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## Health Fair '85

Ruidoso physician Arlene Brown is ready to "check you out" at Health Fair '85 from 10 a.m. until 7 p.m. Friday, November 8, in the Gibson's building. "We Want to Check You Out" is the theme for the annual event, and sponsors urge all area citizens to take advantage of free health screenings and educational information to be provided by more than 70 technicians and exhibitors. A small fee to cover the basic cost will be charged for the cardiac profile (planners advise a four-hour fast prior to this blood test), kidney profile, complete blood count and liver profile blood screening, but all other tests are free.

## Boil Capitan area water

Capitan community water supply users still should boil their water, said Jim Edwards of the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Division office in Ruidoso. Edwards said Wednesday that he received the results from the coliform tests he ran last week. Although the tests showed no coliform bacteria present in the water,

Edwards said the excessive turbidity of the water prompted him to retain the boil order. Edwards said Capitan water supervisor Terry Cox reported that the water was still turbid on Wednesday at four times the acceptable level indicating the possibility of bacteria being present in the water.

## Band wins honors at Zia Festival


The Ruidoso High School Warrior 24-Karat Gold Marching Band climaxed an outstanding marching season by winning six first places at the Zia Marching Festival in the University of New Mexico stadium Saturday.

Besides winning the most outstanding all-around honors for Class A bands (schools with enrollments of 600 or less), the Warrior band also won first for most outstanding auxiliary (flags), most outstanding percussion, most outstanding woodwinds, most outstanding drum majors and most outstanding brass.

Ruidoso will pick up eight trophies in all. Drum majors Londa Miller and John Dean each gained a trophy. The Warrior band will soon receive a trophy for getting a first-place tie in percussions last year. The band did not receive a trophy last year for the percussion win.

A total of 34 bands from New Mexico and Colorado competed in the event. There were seven bands in the A division.

"I think they did pretty good," Ruidoso band director Danny Flores said of his band. "They mar-

ched really well.

"Friday night we watched the news to find out how the football team did. When we found out they had lost, we got kind of depressed.

"But Saturday morning on the field, we perked back up and were ready to march. The Zia Festival is the biggest event of its kind for the whole year."

Flores praised Miller and Dean's efforts.

"John and Londa did a fantastic job," he commented. "Our group is young and we got off to a very, very slow start this year. Over one third of our members are freshmen."

Last month, the Warrior band won first-place honors at the Parade of Champions at New Mex-

ico State University.

The band has played at all home football games and some of the away games this season. If the Warrior football team makes the playoffs, the band will play at all the games, home and away.

So the fall marching season has been very successful for the Warrior 24-Karat Gold Marching Band.

## Senior football players experience good season

Like good wine, the 15 Ruidoso High School senior football team members have improved with age.

When they were freshmen, the Warrior varsity had a 1-9 record. As sophomores, the team was 0-10 (the only win had to be forfeited).

But during the last two years, the Warrior varsity has gone 16-4-1. Ruidoso qualified for the AAA-division state playoffs last season and made the semi-finals. The Warriors are 8-1 this season, with the only defeat being last Friday's 17-13 loss to Silver City.

When they play their final regular-season game Friday against visiting Deming, the Warrior seniors are hoping to qualify for a second straight playoff berth. And there have been many highlights for the Warriors seniors in their high school football careers.

"I guess my biggest highlight was to beat Artesia this year," said quarterback Russell Easter. "Particularly since they beat us (twice) last year."

Artesia, the defending state AAA-division champion, was Ruidoso's first victim this season (14-13).

Easter, the son of Bob and Virginia Swain, made the All-District 3-AAA first team last season. He has been the Warriors' starting quarterback the past two seasons and played a lot at that position in his sophomore year. He started both his freshmen and sophomore years at safety.

The Warrior quarterback has been sought by a number of colleges this season. He hopes to attend Abilene Christian College in Texas and probably play football. He is undecided about his major.

Guard Roger and Rita Herrera.

"I think my biggest thrill was beating Artesia and also pulling a 419 play against Goddard and getting five blocks," he said. "Russell scored a touchdown behind me."

Herrera has started in the Warrior offensive line the past three years and made the All-District 3-AAA second team as a center last year.

"I like guard better because I can pull and block more," he remarked. Herrera would like to attend the University of New Mexico after graduation. An excellent wrestler, he would like to compete in that sport for the Lobos.

Tailback Michael Williamson is the grandson of Joe and Pauline Jarvis.

"I think my biggest thrill was when we got into the playoffs last season," he said. "I'm looking forward to them again this season."

Williamson made the All-District 3-AAA second team last season and has scored 12 touchdowns so far this year. He has played football for four years and started at cornerback in his freshman season. Despite only weighing 140 pounds, Williamson is one of the

best breakaway threats in the state. He would like to attend Eastern New Mexico University and play football. He wants to major in physical education.

Cornerback Mitch Mullican is the son of Randy and Jan Mullican. "Beating Artesia this year was my biggest highlight," Mullican said.

Mitch has played football for three years and has started at cornerback the past two seasons.

