Foundation may form, boost filmmaking

Film-making is a big, serious business—one that could benefit New Mexico's economy, said Paul Lazarus Tuesday at a meeting of the Southern New Mexico Film Commission at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Lazarus, director of the New Mexico Film Commission, said he's supporting the formation of a non-profit foundation to spearhead an aggressive promotional campaign aimed at attracting film, video and commercial producers to New Mexico.

Since the state commission has an "extraordinarily low budget" and is governed by many rules and regulations as to how that money can be spent, Lazarus said an independent state-wide foundation will benefit the entire state.

Financing will be obtained from the private sector in cash and in services, said Lazarus, and therefore the funds can be spent for entertaining and on-site promotion including transportation and lodging.

More than \$2 billion a year is spent outside California on location filming, said Lazarus.

"We're trying to increase our piece of that pie," he added, but warned that the market for slices of that pie is very competitive.

Possible returns make the efforts worthwhile, said Lazarus, who said that a week's filming brings about a quarter of a million dollars into an area. If the standard computation of a two to three times turn-around on such funds is used, filming could boost the local economy by three-

quarters of a million dollars. "That's big money," remarked Lazarus.

Besides pooling resources throughout the state, and supplementing state-financed promotional activities, Lazarus said the foundation will "provide at least the promise of some kind of continuity" for the film commission.

"I serve at the pleasure of the governor," said Lazarus. He said because of the very nature of state government, turnover occurs in the leadership of all state commissions, including the film commission.

Lazarus told the group that a soundstage can further benefit the area, since film makers could then be enticed to do interior shooting as well as exterior shots on location. A small warehouse or airplane hangar can easily be converted into a soundstage, he said.

A video soundstage in Albuquerque is the only one in the state, said Lazarus. He said the nearest full-scale soundstage operation is in Dallas, Texas.

John Jeffers, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, stated that a sound stage should possibly be a priority for this area.

Lazarus, who has spent 20 years in the movie business, said he's excited about promoting New Mexico as a film-making location. He said an advantage he has over some of his colleagues in other states is that he has already learned the movie business, has contacts and has chosen to leave Los Angeles and New York to take up the new challenge in New Mexico.

"I'm delighted to be in this state," said Lazarus. He said com-

ing into his present position as a "relative newcomer" to the state has some advantages.

"My intention and the intent of the commission it to look at the state as a whole," said Lazarus, who stated that he does not have a "northern New Mexico bias."

"There's a real feeling in this part of the state that you've gotten short shrift," he said. "What happens in the southern part of the state benefits the state as a whole."

Lazarus said one problem encountered with trying to attract movie-makers into an area is just not knowing what they'll need, or how to provide the kind of information they'll want. He has drafted a letter to every Chamber of Commerce in the state in which he provides detailed information about what movie people are looking for.

Another project being developed will provide partial funding and technical help for communities to produce 10-minute promotional videos.

"We hope to be on-line with the video tape program before the end of the year," said Lazarus.

He said the foundation "is in the hands of a lawyer," and will become a reality very soon.

Bill Hirschfeld, president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, voiced his willingness to work with the foundation and listed things the Southern New Mexico group can begin to do, such as organizing the region and making suitable contacts, lobbying for increased funds for the state commission and initiating a local fundraising campaign for the New Mexico Film Foundation.

Council decides to refinance bonds

The Ruidoso Village Council, in a special meeting Monday, passed an ordinance approving the refinancing of municipal general obligation bonds.

Mike Kyess of Kyess & Company of Albuquerque explained that the refinancing will net the village substantial savings in debt service over the life of the bonds—\$32,000 a year or \$298,150 savings over the

life of the bonds.

Kyess said Ruidoso's new bonds were insured by Bond Investment Guarantee, and received a Standard and Poor AAA rating. They were offered for sale Thursday and "they sold rather briskly," said Kyess.

Of the nearly \$9 million offered for sale, Kyess said just \$1.8 million

were unsold as of Monday.

Although the new bonds have a lower rate than the outstanding bonds, Kyess said the interest rate paid to holders of the original issue will remain the same.

"The only thing that will change is the market value," he said.

In other business during the special meeting the council:

Heard Jim Hine, village manager, announce that a bill for \$72,000 in "out-of-pocket" expenses caused by the Hollywood well contamination had been presented to representatives of the McCarty Construction Company.

