

Warriors declaw Wildcats

The defense set up or scored five touchdowns as the unbeaten Ruidoso High School varsity football team took a decisive 41-6 win over host Tularosa Friday night.

It was the first time in 24 years that Ruidoso had defeated Tularosa on the Wildcat's field. The top-ranked Warriors are now 4-0 on the season.

Ruidoso's defense set up four of the first five Warrior touchdowns with turnovers, and the final Ruidoso score came on a 34-yard run with a fumble by Toby Rue in the late stages of the third quarter.

The Warriors narrowly missed their first shutout of the season, as Tularosa scored its only touchdown on a one-yard run with three seconds left in the game.

"The kids are coming along," said a happy Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson after the game. "We're right on schedule. The kids keep getting better."

Ruidoso opened up the scoring midway through the first quarter.

After Tularosa drove to the Warrior 20, Ruidoso recovered a fumble and drove 80 yards in just four plays.

Tailback Michael Williamson rambled for 35 yards behind some excellent blocking to the Wildcat 46. Three plays later, quarterback Russell Easter went to his left and outran the Tularosa defenders for a 33-yard touchdown.

Garret Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso had a 7-0 lead with 6:43 left in the opening period.

Ruidoso struck again within minutes.

On Tularosa's third play from scrimmage following the touchdown, Ruidoso middle linebacker Jeff Maxwell picked off a pass and returned it for a touchdown.

However, the Warriors were called for clipping and the ball was put back on the Wildcat 30.

No matter, Ruidoso scored in five plays (all on the ground) with Williamson going over from the one.

Henson's kick again was good and Ruidoso led, 14-0, with 3:05 still left in the opening period.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Warriors tried an on-side kick and Ruidoso's Rod Wright recovered on the Tularosa 47.

It took just three plays for Ruidoso to score, with Easter hitting Brian Davis on a 46-yard touchdown pass.

Henson again kicked the extra point and Ruidoso took a 21-0 lead into the second quarter.

Another interception by Maxwell put the Warriors in scoring position late in the second period.

The Warriors middle linebacker picked off a Wildcat pass at the Tularosa 40 and returned it to the 26.

Two plays later, Williamson cut to his left and ran 23 yards for the touchdown. Henson's kick was good and Ruidoso took a 28-0 lead into the locker room at halftime.

The Warriors concluded their scoring with two touchdowns in the third quarter.

Outside linebacker Chuck Daniels recovered a Tularosa fumble at the Wildcat 30.

After a pass interference penalty, Easter found tight end Bobby Dickinson in the end zone for a touchdown. Henson's kick was wide but Ruidoso led 34-0 with 2:25 left in the quarter.

It took less than two minutes for the Warriors to gain their final touchdown on Rue's fumble recovery and run for the score.

The Warrior coaches played mostly second and third-string players in the final quarter.

Ruidoso gained 365 yards total offense, 191 running and 174 passing. Tularosa had 117 yards total offense, 64 running and 52 passing.

Williamson led the Warrior rushers with 107 yards in 12 carries. He now has seven touchdowns and one two-point conversion on the season.

Easter now has thrown five touchdown passes and run for three scores on the season.

Ruidoso intercepted six passes, two by Maxwell and one each by Jeff Willingham, Randy Reynolds, Rue and Dickinson.

"It's hard to say if it was our best defensive performance of the season," Henderson said. "But we're right where we want to be."

Ruidoso will have its homecoming game this Friday night against the Portales Rams. The game will start at 7:30.

NOTES—Maxwell won the Golden Helmet award. Other Warrior weekly winners were Kerry Jameson, top offensive player; Matt Evans and Mitch Mullican, top defensive players; Jef Sherwood, top kicking team player; and Matthew Grego, top scout team player.

Airport impact statement meeting is set

Envirosphere Company, the firm preparing an environmental impact statement (EIS) for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, will present the third in a series of public meetings at 6:30 p.m. today (Monday), September 23, in council chambers of Ruidoso Village Hall.

