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Village sees reduced revenues

The Finance Board for the Village of Ruidoso Tuesday took the pencil to the city's budget in efforts to bring expenditures in line with revenues. The board is composed of the mayor and village councillors.

Jim Hine, village manager, reported that revenues during the first quarter of this fiscal year (July-September) fell far short of projections used when preparing the budget. Hine said estimates for first quarter gross receipts tax collections were \$227,503, but taxes actually collected amounted to just \$155,606.

Last month, in a meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council, Hine pointed out to councillors that the village usually collects the highest amount of gross receipts taxes during the first quarter.

Hine said property taxes are not received until January, since notices aren't usually sent out by the county until November. Any differences between estimates and income in property taxes won't be apparent until next (calendar) year.

He also told councillors that the village has experienced a "cash-flow" problem because the state has been late in remitting taxes that they collect.

"Why are we doing this?" asked Village Councillor Victor Alonso,

who also questioned why department heads were not included in the process.

Hine confirmed that he told department heads not to attend the

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Council refinances bond debt

The Ruidoso Village Council voted unanimously during a special meeting Tuesday to refinance the \$5,780,000 that is still outstanding on a \$6 million bond issue.

"Your savings are going to be a little better than we originally thought," said bonding agent Dar-

rel Fowler of Stern Brothers of Albuquerque. Councillors had been told in a council meeting that the bonds could be refinanced at a better rate than the one under which they were issued, but Fowler said they'll be issued at 9.55 percent, even better than his estimate of 9.73 percent.

The refinancing is designed to reduce payments and release funds

for water projects, and also to put the village in a better position to issue other bonds.

Besides reducing the yearly bond payments, Fowler explained that the reissue will release a portion of the required reserve fund, allowing the village to use \$200,000 of the \$900,000 now being held. The

Steel mill may be built near Carrizozo

The concept of bringing the processing plant to the natural resources may become reality when Zia Steel Corporation, a New Mexico cooperation, constructs a "mini" steel mill ten miles north of Carrizozo.

Norm Bishop, Zia representative in Carrizozo, said that the mini mill—the first in New Mexico—is presently in the testing and design phase. Actual construction is contingent on the Environmental Improvement Division's (EID) approval of permits based upon test results, Bishop said.

Bishop said that the iron ore to be used in the process and the coal which will be used for electricity production are tested for purity, especially sulfur content. The ore will be taken from the Jones Camp Iron Ore Mine located between Carrizozo and Socorro, and the coal will be shipped from Northern New Mexico. Local coal was found to have an excessive sulfur content, and so was not deemed to be economical.

Bishop said that the cost of using

sulfurous coal is often excessive due to the necessary "scrubbing" of the sulfur dioxide which is emitted when the material is burned as a fuel. He said that EID is very strict about air emissions and waste disposal, granting permits only after the project designers effectively address solutions to the problems. Bishop said that EID continues to monitor a plant's air quality after production begins.

Zia plans to locate the plant 10 miles north of Carrizozo at the old railroad site of Coyote. The actual plant will occupy 50 acres and will "look like a high-tech plant rather than a steel mill," Bishop said.

Bishop said the project is estimated to cost \$150 million and to take up to two years to complete. The construction phase, which Bishop said will be contracted to eligible companies, will employ more than 100 people. After completion, the plant will employ 200 to 300 people, Bishop said.

The plant is to be patterned after plants in arid countries such as Saudi Arabia and Iran, which utilize water conservation systems. The high cost of treating water to meet EID requirements also led to

the design of the closed circuit cooling system which the Carrizozo plant will utilize, Bishop said.

The disposal of waste materials also is an environmental factor. Slag the iron and carbon material which is much like a gray lava will be processed for paving since it contains no toxic materials, Bishop said. Sulfur dioxide from the scrubbers will be mixed with lime creating gypsum, which Zia plans to dispose of at the original iron mine.

Zia is working with Mannesman and Demog, a German steel plant design and manufacturing firm known world-wide. The plant will utilize advanced technology for producing steel with electricity—the electricity also being produced at the site.

Presently, Zia is conducting at feasibility studies and the acquisition of 325 acres of land. According to Bishop, the EID permits require at least 90 days for processing, including a published notice of intent by the corporation, inviting comment by the public.

Bishop stressed the corporation's concern of complying to the EID regulations. He said the company

could not afford to build the plant and then not be able to operate because of environmental problems.

Bishop said that Lincoln County officials have "responded positively" to the project. The plant will become the largest taxpayer in the county, Bishop said.

Bishop added that the plant potentially will put \$50 million into the New Mexico economy, with \$8 million paid as employee wages. Bishop said Carrizozo itself could benefit if the firm purchases water from the town.

Another benefit from the mill could be the decrease of scrap iron in the area. Bishop said the plant will produce steel which is 75 percent iron ore and 25 percent scrap. He said the iron ore is of such good quality it can be used with the scrap to produce top quality steel.

Bishop estimates that the project will not begin until the second quarter of 1986, providing there is no problem with EID approvals.

Bishop grinned when he said Zia hopes to compete with the Japanese for the California steel market, by making the product cheaper with the advanced steel process.

County water is unsafe

Public water supplies in Capitan, Nogal and Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School are not safe to drink, announced James W. Edwards, environmental supervisor with the Ruidoso office of the Environmental Improvement Division (EID).