Was invited to a Planning and Zoning Commission workshop at 4 p.m. today (Thursday), November 21, in Village Hall.

P&Z Commission handles a short agenda Monday

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday completed one of the two items on the published agenda before the regular meeting was called to order, added an additional review and approved one variance request.

During the meeting members approved a five-foot front lot line variance on Lot 12, Block 12, Forest Heights Subdivision for Van Parmley. George Perry, speaking for Parmley, requested a seven-foot, seven-inch front lot line variance for the construction of a 22-by-22-foot carport. Commissioners advised Perry to

decrease the size and stipulated that the carport never be enclosed. P&Z member Don Shaw cast the lone "no" vote.

Paul Davis, village enforcement officer, revealed that he discovered an encroachment on the same lot, but commissioners took no action.

Bob Dolgener asked to be added to the agenda, requesting that P&Z review his plans for a metal warehouse and office on Carrizo Creek Road. His plans were approved, nullifying a previous approval for a temporary building.

An informal discussion with Don Dorman concerning the Grindstone Resort Community Master Plan, slated for the meeting, occurred

during a workshop session prior to the meeting.

P&Z chairman, Mike Callaghan, reported that no action was taken, however Dorman was advised to seek zoning changes through regular village procedures.

Callaghan said members and Dorman conducted the discussion before the meeting in order to save time.

In other business Monday the commission:

—Heard Davis report that Tim Collins of Burke-Collins provided copies of legal notices and Ruidoso News reports indicating that P&Z had approved a zoning change in Camelot Mountain. He said the

matter apparently was never formally approved by the Ruidoso Village Council, and needs to be formalized.

—Approved a suggestion by commissioner Karon Petty that a moratorium on sign approvals be enacted. P&Z members decided to send a letter to the village council suggesting some loopholes in the current sign ordinance be addressed.

—Expressed regret that P&Z secretary, Linda Mallett, is leaving the village to move to Las Cruces.

—Set a workshop for 4 p.m. today (Thursday), November 21, at Village Hall to discuss proposed zoning ordinance changes.

Although the Lodger's Tax Committee has appropriated \$500 per show, more funds are needed to pay for the parties, said Radziewicz. She explained that the tax funds will pay for airfare, lodging, food and ground transportation. Business subscriptions will be needed to entertain reception guests.

Radziewicz said ski clubs, ski shops, travel agents and travel editors will be invited to the parties,

and from 200 to 300 guests are expected to attend.

Melody Vuicich of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Greeters said that Governor Toney Anaya will lead a delegation to the Austin reception, and will greet a winning Texas family in the chamber's winter advertising campaign.


That family, winners of a Ruidoso vacation, will be guests of honor at the reception. Texas Governor Mark White will be a special guest.

Recreation Department seeks state-held funds

Bobby Bailey, director of the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department, appeared last week before a state group responsible for allocating Land, Water and Conservation Funds (LWCF) and state parks and recreation funds.

Bailey asked for \$40,500 in LWCF and state funds to provide amenities at the municipal softball

complex. He said if those funds are allocated, then the village will have to provide \$13,500 as their share toward the \$54,000 project.

"The necessity of the program was already established," said Bailey. He said Ruidoso received funds last year to fund earthwork, fencing and lights for the softball

complex.

This year's proposal includes \$40,000 for restrooms and concessions, \$4,000 for a septic tank and \$10,000 for bleachers.

The committee, which heard proposals from every area of the state, doesn't know how much will be available, said Bailey. When final funding figures are available, they

will evaluate all the requests and distribute the monies, he said.

Bailey said he expects to know in February whether or not the funds will be provided.

Frank Potter, assistant village manager and Village Councilor Rick Evans were in Santa Fe with Bailey for the meetings.

Crime of the week

Norlander receives dispatcher training

Kathy Norlander of the Ruidoso Police Department recently completed the communications course at the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy in Santa Fe. Having completed the 52 hours of required coursework, Norlander has been certified by the state as a dispatcher.

A member of the department staff for a year and a half, Norlander is assigned to the front desk. She will continue in that assignment, but will now be available for emergency relief service in the dispatch area, she said.

Norlander said she felt the

emergency medical dispatch education was particularly beneficial. She said dispatcher candidates were instructed on how to aid people who call for medical assistance while the ambulance is enroute to the scene.

