## Warriors get bucked by Colts, 17-13

Halloween came a day late for the Ruidoso High School varsity football team.

The Warriors, who entered Friday night's District 3-AAA game at Silver City unbeaten, lost a heart-breaking 17-13 decision to the Colts amid a number of questionable or "tricky" calls by the officials.

With the win, the defending champion Colts virtually cinched the district title with a 2-0 record. Ruidoso is 2-1 in district 3-AAA play and 8-1 overall. The Warriors must now beat visiting Deming Friday night, November 8, to have a realistic shot at the state playoffs.

But it was two official judgment calls which turned the tide against the Warriors last Friday.

With the Warriors leading 7-0 late in the third period, Silver City set up for a field goal at the Ruidoso 8.

The center snap went off the holder's fingers and hit the kicker's knee, bouncing off. A mad scramble for the ball ensued, and after a few seconds, Silver City's Mike Mares picked it up and ran down the left sideline for a touchdown.

One official ruled the play dead, but the head linesman called it a touchdown, and Silver City trailed, 7-6.

Shayne Stevenson kicked the extra point and the score was tied at 7-7.

Silver City scored again early in the fourth period.

After a Warrior fumble at the Ruidoso 25, the Colts' sophomore quarterback Willie Gardner ran 22 yards for a score to give Silver City a 13-7 lead.

Stevenson kicked the extra point and the Colts led, 14-7.

But the Warriors came right back on the ensuing series, only to see a close call again go against them.

The Warriors drove 83 yards in just six plays for the score.

Michael Williamson, who had scored the first Warrior touchdown on a 31-yard run early in the third period, this time went over from the five.

With 7:01 left in the game, Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson elected to go for the two-point conversion.

Quarterback Russell Easter took the snap and ran to his right. He appeared to be over the goal line but

the officials ruled him just short. Easter angrily stormed off the field as the Warrior fans showered the officials with a round of boos.

Easter had set up the second touchdown with a 31-yard run and a 24-yard pass to Brian Davis which put the ball at the Colt 16.

Three plays later, Williamson went over for the touchdown.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Warriors went for the onside kick. It was something Ruidoso has tried before with success this season.

But not this time. The Colts recovered the ball at the Warrior 48.

A facemask penalty and a dead-ball foul against the Warriors put the ball at Ruidoso's 20.

Silver City could only move to the Warrior 15. However, Stevenson came in and kicked a 32-yard field goal for the game's final points with 4:10 remaining in the contest.

Ruidoso tried to move the ball on the next series, but could not get a first down and Silver City took over. The Colts then ran out the clock.

The first half was scoreless with both teams having scoring opportunities.

Silver City's Joey Hoover in-

tercepted an Easter pass at the Colt 12 to end a Warrior threat. Ruidoso's Jeff Williamson intercepted a Colt pass to end a Silver City threat just before the half. Bubba Miller also had a first-half interception for the Warriors.

The Warriors scored on their first series of the second half.

After getting a good bounce on a Colt punt, Ruidoso took over at the Silver City 47.

Wingback Kirk Taylor ran for 16 yards to the 31. On the next play, Williamson cut through a hole and ran 31 yards for the score.

Garret Henson then kicked the extra point to give the Warriors a brief 7-0 lead.

"We just made too many mistakes overall to win the game," Henderson said afterward. "I'd rather not say anything about the officiating."

"If I'd have to do it over again, I'd still try for the two-point conversion instead of the kick (after Ruidoso's second score)."

"I felt at that point we would have a better chance of winning the game with the two-point conversion than going for the tie and going into the tiebreaker after the game."

The Warriors rolled up 201 yards rushing and 51 yards receiving for 252 yards total offense. Silver City had 237 yards total offense, 147 yards rushing and 90 passing.

Williamson was the Warriors' leading rusher, gaining 91 yards in 10 carries. Easter added 75 yards in 12 carries.

However, the Warrior quarterback completed just three of nine passes for 51 yards.

Silver City double-teamed Davis all night, and the 6-2 junior only had two catches for 38 yards.

Now the Warriors must play Deming, a 33-0 winner over Hot Springs Friday. Deming is 8-1 on the season and 1-1 in district play.

