

Heavy rains soak village

Some village employees worked around the clock Tuesday and Wednesday monitoring village bridges and river crossings endangered by heavy rainfalls. Jack LaMay, head of the Street Department, reported Wednesday that his crews made a trench across the bridge at Paradise Canyon Drive to form a channel for waters that were overflowing that structure. Forming the channel necessitated closing that road, but LaMay explained that it saved area homes from being flooded.

Frank Potter, assistant village manager, reported that other bridges were in good shape. He said the heavy rains were causing some problems in the municipal sewer system, but maintenance crews were clearing debris from the system before serious problems occurred. Jim Hine, village manager, reported Tuesday to the Ruidoso Village Council that the Environmental Improvement Division and the Office of Civil Emergency Planning had been alerted to the possibility of flooding in the village.

Water woes occupy council

Water—from wells and from the sky—was a major topic of discussion Tuesday for the Ruidoso Village Council. Councillors heard questions from a citizen on the Eagle Creek well field, asked questions about the Hollywood well cleanup and were told that if Tuesday's rain continued some areas of the village might experience flooding.

Ruidosoan J.D. James read a prepared statement during the regular council meeting in which he raised some questions about the Eagle Creek well fields and the city's contract with Atkins-Landfair, the engineering firm credited with finding the water.

"It is obvious that there is real reason to doubt the engineers reports on these wells," said James, who recommends that a hydrologist be appointed "to appraise the water find attributed to the Atkins-Landfair Corporation." The council offered no response to James' remarks, but Village Councillor Bill Karn assured him that he'll get an answer later.

In other water-related discussions, Frank Potter, assistant village manager, reported that cleanup is under way on the contaminated Hollywood well. He explained that preliminary cleaning operations must be completed in areas surrounding the well, before

the status of the well itself will be addressed.

Potter said a recent broken water line near the Pinecliff area caused a recurrence of diesel-contaminated water in the distribution system, but said those problems were cleared up after about four days.

Customers have received credit for additional water costs incurred when water lines had to be flushed, and some water users have filed claims for damaged hot water heaters, according to Potter.

Mayor George White questioned Potter as to the future of the well and recovery of funds spent because of the contamination.

Potter and John Underwood, village attorney, assured the mayor and the audience that they are in touch with the Environmental Improvement Division and will make efforts to recover the well and the funds.

"We got close to having another flood today," said Jim Hine, village manager. He reported that village employees were closely monitoring the rainfall, and watching bridges with a history of washing out in heavy rains.

Hine reported that the first step has been implemented toward rebuilding those village bridges and culverts with direct appropriation funds from the state. He said requests for engineering proposals have been published, as required by the state Highway Department.

He estimated that the first bridge project will go to bid in May.

Another water matter was brought up as Mike Davalos, village engineer, reported on various projects in progress in the village. Davalos reported on three major projects, but was questioned on a fourth job which he said he hadn't planned to discuss.

"There's a lot of work to be done," said Davalos, when asked for an estimate on the completion date of the transmission lines and

intake structure in the Upper Canyon.

Davalos confirmed that the project is behind schedule, and reported that the contractor, Brait, Inc., has not been cooperating with the village on the project.

"It has caused a terrible situation to some of the homeowners in the area," said Davalos. He said the work site wasn't properly prepared, which caused flooding in the area.

"Are you telling us we have a problem with this contractor?" asked Village Councillor Victor Alonso.

"I hope I wasn't saying anything you didn't already know," answered the engineer. Davalos has been the village engineer for about a month.

Councillors expressed surprise and concern about the problems, and Councillor Karn instructed Davalos to "stay on top of it."

Besides answering questions on the intake structure project, Davalos also gave councillors detailed charts on the progress of three other construction jobs in progress. He reported that construction of a metal building to house the village trash compactor is 12 percent behind schedule, but still within a "safe" range for a December 14 completion deadline.

The engineer said the Ponderosa Heights sewer job is about 25 percent behind schedule. Mayor White said the council allowed the contractor on that job to start a little late.

Davalos reported that "a lot of work is being done in a short period of time" on the Grindstone Canyon dam project, but that construction is six percent behind schedule. He said that he will continue to monitor all projects.

First item on Tuesday's agenda was a presentation from Stuart Gail and Charles Noble on an eight- to nine-story hotel/convention center

Lodgers Tax Committee declines rail study support

After a lengthy discussion at its regular meeting Wednesday, the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) voted not to appropriate funds for the feasibility study of the proposed Swiss railroad.