"Because water from Bonito Lake is still very turbid (cloudy), some of the water supply systems which supply water from this source are unable to filter the water well enough to produce water which is considered safe to drink," said Edwards in an official news release Wednesday.

Edwards cautions users that water from the municipal systems listed should be boiled for 20 minutes before being used for drinking or cooking. He said water from some other safe source, such as bottled water, can be used.

Carrizozo's water is not included in the warnings because that city has switched over to supplemental wells, according to Edwards.

Coliform bacteria, numbers of which exceed the established limit,

were found in bacteriological samples collected by Edwards on October 16 in Capitan, according to the release. Results of tests on those samples were received in Ruidoso Wednesday, explained Edwards.

"The presence of coliform bacteria in drinking water indicates that harmful bacteria or other harmful organisms are present also," said Edwards.

The EID issued a "boil water order" last Thursday to the Village of Capitan, and according to Edwards, the new warning expands the order to Nogal and Fort Stanton Hospital. Edwards said information obtained by the EID this week indicates the turbidity of treated water supplied by these systems is also exceeding the established limit.

"This order will remain in effect until further notice," said Edwards.

Developer and village differ over building methods

All I want is my back yard fixed," said Darryl Crumbley of 118 Birch Drive, as he pointed out piles of rocks on his lot which is directly behind Ruidoso True Value Home Center. Crumbley and his wife, Ann, say they have waited nearly two years for the damage resulting from excavations during True Value's construction to be repaired.

Crumbley said some progress was "finally" made last Thursday when True Value developer Wayne Dacy, of (CSD, Inc.), had the ever-widening space between True Value's back wall and the Crumbley yard filled with rocky dirt. Although Crumbley was not happy with the large rocks, he said he was pleased to have the dangerous open space filled.

"By the end of August he (Dacy) said he'd have it done," said Crumbley, who said he got tired of waiting and recently asked Ruidoso building inspector Jimmy Neeley to file a complaint on his behalf with the Construction Industries Division (CID) of the State of New Mexico.

Harvey King, CID telephone officer, confirmed in a telephone interview Wednesday that he had received a complaint and a report. King said that when he gets a citizen's complaint, he must then obtain a report from a licensed building inspector.

He said he has both documents relating to Crumbley's allegations, and forwarded a copy of the complaint to Dacy on October 16. King said Dacy now has 20 days in which to answer the complaint.

"If I don't hear back from him pretty quick I'll just send it on down to the AG (New Mexico Attorney General)," said King, who added that a complaint filed in his office is "only hearsay until it is proven in a hearing."

Slopes and drainage are two problems mentioned in the complaint, according to King, who stated that other projects besides the True Value building are also on the complaint.

"They apparently kind of got ahead of some inspections, according to the complaint," said King.

Dacy said Wednesday that he and Crumbley met and agreed upon a solution to the erosion of the Birch Drive property. Dacy said he plans to finish the grading, complete a concrete gutter and fence along the property line, "probably in November, if the weather holds up."

Crumbley confirmed that he will

be "completely satisfied" when Dacy makes those adjustments. "I don't want to wait another two years, though," Crumbley added.

Dacy also said that he has received a copy of the complaint filed in Santa Fe against him, and has his attorney looking at it.

"Everything that they've complained about has been fixed," said Dacy, who added that he may file a formal complaint in response to the one entered against him.



"I'm probably going to file a complaint against the village and the building inspector," said Dacy.

King explained that the village building inspector will be expected to reinspect projects named in the complaint after the 20 days have

elapsed and report to CID whether the alleged problems still exist. If the inspector reports that all have not been corrected, then CID will send the reports on to the Attorney General.

King said the AG then will send the contractor against whom the complaint was filed a "notice of contemplated action" naming charges and specific code violations. The process then gives the person against whom the complaint was filed another 20 days to take action and/or request a formal hearing.

In the meantime, the Crumbleys reiterated their hope that their backyard soon will be back to normal.



Building is healthy this autumn

Although Ruidoso's tourist business is in its slower time now, the construction industry is keeping busy with new projects on Mechem and Sudderth drives.

The Ruidoso Financial Center, at 1094 Mechem Drive, will be the first four-story commercial office building in Ruidoso. Greg Masters, one of four general partners in the project, said construction of the building is on schedule and the steel super-structure will go up within a week. Four stories of steel will be in place by the middle of November.

Masters said the building is leasing well and will be ready for occupancy by June. In February and March, contractors will begin work on tenant specifications.

Included in the new complex will be the law offices of Mel O'Reilly and his associates, The Bank of Ruidoso, Territorial Abstract, John Barraclough (certified public ac-

countant) and associates, Thomson McKinnon Securities, Inc., and Sierra Securities. Other general partners are Gary Lynch, John Hall and Jace Ensor.

Masters said the building will include a cluster of spaces where people may rent office space which includes secretarial and other services.

Insurance agent Greg Carey will move his State Farm office to a new building presently under construction at 510 Mechem Drive (near Minit Mart). Carey's building is two stories high. He said his office will take up half of the top floor and he will rent the rest of that floor as office space. Carey said the bottom floor will house shops. Carey estimated the building's completion to be around December 15.


Ruidoso Paint Center, at 1308 Sudderth Drive, is adding a warehouse to its store. Owner Jerry Holder reported that the new warehouse should be complete within 30 days.

Arby's, a national chain of roast beef restaurants, will open a Ruidoso location before Christmas, said building project manager Virgil Lucius. The restaurant will be at 637 Sudderth Drive (former location of Round Up Realty).