He would like to attend Abilene Christian University and major in business.

Offensive tackle Phillip Herrera is the son of Manuel and Sharon Herrera.

"My biggest highlight is going to be a state championship," he said, definitely.

The 5-10, 220-pound lineman has played at tackle the past two seasons. He also is the defending District 3-AAA heavyweight wrestling champion.

After high school graduation, Herrera would like to attend either the University of New Mexico or the University of Arizona. He wants to major in aeronautical engineering.

Tight end-linebacker Bobby Dickinson is the son of Jim and Barbara Dickinson.

"My biggest thrill was catching my first touchdown pass against Goddard this year," Dickinson said. "Russell threw it to me."

Dickinson made the All-District 3-AAA second team last season as a middle linebacker, but is playing at outside linebacker this season. He was a starter at tight end in his sophomore season.

He is not sure what school he wants to go to next year. However, he would like to major in architectural engineering.

Linebacker Jeff Maxwell is the son of Mary Failla. "I think my biggest highlight was last season in a JV game against Artesia," he said. "I grabbed the ball from the ballcarrier and ran for a touchdown."

This season Maxwell has started on defense as the middle linebacker. This is his third year of Warrior football.

The muscular senior is undecided about his post-high school plans.

Center Mark Flack is the son of Rudy and Linda Flack.

"Being ranked number one in New Mexico has been my biggest thrill," Flack said. The Warriors were ranked first in the state's AAA-division in two polls before losing last week.

Flack has been the Warriors' starting center this season. He has played football for four seasons, the previous three as a tackle.

He would like to attend Eastern New Mexico University, possibly majoring in finance or business.

Offensive tackle Jimmy Frost is the son of Larry and Judy Frost. "When we win state," he said bluntly when asked what his biggest thrill was.

Frost has played Warrior football for three years, not playing in his sophomore year. The 185-pounder has started at offensive tackle most of this season.

Frost would like to attend Texas A&M University and major in veterinary medicine.

Twins Kerry and Kyle Jameson are the sons of L.J. and Linda Jameson.

"Beating Artesia was my biggest highlight," Kerry said.

Kerry is a starting offensive guard. He has played football four seasons, the last two as a guard. Previously, he was a split end.

He would like to attend college somewhere in Colorado. He wants to major in architecture.

Kyle has started at defensive end most of the season. He has played at end his entire four-year career.

"Having a winning season has been my biggest thrill," he said.

He wants to attend college after graduation from high school. However, he is not sure where he will go to school.

Cornerback Randy Reynolds is the son of Jesse and Isabel Reynolds.

"Just being with this team as a family and winning games has been my biggest thrill," Reynolds said.

Reynolds has started at cornerback this season. He was a cornerback last season, played fullback in

his sophomore year and wingback in his freshman year.

After graduation, he plans to work for a year, then attend college. He is undecided about his major.

Fullback Bryan Alexander is the son of Bob and Sandy Alexander.

"Having the courage to come back after all my injuries has been my biggest thrill," he said. "Just to keep trying."

Alexander has shared the fullback duties with junior Billy Harrison this season. He was injured early in the season this year and was out much of last season with an injury.

The past two seasons he has played at fullback. He was a cornerback his first two years.

Alexander would like to attend New Mexico State University and major in business.

Running back Alan Hearn is the son of Willie and Florida Hearn.

This is Hearn's first year at Ruidoso after moving from Plainview, Texas. Besides football, he also played basketball and ran track in Texas.

"My biggest thrill has been the excitement of being a Warrior this year," he said.

Hearn plans to attend college and would like to go to the University of Oklahoma. He would like to major in business.

Trainer Richie Sanchez is the son of Richard and Nellie Sanchez.

"My biggest thrill was winning the most valuable player award for track in my freshman year," he said.

Sanchez has been the Warrior trainer for three years. He was a manager in his freshman year.

He would like to go to Texas Tech University or New Mexico State University and major in electrical engineering.

members are still reviewing the document.

Commissioner Martin Rose, chairman of a P&Z sub-committee charged with reviewing the proposed ordinance, reported Monday that he and his group have logged at least 40 hours on their review, and will be ready by next week to make recommendations to the commission.

Rose suggested a workshop for 4 p.m. Wednesday, November 13. He said his group will have completed the entire document by that time and will make final recommendations.

Commissioner Mary Underwood suggested that the Ruidoso Village Council be invited to participate in the workshop, and the commission concurred.

Commissioner David Smith, chairman of the sub-committee that will review proposed land use

and zoning maps, said his group will wait until the other sub-committee recommendations are presented before completing their assigned task.

"We have a problem looking at lands that may one day be annexed," said Smith. He recommended a cooperative effort between the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extra Territorial Zoning Commission and village P&Z to identify possible land uses for the areas surrounding village limits.

Smith raised questions about a transportation study also being completed by BRW, and wondered how that study and downtown revitalization will fit into the completed comprehensive plan and zoning map.

Smith volunteered to "get something on track" with the transportation plans. He noted that BRW has presented five options for Midtown traffic, including possible pairing of one-way streets and/or

elimination of on-street parking.

