



The "Big D" again proved dominant as the unbeaten Ruidoso High School varsity football team rolled over visiting Hot Springs, 35-0, in a District 3-AAA opener Friday night.

Ruidoso's defense limited the Tigers to 80 yards total offense, the second straight week the Warriors have held their opponents under 100 yards.

The Warriors have given up only two touchdowns in the past four games, one a last-second touchdown in the Tularosa game and the other on a pass after a fake punt in the Portales contest.

"Our defense has played great," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "I'm concerned a little bit about our offense. We threw the ball well, but our running game wasn't always consistent."

"We need to get that three or four yards every time."

But the offense was still potent enough to roll up 429 yards total offense, the majority of it in the first half when the 7-0 Warriors scored

all their points.

The Warriors scored their first touchdown on a 47-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Russell Easter to split end Brian Davis with 7:13 left in the first period.

Davis got behind a Hot Springs defender, caught the pass and ran down the left side for the touchdown. The play ended a 56-yard, three-play drive.

Jeff Willingham ran over for the two-point conversion and the Warriors led, 8-0.

Toby Rue set up the drive by returning a Hot Springs punt to the Warrior 44.

Easter then hit Davis for 14 yards to the Tiger 42. On the next play, Easter was sacked for a five-yard loss.

However, the next play saw Easter connect with Davis for the score.

Ruidoso broke the game open with 27 points in the second quarter.

The Warriors increased their lead to 14-0 when Easter broke 71 yards for the touchdown with 11:20 left in the half. He received some excellent blocking down the sidelines and outran a couple of

Tiger defenders into the end zone. The extra-point attempt was no good but Ruidoso had a 14-0 edge.

Ruidoso came right back to score within two minutes.

Rue intercepted a Tiger pass and returned it to the Hot Springs 13.

Tailback Michael Williamson then found a hole, cut to his right, and ran into the end zone for the touchdown.

Garret Henson's extra-point kick was good and the Warriors led, 21-0, with 10:07 remaining in the period.

Easter hit Davis for a 77-yard touchdown pass play and Williamson ran one yard for another touchdown to conclude the scoring.

The final touchdown finished a 66-yard drive in seven plays. Again, the big play in the drive was a 47-yard pass play from Easter to Davis.

In the second half, the Warriors moved the ball well at times but failed to push the ball across the goal line. The Ruidoso coaching staff substituted liberally.

Easter hit on five of nine passes for 185 yards and two touchdowns. He now has nine touchdown passes

on the year and also has run for seven scores.

Davis has caught seven touchdown passes this season, and has come on strong in the past few weeks.

Williamson's touchdowns were his eighth and ninth of the season. He rushed for 90 yards in 14 carries.

Ruidoso had 245 yards rushing for the night, despite the slippery condition of the field due to several days of rain.


The Warriors did not have a turnover in the first half and did not have any serious injuries.

"We did have an excellent first half," admitted Henderson.

Ruidoso has an open date this week. The Warriors will resume play Friday, October 25, at Cobre.

"We're going to work hard on fundamentals this week," Henderson said. "Next week we'll start preparing for Cobre."

NOTES-In the other District 3-AAA game, Cobre topped Deming, 14-7. It was Deming's first loss of the season. In a non-district contest, defending District 3-AAA champion Silver City edged Gadsden, 21-19.

The National Weather Service in Albuquerque has predicted partly cloudy skies with isolated showers for today. The prediction calls for northerly winds from five to 15 miles per hour. The forecast for tonight calls for partly cloudy skies with scattered showers and light easterly winds. Tuesday's forecast calls for partial cloudiness with widely scattered showers and variable winds less than 15 miles per hour, gusty near the showers. Chance of precipitation is 20 percent for this period.

The extended forecast for Wednesday through Friday calls for partly cloudy skies with widely scattered showers Wednesday, with the showers decreasing Thursday and Friday. Highs are predicted to be from the 50s to 60s, lows in the upper 20s to lower 30s.

High waters recede, one bridge still out

Ruidoso officials and police personnel late last week kept a close vigil on rising waters as nearby rainfall was estimated at nearly five inches.

"The biggest thing was the Paradise Canyon crossing," said Frank Potter, assistant village manager.

Street Department crews Wednesday formed a channel across the bridge at Paradise Canyon, as waters swelled across the top. Jack LaMay, Street Department head, said the trench would protect area homes from flooding.

Potter said early today (Monday) that Street Department crews would be on the streets today to begin repairing and repaving that major crossing.

He added that the rain would cause some inconvenience to other paving projects that are now in progress. Village crews monitored heavy

rainfall last week, but Potter said the number of workers involved was kept to a minimum.

No major damage from the flooding was reported.

One Upper Canyon resident reported to The News that a village construction project had caused their home to be flooded by the heavy rains. Phillip DiPaolo said digging above his Upper Canyon home caused his yard and a neighboring house to flood.

