500 out of a \$285,000 gross purse. Charles Smith was in the saddle. The track was good. The winning time was 20.4.

1964-Decketta took to a sloppy track like a duck to water and splashed her way to an upset victory. She ended the soggy jaunt with a ¾ length lead over the favorite, Steam To Go. Decketta went off at nearly 15-1 and collected \$134,030 out of the total prize of

\$302,060. Decketta was owned and trained by Wilbur Wilson of Blanchard, Okla. Boyd Morris was up. The time was 20.3 seconds.

1965-Savannah Jr. got a heads-up ride from Jack Wallace and dashed to a 2 / length win on a sloppy track. Savannah Jr. got rolling at 6 / - 1 in the betting. The winning owners, J. R. and R. E. Cates of Tulsa, Okla. collected \$192,730 from a thumping gross purse of \$419,460. The winning time was 20.3 seconds. Ted W. Wells Jr. was the winning trainer. The 7-5 favorite, Rapid Volley, came on in the final portions to take third.

1966-Go Dick Go owned by Joseph Leitner of Brandon, Fla. rallied out of fourth place to take a head win as a 8-1 outsider. Buddy Nesmith was up. The track was fast. Go Dick Go stopped the clock in 20.27 seconds, a clocking which set a seasonal record. The gross purse of \$430,600 netted a winner's slice of \$198,300. Top Ladybug, the even-money favorite, had the lead on the first jump but sagged to third.

1967-Laico Bird broke with the leaders from the No. 5 slot and settled in second place. She steadily improved her position, then surged into the lead a few yards from the wire and had enough left to hold off the furious late attack by Sea Nymph. The victory margin was a head. Laico Bird raced as a 3-1 shot. She was owned by Floyd Jones Jr. of Norman, Okla. Bobby Harmon was up. The gross purse swelled up to \$486,600, and Laico Bird collected \$228,300. The winning time, on a fast track, was 20.11. The favorite, Turf's Best, was never in contention.

1968-Three Oh's, a 3-1 shot piloted by Jerry Nicodemus, pounded his way out of third place to snare a head win on a fast track. The winning owner was D. G. Strole of Abilene, Texas. The victory gave Trainer Bubba Cascio, and Jockey Nicodemus, the first of their two All-American wins. Three Oh's was timed in 20.07 seconds. The colt collected \$160,373 out of \$602,000. The '68 running marked the beginning of All-American consolation races. Joda Bux operated as a 2-1 favorite in the '68 All-American finale, but ended up fifth in a lukewarm performance.

1969-Easy Jet, regarded by many as one of the greatest running quarter horses in history, jumped into an early lead on a rain-drenched track and flashed to a neck lead as a 2-1 shot. More than 10,000 fans were on hand, despite the rains. Easy Jet was ridden by Willie Lovell. The colt, later to

become a tremendous sire, was owned and trained by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Okla. The gross purse reached \$600,000 and Easy Jet took home \$159,840. The winner was clocked in 20.49 seconds. Co-favorite, Miss Three Wars, was second.

1970-Rocket Wrangler, the property of J. R. Adams of Guyton, Okla. opened up a half-length lead at the start, then fought off Bunny Bid for a neck win in a tight three-horse finish. Rocket Wrangler was ridden by Jerry Nicodemus. Bubba Cascio was the trainer. The winning time, on a fast track, was 20.09. The gross purse soared up to \$670,000, providing Rocket Wrangler with a resounding \$178,788.

1971-Mr. Kid Charge stepped off a half-length win in a front-running performance. The colt, purchased for a modest \$4,100 in the previous year's All-American Yearling Sale, banked a tremendous \$200,841. The gross purse escalated up to \$753,910. Mr. Kid Charge was piloted by Johnny Cox for Will F. Whitehead of Del Rio, Texas. The colt carried odds of 5-1. The late James Chapman did the training. The fans centered their mutual attentions on Come Six (3-1), who ran second, and Mr. Jet Moore (3-1), who got in last. Mr. Kid Charge's clocking of 19.65 seconds established a track record which still stands.