Construction is well under way at Wal-Mart on Highway 70. A spokesperson from the discount store's main office in Arkansas said the store should open sometime after the first of the new year, possibly in February or March.

Next to Wal-Mart will be a Safeway store, a Firestone Tire Center and other shops. Floyd Rogers, manager of the new Firestone (temporarily located at 100 Highway 70 East), said he expects the new building to be finished by mid-December and open for operation by January 1, 1986.

Lloyd Fannon, manager of the Safeway store on Mechem Drive, said an exact date for the opening of the new Safeway is not yet known. He said it will be sometime in 1986.

to be located near Wal-Mart, is expected to be open by January. A Safeway store is also planned to open sometime next year.

Forest Service says no second ski area is planned

Talk of the formation of a new ski area on Buck Mountain has been circulating around town, but U.S. Forest Service district ranger Steve Sams reported that there is "no consideration whatsoever" of a new ski area here.

But one businessman said he may pursue development of a new ski area and Forest Service officials in Cloudcroft reported the possibility

of another ski area there.

Lincoln National Forest covers much of the Sacramento Mountains, and most of Ski Apache ski resort is on National Forest land. Sams said a proposed expansion of Ski Apache is included in a land management plan. The proposed expansion would encompass the Rio Bonito side of the mountain, which Sams said will provide expert skiing with a north exposure and good fall lines.

Fred Dantonio, developer of Ran-

cho Ruidoso Village, said that his and other corporations are looking into the possibility of creating a Buck Mountain ski area if the proposed Swiss railroad is built. Dantonio said his corporation has a "vested interest" in the railroad and has contributed funds and guaranteed payment to Unified Industries for the railroad feasibility study to be completed by December.


Dantonio opined that a ski area on Buck Mountain would complement Ski Apache and provide more

ski runs in the Ruidoso area. Buck Mountain is about a mile northeast of Ski Apache.


Sams said the mountains are on public land and the only ski development under consideration is the addition to Ski Apache.

"Mr. Dantonio is blowing smoke," said Sams.

Sams reported that the Cloudcroft Ranger District is studying the possibility of a new ski area there, but no new ski resort for this area is in the offing.

meeting. He told Alonso that it was his intention to report on the financial state of the village on a quarterly basis, rather than waiting until the end of the year.

The group heard and discussed Hine's suggestions on where cuts could be made in each department, and instructed him to discuss the changes with the appropriate department heads.

Richard A. Swenor, chief of the Ruidoso Police Department, was on hand for the meeting. He asked for input into any line-item changes in the \$747,068 police department budget.

Swenor, who said he didn't know that he wasn't supposed to attend the meeting, told the Finance Board that his budget had already been cut significantly.

Hine recommended a total of \$8,500 in line-item cuts for the police department, including a \$2,000 decrease for travel and schools.

"We can live with a cut," said Swenor. "But training and certification is at bare bones minimum," he added.

"If you don't cut me anymore, I'll make this budget work," said Jim Alston, deputy chief. "If necessary I can park cars, but I cannot work without trained people," he added.

Village Councillor Bill Karn recommended cutting an additional \$500 from travel and schools in the administrative section of the budget, so that the police department's decrease could be just \$8,000. His recommendation, added to Hine's, would reduce traveling funds for village administrators and officials by \$2,800.

That line item was originally set at \$10,500, and over \$3,000 has already been used.

Swenor presented recommendations for cuts in several areas, but asked to retain his entire travel and schools line item.

"I like the way this was handled," said Village Councillor William A. "Dub" Holt. "They (police) were willing to rob Peter to pay Paul," he added.

Hine said new federal laws that require the village to pay overtime to members of the Fire Department who serve around the clock will necessitate some budgetary shifts within that department. He reported that Fire Department overtime payments from April 15 through October 15 amounted to \$16,513.

Although no cuts were suggested in the Fire Department, Hine said he was working closely with Fire Chief Virgil Reynolds on ways to maintain current levels of fire protection without continuing to pay large amounts of overtime.

The Finance Board waded through the Street Department budget, complaining that contract work for the state and county isn't adequately tracked in the budget. Several line items in the Street Department appeared to have been grossly overspent.

"Transfers have not been made from contractual road work to the general fund," said Frank Potter, assistant village manager.

"All it is is an accounting problem," he added.

"I disagree," said Village Councillor Rick Evans. "I see it more as a control of the department deal ... for some reason these line items are out of control," he added.

Hine suggested a total of \$22,200 in cuts to the Street Department, as board members continued to express dissatisfaction with the state of the budget.

Budget changes for the swimming pool portion of the Parks and Recreation Department and for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport were deferred with the Finance Board indicating a desire to have those two department heads appear for discussions on their budgets.

Hine recommended that a line item for shop tools, included in several departments, be cut from each.

\$700,000 left in reserve will be adequate until 1994, said Fowler.

He said that by the end of 1994, Ruidoso will have to add about \$50,000 to the fund.

"These are special obligation bonds," said Fowler. He said the only village funds obligated are those collected through the supplemental gross receipts tax of one cent on the dollar.

That tax will expire when the total bond issue is repaid in about 17 years, said Fowler.

Fowler presented a detailed explanation of the ordinance that he had drafted for the council's approval, and the councillors accepted his recommendations with few questions.

Sunwest Trust Company of Albuquerque, a correspondent bank of Ruidoso State Bank, was adopted as the escrow, paying and transfer agent for the bond issue, upon Fowler's recommendation. United New Mexico Bank, correspondent bank to Bank of Ruidoso, also submitted a bid.