During regular business, commissioners denied a request for a 16-foot front lot line variance for new construction on Lot 12, Block 3, Mountain View Estates, for Haria Jean Gossett.

Jim Wilkerson, contractor for the project, revealed plans to add a breezeway and a 24- by 30-foot garage that would extend into the required 20-foot front setbacks by 16 feet.

"Our job as P&Z Commission is to enforce covenants except when there's a hardship," said Smith. "I don't see hardship here," he added.

"The hardship part of it," said Gossett, is that the house has a "settling problem. It's virtually falling in." She reported that the house was built by John Hall.

Gossett and Wilkerson explained that the planned addition was designed to divert water and alleviate drainage problems on the lot.

"I paid \$200,000 for that house ... I've got to do something," said Gossett, who added that she didn't feel she should go back to the contractor with her problems now.

Petty suggested that a retaining wall in the setbacks would be more acceptable than a structure, and presented a motion to deny the request for front lot line variance for the garage, but approve the building of a retaining wall within five feet of the lot line.

The motion, which was unanimously approved, stated that the retaining wall should not be taller than 10 feet.

In a telephone conversation Tuesday, Gossett said she and several workmen were in the process of measuring and figuring ways to complete her project within the allowed parameters.

"I have no problems with John Hall," said Gossett.

Hall, when contacted by telephone Tuesday, confirmed that

Gossett purchased the house from his company in July 1982. "She (Gossett) had some warranty problems that we responded to," said Hall.

He said the warranty period was for a year, and during that time he said he was called upon to repair some roof leaks and replace a plumbing fixture, which he did.

"We have not had a single call from her on the foundation," said Hall. "We try to take care of our people," he added.

In other business P&Z:

—Approved a five-foot, six inch front lot line variance on lots 21, 22 and 23, Block 6, Paradise Canyon for Jan Dyson, after discussing a possibility that Paradise Canyon Road encroaches on Dyson's property. Smith was the lone commissioner who opposed the request.

—Unanimously approved a land exchange on tracts A and B, Panorama Lodge Addition between Mike Radziewicz and the Village of

Ruidoso. The nearly even exchange returned a street to village ownership and made the Radziewicz property contiguous.

—Approved a 3.4-foot side lot line variance on Lot 13, Block 4, Golf Course Estates as requested by Jace Ensor. Davis reported that the house was built into the setbacks in 1981, before current building inspection policies were enforced.

—Heard Davis report several possible zoning discrepancies in village maps. He said he'll do further research, and report his findings during the next P&Z meeting.

—Set a workshop for P&Z and the Ruidoso Village Council at 4 p.m. Wednesday, November 13, at Village Hall.

—Heard Davis remind Griffin that she will be the official P&Z representative to the next meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

Commissioner Reed Sturman was absent from Monday's meeting.

## No trade shows for chamber

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce advertising committee decided not to attend trade shows using lodgers' tax money earmarked for that purpose, unless money is made available from other sources, such as cooperative advertising. The committee met at the chamber Monday afternoon.

A total of \$2,500 remains in the "council-approved advertising" line item of the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee budget. The original \$9,000 line item was earmarked for possible trade show use. However, the Ruidoso Village Council spent \$1,500 of it for State Police protection during the motorcycle festival and donated \$5,000 to the cog-wheel railroad feasibility study.

The advertising committee decided to ask that the remaining \$2,500 be used for a promotional trip to Austin, Texas, to present the winners of the "Picture Yourself in Ruidoso" contest in which a Texas family will be chosen as Ruidoso's "family of the year."

The committee acknowledged the

possibility of using matching funds from the ski area or racetrack to attend trade shows, if agreed upon later. Chamber executive director John Jeffers said he spoke with representatives from Ski Apache and Ruidoso Downs about the possibility of cooperative advertising. Ski Apache manager Roy Parker reported that no funding agreement has been made at this time.

The committee discussed the contest, which began last week. Advertisements in newspapers and on radio stations throughout Texas will call for families to send a snapshot and essay about why they like Ruidoso. The committee will choose the winners after the November 30 entry deadline.

In a special meeting Friday, the committee chose not to participate in a "gold card" advertising program with radio station KOAM-AM. Committee chairman Bill Hirschfeld said the chamber did not have the funds required for the project.

Charges of embezzlement and falsification of county vouchers against Guy Henley, a former Lincoln County road supervisor, were resolved in a pre-prosecution diversion program arranged by assistant district attorney Harry Wilcox and Henley's attorney Gary Mitchell.

Mitchell said Tuesday that he met with Henley and Wilcox on Monday, the day Henley was scheduled to enter his plea. Mitchell said Henley did not appear before Judge Richard Parsons as the case was resolved prior to court. Mitchell said Wilcox did not request that Henley make a plea.

Wilcox said he did not require Henley to make a guilty plea

because of the diversion program. Wilcox said that the program involves a contract in which Henley agrees to probation terms set by the district attorney's Lincoln County investigator, Leandro Vega.

