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Warriors rally to defeat St. Pius

One down. Two to go. Ruidoso High School's varsity football team advanced to the state AAA-division semi-finals by coming back in the second half to beat St. Pius, 36-21, Friday night in Albuquerque.

The Warriors will now travel to Aztec Saturday, November 30, for a 1:30 p.m. semi-final game. Aztec topped Robertson, 6-2, Saturday to gain a semi-final berth.

But for a while last Friday night, it looked like it might be St. Pius that would be playing in the semi-finals instead of the 10-1 Warriors.

Taking advantage of Warrior mistakes, the Sartans jumped to a 21-7 lead.

That brought the Warriors back to life, however. They closed the gap to 21-15 at halftime and blanked the hosts in the second half, with the aid of two goal-line stands.

"It was our best-ever comeback," said Warrior head coach Cooper Henderson. "We've never been down by two touchdowns before and come back to win. It was a very exciting victory."

St. Pius took the second half kickoff, but on the first play from scrimmage, fumbled and Ruidoso's Shayne Fedrick recovered at the Sartan 14.

A five-yard penalty put the ball back at the 19.

But then quarterback Russell Easter connected with split end Brian Davis for 11 yards to the St. Pius eight.

Michael Williamson picked up seven yards in two plays to put the ball at the one.

Williamson then banged over for the touchdown to tie the score at 21-21. Garret Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso led, 22-21.

Then the Warrior defense showed its stuff.

St. Pius took the ensuing kickoff and drove 51 yards to the Warrior four. The big play in the drive was a 32-yard pass play from Jim Sullivan to Scott Eldridge.

After reaching the four with a first down, the Sartans went to Eldridge four straight times.

Four times, the St. Pius tailback failed to reach the goal line. On the final time, from the one-foot line, Ruidoso's Jeff Willingham crashed

into the St. Pius backfield and tackled Eldridge for a three-yard loss.

Ruidoso took over on downs, but had bad field position and had to punt.

Back came St. Pius. The Sartans drove to the Warrior five only to see a fourth-down field goal attempt go wide.

From then on, it was Ruidoso's game.

The Warriors drove 80 yards in eight plays, capped off by Easter's one-yard touchdown sneak with 9:45 left in the contest.

Henson kicked the extra point and Ruidoso led, 29-21.

The Warriors added their final touchdown on a 23-yard sprint up the middle by Williamson.

Willingham set up the touchdown with an interception (his ninth of the season) at the St. Pius 29.

Williamson scored four plays later.

But it was tough in the first half when St. Pius grabbed its early 21-7 lead.

After the Warriors drove to their 47 on the first series of the game, St. Pius' Joe McIntyre intercepted an Easter pass and raced down the right sideline to the Ruidoso 20.

It took St. Pius five plays to score. Eldridge ran it in from the seven with 6:10 left in the first quarter. McIntyre kicked the extra point and St. Pius led, 7-0.

The Warriors tied the game early in the second period, driving 91 yards in nine plays.

Easter hit Davis with a 13-yard pass over the middle for the score. Henson kicked the extra point and the game was tied 7-7 with 11:56 left in the half.

Easter started the Warrior drive, connecting with tight end Bobby Dickinson for 18 yards to the Warrior 27.

Williamson ran for 28 yards in four carries during the drive. Fullback Billy Harrison added a 25-yard run.

St. Pius failed to move the ball on the ensuing series, but Ruidoso also failed to gain a first down on its next series.

Ruidoso's Jeff Willingham punted the ball from his own 16. One of the St. Pius players caught the ball and handed off to teammate Manny Garcia.

Garcia then rocketed down the

sideline for a 55-yard touchdown, eluding several Warriors in the process.

The extra point kick was good and St. Pius led, 14-7.

On Ruidoso's next series, disaster struck again.

St. Pius' Tim Rizek intercepted an Easter pass at the Sartan 49, and sprinted 51 yards for another touchdown.

Again, the extra point kick was good and St. Pius led, 21-7.

The third Sartan touchdown brought joy and yelling from the St. Pius side of the stadium. On the other side, the Warrior fans were silent and gloomy.

However, that did not last for long.

Davis returned the kickoff 95 yards for an apparent score, outracing the final St. Pius defender at the 50.

But a clipping penalty nullified the touchdown and Ruidoso had to start from its 19.

The Warriors then drove 81 yards in nine plays.

Easter's 22-yard run put the ball at the Sartan's 42.

Easter ran for 19 yards in two more carries and completed a nine-yard pass to Davis to put the ball at St. Pius' eight.

From there, Easter found Dickinson in the end zone for the touchdown.

Willingham took the snap for the two-point conversion and banged it over, giving St. Pius a 21-15 lead at halftime.

The second half was all Ruidoso as the Warriors gained their 10th win of the season and a second straight berth in the state semi-finals.

Ruidoso gained 376 yards total offense to just 146 for the losers.

Williamson led the Warrior ground game with 107 yards in 17 carries. Easter added 75 yards in nine carries. Harrison had 49 in nine carries and Bryan Alexander picked up 25 in three carries.


Easter completed 10 of 18 passes for 126 yards and two touchdowns. Eldridge led the St. Pius ground game with 57 yards in 18 carries.

"It was a great defensive effort," Henderson said. "Those two goal-line stands were tremendous."

Now the Warriors must prepare for Aztec, a team that lost to Artesia in the state finals last season.

"They're probably stronger defensively than offensively," Henderson remarked.

NOTE: Silver City will host Grants in the other semi-final game Friday night, November 29. Silver City defeated Bloomfield, 27-0, and Grants outscored St. Michaels, 14-7, in the other play-off game over the weekend.