At their last meeting, LTC tabled action on the railroad until a project representative could be present. James Paxton spoke to the committee on behalf of the cog-wheel railroad feasibility study.

Paxton told LTC that results of the study would provide valuable information for the community, regardless of the outcome of the feasibility of the railroad. The study will include such information as tourist origins and traffic patterns.

So far, \$50,000 has been collected to pay for the \$80,000 study. The proposed railroad will go from the new airport to Ruidoso Downs to the ski area and Inn of the Mountain Gods (one possible route).

Paxton said one company,

Unified Industries, would underwrite construction of the initial installation if the study proves favorable. The New Mexico Transportation Department would then step in with funding alternatives, said Paxton, who stressed a sense of urgency in completing the study in time to get funds from the state Legislature next year if the project goes through.

"I admit that to a certain extent, the idea seems far-fetched... radical," said Paxton, but he said he felt the state would not have funded \$20,000 if it did not feel that the project had some validity.

LTC chairman Budgie Green said he supports the railroad, but is committed to spending lodgers' tax collections in a manner that would provide the earliest returns for the money, specifically through advertising. With decreasing lodgers' tax collections and a tight budget, Green said he did not see how the committee could make any such financial investment.

With the exception of Rod Adamson, the committee declined the re-

quest for railroad study funds. During the financial report, village clerk Leon Eggleston said \$26,661 in lodgers' taxes had been collected for the month of August.

Eggleston said the figures represent a drop in collections if the increase in the rate of collections, from two percent to three percent, is taken into account.

In other business, Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers thanked LTC for the \$4,949 appropriated for this

year's Aspen Festival. Jeffers said he felt the crowds were "phenomenal" and that the advertising dollars were well spent.

LTC member Bill Rawlins reported that he spoke to State Representative Ben Hall about an upcoming lodgers' tax committee act in the Legislature. Rawlins said that if the act passes, it would create standing committees which would not be under financial control of the village councils.

Music Festival searches for larger, permanent home

The Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Summer Festival, Incorporated, told a small group at its public meeting Tuesday that the main problems with the music festival are the lack of a larger facility, funds and public support.

After this summer's festival, the board issued a notice that the festival would be suspended next year. The board wanted public input and ideas for continuing the festival in the future.

Board president Carl Anderson told the group that last year's gross costs were \$210,193. Board member Don Shaw reported that ticket sales, to a full seating capacity of 750, brought in \$46,000. Shaw said that even in metropolitan areas, ticket sales never cover the costs of such festivals, and that more public support is necessary to keep the program going.

Board member Ted Bennett told the group that 80 percent of the contributions to the music festival come from out of town.

"We have a few gracious people, but we can't continue at that rate," said Shaw, adding that some of the festival's regular supporters are having financial troubles of their own.

The key problem outlined by the group is the lack of a facility large enough to hold more than 750, the capacity of the Super Select Sales Barn, location of last year's festival. Bennett said he felt that if the festival could at least double seating capacity and ticket sales, it would help the financial situation tremendously.

"We could have sold 1,600 tickets to Al Hirt," said Bennett of the limited seating capacity. He said that when Diane Warwick sang at the festival, they had to turn down more tickets than they could sell.

"If we had a facility we could count on year after year, 90 percent of the problem would be washed away," said Anderson.

A larger facility would enable more people to attend the festival at lower ticket prices. Anderson said he felt it is important that people who want to go to the concerts, but cannot afford it, be able to attend. He felt a larger seating area would aid that situation.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director John Jeffers told the board that he felt it is "obvious" that the community needs a facility to house the festival, conventions and other gatherings. Jeffers said that several groups are working on the project and suggested that all concerned groups meet for a collective "brainstorming" session.

Anderson and Shaw said the festival board would be pleased to participate in such a meeting, which Jeffers will organize for the coming week.

Jeffers told the group of the possibility of the state developing 500 acres on Moon Mountain. If the project develops, it could be a possible site for the center.

Anderson opined that Ruidoso would be able to attract other events if it had the facility for them.

A suggestion was made to broaden the scope of the festival to include such genres as country-western music. Anderson said he welcomes all suggestions from the public.

Shaw emphasized that the suspension of next summer's festival does not mean the festival is permanently disbanded.

"We don't plan to give up the festival for good," said Shaw.

Shaw added that the current situation is not a sudden problem. He said it has gotten progressively worse over the past three years.

Chemical dependencies vastly affect families

Things are not right in the family. The father has condemned the son's problem, and has ordered it stopped. The son refuses to communicate with the father. The mother, "enabler" for the son, becomes the only line of communication between son and father. The mother covers up for the son, shielding him and his problem from the father and others. The problem grows. Family rituals, such as dinner time, are disrupted. Often, the problem results in violence.

