

Snow falls one way or another at ski area

Although Sierra Blanca may look quite bald this late in the fall, a white surprise hides from the view of most who see the mountain from Ruidoso. Ski Apache crews are hard at work producing manmade snow, and have several trails covered already.

"We're in good shape," said mountain manager Denny Grover. Grover reported that snowmaking crews began producing the white stuff November 1, and are busy covering trails anytime temperatures are cold enough to make snow.

Grover said the ski area can open a significant part of the resort even

with no natural snow. He said Captain, Lower Deep Freeze, the beginner areas, Easy Street, Snow Park, the lower Lincoln Liftline and Smokey Bear trails can be completely covered with manmade snow.

Already piles of snow as much as five feet deep blanket some trails. Grover said the coverage averages 24 inches deep on the trails where snowmaking has taken place.

Grover pointed out that the manmade snow also makes an excellent base for natural snow. He said the snow is extremely durable.

"It's bulletproof," he said with a smile.

The mountain manager said Ski Apache could handle as many as

3,000 skiers with just manmade snow areas open.

"It's definitely as much fun," Grover said of the manmade snow. But the resort would rather have the real stuff, especially the crews who have to stay up all night and operate the snow guns. Grover said the cold, wet work is shared by staff members from all departments at the resort.

"Needless to say, all the snowmaking crews are praying we get natural snow real soon," he said. Grover said snowmaking will continue until natural snow comes or until all trails within reach of the snowmaking guns are covered.

Either way, the resort plans to have snow-covered slopes for this winter's skiing enthusiasts.

Village cuts snow removal

The Ruidoso Village Council, in a Tuesday meeting that made recent budget-cutting decisions official, heard that snow removal may be heavily impacted by austere budget policies.

Frank Potter, assistant village manager, displayed a color-coded map showing areas of priority under new street department policies.

"We'll try to be flexible," said Potter, who explained that just \$50,000 has been budgeted to clear village streets after snowstorms. He said that amount represents a 75 percent reduction from last year's \$150,000 snow removal budget.

Mike Davalos, village engineer, said that according to state Highway Department figures the village should expect to spend \$25,000 in men and equipment costs for every 1,000 pounds of salt used on the streets. Using those figures, Davalos said it should have cost \$517,000 to remove snow during the 18 snow events last winter.

Street maintenance crews, using Village equipment and salt provided by the state, will be responsible for salting streets on a priority basis, said Potter. He said since snow removal is so expensive, crews will not necessarily remove it after every snow.

Salt will be spread on nine major intersections plus Carrizo Creek Road and the hill on Highway 37 near the Swiss Chalet, said Potter in an interview Wednesday.

Village Councillor Rick Evans suggested that, new policies might be too drastic, and even endanger public safety.

Richard Swenor, chief of the Ruidoso Police, agreed with Evans, adding that snowstorms cost his department overtime because of accidents. He said the public may have to make some changes to accommodate the new policies.

The public exercised their opinion when they voted against an increase in gross receipts tax, said Jim Hine, village manager. "The majority of them are in favor of leaving snow," he added.

Councillors also approved budget cuts of \$89,600. Hine, who proposed the cuts during a recent council workshop, warned councillors in an earlier meeting that the budget would have to be adjusted to compensate for lower than expected first quarter revenues.

He said he discussed the cuts with various village department heads and "reluctantly they have agreed."

General fund cuts included \$3,700 from the Executive-Legislative Department, \$3,500 from the Financial Administration Department, \$8,500 from the Police Department,

\$1,700 from Planning and Zoning, \$2,200 from the Building Inspection Department, \$20,200 from the Street Department, \$2,000 from the Library, \$700 from the Shop Department and \$1,500 from the Recreation Department.

Budget reductions in utility funds amounted to \$45,600.

In other financial business, the governing body approved an amendment to an ordinance in which village bonds were refinanced. That refinancing should save the village \$690,000 in debt service costs over the next three years, explained bonding agent Darrell Fowler of Albuquerque.

Councillors set a special meeting for 4 p.m. Monday, November 18, to discuss the refinancing of general obligation bonds.

Municipal Judge John Cupp described a sentencing program he uses that saves the village money and also benefits the community.

"We try to use jail as a last resort," said Cupp, as he explained a process he uses in which community service work is used in lieu of jail time and/or fines.

"Logistically, I can't handle it, and we can't afford to hire anybody," said Cupp, who asked that a volunteer advisory board be formed to help coordinate the community service project.

Village attorney John Underwood opined that such a committee could be formed within Cupp's department and would have no reason to "come hat's off to Judge Cupp."

"My hat's off to Judge Cupp," remarked Underwood.