Vega said Wednesday that the terms have not been established, but will involve one to three years of probation. Wilcox said that his office will set the terms and he will meet with Mitchell and Henley for their approval of the probation contract at a later date.

Wilcox stressed that the probation is not a formal probation set by a judge after a plea is entered. He added that Henley could be charged and brought to court if he does not fulfill the terms of the probation. However, if Henley fulfills the

terms, the charges will be dropped and Henley will have no criminal record, Wilcox said.

Defense attorney Mitchell requested the agreement, as is customary, Wilcox said. After the request, guidelines to qualify for the pre-prosecution program, set by the DA's office, were followed in the investigation of the case. Wilcox said he approved the agreement after the guidelines were met.

Wilcox said that he met with Mitchell and Henley Monday morning and agreed the charges be "dismissed without prejudice." He said the resolution was "based upon circumstances and the totality of the investigation" by Vega.

District Attorney James Weldon said the pre-prosecution program "gives a deserving person a

chance."

Mitchell complimented the district attorney's office, saying that the case was investigated fully and treated fairly. Mitchell said he felt that Henley was treated fairly in the investigation and the resolution.

Henley was unavailable for comment at press time.

Mitchell said that the charges against Henley stemmed from an incident involving an employee under Henley's supervision with the county road department more than two years ago. Mitchell said the Lincoln County Commissioners at that time—John Hightower, Ken Nosker and Bill Elliott—asked Henley to resign from his supervisory position because of the incident.

## Former county road supervisor gets probation

Sewers and roads are top priorities with Ruidoso Downs residents, who filled the village meeting room to express their opinions Monday evening.

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees had the special public hearing to garner input from the residents prior to making applications for improvement grants from the state. Hubert Quintana, director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, an area-wide planning and assistance organization of which

Ruidoso Downs is a member, described the grants for which the Downs must apply by November 27.

The village will apply for two types of grants—the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and New Mexico Community Assistance grant (NMCA). The village may apply for a maximum of \$500,000 from each program. Funds may be used for improvements including water, sewer, roads, street lights and waste disposal.

According to Quintana, at least one (preferably all) of three basic criteria must be met for the CDBG. The improvements must serve low

and moderate income people—a minimum of 51 percent of those served must have low or moderate income levels. Also, the money must be used to eliminate slum or blight conditions and must remove a health hazard which has occurred within the past 18 months.

Last year, Ruidoso Downs received a CDBG grant to install a 500,000-gallon water storage tank. Engineer Barrett Atkins reported that the water project is nearly complete.

The residents discussed various areas where sewers and paved roads are needed.

"Unfortunately, you can't solve

all the problems at once," said Atkins.

"Any improvement in the Downs is fantastic," said resident Joe Martin.

Using the input gathered at the meeting, Atkins will complete the lengthy applications for the grants. The state committees will meet in Ruidoso on December 17 and 18 to review all grant applications.

State Representative Ben Hall was present at the meeting. Ruidoso Downs Mayor J.C. Day thanked Hall for his help in getting state funds for Ruidoso Downs and Lincoln County.

## Officer to face charges

Former Ruidoso Downs police sergeant and volunteer fire department director James R. Riley faced charges of embezzlement in Lincoln County District Court Monday. The charges were reduced and remanded to Magistrate court, according to a court official.

Court clerk Margo Lindsay said Riley was charged with one count of embezzlement of more than \$100 and making or permitting a false public voucher. Judge Richard Parsons heard the case. Lindsay reported Tuesday that the case was remanded to Magistrate court.

Gary Mitchell, Riley's attorney, said the charges were reduced to the misdemeanor level of attempt

ed embezzlement and attempt to falsify a public voucher. Mitchell said Riley will plead "no contest" to the charges in Magistrate court.

Mitchell said that Riley made full and complete restitution, in excess of \$3,000, to the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department. Mitchell said he felt the case was more "careless book-keeping" on Riley's part than attempted embezzlement.

Riley was employed with the Ruidoso Downs Police Department for about three years, said Downs dispatcher JoAnne Jenkins. The alleged embezzlement involved Riley's position as the head of the volunteer fire department, and not his work on the police force, Jenkins said.

## Service Club Council plans calendar

Members of the Service Club Council (SCC) Monday compared notes on who's doing what when. In continuing efforts to avoid duplication of activities and dates, members recorded upcoming events on an activities calendar that will be distributed to the council's mailing list.

Jean Stillman reported that Spirit of Ruidoso has volunteered to pay for postage and copying of the monthly events calendar. Although Spirit had budgeted for such a calendar, the group decided not to prepare one since SCC is providing the same service.

Stillman also reported that area clubs and organizations will have the opportunity to participate in this year's Holiday Spiritfest. The holiday celebration will begin with a parade on Friday, November 30, and will continue with Mr. and Mrs. Santa, a petting zoo, caroling and refreshments each weekend at the Tall Pines R.V. Park.

Any group may volunteer to sit in for Santa Claus and Mrs. Claus and staff the refreshments stand for one weekend of the season. Stillman said funds earned by the concessions will remain with the individual club.