A preliminary draft EIS is presently being reviewed by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and will be discussed during tonight's meeting. Robert Lytle of Envirosphere will be on hand to lead the discussion and answer questions on his findings.

Members of the public will have the opportunity for informal discussion tonight. A formal public review and comment period and public hearing will follow the formal issuance of the draft statement, probably in late October to early December.

During scoping meetings conducted in the summer of 1984 by the FAA in Ruidoso and Carrizozo, significant issues were identified including alternatives for airport planners. Alternatives mentioned were 1) no action, 2) expand the existing municipal airport, 3) close the existing airport with no replacement and 4) replace the existing airport with a new facility at a new site.

Other issues discussed were the impact of a new airport on the New Mexico State University Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch, evaluation of financial and socioeconomic impacts, impacts on land uses and possible effects on archaeological,

historical and cultural resources. Lytle made progress reports during March 25 and July 16 meetings in Ruidoso. He presented a briefing document in July, and announced an accelerated EIS schedule in which the date of the final statement was moved from late March 1986 to late January 1986.

The meeting is open to the public.

Commission hires airport engineers

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission Wednesday authorized Chairman Fred Heckman and vice-chairman Ken Nosker to sign an engineering contract with Leeds Hill Herkenhoff of Albuquerque.

During the more than five-hour special meeting, which replaced Thursday's regularly scheduled meeting, commissioners completed negotiations with the engineering firm and reviewed the preliminary contract, according to Heckman.

The 20-page document now will be thoroughly reviewed by legal representatives of both the commission and the engineers. It then must be approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and the state Department of Aviation, Heckman said.

The commission will get another chance to see the contract if changes are inserted by the reviewers.

Heckman also was authorized to sign a notice to proceed, instructing engineers to begin construction on the airport project once the contract is ratified.

"Every hour counts," said Heckman, who stressed the urgency to complete each step toward the construction of a new airport facility on the Fort Stanton Mesa as quickly as possible.

Highway officials report on projects

Lincoln County has received \$10.2 million in highway improvement contracts during the last three years, reports L.A. "Larry" Larranaga, chief highway administrator.

Larranaga spoke Thursday morning during an open house at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, and listed county projects, including three on Highway 70, one on Highway 54 north of Carrizozo, four bridge replacement projects on Highway 380, a project on State Highway 48 between Angus and Capitan and various others.

About \$29 million in additional highway improvements for Lincoln County are included in the state Highway Department's current five-year plan, said Larranaga.

In Ruidoso for a meeting of the New Mexico Highway Commission, Larranaga said the governor instructed him to schedule public meetings throughout the state to "open up some dialogues" between his department and the citizenry.

With Larranaga at the chamber were Bill Lee of Lovington, this district's (District Two) commissioner; Lou Medrano of Roswell, District Two engineer; and Tony Gonzales of Santa Fe, administrative assistant for the Highway Department.

In addition to the over \$10 million spent in the county, Larranaga said the state had participated in other area projects through cooperative (co-op) agreements. Co-op funds are provided on approved projects at a ratio of a 60 percent state contribution and 40 percent local participation.

During fiscal year 1985, Lincoln County received \$233,200, and the Village of Ruidoso received \$152,000 in co-op funds. Co-op funds approved for the current fiscal year, 1986, include \$130,000 for the county, \$120,000 for Ruidoso, \$40,000 for Capitan and \$150,000 for Ruidoso Downs.

Lincoln County has been allocated \$114,500 this fiscal year through the state's school bus route program, added Larranaga.

Frank Potter, assistant Ruidoso village manager, told Larranaga how valuable co-op funds have been to Ruidoso. He said the many projects completed by the Village "absolutely could not have been done any other way."

Larranaga said that of the state Highway Department's nearly \$370 million annual budget, about \$240 million goes directly to road construction.

Larranaga said District Two received \$6 million in requests for the \$1.6 million in funds available for co-op programs this year. Requests were carefully reviewed and allocated according to "the highest need," he said.