1972-Possumjet, a filly owned by Jack Byers of Blanchard, Okla. scored a landmark win as the All-American Futurity surpassed original purse projections and soared over the \$1 million level a year ahead of schedule. Possumjet barreled out of the No. 7 post with Pete Herrera aboard and outlasted Miss Ooo Wee and Callmemyoh (the 9-5 favorite) in an extremely tight three-horse finish. Possumjet covered the distance in 20.04 seconds and collected \$336,629 out of a gross purse of \$1,035,900. Possumjet never again duplicated the form she displayed in that brilliant All-American win.

1973-Timeto Thinkrich turned in a front-running length victory as the All-American Futurity was expanded from 400 yards to the classic quarter-mile distance (440 yards). John Watson was up for the Vessels Stallion Farm of Los Alamitos, Calif. The trainer was Jerry Fisher. Timeto Thinkrich was clocked in 21.58 seconds (the All-American record at the 440 distance) and earned \$330,000 as the All-American was structured with a built-in ceiling of \$1,030,000 in order to spawn its three-year-old counterpart, the

All-American Derby. Coco's Kid, the 7-5 favorite, came in third. Timeto Thinkrich, aided immensely by his All-American purse, went on to become the second-richest quarter horse in history (at one point) with a bankroll of \$612,858.

1974-Easy Date ruined Timy's Gay's bid to become the first Triple Crown winner in quarter horse history with a mighty late attack on the far outside. It took a photo-finish to pry the two apart, and Easy Date got the decision by the slimmest of noses. The filly, owned by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Okla. picked up \$330,000 from the \$1,030,000 bonanza. Don Knight was up. The trainer was James McArthur. Easy Date went on to post the sport's top money line of \$849,709 (a figure which has since been eclipsed). A sidelight to her victory was the fact she was the first All-American winner to be sired by an All-American winner. (Her sire is Easy Jet.)

1975-Bugs Alive In 75 got an early stranglehold and never let go. The handsome colt ended the sprint with a length lead as a 7-2 shot. Jerry Burgess was up. The winning owner was Ralph Shebestor of Wynnewood, Okla. J. B. Montgomery did the training. Bugs Alive In 75 clocked the distance in 21.98 seconds. He earned the standard \$330,000 from the \$1,030,000 purse. The favorite, Rocket's Magic (5-2), rallied out of sixth place to take third.

1976-Real Wind poured it on at the end in a magnificent performance to win going away by 1 ¾ lengths as a 3-2 favorite. The filly raced for retired school teachers, Elsie and J. D. Kitchens of Ft. Sumner, N. M. Gary Sumpter was up. The trainer, T. A. Walker. Real Wind took a slightly wayward course at the end, but in no way bothered the competition. The 2-1 favorite, Lord Winsalot, had to scramble at the end to take second. The winning time was 21.70 seconds. Real Wind enriched her owners by \$330,000. The gross purse was \$1,030,000.

1977-Hot Idea, one of the great bargains in quarter horse racing, went through the 1976 All-American Yearling Sale and was taken for a slim \$4,000. In the All-American, she made her third career start and hit the final yards with a tremendous attack to win by 1 3/4 lengths. The filly is owned by Ted Bruce and Floyd Jackson of Estelina, Texas. Gene Terfittlet, the man who urged Bruce and Jackson to buy the filly in the All-American Sale, was the trainer. Hot Idea spanned the

440 yards on a heavy track and was timed in 22.75 seconds. She earned \$330,000 out of the \$1,030,000 gross pot. Terry Lipham was up.

1978-Moon Lark, racing from the No. 3 post as the 8-5 second favorite, burst into the early lead and stayed on top all the way. The colt, who had established the second best qualifying time (22.18) hit the tape ¾ lengths on top in a strong performance as Vespero, the people's choice, weakened and sailed in fourth. Moon Lark is owned by Paul Sam and James Howard, a trio who later banded together under the banner of Moon Lark, Inc. Moon Lark earned \$437,500 with his All-American Futurity win. He eventually earned a total of \$859,356. Jack Brooks was the trainer. Jacky Martin was the rider.