Spirit of Ruidoso also will be selling "candy cane packets" to area businesses, said Stillman. She explained that purchasers will be included in a special advertising campaign. The packets cost \$50 for members and \$60 for non-members.

Other Spirit activities include sponsoring a ballet, The Nutcracker Suite, on December 7, at Ruidoso Middle School and a March

ski race between the Dallas Cowboys and the Houston Oilers.

Nancy Radziewicz said Dan Kelley will explain the "Get S.M.A.R.T." advertising campaign during a future SCC meeting. The program is designed to encourage local shopping, said Radziewicz.

She also reported that the Aspenfest Committee has been appointed to work year-round on plans for the yearly Aspen Festival. Besides the Aspenfest Ball on September 28, 1986, and the parade and street festival on October 4, Radziewicz said an apple festival will be added to next year's fall events.

She asked that any group with plans for festival activities advise the committee of planned events so that the Chamber of Commerce will be able to include them in festival advertising.

Sally Avery of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) Auxiliary displayed a "Call Police" emergency banner, and announced that the plastic banners are being sold in the Pink Shop at RHVH. Avery said the banners sell for \$3 each or two for \$5.

The auxiliary will have orientation for new members at 2:30 p.m. Monday, November 11, in the RHVH conference room, said

Avery. She said the group is open to everyone—men and women.

Ellen Anderson, director of the RHVH swingband program, said an emergency response system for people who live alone or spend eight hours a day alone, will be available in this area "very soon."

Anderson said applications for inclusion in the system will be distributed during Friday's Health Fair. She said donations to the program are welcome, and encouraged clubs to purchase home units as a service to community members with special needs.

Steve Stillman of the Optimist Club reported that his group plans to provide Thanksgiving meals for several foster families. He said the Optimists will also sponsor a Christmas dinner and party for foster children and their families.

Stillman said the Optimist Club is bringing a magic show to the village, and will announce the date and time soon.

Members of other organizations also gave reports to be included in the next calendar of events.

Cal Cowden announced that monetary donations will be accepted to help support the local science fair. Anyone interested should contact Cowden.

## Judge backs out of Downs trustee case

Ruidoso Downs Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela withdrew himself from hearing citations against village trustee Jake Harris at municipal court Tuesday evening.

Harris had received three citations for violating municipal codes regarding sewer hookups and lot

size requirements.

Valenzuela said he withdrew from the case, without prejudice, because he felt that hearing the case would create an impropriety because of his office as municipal judge. Because Harris is a village trustee, Valenzuela said he did not want to be accused of favoritism if

he were to rule in Harris' favor.

Valenzuela referred the case to village attorney Don Dutton. Wednesday, Dutton said he spoke with New Mexico Supreme Court Justice William Federali who advised Dutton that state law calls for the mayor to appoint any village elector (registered voter) to hear the case. Dutton said he would confer with Mayor J.C. Day on the matter.

Dutton said he also will ask the mayor to appoint another attorney, not connected with his law firm, to present the case.

Harris told The News Wednesday that he felt he had been issued a "false citation." He said that Richard Thompson, with the New Mexico Administrative Plumbing Authority, told Harris that his sewer hookups are legal. He also contended that he received approval to place his mobile home on the lot referred to in one citation.

1893, to Craddock "Crad" Gober and the former Nancy Kuykendall. She arrived near the Bonito River with her parents in a covered wagon, and settled in nearby Bitter Canyon, so-called on account of the hard water.

On July 13, 1913, she was married to A.N. Runnels by pioneer Justice of the Peace Thomas Henly.

They raised four children: Arvel, Bonnie Coe, and the twins, Robert and Rayford. Rayford was called Home by Our Lord several years

ago. Mr. A.N. Runnels worked for the Southern Pacific Railroad many years, first on the South Fork, then as watchman for Nogal Lake. Then when the Bonito Dam was finished in 1931, he was watchman for the dam for a number of years.

In about 1931 the family moved to their present home below the dam, where Lula lives today with her son Robert.

Lula is a true pioneer lady, cheerful and smiling always, and unsparring in her helpfulness to neighbors. She is a devout member of the Church of Christ and attends faithfully the Capitan church and also the Ruidoso Church of Christ.

God has blessed her richly with a long and happy life, and we rejoice that she has reached this milestone along life's pathway. We wish her many happy returns of the day and all God's blessings.

Happy Anniversary to Mary and Louis Smith Mrs. Smith was born Mary Belle

Davidson on February seven, 1908, in Benton County, Tennessee, to Noah Davidson and the former Lizzie Farmer.

Louis McAdams Smith was born in Munday, Texas, August nine, 1905, to Dan Hardin Smith and the former Eva Jane Dunn.

Louis and Mary were married in Roswell November nine, 1925. How they both arrived in nearby Portales, where they had become acquainted, is like something out of a story by Zane Grey.

Mary arrived at Shamrock, Texas, with her parents by train from Tennessee when she was eleven years old. Her father had brought along on the train a wagon filled with household things necessary to making a new start in the West. In the wagon they set out from Shamrock for Quail, Texas, fifty or so miles distant.