"I like the whole concept," said Village Councillor William A. "Dub" Holt, after further discussions on the benefits of the program.

In other business Tuesday, the council:

Unanimously approved a vacation of right of way necessitated by a land exchange between the village and Mike Radziewicz. Paul

Davis, village enforcement officer, explained that Eagle Drive, a municipal street that crosses the Radziewicz property in front of the West Winds Lodge Annex, was on private property before the land exchange.

—Set a workshop for 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, November 26, to discuss a nuisance code ordinance proposed by Davis.

—Rejected all eight bids to remove buildings deemed unsafe by the Board of Appeals, Abatement of Dangerous Buildings. The council instructed the board to begin hearings on the unsafe structures.

—Heard Underwood report that he'll meet Thursday with Federal Aviation Administration representatives in Albuquerque to begin negotiations on the future of the current Ruidoso Municipal Airport land.

—Heard Underwood report that he is working toward a settlement on damages caused by the Hollywood well contamination, and "receiving" a great amount of "contribution" from McCarty Construction Company's legal representatives.

—Heard Hine report that an offer of judgment on the Eagle Creek well field may be received in time for the next council meeting. He said the councillors will decide whether to accept or reject the offer, which will then be adjudicated in district court.

—Heard Hine report that the Personnel Review Committee will meet at 2 p.m. today (Thursday), November 14.

—Heard Leon Eggleston, village clerk, report that the State Auditor has completed a village audit and will deliver his report next week.

—Heard Mayor Pro-tem Jerry Shaw report that the Economic Development Board is "working diligently." Shaw also reported that she is serving on a Happy Holidays food drive committee.



After a year, still no solution of McKnight killings

When friends and neighbors saw Thomas "Cotton" and Judy McKnight last year on November 13, they had no idea it was to be for the last time. That day, just a year ago, was much like any other for the Picacho couple.

Some anniversaries are celebrated, others just remembered—the anniversary of the McKnight murders many will recall the mystery that has surrounded the deaths of Cotton and Judy McKnight.

It was learned that Cotton spent the day working sheep on the ranch with neighbors Virgil Smith and Arlan Tolbert from the Diamond A Ranch, while Judy spent the day in town.

"She (Judy) was in a real good mood," said Karen Morlack, who was working as a bartender at the Hollywood Bar that day. Morlack said Judy visited with some of Hollywood's "regulars" early in the day, bought some package goods and left soon after noon.

The McKnights headed for their isolated stone ranchhouse about 4:30 p.m. that Tuesday, never to be seen alive again.

A friend from Louisiana was camping on the McKnight ranch, and said he knocked at the ranchhouse door early Wednesday morning, but received no answer. By Thursday morning, he said, he

was concerned enough to contact McKnight neighbors for information on his friends.

Investigators said that those friends and neighbors entered the house together through a locked, but not completely closed door, and made a grisly discovery. They found the bodies of Cotton and Judy on the kitchen floor.

Cotton was shot through the chest, Judy through the back, and then, both victims were shot once in the head, according to police reports.

Lincoln County Undersheriff Charlie Cox, principle investigator on the case last November, termed the double murder "an execution-type killing."

"Any time someone shoots someone in the head like that, that's what it looks like ... It was just a cold-blooded thing," Cox said at the time.

Cox speculated that the undisturbed condition of the house indicated that the murderer or murderers may have known the victims. He said liquor, glasses and beer cans were on the kitchen table.

That "casual" scene may have been "a set-up," according to Cotton's father, Joe McKnight of Roswell. The elder McKnight said the liquor on the table was not the kind the couple and their friends usually drank.

Joe McKnight has been openly critical of the sheriff's investigation of the case. He wants to see his

son's murderer arrested and convicted.

The sheriff's investigation has been beset with problems, and has drawn criticism from James Weldon, district attorney for the 12th Judicial District.

Investigators revealed that evidence gathered at the scene included laser fingerprints and ballistics materials. The fingerprints were "hand-carried" to the F.B.I.'s Washington D.C. laboratory, but the results, which were termed "inconclusive," were not returned to Lincoln County for five months, according to published reports.

Ballistics testing was performed in the Texas Department of Public Safety laboratories, and those tests, too, proved inconclusive, said Cox.

Sheriff Tom Sullivan said that skindivers were even brought into the case after a psychic indicated that evidence might be found in a stock pond near the Picacho ranch. The divers said they spent a day in search of evidence, but didn't find anything in the pond.

Reports published in April indicated that Cox had revealed results of laser fingerprint testing, however Cox and Sullivan said those reports were "fabricated."

As a result of those reports, Weldon muzzled the Lincoln County Sheriff on the subject of the McKnight murders.