Both banks, whose bids were very

close, met the requirements of having a local correspondent bank and being federally insured, but Fowler said that Sunwest has more experience.

Village Councillor Bill Karn noted that the total difference in bids over the 17-year payback period was about \$100.

Fowler said he'll present a general obligation bond proposal Tuesday, during the council's regular meeting.

Councillors also unanimously approved an ordinance allowing the village to apply for a water improvement grant to finance a five million gallon water tank in Black Forest Subdivision.

Village Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter reported that the governing body will be asked Tuesday to take action on recommendations from the Annexation Policy Committee. He asked the council to dissolve his committee, and they approved his request.

Before the council went to work in its other capacity as Ruidoso's Finance Board (see other story), Hine reported receiving the fiscal year audit report.

Campaign urges local shopping

Ruidoso businessman Dan Kelley thinks everyone should "get smart" and shop in Ruidoso. To encourage local shopping, Kelley has created the "Get S.M.A.R.T." program which he will propose to business organizations next week.

S.M.A.R.T. stands for "Shop Merchants-Around Ruidoso Today." Kelley, proprietor of Kelley's restaurant in the Sierra Mall, said the idea came about from discussions he has had with his customers who are businesspeople and shoppers.

According to Kelley, the goal of the campaign is to change local people's attitudes about shopping in Ruidoso. Kelley said that many people shop out of town when the items they need may be purchased locally, at prices comparable to those at city stores. He said that local shopping saves Ruidosoans time, money and gasoline.

Kelley said that spending money in Ruidoso creates a larger return than most people realize. The dollar "turns over" six or seven times, so every dollar spent locally is spent again six or seven times throughout the area.

Most Ruidoso merchants are local, so money spent here stays in the area, said Kelley. He said he felt that a large variety of shopping is available from Alto to Ruidoso Downs.

"We need to create a community spirit that we're proud to shop and live here," said Kelley, adding that the town should stick together through tough times.

The program will encourage shoppers to check around town to see if what they need is available here, before shopping somewhere else. Kelley said that merchants have told him that people shop out of town without comparing local prices.

Toni Varnadore, owner of Mountain Laundry, said that her home town of Plano, Texas, has a local shopping campaign. Called "S.P.I.F.F.Y." the program urges shoppers to "Shop Plano, It's Fun For You."

Varnadore said she saw a S.P.I.F.F.Y. sign when she was shopping with her mother in Plano recently. She said the sign made her realize that she should be shopping at home in Ruidoso, and inspired her to develop the "Get S.M.A.R.T." campaign with Dan Kelley.

Kelley will present the idea to Spirit of Ruidoso at its Monday meeting and to the board of directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce at its meeting Wednesday. He said he has had positive feedback from local businesspeople with whom he has discussed the idea.

Kelley said the program would provide immediate results with minimal costs. Merchants would be invited to participate by purchasing a package which Kelley estimates will cost \$10. The package will include a poster and bumper sticker. Kelley said that merchants would benefit from any "Get S.M.A.R.T." advertisements or publicity.

The campaign is scheduled to begin November 1 and run through the Christmas season. Kelley said he hoped the campaign would continue six or nine months, long enough to engrain the theme in the minds of local shoppers.

"We need to eliminate the concept that Ruidoso is strictly a tourist town. Merchants depend on local trade," said Kelley.


"People say they go to Roswell or Las Cruces for a Christmas-shopping weekend. We need to get them to look here first," said Kelley.

Kelley said he hoped the program also would make merchants more aware of the needs of local clientele.

Warrior gridgers hope to end surprising Indians' hopes

Last year, Ruidoso High School had one of the surprise teams in the state's AAA-division football ranks. But this year the unbeaten Warriors are an established powerhouse. Friday night, October 25, they will be meeting one of this year's surprise teams when they travel to Cobre for a 7:30 District 3-AAA game.

The Indians are 6-1 on the season and have already beaten Deming (14-7) and Hot Springs (21-9) in district action.

The top-ranked Warriors (7-0 overall) had an open date last week, but began the district season two weeks ago with a 35-0 win over Hot Springs.

Ruidoso beat Cobre 44-6 last season, with an excellent offensive and defensive effort.

But this year's game could be closer.

"What we need is to establish ball control on offense and keep playing as we have on defense," Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson said.

"We haven't really had that much ball control in the past few weeks. It's nice to make the big play, but we also need to get ball control."

Cobre has good size in the offen-

sive and defensive lines, particularly the former where 6-3, 250-pound Gary Holquien is at tackle.

"The team is more together this year," said Cobre head coach Jerry Reyes. "This is my second year as coach and we're working together well."

Cobre runs out of a wishbone offense and probably will play a 4-4-3 defense. The defense features four down linemen, four linebackers and three defensive backs.

"As of right now, I think we've done better on offense than on defense," Reyes remarked.

But most of the Indian players go both ways. This is in contrast to the Warriors who only have two players scheduled to play both

ways Friday night.

Ruidoso has scored 193 points and given up just 62 on the season. The Warriors have only allowed 12 points in the past four games.

However, the Warriors will be missing two offensive starters for the Cobre game. Guard James Herrera and tackle Jimmy Frost are out with injuries.

Kyle Jameson will take Herrera's place and Jason Hill will take Frost's place.