Ruidoso beat Deming, 31-14, in the final regular season game last season to earn a playoff berth. The Wildcats will be seeking to even the score Friday.

NOTES-It was a bad week all around for the Warriors. The team film of the game was misplaced at the Roswell bus station and probably will not be available for two or three days. The film is developed in Artesia each week. Thus, the coaches could not determine the week's top players.

## Downs trustee is cited

Ruidoso Downs Trustee Jake Harris has been cited for violations of village ordinances regarding sewer connections and minimum lot size, according to Downs enforcement officer Mark Milford.

Milford said Harris was cited for violating Ordinance 4-4 and 4-6, involving sewer hook-ups, and Ordinance 12-1-8, regarding minimum lot size.

Although Milford cited Harris in municipal court, the case might go to magistrate court in Ruidoso because it involves a village trustee, said Milford. Village attorney Don Dutton said he would research the legality of where such a case may be heard.

Contacted on Sunday, Harris said the citations are mistakes.

"They're not qualified to tell me what's legal or not for plumbing on private property," said Harris of the village. He said he would con-

tact the Administrative Plumbing Authority of the state of New Mexico to inspect his property.

Harris said he is not in violation on the lot size citation. He said he had received approval from the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission to place a trailer on a lot that is less than 7,000 square feet.

Harris said that before he took it to the board of trustees for approval, village clerk Wilma Webb told him that Dutton told her that Harris was "grandfathered," allowed since the situation existed before enactment of the regulation in the lot size rule.

Webb said Sunday that Harris would be grandfathered if his property were a lot, but his property is a tract of land. According to Webb, a tract must be subdivided into lots before houses may be placed upon it.

## Gymnasts qualify for state competition

For the first time ever, during this weekend's gymnastics meet in Albuquerque, every member of the Ruidoso Mountain Tops gymnastics team qualified to compete in the state meet.

One by one, Ruidoso's five gymnasts racked up the points needed

for state, with Terri Kennedy bringing home first all-around gymnast honors in the 12-14 age group. Kennedy also took first place in floor routine, second for beam, second for the vault and fourth on the bars.

Rachel Garrett won sixth all-around gymnast in the 12-14 age

group as well as fourth for floor routine, sixth on the bars and sixth for vault.

Kristin Leslie, Tricia Evans and Tara Candelaria competed in the 9-11 age category with Candelaria winning fifth all-around gymnast, second on the bars, fourth for the

beam and fifth for floor routine.

Evans took second for vault and fifth on the bars and Leslie won second place on the beam.

The Mountain Tops will compete Saturday, November 9, in Hobbs, in preparation for the state meet November 23 in Alamogordo.



## Blood drive promoters honored

"Any day of the year we are somewhere collecting blood," said P.K. Watts of United Blood Services (UBS) Wednesday during a "thank you" luncheon at Cree Meadows Country Club. Watts, UBS director for West Texas and Southern New Mexico, also introduced Betty Richards, the new coordinator for Southern New Mexico.

Watts told luncheon guests, all media representatives and blood drive sponsors, that the El Paso center which she directs is just part of a larger system that includes 21 blood centers throughout the U.S.

Watts said UBS is the only system in the world with interrelated centers that work together to meet the blood needs of citizens.

Watts presented Community Service Award plaques to The Ruidoso News, radio stations KREE/KTNT and KOAW, and to Lincoln County Cablevision for "getting the word out" about local blood drives.

She also presented awards to representatives from organizations that sponsor blood drives: Ruth Moore, president of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Auxiliary; Judy Radtke, Ruidoso High School;

and Cyrena McGee, Community United Methodist Church.

"We need at least one other blood drive here," said Watts. During 1984 in Ruidoso, 903 units of blood were used, while only 346 units were collected in area blood drives. Through September 1985, RHVH has used 476 units of blood, and at that rate 634 units will be needed by the end of the year, said Watts.

She said 413 units have been collected, and no other blood drives are scheduled during this calendar year.

"Blood shortages are very real," said Watts. She said misunderstandings about AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) have had a negative impact on blood supplies.

"You cannot get AIDS from donating blood," said Watts, who added that a new, clean, sterile needle is used for each donor. Blood received from donors is screened at the center for the AIDS antibody, and any donor having that antibody is sent a letter.