Weldon was quoted as saying, "Because of that erroneous information, I felt we had to have our

source of information, and since I am the chief law enforcement officer for the district, I made myself responsible for ensuring that the information given to the press, if any, is correct."

As the DA and the Sheriff wrestled over who was responsible for handling the murder investigation, two relatives of the victims took matters in hand and began circulating a petition asking that a grand jury be called to investigate Weldon's handling of the case.

Terri Bussey, Judy McKnight's sister, and Donald Frank "Pancho" McKnight, Cotton's brother, initiated the petition. Bussey, her sisters and mother also issued a statement in which they stated their gratitude and support for the Lincoln County Sheriff's office.

Weldon called a press conference on August 23, and told members of the media who gathered in Ruidoso's magistrate courtroom that evidence gathered at the murder scene was "well-tainted." He said the sheriff "was dead-set against cooperating" so he had established an independent investigation.

Weldon, who averred that prosecutorial decisions rested with him, said it was premature to present the case to a grand jury. He stated his office had developed additional leads.

During the press conference, Joe McKnight told Weldon, "I think you've done a fine job." He said he asked Governor Toney Anaya to reassign state police to the investigation.

Sheriff Sullivan responded to Weldon's criticism of his office's investigation and handling of evidence by calling a news conference on August 26. Sullivan called for a special prosecutor in the case because, he said, "(Weldon) lacks experience to prosecute a case of this magnitude."

Sullivan stated emphatically that his office had conducted a good investigation and had handled evidence correctly using standard procedures.

Within a week after the two press conferences, District Judge Richard Parsons issued an order constraining the sheriff's office, the district attorney and other attorneys involved in the McKnight

investigation from discussing the case.

On September 4, Stephen Westheimer, deputy attorney general, confirmed that the Attorney General's Office (AG) was entering the case.

"We'll just take a look at the case and discuss it with Weldon and Sullivan," said Westheimer in a Ruidoso News story.

Family members said they were glad to have the AG investigate the murders, and Bussey and Pancho McKnight have put aside their petitions while they wait for the AG to complete his investigation.

They are still waiting. The AG has been reviewing the case for over two months now, and when contacted by telephone Tuesday, Westheimer declined to comment on the ongoing investigation.

The sheriff has indicated that he has a suspect, Joe McKnight has named his own suspects, Weldon has said he has a suspect, the AG has no comment ... and a year after Cotton and Judy McKnight's slain bodies were found, the McKnight murderer or murderers remains unnamed—and free.

Group revises proposed zoning code

In a joint workshop Wednesday, members of the Ruidoso Village Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) reviewed changes to the final draft of a proposed zoning ordinance.

The draft was prepared by BRW, a Colorado planning firm, and the changes were the result of many hours of review by a P&Z subcommittee headed by P&Z commissioner Martin Rose.

"If we hadn't had this from BRW, we would have been up duck creek," he added, holding up the more than 50-page document. Rose said that the planners "covered things we never even thought of."

The subcommittee combined parts of the current village zoning ordinance with BRW recommendations to form the new proposal, but were unable to lead the two groups through the entire document during the two-hour meeting.

Rose said his group simplified, condensed and used language from the current ordinance whenever possible.

The zoning ordinance was scheduled for completion on August 30, but after Wednesday's workshop, it was learned that another review session will be required before continuing on to the next stage, which will include

preparing a land use map and a zoning map for the village.

Zoning classifications for residential areas included in the proposal are: F-HP (forest-hillside protective zone), R-1 (single family), R-2 (multi-family), R-3 (high density multi-family) and R-4 (mobile home).

Rose said mobile home and recreational vehicle park areas were moved from residential to commercial zones.

Commissioners and councilors discussed the maximum density for high density residential areas, and finally changed the maximum units per acre from 30 to 25. Rose told commissioners that the 30 units per acre figure was designed to make development of housing projects on expensive land cost-effective.

Mike Mulholland, an audience member, suggested that low-cost housing might be more economically feasible if the 40 percent green space requirement were reduced in selected areas.

"We aren't shutting the builders out," said Mike Callaghan, P&Z chairman. He explained that a Planned Area Development (PAD) is an alternative that expands the possibilities for developing some land, and also increases the maximum number of units allowed.

The recommendation includes four commercial zones: C-1 (light commercial and office), C-2

(general commercial), C-3 (neighborhood commercial) and C-4 (central commercial). Commissioners agreed to consider combining C-1 and C-2 after councilors Rick Evans and Carpenter stated concern with continuing to have the C-2 designation.

Evans questioned the practice of continuing with the C-2 designation when there is no C-2 land. He suggested having just one zoning classification for the businesses listed in the proposed ordinance, and including conditions on some uses.