The problem is that the son has a chemical dependency.

Chemical dependencies and their effects on families were the subject of discussion during the Tuesday night session of IMPACT '85—Awareness Week at the Ruidoso schools. The meeting, at the Ruidoso High School meeting room, was the second in a series of three sessions on chemical dependency scheduled for parents of students in Ruidoso schools. The sessions are running this week concurrently with a program of drug awareness that is scheduled for students in kindergarten through high school.

Monday night, at the first session for parents, the schedule called for Mike Gladden, assistant superintendent of schools, to introduce and explain the program. Representatives from CareUnit in Albuquerque also were at the meeting to answer questions of meeting-goers.

During the Tuesday session, Skip Wardlow and Lisa Edgett of the Albuquerque CareUnit presented a program on "Substance Abuse, a Family Illness."

Wardlow, a chemical dependency therapist, outlined several scenarios, such as the one leading this article, in which one or more chemical dependencies in the family lead to family problems.

Diagraming on a chalkboard,

Wardlow described how communication channels begin to "dysfunction" when a family member develops a chemical dependency. A major problem with chemical dependencies, Wardlow said, is when the chemical dependent child begins to control the family.

"They're too big to spank and they can run away," Wardlow said. "They can make things happen the way they want them to happen."

One way chemical dependent youths gain control of a family is by using an "enabler."

Wardlow explained that enablers are people who pretend not to notice that someone is chemically dependent. The enabler helps cover up the problem by doing the schoolwork or job of the chemically dependent person. The enabler avoids confronting the problem, so becomes a way to enable the chemically dependent person to continue his dependency.

Enablers often go to great extents to cover up for chemically dependent people. Wardlow related a case of his in which an 11- or 12-year-old girl supported her chemically dependent father, mother, grandfather and grandmother. The girl cashed checks, fixed the automobile and shouldered many other adult burdens as a result of the chemical dependencies in the family.

Wardlow said such situations force youngsters to grow up too quickly, which can lead to worse problems later in life.

Sometimes a chemically dependent child may draw the enabling parent away from the other parent, causing strife in the marriage. A chemical dependency may be present in both parents, or in a sibling and a parent.

In the case of a son and father with chemical dependencies, the mother becomes trapped. When she tries to intervene in the dependency, she may be threatened by the father

and running away by the son, Wardlow said.

Wardlow described the signs of a chemical dependency as being:

—Dysfunction in social or employment settings.

—A pattern of compulsive use that lasts at least one month.

—Not being able to go without the chemical, at will, for a week.

—Dependent to the point of having withdrawal symptoms.

An audience member asked at what point children need help. Wardlow said when a child lies about drinking, smoking or another dependency; shows a pattern of compulsion; or is caught in possession of a chemical substance, help is needed.

"Raising the bottom" was one treatment technique discussed during the meeting. Edgett, a CareUnit call center supervisor and intake counselor, said the technique involves preparing family members, friends, the employer and other people who are important to the chemically dependent person. Each person completes a list of past events in which the person's chemical dependency affected the family, job

or other setting.

After two rehearsals, the group joins the chemically dependent person and, one by one, they read each of their lists out loud. The chemically dependent person hears over and over how he let down his family, friends and employer because of the chemical dependency. After each list is read, the reader ends with "I love you" or "I care about you." The last to read a list ends with "I want you to get help."

Edgett said the technique is very effective.

Both CareUnit representatives stressed the seriousness of a chemical dependency problem in the family.

"Chemical dependency is a slow form of suicide in most cases," Edgett said.

The sessions continue tonight (Thursday), October 10, with the showing of the award-winning film "Soft is the Heart of a Child." The film will be shown at 7 p.m. in the meeting room of Ruidoso High School and will be followed by a discussion on what help is available locally.

complex to be built on a 14-acre tract overlooking the racetrack in Ruidoso Downs. Noble said the 31,000-square-foot convention center and banquet hall will accommodate as many as 8,000 people. He said the facility is scheduled to be complete in October or November 1987.

"It would really be nice if we could figure out a way to annex that area," said John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. He told the developers that listeners would be more excited if they would benefit from the hotel's gross receipts taxes.

In other business Tuesday, the council:

—Heard John Jeffers thank the village for participating in Saturday's Aspenfest activities.