Ruidoso Police were on the streets through the flood warnings, said Captain Dave Pfeiffer. He said the wet streets apparently weren't the cause of any traffic problems, but officers were out "to keep an eye on things."

According to village officials, Ruidoso Downs apparently suffered no serious damages from the recent rains. Village clerk Wilma Webb said bridges had been repaired recently from last year's floods, and seem to have held up well.



Book Fair is scheduled

Ellie Keeton, librarian at Ruidoso Middle School (RMS), will be organizing her 11th book fair when she brings a giant selection of reading materials into the RMS library on Friday, October 18. "Books Are Best Friends" is this year's theme, and the fair is scheduled from October 21-25, with a special preview on October 18.

"The main purpose of the book fair is to encourage reading in the home by making books available for purchase in the school," said Keeton, who started the annual book sale when she was Ruidoso High School librarian from 1969 until 1974.

When she came back into the school system as RMS librarian in 1980, Keeton reinstated the yearly event.

All grade levels have the opportunity to shop during school hours, said Keeton, but she especially en-

courages parents to attend the sale in the evening hours with their children. The book fair will be open from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Monday-Friday, and again from 5-8 p.m. Monday-Thursday.

"We'll have a very large selection for all age levels," said Keeton, who added that purchasers will receive a 10 percent discount off the jacket price.

Although earning money is just a secondary goal to Keeton's major one of encouraging reading in the home, she said she uses the funds earned for purchase of additional library books and supplies. Last year she purchased copies of all books on the required reading list.

Keeton said parents will receive a letter with details on when their children will be visiting the fair. She invites everyone to "come to the fair!"



Editorial

The Rio Ruidoso is a wild, untamed creature of nature.

Like a tiger, its movements are beautiful to watch, but potentially destructive to those who carelessly come too close.

Three times in the past 14 months, the power of the Rio Ruidoso has surged. The flooding waters have left destruction in their wake, especially to that which was built too close to the natural course of the river.

The Village of Ruidoso is just 40 years old. What has been termed "disastrous" may be the normal ways of the river—disaster perhaps has not yet been seen on the Rio Ruidoso.

"Flooding" this month was set off by just four days of moderate rain showers.

So those who choose to build near the river are taking a risk with the untamed Rio Ruidoso—being close to the beauty, hoping or believing that the placid waters won't rise.

But the river again will flood, and destroy. Let's respect the power of the river. If you must build near the river, at least build in preparation of the day when the wild Rio Ruidoso rises.—DJP

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Emotionally, our Governor appears to be in a strange state. Judging by the speech he gave here earlier this week, we'd have to say he appears to be feeling confrontational but repressed.

What that means is that he wants to pick some fights, but thinks he has to bridle his temper.

The Governor chose the annual meeting of the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association as the site for what we were told in advance was going to be a "major policy statement."

It was that, in a way, except that the writers who heard the speech and the man who gave it might disagree slightly on what was said. The Governor chided us and told us not to write that he had called for increased taxes. Maybe he didn't, but what he said led so conclusively to the necessity for such increases that we'd only be off a hair's breadth if we reported he did that.

Stopping just short of saying things outright may be the best proof that Toney Anaya is, with difficulty, repressing himself. He clearly wants to say some things straight out, but has decided not to. So, all during this speech, which he made from notes rather than a written text, he stopped just short of blasting a lot of us.

He talked about the need for more maturity, for instance, from all New Mexicans and, rather pointedly, from the news media. As one who might easily have been the target of such remarks if they had been sharp-pointed, this writer waited for the explosion. It never came. There was almost a feeling that Governor Anaya had it in his mind, and maybe had even planned to go ahead and spell out exactly what he thinks of some of us, but thought better of the exercise.

In much the same way, he complained that he was not warned while, during his campaign for office, he was making promises and commitments of all kinds based on the idea that there would be surplus money for him to spend when he took office. He evidently feels that was very shabby treatment from his fellow Democrats, then in office, but he stops short of calling

them unpleasant names. (He does promise to see that his successor is not treated in that same fashion.)

Clearly, we have here a man who would like to come out fighting in defense of his own record, but who has only taken more body blows whenever he has tried that. The wisdom learned from such encounters now tells him to try to feign willingness to put up with such treatment, but it isn't easy.

You know he'd call for higher taxes if he didn't think his doing so would doom such a program.

Whether he does so or not, the fact is that someone is going to have to do that. Contemplate these statements, all true, and you will see why:

—Revenues to the state are falling, or at least are not rising as fast as the cost of the services state government is providing.

—Those neat surpluses the Governor and others expected to find when they came into power have been ended, and the reserves built up at that time have been spent. (As Anaya pointed out in this speech, it was two conservative Legislatures in succession that allowed that sort of possibly illegal deficit spending, so the conservatives can't be counted on to solve the problem.)