The family moved to Portales when Mary was age fourteen. Here she attended high school and was in her senior year when her star of

good fortune shone brightly.

On the Homestead in a Tent

In the year 1910 Louis arrived on the train with his parents at Valentine, Texas, and went by covered wagon to what was then Orange, Texas, which was then close by present-day Dell City. They lived first in a tent with a dirt floor, and Louis' father went to work as a cowboy for the big ranchers. Louis remembers the abundance of game, herds of deer and antelope. After they proved up and got title to the homestead, the family moved in 1915 by covered wagon to Floyd, New Mexico, near Portales. The trip took thirty-three days. Here Louis went to high school, and from there to the University of New Mexico.

In July 1925 he came home and met Mary in Portales; and the next November nine began this marriage that is like something in a beautiful song. They have two children, Mac Hardin Smith, with the Sun Oil Company in Dallas, and Mary Coleene Holmes of Ruidoso.

Frontier Motors

In 1948 Louis and Mary moved to Ruidoso where Louis was a charter member of the Masons and the Odd-fellows, and a member of the city council. Under Mayor Ike Wingfield he was the first Ruidoso Airport

commissioner.

In 1950 they moved to Ruidoso Downs, then called Green Tree; and this was their place of happy destiny toward which all their long toilsome travels had been leading.

Louis opened his garage and wrecker service, and offered a five dollar prize to the person who could think up the best name. Frontier Motors was selected and the place became famous from coast to coast.

For almost twenty years the place was kept open day and night, and became nationally known not only for people in wrecks, breakdowns, but also as a refuge for folks struck by every kind of misfortune.

Besides his busy wrecker service Louis established the fire station and was for a while Fire Marshall. He put in the streetlights, and he and Mary had the first business phone in town.

The people who remember the kindness of Louis and Mary are in the thousands; and their "bread cast upon the waters" has returned a hundredfold. They are active in church work and raise beautiful flowers.

We wish this beloved couple every congratulation and God's blessing on their sixtieth anniversary.

## Playoff-hopeful Warriors hope to skin tough 'Cats

A spot in the state playoffs and the best regular season Ruidoso High School has had since joining the AAA division will be on the line Friday, November 8, when the Warriors varsity football team hosts Deming.

Ruidoso is 2-1 in District 3-AAA play and 8-1 overall. Deming is 1-1 in district action and 7-1 overall. The game will start at 7:30.

If the Warriors beat Deming, they will have virtually clinched a playoff berth. Only if Cobre upsets Silver City, will there be any doubt. Cobre, Silver City and Ruidoso would then all have 3-1 records.

Even then, the Warriors probably would have an edge for second place based on the number of "plus points" they would have against the other teams.

"I think the key to the game will be if we can play physical, aggressive football," Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson said. "I think they're a good team. I think they've got better talent than Cobre (which beat Deming, 14-7)."

Deming head coach Ted Hern thinks it will be a tough game.

"It's a must game for us, it's a must game for Ruidoso," he said. "It may come down to who has the least turnovers."

Deming operates out of a Wing-T on offense and a split-6 on defense. Hern rotates a lot of his players and

does not have a set lineup.

Dean Gray may be the best player Deming has. The 6-2, 205-pound senior is a fullback on offense and an end on defense.

"He's a good, hard runner and he's had a good year running the ball," Hern commented.

The Wildcats have three quarterbacks they rotate—Tony Flores, Mike Chavez and Scott Harrison. All did well in the Wildcats' 33-0 win over Hot Springs last Friday.

However, the Deming offensive and defensive lines are on the smallest side, averaging in the 160-170-pound range.

Ruidoso is fairly healthy for the contest. Senior guard James Herrera has some slight injuries but

still could play in the game.

Ruidoso has plenty of offensive weapons to throw at Deming.

Quarterback Russell Easter has completed 50 of 119 passes for 979 yards and 11 touchdowns. He also is a threat to run with the ball.

Easter's main target has been junior split end Brian Davis. Davis has caught 36 passes for 890 yards and eight touchdowns.

Tailback Michael Williamson has scored 12 touchdowns and rushed for 746 yards in 113 carries.

Fullback Billy Harrison and wingback Kirk Taylor also have done well.

Herrera and tackle Phillip Herrera lead a tough Warrior offensive line. Both players are strong all-district candidates.

The Warrior defense only has allowed 85 points in nine games while the offense has scored 226 points.

In last week's 17-13 loss to defending district champion Silver City, the Warrior defense gave up over 200 yards total offense for the first time since the 13-6 win over Portales in the fifth game of the season.

Junior safety Jeff Willingham leads an aggressive Warrior secondary, having grabbed seven interceptions this season.

Tackle Shayne Fedrick and end Matt Evans have been standouts in the defensive line while linebackers Chuck Daniels, Jeff Maxwell and

Bobby Dickinson have been consistently tough.

Place kicker Garret Henson has been accurate on his extra-point attempts and also is a good field goal kicker.