—Heard Flora Elliott report on activities of the Adult Recreation Advisory Board. She said the board wanted council action on a proposal to hire Carl Ross to drive the center's van two days a week instead of just one day as he currently does. Councillors didn't discuss or act on the proposal.

—Approved a call for bids to demolish several structures as recommended by the Appeals Board, Abatement of Dangerous Buildings after seeing a slide presentation by Jimmy Neeley, building inspector.

—Heard Hine report that an-

ticipated revenues were below projections by at least 10 percent for the first quarter of this fiscal year. He said the first quarter traditionally yields the year's highest revenues.

—Scheduled a meeting of the Finance Board and the Village Council at 2 p.m. Tuesday, October 22, in Village Hall. Besides discussing shortfalls in revenues, the governing body will also hear from the village bonding agent on plans to refinance bonds.

—Heard Mayor White report on a Municipal League meeting he attended Saturday. He warned that the state is in bad shape financially. "They're going to be taking more monies from the local governments to finance the state government," said White. He recommended that councillors begin lobbying efforts now.

—Discussed insurance costs, after hearing Potter warn that rates probably will increase dramatically when bids come in on vehicle and general liability coverage. Potter said insurance carriers nationwide are raising premiums by 300 to 400 percent while providing just half the coverage they provided at the old rates.

—Heard Hine report that a new federal law requiring that firemen and police officers be compensated with overtime pay for all duty hours will cost the fire department this year the equivalent of an extra month's payroll.

—Approved a recommendation by Councillor Rick Evans to write a letter of thanks to the Mescalero Apache Indian Tribe for their participation in Aspen Festival events.

Lodgers hear ski pitch

The Ruidoso Lodgers Association heard a presentation about Ski New Mexico at its regular meeting Tuesday.

Elizabeth C' deBaca, executive director of the non-profit trade association, told the lodgers about the organization. Ski New Mexico provides a statewide voice for the varied businesses that make up the ski industry and advertise New Mexico skiing in large publications such as "California Magazine," "Skiing" and "Texas Monthly." C' deBaca solicited memberships

to the organization, which provide special privileges for the \$150 dues.

Also at the meeting, Barbara Loyer, representing Clear Publications, told the lodgers that her company would produce a pocket-size Ruidoso Guide which will come out in December. The magazine will contain maps, stories and calendars of events.

In other business, the group decided to have a Christmas party again this year. Details will be discussed at the next executive board meeting.

Zoning commission struggles with commercial areas

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Commission approved all six requests presented during Monday's meeting, and then discussed what the zoning designation "C" (commercial) left over from the old ordinance means in the current ordinance.

Although an old zoning ordinance included the broad "C" commercial category, the current regulations include designations for light commercial (C-1) and heavy commercial (C-2) as well as industrial (M-1). P&Z chairman Mike Callaghan said many areas have never been rezoned because the Ruidoso Village Council instructed the commission to stop the rezone project.

That left some parts of the village, like the Carrizo Creek Road area, with the old commercial zoning.

Bob Dolgener appeared before P&Z Monday to present development plans for Lots 497-503 of Skyland Addition, an area on Carrizo Creek Road that still is zoned "C". Dolgener's proposed business of pouring septic tanks and curbing

would be classified industrial and using today's regulations could only be placed in an area zoned M-1.

Dolgener and James Paxton, the real estate agent who sold him the property, contend that the old "C" allows anything from light commercial through industrial uses. At least one commissioner stated firmly that "C" would allow the most liberal interpretation of commercial uses, but stopped short of industrial.

"I need a clarification," insisted Paxton, who cautioned the commission to be careful in their interpretation of zoning regulations.

"I don't interpret, that's what the village attorney is for," said Paul Davis, village enforcement officer. Davis added that the attorney had stated that it (Dolgener's proposal) would be permitted in the location under discussion.

Paxton reiterated his need for specific information when representing property to potential buyers.

"I think the problem is going to get solved with the new master plan," said Callaghan.

"There are an awful lot of people going to need a septic tank before the new master plan," said

Dolgener.

Finally, commissioners unanimously approved Dolgener's development plans.

"It appears that this area is quickly becoming industrial and I would suggest that it be brought to the attention of BRW (village planners)," stated P&Z Commissioner Karon Petty.

Commissioners approved with a five-to-one vote front and south side lot line variances on Lot 28, Block 12, Ponderosa Heights, Unit 2 for C.S. Warren. Davis reported that encroachments were found by the village building inspector when he "red-tagged" the deck construction which was done without the required permits.

"Out of ignorance we built the deck thinking we could do it with the existing permit," said contractor Don Russell. He obtained a permit for interior repairs which stated that no square footage would be added to the structure, said Davis.