—Nobody seems willing to face the decisions involved in cutting the size of state government. Anaya's opponents in the Legislature call for him to wield the meat axe, but they go on increasing the budget for most of state government. So far the only difference between the response liberals make to special interests and conservatives make to special interests is that the interests they listen to are different.

But in early 1986, the day of true reckoning comes. We can't delay making the decision longer, because the reserves are almost eaten up. Now we either cut government spending or raise taxes.

It won't be the former. Ergo it will be the latter.

Nobody, including the Governor, wants to say that baldly, but it's true.

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

Warrior spikers lose to Cobre, host tough Colts Tuesday

Ruidoso High School's varsity volleyball team stayed winless in District 3-AAA play by losing to visiting Cobre in four sets Saturday afternoon.

Cobre won the first set, 15-8. Ruidoso rallied to win the second set, 16-14, but the Indians won the third set, 15-4, and the final set, 15-2, for the match victory.

Ruidoso, now 0-3 in District 3-AAA action, will host Silver City Tuesday for varsity and junior varsity matches. The varsity match will begin at 2:45 p.m., followed by the junior varsity match.

Against Cobre, mistakes again hurt the Warriors.

The Warriors trailed, 7-2, early in the first set, but rebounded for an 8-7 edge. However, the Indians scored eight straight points for the final 15-8 margin.

In the second set, Ruidoso rebounded from a 10-3 deficit for the victory.

Good serving by Shannon Lee and Felicia Childress helped key the comeback.

Ruidoso trailed, 13-10, but cut the margin to 13-12 with Lee serving. Cobre took a 14-12 advantage, but Childress then served four straight points for the set victory.

But the next two sets were no contest as Cobre won easily.

Cobre led, 9-4, in the third set, but reeled off seven straight points for the victory. The Indians led all the way in the final set.

"I felt we played fair," said Warrior head coach Pixie Arthur. "Again, mistakes hurt us. More defensively than offensively."

"I felt Shannon Lee again played well."

Lee led the Warriors with six serve points in the first set.

Childress had five serve points in the second set.

Now the Warriors must look ahead to Silver City, probably the second best team in the district (after Hot Springs).

"Oh, they're tough," Arthur commented. "I don't know if they've got that much skills, but they're so aggressive."

Following the Silver City match, the Warriors will host the Deming Wildcats Saturday, October 19.

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Jv spikers defeated, C team wins

The Ruidoso High School junior varsity and C volleyball teams split with visiting Cobre Saturday afternoon.

Cobre won the junior varsity match in three sets, 15-6, 13-15, 15-1. The Warrior C team won in three sets, 11-15, 15-6, 15-7.

"We played terrible," said Warrior coach Jim Hofstad about the junior varsity team. "We couldn't pass the ball."

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

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Around Sports with Gary Brown



Cisco Bob is proving to be as successful in college distance running as he was when he was running at Ruidoso High School. The former Warrior athlete is a freshman at Texas Tech University in Lubbock and is now the Red Raiders' top cross-country runner.

Cisco won the New Mexico AAA-division 3,000-meter and 1,500-meter championships the past two track seasons. Bob was second in the state AAA-division cross-country race last year and finished 11th the year before.

He opened the collegiate season this fall by finishing third in the Pioneer Invitational in Plainview, Texas, and was first in a dual meet with Baylor University.

Last week he took 12th in a tough race in Arlington, Texas. "He finished 12th against some world-class runners there," said Cisco's mother, Leda. "He likes Texas Tech a lot."

Texas Tech competes in the Southwest Conference, one of the top conferences in the country.

So Cisco should get plenty of competition the rest of the season. But knowing the former Warrior star, he should be up to the challenge. Bob ran away from his competition in his junior and senior high school seasons with a strong kick and a tough pace.

Ruidoso frosh fall to Rockets

The Ruidoso High School freshman football team dropped a 30-8 decision to host Goddard Thursday in Roswell.

The Warriors, now 1-3 on the season, scored their only touchdown on a 12-yard pass from quarterback Michael Swanner to Dusty Skellett with a minute left in the game.

Dusty Beavers scored the two-point conversion on a sweep. The touchdown finished a 55-yard drive.

Goddard jumped off to a 14-0 halftime lead and gradually increased its margin from there.

Still, Warrior coach Clendon Kirkpatrick felt his team played well against the Rockets.

"Goddard is comparable to Roswell (who defeated Ruidoso, 42-0, earlier this season)," he said. "They're not as big or quick as Roswell but they're still big."

"I felt the guys did much better. We had a lot better blocking, and we ran a little tougher. They hit better too. Chris Long had an interception and the linebackers covered well."

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

Wohlgemuth carries family tradition with style

Ruidoso hair stylist Steve Wohlgemuth is part of a family tradition that he loves.

A Tularosa native, Wohlgemuth began working at his father's store, Central Barbershop in Tularosa, at an early age, drawing baths and shining shoes.