The Warrior's offense will again key on quarterback Russell Easter's passing and running, plus the running of Michael Williamson and the receiving of Brian Davis.

All three athletes rank among the state offensive leaders.

Defensively, Ruidoso has received an all-around effort.

All-district safety Jeff Willingham has intercepted four passes to lead Ruidoso in that category.

The Warriors have also been tough against the run, with linebackers Jeff Maxwell, Chuck Daniels and Bobby Dickinson forming a tough group.

be facing a Hot Springs team that probably is among the two or three best AAA-division teams in the state.


"I don't think they're quite as good as last year," Arthur said. "But they're still tough. They belted Silver City."

P&Z approves Mechem restaurant plans

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday approved all six agenda items and appointed Mary Underwood to the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission during a regular meeting.

A lengthy discussion preceded approval of change of use and commercial addition plans for a fast-food hamburger restaurant on Lot 2, Block 11A, Cree Meadows Country Club for J.D. Crawford.

"This board doesn't necessarily feel that this is the highest and best use for this property," said commissioner Martin Rose, after hearing contractor Jay Goodman describe plans to remodel an existing house to serve as a Maid-Rite franchise restaurant.

"You can't deny people the right to use their land," said Rose, after the members of the body voiced concern over traffic, drainage, choice of use for the property and extreme development on the lot.

"I'm not aware of anything in C-1 (light commercial) zoning that says we can't develop the whole thing," said Tim Collins, speaking for the development. Collins told commissioners that the drainage plan had been submitted to both Boyle Engineering and the village engineer.

Goodman said the developer is willing to forego plans for a drive-in window in order to alleviate some of the traffic problems that might occur at the site, which is directly

across the street from the Mechem Drive 7-11's driveway.

P&Z members voiced concern over trees and green space, and Collins said plans include saving three trees.

Rose presented a motion to deny the request on the grounds that it would cause a "terrible" traffic problem, but the motion died for lack of a second. His subsequent motion to approve the plans without a drive-up window was unanimously adopted.

Commissioner David Smith, voting along with his co-commissioners in favor of the request, said he felt that it was an "unfortunate decision to use this piece of property for that use."

Two citizens on hand for the meeting asked to be added to the agenda, with one request being denied and the other approved. The denial was of what would have been a request for a lot line variance to build a garage on a lot on Timberline Drive in Mountain View Estates.

Commissioners instructed the requestor to follow the prescribed procedures and submit required paperwork to be included on the next meeting's agenda.

Mannie Badillo's appeal on an administrative denial on his request for additional signage at the former location of Mannie's Toggery on

Sudderth Drive was considered after regular items.

Although the present sign is about twice as large as the sign ordinance allows, it was included in a grandfather clause that allowed signs that were in place when the ordinance was passed to remain as long as its use didn't change.

Badillo, who said the sign cost about \$2,000 when he purchased it 20 years ago, said he has plans to rent the Mannie's building to a video rental business, and would like to allow the business to repaint the sign and leave it atop the building. He added that he will extend the false front on top of the building to the top of the sign, increasing the amount of signage allowed.

Commissioners voted unanimously to refer the matter back to Paul Davis, village enforcement officer, authorizing him to allow excess signage as long as the coverage is five square feet or less.

In other business, the commission:

—Granted a seven-foot west side lot variance on Lot 11, Block 6, Juniper Hills Subdivision, as requested by Scott Miller for James Miller. P&Z stipulated that the deck, which extends into the side setbacks, never be enclosed.

—Approved development plans for swimming pool and recreation

area at Granite Heights Condominiums as requested by Tim Collins for John F. Mobley.

—Approved a request to replat lots 9 and 10, Mountain Shadows Subdivision, for Donald M. Simms.

—Approved development plans on Phase 2 of Jira Plaza for Bob Alexander. Alexander reported that work will begin in about 30 days on the extra lane the state Highway Department has required him to furnish on Highway 37 beside Jira Plaza.

—Granted an 11.88-foot rear lot line variance on Lot 22, Block 4, Highwood Addition, for Franklin Ebeling as requested by Don Harmon. Although the original request was for a side lot line variance, Davis said that according to a village ordinance which states that on corner lots the shorter line is designated as the rear, the line in the request is a rear line.

—Heard Davis remind Ken Carr that he is the designated P&Z representative at next Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

—Established two committees to continue reviewing BRW zoning ordinance and map proposals, and agreed to hear reports from those groups at the next regular P&Z meeting.

Absent from Monday's meeting were chairman Mike Callaghan and commissioner Don Shaw.





Ruidoso Downs to get paved roads

Six Ruidoso Downs streets will be paved by next summer, according to Downs officials. Village clerk Wilma Webb reported that representatives of the state Highway Department met with village officials and engineer Barrratt Atkins recently.

More than \$300,000 will be spent on paving the roads. The Downs received a \$154,000 grant from the New Mexico Community Assistance (NMCA) program. The NMCA money will be matched by

the state Highway Department in a \$150,000 cooperative agreement.

Roads to be paved are East Spring Avenue, from Highway 70 to Juniper Road; First Street, from Highway 70 to Turkey Canyon Road; West Avenue, from Highway 70 to D Street; Reservoir Street, from Entrance Road to A Street; Second Street, from Highway 70 to Turkey Canyon; and Entrance Road, from Reservoir Street to Turkey Canyon.

Preliminary plans for construc-

tion are under way. The work will include widening the roadway where necessary, adding base course, applying hot mix and installing curbs and gutters to the various streets in the Downs.

