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Downs officials grapple with sewer controversy

Tempers flared over the messy issue of "illegal" sewers at the Ruidoso Downs Village Trustees meeting Monday.

Trustee Jake Harris, who serves as the Downs water and sewer commissioner, began a discussion of sewers by telling the board that he has three adjacent houses, one of which he has hooked up to the Downs sewer system. Building inspector Don Edwards told the group that Harris hooked up all three houses to one tap.

According to a village ordinance, each house must have a separate sewer tap.

Edwards said that Harris told him he had hooked up the houses, even though Harris knew it was wrong.

"You're the most illegal one around here," said Edwards to Harris. Earlier in the meeting, Harris charged two Downs establishments of having illegal sewer hookups.

On June 1, Harris took out four

permits for sewer hookups. Tuesday, village clerk Wilma Webb confirmed Edwards' charges against Harris. Webb stated that Harris hooked three houses onto one tap, using only one permit.

Webb said that Harris entered the village office last week and told her that he had hooked up the three houses. Webb said Harris asked what the village should do about the situation and suggested the possibility that a "red tap" be issued if he was in violation of the ordinance.

Webb said that Harris told her the village could start with him to correct "illegal" hookups, if his connection was found to be in violation. On Tuesday, Harris denied that he had any illegal hookups. He said he hooked up one house and brought the sewer line past the other two, but had not hooked them up. Harris denied telling Edwards that he had illegal hookups.

The sewer hookups, said Harris, "If they say I should stop the road, I will. If they say it's okay to do them on, I'll do that."

Harris said that only one of the houses is occupied.

Downs Mayor J.C. Day said Tuesday that he did not know if Harris has the three houses hooked up to one line. However, Day said Edwards has expertise on sewer matters.

Edwards said he would file a complaint against Harris, pending a consultation with village attorney Don Dutton.

Wednesday, Dutton said that Downs code enforcement officer Mark Milford would work with Edwards to determine if Harris has illegal hookups.

"If there is a violation, the ordinance will be enforced against all citizens," said Dutton.

At Monday's meeting, Harris charged that Inspiration Heights Apartments and Cottonwood Motel have illegal sewer connections. According to Webb, there is no sewer permit for the Downs apartment complex.

Dutton said he would send a letter, followed by a citation, to the apartment complex.

"I don't care if they have \$1

million to our community, they have to follow the ordinances," said Dutton.

Dutton also recommended against allowing the apartment complex to use their own meter instead of the village meter.

Joe Ortega, executive director of Region Six Housing, the agency that manages the apartments, told The Ruidoso News Wednesday that he was "totally flabbergasted" when he heard about the apartment village fees. Ortega said the building contractor was to have taken care of the permit fee. He said he would see that the fee is paid.

Webb said that she had never seen a record of the Cottonwood Motel ever having filed for a sewer tap. Glen Crane, a real estate agent with Lela Karter, said that the previous motel owner spent \$25,000 in taking the sewer and had gotten all the necessary permits, including state approval. Ed Hazel, new owner of the motel, said he'd be willing to pay the Downs contractor to clean up the matter.

All city Dutton said he would like to see the board pass a resolution allowing for an amnesty period in which people could declare unreported hookups and pay the permit fee without penalty.

The council agreed to allow Hazel to pay the permit fee, pending approval by the inspector. Edwards checked the hookup Tuesday and said everything is in order.



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
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The band won at the Parade of Champions Saturday. Members of the band are in the background.

New mobile home decks, porches require permits

Mobile home owners should obtain a building permit before adding decks or porches, Jimmy Neeley, Ruidoso Building Inspector, said Wednesday.

Neeley explained that he has required that mobile home owners have a permit for such additions, but after encountering some resistance he asked the village attorney to interpret that section of the law.

John Underwood, village attorney, notified Neeley that "construction of porches not a part of the mobile home itself must require a building permit and a plot plan."

Neeley and Sandy Hall, also of the inspector's office, said they'll continue to enforce that requirement along with other parts of the Uniform Building Code. The village will be notifying mobile home sales, service and installation businesses of the regulation.

Hall and Neeley are charged with approving building permit applications and following the progress of projects to see that all village and state building requirements are met. They stressed that their enforcement of building standards is strictly according to the minimum standards established in the uniform code.