Wohlgemuth recalled a highlight of his childhood career, when Russell Hayden—alias "Lucky," Hopalong Cassidy's sidekick—came into the barbershop to have his boots shined.

"All the kids watched through the window," said Wohlgemuth nostalgically.

Wohlgemuth began cutting hair at his father's shop in 1950. At that time, he was doing mostly shaves and flat-top cuts. In 1956, he opened Sierra Barbershop in Tularosa.

Wohlgemuth said that the course of the industry changed 15 years ago, when long hair came into style.

"The people who survived were those who accepted long hair and went back to school," said Wohlgemuth, adding that 60 barbershops closed nationwide with the advent of long hair.

Wohlgemuth traveled to Las Cruces on the weekends to learn the new techniques. He still continues to keep up with the latest styles and techniques by attending conventions and seminars.

The first men's long cut was called the Sebring style, named after the man who invented it. Wohlgemuth said that 15 years ago, the cut began to appeal to women, who went to barbers for the fuss-free style. Since then, the industry has revolutionized into the unisex shops operating today.

After learning the new styles, Wohlgemuth began commuting to Ruidoso once a week during the summer. One year, he worked at the Chaparral, the next, at Delma's.

"That's when it took off for me," said Wohlgemuth, who opened his own shop in the Adobe Plaza at the end of the summer of 1975. This summer, 10 years later, he moved to a larger location in the new Jira Plaza.

"When I first came, it was different than now—the barber and

cosmetologist were far apart," he said of the changes in the industry.

Wohlgemuth said he returned to his roots in a symbolic sense with a barbershop-pole logo on the new store's sign. Wohlgemuth's shop is a full-service salon for men and women.

Steve and his wife, Marian, live in Ruidoso. One of the stylists in the shop is Jeanette Wohlgemuth, one of their five children. Jeanette said

she always watched her father cut hair and wanted to follow the family tradition.

"The whole time I was in beauty school, I learned more from Dad (than at school). He's a tough act to follow," she said.

Her father's customers come from all over the state and Texas, she added.

Steve Wohlgemuth said he loves his job and looks forward to going to

work each day.

"To put things in perspective, I must say any success I experienced in my career as a barber-stylist and in raising our five children to becoming responsible, productive members of our society, must be attributed to the cooperation of the Holy Spirit, whom I have often asked for guidance," said Wohlgemuth.

Merri Gandy won a pair of Naturalizer shoes, Marge Garner won Naturalizer boots. Pat Evans and Jo Steele each



Delgado resigns from school board

Mark Delgado, president of the Capitan Board of Education, resigned his position at Thursday's school board meeting.

Board members Tom Trost, Preston Stone, Isidro Peralta and James McDaniel reluctantly approved the resignation. Afterward, Delgado expressed his "sincere appreciation to the board, the administration, faculty and staff" of Capitan schools.

Delgado said he felt it was a privilege and pleasure living in the community for the last nine years. He thanked the people of the community for their friendship during the good times and the hard times.

Delgado left his position as administrator of the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School after he was appointed administrator of the Los Lunas Facility last month.

Delgado said that he would remain with the board until November 13 to help find a replacement and help with any problems the board might encounter.

Also Thursday night, the board resolved the problem of student transportation on school activity trips with the approval of a permission waiver policy. The waiver would allow the transport of any school group in private vehicles, providing the group has fewer than nine students.

The waiver also states that any activity trip with nine or more

students will be on a school bus, purchased for the purpose of transporting students. The waiver states that school vehicles other than buses may be used for groups of fewer than nine students only after the students' parents or guardians sign a travel consent.

The use of private vehicles is discouraged by the board, but may be done with the written consent of the superintendent. Before the vehicle is approved by the superintendent, the driver's name, license number, vehicle description and license plate number must be recorded. Also, the name of the insurance company and policy number of the vehicle must be provided.

Capitan superintendent Leonard Hays said that the school could not be considered negligent if parents sign the waiver for their children to travel in vehicles other than school buses. Hays said the waiver would cover every school activity including the cheerleaders, Future Farmers of America and Future Homemakers of America.

Hays briefly reported that the New Mexico Activities Association approved Capitan's request to return to a Class A rating next year. The school's application for an AA classification was approved last spring.

Hays said the AA classification creates problems with longer distances that Capitan teams would travel to play Class AA schools. Capitan schools also did not reach

the enrollment expectations and are below the enrollment level for Class AA schools.

Also Thursday, the board narrowly approved a two-year contract with bus contractor Trankie Silva for use of the activity bus at \$1.30 per mile this year, with the price negotiable next year. McDaniel cast the dissenting vote, after Silva reported that the motor on the activity bus failed while on a trip last week.

Silva said he requested the contract because of the high cost of the motor replacement. He said he needed two years of guaranteed payments, because he took out a loan to pay for the repairs.