Final plans will be completed by December and bids will be advertised in January. The construction contract is scheduled to be awarded on February 1, 1986.

Roadwork is scheduled to take place in the spring. Construction must be completed by July 1, said Webb.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF RUIDOSO SUPPLEMENTAL GROSS RECEIPTS TAX REVENUE REFUNDING BONDS, SERIES NOVEMBER 25, 1985, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$5,700,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF REPAYING, REFUNDING AND PAYING THE MUNICIPALITY'S SUPPLEMENTAL GROSS RECEIPTS TAX REVENUE BONDS, SERIES JULY 1, 1983, TO BE OUTSTANDING IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$5,700,000, PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSITION OF THE RECEIPTS DERIVED FROM SUPPLEMENTAL GROSS RECEIPTS TAX PROCEEDS; PRESCRIBING OTHER DETAILS CONCERNING SAID BONDS AND SAID TAX PROCEEDS INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO COVENANTS AND AGREEMENTS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH AND THE FORM, TERMS, CONDITIONS, AND MANNER OF EXECUTION OF THE SAID BONDS; RATIFYING ACTION PREVIOUSLY TAKEN IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

The preamble recite the imposition of a supplemental gross receipts tax revenue on the gross receipts from business within the Municipality with certain exemptions and deductions reported to the State of New Mexico from which an amount equal to one (1%) percent is remitted to the Municipality monthly; the prior issuance of Supplemental Gross Receipts Tax Revenue Bonds, Series July 1, 1983, payable from the supplemental gross receipts tax revenues received by the Municipality; and the Governing Body's determination to refund such bonds by the issuance of Supplemental Gross Receipts Tax Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series November 25, 1985, in the amount of \$5,700,000; reciting the benefits that inure to the Municipality and accepting the proposal of certain investment bankers to purchase said bonds.

The ordaining clause is set forth.
Section 1. Section 1 sets forth terms and definitions used in the Ordinance.
Section 2. Section 2 ratifies previous action taken by the Municipality.
Section 3. Section 3 authorizes the refunding of the July 1, 1983 Bonds by the issuance of 1985 Refunding Bonds.
Section 4. Section 4 authorizes the November 25, 1985 Supplemental Gross Receipts Tax Revenue Refunding Bonds in the principal amount of \$5,700,000, prescribes the details of the bonds as to the denomination, date of issuance, date of maturity, interest rate and payment dates.
Section 5. Section 5 provides for no prior redemption of the Bonds.
Section 6. Section 6 provides for actions to be taken under the bond insurance policy.
Section 7. Section 7 provides for the execution of the Bonds.
Section 8. Section 8 provides that the Bonds are special obligations payable only from the special funds set aside for their payment.
Section 9. Section 9 sets forth the form of the Bonds.
Section 10. Section 10(A) provides for the registration and the transfer of the bonds. Section 10(B) provides for lost, stolen, destroyed and mutilated Bonds.
Section 11. Section 11 provides for the Authentication Certificate of the Registrar.
Section 12. Section 12 provides for the delivery of the Bonds and the funding of an escrow fund with the proceeds thereof to refund and pay the July 1, 1983 Bonds.
Section 13. Section 13 creates the Supplemental Gross Receipts Tax Income and Reserve Fund.
Section 14. Section 14 provides for the details of the Income Fund including administration of the Supplemental Gross Receipts Tax Income Fund, including the creation of the Bond Fund the payment of Bonds and interest thereon from the Bond Fund, determination of deposits in such fund, the defraying of delinquencies in such fund, payments into the Reserve Fund, the payment of additional obligations, and the use of surplus revenues.
Section 15. Section 15 provides for the general administration of the escrow fund and the income fund, including the deposit of funds and the investment of money in such funds.
Section 16. Section 16 provides that the 1985 Refunding Bonds shall be an exclusive lien on the pledged revenues.
Section 17. Section 17 provides the manner of and restrictions upon the issuance of additional obligations payable from the same fund.
Section 18. Section 18 provides for refunding of the Bonds.
Section 19. Section 19 provides that all the 1985 Bonds issued pursuant to the Ordinance are of equal lien.
Section 20. Section 20 provides protective covenants for the protection of registered owners relating to payment of the Bonds, the keeping of records, the making of audits, the extending of interest payments, the proper performance of duties, the existence of other liens, the existence of the municipality, the duties to impose the tax, and the impairment of contract.
Section 21. Section 21 provides for the defeasance of the Bonds.

Special Hank overcame a 123-pound load to run away with Sunland Park's featured Don Lewis Memorial Handicap on Sunday. The victory marked the sixth straight win for the burly eight-year-old gelding.

Backed down to the 9-5 favorite for the 12th running of the Don Lewis, Special Hank pulled out all of the stops for the 5 1/2-furlong sprint racing through fractions of :22, :44.4, :57.2, and finally crossing the wire in 1:04 2—a seasonal best for the distance.

The winner was stalked around the stretch turn by 6-1 Bourbon And Blues and 5-1 Be My Partner, who took the lead for a few strides heading to the top of the lane.

Jockey Salustio Burgos sent Special Hank into high gear at the head of the stretch, drawing away from both horses easily to post a 2 1/2-length win. The Don Lewis offered a gross purse of \$12,475. Special Hank's victory was worth \$7,485 for owner Lowell Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas. The win boosted his lifetime bankroll to \$70,545.