Norlander, a "fourth-generation New Mexico native" from Albuquerque, has been a Ruidoso resident for five years. She has a 14-year-old son, John, and a 17-year-old daughter, Sharon.

Although she has a strong interest in criminal investigation, Norlander said she doesn't have any desire to go on the street as a

uniformed patrol officer.

About 20 area dispatchers will participate in the state police academy's communications course when it is offered in Ruidoso next week, said Norlander. Dispatchers from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs will be joined by trainees from as far away as Window Rock, Arizona, when the academy brings the school to this village beginning Sunday, November 10.

Class members will receive the same specialized training that is normally offered at the academy in Santa Fe, said Norlander.

to learn consideration, to give service and to develop one's own special talents and interests, explained Jane Deyo and Kim Pickett, co-chairmen for the fund drive.


Contributions to the Girl Scout program will be used for leader training, support services, special council-wide programs for the girls, Camp Mary White and



Warrior to begin 'second season' against Sartans

Round one of the second season begins Friday night, November 22, for the Ruidoso High School varsity football team.

The 9-1 Warriors will open the state AAA-division playoffs against St. Pius at 7:30 in Albuquerque's Wilson Stadium. The game had originally been scheduled for Albuquerque's Sports Stadium, but was switched to Wilson's artificial turf.

"I don't think the artificial turf will have any effect on us," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "We haven't played on it before, but it shouldn't have any effect."

The second-ranked (Associated Press poll) Warriors are healthy going into the game against the fifth-ranked Sartans.

Senior guard James Herrera has had some back problems but is ready for the game.

So is the rest of the team. "We're going to dominate the line of scrimmage like we have all season," said 220-pound offensive tackle Phillip Herrera.

The Warrior offensive line probably will outweigh its opponents across the line of scrimmage.

St. Pius' biggest player is 260-pound nose guard Matt Parkin, but no other Sartan starter weighs more than 185 pounds.

However, the 8-2 Sartans are still a potent team. They beat Grants, 20-7, before that team turned around and stunned defending champion Artesia, 16-13, last week.

Tim Rizek is an excellent athlete who plays tight end, fullback and linebacker. The 185-pound senior is an good hitter.

Rizek probably will be the main receiver for quarterback Jim Sullivan in St. Pius' slot-I offense. Tailback Scott Eldridge is the main running threat.

"They use him (Eldridge) a lot," Henderson said. "The outside sweep is their main running play."

"Their quarterback (Sullivan) is a good thrower."

But the Warriors have plenty of weapons of their own.

Senior quarterback Russell Easter has completed 58 of 135 passes for 1,105 yards. He has thrown 12 touchdown passes and ran for 11 more.

The fact that Easter can run with the ball besides passing has given the Warriors a big edge in most of their games this year.

Tailback Michael Williamson and split end Brian Davis are other big offensive threats.

Williamson has rushed for 805 yards in 122 carries and scored 12 touchdowns. Davis has caught 40 passes for 962 yards and nine touchdowns.

Wingback Kirk Taylor and fullbacks Billy Harrison and Bryan Alexander provide additional offense threats.

With the potent blocking of Phillip Herrera, James Herrera

and the rest of the offensive line, the Warriors have scored 263 points this season.

On the other side of the ledger, Ruidoso has given up just 92 points.

The Warriors only allowed 12 points during a four-game stretch in the middle of the season. After allowing 50 points in the first three games this season, Ruidoso only has given up 42 points in the past seven games.

Junior All-District 3-AAA safety Jeff Willingham has intercepted eight passes to lead the Warriors in that category this season. He leads an experienced and talented Warrior secondary.

Willingham and St. Pius split end-defensive back Tom Sheppard could wage a battle on the field.

Sheppard is called "Mr. Interception" by some high school football

followers.

The Warrior four-man defensive front and the linebacking corps also have done well this season. Ruidoso has not given up any long passes or runs on defense this year.

Ruidoso's kicking game has shown some improvement in recent weeks.

"I think our kicking game was better against Deming (a 37-7 win two weeks ago) than it had been in a long time," Henderson remarked.

"The kicking game could be a big factor in the outcome of the game. That and our ability to play consistent, good football."

The answer will come around 9:30 Friday night.



"I have done a lot of weight lifting so I thought I would do pretty well in the tournament," Serna said.


Serna graduated from Ruidoso High School in 1981. He competed in wrestling and freshman basketball.