Watts challenged area blood drive sponsors to promote more blood drives in Lincoln County.

# Probation officer enjoys new office

Rick Austin, probation/parole officer for Lincoln County and Mescalero, is proud of his new office at Terrace Plaza on Mechem Drive. After operating out of his home and the Magistrate Courtroom for the past year, Austin is pleased finally to have an office.

"We got through it," said Austin of his first year on the job. He said his kitchen table doubled as a typing desk, Judge James Wheeler's secretary took telephone messages, papers and documents were sent to Alamogordo to be filed and stored and he met clients in Judge Wheeler's office.

Austin, happily settled behind his own desk now, said he wouldn't have been able to do his job this past year without the cooperation of other county agencies.

His job is to serve as probation/parole officer for 60 area clients.

"I wear a lot of hats," said Austin, who thinks of his 60 clients as 60 individuals.

Austin said his purpose as an agent of the court is to monitor clients as well as enable them. He explained that he is called upon to monitor his clients' lifestyle changes, such as marriage, divorce, automobile purchases, job changes and the like.

"Sometimes I have to be their conscience," he noted.

Initially, Austin said, he completes a pre-sentencing investigation and report in which he makes a recommendation to the judge regarding a convicted person's sentence.

Austin, who has a strong law enforcement background, said he takes the pre-sentencing report very seriously. He said he goes back and basically re-investigates the case, interviews principle parties and questions the defendant.

First step for clients assigned to him is to enter into an agreement with the state containing 21 conditions, "most of which you and I abide by everyday," said Austin.

Conditions include agreeing to keep a job and to obey all local, state and federal laws.

"Your other choice is going to prison or jail," Austin tells his clients. He said probation is a second chance, not a guaranteed right.

Austin sees most clients just once

a month, but is available much more often, working seven days a week for as long as 24 hours a day. "There's no way I can monitor the whole county," said Austin. "But I hear things."

Austin has had clients he had to see daily, but if that much supervision is required, he said he now recommends the new state community corrections program. In that program, clients live in an open facility and have daily visitation with a caseworker, extensive counseling, educational guidance and individual living skill training.

"It gives me a tool," said Austin, who can recommend a client for the program through the courts. La Posada de Dona Ana in Las Cruces is one of about six community corrections operations in the state.

The ultimate tool is to ask the judge to revoke a client's probation and return the person to prison or jail, said Austin.

He received his bachelor's degree in police science and has also taken courses toward a master's degree in business administration.

"I wanted to be a police officer," said Austin, adding that as he was acquiring his education he never considered his current field.

As an instructor at the state correctional academy, Austin discovered that field services personnel in probation/parole seemed to have fascinating jobs. That's

when he changed career directions. "I had no assumptions as to what a probation/parole officer was," said Austin. "On the other hand everyday's a surprise," he added. Not only are his clients all individual and unique, he said no two days are alike.

Nationally, the percentage of citizens on probation or parole is from one-half of one percent to one percent, said Austin. That small percentage normally represents a "cross-section of society," he added.

Austin's clients are 25 percent female and 75 percent male, but he said the ratio is usually 40-60.

"Society is tougher on females," he said, seriously. Austin himself stands as an advocate for his clients' rights, whether they be male or female.

Austin, who moved to Ruidoso just a year ago when he accepted his present assignment, is the father of a seven-year-old boy. His wife of just three weeks, Cyndi Austin, is a dispatcher for the Ruidoso Downs Police Department, and the mother of a 13-year-old daughter and a 17-year-old son.

What would Austin most like his clients to know?

"Life is not a gimme ... they must take responsibility for their own actions ... if I can just get that across to them ..." said Austin, thoughtfully.

# Christmas tree cutting forms are available

Christmas tree applications are available for the 1985 season, with permits again being issued from the Cloudcroft Ranger District, according to a report from the Smokey Bear District Ranger Station.

Permits are required and will be distributed through the mail. Designated areas have been established within each district of the Lincoln National Forest, and trees cut for personal use may not exceed 10 feet in height. Applicants will be expected to designate a chosen area when applying for a permit, and will be confined to that area.