The winner returned mutuels of \$5.60, \$3.80 and \$3.

Glover D., dismissed at 7-1 by 3,293 on hand for the afternoon program, made a strong move in the final hundred yards to shorten Special Hank's winning margin and collect runner-up money of \$2,744. It was a good finish for Glover D. who overcame a difficult outside post position under rider Richard Bickel. Glover D. paid \$5.80 and \$5.20.

The Don Lewis was a gold mine for trainer Doyal Roberts Sr., who conditions both Special Hank and Glover D. Roberts also sent out Currirot last week to win Sunland's season opener—the Mr. Vale Handicap.

Reverend Blu Jeans, who was making his second start in stakes company this year, surprised many by finishing back of Glover D. to pocket \$1,497 for third. Elbert Minchey was aboard Reverend Blu Jeans to return \$7.40.

Thrills and spills for fans Saturday

There was plenty of action at Sunland Park Race Track Saturday as one lucky fan collected \$25,640 on

a one-dollar trifecta bet, while "Harry The Hat" cashed in using a system for the Pic-Six events and jockey Larry Byers lost all chances, tumbling from his mount in the feature race.

Both of Sunland's trifecta races on Saturday resulted in five-figure payoffs. In the nightcap, 21-1 longshot Bobo's Prince led two other outside horses across the wire for a \$25,640 payoff. Only one dollar was bet on the winning combination.

The track's eighth-race trifecta soared to a \$13,447 payoff when the second wagering favorite Take No Prisoners was followed by Tweeberdee (52-1) and Relato (24-1).

In the day's Pic-Six events, Albuquerque handicapper "Harry The Hat" used a home-bred system to peg the winners of the fifth through tenth races, collecting \$946 on a \$32 investment.

"I used a system developed by Bill Previtti in Albuquerque," Harry revealed, requesting that his real name not be used. "They all know me in Albuquerque," he said. "Bill and I do a radio show together on KDEF."

Previtti is well-known in Southwest racing circles from his association with the State Fair Meet at Albuquerque and his han-

dicapping publication "Betting The Pic-Six."

Jockey Larry Byers was knocked out of contention in Saturday's 400-yard main event when Easy Pass Request, the 6-5 favorite to win the dash, stumbled to the ground out of the gate, roughly unseating Byers.

"She grabbed a quarter and just fell," Byers said, referring to Easy Pass Request's nose-dive out of the gate. "It's just hard to stay on them when they're upside down," the veteran rider added. Byers was not injured in the spill.

Classic Quickie takes Friday feature

Alan Antwell's Classic Quickie pressed the pace throughout Friday's mile-long feature race at Sunland Park, moving strongly in the final furlong to overtake wagering favorite Addendum with a half-length margin at the wire.

The main event figured to be a mild upset as 7-1 Hesa Flea led the

field through swift fractions around both turns and to the top of the lane. Classic Quickie and Addendum stalked the leader through the backside and into the stretch, when Hesa Flea finally succumbed to the quick early pace in the final furlong.

The winner's share came down to a stride-for-stride battle between Classic Quickie and Addendum as those two were neck and neck in the final 100 yards. Classic Quickie had the most kicks at the finish to win by a half-length in 1:40 seconds.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

Saturday was a red-letter day for big trifecta payoffs. The 12th race provided the top mutual reward for the season when one handicapper bet one dollar on Bobo's Prince, Damberod and Justa Dumping to finish first, second and third. They did and the lucky fan held the only winning trifecta combination to collect \$25,640. In the eighth race, there were four tickets picking Take No Prisoners, Tweeberdee and Relato. The payoff was \$13,447.60.

Easy Pass Request went into the gate for Saturday's 400-yard allowance feature race as the favorite. Unfortunately, he left jockey Larry Byers behind when the gates opened. The horse stumbled badly at the start, throwing Byers out of saddle. The veteran jockey, who was not injured in the spill, said Easy Pass Request "grabbed a quarter and just fell. And it's hard to stay on them when they are upside down."

It should be an interesting showdown when Cesar T. and

Clarendon Star meet in the finals of the \$37,000 Thoroughbred Sale Futurity on November 3. Both had impressive wins in their respective trial heats for the race on Friday, October 18. Cesar T. wasn't challenged as he breezed to a 6 1/2-length win. Clarendon Star was also winning in convincing fashion before Son To The King rallied late in the stretch. He won by one and one-quarter lengths.

Trainer Kenneth Grisham was the bettors delight on Saturday when his two charges Pleasures Hempen and First Akbar accounted for the daily double by winning the first and second races, respectively. The payoff was \$28.00. In the 12th race Bound To Stop took first to give Grisham's trainees three wins for the day. In eight starts in the three days of racing, Grisham had four winners to earn Trainer of the Week honors and a tie with Cliff Lambert Sr. and Richard Fry atop the trainer standings. All three have four winners.

Jimmie Hunt rode four winners

over the weekend to take the lead in the jockey standings, edging past last week's leader Eugene O'Neill. He has seven wins, while O'Neill has six. In 12 starts over the weekend, Hunt had four firsts, three seconds and two thirds.

Missing from the jockey standings is Kevin Cogburn. But that doesn't mean he hasn't been lighting the board with regularity. In 26 starts this season he has eight second-place finishes to go along with one first and one third.

Sunland Park will be simulcasting the first four races in the upcoming Breeders' Cup on November 2. The Breeders' Cup Juvenile kicks off the program at 10:45 a.m., followed by the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies, the Sprint and the Mile. Each offers a \$1 million purse. Win, place, show and quinela wagering will be offered on the series.