"My preference is to walk through and admire the product,"

and Neeley. But he said that part of construction code does not meet minimum standards and that they can show the builder any unacceptable practices noted in the book.

Hall, who stressed that the department's main goal is to assure the public welfare, said that one big area of non-compliance is an ordinance requiring a certificate of occupancy after the final inspection before new commercial buildings are occupied.

They said builders or owners "don't always call for the final inspection," said Hall. "The ones we're concerned with are the ones the public uses," she added. Safety and fire hazards might be identified in that inspection, she said.

Approved building plans are stamped with the following information:

All inspections must be made and a Certificate of Occupancy issued before this building may be occupied. Under penalty of \$300.00 Fine or 90 Days. Ord. 8-10-1

Neeley and Hall, both state-certified inspectors, said they have designed a plan in which the village and lending institutions will cooperate to see that commercial buildings adhere to the certificate of occupancy requirement. The certificate is not required for residences.

where requirements are not met. The inspectors say they work on two levels: first they might try a verbal resolution of the problem, and second they pursue further action to see that the problem doesn't continue. Neeley said one course of action in cases of failure to meet minimum standards is to pursue revocation of a contractor's license.

"It's our duty to the public," said Neeley, although he said he would

prefer not taking the local problems to court.

Hall said "100 percent cooperation" among builders, developers and the inspector's offices would simplify the job of enforcing building regulations.

"We don't really expect that," said Neeley. "We have different goals, and we hit people in the wallet," he added. "Basically we're in the consumer protective business."

Downs Trustees fire police officer after alleged handgun incident

After one open and one closed meeting of the Ruidoso Downs village personnel board, the Ruidoso Downs village trustees voted to fire police officer John Fuselier on charges that he unholstered his gun in a public place.

Police Chief Skip Hazel told the personnel board that on or about September 20, Bill Stirman registered a complaint against one of the officers, whose description fit Fuselier's. Stirman alleged that on

September 12, he and his family saw Fuselier take out his gun and hand it to another officer, across a table at the Village Inn Restaurant.

Stirman told the group that he was prompted to report the incident because his son attended Ruidoso Middle School when a shooting occurred last year. He said that when they saw the gun go across the table, cocked, it brought a flashback of last year's shooting to his son's mind.

"It was wrong to wait a week to report it, but I felt like it needed attention," Stirman said.

Police dispatcher JoAnn Jenkins said that she and Hazel had checked the records and found no tickets or anything else that could link Stirman to Fuselier or any of the Downs police.

Hazel said that a policeman should never draw a weapon unless he intends to use it, especially in a public place.

"I did not and would not," said Fuselier of the alleged incident. "I have more common sense and respect for a weapon."

After the public session, the personnel board met privately. After

that meeting, Mayor J.C. Day announced in open session that the board had decided to recommend that the council terminate Fuselier. The board of trustees unanimously approved the action.

Hazel's attorney, Ed Buck, said he felt his client did not receive a fair hearing.

Village attorney Don Dutton said he felt that "as a probationary employee, Fuselier received more due process than he was entitled."

Village Trustee and personnel board member LeVerne Cole was absent from the meeting.

Alarm company will monitor burglar alarm calls

Alarm company operator Jack Halbrooks reported Wednesday that his company is installing a more advanced system in order to monitor burglar alarm calls that used to ring directly into the Ruidoso Police Department dispatch area.

Halbrooks, after reading a News report on the number of alarm calls handled by the Ruidoso Police, volunteered Tuesday to explain how his and other alarm companies work with the police to deter crime. But by late Wednesday he reported a change in procedures.

Ruidoso Police Chief Richard A. Swenor explained recently that his department is trying to reduce the number of alarms that ring directly into the station. He said 154 separate alarms are authorized to ring into the station, and many more unauthorized systems, when activated, are programmed to dial the department.

Halbrooks contends that the unauthorized alarms, those installed by individuals rather than licensed alarm companies, are the ones causing the problems.

The kinds of problems they can cause are illustrated by the number of false alarm calls the department answers every month. Swenor said police responded to 79 alarm calls

during September, and in 25 cases the alarms went off because of operator error. A cause was not established for the other 54 alarms, but apparently the systems were not set off by burglars.