Silva responded to the board's September discussion of purchasing an activity bus. Silva told the board Thursday that a used Trailways bus costs \$69,000.

"You want class, but you have no money," he told the board.

Silva said that he has donated many miles of bus transportation during the last two years, when Capitan had no money to pay for out-of-town trips. He also said that he is "the lowest paid contractor in the state."

In other school business, the board:

—Denied the request for a bus route extension on the Debbie Byrd route, north of the Capitan Mountains, because of the condition of the road in question and the time it would add to the already lengthy route.

—Approved the request from the state Office of Education that a 1972 bus currently being used for the Ward Subdivision route be replaced with a new one.

—Decided that Shirley Bannister will be separated from service. Board members reported that she failed to return from a vacation.

—Approved the publication of a call for bids for a 1978 Ford station wagon, to be sold to the highest bidder after Hays receives permission from the state purchasing office to remove the vehicle from the school inventory.


—Approved a cash transfer of \$24 from the lunch fund to the activity fund to correct a clerical error.

—Approved a budget transfer of an excess of \$726 from line item 2.180 for clerical salaries to line item 5.320 for rent on the school copiers.

—Heard Hays say that this year's audit report cited the school for not maintaining a fixed-assets inventory which shows the original price of the school's acreage and physical plant, including the recent kitchen and gym changes.

—Heard a report from Hays that the school earned \$7,653 from investments during the third quarter of this year. Hays said the earnings must be distributed to the funds from which the investment money was taken.

The next board meeting will be at 7 p.m. Thursday, November 14, in the school administration building.



October Begins to Show Its True Colors

Heavy rains fall from the ninth to the eleventh and it seemed that we were going to have one of those rare rainy Octobers, with the rain turning to snow toward the end of the month.

Then on the twelfth, you awoke to a true October day. The clouds had all rolled by in the night leaving the sky the bluest of blue. All the weather spirits treated us to a delightful surprise.

Yes, glorious October has come into its own. And our hearts beat higher day by day.

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
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
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Merchants report motorcycle, Aspenfest business overall was good

The Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival and annual Aspen Festival traditionally are two busy weekends before an autumn lull in Ruidoso business activity. This year was no exception, and most local businesspeople reported successful weekends.

Most of the lodgers polled said their facilities were full for the weekend of the cycle festival and partially occupied for Aspenfest. Elbert Dubose, owner of Casey's Cabins, said his rentals were full for three nights during the cycle weekend and one night for Aspenfest.

Dubose said he felt cyclists were dissatisfied with the festival. He said he heard complaints from his cyclist clientele that the festival (located at the Super Select Sale Barn near Glencoe) was too far out of town, and did not have enough activities.

Betty Mize, manager of 29 Pines Motel, gave a similar report. Mize said her Aspenfest occupancy of 10 rooms was up from previous festival years. Mize said her biker guests also complained about what they felt was a lack of activities at the cycle festival. She said a New Jersey couple left after only one day because they said there weren't enough activities.

Nancy Radziewicz said that her Westwinds Motel saw the best biker occupancy this year since Til Thompson moved his show in 1981. She said she also was pleased with

Aspenfest occupancy, which she said she had not had in the past.

Westwinds co-owner Mike Radziewicz said that, although his motel occupancy was up during the cycle festival, he heard that other lodgers were down. Radziewicz attributed the decline of bikers in some lodging establishments to the nice weather, which allowed more bikers to camp out.

Sherry Gosdin, manager of the KOA River Ranch Campground (located six miles east of Ruidoso Downs), said she had more than 420 bikers, from 22 states and Canada, registered over the week-long period. She, too, said it was her best year since the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival Corporation took over the event.

Most eating establishments fared well during the two festival weekends. Taste Freezer clerk Mary Ann Sauskis reported that she served lunch to the bikers on Sunday, and breakfast everyday.

"I'd come in at 6:30 a.m. and people were waiting at the door," she said.

During the Aspen Festival, hungry and thirsty parade-goers and high school band students packed the restaurant from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Jimmy Goodwin, owner of Schlotzsky's Sandwich Shop, said his cycle festival business was up 20 percent this year, and his Aspenfest business was up by 40 percent. Goodwin attributed some of the increase to having an enlarged store, since he moved locations recently.

Hilda Pratt, a clerk at the 7-11 store at Sudderth and Mechem drives, said her store was swamped with pre- and post-Aspenfest parade shoppers. Pratt reported that she sold a lot of hot coffee before the parade and beer and liquor afterward.

Pratt said the cycle festival brought a steady stream of customers throughout that week.

Dee Webb, a waitress at Nottingham's Pub, reported that bikers packed the bar during "happy hours" (4:30 to 6:30 p.m.) during the motorcycle festival. Webb said most of the bikers did not eat meals at the restaurant. During the Aspen Festival, however, Webb said that more people filled the restaurant than the bar.