At Kaiser Permanente Medical Center in Anaheim, California, maternity floor "rooming-in" means that mom, baby, AND dad share the room. They say it promotes better family "bonding."

Doctors now believe that a B6 deficiency may be linked to depression, especially where neurological symptoms are also present. The report came from the New York Psychiatric Institute and Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons.

Long-term mononucleosis, without any acute illness, may be the reason for vague fatigue, slow thinking, and a feeling of gloom, says a report in the Annals of Internal Medicine. Blood tests indicate the presence of virus in many cases.

How important are Pap smears? Large-scale study shows a 75 percent decrease in cervical cancer among women who had Pap smears at least once during a 10-year period. American Cancer Society recommends: a test every 3 years, after two negative smears a year apart.

For diabetics who get episodes of very low blood sugar, there's a device that warns of tempature drop and sweating, two symptoms of hypoglycemia. Wristwatch-like device sounds an alarm.



Education Association celebrates Education Week

The Ruidoso Education Association is busy this week celebrating American Education Week with a host of activities.

Also, the group conducted a student essay contest on education.

Myers also reported several facts from REA in honor of American Education Week. She listed them as:

—About 80 percent of young people currently graduate, of which 65 percent attend college. In college, 50 percent of the entering students graduate. In England, only about 20 percent of students graduate from high school.

—Enrollment in colleges and universities rose from 6 million in 1966 to 12 million in 1981.

—Studies show that, of students in the fifth grade in 1947, 55 percent later graduated from high school and 28 percent entered college. More recently, studies have shown that, of fifth-graders in 1970, 74 percent later graduated from high school and 43 percent entered college.

—In 1981, the 22nd International Mathematics Olympiad included competing teams from 27 nations of which the U.S. team placed first.

—Handicapped youth in the U.S. have more education geared to their needs than do handicapped youngsters in any other nation.

All-American Sale Futurity caps weekend racing action

Smashed Groom is longshot winner

Smashed Groom, a 10-to-one longshot ridden by Darrell Blevins, upset a good field of quarter horses posting a wire-to-wire victory in

Sunday's All-American Sale Futurity at Sunland Park.

The outsider lined up for the \$164,000 stake with the second fastest qualifying time among the 10 finalists, heading postward well behind the even-money favorite Real Duck.

Blevins had the gelding away from the gates in good order, blasting out of the rail post for a

half-length victory in a wind-aided 19.88 seconds—the fastest clocking this season at Sunland for 400 yards.

Smashed Groom was followed across the wire by two more outside horses as six-to-one No White Shoes with Larry Byers aboard nosed out Zevis Cash Flow (9-1) for second place. Veteran rider Elbert Minchey had the assignment aboard Zevis Cash Flow.

Smashed Groom earned \$81,967 for owners Cullen Plaag and William Reilly of Yoakum, Texas. The winner is trained by James Gerhards. Smashed Groom rewarded his backers among the 3,047 fans attending the afternoon program with hefty mutuels of \$23.60, \$14.80 and \$8.60.

The All-American Sale Futurity was the first stakes win for the Oklahoma-bred in 14 appearances his first year on the track. Owners Plaag and Reilly purchased Smashed Groom for \$16,000 in last year's All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. His Sale Futurity victory boosted the gelding's earnings this year to \$154,398.

No White Shoes, trained by Jake Cascio for Gil Snyder and E.W. Belton of Tucson, Arizona, returned \$9.40 and \$5.40. He earned \$27,869 for his second-place effort.

Zevis Cash Flow carried the colors of John Chapman and John Sheets of Odessa, Texas, earning \$16,393 for third. The show price: \$5.

day's featured allowance sprint at Sunland Park.

The colt, who was backed down to the nine-to-five favorite for the 6½-furlong race, stalked the pacesetter duo of K. Jack and Knight At War to the half-mile mark, where the frontrunners began to tire after stepping the first four furlongs in 45.3 seconds.

Jockey Carlos Rivas steered Sir Warbucks around the two horses as they entered the lower bend, taking command of the race as the field raced to the head of the stretch.

Sir Warbucks drove home for the money with no serious threat from the remaining nine contenders as outsider Incredible T. and second-favorite Flemish Slipper emerged from the pack to battle for second-place money. Incredible T. pulled away in the final strides to finish three-quarter lengths ahead of Flemish Slipper.