Swenor said the current average on alarm calls is two and a half per 24-hour period.

"We don't like the false alarm calls anymore than anybody else," said Halbrooks, who said he also responds when one of his alarms rings. He said he is on hand to unlock the premises so police can thoroughly check for prowlers.

If an alarm installed by Halbrooks' company is causing problems, he said he takes out the faulty system and installs a brand-new one. He said he also works closely with his clients to be sure the equipment is used properly, keeping operator error problems to a minimum.

Halbrooks said the unauthorized systems are the ones over which the police have no control. He agreed with Swenor that a licensing ordinance would alleviate part of that problem.

Since the cost to answer alarm calls was estimated by Swenor to be as high as \$6,000 this year, he has been asked if the police are "in fact subsidizing private enterprise."

Although a previous village council authorized the department to bill alarm users for police services,

Swenor said he doesn't do so. "It was an administrative nightmare," he said.

He would prefer to recover the costs through a yearly licensing fee that would go along with strict regulations on alarm users.

Halbrooks disagrees with those who have questioned using police personnel to answer privately installed and maintained alarm systems. Besides his contention that he and his employees have no law enforcement authority, he also states firmly that the few alarms in service are a help in combating burglaries.

"They (burglars) never know where the alarms are," said Halbrooks.

Swenor said he is authorizing only burglar alarms that are required by business- or home-owners' insurance providers, but Halbrooks said that has not been a deterrent to the growth of his business.

With the new system Halbrooks is installing, he'll no longer need Swenor's okay since his alarms will ring directly into the alarm company. There, a member of Halbrooks' staff can check to see if the ring was caused by operator error, the weather or some other cause.

If the alarm was apparently triggered by a would-be burglar, then the police will be called and dispatched to the scene.

"It should cut out 90 percent of the false alarms," said Halbrooks, who still contends that the presence of any alarms is beneficial to the community. He and his employees still will be removed from acting as law enforcement agents at the site of the burglar alarm.

"You're going to pay one way or another," said Halbrooks. "Everytime anybody gets hit it's upping everybody's rates," he added.

He also contends that costs to answer alarm calls are probably minimal when compared with long-term burglary investigations—many of which are never solved.

Halbrooks also said he knows of several instances where burglars apprehended because of burglar alarms were found to have been involved in many other burglaries as well. He said the alarms in those cases served the public by helping get those criminals off the streets.

Halbrooks said that one of his company's alarms was the primary reason a burglar was apprehended Monday in the Ruidoso Public Library.

"When money gets tight, burglaries go up," warned Halbrooks, who added that even with his new system he'll continue to work closely with village and county law enforcement agencies.

Zoning code is reviewed

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission put their review of a proposed zoning ordinance on hold after hitting a snag during a two-hour Monday workshop, said Paul Davis, village enforcement officer.

"They decided to take the best parts of the proposal and the best parts of the current ordinance and put them together," said Davis.

During an earlier workshop, the commission reviewed the first half of the 103-page document, but Monday they didn't get past page 65.

A major item of disagreement in the general building and performance requirement section of the proposal involved special requirements for anyone building on lots with average slopes of over 10 percent.

Commissioners wrestled with the question of controls and protecting the hillside environments versus costs and discouragement to builders and developers.

"You can't legislate everything," said commissioner Martin Rose.

"I think there's got to be some kind of controls," said Mike Callaghan, P&Z chairman.

Audience members Mike Mulholland and Tim Collins also had differing opinions on the proposal with Collins stating that the cost to meet requirements would be prohibitive for individuals building single-family homes.

"It might save somebody's house from falling down," Mulholland pointed out.

One section of the proposal that would limit the amount of developable space according to the average slope was discussed at length.

"You can't tell somebody they can't build," said Rose. "I think I'd take you to court real quick," he added.

Although another meeting date wasn't established, the group adjourned after deciding to combine parts of the current and the proposed ordinance, said Davis, who confirmed that accomplishment of a final zoning ordinance may now be delayed.

R.V. Rally and Celebrity Ski Race are planned

The advertising and promotion committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is planning a recreational vehicle (RV) rally and celebrity ski race as tourist attractions this spring. The committee discussed the projects at its meeting Tuesday.