Trees are \$5 each, and each family is entitled to only one tree. Groups may also purchase the \$5

trees, but one person should sign and complete the application in the name of the organization, including a statement specifying the number of trees desired and the intended use.

Applications are available at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Capitan Chamber of Commerce and other area chamber offices.





The junior varsity Warriors will take on Hot Springs in the first round of the tournament.





There certainly have been some surprises in professional and collegiate sports the past few weeks.

Last week, the Kansas City Royals won the World Series, coming from a three-one deficit to defeat the favored St. Louis Cardinals.

The same weekend, the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) football team stunned defending Western Athletic Conference (WAC) champion Brigham Young University, 23-16, in the Sun Bowl.

There have been a number of other upsets in professional and collegiate sports, but the Royals and UTEP victories have to rank with the great upsets of all times.

As far as Kansas City goes, it was even surprising that the Royals were in the World Series.

They also had a three-one deficit in the American League playoffs before rallying to beat Toronto.

Before this season, a Western Division team had only represented the American League in the World Series once since 1974. That was in 1980, when the Royals fell to Philadelphia in six games.

When the Oakland A's ruled baseball in the early 1970s, they won five straight Western Division titles, three American League pennants and three World Series titles.

But no team in baseball has even come close to the A's 1970s record since then. That's especially true of teams from the Western Division.

However, the Royals' World Series victory and the competitive division race this season should give Western Division teams more respect from the baseball world.

The Miners' victory over Brigham Young was amazing since UTEP had been winless before the game.

Any team that can shut down Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco as effectively as the Miners did should be a factor in the WAC race the rest of the season.

This should be good news for local college football fans. The Miners are the closest major college team to Lincoln County and El Paso is within easy driving distance.

Take in a Miner game sometime.

If any game could be called a moral victory, Thursday night's freshman football game between Ruidoso and visiting Goddard fit the bill.

Ruidoso lost, 14-6, but showed a marked improvement over the 30-8 defeat the Warriors suffered in the first meeting between the teams this season.

The Warriors finished the season with a 2-4 record. They beat Chaparral Junior High School, split with Tularosa, lost once to Roswell and lost twice to Goddard.





## Ruidoso Gross Receipts (Sales) Tax




Gross receipts tax collections in August 1984. Collections in August were \$178,181; were slightly higher than those of August 1984 they were \$174,438.



## Henley to enter plea

Capitan road supervisor Guy Henley, previously employed as the Lincoln County road supervisor, is scheduled to appear before Judge Richard Parsons in the Lincoln County District Court this morning (Monday), November 4, at the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Henley was indicted by a Lincoln County grand jury on April 15 for one count of embezzlement for more than \$100 and one count of making or permitting false public vouchers while he was a county employee. Henley is scheduled to enter a plea and disposition on the two counts, with Ruidoso attorney

Gary Mitchell defending his case. Mitchell said Henley will plead "not guilty" to the charges.

"I think and hope that the district attorney's office will not pursue what can be construed to be a technical violation, as Henley had no intent to defraud," said Mitchell.

Mitchell added that he thought the case "involves politics and personal animosities." He said that people who know Henley "know he will not cheat anyone."

District Attorney Harry Wilcox is the prosecuting attorney for the state. Only pleas and dispositions will be heard in today's court. Trial dates will be set later.

Wilcox was unavailable for comment Friday.

## Grizzlies defeat rival Tigers

The Capitan Tigers lost to their traditional rivals, the Carrizozo Grizzlies, 40-12, in Carrizozo Friday night.

The Tigers were unable to score in the first half, meeting the halftime buzzer with the score at 20-0 in Carrizozo's favor.

Capitan's Chris Peralta made the first touchdown with a short run to the goal line in the third quarter.

The Tigers did not score again until the fourth quarter when Mike Shanks caught a touchdown pass from quarterback Troy Padilla.

The Grizzlies proved to be too tough for the Tigers, winning the 28th game between the two schools.

The game was the last game for Tiger seniors Peralta, Nick Najjar, Troy Keller and Robbie Runnels.