"If you believe in the co-op and school bus routes and the assistance we give you, go to the Legislature and tell them," said Larranaga.

"We consider the Lincoln County area to be one of the major areas of importance to the state and the district," said Commissioner Lee, citing the area's tourism industry as one that benefits the entire state, making access arteries of prime importance.

Larranaga said his agency is already planning feasibility studies on access roads to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, and added that they will continue to monitor that project.

He also related how the Highway Department is working to reduce the number of miles of state roads by trading low-volume state roads for high-volume local roads. Gavilan Canyon Road may be considered for such a trade, he said.

"We usually like to end up on the short end of an exchange," said Lee. Larranaga said an ideal trade would be for the Highway Depart-

ment to take over less than 10 miles of highly-traveled roadways, and give a local entity 40 or more miles of seldom-used roads.

Audience members wanted to know when Highway 37 will be widened, what plans the state has for the traffic "Y" when Ski Run Road will be repaired and the possibility of opening a state highway between Tularosa and Truth or Consequences.

Larranaga said Highway 37 improvements are included in the department's five-year plan, but may be moved up if the airport causes a huge increase in traffic. He said a traffic signal and road maintenance are on tap for the "Y," but no changes in configuration are planned.

He said possibilities are very slim of adding a new highway, such as the road from Tularosa to Truth or Consequences. With 12,000 roads in the system now, he said current trends are to decrease that number.

Medrano said work on Ski Run Road is under way.

Several citizens complained of drainage problems along Sudderth Drive, and Medrano said his office is working on the overall problem. He said he was working toward a total solution instead of isolated instances.

Before the meeting adjourned, Commissioner Lee commented on the smooth working relationship shared by the Highway Department, the Highway Commission and Governor's office.

"Our relationship with the Anaya administration has been one of the smoothest relationships I've seen in state government," said Lee.

Highway commissioners met Thursday and Friday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.



Senator Bingaman announces Healthnet

Senator Jeff Bingaman, in the Ruidoso area to speak to a gathering of Tenneco legal staff members from throughout the Southwest, announced the formation of an organization to promote better health for New Mexicans.

Healthnet-New Mexico, as the organization is named, is a joint project of Bingaman and state broadcasters. Ultimate missions of the project include improving the quality of life in the state, increasing productivity and lowering medical costs.

The organization has been in the planning stages for some time, and Bingaman said Saturday that he had introduced Healthnet during a press conference earlier that day in Albuquerque. He named some members of the 24-member board at the conference.

The board will have 15 appointed members with staggered terms and nine ex officio members who sit on the Healthnet board because of their other positions.

Those nine slots will include the two New Mexico Senators, the Dean of the University of New Mexico Medical School, the state Secretary of Health and Environment, the state epidemiologist, the superintendent of public instruction, the president of the New Mexico Broadcasters Association, the president of the New Mexico Federation of Advertisers and the Albuquerque area director of the Indian Health Service.

Joe Carriere, general manager of

KBIM Television in Roswell, was among board appointments announced Saturday. Bingaman said he didn't name all 15 members of the board, but will encourage those already named to complete the membership.

Funding for Healthnet will be from donations, and Jack Waugh of Bingaman's Washington office said the organization has already received commitments for nearly \$50,000. Waugh said about \$80,000 is needed to operate the program for the first year.

Bingaman said an executive director and a small staff will conduct Healthnet programs.

Five objectives that Bingaman listed for Healthnet include identifying lifestyle changes that will lead to a higher level of health statewide, developing effective messages to encourage New Mexicans to make such lifestyle changes, conducting a vigorous five-year statewide public health promotion media campaign, monitoring the extent of changes in lifestyle and improvement in the health of New Mexicans during the campaign and identifying and considering future health promotion and wellness-related projects.

Southwest Community Health Services, parent company to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, is among organizations committing funds to Healthnet-New Mexico. Other contributors include Mountain Bell, Texas-New Mexico Power Company and Public Service Company of New Mexico.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Anybody who engages in the business of mouthing-off in public would be silly not to pay heed to the incoming mall.