Setback requirements and the uses allowed in C-3 are designed to make it compatible to border on residential areas. P&Z commissioner David Smith said likely neighborhood business areas will be arterial and collector intersections.

He said that Rich Unger of BRW suggested in a telephone conversation that most current zonings remain the same when a zoning map is prepared. Smith said Unger explained that zoning changes will be requested as uses develop that fit the specific classifications.

Callaghan said that recommendation should come from BRW, along with a financing plan.

"Let's finish this ... one step at a time," said Rose.

Lodgers Tax Committee funds trips

The Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) voted to allocate \$1,000 to fund travel expenses for two Ruidoso representatives to host receptions for ski clubs and other groups in Austin and San Antonio, Texas.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce member Nancy Radziewicz approached the committee with a proposal for wine-and-cheese receptions to coincide with advertising in the cities targeted for the chamber's winter program. Radziewicz proposed that four Texas cities—Austin, San Antonio, Dallas and Houston—be done two per trip. Ski clubs, travel agents, ski shops and travel reporters would be invited to the receptions.

Radziewicz said the Austin reception would dovetail the Ruidoso Valley Greeters' reception for the winning family of the year, tentatively scheduled for mid

December. Radziewicz proposed funding the reception costs with money collected from chamber members. For \$30 per reception, a merchant or lodger may send 300 brochures to be placed at the party.

Radziewicz said she hopes to collect enough money to fund the receptions.

"If we don't get it, we won't go," she said, adding that letters will be sent to all chamber members informing them of the advertising opportunity.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers supported the reception project. He said he felt receptions would enhance the winter advertising program planned by the chamber.

LTC approved funding two receptions, after which a report will be made to LTC. Funding for the second two will depend on the success of the first two.

LTC also commended Radziewicz, Aspenfest committee chairperson, for her work on the

committee and the success of the festival.

In other business, the committee discussed revisions of the accounting system to clarify money earmarked for use, so LTC would know exactly how much money is left in the budget.

"If business continues in the village as it is, we won't have \$177,000 in our budget. It would be nice if we had a true picture of our unencumbered balance," said LTC chairman Budgie Green, pointing to the possible need to trim the budget later in the fiscal year.

Ruidoso village clerk Leon Eggleston said he could write purchase orders for planned expenses (for example, by the chamber advertising committee) so LTC would know the money is unavailable.

LTC treasurer Don Parsons reported that collections for the month of September were \$3,447, down \$400 from collections last year in September.

Lodgers to study lift ticket pricing

The Ruidoso Lodgers Association voted Tuesday to form a subcommittee to study the possibilities of becoming involved in the determination of lift ticket prices at Ski Apache.

Lodger Clark Carpenter said he sees Ski Apache as a weekend resort, and he feels it would be better for the community if more weekend skiers would ski here. He said one way to attract weekend skiers is through competitive pricing packages.

"Taos does it, everybody does it," he said of special lift ticket discounts during weekdays. "I really think it would be in everybody's best interests, theirs (Ski Apache's) included."

Most at the meeting agreed that an emphasis will be put on any study of ticket prices for next year's season.

Also during the meeting, lodgers heard a presentation of upcoming events from Spirit of Ruidoso president Teri Sodd. She reported that the organization's Holiday Spiritfest is coming up, and will include tourist promotional events, a parade (November 29), and a "Winter Wonderland" at Tall Pines RV Park which will feature Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus and attractions for children each weekend until Christmas.

Spirit will sponsor a residential Christmas lighting contest to coincide with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce's commercial lighting contest. Also, events will be planned each weekend until Christmas. December 7, the Albuquerque Renaissance Ballet West will perform at the Ruidoso Middle School Auditorium. Other weekend events are still being planned.

Also during the meeting, the lodgers:

—Heard Chairman Bill Rawlins report that Ski Apache posters are available at the chamber.

—Voted to ask that the chamber list (at each lodging establishment's discretion) the prices of each lodger in future editions of the chamber Ruidoso brochure.

—Learned that the Lodgers Association Christmas party will begin with cocktails at 6:30 p.m. followed by dinner at 7 Tuesday, December 10, at the recreation hall of the Village Lodge. Reservations for the \$8 per plate dinner are due December 1. Diners are asked to each bring a dessert with serving spoons and a white elephant gift worth about \$5.

—Voted to donate \$200 to the Happy Holidays Drive.

—Agreed to make an attempt to have Jack White, of White's City near Carlsbad Caverns, come as a guest speaker.

—Voted to approve Clabe Webb as vice chairman of the organization.

The Ruidoso Mountain Tops gymnastics team won first place Saturday during a four-team competition meet in Hobbs. The Ruidoso team dominated the one-day meet, with individuals winning both first- and second-all-around in both the nine-11 and the 12-14 age groups.