"I think the question is whether or not ignorance is a good reason for granting a variance," said Commissioner David Smith, the only member who voted against approving the variances.

Service Club Council is happy with Aspen Festival

Nancy Radziewicz received a standing ovation Monday from members of the Service Club Council (SCC) who gave her much of the credit for the success of last weekend's Aspen Festival.

John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, thanked Radziewicz for a "beautiful, wonderful, phenomenal weekend."

Radziewicz said she had a strong committee working on the Aspenfest project, and commended Cal Cowden, Charlotte Jarratt and Barbara Downs for their contributions to the event.

"There were so many things going on all over ... people wanted to be here and they wanted to be there," said Barbara Duff, SCC president. Radziewicz said her committee would recommend to the chamber board that the festival be changed to another weekend because of conflicting events throughout New Mexico.

"I don't believe we can change the weekend of Aspenfest," said Pat Breedlove of Spirit of Ruidoso and chamber, adding that the first weekend of October is the "peak weekend for the aspens."

Breedlove proposed, on behalf of Spirit of Ruidoso and the chamber, that each club pick one special annual project to be implemented in cooperation with other area

organizations. His plan includes publishing a yearly brochure listing activities for almost every weekend.

The proposal calls for the sponsoring organization to receive two-thirds of the monies earned and for the other one-third to go into an advertising fund to be administered by the Chamber of Commerce.

"We want to bring more people to Ruidoso so we can all make more money and live fat and happy," said Breedlove.

Jeffers said that the Telluride, Colorado, Chamber of Commerce promotes special events from May 1 through October 1 each year. Typical projects that Jeffers mentioned include a winter carnival, mushroom festival and rockhound group.

"We could have a super apple festival in September," said Breedlove.

Also Monday, Geri Collins, president of the Lincoln County Mental Health Association, reported that the counseling center has changed its name to the Professional Counseling Association.

Collins said it's the "same people ... same services ... but a more professional-sounding name." Besides counseling services, Collins said the association provides educational programs to interested groups.

Current and readily available programs are on alcohol and

substance abuse, stress management and an overview of association services, but Collins said programs can be structured around particular needs or interests of a group.

In other business Monday: —Sally Avery of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary reported that her group will be selling emergency "Please Call Police" signs in the hospital gift shop for \$3 each. Avery said the large plastic signs are designed to be folded, carried in the car and taped to the car window if car trouble occurs on the highway.

"It (the sign) has saved people's lives, literally," said Avery.

—Helen Townsend of Rio Ruidoso Lionesses reported that she has been unable to locate the missing club signs that used to be displayed on Sudderth Drive.

—Spirit of Ruidoso President Teri Sodd asked for help with the Halloween Hoedown scheduled for October 31, at Tall Pines RV Park. Sodd said Spirit will rent booths to other organizations for \$20.

The Winter Wonderland will begin the Friday after Thanksgiving with a Christmas parade. Sodd said local groups will be invited to staff the cider booth and act as Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus during December.

Breedlove said Spirit hopes to have more participation from church choirs this year than last.

—Duff reminded SCC of the third

The motion that was approved included the condition that the deck never be enclosed.

In other business Monday, the commission:

—Approved development plans of Tara Woods Condominiums, Tract 2, Panorama Lodge Addition for Mike Radziewicz after seeing plans and architectural drawings presented by Al McChesney.

—Granted approval of development plans for a recreation and sales office for High Sierra Condominiums located on lots 14A and 15A, Block 1, Camelot Mountain Tracts. The commission stipulated that handicapped parking be provided and indicated on final plans.

—Approved front and west side lot line variances for a new carport on the west half of Lot 35, Block F, White Fir Subdivision for Dan Swearingin, but added the condition that the carport never be enclosed.

—Approved development plans for Arby's Restaurant on lots 13 and 14, Block 2, Palmer Gateway Subdivision for Fresquez, Inc. Lanny Fresquez displayed pictures of possible architectural styles to be used, and reported that Arby's should be open by the end of November.

Three charged in accidents

Two one-car accidents occurred within minutes of each other about 1:30 a.m. Sunday, October 6, on Eagle Creek near Gavilan Canyon Road, according to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

Sheriff's Deputy Bruce Brown said the drivers of both vehicles were arrested for driving while intoxicated (DWI), and were scheduled to appear before Magistrate Judge James Wheeler.

Ruidoso hopes to declaw Tigers in District 3-AAA opener

It all counts from now on for the Ruidoso High School varsity football team.