## Capitan water still turbid, needs boiling

When the rainy season comes, most Capitan residents expect the water coming from their taps to be murky. The technical term for the discolored water is "turbid"—a condition that occurs when the water contains excessive silt and debris, making it muddy.

If the incoming water is not excessively turbid, it can be filtered. But the very wet month of October, combined with a major transmission line problem, brought brown water into Capitan homes in the middle of October.

When the main regulator valve in the Capitan water supply lines exploded, there was nothing to control the flow of water into the village filter tank. According to village water supervisor Terry Cox, the tank suffers from metal stress from having too much pressure in the past. To avoid damaging the tank and filtration equipment, the water was treated with chlorine and sent through the village lines.

After tests were run for bacterial content in the water, the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) issued a boil order in mid-October, which has continued into November. Even after the regulator was repaired, turbid water continued to come from Bonito Lake.

According to Jim Edwards of the Ruidoso EID office, coliform bacterial tests require more time for results when the water is turbid than when it is clear. Edwards said he ran a coliform test Tuesday, but results were unavailable as of Friday. He said the boil order would be in effect until the turbidity level is lower.

Edwards said the turbidity level is based on a scale of the amount of suspended particles, starting from an acceptable level. He said Capitan has an administrative

waiver to allow five turbidity units in an average water supply.

In the Tuesday test, the turbidity unit level was 28, said Edwards. He said he will continue to issue the boil order until the level drops to five.

Edwards said the turbidity level is the simplest method of determining the possibility of bacteria in the water. He added that lengthy testing of the water is the only accurate way to see if bacteria is present.

Village residents cope with the dirty water in different ways. Capitan Trustee Kelly Beavers, after learning that the U.S. Forest Service has a large water tank, arranged for the village to borrow it.

The Forest Service parked the 500-gallon tank, full of water taken from an approved well at the Smokey Bear Work Station in Ruidoso, near village hall in Capitan on Wednesday afternoon. Edwards said the village is required to disinfect the water.

The tank is on loan as long the village needs it, Beavers said. He said he wanted the Forest Service to know "how much the village appreciates the loan."

With arrival of the tank, many residents may stop purchasing or hauling water. To acquire water, many residents travel almost 16 miles to Baca Campsite where pure spring water is discharged from a pipeline. Others get water from nearby wells, while some purchase water.

David Cummins, a member of the Cummins Food Corporation in Capitan, said the sales of water rose considerably since the turbid water problem began. Cummins, who also is the mayor of Capitan, said he had to special-order extra water last month.

Cummins said that he contacted the Emergency Preparedness Office in Santa Fe about using National Guard water tanks as the

village has done during past water problems. Cummins said that the office told the village that since an alternate solution exists (the boil order) there is no need to call in the National Guard.

A growing number of residents want action taken to solve Capitan's water problems. A petition is circulating in the village to question why grant money, originally designated for a new filter plant, was diverted to the new well project.

Some Capitan residents say that the new well cannot produce all the water needed by the community, making the Eagle Creek and Bonito Lake water supply more vital than ever.

David Rouleau is a general medical practitioner in Capitan. He said he is very concerned about the water situation, as he sees many Capitan patients with stomach problems during bad water periods.

Rouleau said it is very difficult to connect the condition of the water supply with stomach complaints because state environmentalists are not required to test the water beyond a bacterial count. He said a culture of the water, which would show what types of microorganisms are in it, would benefit medical personnel in "bad water times."

Rouleau said he is monitoring the water for chlorine residue. He said he found Thursday morning that the residual chlorine level in the water was high. He said this indicated the iron-manganese level in the water had decreased.

Manganese and iron react with chlorine to make the disinfecting chemical inactive. The reaction leaves little residual chlorine to kill bacteria in the village water lines, Rouleau said.

Rouleau said he is interested in the water problem from a "health aspect." He wants to see the village make a long-term commitment to

make the water supply safe.

Rouleau said he researched the history of Capitan's water problems and the steps that were taken in the past. He opined that the village has taken little more than emergency measures previously when dealing with the water.

The recent grants given to the village to improve the filter system were diverted to the development of the new well. Rouleau said the grants were based on a long-term study made by a reputable engineering firm in Albuquerque. The firm recommended a filtration system that would handle the village needs, presently and in the future.