"Actually all the girls have double-qualified for the state meet," said coach Robyn Johnson. Since the whole team qualified during an Albuquerque meet, the points racked up Saturday were just extra, she said.

Terri Kennedy won first-all-around gymnast and first in all four events for the 12-14 age group. Rachel Garrett took second-all-around gymnast in the 12-14 age group, and won second for vault and bars, third for beam and fourth for her floor routine.

In the nine-11 age group, Tricia Evans won first-all-around and Tara Candelaria won second-all-around gymnast. Evans also won first on the bar, third for vault and sixth for her floor routine. Candelaria placed second on the bar and sixth on the beam.

Kristin Leslie won fourth place on the beam.

Hopkins is in her first year of coaching basketball with the Braves.


"We've looked pretty good in practice," she said. "We have both an A and a B team."

Tam hopes to top Bob's mark at state

Ruidoso High School cross-country star Gabe Tam hopes to equal or better a former Warrior standout's time when the Warriors compete in the state AAA-division meet Saturday, November 16, at Milne Stadium in Albuquerque.

The meet will start at 10:30 a.m. It will be in conjunction with meets from the other divisions.

Tam won the District 3-AAA meet last Saturday and finished 27th in last year's state meet. He is hoping to run as fast as former Warrior star Cisco Bob did last season at the state meet. "The meet's kind of a shot in the dark for us," Maskew said. "We're just going to go up there and run the best we can run."


Team scoring-wise, a number of northern schools should be tough. Goddard and Silver City look to be the strongest teams from the southern part of the state.

McElya creates art with lasers

"Once you see it, you'll be a believer," said laser artist Bruce McElya. McElya, a Ruidoso photographer by trade, has a deep involvement in the Laser Art Program sponsored by the Space Center in Alamogordo.

As a "traveling artist in residence," McElya displays the capabilities of the red-beam laser art equipment all over the country. Recently, he returned from several weeks in the Gillette and Riverton, Wyoming, school systems where McElya demonstrated laser art to students in grades four through six. Previously, he showed the system to Ruidoso students.

McElya said the system is a combination of laser beams and computer systems. The matrix electronic writing tablet of an Apple computer is used. Images drawn on the tablet are stored in the computer, then the computer tells the

laser to reproduce the image. McElya said when displaying the system to students, he first demonstrates its capabilities. Then he gives instructions on its use, and allows each student to try the system.

McElya calls the laser art system a "hands-on, realistic results system."

"That's the charge for me," McElya said, "seeing the students do it."

McElya said the Space Center provides the technical expertise necessary to make the project a success. He adds his talents to transform the technology into art. "Our system is right on the leading edge," he said. "Nobody in the country has anything like this."

The Space Center expects to continue the program soon in the Albuquerque school system. The Albuquerque expansion is largely possi-

ble due to a \$14,300 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. With the grant, the Space Center will now be able to help schools set up their own laser art systems.

"We'll continue the system," said McElya, who added that requests from people who want to see the laser art continue to snowball.

The artist said he expects the system to continue expanding, especially as it becomes a more recognized art form.

The laser art experience has been a rewarding one for McElya.

"This is a great chance for me to do something meaningful. We're right at the beginning," he said.

The artist predicted television-like laser art images and holography—three dimensional—images from the system.

"When you know what's behind and what's coming, it's an awesome thought."

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Downs Trustee refutes charges

The Village of Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees heard Trustee Jake Harris discuss two areas of litigation at its meeting Monday evening.

The two issues which Harris addressed were recent municipal citations and a lawsuit filed against him by former municipal code officer J.D. Knops. The municipal citations are for alleged illegal sewer connections and lot-size requirements.

Harris prefaced his discussion with a history of the Downs and his participation in the village's development. Harris said he was here to help incorporate the village and help with the first water system and the second water system. He also said he was a charter member of the volunteer fire department.

Harris said that the recent incidents had "traumatized" him. He said he would not do anything to jeopardize Ruidoso Downs. He

said his sewer hookups are legal and blamed the "people in authority" who he said "didn't know what the law is."

Last week, Ruidoso Downs Municipal Court Judge Martin Valenzuela removed himself from a case involving the charges against Harris because he said he felt it improper for him to hear a case involving a village trustee. The citations still stand against Harris, awaiting action from Mayor J.C. Day.

Day said Monday that he would not comment on the citations or the Knops issue because both matters involve litigation.

Harris said that Knops filed a lawsuit against Harris for defamation of character and for contributing to Knops' losing his job as code enforcement officer. Harris recounted the circumstances surrounding Knops' resignation.

Harris said he was serving as Mayor Pro-Tem one weekend and had heard allegations that Knops was driving the village's vehicle

during off-duty hours and that Knops had verbally abused a Downs police dispatcher.