Committee member Pat Breedlove said Spirit of Ruidoso, in conjunction with the chamber, Ruidoso Lodgers Association and other interested groups, hopes to sponsor a ski race between members of the Dallas Cowboys and Houston Oilers football teams.

The ski race is being planned for March. Breedlove said the project is pending final approval by ski area manager Roy Parker.

The "RV Jamboree" is tentatively scheduled for the first week of May. Chamber executive director John Jeffers said he is compiling a list of RV clubs. The list will be used when publicizing the event.

Committee member and campground manager Robert Boverie said an RV rally is feasible for Ruidoso, as there are several hundred spaces in the area.

Advertising committee chairman Bill Hirschfeld said that the Ruidoso brochures will be reprinted

soon. He advocated changing the cover to an all-season picture or montage.

Another committee under the promotion aspect of the chamber is the Southern New Mexico Film Commission development task force. The group, also led by Hirschfeld, had its second meeting Tuesday afternoon.

The purpose of Tuesday's meeting was to provide Jeffers with a list of questions and goals to discuss with Paul Lazarus, New Mexico film commissioner. Jeffers will see Lazarus at a chamber executives association meeting in Gallup this week.

Committee member Harvey Foster suggested that Jeffers ask Lazarus to help determine "the basics"—what the commission needs to form and how to attract film producers to the area.

Jeffers said he hoped to have Lazarus meet with the commission in Ruidoso soon. Jeffers told the group that he spoke with chamber executives in Artesia, Las Cruces and Roswell and has not received any negative responses to the formation of a commission.

Hirschfeld reported that the Ruidoso-Alamogordo area is still under consideration to be the location of an upcoming movie starring David Keith.

State Crime Stoppers will meet in Ruidoso

Ray Duran, director of state Crime Stoppers, announced last week that the state meeting planned for May 1986 will be in Ruidoso. Duran was a special guest at the regular meeting of Ruidoso Crime Stoppers.

Richard Sandoval, president of the local group, appointed Wilma Sandoval to coordinate the meeting which will draw as many as 200 people. Sessions will be conducted at the Quality Inn and Prime Time Restaurant, said Wilma Sandoval.

Members also discussed plans for the Ruidoso Crime Stoppers Third Annual Policeman of the Year Award. Tickets for the November 2 party planned at Prime Time Restaurant are available from Crime Stoppers for \$6.

Ruidoso Police reported that seven calls were received last month on the Crime Stoppers line. It was learned at the meeting that tips received are under investigation.

"Classy people aren't trashy" is the theme as the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce's cleanup and beautification committee ventures out to clean the town.

The committee falls under the jurisdiction of Sandy Dacy, vice president of community development. Dacy said the cleanup would take time and that she hoped it would become a continual, ongoing process.

"We feel we need to keep Ruidoso clean and have pride," said Dacy. As the town heads into ski season, the committee will try to bring this awareness to the public. Dacy said the committee will encourage service clubs to participate in the cleanup by taking on projects, even something as small as supplying trash bags. Representatives from each service club are invited to the clean-up committee's next meeting at 3 p.m. Tuesday, October 22, at the chamber office.

The committee also will visit the schools and educate students about the litter problem. Dacy said adults, as well as children, need to be aware, especially at sports activities.

"The adults are just as bad as the kids at the games," she said, of people throwing litter under stadium seats.

Dacy said the committee will bide its time, following projects to completion without taking on too many projects at one time. A big cleanup day is planned for the spring. One ongoing project involves the

pickup of large items (such as junk refrigerators) by the Village of Ruidoso. The village is divided into districts. For two days in a rotation, people in each district will be able to have large trash items removed.

The cycle will repeat itself continually when all the districts have been covered. District maps are posted at the post office. Dacy said that people may call the chamber or village hall to find out their district and ask for help if they have a problem hauling the objects to the curb.

Dacy also encourages people to call the chamber or village hall if they know of areas which need cleanup or areas of potential hazard.

Committee members include Paul Davis, Monica O'Reilly, Margie Hines, Bill Rawlins, Larry Tillman, Barbara Duff and Steve Sams.