Many merchants reported better business during Aspen weekend than during the motorcycle festival. Mac McDougal, owner of Ski West Sports, said he felt that the motorcycle festival needed to be more of a community project, such as is the Aspen Festival.

"My main theme is that there be more coordination with the cycle people (planners) and the Aspen Festival," said McDougal.

However, McDougal said he felt the festivals should not be on the same weekend. He also advocated moving both activities back one week into October to prolong business during the traditional slow time.

"From now to Thanksgiving, it is a long dry spell," said McDougal.

Budgie Green, owner of The Wild Snail, said his Aspen Festival

business was good, but not proportional to the amount of people that were in town for the day.

Some merchants said that the street festival during Aspenfest brought more people into their stores. Don Parsons said that he had more walk-in traffic at Collections (in the Serenity Plaza) than at Mary's Fashions because there were dancers and entertainment at the plaza.

However, Steppin' Out shoe store owner Anita Smith said her Serenity Plaza store made only \$200 more than her Sierra Mall shop during Aspenfest Saturday. Smith said she had a good business day, meeting the goals she'd set for her store.

Smith emphasized the positive aspect of having crowds in town, even if they do not overwhelm the shops with purchases on the busy days. Smith said many customers return to Ruidoso after seeing the stores during such visits. She stressed the value of the second-hand turnover after having crowds in town.

"You have to look at this in the broad sense. A lot of people can't see beyond their front doors, that even if they didn't gain anything (in direct sales), the dollar turns over seven or eight times," said Smith.

Smith said she is tired of what she felt is a "negative attitude" displayed by some local merchants. "I know the economy is down," she said, "but the customers don't want to hear that."

Smith opined that a positive attitude is an important asset for Ruidoso businesses.

P&Z reviews zoning draft

When members of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) met to review the final draft of a proposed zoning ordinance, they found that BRW, the planning firm preparing the document, hadn't incorporated many of the changes requested in last month's marathon workshop sessions.

Paul Davis, village enforcement officer, reported that the commission reviewed half of the draft Wednesday, but found that many of the recommended changes were not made, so P&Z members were forced to repeat some parts of the process that they thought already were accomplished.

An item of concern was a section of the proposal establishing an appeals board. Although the draft contained an option of establishing a separate five-member board or having the village governing body continue in that capacity, members want to have the ordinance mandate one option or the other.

"I would like to have an appeals board for one reason—to keep politics out of it," said Davis, who also said that a drawback to appointing another village board would be adding another meeting to busy schedules.

"I don't understand the need for it (a separate board)," said Commissioner Karon Petty. She expressed the opinion that the draft's wording would throw most requests presently heard by P&Z right to the council.

P&Z finally voted to rewrite that portion of the draft to call for appeals from administrative rulings to go before P&Z, on to the council and finally to the courts if necessary.

Commissioners discussed including a definition for time-share in the document, and discussed some special problems and concerns about interval ownership.

Village Councilor Rick Evans opined that a tax loophole is allowing time-share developers to avoid paying gross receipts taxes. He suggested that builders and developers be required to furnish a tax identification number when obtaining permits, and his idea was incorporated into the draft.

The commission had a lengthy discussion on minimum lot sizes in neighborhood business districts. They also discussed minimum requirements on mobile home developments.

P&Z will review the second half of the draft at 4 p.m. today (Monday), October 14, in council chambers of Village Hall.

After the complete zoning ordinance proposal is reviewed and corrected, commissioners will repeat the careful review process on land use and zoning maps. The commission's recommendations and corrections will be incorporated into the draft, and returned to BRW for a "final-final" draft before a public hearing is scheduled.

Chemical abuse counseling is available here

Emotions were high Thursday night at the final Ruidoso Schools-sponsored IMPACT-Awareness Week '85 meeting. Audience members viewed a movie of the tragic story of one family's struggle with alcohol and heard impassioned presentations from representatives of A.A., Al-Anon, Alateen and several counseling centers on the dangers of chemical dependencies.

The meeting capped a series of programs in the schools for students and after school for parents that were organized by Ruidoso schools.

"Soft is the Heart of a Child" brought to life the effects alcohol abuse can have on a family. Especially dramatized were the results the film father's alcoholism had on his children.

Presentations by members of chemical dependency-related groups followed.

Virginia, a member of A.A., told how that group has helped her defeat her chemical dependency.

"Not only did they give me back hope, but they gave me serenity, joy and a peace that passes understanding," she said of the group. "My life has changed, I continue to grow."

Virginia reported that a Ruidoso A.A. group meets every night, and welcomes anyone who has decided to overcome a chemical dependency.

"The hand of A.A. is always there," she said.

Wanda, representing Al-Anon and Alateen, explained that the two groups are not for alcoholics themselves, but for those who are affected by alcoholics. Al-Anon is for friends or relatives of alcoholics, Alateen is for teenagers whose lives are affected by alcoholics. The two groups meet regularly in Ruidoso.