Harris suspended Knops, who was later reinstated by the board of trustees. Harris said he later heard allegations that Knops bought and drank alcohol while on duty. Harris said he told Day and Knops that he had "enough information to discharge" Knops. Knops resigned the next day.

Contacted Wednesday, Knops would not comment on the case, as advised by his attorney, Gary Mitchell. Knops did confirm that he filed suit against Harris.

In other business, the board of trustees:

- Authorized village clerk Wilma Webb to obtain information from telephone specialists to possibly use for bidding guidelines at a later date. Trustee Conrad Buchanan said he was worried that the present system for the city hall and police department is not adequate to handle the growth of the municipality.
- Accepted the low bid from F. Alderette Construction of El Paso, Texas, for the North Street Sewer.
- Heard a request from code enforcement officer Mark Milford for more support with his investigations.
- Approved the appointment of Mark Fraire to the Downs Planning and Zoning Committee.
- Approved the purchase of a word processing program for the village computer system.
- Approved new fire department officers: Scott Tillman, Paul Keith, Renee Keith and Chet Southard.
- Approved loaning dumpster containers to the Happy Holidays Committee to collect canned foods, clothing and toys.
- Heard Day congratulate Albert Montes for achieving a Level 1 status at water school and to Police Chief Skip Hazel for being named "Policeman of the Year" by Crime Stoppers.
- Went into executive session to discuss certain acquisitions and litigation.

Racquet club considered as convention center site

The vacant Sierra Swim and Racquet Club is being considered as a possible site for a small convention center by the Economic Development Board, a Village of Ruidoso advisory committee.

During a board meeting Tuesday, members discussed the possibility of leasing or purchasing the facility, and voted to tour the empty building at a noon meeting Tuesday, November 28.

Village Councillor Jerry Shaw, chairman of the board, told the group of a proposal on the building she received from a Dallas consulting firm. Shaw said that, according to the consultants, although a balance of \$1,753,000 is owed on the club, almost any terms could be arranged.

Members agreed that putting the inactive building to use would benefit the entire town.

According to information furnished by the Dallas firm, the club is located on 12.8 acres, and the building includes 13,181 square feet. Also on the property are eight tennis courts, two racquetball courts, exercise rooms, locker rooms, a swimming pool, restaurant and lounge facilities.

Several board members attended last week's meeting with representatives from the State Land Office, and discussed possible development of Moon Mountain, a tract of land owned by the state.

Board member Slover Cape remarked that Moon Mountain development would have to be a long-range project.

Sid Miller, member of the board

and superintendent of the Ruidoso Municipal Schools, speculated that some future use of Moon Mountain might include school facilities as well as meeting facilities.

"I don't think we're the proper ones to sell the State Land Office on a feasibility study," said Petty, adding that the village has no use for the over 600 acres. "We can't be competing with private enterprise," noted Petty.

Members instructed Shaw to write to land office representatives thanking them for their presentation, and informing them that the village has no plans for the Moon Mountain development at this time.

Land across the street from Cree Meadows Country Club was discussed as another possible site for convention center facilities, but members agreed to consider the racquet club building before looking into any other alternatives.

"Are we going to listen to every proposal that comes by, or do something," asked Petty.

"I think the people want us to do something," said Cape.

Petty reminded members that money is already earmarked for a convention facility, adding that acquiring property would not involve tax increases.

Shaw said the money appropriated for the convention center and tourist bureau fund will accumulate until it can be put into an appropriate facility.

Preston Isaacs, a member of the board, was not at the Tuesday meeting.

Grand Meeting of Ruidoso Woman's Club
It was an honor to be present to say a few words at the meeting of the Ruidoso Woman's Club held November thirteen in celebration of Ruidoso's fortieth birthday as an incorporated village. This was my first visit to a Woman's Club, and I was given a glimpse of the true greatness of this organization, made up of women of high character devoted to Chris-

tian service.
Jackie Rawlins, who had invited Nell Parks and myself to tell what we remembered of the early days of Ruidoso, gave a brief outline of the history of the Ruidoso Woman's Club. Organized on April 14, 1932, by eighteen women, it was the first civic organization established in Ruidoso. Edith Coe Rigby was the first president, serving from 1932 to 1936 and again from 1938 to 1939. Meetings