A recent letter says this: "Although I voted for Toney Anaya because I thought he'd been a strong, forthright and forceful Attorney General, I have changed my mind during his governorship."

"However, the views you have often expressed in your column (with which I mostly agree) have been so virulently critical and sarcastic that sometimes you create the impression that you are 'out to get Toney, no matter what.' ...

"Perhaps by expressing your opinions a little less violently you might win even more supporters." The point is well taken. Without doubt, the noises made here sometimes rise to a level that is shrill, and the charges may sound as though they were hyperbolic.

That may be the wrong way to go about things.

If there is a defense for the man who pounds these typewriter keys, it has to be based on sincerity.

If you sit very close to the center of state government and consistently-day in and day out-see things that your judgment tells you are bad for New Mexico, it's hard not to want to warn people about them.

What's more, you want to make the point with such force that nobody can miss it.

That's what comes from caring. You would like to grab your readers by the shirtfront and ask, "Do you understand how bad things really are here?" You want to shout, "Don't make the mistake of shrugging this information off. Maybe the wrath sounds exaggerated to you, but it's real. These are actions we all ought to be disturbed by."

As for speaking a little more softly as a technique for attracting followers, that's undoubtedly a good plan. It's just that not everybody is capable of it.

At all times in history, "trouble-makers" have been advised to keep their voices down. If you do that, however, your message can get lost

in the multitude of distractions experienced by the average reader. That may lead to its going totally unheeded.

If you think what you have to say matters, that's the one risk you are not allowed to run.

Congressman Bill Richardson says he now plans "to make a career of Congress."

Doesn't that decision have more to do with the way the voters feel than the way the Congressman does?

That statement from Our Bill came when he was explaining why he decided to resign as chairman of the House of Representatives' Hispanic Caucus. He said he took that action because he wants to give more attention to "statewide projects" in New Mexico, though there appears to be evidence that the decision was helped along by a realization that he was not going to be re-elected to the caucus post in an upcoming contest.

When asked to give examples of the kind of "statewide" topics he was interested in, he named two, both of them located in the territory of and watched over by Congressman Joe Skeen. It would be simpler, of course, for him to select projects in his own district and go after those with all his might.

All this led Paul Wieck, Washington correspondent for the Albuquerque Journal, to turn out an opinion column in which he gives as his judgment the fact that Richardson is good in one-on-one, brief contacts with constituents, but that he hasn't yet gotten it all together in the halls of Congress.

Those of us who know Paul know he wouldn't put out those words unless they had been welling up in him for a long time as he watches Richardson operate.

This writer credits Wieck with the same sort of sincerity referred to earlier in this column, based, as was said above, on close-at-hand observation and a strong attempt to arrive at supportable judgments.

Here again, it might be unwise to shrug off the views of a writer simply because they sound unpleasant.





The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) accepted subdivision plats and appointed a committee to research a proposed ordinance for airport hazard zoning at its regular meeting Thursday in Carrizozo.

P&Z members Mack Bell, Walt Wilson, Betty Shrecengost and Modesto Chavez reviewed six separate subdivision plats presented by Tim Collins of Burke-Collins Engineering of Ruidoso. Collins had shown the plats at a previous meeting, but a quorum was not present then.

P&Z discussed the plat for Rancho Ruidoso Village. Collins said developer Bob Blum increased the number of lots and changed the road configuration on the plat that P&Z reviewed at its last meeting. The subdivision consists of 15 duplex lots, 42 small home lots and 37 larger lots. At the last meeting, Blum said that the lots would feature developer-constructed lower cost homes.

"I'll be interested in watching this one," presiding chairman Bell said. P&Z accepted the review plat. Collins also presented the plat for Eagle Creek Acres. The plat had

been shown to the commission before, but P&Z had not accepted it because there was no emergency escape route.

Collins requested variances for the width of the road and cul-de-sac, neither of which meet county road specifications.