"They're addicted to alcohol or drugs, and we're addicted to them," Wanda said.

She stressed that alcoholism is a disease, and so must be treated as such. She also emphasized the anonymity of A.A., Al-Anon and Alateen, and pointed out that

meeting-goers discovering that others have the same problems is a strength of the programs.

Teri, another A.A. member, praised the Ruidoso schools for sponsoring the drug awareness program.

Representatives of local counseling agencies also spoke. J.L. Wilson, director of the Professional Counseling Associates, said mental health counselors as well as alcohol counselors are available at the Professional Associates counseling center. Wilson praised A.A., Al-Anon and Alateen programs in Ruidoso, and said the counseling center deals mainly with the mental health problems that underlie chemical dependencies.

He, too, congratulated the schools for initiating the drug awareness program.

"I really compliment the schools on their approach to substance abuse," he said.

Birgit LaMotte, a Professional Counseling Associates counselor, expressed her pleasure at seeing so many groups working together against chemical abuse. She

reported that she also has a private counseling service in Capitan.

Paula Land, a psychological counselor for the Ruidoso schools, also has a private practice. She said she employs family therapy techniques in her counseling many times, often finding it vital in treating those with chemical dependencies. She, also, said she was pleased to see a united group of counselors.

Mary Reeves, of the Roswell CareUnit, described the treatment program available at CareUnit. She said the first step in treating chemical dependencies, that of withdrawal, is dangerous and can be fatal in the case of alcoholics. She said CareUnit employs a 12-step approach in treating the problem. She said CareUnit's central purpose is to help.

"As long as you're alive, there's hope," she said.

Ruidoso teacher Maggie Hawthorne was the final speaker of the evening.

"We feel like it's been a pretty successful program," she said. "We can't do it without the community's help."

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING SOLID WASTE IN LINCOLN COUNTY, PROVIDING A PENALTY, AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Commission finds that the following ordinance is necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Lincoln County, and

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Commission finds that the following ordinance is necessary to provide for safe and sanitary collection and disposal of solid wastes, and

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Commission finds that the following ordinance is necessary to provide a coordinated county wide program of control of solid waste in cooperation with Federal and State Agencies, and

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Commission is delegated the power and responsibility to regulate refuse collection in the county pursuant to Section 4-5-1, of N.M.S.A., 1978, and

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Commission finds that this ordinance is necessary to provide for the safety, preserve the health, promote the orderly and convenient disposal of refuse, comfort and convenience of the County or its inhabitants;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Lincoln County Commission as follows:

Section 1. Definitions.
 For the purposes of this ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivatives shall have the meanings given below.
 County Manager is the chief executive officer of the County.
 Debris is all waste building material, bricks, concrete blocks, trees, stumps and other material which is commonly known as debris.
 Garbage is putrescible animal and vegetable wastes resulting from the handling, preparation, cooking and consumption of food, and
 Refuse is any person, joint enterprise or corporation who collects refuse, garbage or debris from any property not owned by the person, joint enterprise or corporation.
 Litter is refuse, garbage or debris found in public areas or generated while traveling in a motor vehicle.
 Refuse is all solid waste (except body wastes), including garbage, paper, cardboard, tin cans, yard clippings, wood, glass, also liquid petroleum waste, such as motor oil, and all such similar items.

Section 2. Accumulation of garbage, refuse and debris removal.
 (a) No person shall permit to accumulate upon premises owned, leased or occupied by him, which are within 200 feet of another inhabited premises, any refuse, garbage or refuse, except in covered watertight containers made of metal or plastic.
 (b) No person shall throw, place, dump or dispose of any debris on any road, street, gutter, sidewalk or alley, nor shall any person allow the accumulation upon any adjoining property, of any debris for a longer period than five (5) days.
 (c) No person shall cause or permit to remain upon any property, private or public, any dead animal or vegetable or mineral matter or any composition or residue thereof which is in an unsanitary condition or is hazardous to public health.
 (d) Any unauthorized accumulation of garbage, refuse or debris is hereby declared to be a nuisance and is unlawful.
 (e) No person shall cast, place, sweep or deposit anywhere within the County any garbage, refuse or debris in such a manner that it may be carried or deposited by the elements upon any road, street, sidewalk, alley, sewer, parkway or other public place, or in any occupied premises within the County.
 (f) Subject to any limitations otherwise provided by law, the Sheriff is authorized to inspect and enter any private property or private premises where he/she has reasonable cause to suspect that unlawful accumulations of refuse may exist.
 (1) If, upon the basis of such inspections, the Sheriff finds that any of subsections (a) through (e) have not been complied with or that a hazard exists, he/she shall cause to be disturbed or removed from the premises (whether owner, tenant, lessee, manager or other person) where the unlawful refuse accumulations exist, to properly correct such conditions, within a designated period of time from ten (10) days up to thirty (30) days.
 (2) Upon the failure, neglect or refusal of any owner, tenant, lessee, manager or occupant to properly correct such conditions within the time prescribed (or within five (5) days after the return of