Sir Warbucks' victory was worth \$1,560 to Wood, who resides in Albuquerque. The LaRae Lovell trainee returned \$5.60, \$3.40 and \$2.60. The final time for the 6½ furlongs was 1:17.4—a seasonal best for that distance.

Incredible T., owned by Carl and John Frank Tisdale III from El Paso, collected runner-up money of \$572, and returned mutuels of \$8.80 and \$5.20. Flemish Slipper, racing under the colors of Ellen Hambrick of Canutillo, Texas, paid \$2.60 for the show.

The fourth through fifth races on Saturday's program ran as 400-yard trial divisions for the \$25,000 Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby. Touch Of Essence emerged as the leading contender for that stake after stepping the top qualifying time in the final division to stop the clock in 22.155 seconds.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

THREE SEASONAL BESTS were established over the weekend at Sunland Park Race Track. In Friday's seventh race Amanda Michelle and Real Tau Thing finished first and second to pay the season's top quintela of \$483.40. In Saturday's 10th race, Sir Warbucks posted the season's best clocking over 6½ furlongs sprinting the distance in 1:17.4 seconds. And on Sunday Smashed Groom won the All-American Sale Futurity in 19.88, the best time so far over 400 yards.

TOUCH OF ESSENCE had the top qualifying time of 22.155 seconds in Saturday's trials for the 440-yard Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby, which will be run on December 1. But Jerry Nicodemus, one of the country's leading quarter horse riders, was forced to scratch from the weekend's races at Sunland Park after being injured during a morning workout at Los Alamitos Race Track.

Nicodemus was attempting to get his horse into the starting gate when the animal began backing up and fell over backward. The horse landed on top of the jockey breaking his leg and ankle. He is currently in Ceminelli Hospital in Inglewood, California.

TRAINER G.R. HOWELL posted back-to-back wins with a quarter horse and a thoroughbred in his only entries on Sunday. In the third race, Lookin Em Over won at 400 yards and in the fourth Irish Antics won at 5½ furlongs.

EUGENE O'NEILL didn't let an injury keep him from increasing his big lead in the jockey standings. In

Saturday's third race, Greek Myrtlewood stepped on O'Neill's foot after rearing in the gate, tossing off the jockey.

O'Neill's foot swelled up while waiting for his next mount in the seventh race, but it wasn't enough to keep him from the finish line. Not only did he ride Call American to victory in the seventh, he came back to win on Special Command in the eighth and Pipon Fluke in the ninth.

Those three wins, along with one more on Sunday, earned O'Neill Jockey of the Week for the second week in a row.

Clifford Lambert Sr. also earned Trainer of the Week honors for the second straight time, as he added three more wins to his lead in the standings.

History comes alive at Woman's Club

"Ladies in Ruidoso 40 years ago wouldn't have come to a meeting without wearing a hat," said Genevieve Duncan as she welcomed guests to a reception celebrating the village's 40th birthday.

Hostesses for the Ruidoso Woman's Club party greeted guests in hats and gloves as they remembered the way things were 40 years ago. Ruidoso village officials and administrators were honored guests, and Nell Parks and Daniel Storm shared memories of Ruidoso and Lincoln County.

President Charlotte Jarratt presented a special plaque to Mayor Pro-tem Jerry Shaw for the Village of Ruidoso.

Jackie Rawlins told guests that 18 women organized the Ruidoso Woman's Club on April 14, 1932. It was the first civic organization to be founded in Ruidoso, and Rawlins related many other firsts brought about by the club.

A library to serve the population of about 500 people was one of the club's first projects, said Rawlins. She said a clubmember offered the front room of her home as a repository for the library books, and for 25 cents a year anyone could check out books.

The club supported local schools by purchasing books, playground equipment and a large school bell. Rawlins said the women organized Ruidoso's first PTA in 1934, and later sponsored the first local Girl Scout troop.

During a time of high unemployment, Rawlins said the Woman's Club president wrote a letter to Lincoln County Relief Administration outlining the need for road improvement and for the employment of sanitation workers along the river and around campgrounds.

"She pointed out that this area was now attracting 10,000 visitors a year," said Rawlins.

She said the club, perhaps one of the first groups to promote tourism in Ruidoso, purchased a pictorial advertisement in the "Southwestern Business and Tourist Guide" in 1936, for just \$10.

Also in 1936, said Rawlins, a building fund was established with \$50.