O'Reilly said she feels strongly about the trash problem in Ruidoso. "People don't respect the world they live in. I almost despair," she said.



Warrior spikers lose thriller to Colts, to play Deming next

With every match it seems like Ruidoso High School's varsity volleyball team is getting closer to a win.

Take Tuesday's match with visiting Silver City, for example. The winless Warriors extended the Colts to five sets before losing the District 3-AAA match.

Ruidoso lost the first set, 15-8, after getting an 8-1 lead. The Warriors came back to win the second and fourth sets by impressive 15-3 scores.

However, Silver City won the third set, 15-10, and the final set,

15-6, for the match victory.

"Oh, it was definitely our best match of the season," said Warrior head coach Pixie Arthur after the long afternoon was over. "But inconsistency is still a problem."

"I think it's because our team is so immature and young volleyball-wise. We get a lead and we don't know how to deal with it. It seems when we win a set, we get tight."

Perhaps that was shown in Tuesday's match.

In the first set, Silver City scored 14 straight points to cancel an 8-1 Warrior edge.

After the Warriors won decisively in the second and fourth sets, they did not play as well in the third and

fifth sets.

Ruidoso dominated the second and fourth sets with probably the Warriors' best play this season.

The Warriors jumped off to a 4-0 lead in the second set and increased their edge to 10-2 before the Colts scored their final point.

Shannon Lee then served the winning points for the Warriors.

Silver City jumped off to an 9-0 lead in the third set, but the Warriors scored nine straight points to tie the score.

But the Colts then pulled away for the set victory.

Ruidoso took a 4-1 edge in the fourth set and increased the margin to 6-2.

After Silver City scored a point, the Warriors scored nine straight points for the set victory.

The final set saw Ruidoso take a 2-1 lead in the early going.

However, Silver City scored four unanswered points for a 5-2 lead and led the rest of the way.

"I thought Shannon Lee played well serving and she was our

leading attacker," Arthur remarked. "Kerry Gladden did a good job at the net."

Silver City defeated the Warriors in junior varsity action, 6-15, 15-12, 15-12.

Mikki Roller was the leading server for Ruidoso, serving 13 points in two sets.

"The team played good, but not

well enough to win," said Warrior junior varsity coach Jim Hofstad.

The Warrior junior varsity is now 4-5 on the season.

The Warriors will host Deming Saturday for varsity, junior varsity and C team matches. The C match will start at noon, followed by the junior varsity and varsity matches.

Improved runners aim for Lovington

Ruidoso High School's boys cross-country team hopes to continue improving when the Warriors compete in the Lovington Invitational Cross Country Meet Saturday, October 19.

Competition will start at 10 a.m.

The Warriors were idle last weekend, but competed in the Carlsbad Invitational two weeks ago.

The Braves' two victories have come over Dexter and Hagerman. Ruidoso's losses have been to Moriarty and Portales.




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

What's this? An open date on the Ruidoso High School football schedule this week.

That's the first time in the five seasons I've been here that Ruidoso has had an open date during the regular season.

The 7-0 Warriors will resume action Friday, October 25, at Cobre. The Indians have been unexpectedly tough this season. Cobre opened the District 3-AAA season last Friday with a 14-7 win over previously undefeated Deming.

However, just because the Warriors won't play this week doesn't mean they won't be busy.

Head coach Cooper Henderson and his assistants will have the players working on fundamentals to cut down on mistakes.

Last Friday the Warriors dumped Hot Springs, 35-0, in the district opener. Ruidoso scored all its points in the first half, but struggled offensively in the second half.

"We lost a little intensity in the second half, but I'll take the blame for that," Henderson said.

The Warriors have been impressive both offensively and defensively this season.

Ruidoso has scored 192 points and given up just 62 in seven games. More impressively, the Warriors have allowed only 12 points in the past four games, six to Portales and six to Tularosa.

Ruidoso has three of the state's statistical leaders in quarterback Russell Easter, split end Brian Davis and tailback Michael Williamson.

The Warriors have gained over 300 yards total offense in every game except the opener against Artesia (a 14-13 victory).

What makes the figures even more impressive is the fact that they came against some of the top AAA-division teams in the state.