If the Warriors do qualify for the playoffs, they will open the "second season" two weeks hence at the field of the winner of next week's pre-playoff game between the District 5-AAA champion and the District 4-AAA runner-up (probably St. Pius and Lovington).

But first things first. Beating Deming is the main thing on the Warriors' minds this week.


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

The wiry Warrior junior should win top individual honors, but the key to the meet will be whether Ruidoso's younger runners can rise to the occasion.



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## Village pool revenues are reported

The Ruidoso municipal swimming pool ended the 1985 season with a profit of \$339.36, according to figures Bobby Bailey presented Tuesday to members of the village Parks and Recreation Committee.

Bailey, Parks and Recreation Department director, reported that the \$16,300.37 spent on major pool and slide repairs was not included in the revenues and expenses report because it was part of a long-range project included in the departmental budget.

Total pool revenues from entry fees, tuition for swim lessons, concessions and slide tickets were \$40,789.96 for May through August. Operating expenses, including salaries, chemicals and concession supplies, were \$40,441.60 for the same period.

The big revenue-producer, said

Bailey, is the slide. Slide tickets brought in \$334.50 in May, \$7,542 in June, \$8,119.01 in July and \$2,950.20 in August. Pool entry fees in May were \$1,189.50; June, \$7,575; July, \$4,568.64; and August, \$1,295.48.

Total lesson fees for 1985 were \$3,701.06. Revenues from concessions amounted to \$3,515.57.

The pool closed August 17. "In the past it's never paid for itself after that," said Bailey.

Also during Monday's meeting, Bailey reported that the adult basketball program is under way from 6:45-9 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays in the White Mountain School (WMS) gymnasium. Adult volleyball is offered from 4:45-8 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays at the WMS gymnasium, he said.

Both village-sponsored athletic programs are free and open to the

public. Bailey said village crews soon will be doing earthwork at the municipal softball fields. He said materials for fencing and lights are in storage until the fields are prepared.

In order to play on the fields next spring, Bailey said grass sod will probably be installed rather than planting seeds.

Bailey also reported that he'll be traveling to Santa Fe on November 15 to apply for Bureau of Outdoor Land Reclamation funds to be used on the second phase of the softball complex.

That phase will include concessions, restrooms and septic tanks, said Bailey.

"When it's all said and done it's going to be a first-class facility," said Bailey.



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

O.A. Martinez Jr. showed the way aboard Lovely Glass to the half-mile mark before Arteaga took Impressive Ruler to the front of the pack as the field headed into the stretch turn.

Rivas squeezed Richest between Impressive Ruler and the rail as the two horses neared the top of the stretch, taking the lead when Impressive Ruler went wide coming out of the turn.

Martinez moved Lovely Glass sharply around Impressive Ruler at the top of the lane and tried to chase down the leader, but it was Richest by three-quarter lengths at the wire in a final time of 1:051 seconds.

Lovely Glass and Impressive Ruler both shared the role of favorite heading postward at 8-5 odds. Richest, at 4-1 on the board, returned \$10, \$4.20 and \$2.60. The three-year-old son of Bergerac is trained by owner Mullins, who resides in Reserve.

Lovely Glass' runner-up finish was worth \$3.40 and \$2.80. Impressive Ruler held on for the show to pay \$3.

The first eight races on Friday's program ran as 400-yard trial divisions for the \$164,000 Sunland Park All-American Sale Futurity. Eighty two-year-old quarter horses faced

off in the eight heats with the 10 fastest advancing to the final of the Sale Futurity scheduled for Sunday, November 17.

Mack Yates' Real Duck emerged as the leading contender to pocket the winner's share in the Sale Futurity after posting a two-and-a-half-length daylight victory in the fourth division under jockey Joe Martinez. The Real Easy Jet colt stepped the 400 yards in 20.050 seconds—the fastest clocking among Friday's eight heats.

Sticky Native, racing in a four-horse entry, led the 11-horse field for the Sale Futurity through extremely quick fractions, with Cesar T. and Hobson's Choice pressing the pace to the head of the stretch.

The two-year-old son of Our Michael has finished first or second in each of his last eight starts.

Clarendon Star, a leading contender for the Sale Futurity after posting an impressive win in trials for the stake on October 18, was a late scratch. Boo Bee's, Sticky Native, Hobson's Choice and Son To The King raced as a Brown-owned entry.

Sunland's Pic-Six carryover, which opened with a carryover of \$16,613 for Sunday's program, ballooned to \$22,167 for next Friday's card as no fans held perfect tickets.

## Reverend Blu Jeans wins Saturday





DEAR EDITOR:

Is the Ruidoso School Board guilty of malfeasance? Are they the ideological instruments of a darker, more foreboding political presence in our country? Which purpose is to corrupt our children's democratic and moral values. Could the trouble parents have with their children stem partly from a radically opposed set of values?

With stealth and subtlety, elements of our educational system are imposing the values on our students, our children.

The avowed promises of Krushchev were to destroy our country from within.

Looking to our small village, let us go back to March 1968. Remember that communism uses lies and rhetoric to cover her foul deeds.