1979-Pie In The Sky, top qualifier at 21.66 seconds, got a tremendous jump from the No. 9 post. Before the competition knew what was happening Pie In The Sky was on top by a half-length. He continued to open up and soared across the finish with an impressive 1 ½ length lead. Danny Cardoza was in the driver's seat. The winning time, on a fast track, was 21.76. Pie In The Sky earned \$437,500 for owners, Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas. Leo Wood trained the colt.

1980-Higheasterjet, 13-1, got a tremendous jump from the rail post. Mighty Deck Three, an odds-on favorite, broke a bit sluggishly, then unleashed a fast-closing attack. But Higheasterjet, brilliantly ridden by Billy Hunt, held off the people's choice by a nose. Higheasterjet raced in the All-American as the object of a partnership involving G. D. Highsmith of La Grange, Texas; L. E. Willis of San Antonio, Texas; Allen Taylor of Beeville, Texas; and Myron Palermo of Houston. The partnership expired the day after the All-American. Higheasterjet's All-American purse was \$440,000, a record at that time.

1981-Early in the season, Special Effort was purchased for \$1 million by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas. That was the biggest price ever paid for a quarter horse in training. On the eve of the All-American trials, the colt was syndicated for \$15 million. He set the top qualifying time of the All-American (21.78 seconds), and had no trouble winning the finale, on a rain-drenched track. His four-length margin was the biggest in All-American history. The win, his


ninth against no defeats, also made him the first horse to win the Triple Crown (earlier, he'd won the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities). The All-American victory purse, increased to \$528,000, put Special Effort's career earnings at \$1,106,723-making him the biggest money-maker in quarter horse history. The colt is trained by Johnie Goodman. W. R. Hunt is the rider.

1982-Mr Master Bug, running as part of a favored \$1 million, 10-1 entry, broke in third place and fought his way to a ¾ length win in the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity and became an instant millionaire. 1982 was the first year a new \$1 million winner's purse was paid to the victor. Mr Master Bug's stablemate, Miss Squaw Hand, finished second. Both horses are owned by Marvin Barnes of Ada, Okla. Jacky Martin's brilliant ride on Mr Master Bug gave him a second All-American win. Miss Squaw Hand was handled by Jerry Burgess. Jack Brooks was the trainer.

1983-On A High, a 14-1 longshot ridden by Steve Harris, emerged powerfully out of fifth place to win by a head and claim the \$1 million victory prize. On A High came out of the All-American Futurity with career earnings of \$1,085,851 (fifth-richest of all time at that point). The colt is owned by Jerry Rheudasil of Lewisville, Texas; B. F. Phillips Jr. of Frisco, Texas; and Preston Carter of Dallas. C. Dwayne Gilbreath does the training. On A High is a half-brother to Yankee Win, the filly (owned by Rheudasil) who won the 1982 Rainbow Futurity, was made the second-favorite in the All-American, broke down near the finish line, and passed away several weeks later.

1984-Eastex turned in a dramatic performance charging out of fifth place to win the '84 All-American Futurity. The gelding, backed down to a 2-1 favorite, broke off the pace in the 440 yard classic, but gathered momentum and took command of the dash about 50 yards from the wire. He won by 1 lengths and earned \$1 million for owners Dr. Dale Hall and his wife Peggy Jo of Ada, Okla. Eastex stepped the quarter-mile distance in 21.41 seconds on a track listed as slow. In winning the All-American Futurity, Eastex boosted his career earnings to \$1,524,967-ranking him among the top 10 richest quarter horses of all time. Eastex was piloted by Bruce Pilkenton and trained by James McArthur.