Four of Ruidoso's seven victories were against teams from District 4-AAA, generally regarded as the toughest district in the state.

But the Warriors still have plenty of tough competition ahead of them.

Silver City is undefeated and the defending district champion. The Colts were supposed to be rebuilding this season, but apparently all the rebuilding has been completed.

Deming has only one loss (the defeat to Cobre) and has defeated some good teams this season.

So the last three weeks of the season still have some tough obstacles for the Warriors to overcome in their quest for a district championship.

Still, they've overcome a lot of tough obstacles already this season. Look for the Warriors to overcome the rest of them over the next four weeks.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats American Moon Fun in upset win

Everything was on the plus side on the opening day Saturday, October 12, at Sunland Park Race Track.

The opening day attendance of 3,945 was the highest season opening crowd since 1975, when 4,309 came through the gates. And the \$341,214 handle was the third highest for opening day in the 27-year history of the track.

The opening day attendance represented an 18.2 percent increase over last year's and the handle was up 2.85 percent.

Sunland opened its 1985-86 season with programs October 12 and 13. A total of 7,404 fans were in attendance over the weekend—a 15.3 percent increase over last season's opening weekend.

The two-day handle of \$635,624 was up a half percent over the 1984-85 opening weekend.

Trainer J. Doyal Roberts was keeping a close eye on the rain and the track before deciding to run Sunland's two-time Horse of the Meet Currirot in Saturday's Mr. Vale Handicap.

Roberts had already announced that the Mr. Vale would be Currirot's final outing for the remainder of the year because the horse was tired and was due for a rest. But after rains had soaked the track several days before the race, Roberts said he was considering scratching his horse from the handicap.

Currirot has been injured two times running in the mud and Roberts said the bay gelding "just doesn't like an off track." He said the horse's first injury on mud came two years ago in the Ruidoso Mile when Currirot took a bad step, pulling a shoe.

Following heavy rains early in the week, the skies cleared and the track began to dry on Friday. By first post on Saturday the condition was rated as fast and Roberts decided to keep Currirot in the field.

The eight-year-old track veteran showed his form in the race, entering the final stretch in third place and blowing past the leaders to win by four lengths.

Roberts said Currirot pulled up "pretty good" following the race and now is headed for a rest until spring at the Johnny Baines Horse Ranch, located a short distance from Sunland Park.

Sparkling Sands turned in the top qualifying time for the Shue Fly in two trials for that race on Saturday. The two-year-old gelding has quickly become the showcase horse in the stable of trainer Waldo Morgan. Once he was the only horse.

During most of the summer meet in Ruidoso, Morgan, who has been training only two years, had only two horses. He eventually was left with only Sparkling Sands when the stablemate was shipped off to race in Oklahoma.

But "Sandy," as the horse is affectionally called, turned in a sparkling performance to win the third consolation of the All-American Futurity. That win didn't go unnoticed and when Morgan came to Sunland, owners had signed the young trainer to handle a total of 23 horses, many of them youngsters who have yet to compete on the track.

Sparkling Sands covered his 400-yard trial division in 20.225 seconds. The remaining qualifiers include Star Kissin, 20.255; Rebel Blade, 20.414; Class Of The Class, 20.620; Cinderfellow, 20.625; Trucker Bar, 20.680; Little Bit Snaky, 20.685; Jetatta, 20.705; Scout N Easy, 20.710; and Jetaway Tinky, 20.760.

Jockey Elbert Minchey showed that a long-time track veteran can still bring in the winners, when he rode Racing Fols to victory in the 870-yard fifth race on Sunday's program.

Minchey is definitely the veteran's veteran in Sunland's jockey room, with racing credits dating to the 1950s including a start in the first All-American Futurity that was run in 1959. Out of the field of jockeys for the first futurity he is the only one still riding.

O.A. Martinez Jr., last season's leading rider at Sunland Park, booted in one win, two seconds and a third in eight starts on Saturday. He didn't ride on Sunday.

American Moon Fun broke alertly under jockey Jimmie Hunt to down a good field of quarter horses in the opening leg of the Savannah Swinger Series on Sunday at Sunland Park Race Track.