were held in Edith's Navajo Lodge in the early life of the club when Ruidoso had a population of about five hundred people.
Speaking of the Navajo Lodge, Gladys Knox told of visiting the Lodge in 1924. "It was just little cabins at that time," said Mrs. Knox. "I wrote a letter to my father telling him that I had eaten a meal at the Lodge and paid seven-three cents for it. And that even though the price was a little high, it was worth every penny of it!"
Mrs. Nell Parks, in telling of her pioneering in Ruidoso, painted a vivid word picture of the type of person that has made Ruidoso the great place to live that it is today.
Cal Cowden, representing the American Cancer Society, announced "The Great American Smoke Out," to be held November twenty-one. This is the local effort in a nationwide campaign to stem the devastating tide of lung cancer. All

over the nation people are urged to stop smoking for one day, to give them a start in breaking the smoking habit. The idea is that if you can quit for a day you can quit for good. We wish Cal a lot of good fortune in his drive.
Nell and I each received a little memento of this landmark meeting of this admirable band of women—a Christmas tree decoration in the form of a little red apple. On top, seated in front of a sprig of Christmas holly, is a tiny little Smokey the Bear. On the apple is written, "Special Friend '85."
After coffee and spiced tea and great grub of all kinds, the regular meeting was begun by Charlotte Jarrett, "the Georgia Peach Blossom."
I thank the ladies of the Ruidoso Woman's Club for a new and very pleasant and memorable experience, and we all wish them continued good fortune in their work of high patriotism, community leadership, and Christian service.
Often times, at the close of day, when things are just right in the heavens and on the earth, comes a brief little season of the day known in song, poem and story as "the

gloaming."
Here in our mountain land it may last from a minute or two to five or ten minutes. In the northern lands like Norway, Alaska and Scotland it will last for an hour or more.
This time of year our gloaming begins to have a special charm. On the evening of November thirteen, the sky was all cloudy up the valley to the west. Then, just as the sun went down behind the rim of the mountain, the clouds, like a curtain of the sky, drew apart, thinning and scattering overhead and catching the rays of the sun shining from just over the horizon. Up in the top of the sky, the clouds turned pink and cherry red and orange, leaving spots of light blue; while more to the west, nearing the mountain horizon, the thin veil of clouds all across the sky was solid light—pure gold.
The colors of the top of the sky and those in the west began to blend, sending their radiance flooding through the air down to the earth, transforming every meadow, glen and hill, every tree, rock and bank, into a wonderland of gleaming, glowing, airy colors that hold you enraptured in their spell.


Sunland Park pic-six winners take home \$13,841 in weekend action



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

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—New Mexico's climate doesn't produce much fog. Maybe that's why our politicians feel they have to make up for its absence.

At the present time, they are turning out a fog of poorly thought-out and ineptly expressed words on two topics that should only be approached with extreme clarity of mind: what to do about finding new sources of revenue to finance our government, and how to improve the education we give our children.

Instead of using the governmental process to spotlight these issues of prime importance and to seek realistic and hardheaded solutions to them, legislators are trivializing the two in a wash of gaseous language that falls by a country mile to come to grips with either. Imagine for yourself what level of intellectual discussion goes on in a hearing held by a legislative committee when the following process takes place:

—Legislators questioning witnesses have no clear and distinct idea what it is they want to ask.

—Those same legislators find it almost impossible to phrase such stumbling questions as they do get out in language that makes clear what they want to know.

—Witnesses being asked the questions do not listen to them, and are allowed to roam at will in their responses.

There's lots of that going on here in Santa Fe these days, and worse. Little of it does anything to make it likely we will find solutions to our problems. Instead, we appear intent on merely burying them for now, in the hope that when they rise again, we won't be the people who have to face them.

Two strains are notably evident among those now holding high office in New Mexico. Sadly enough, neither contributes to honest grappling with the problems of government.

We have, most notably in our Legislature, a small but very hard-core group of political fundmen-

talists. Their thought processes are marred by the same sort of fears blocking rationality in religious fundamentalists. These good folks contemplate a world, whether of religion or of politics, that frightens them to death by its chaotic nature. Instead of bringing their reason to bear to deal with the problems that fact creates, they seek to vanquish chaos by the exercise of unvarnished power. That's all they can see to do—roll over those who are perceived as enemies, as the sources of what they derogate so highly. Kill, kill, kill.

As they are doing that, of course, they turn the air blue with rationalizations and "proofs" that what they are doing is simply the only choice, the one right thing; which must be done.

These are tough folks, and they're hard to defeat, especially if the only weapon you have to use against them is reason.

The other gang are the woolyheads. Instead of directly facing the truths that appear slightly discomfiting, these folks simply modify them and modify them by more and more talk-talk-talk, until the talk-talk-talk becomes for them the reality. In that way, what has been a harsh and prickly idea, difficult to come to grips with and handle, is turned into something as smooth-edged as a stone from the brook, which can be turned and turned and endlessly discussed.

Trouble is, in that process, they have moved miles from reality—and reality is what government is supposed to be about.