Rouleau said all residents, regardless of whether or not they are registered voters, may sign the circulating petition. The petition will be presented to the Capitan trustees at the November 18 meeting.

An informal group, meeting as concerned citizens, has considered sending letters to village residents outlining the history of the water problems, said Rouleau.

The doctor said he felt abandoning the lake water supply would be a "serious mistake." He commended the city of Alamogordo, which owns Bonito Lake and the camp area, for improving the lake watershed by installing portable toilets at the camp.

For now, village residents must boil their water and let their laundry pile until the water clears. One homemaker said she never uses bleach even after the water has cleared some, as bleach reacts with the water to leave dark spots on clothing. She also said that she plans to drain her hot water heater after the water is clearer to prevent problems from the accumulated silt in the bottom of the tank.

## County Commission inspects subdivision roads

The Lincoln County Commissioners made an on-site inspection of the Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates Subdivision roads and cul-de-sacs last Monday.

At a recent special meeting with the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission, the commissioners requested that Otero Electric Cooperative join them in the inspection of the placement of electric pedestals in the subdivision's

cul-de-sacs.

According to subdivision regulations, a cul-de-sac must have a 100-foot diameter turning space. Suzanne Cox, county manager, said the commissioners discussed a possible compromise with Otero to allow for a 90-foot diameter turning radius.

Cox said the commission found only one cul-de-sac in which the pedestals did not meet the 90-foot specification. Otero had agreed to move any pedestals requested by

the commission at the special meeting with the commissioners last month.

The commission took no action on the situation because member A.W. Gnatkowski was absent from the meeting. Commissioners Bill Elliott and Ken Nosker agreed to discuss and take action on the results of the inspection at their November 12 meeting in Carrizozo.

Cox said the commissioners present at the meeting directed her to begin the process to hold a sale of county surplus items. The pro-

perty—which includes a confiscated airplane, an old van and other vehicles—is to be sold by public bid after approval from the state property control office, Cox said.

Cox also said that the commissioners gave her permission to apply for \$25,000 in grant funds toward the restoration of a historical site at Fort Stanton.

The commissioners will meet at 9 a.m. Tuesday, November 12, at the courthouse in Carrizozo.

## Downs may get big new luxury hotel

Ruidoso Downs is one step closer to having a nine-story luxury hotel, reported Mayor J.C. Day Friday.

Charles Noble of the Borrego Development Company, Inc. was in Ruidoso Downs October 29 for the closing on the property located on Highway 70 overlooking the Ruidoso Downs Race Track. According to Day, the company will do a feasibility study and, if things go as planned, begin construction on The Sport of Kings Hotel in March. Construction is estimated to take about two years.

Day said that Noble studied Ruidoso's needs and has included "tremendous convention facilities" in the hotel plans. Convention and banquet seating capacities are more than 1,000 each.

"We're really enthused," said Day. "This will be a boost to Ruidoso Downs and the whole area."

The hotel will have 268 units, including suites and rooms. The facilities will include shops, underground parking, a swimming pool and other amenities.

Day said that the project will cost between \$8 million and \$20 million, having "a tremendous impact on this area."

## Committee to gather data, hopes to attract industry

The Business Research and Promotional Council, a division of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce's Economic Development Committee, had its first meeting last week, under the direction of chairman Richard D. "Buz" Browning.

The purpose of the council is to gather data and make it available to prospective industries, investors, educational institutions and other entities that might look at Ruidoso as a possible location.

The group will gather statistics about Ruidoso's population, labor force, unemployment rates, tax structure, average income and educational levels. Also studied will be growth rates, major employers, school enrollments, historical trends, area churches, housing costs, real estate sales, transportation and traffic counts and financial institutions.

The information will be compiled to form a community profile, which will be written into a brochure and updated annually.

Committee member Lori McKnight, who has a degree in economics, gathered similar data

in Las Cruces and suggested the categories to the group. Other committee members are John Jeffers, chamber executive director; Barbara DiPaolo, vice president of economic development; Mike Gladden, assistant superintendent of Ruidoso Schools; and Father Dave Bergs of Saint Eleanor's Church.