The victory was a major upset for the filly who went postward at nearly 16-to-1 odds behind overwhelming favorite American Speed in the 350-yard dash.

Hunt rocketed out of the starting gate aboard American Moon Fun to get a quick one-length jump on the field running out of the rail post. The Texas-bred miss was never challenged for the remainder of the journey.

She crossed the wire with a decisive margin. The final time was 17.60 seconds—a new stakes record for the 350-yard leg of the Savannah Series, which has been contested since 1979 at this Southern New Mexico Track.

American Moon Fun rewarded her few backers among the 3,459 fans on hand for the afternoon program with mutuels of \$33.80, \$9.40 and \$10.20.

It was the first win of the year for American Moon Fun, who is trained by Dan Howard for owners Claude Neeley and Billy Copeland of Strawn, Texas. Neeley and Copeland pocketed \$5,880 from the

\$9,800 Savannah purse.

Gallant Red Wing, voted Best Older Quarter Horse last season, finished second in the Savannah, returning \$4 and \$4.20. Rocket Jet Bug, a 30-to-1 shot, was third for \$13.20.

Sunland Park opened its 1985-86 season with programs Saturday and Sunday. The track's handle for the opening weekend totaled \$635,624—a half percent from last year. Sunland's attendance surged more than 15 percent above last year's opening weekend as 7,404 fans attended programs over the two racing days.

Mr. Vale Handicap grand finale for Currirot

Currirot, Sunland Park's champion horse for two years running, flashed his patented come-from-behind style to walk away with the Mr. Vale Handicap in Saturday's season opener at this Southern New Mexico track.

The eight-year-old son of Little Current went postward as the 1-5 choice of 3,945 fans on hand for the afternoon program, with Ask Muhammad second in the wagering (9-2) and Ima Flea third at more than 8-to-1.

The mile race opened with a surprising battle for the lead between

outsiders Knight At War and Tang Dynasty. Those two horses set all of the fractions through the first six furlongs, with Currirot making a strong move under jockey Casey Lambert in the final turn.

The race was in hand for Lambert as he caught the leaders at the top of the lane, drawing out to a widening four-length victory at the wire. The final time was 1:39 seconds.

Currirot returned \$2.40, \$2.60 and \$2.80. Tang Dynasty came on strong in the final furlong to outdistance Knight At War by two lengths. Tang Dynasty paid \$8.20 and \$4.40. Knight At War's show was worth \$5.20.

Currirot boosted his lifetime earnings to \$342,800 after pocketing \$7,080 from the \$11,800 purse for the Mr. Vale. Trainer Doyal Roberts had said before the race that the Mr. Vale would be Currirot's last race this year before being turned out for a well-deserved rest.

The Pennsylvania-bred horse has won seven of 14 starts this year,

finishing second or third in two of those races. His last victory came against allowance company at a mile in Albuquerque in mid-September.

Complementing Saturday's Mr. Vale Handicap were two trial divisions for the Shue Fly, an \$8000-added event for three-year-old and older quarter horses.

Sparkling Sands, winner of the third consolation of the All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs this summer, posted the top qualifying time of 20.225, seconds winning the first division.

The remaining qualifiers are: Star Kissin, Rebel Blade, Class Of The Class, Cinderfellow, Trucker Bar, Little Bit Snaky, Jetatta, Scout N Easy and Jetaway Tinky. The 10 horses will meet in the Shue Fly on Friday, October 25.

Racing resumes Sunday at Sunland Park as 10 of the region's top dashers meet in the opening leg of the Savannah Swinger Series. That 350-yard event carries an added purse of \$8,000.

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



Drinking driving is bad, no matter who the offender.

Illinois State Police arrested Chicago Bears football coach Mike Ditka early Monday and charged him with driving under the influence of alcohol, improper lane usage and speeding.

The arrest sparked a torrent of calls from angry Bears fans who felt that Ditka's arrest was unjust, apparently because the coach has brought Chicagoans an outstanding football team for the first time in more than 20 years.

But shouldn't the fans have instead thanked the arresting state trooper for saving Ditka from himself?

"If the officer had not done his job, Ditka may have been dead," a State Police spokesperson commented.