"The most unique achievement of the Woman's Club," noted Rawlins, "was the establishment of the Women's Chamber of Commerce of Ruidoso, the only one of its kind in the United States."

Rawlins said a charter member was quoted as saying, "The men would reorganize every year and by Christmas it had fallen through."

"The first thing they did as a chamber was to purchase a truck and hire two garbage collectors—another first in Ruidoso history," said Rawlins, who then introduced the speakers for the day—Parks and Storm.

Parks, barely tall enough to use the microphone, told of how she, a

Pampa, Texas, school teacher suffering from hay fever, discovered "the beautiful mountains of Ruidoso" 54 years ago. After a three-week vacation at Carter Lodge (now Tall Pines), she said she was ready to leave the Plains and start a new life in the mountains.

With \$300 she had saved and \$300 that she borrowed, Parks said she moved to Ruidoso and lived in a tent while she built Parks Pine Place. Within three weeks she was able to move into the first cabin, she said. It didn't take her much longer to repay the borrowed money, she added.

"Everybody was so kind to the little schoolteacher from Texas," said Parks with a smile.

By July 4 of that first summer, Parks said she rented floor space to 25 people, who slept all over the big cabin on mattresses. She said she added a fireplace for just \$30, and had water delivered for 25 cents.

"My, how we loved it up there," she said, but related how she returned to Texas each fall to teach for the next four years.

Parks had more anecdotes to share of her life as a cabin-operator. Her original cabins, which she sold in 1945, became the Mountain Air cabins; and her lower cabins were where Whispering Pines is now located.

"This town has meant a lot to me," said Storm, who has made his home in the Hondo Valley since 1925. He said he came to New Mexico with his family after living in Alaska, Mexico and El Paso, Texas.

Storm said his family traveled from El Paso in the 1917 Velle automobile which led the Aspen Festival parade this year, and "just followed the ruts of people that went before," since there were no roads.

"We missed Ruidoso," Storm said with a laugh. "We landed down where we are now," he added. The area where the Storms settled was to be Ruidoso Park, a subdivision, but they eventually purchased all the lots.

Storm said Ruidoso used to be called Ruidoso Springs, and was just a "dirt road through the pines." He added that he has watched it grow into "one of the finest cities in the Southwest."

"I'm just proud to have had a little part in it," said Storm, who contributes "The Dreamer" and "The Silver Lining," regular features in The Ruidoso News.





Editorial

When a public body announces that it will discuss a certain topic at a certain time, it must do just that.

Such was not the case at the Monday meeting of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z).

An agenda item—"Don Dorman - informal discussion concerning Grindstone Rescued Community Master Plan for Dorman, Inc."—was discussed prior to the meeting during a workshop session. When the regular session convened, P&Z chairman Mike Callaghan announced that the agenda item had been taken care of during the workshop session, and that no action had been taken.

Wednesday, Callaghan said the discussion took place during the workshop in an effort to make good use of time. He pointed out that a council meeting set for 4 p.m. that day gave the commission just an hour to take care of their business, and since all parties involved in the Dorman agenda item were present at the workshop, a decision was made to handle the matter then.

Callaghan stressed that the decision was not made in an effort to cover anything up. He also pointed out that no action was requested of P&Z nor any taken by P&Z on the agenda item. Callaghan said he would consider the situation more carefully in the future if it should arise again, and probably would not repeat the move.

Whether or not anything of substance was discussed during the workshop, handling a regular agenda item away from public scrutiny endangers a principle that is elemental to our freedom. The principle—that proceedings of public bodies shall be open to the public—is something we believe must be vigorously protected. In this case it was not.—DJP

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Reference was made here recently to those "personal services" contracts out state issues when not a practicing most ordinary citizens are even aware of, but it costs big bucks.

Latest figures from the Management and Contracts Division in our state government (which most people didn't even know we have) show that between July 1 and October 1 of this year \$76,875,997.32 was spent in this fashion.

That's something over \$76 for every man, woman and child in the state, in just this single three-month period.

What part of government do you guess has to have all that high-priced outside expertise? Well, more than \$46 million of that total, or 61 percent of the money spent in this 90 days, was for the Department of Health and Environment. That's not an agency most New Mexicans are particularly fond of, since some find it the one that most intrudes into their personal affairs.

Even the Human Services Department spent only \$7.4 million on such contracts during this period.