such prescribed notice as undeliverable, if the notice is served by mail, the County Manager may cause to be placed on the premises in charge of the refuse accumulation, or order its correction by the County, at the expense of the owner, tenant, lessee, manager or occupant in charge of the property.
 (3) The cost of correction shall be a lien on the property, and shall remain in full force and effect for the amount due plus interest at the legal rate from the date of the filing of the lien until paid and all other costs, including attorney fees. The lien shall be enforced and foreclosed according to applicable state law.
 (4) Where the sheriff finds that immediate measures are required to alleviate a threat to the public health and safety due to certain unlawful refuse accumulations, the County Manager may waive the ten (10) day notification period in order to take whatever steps are necessary for correction of the accumulation.
 (5) Costs for correction of unlawful refuse accumulations shall be determined on the basis of man worker hours, equipment at a normal rental rate per day, plus any direct costs paid by the County to correct the accumulation.
 (6) Nothing in paragraph (f) of this section shall be construed to require any notice before the filing of a Magistrate Court action pursuant to this section.

Section 3. Garbage and Refuse; Recollection practices.
 (a) Garbage and refuse if not properly stored on premises shall be placed in boxes or packing crates, regardless of construction, and to bundle all tree clippings, before placing the same in County garbage containers.
 (b) Garbage disposed of in containers provided by the County shall be first deposited in closed fly-proof containers.
 (c) Motor oil and similar liquid material shall be disposed of only in sealed containers, or in drums filled or capped.
 (d) Mobile home parks. Every mobile home park shall provide for the collection of not less than 5 cubic yards of refuse weekly per lot. If the County Manager determines that additional sanitation containers are necessary, he/she may order such additional containers as may be required to prevent excessive litter or any hazard to the public or residents of the park.
 (e) All users of County containers shall comply with the rules and regulations established by the County for the use, care and location of solid waste containers and shall keep the lids and covers furnished for such containers closed at all times except when they are being filled or emptied.
 (f) All solid waste including grass and tree clippings, leaves and cut weeds shall be placed in the container provided by the County (not less than the container) and shall be reduced in size to no more than four (4) feet in length. No items in excess of these dimensions or weighing more than fifty (50) pounds shall be placed in the containers provided by the County.
 (g) It is unlawful to block or impede access to a County container.
Section 5. Toxic, flammable or explosive refuse.
 Poisons, acids, caustics, chemicals, waste concrete, dead animals, live pests, rocks, sand, dirt, concrete, bricks and building materials, toxic, highly flammable or explosive materials shall not be placed in containers for regular collection, but shall be disposed of as directed by the County Manager and in accordance with any applicable state and federal regulations, at the expense of the person accumulating the same.
Section 6. Use or damage to containers.
 (a) It is unlawful to intentionally damage any refuse container owned by the County.
 (b) Any individual who damages any container provided for the County residents shall be liable to the county for the cost of repair or replacement of such container.
 (c) It is prohibited for any person including children, to be on or in sanitation containers.
Section 7. Construction sites and transportation of materials.
 (a) All persons who have secured a State building permit shall, before the start of any construction activity, furnish or place on those premises a container or fenced area of suitable class and design to contain all refuse which may be disturbed or removed from the premises by the wind or elements. Within five (5) days of completion, all solid waste and containers shall be removed from the premises.
 (b) No person shall allow solid waste of any kind to be blown or to be carried by the elements from the premises for which the building permit is issued.
 (c) Persons engaged in demolition, who have obtained a State permit, shall remove the debris and structural parts and contain

their elements from scattering in the same manner as set out above. Demolition solid waste shall be removed and disposed of within five (5) days of completion in the designated manner as prescribed by the County Manager.
Section 8. Scavenging prohibited.
 It is unlawful for any person not authorized by the County, to remove, collect or disturb the trash stored in a County landfill or container or to open the lid intending to do so. No person shall remove any trash from a container and scatter the same upon any public or private property.
Section 9. Regulations adopted.
 The laws and regulations promulgated and published by the State Environmental Improvement Agency, along with subsequent revisions and amendments are adopted by reference and made a part of this chapter. The penalty sections in such laws and regulations shall not be applicable to violations within this County. The penalty section herein is applicable to violations prosecuted under this ordinance.
Section 10. Penalty.
 Violation of this ordinance shall be punished by imprisonment for a period of ninety (90) days or a fine of \$300.00. Each violation shall constitute a separate offense. Each day an offense continues shall constitute a separate offense.
Section 11. Recording.
 This ordinance shall be recorded in a book kept for that purpose and shall be authenticated by the signature of the County Clerk.
Section 12. Effectiveness.
 This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its recording in the book kept by the County for that purpose.