Collins explained that the subdivision will have private roads, not maintained by the county, with no school buses allowed.

Bell said that he toured the subdivision and found the escape route, constructed as P&Z had requested, "very adequate."

Bell said he approved of the variances because large pine trees would have to be removed if the road were to be widened. P&Z accepted the plat and the variances.

P&Z also accepted a replat of a large lot into four smaller ones in Magado Creek Estates. Collins presented the replat for Ruidoso State Bank. He reviewed the restrictions requested by P&Z at the last meeting.

Collins said the restrictions now require that the maximum of two horses allowed must be penned. The restrictions allow temporary grazing if it does not damage native grasses.

P&Z approved the review plat of Alto Townhomes. Collins

represented Hal Cliff, developer-contractor. Collins said the property had been platted originally for townhouses by another developer.

Collins reported that Cliff had begun the townhomes without a new plat approval. Collins said that once he discovered the unapproved construction, he contacted Cliff about the discrepancy.

"I don't think it would have made it through architectural control of Alto Village," Collins said.

P&Z also accepted a plat that was filed for a subdivision developed by Johnny Mobely, which previously had not been platted. Mobely complied with a request from P&Z that he plat the lots already sold, with descriptions of each. P&Z accepted the plat for the property.

A final road inspection report for the Gavilan Canyon Subdivision was referred to the county commissioners to deal with non-complying roads and cul-de-sacs. Collins said the roads were constructed in 1983, after preliminary plat approval by the county commissioners at that time.

Collins said the roads were completed by August 1983, and were approved by the county road superintendent. He added that the cul-de-sacs were platted for a specified 100-foot radius, but were

constructed with a 65-foot radius.

"The county was not requiring 100-foot cul-de-sacs. This goes back to what we've been saying all along, that most of the older subdivisions have cul-de-sacs less than the 100 feet," Collins said.

Collins said that the subdivision faced problems similar to Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates, in that the cul-de-sacs could not be widened because the underground utilities were installed within the 100-foot radius.

P&Z referred the problem to the county commissioners, with the explanation that the subdivision roads do not meet specifications, but were accepted in the preliminary plat two years ago.

P&Z appointed a committee to study a proposed airport hazard ordinance. Shrecengost, Ben Hall and Bill Seelbach were appointed to review the proposed ordinance with county attorney Steve Sanders. The ordinance was drafted at the request of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission.

The proposed condominium ordinance was tabled until the airport hazard ordinance is completed. The next P&Z meeting will be Thursday, October 17.

Highway Commission meets at Inn

The New Mexico Highway Commission Thursday reduced liquidated damages from \$101,500 to just \$24,000 for a contractor who failed to complete a state contract within the allotted time.

The contract for a bridge to be built and another to be torn down near Corona about a mile north of the Lincoln and Torrance County lines, was let on February 1, 1982, and the project was completed on July 27, 1984. The contract specified that the job was to be completed within 90 working days.

Commissioners listened to department personnel and construction company representatives during their regular meeting Thursday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"If we did the work, we should be paid for it," said Daniel McReynolds, the president of McReynolds Construction Company, in his appeal. McReynolds claimed the state still owed him \$114,000 for the bridge he constructed near Corona.

Department officials explained that a percentage of a construction contract is retained until the job is completed and liquidated damages, if any apply, are deducted. They said they agreed with the \$114,000 figure, but said after deducting liquidated damages, the state would owe McReynolds only about \$13,000. They also related how McReynolds was granted several "suspensions" during the project during which working days were not counted.

In addition to the suspensions of about 300 days and bad weather days allowed, the company took 290 extra days on the job, according to a Highway Department spokesman.

McReynolds blamed the department for those delays, citing a 60-day delay in approving subcontractors and unrealistic job specifications.

L.A. "Larry" Larranaga, chief highway administrator, told the commission that he had offered to reduce liquidated damages to as little as 180 days at the contracted amount of \$350 a day, but McReynolds refused his offer.