Friday night the undefeated Warriors will host Hot Springs High School in the District 3-AAA opener. The game will start at 7:30.

Hot Springs only has a 2-3 record. One of the Tigers' losses was a 55-0 defeat at the hands of Artesia, who Ruidoso beat, 14-13.

But Ruidoso head coach Cooper Henderson is not taking the game lightly, particularly because the Warriors took a hard-fought 15-8 contest over Hot Springs last season.

"One of the keys for us will be to make sure we're mentally ready to execute," Henderson said. "We have to play smart football."

One of the things the Warriors will have to correct this week is turnovers. Ruidoso has made more than its share the past two weeks in 13-6 and 29-0 wins over Portales and New Mexico Military Institute.

But otherwise, the Warriors had played like a team that deserves to

be ranked first in the Associated Press state poll and Albuquerque Journal coaches state poll.

Ruidoso has scored 157 points and given up just 62 so far this year. The Warriors have allowed just 12 points in the past three games. Ruidoso limited New Mexico Military Institute to 58 yards total offense last week.

Quarterback Russell Easter leads the Warrior offense with his 656 yards passing on 35 completions in 72 attempts.

Tailback Michael Williamson has 494 yards in 72 attempts for seven touchdowns and two points.

Wingback Kirk Taylor had his best game last week, running for 115 yards. Fullback Billy Harrison also has done well.

Split end Brian Davis is the Warriors' leading receiver, having caught 25 passes for 596 yards.

Tackle Phillip Herrera and guard James Herrera lead the Warrior offensive line. Center Mark Flack is back strong after an early-season injury.

The Warrior defense was outstanding against New Mexico Military Institute. Middle linebacker Jeff

Maxwell and cornerback Randy Reynolds tackled a Colt runner for a safety, and the losers never really threatened to score.

Outside linebackers Bobby Dickinson and Chuck Daniels have been consistent, while tackle Shayne Fedrick has been a standout.

Safety Jeff Willingham leads the Warriors in interceptions with three.

Middle linebacker-fullback Chris Harrison probably is the top Tiger player.

Chris Pape (230 pounds) and Gene Armijo (215 pounds) give the Tigers some size up front. John Faulkner is an outstanding free safety on defense.

"They run basically two offenses," said Henderson. "Sometimes they'll run out of the shotgun and at other times, out of the Pro-I where they will use the option a lot."

"They use a 6-1 or 5-2 on defense a lot."

More than a million dollars in prize money is up for grabs at Sunland Park

Sunland Park Race Track will be offering more than \$1.6 million in prize money for major stakes and handicap races during the upcoming 1985-86 season that gets under way Saturday, October 12.

The track kicks off its 27th season this Saturday with the opening-day \$10,000-added Mr. Vale Handicap, a mile race for three-year-olds. Also carded are trials for the Shue Fly, an \$8,000-added event

for quarter horses at 400 yards. Quarter horses are also spotlighted Sunday, when the opening leg of the Savannah Swinger Series is contested. Three-year-olds will compete over a 350-yard course

for their share of \$8,000 in added prize money.

Races will be held every Friday, Saturday and Sunday until May 4. There will be one Monday program on February 17. Programs get under way at 12:30 p.m. each day. Highlighting the meet will be the 21st running of the Sun Country Futurity for quarter horses on April 27, and the Riley Allison Futurity for two-year-old thoroughbreds on May 4.

The Sun Country is a Grade I race for two-year-olds over 350 yards with a projected purse of \$275,000. Dashing Phoebe, winner of last year's Sun Country, went on to capture the Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and qualified for the final field of the \$2.53 million All American Futurity.

The Riley Allison is also written for two-year-olds, covering a distance of five furlongs with an estimated purse of \$350,000. Last year's winner was Senator Billy B.

Other major stakes races for quarter horses to be run at Sunland this season include:
- The Grade II West Texas Derby on October 15 with three-year-olds competing for a \$100,000 estimated purse over 400 yards.

- The Grade III Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby on December 1 for three-year-olds

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from 5 p.m. - 7:30 p.m.
Hours: Monday-Saturday, 11 a.m.-7:30 p.m.

Eight-year-old veteran Reverend Blue Jeans, voted Most Improved Horse, also is back.

Sunland Park general manager Rick Henson is pleased with the quality of horses returning for the 1985-86 season.

"We had 2,400 applications for stalls. It was a tough decision to trim the list," Henson remarked. "We can house 1,400 horses on the grounds, and I think we have some of the very best horses on the Southwest circuit here to compete."