Jockey / Trainer Of The Week

RUIDOSO DOWNS, N. M. — Steve Harris and Jack Brooks won the week's biggest race, but Ramon Apodaca and Edward Thompson earned jockey and trainer of the week honors, respectively, for their efforts the five-day racing weekend

(Aug. 21-25) at Ruidoso Downs. Harris rode the Brooks-trained filly Heavenly to a dramatic score in the \$992,000 All-American Derby on Sunday afternoon. That win provided a huge payday for both jockey and trainer, who both are

customarily awarded 10 percent of the winner's purse, which was \$424,687. Harris rode five winners on the week, as did the veteran Apodaca, who won the weekly award based on a better winning percentage.

Apodaca scored three of his wins last Thursday, and was five-for-19 for the week.

Leading rider Joe Martinez also won five times and leads runnerup Jacky Martin 73-42 with five racing days remaining this season. Martinez did not ride on Sunday; he was in Santa Fe to accept a stakes mount there.

Trainer Thompson was one of five conditioners to send out three winners on the week. All of his wins came last Thursday, when he sent out a trio of longshots who all came back winners. They were Count Hot Stuff (who paid \$23.60), Ajimura (\$30.00) and Kaksi (\$16.00). All three won easily.

Also winning three times were Brooks, Bob Arnett, Hugh Tucker and Dwayne Gilbreath. Gilbreath won the \$186,000 All-American Derby First Consolation and is second in the standings, trailing leader Bill Leach 43-40. Leach sent out Shounds Sharp to win Saturday's Miss New Mexican Handicap.

Racing Secretary Harold Payne has assigned a 123-pound impost to Straight Forward for Friday's headliner. That will be the highest weight the bay gelding has shouldered in his summer campaign at this mountain track.

My Going Jesse, the horse who took advantage of Straight Forward's mishap in the Gene Hensley to post a nose decision, will carry second high weight in Friday's Brigand at 122. The 8-year-old was three-quarter lengths back of Straight Forward in the Flying Charm, but will have to make up ground out of the seven hole in the Brigand 'Cap.

Special Hank threatens off a decisive allowance win over three of the horses in the Brigand. Rounding out the field are: Short Shift, World Champion Sgt Pepper Feature, Bozart, Shucky Who and Mr Ground Squirrel.

Ruidoso Downs hosts two stakes on Saturday - the \$168,000 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity over 6 furlongs, and the 3rd Consolation of the All American Futurity. First post is 1 p.m.

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


But the hour was late and promises had been made to the babysitter, so we were unable to stay for the performance, exciting as it must have been.

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



Both men are public servants elected by the people to do a job. Regardless of their differences, their basic desire should be to proceed with the case. And it seems there is no way for the case to proceed properly without complete cooperation between the two officials.

We encourage Sullivan and Weldon to set aside their differences, adopt an attitude of positive cooperation, and direct all their efforts toward bringing the McKnight murderers to justice.—DJP

Reporter's Round

Language, a fascinating part of our daily life, is taken for granted by one and all as we use, abuse and misuse this irreplaceable communications tool.

Reading a national column in another newspaper, I was amused by the headline, "Abusers of language get rapped on their knuckles." I couldn't resist reading the catalog of "pet peeves" involving the English language.

My mother, an English major, was challenged by raising children in West Texas. She was determined that we would speak correctly in spite of the "Texan" that was spoken in our neighborhood. While she never actually rapped our knuckles, she verbally chastised any family member using incorrect grammar.

She still does, but she now has nine grandchildren to educate along with her three growing children. She will never stop trying.

One "peeve" that I share with the contributors is using the word "lady" instead of "woman."

My mom passed along to me her hearty dislike of this accepted trend, explaining that a "lady" is a woman of refinement, whereas a "woman" is any adult of the female gender.

The term "ladies' night," widely used to advertise special times at bars and nightclubs, seems especially inappropriate. Another surprising combination of words is "bag lady."

And please, don't call women girls. A girl is a young, unmarried female—referring to a grown woman as a girl is no compliment.