Sunland will follow the simulcast with a 10-race live program that gets under way at 12:40 p.m.

Old Rugged Cross" and "The Little Brown Church in the Vale."
 Terry concluded the services by reciting Robert Louis Stevenson's epitaph, written by himself, entitled "Requiem."

 It was good to see at the services many contractors and heavy equipment representatives who were long time friends of Floyd.

Floyd Dicus Haake was born May twenty-two, 1904, in Griswold, Iowa, to Walter S. Haake and the former Lyda Nancy Dicus. He grew up on the farm and worked his way through Iowa State University, gaining a degree in engineering. However tuberculosis caused him to return home where he recovered under the devoted care of his mother.

In 1926 he and a friend landed in New Mexico after several adventures in a Model T Ford and Floyd went to work for the New Mexico Highway Department. The next year he was stricken with infantile paralysis which impaired the use of his legs.

After sixteen years in the Highway Department Floyd struck out on his own as a highway contractor and established an outstanding record. He built many of the local highways, including the widening project through Ruidoso, and the airport runway.

They say the Lord places heavy burdens upon the shoulders of the strong. And yet for every adversity, he has received one hundred blessings: his adoring parents; his devoted wife, Helga; his loving children; and the respect and admiration of his fellow man.

Floyd was a great sports fan, and had always longed to be an athlete. Often as we watched athletic events together on TV he would express

these youthful yearnings. I reminded him of his many accomplishments in "the great game of life," in which he was truly a "super star."

Besides Terry and Helga, Floyd is survived by a daughter, Nancy Jane Crownover. Also four grandchildren: Jack Gabriel Haake, Heather Alice Haake, Beau Daniel Haake and Melvin Lee Crownover. Also two sisters, Melba Pierson of Albuquerque, and Adelida Northop, of Tucson, Arizona.

We all rejoice that Floyd has gone to meet loved ones, with Our Lord in Heaven.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Who cares about higher education?

The Board of Educational Finance, established to act as middleman between the state's universities and the Legislature, failed to get a quorum for its meeting in Roswell last week. That's the second time in recent months such a failure has occurred, though the board has gone almost half a year without even calling an assemblage.

That apparent lack of interest on the part of board members, most of them named after the Governor cleaned house of those serving when he took office, inconveniences the dozens upon dozens of representatives from the higher education community who make a trip to attend in the belief some official action is likely to take place.

Some Santa Fe Democrats are working on layouts for a new bumper sticker that almost says it all. It goes like this: "We got Toney, you got Les."

Does it make sense to impose a tax that raises \$120 million a year and give back \$90 million of it?

That's roughly the condition of our state's income tax. It's far from stiff to begin with—so much so that many observers have felt we ought either to stiffen it up or do away with it altogether. It became even more meaningless when it was chosen as the vehicle for delivering a rough sort of equity to citizens by using it to provide low-income rebates. It is also the medium by which the state chose to reimburse its citizens for taxes paid at point of sale for groceries, drugs and other necessities.

Now that the state finds itself definitely cash-short, it is increasingly certain that some changes will be made in those previous arrangements.

Even the least logical of commentators knows that those lawmakers who preach the loudest about economy in government ought to demonstrate the sincerity of their belief in action.

The present crop of such preachers-from-the-rooftops don't do that very well, as is evident from an examination of the out-of-state travel at our expense that has been authorized for selected lawmakers by the Legislative Council, a body which is strongly in possession of those who most dramatically wring their hands over "waste in government."

True bureaucrats can build empires anywhere.

In Washington, we have 2,000 employees, working on an annual budget of \$200 million, just to take care of the details of our national debt.

That's like hiring all those people to watch a hole in the ground get bigger.

Educators (God bless their little hearts!) have made a startling discovery: Kids learn best in the classroom.

As is the fashion these days, they have even given this wild theory (which most of us have known for generations, without scientifically established basis for our knowledge) a catchy title. They call it "Time on Task."

Wow, what an insight! You mean the more time a kid spends actually studying, the more he or she learns? Revolutionary!

So what happens when the Santa Fe public school system tries to put that startlingly new realization into practice by cutting out all-day trips to the ski slopes in elementary and junior high schools? Some of the parents rise up in wrath. It seems they don't care much whether their youngsters learn those dusty old things that come out of textbooks. They want them to be turned into socially acceptable Yuppies, which they clearly won't become if they don't know how to schuss.

Doesn't it make you wonder just a little about our sense of values?

Those preparing the show for the annual Gridiron Dinner of the Albuquerque Press Club next Saturday are having trouble.

How can you satirize a government that is already outlandish?

One professor misunderstood where I said I live and asked me if there are many English-speaking people here.





Now is a good time to invest in Ruidoso real estate! Lower interest rates are spurring growth in interest-sensitive industries such as housing and some economists predict further declines in interest rates.
Today, many loans have interest rates (and monthly payments) that can change from time to time. These are Adjustable Rate Mortgages (ARMs). Most lenders tie ARM interest rate changes to changes in an "index rate." Your mortgage rate can vary from one adjustment period to the next—every one, three, or five years. Lenders add to the index rate a few percentage points called "the margin," which is usually constant over the life of the loan. This amount differs from one lender to another.
The data at the right illustrate the current lower indexed rates (and that now is an appropriate time for making real estate investments).