Other agencies writing lots of contracts include the Agency on Aging (\$5.4 million), the Highway Department (\$4.6 million) and the Risk Management Division (\$4.2 million), all during the latest quarter-year for which reports are available.

Jim Baca, having failed to enthrone the voters of Albuquerque, will return to his post as our state's Land Commissioner.

In a perfunctory moment in a debate during the big city campaign, he promised that, along with taking no state pay for the period in which he engaged himself elsewhere, he would also pay back the state's contributions to his benefits package (retirement, health insurance and so on) during that same time. If those hearing him report accurately, he even pledged to pay all this back with interest.

He may be sorry he made such a promise. He can be sure the news

media will be waiting to pounce on him if he doesn't do that, fully and soon. (They are also now checking to see how many top-rankers in state government have failed to pay back their student loans.)

Now, of course, Baca is required to have a "residence" in Santa Fe, after the Attorney General ruled that the Constitutional provision on this point is to be taken seriously.

That doesn't mean, of course, that Baca will actually cease living with his wife and children in Albuquerque, and commuting to and from there in a state car, with a driver.

All it really means is that he will keep a change of underwear in a room in the capital city lent him by the attorney for his "home" if he is challenged on the point.

In political matters, even the simplest of words don't always mean what they do in reality.

More Attorney General candidates for next year?

Observers here are still waiting to see if Fernando Macias, state Senator from Dona Ana county, has been so overcome by revulsion at serving in that body that he decides to make a run for AG as a way of escaping. Macias is a Democrat.


Another legislator reportedly eyeing the same race, but as a member of the opposition party, is Albuquerque Representative Hal Statton. He's a conservative doubled and redoubled in spades, who practices law with former Senator Mickey Barnett. The two are sometimes credited and sometimes blamed for making lots of mischief in electoral races last year with media advertising and mailings that may have hurt candidates who did not fit their definition of conservatism.

One of the last legislative points out that the last Legislature granted permission for kids to get most of their education at home.

"The way things are going," he adds, "the next Legislature may make it obligatory."

(Laugh. It doesn't hurt as much as crying.)



When Walterine Hughes broke her ankle sliding into home plate during a women's softball game 33 years ago, it gave her a chance to begin a new sport.

Hughes took up bowling because the sport was "less dangerous". "I walked up to the lane on crutches and rolled the ball down the lane," said Hughes.

Hughes has been bowling ever since then. She has bowled in Ruidoso since 1970 and is one of the top woman bowlers in the area.

But she is just one of many people in the Ruidoso area who take advantage of Jerry Dale's Bowling Center and Holiday Bowl to enjoy one of the country's most popular sports. There are 15 leagues at Jerry Dale's and one at Holiday Bowl.

Hughes participates in the Monday Night Ladies League at Holiday Bowl. She has a single-game high of 279 and a 120-per-game average.

"It's a good way for women to get together," Hughes remarked. "It's a challenge to play and a way to meet new people."

"It's also a nice family game." Gene Scott is one of the top male bowlers in the area, participating in four leagues at Jerry Dale's Bowling Center.

He has a game high of 289 and his highest league average is 190. He competes in many local tournaments and has been bowling in the area for 10 years.

"I just enjoy it," he said when asked why he participates in the bowling leagues. "I like the

competition."

Elaine Garrity is one of the better woman bowlers in Lincoln County. She competes in the Tuesday Morning Ladies League at Jerry Dale's Bowling Center.

"It's good social fun," Garrity commented. "It's fun and it's competitive. It's good for concentration and it's a good winter sport."

Garrity got started in bowling when she was living in Daytona Beach, Florida. Her husband was president of the bowling association there and she became involved in the sport.

Since then, she has become an excellent bowler. Garrity has a 156 average and her high game is 256.

Jack Kannady, the general manager at Jerry Dale's Bowling Center, bowls in a number of leagues there and once competed on the Pro Bowlers Association (PBA) tour.

He still belongs to the PBA but does not compete on the tour anymore. He does participate in monthly regional professional tournaments, however.

Jerry Dale's Bowling Center has leagues for men and women, plus mixed leagues and youth leagues.

Just why is bowling so popular? "It's relatively inexpensive and almost anybody can play it," Kannady answered. "Plus, it's a lot of fun and relaxing."

Add those factors up and it's easy to see why the country's bowling lanes often are crowded.

Sections 20 and 21 provides for severability and repealer clauses.