Also on the council are Carroll "Buddy" Bundick, manager of Texas-New Mexico Power Company; Leon Eggleston, Ruidoso village clerk; Ray Carpenter, village councillor; Karen Moore, marketing director of The Swiss Chalet; Frank Potter, assistant village manager; businessman Mac McDougal; and businessman Tom Dorgan.

Each committee member will research statistics in a specific category and report back to the group at the next meeting. The general consensus of the group was to target Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Alto. However, statistics from 20 miles around these areas will be gathered as much as possible.

The council will have its next meeting at noon Monday, December 2, at the chamber office.

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE**—"It's five miles between names."

That's what supporters of Garrey Carruthers say about circulating petitions in Catron county.

They were notably successful. The group that had to ride that far to find Republicans in a county that doesn't have many people of either political persuasion were the first in the state's Carruthers organization to meet their quota of signatures.

And those signatures are all-important. They are now the only way for a statewide candidate to get on the ballot, and gathering them is not nearly so easy as some who want to get elected had imagined. That's one of the reasons Carruthers says he thinks that pack of hungry Republicans contesting for the governor's race will be much smaller than it presently is by the time petitions must be filed.

Some are counting as many as ten possible entrants in that party's top race. They include Joe Mercer, Frank Bond, Jack Morgan, Bill Loomis, Jack Little and Carruthers, who have already announced; Colin McMillan and Bill Segó, who appear about ready to; and Paul Becht and maybe one other who are still studying the matter.

Every one of them has to get more than 3200 signatures of bona fide Republicans, no one of whom may sign more than one petition. It's a fourth-degree felony to put your name on more than one list of persons running for the same office—unlike the good old days, when a registered voter could spread his or her name around with gay abandon on petitions for anybody who wanted signatures.

After observing that difficulty, Carruthers goes on to the other one, which may in fact be primary. That's the question of money. It's tough to come by.

Asked how many finalists he thinks there will be in the category he finds himself in, Garrey guesses three or four.

What he clearly finds most encouraging about his own campaign is the first-timers he says he is attracting. "I think the kind of new beginning New Mexico needs is only possible if we draw new people into the process," Carruthers adds. "The ones who have signed on with us are among our hardest and most dedicated workers."

The candidate says he is getting good response from pointing out to audiences that he is neither a former legislator nor an attorney. He speculates that New Mexicans may not feel too warmly about either of those two groups at the present time. And he believes, of his party's aspirants who fit that description, he is the only one with statewide name identification.

What those of us who have watched campaigns come and go look for at this early date is the status of the organizing effort.

In a field as crowded as that Republican one is likely to be, grassroots organizing, which eventuates in an ability to get out your identified supporters on primary day, is the single effort most likely to be productive. A heavy and skillful advertising campaign ranks second.

Some Republicans will concentrate almost all their efforts on the three counties (Bernalillo, Dona Ana and San Juan) where over half their party members live. Others will hustle to out-organize those

popular in the big towns in all the other areas. If about 73,000 of the state's 183,000 Republicans show up to vote on primary day, 25,000 could take it if the field has narrowed by that time. A good campaign organization should aim at something like 30,000 to be on the safe side.

As for what the state really needs in its next chief executive, Carruthers is correct when he says it is a man who knows how to "Manage downward."

It isn't tough to handle a government or anything else during the

period of the upward curve. But what's required when the times are closing in is quite another set of talents.

We in this state are going to have to do some soul-searching in months just ahead to choose those services from government we cannot do without and those we can dispense with. A governor should be able to lead us in that process—which means next year we have to choose something other than just another hacker for the job at the top.

## Editorial

Shopping locally, and keeping dollars in our community as long as possible, sounds like a smart idea. One businessman has taken a smart idea a step farther and created the "Get S.M.A.R.T." shopping campaign to encourage local shopping.


Campaign organizer Dan Kelley explains that the S.M.A.R.T. stands for "Shop Merchants Around Ruidoso Today." The campaign is based on the belief that shopping locally can greatly benefit everybody, and that a wide variety of goods are available here and so shopping elsewhere is unnecessary.

It makes a lot of sense for us to stick together by supporting each others' businesses. Shopping locally for merchandise and services saves time and travel—and sometimes money on the cost of the item.