The problem of drinking and driving is a serious one. In New Mexico, recent statistics set alcohol as a contributing factor in 55 percent of our fatal accidents, and that figure could be as high as 70 percent.

We believe no matter who the offender, drinking and driving must not be tolerated.—DJP

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—You'd think they all work in separate boxes, with nobody ever talking to anybody else.

On one day, representatives of the administration sit down with legislators to talk realistically about the severe shortage of money available to support existing state government. Unless drastic steps are taken, we are warned, there is danger the state will slip into deficit spending of the sort forbidden by our constitution.

Yet less than 24 hours later, in that same room, before the same legislators, agency heads from that same administration parade by to "justify" expanding their particular portion of state government, which we have already been told we cannot afford in its unexpended form.

One, for instance, wants more money to buy a new dessert cabinet for his cafeteria—surely a critical expenditure. And word processors are very big this year; almost everyone wants new word-processing equipment.

For those who understood the previous day's testimony, it takes great patience to listen to discussions of spending ever greater sums from a bank account that is already overdrawn.

When legislative leaders left the Governor's office after getting the bad news about the state's bank accounts referred to above, only one of them had anything to boast about in the area of seeing that this bad state of affairs did not come to pass.

He is House Speaker Gene Samberson, who quietly pointed out that he pushed hard last regular session for a package of tax reforms that would have prevented some or all of the problems we are now facing.

His bill expired on the floor of the Senate in the waning hours of that session, while his conservative conferrers filibustered away the hours in a manner some of us thought notably irresponsible.

Sometimes it's hard to tell the good guys from the bad guys.

Governor Anaya has taken every opportunity recently to denounce the despicable Reagan administration in Washington for turning over more and more programs to the

states, instead of continuing to fund them at the federal level.

In one recent speech in which he made those charges, Anaya spoke later about the state's need to turn more and more of the programs the state presently funds to the counties and municipalities.

Apparently when Reagan does it, it's bad; but when Anaya does it, it's statesmanlike.

Vickie Fisher was wrong on this one.

When she was asked, in her capacity as Secretary of Taxation and Revenue, if that legal case about whether severance taxes may be charged firms doing business on Indian lands would contribute to our problems of money shortage, she replied in the negative.

It's clear, however, that those taxes, now being paid under protest, are not available to us to pay the everyday bills of government. If the state wins, there may be something of a "windfall" three or four years from now—but the fact is that we need them immediately. And of course if we don't win, we lose those bucks—big bucks—altogether.

When legislative committees are named, it is courteous to speak directly with those chosen to be members to be sure they find it possible to serve.

When that new Revenue Committee was named recently, etiquette got forgotten. The list of members was released to the public, but it subsequently had to be revised because some of those named could not afford the time to serve.

A few simple phone calls before the announcement would have avoided that kind of embarrassment.

At least once a year we use this space to protest the amount of time the Legislative Finance Committee spends in "executive session," with the public and reporters cooling their heels outside. Of 16 hours of time they were in session here last week, another correspondent observes, they were locked up in private for more than eight and a half hours.

Gary Scott: "I went against my instincts a bit in the last few weeks. I tried to call a few longshots and staggered a bit."

"But I'm still in good shape to overtake the so-called expert, 'California-biased' sportswriter. My best pick was Animas over Jal. My worst one probably was San Francisco over Chicago."

Rolland: "The challenge is there. But more than the challenge, the picks give people a chance to back particular teams that they like."

"I guess my best picks have been the Ruidoso games, since they've won them all. My worst picks have probably been for Houston (Rolland is a big Houston fan)."

As far as my own picks go, I immediately say that I've had so many good picks the numbers overwhelm me.

However, picking Jal over Animas (Animas won 47-0) didn't enhance my image as one of the master football experts of the century.

Still, with my 10-game lead over the fast-fading Scott, I think I'm in good shape.

Frankie and Darrell have picked up strongly in the past couple of weeks. Rolland has staggered a bit, but should come on strong.

I look to finish the season in first place with either Frankie or Darrell in second place, Rolland around the middle, and Scott bringing up the rear.

But regardless of who wins the season contest, it's still fun to pick football games.

So everybody watch our picks the rest of the season.

And remember. Keep turning in your own picks. It's fun and the money prize adds to the enjoyment.