All of my mother's granddaughters "lay out" in the summer when they want to get a suntan. Grandmother has begged all the girls not to misuse the word "lay," which means to "place, deposit or wager."

Her pleas have gone unheeded, because this misuse apparently is generally accepted.

Another writer advocates putting a stop to prefacing sentences with the word "hopefully" in place of "I hope." This is another misuse that has become widely accepted, but still is incorrect.

Somewhere I learned that ending a sentence with a preposition is incorrect grammar, like "Where's it at?" I hear that particular sentence

quite often, and have begun to wonder if I'm mistaken, and ask myself, "Where did I learn that lesson at?"

"Irregardless," is a non-word double negative that is so widely used that it is listed in some dictionaries with the notation that it is "non-standard." I can't believe Webster gave in to public pressure.

Other "peeves" from the column include using "I feel ..." when you really mean "I think ..." saying "got" for "have," for instance "got the idea?" and ending every sentence with the question "right?"

A headline just left of the column said, "Pep club holds meeting." My editor says you can never under any circumstances "hold" a meeting. He's right, it would be a physical impossibility to "hold" a meeting, but meetings are "held" every day anyway.

Apparently using "hold" for "conduct" or "have" has been so widely practiced that the misuse is accepted by many, but not by all. We're trying, Darrell.

People speaking at meetings use expressions like "by and large," which doesn't mean anything; they often say "at this point in time" when they mean right now or last week or yesterday; and some meeting-goers use an expression that involves comparing apples and oranges (you can't).

Apparently those expressions are a part of a new "official meeting language," that is designed to use as many words as possible to say as little as possible. As a "professional meeting-goer" I am annoyed by this trend.

I would advocate a return to the basics when speaking either publicly or privately. And say what you mean.

When I call someone on the telephone, and am told that "he's tied up," I have to laugh at the mental image those words create.

Or how about "law office" as a telephone greeting? How many offices are able to answer telephones?

"Last but not least," another trite and overused expression could describe my last item on a list of things not to say: "Have a nice day."

Unless you really mean it, don't tell me to have a nice day. Right?

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It would be crude to openly express triumph or defeat at a governmental meeting, but nothing forbids the use of body language for that purpose.

There was a lot of that form of silent communication when the Board of Finance met last week to consummate its deal to refinance outstanding seyerance tax bonds.

Those who were getting what they wanted, notably bond attorneys and brokers who would make megabucks on the deal, were working to keep their smiles from becoming indecently wide. Several of them looked as though they were enjoying the sound of soft music—the cash register's ring.

Others who appeared to sense the sweet smell of success were Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels and board member Lisa McDowell, whose push to accomplish this refunding had initially been frustrated by State Auditor Al Romero. Now they had come up winners, and Runnels at least could barely conceal his self-congratulation.

Those in the room with folded arms and intermittent scowls were clearly of the opposite disposition.

They included representatives of the Attorney General's office, which seldom sees eye to eye with Toney Anaya on anything. They had been on the same side as Romero in the first effort to block this action, and clearly were not new converts to the notion that it was all being done for the good of New Mexicans.

The bare news accounts of this meeting leave out mention of such non-essentials as the emotion with which the deal was greeted, but that doesn't make the diversity of reaction any less dramatic.

By next year, something like \$75 million worth of refund checks will go out to what are known as members of "the Brewer class." The money will be delivered to those who were customers of Southern Union Gas Company at a particular period in history because federal courts have ordered that done.

None of the checks will actually bear the signature of Gene Gallegos, Santa Fe attorney who led the phalanx of legal eagles that convinced the court to order this refund. Some political sharpies, however, believe most of those to whom the money goes will feel at least a momentary twinge of gratitude to Gene.

So, they are asking, why not make political capital of that fact? Why not run this guy for something? What they have agreed upon as the proper place for Gene is the office of lieutenant governor, to which they think he would restore some dignity.