Bob Arnett, who was last season's top trainer at Sunland with 44 wins in 250 starts, will campaign with an impressive stable of horses as he seeks his 11th training title at Sunland.

Arnett trainee My Going Jesse is among the very best 870-yard competitors winning the Fine Loom Handicap and the Gene Hensley Handicap last summer in Ruidoso. He also conditions My Kinda Loom, who won the Norgor Futurity for 2-year-olds at Ruidoso, while Pride Of Loom captured the Barlaris Handicap.

Cliff Lambert Sr., who is seeking his eighth trainer title, has another strong stable headed by Copper Case who had impressive wins in the Governor and Isayolboy handicaps at Ruidoso.

over 440 yards with a purse of \$25,000.

The Grade II Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity on December 15 for two-year-olds over 400 yards with a purse of \$125,000.

- The Grade II West Texas Futurity on March 23 for two-year-olds over 330 yards with an estimated purse of \$420,000.

Also on tap for quarter horses is the \$175,000 estimated Sunland Park All American Sale Futurity on November 17. The race is run at 400 yards for two-year-olds purchased in the 1984 All American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso.

The Savannah Swinger Series continues on November 10 at 400 yards and December 14 at 440 yards.

Major races for thoroughbreds during the 1985-86 season include:
- The Riley Allison Derby on

April 20 for three-year-olds at one mile with an added purse of \$12,500.

- The Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity on December 28 for two-year-olds at six furlongs with an estimated purse of \$100,000.

- The Thoroughbred Sale Fall Futurity on November 3 for two-year-olds purchased at the 1984 Summer Select Thoroughbred Sale at Ruidoso. The race is six furlongs with an estimated purse of \$30,000.

Thoroughbreds will also compete in the five-part Rio Grande Marathon which opens on October 27 with a mile event. The Marathon will continue on December 8, January 11, February 16 and March 29.

Curriobot won't race on muddy track

A muddy track could mean an early vacation for Curriobot, last year's Horse of the Meet at Sunland Park Race Track.

Trainer J. Doyal Roberts said Wednesday that the outstanding distance runner would be scratched from Saturday's Mr. Vale Handicap if the track was muddy. Whether he runs in the race or not, Roberts has said Curriobot would be turned out for a rest following the Mr. Vale, and would not return to competition until after the first of the year.

Roberts said the decision not to run Curriobot in the mud is because the eight-year-old gelding "will not run on an off track. He's been hurt twice on muddy tracks and has gotten so he won't run on one."

Roberts said that while racing on a rain-drenched track in the Ruidoso Mile in 1984, Curriobot "took a bad step and pulled the shoe off his hoof. He has injured himself on a muddy track one more time since then and now he just won't run on an off track."

Curriobot, winner of last year's Mr. Vale Handicap, has been Horse of the Year at Sunland Park the past two seasons. He was also named the Best Handicap Horse and Best Router for the 1984-85 season.

The Mr. Vale Handicap will be Curriobot's only fall start at Sunland Park, according to Roberts. "He's been up and running for a long time

and he's getting pretty tired. We plan to rest him for the rest of this year then bring him into action sometime after the first of 1986."

Following last year's campaign at Sunland Park, which he topped with his second straight win in the Sunland Park Handicap, Curriobot had a heavy summer season, racing at both Santa Fe and Ruidoso Downs, where he was second in the Ruidoso Mile.

He's returning to Sunland after competing at the New Mexico State Fair meet in Albuquerque, where he won a mile allowance race and finished third in the New Mexico State Fair Handicap.

The track veteran is just one of an outstanding group of horses currently stabled at Sunland Park and preparing to compete in the upcoming meet. Nearly all of last season's champions have returned. Senator Billy B., who was voted Best 2-year-old Thoroughbred and Best 2-year-old Colt after posting three wins last season, including the \$350,000 Riley Allison Futurity, will be returning in the juvenile ranks.

Lord Rubic, named Best 3-year-old Colt or Gelding and Best New Mexico Bred Thoroughbred after taking six wins, including the Sunland Park Derby, is back for the upcoming season, along with the Best 3-year-old Thoroughbred Filly Giboulee Wood, who accounted for the City of Las Cruces Handicap.



Chili, of Amarillo, Texas, took third place.



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



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—They finally got around to it, but they're very late; the bosses of our state Legislature have named a committee to take a look at revenues.

That means five and half months when this could have been going on have been shot, apparently because those at the top in Senate and House had some secret plan they wanted to put into effect. It would appear they named their two overly large study groups to take a look at education in the belief they would have completed their work by this time. They haven't, and it is by no means clear when they will.