For this writer to give examples of the elected officials in the first category, he would have to name specific names. That might be objectionable. Come watch either House or Senate in floor action for a single day and you can spot the political fundamentalists, with their anti-rationalism, for yourself.

As for the second class, the fabulists, you couldn't find a better example of them and their prac-

When times are tough, we need tough-minded leaders, not ones whose minds are befogged and befuddled.

Businesses fail in Ruidoso for three reasons—the tax advantage of failure (a whole story in itself), wrong products, services or prices for this market, or total dependence on the whims and vagaries of the tourist trade. Come on Ruidoso business owners, give the sucker an even break by being competitive or the money will continue to go out of town. With the highways constantly improving, it's easier than ever to take it out.

Most groups complaining about rock and roll include the word "mother" in their names—some go farther and call their groups "parents against ... whatever."

I'm a mother ... I'm a parent ... and I like music—all kinds of music. I listen to music, I sing, I hum—but I usually don't know the words to the "top-40" songs I hear on the radio.

That may be why I'm one mother who is not concerned about rock and roll lyrics. I just don't know what they're saying, but I like the sound.

I hear kids at my house humming the same tunes that I'm hearing on the radio—sometimes they even sing those songs. I haven't heard them singing anything offensive.

If the songs with the catchy tunes are full of offensive and violent lyrics, I sure don't know it—I don't even want to know.

Maybe these folks carrying on about the words to current songs should just turn down their hearing aids or turn off the radio. If I don't like a song on my radio I just push a button and I'm listening to something else.

Efforts to rate music have been unsuccessful, so far, and instead music publishers have agreed to include the lyrics to some songs on some albums. Since cassettes are so small, reader/listeners will be instructed to read the words on the record albums.

So, now we will have the chance to know exactly what our favorite groups are singing—some of us may even learn some new words. Instead of happily humming those tunes, from now on we can learn the words—all the words—and sing to our hearts' content.

I may be in for a big shock, but I can't wait to read all these things I've been singing about that I didn't even know about. Maybe I'll soon be saying that ignorance was bliss, because I haven't been hearing all these terrible words that my fellow parents are condemning.

The whole system is voluntary, so some musicians may choose to exercise their artistic freedom and not publish the words to their songs.

But many have said they will.

But, how will "concerned parents" enforce their standards on young people who spend a good part of each day driving in cars with AM/FM radios and cassettes playing full-blast?

It's really not enough to control what records and tapes our children buy—we'll also have to control what radio stations they listen to and what songs those stations play.

How about this? Before playing a song, the DJ could instruct listeners under 17 to go get their parents. The DJ could then read the lyrics of the next song up on the turntable—if Mom and Dad are not offended, then the radio stays on—if the lyrics prove unacceptable, then off it goes.

Things could get more complicated if the folks are not at home. Parents would just have to trust the kids to know what is acceptable in that family—a novel idea—sort of like we do now.

It's too bad the ratings system idea bit the dust, though. That idea offered a lot of challenge to technologists throughout the world.

The way it could work, I think, would be to have a whole series of ratings—like A for acceptable for anybody; S-11 for sexually explicit, not suitable for children under 11; S-17 for sexually explicit, not suitable for anyone under 17; S-P for sexually explicit, not suitable for parents; V for violent; G for gross; and X for generally disgusting.

Now, here's where the technology would come in—every radio in the United States would get microchips (or something like that), and those chips would respond to a special radio signal for each rating.

So if a station was going to play an X-rated song, that signal would alert home listeners with the designated electronic signal: "beep, beep, beep, this station is about to play an X-rated song ... beep, beep, beep."

Similar warnings would precede each kind of song, but that's not the most beautiful part. The best part is that parents could program the radio to shut out any or all of the ratings!

Then we "concerned parents" would have total control. Our radios might only accept A-rated songs, or we could even go a step further and hear only commercials, news, weather and sports.

Wouldn't that be a lot easier than teaching our young people to make mature choices for themselves? What do you think?

(More on the proposed tax plan which has not been passed by Congress.)

Business interest and other expenses connected with a rental property would still be deductible. However, the interest expense for a vacation or second home would be combined with all other personal interest expense deductions (including car loans, education loans, and credit card interest but not including principal-residence home mortgage) and subjected to an annual maximum. This maximum personal interest deduction would be limited to \$5,000 plus "net investment income" for the year. The latter includes stock dividends, bond interest, rents, royalties, and bank interest.

The administration proposal also said that mortgage interest would be deductible for that portion of the year that your second home is actually rented and if you use it personally for any part of the year.

The plan further proposed that the "basis" of rental residential and commercial property, for depreciation purposes, would be indexed for inflation. It is estimated that this new application would provide about 60% of deductions now provided.