They are trying to sell him on the fact that he could, if elected, make big time with the citizens by shutting down this unnecessary and presently overstaffed office, and returning the job to the part-time capacity the Constitution apparently envisions. (There is no provision there for anything except a person to take the place of the governor

under certain conditions and to preside over the Senate when it is meeting. The post was allowed to expand into a full-time position when it was first held by Roberto Mondragon, who needed work.)

Gallegos, who once ran for Congress against Manuel Lujan, is an attractive candidate. If he didn't have to give up his lucrative law practice, he might find the LG's job a pleasant point at which to return to the political arena.

Insecure bureaucrats are always the kind who don't want to let "outsiders" learn anything. When passing out written reports to boards, commissions or committees, they are the ones who never make enough copies for the press or the public who are present.

Even though reason says reporters will be more likely to write accurate stories if provided the material to do that, these folks exclude the rest of us lest by knowing what's going on we become as much "insiders" as they are.

Governor Anaya always stops meetings and makes them go prepare the copies they should have provided in the first place.


I have been at meetings, read the

Cooking like a pro

The problem with many cookbooks is that dishes tend to be more expensive, complicated and time-consuming than the average family can afford. Most cookbooks do not include a section for soup and sandwiches, an economical meal both in time and money.

But Janel Franklin, of Tahoka, Texas, and Sue Vaughn, of Lamesa, Texas, completed their cookbook, "Calf Fries to Caviar," which they call a "collection of recipes gathered over the years."

"Every time we started to cook we would have to retrieve scraps of paper. Neither one of us was organized," said Vaughn. The cookbook idea began as a simple organizing endeavor. "We decided to type up our recipes and Xerox them," she continued. "And then we wanted a cover for it. And then we decided to go to a printer. It just happened."

Organizing family recipes was also a way for the two women to teach their children to cook. "We started it for our kids," Franklin said. "They were all grown, but they kept calling home and asking for recipes. Collect. We thought the book might be a little easier."

A project they thought would take two and a half months extended into two and a half years. "We really think we've done a great job," Vaughn said. The recipes are easy to read, go step by step and the ingredients are in bold type for easier reading.

"We've sold a lot to men," Vaughn said. "We wanted it to be appropriate for our sons, so we didn't put any hearts and flowers stuff around the borders."

When the book was finished, they decided to order 5,000 copies. "We swore that no one but our husbands would know about it," Vaughn said. "We didn't want to be laughed out of the country."

"In three and a half months we were sold out and we were hoping to sell them all in three years," Franklin added.

In less than two years, they have sold 21,000 copies, a figure Franklin attributes to a recipe for Turtle Cake.

A simple dinner menu from the cookbook starts with Perfect Roast Beef (recipe below), Vegetable Salad A'Lot (an eight-layer salad), Melodise's Quick Rice, Featherweight Rolls (this recipe calls for six packages of yeast) and the Turtle Cake for dessert.

PERFECT ROAST BEEF:

Use either prime rib, rolled or rump roast, any size, and salt and pepper.

Place in roasting pan on a rack, uncovered, in a preheated 375-degree oven. After one hour, turn off the oven, but do not open the oven door. For rare roast beef, turn oven on to 300 degrees 45 minutes before serving. For medium meat, turn the oven on to 300 degrees 50 minutes before serving. For medium-well, turn the oven on 55 minutes before serving.

Both Franklin and Vaughn said they were skeptical of this recipe, but a note at the top of the page says, "This really works." A hint at the bottom of the recipe warns, "Just follow the directions and Don't Peep, Don't Peep!"

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

McMillan is scheduled to serve with the 2nd Organizational Maintenance Squadron at Barksdale Air Force Base in Louisiana.



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
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





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
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
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
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
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A helicopter carries wet concrete to another part of the ski area during the replacement of lift number one. The concrete was used as the foundation of the tower bases.





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Principals in McKnight case speak

Controversy surrounds investigations of the November murders of Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight in their Picacho ranch home.

The bodies were discovered November 15 on the kitchen floor, and, according to the Lincoln County Sheriff, both victims were shot in the head after they were dead.