"Why is that so disagreeable to

you?" asked Commissioner Emerlinda De Brine of Socorro.

McReynolds, who said his small minority status business employs about 100 workers, reiterated his belief that he should be paid the full \$114,000 retained by the state, saying his last resort would be legal action. He told the commission that he might lose his home and business if he was forced to pay the liquidated damages assessed.

"I don't know who to blame," said Commission Chairman Sosimo Padilla of Albuquerque, after hearing both sides of the story. He recommended the commission's final offer, in which McReynolds will be paid \$90,000, and the state will retain the \$24,000 in liquidated damages.

McReynolds accepted that offer, and commissioners went on to other business.

Also during Thursday's session, members heard the department's financial bureau chief report that the Highway Department closed the fiscal year that ended June 30,

1985, with a surplus because of higher than predicted revenues of \$319.6 million.

Larranaga reported that cleanup is continuing on the contaminated Highway Department Building in Santa Fe. He said finding a place to dispose of water used in cleaning the building, which was contaminated with PCB, is a major problem.

Friday, the commission was welcomed by Mayor George White and heard from Lincoln County Commissioner Ken Nosker, Roswell Mayor Peter York, Sierra Blanca Airport Commission Chairman Fred Heckman and officials from several other municipalities. "We're not asking for anything," said Mayor White, as he welcomed the commission. "We've got all we can say grace over," he added with a smile.

"Now that we've got the airport site, we've got to start thinking about the roads," said Heckman. He said the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will be a major connector to

Dallas and Houston, Texas, and eventually will serve as the primary access to this region.

Heckman said it will be an \$18 million project, adding that 200,000 passengers a year will utilize the facility by 1990, landing in 46,000 different airplanes.

Larranaga expressed surprise at how quickly the project is progressing, saying his department will have to put the road study "on the fast track."

He assured Heckman of the Highway Department's commitment to providing access to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

The commission also passed a resolution supporting efforts by the Highway 70 Association to gain federal and state funding to complete that 402-mile project.

York, president of the newly rejuvenated association, spoke on behalf of the project. He said funds were authorized by the U.S. Congress, but never were authorized to make the road a four-lane interstate highway.



Phil Collins in front of the drums

Everybody was surprised that the drummer could sing. It was 1975, and Phil Collins had emerged from behind the drums to sing lead vocals for Genesis. That transition has led to one of the most successful solo careers in recent rock history.

Collins' latest solo album, *No Jacket Required*, is still on the charts in Britain and the U.S. It's provoked a string of solo hits like "One More Night," "Only You Know and I Know," "Don't Lose My Number" and "Sussudio." That album has also seen Collins through one of the most successful tours of 1985. HBO caught him in action, and *Phil Collins: No Jacket Required - Sold Out* premieres this Saturday.

The 34-year-old Collins, who has racked up Grammy Awards and an Academy Award nomination for the title song from *Against All Odds*, is quietly revolutionizing pop music. Through his role with Genesis, his solo career, and his work as producer for the likes of Philip Bailey and Eric Clapton, Collins is redefining the way we hear drums.

By mixing synthesized and nonsynthesized drums, Collins makes us realize that there's more to drums than a good backbeat. His drums fade in, they fade out, they jump from speaker to speaker. The right rhythm, especially the way Collins plays it, becomes an integral, emotional part of the music.

Collins started his drumming career at age 5, playing a toy tin drum in the basement. "There has been no point in my life since I first had drums that I can remember not wanting to do it," he says in Armando Gallo's book *Genesis: I Know What I Like*. "I always imagined myself up on stage when I played, and I always thought of myself as doing this for a living, and not to have to do anything else. This is what I wanted to do."

Collins seems to have hit an all-time high with his latest solo venture. His name is everywhere, especially since he performed in both London and Philadelphia during the Live Aid concert this summer. There are even rumors of an impending television acting debut, playing a sleazy lounge performer in an upcoming episode of *Miami Vice*.