Thus the revenue committee, which was supposed to come into existence now and look at needs of next year with educational recommendations in mind, has nothing of that kind to consider. Instead, in the remaining three months before the Legislature assembles (which takes place on January 21), this new group has been ordered to hold five meetings and pack in a full year's work.

As for that unofficial committee that has been meeting for this purpose, that, according to Les Houston, should be paid no heed because it operated "outside the rules."

In this instance, that last phrase means "without pledging obedience to Senator Houston."

Shortly after this space noted that the number of prisoners in our corrections system taking college courses amounted to a slim handful, the education division of the Corrections Department rushed out a news release to tell us how hotsytotsy everything is there.

Almost every inmate in the penitentiary system took at least one course last year, the release says—leading some cynics to suggest that there must be some sort of orientation course required of every convict.

The story goes on to make the place sound like a veritable Cambridge, but it neglects one set of statistics. Nowhere does it say how many students there are in the college courses, which is the topic of the original discussion.

What do you want to bet the number there turns out to be a very small one?

When the Senate of the United States is considering such subjects as raising the debt ceiling of the nation, any kind of amendments at all may be introduced; it is not necessary that they have any relationship to the topic under consideration.

That's wild, but it's according to regulations governing such matters in that deliberative body.

Hence the Rudman-Grumm amendment.

If that's adopted, it certainly will be historic. Essentially what it says is that the nation has five years to end deficit spending and bring its budget into balance—a consummation devoutly to be wished. What's most unusual about the plan, however, is that it states that if Congressional budgets do not achieve the requisite cuts in spending in each of the forthcoming five years, the executive branch is empowered to do so.

That would mean that if the Congress voted too many bucks, the President could pick and choose among what is authorized and spend no more than is required to bring the budget under control.

Doesn't that suggest that some of those on Capitol Hill are finally getting as worried as they should be on this subject of spending more than we take in

They're going to lock President Reagan into the White House so they can prepare him for his trip to Geneva, where he meets with Premier Gorbachev.

That's a good thing. It keeps him from going on and on with his repetitious speech about the glories of his tax-reform proposals. That notion has not set the hearts of the nation on fire, principally because most of us, having had a look at it, know what help it would give us does not amount to a hill of beans.

Perhaps while they have the President studying his fact books, somebody can convince him that being "revenue neutral" isn't going to solve the nation's problems. Only a tax raise (ugh!) is likely to accomplish that.

September building permits are mostly remodel projects

More than half the building permits issued last month in Ruidoso were for remodeling projects, continuing a six-month trend toward fixing up rather than constructing new single-family homes. Those 26 additions and alterations permits accounted for more than a fourth of the total dollar valuation on permits issued.

The Village of Ruidoso in September issued 42 permits for all categories with a valuation of \$878,069, down from August's 36 permits with a valuation of \$1,023,806. September 1984 saw 53 permits issued for all categories with more than twice the September 1985 valuation. The September 1984 total permit valuation was \$2,478,221.

Year-to-date permits issued in all categories number 485 with a valuation of \$17,651,352, showing a sharp dollar decline from the year-to-date total at the same time last year, which numbered 459 with a valuation of \$34,965,786.

Five permits with a combined valuation of \$368,658 were issued in September for new single family dwellings (SFD), down slightly from last month's seven SFD permits with a valuation of \$569,672, but down sharply from September 1984, when 17 SFD permits were issued with a valuation of \$1,132,066.

The 26 permits for alterations and additions issued last month had a valuation of \$272,753, close to the August figure of 24 permits with a valuation of \$270,442. Last year in September, 23 alteration permits were issued, but the valuation was just \$194,958.

Two commercial building permits were issued in September with a valuation of \$79,620, down slightly from last month and down significantly from last year. In both August 1985 and September 1984 the village issued just one commercial building permit, but the valuation was \$120,000 for the August permit and \$541,800 for the permit issued in

September 1984.

Commercial additions and alterations permits issued in September showed a healthy increase over those issued this August and held steady with those issued in that category a year ago in September. Permits issued this September numbered eight with a valuation of \$152,039, compared to three permits issued in August with a valuation of \$60,260—half of September's valuation.

During September 1984, the village issued seven permits for commercial additions and alterations with a valuation of \$169,668.

One grading permit was issued in September with a valuation of \$5,000. August saw four grading permits issued at \$1,329. Also in August one foundation permit was issued with a valuation of \$3,432, but none were issued in that category in September.

No permits were issued in September 1984 for grading or foundations.