Early investigations included the New Mexico State Police and the sheriff's office, but after a short time the state police either left or were called off the case.

When 12th Judicial District At-

torney James Weldon was sworn in on January 2, he entered the case. Weldon said he began requesting information from Sheriff Tom Sullivan as of that date, but has had no cooperation.

Sullivan, who says he knows who murdered the McKnights and wants the DA to call for a grand jury, avers that he and his investigators have cooperated with Weldon, but "cooperation has been all one way."

In the meantime, some family members are ready to see an end to the investigation and an arrest. The sister of one victim, Terrie Bussey, and the brother of the other, Donald Frank "Pacho" McKnight, are circulating a petition that calls for an investigation into Weldon's handling of the case, and barring that, a special grand jury.

Weldon conducted a press conference Friday and Sullivan had a news conference Monday.

Warriors hope to end Silver City's reign

Could this be the year?

Will Ruidoso finally topple Silver City as kingpin of District 3-AAA?

The prospects are bright for a good season. The Warriors had an 8-3-1 record last season and made the state playoff semi-finals before losing to state champion Artesia, 21-6. They finished second in the district to always-powerful Silver City.

Ruidoso has a solid nucleus of players back from last season, particularly on defense.

What will be the key to the team's chances?

"Improvement," said head coach Cooper Henderson simply. "We're more set on defense than on offense."

The Warriors have eight returning starters on defense and five on offense, although not all of them may start at the same position.

"The offensive line is where we have the least experience on the team," said Henderson.

But the Warriors have talent in the offensive forward wall.

All-district center James Herrera returns, but the 175-pound athlete will start at strong guard this season.

Mark Flack and Ruben Herrera are the top candidates for the center spot. Ruidoso has good size at tackle with 230-pound Phillip Herrera, Jimmy Frost and Jason Hill.

Brian Davis at split end and Bobby Dickinson and Matt Evans at tight end have talent and experience.

Ruidoso does not have to take a back seat to any team in the AAA division at quarterback or tailback.

Russell Easter returns at quarterback. He made the all-district first team last season and has the running ability to handle the Warriors' Wing-T offense.

Michael Williamson scored 18 touchdowns from his tailback position last fall. The speedy 140-pounder should be a strong candidate for all-state this season.

Billy Harrison has been moved from guard to fullback. Harrison started at

guard last year, but has enough speed to play fullback.

Kirk Taylor probably will go at wingback. Bubba Miller also could see a lot of action there.

But defense is where the Warriors are especially strong.

Jeff Maxwell is the middle linebacker. Bobby Dickinson started at that position, but has been switched to the outside. Chuck Daniels at the other outside linebacker post is another returning starter.

All-district first team safety Jeff Willingham returns in the defensive backfield as does cornerback Mitch Mullican.

Randy Reynolds, Miller and Toby Rue are other top defensive backs. Taylor started last season and also could see some playing time in the defensive secondary.

Evans, James Herrera and Shayne Fredrick are top defensive line prospects.

Willingham probably will be the punter. Garrett Henson and Frost are battling for the kicking spot.

Henderson is optimistic about the season.

"We're looking forward to the challenge," he remarked. "The players are excited and we hope the community is excited, too."

Henderson sees defending champion Silver City as the team to beat.

"They always are," he said. "They always have a senior ballclub and have a lot of players to draw from."

The Warrior coach sees Deming as being tough. Ruidoso had to defeat Deming to make the state playoffs last season.


"They've got a new coach and had an undefeated junior varsity team last season," Henderson said.

Ruidoso will open the season Friday, August 30, at Artesia.







Peralta is a tailback, Padilla will go at quarterback and Layher will be the center. Layher is the biggest starter at 215 pounds.


The Tigers have 32 players out for the team in grades nine to 12.

"We have more speed than we've had here in the past," Wharton commented. "We also have some size."


McCabe Turner, Rusty Silva and Logan Stirman are top backfield candidates.