In March of 1968 the Ruidoso School Board unanimously approved a Philosophy of Education. Quoting from this philosophy, "The educational program must ... develop responsible thinking citizens who believe in our American way of life, and stable adults who live by high moral and spiritual values ... to provide an organizational pattern that can care for ethnic groups."

The truth, 1.) The school board has little concern for ethnic groups. June 15, 1971, school board meeting,

The truth, 2.) The Ruidoso School Board is elected at large. The April 4, 1984, El Paso Herald newspaper headline reads "school election-called illegal." In New Mexico, more than five school districts have legal action brought against the at-large voting practices.

The truth, 3.) To obtain control and quality of their children's education, parents and some teachers elect to teach their children at home. Our small village supports a private school with an excellent record.

The truth, 4.) Ruidoso School Board decides that the Bible is not suitable reading for school-age children. Students in the high school learn in American History that the Bible was one of this country's first text books. In short time this may no longer be included in the curriculum.

At about the same time, the State School Superintendent orders the destruction of a culturally significant art mural that adorned the outside wall of the El Rito public school.

The truth 5.) No Pledge of Allegiance in our schools, not to mention prayer or a moment of silence.

The truth, 6.) American education standards far behind other nations. Quote from foreign exchange student attending Ruidoso school, "His home school is just too far ahead of the Americans ... students' dedication to schoolwork isnt as high here."

What parent, that is actively participating in their child's education, is satisfied if not shocked by the "whitewash" from our schools.

Since the present school board resists the loss of their power by districting, we must put more pressure on our state senators.

Teachers with more honor and pride than a fear of losing their jobs in a corrupt system must also speak out.

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Don't expect government to operate like a business. There's simply no way it could.

Nobody running a company that is expected to make a profit would be so peabrain as to fire the whole top tier of management every four years and replace them with a lot of new kids who know next to nothing about what they're doing. Yet that's precisely what goes on here in Santa Fe every time a new governor takes office.

And then we "stockholders," the citizens, gripe because things aren't being run intelligently.

Like most exasperating elements in government, that one too became a bigger pitfall when Toney Anaya got to run things. We had no reason to expect him to be much of a manager when he was elected, because he had little or no experience at managing any enterprise larger than a law office. He set up a big "search committee" to help him find top talent to fill Cabinet posts, which are jobs whose occupants oversee the spending of millions of dollars and the work of thousands of employees. Then he ended up giving the jobs to his own buddies, most of whom were attorneys as innocent of management as he was.

No wonder they now flounder around when asked to make suggestions on how to cut the cost of running government.

And it's not just ideas they are being asked for. That memorandum they got from the Governor's office last week told them to be "innovative and creative" in their suggestions.

If the examples they were given as thought-starters in that memo are expected to inspire them, we aren't going to get lots of creativity. Of the 20 items listed, the greatest number were things that anybody who knew anything about managing an enterprise should have done three years ago, long before the current budget crisis ambushed us.

To study federal programs that have ended up being run entirely by the state to see if they should be continued is something that should have been done in every agency without the Governor having to write to suggest it. The same can be said for reviewing the agency charter to see if it has not been ex-

panded needlessly, deciding which boards and commissions can be done away with, and evaluating personnel vacancies when they occur to see if it is necessary to fill them. Those are just good management practices, which we citizens ought to demand whether we are in a time of crisis or not.

And how about this one? That memo says these agency heads should (and this is a direct quote) "figure out overhead and administrative costs." If they haven't done that already, what right do they have to think of themselves as managers?

This memo, over the signature of Dan Weeks, a top Anaya aide, may be telling us more about what actually goes on in the present administration than it meant to.

Some of the suggestions are downright fatuous. Bosses are told to question the need for all reports and procedures, and to evaluate their field operations for effectiveness. (How about doing the same for the central office?) They should also review their leases and the contracts they issue to see if money is being wasted.

If they need to be told to do that sort of thing, we're in worse trouble than we knew.

Other recommendations may even cause a faint snicker. For agency heads to search for equipment they can sell or for jobs that can be filled by unpaid volunteers seems a long way from practicality when the total amount of cuts we have to make is something like \$60 million.

But then, maybe we shouldn't be too critical. The very fact that such a memo has been distributed tells us the fourth floor has begun to see the light. The folks there are at least publicly saying we can't go on doing things the way we have been doing them.

Now if we can only make those who receive this document believe it applies to them and not just to all other parts of state government, something may yet be accomplished.

But if things are as poorly managed in state offices as these admonitions give us a right to suspect, this communication is likely to get lost on the desks of the persons it's addressed to.

Now is no time to nap. Most likely you will wake up to find that you missed

- (1) equity of a year of ownership,
- (2) tax deductions,
- (3) a year's appreciation of value.

On the tax subject, the administration's recently proposed tax plan has not been passed by Congress. Most provisions would be effective January 1, 1986. The plan affects home ownership, rental residential property, depreciation, and capital-gains treatment.

Home ownership would be more expensive even though the proposals would continue to allow full deductibility of mortgage interest expense on a principal residence. State and local property taxes would no longer be allowed as deductions for federal tax purpose.