Ski Apache is ready to go

Ski Apache Resort manager Roy Parker reported that the resort will begin the 1985-86 season this week on Thanksgiving Day with many lifts open.

Parker said the resort has received just three inches of natural snow, but snowmaking efforts have been under way for the past three weeks every night temperatures have permitted.

He said Chairs 3 and 5, serving the beginner areas, Chair 4 serving Capitan and Deep Freeze, and

Chair 2 to midway serving Silver Bear will be open.

Snowmaking capabilities of the resort can make snow at a rate of more than one million gallons of water a night if conditions permit, allowing the area to cover trails quickly and thoroughly sometimes during a single evening, reported mountain manager Denny Groves.

But natural snow will make a difference when it arrives. "A snow storm would bury everything," Parker said. "We are hoping."

Attorney general charges Chateau de la Shay

North American Developments, Inc., doing business as Chateau de la Shay, is being charged with violations of the New Mexico Unfair Trade Practices Act by the New Mexico Attorney General's Office, according to a press release from that office.

"We have received more complaints about Chateau de la Shay than any other time share operation," Attorney General Paul Bardacke said. "Our Consumer Protection Division has been literally deluged with complaints from dissatisfied time share customers

Our office is taking aim at those whom we consider to be the worst offenders."

The charges stem from North American's promotions and sales of time share interests at its condominium and recreational vehicle developments in Ruidoso and Timberon, according to Kenneth Cassutt of the Attorney General's office.

The suit, filed in District Court in Alamogordo, focuses on various deceptive practices allegedly used by the company to encourage customers to attend sales presentations at Chateau de la Shay and to purchase time share interests, according to the release.

One allegation charges that North American Developments, through various telephone solicitations and promotional mailings, failed to reveal hidden terms and conditions in promises of vacations to Hawaii or Mexico, and cruises to the Bahamas. The suit alleges, for example, that notices informing someone they had "won" a Hawaiian vacation for six days and five nights failed to reveal that the "winner" would be required to purchase a second round-trip airfare through a second company, at an inflated cost, the release states.

Another allegation in the suit charges North American with selling time share interests in units that had not yet been built, then misrepresenting the completion dates for construction of those units. Additionally, the suit alleges that North American misrepresented the rental value and investment potential of the time share units at Chateau de la Shay.

The suit also alleges that North American refused to allow prospective purchasers the opportunity to examine and reflect on conditions of the sale before making a decision to purchase. Also, customers were encouraged to purchase through "unlawful" promises of cash payments for "chain referrals" of acquaintances to Chateau de la Shay, the suit alleges.

Other allegations also were included in the suit. The suit seeks restitution for purchasers involved in transactions that included "any unfair, deceptive or unconscionable practice."

Injunctive relief also is sought to stop all practices alleged to be unlawful, and the attorney general seeks civil penalties of \$5,000 for each willful violation of the Unfair Trade Practices Act.

Jim Smith, vice president and director of marketing for Chateau de la Shay, could not be reached for comment.

Burglary is under investigation

Carrizo Lodge was apparently burglarized November 17, and about \$4,500 in cash was taken, reported Charlie Cox, Lincoln County undersheriff. Cox said the Lincoln County Sheriff's office was notified of the burglary on November 18, and is investigating the loss.

Cox said there were signs of

forceable entry into the office in which a safe was located, and the dial was knocked off the safe in which the money had been secured.

Principal investigator on the case is Pete Esquibel, who is being assisted by Mike Lee and Byron Baker, all of the sheriff's department, said Cox.

Happy Anniversary to Dick and Zula Bunt. William Sherman Bunt, affectionately known as "Dick," and the former Zula Coffman were married November thirty, 1935, in Pittsburg, Texas.

It so happens that Dick's brother, Clarence, and the former Bennie Bazar were married two weeks later on December 14, 1935.

Therefore Dick and Zula's son Kenny, and Clarence and Bennie's son, Ronny, have sponsored a joint celebration of the two golden anniversaries, mid-way between the two dates, on December seven.

The celebration will take place at the Rio Rancho Country Club, in Rio Rancho, New Mexico, from twelve noon until three o'clock in the afternoon.

All friends of these two well-beloved couples are cordially invited to attend the celebration. And also I know that Dick and Zula will in the meantime receive many messages of congratulations and blessings at their home in Ruidoso Downs.

Both Dick and Zula had a farm background, and Dick had been working in the timber industry since boyhood. They headed for New Mexico in 1936, first to Albuquerque and then various places in the state.

They moved to Ruidoso Downs in March 1958, where they live today, and have become two of the favorite people of this famous little city.

Here Dick continued his work for the Valley Lumber Company at the old saw mill that used to stand near where Frank's Fruit Market now stands. At the same time, he was "trouble shooter" for four other mills of the company in Hondo, Weed and Mayhill.

During his life here in Ruidoso Downs, Dick has served as city councilman and Mayor.

Under General Patton in World War II

A movie or novel would be hard-pressed to come closer to descriptions of war in the European theater than Dick Bunt's brief description of his experiences, especially in the Normandy Invasion.

He was in General Patton's army in the 38th-82nd Quartermaster Truck Company.

"We put the ammo and fuel in General Patton's tanks sometimes seventy miles ahead of the infantry. We drove back seventy-two hours without sleep in a stretch," Dick remembers.

He told of one incident of night bombing in which an amphibious unit in front of them and a tank unit behind were wiped out by bombs, while his organization in the middle escaped.

"We traveled every road in France and followed Patton," said Dick.

He served from 1942 to 1946 with two years overseas, serving in England, Ireland, Belgium, Austria, France and Germany.

In trying to describe the Normandy Invasion, Dick said it was hard to believe, almost beyond the imagination.

"For eight solid hours the sky was filled with airplanes going and coming overhead," Dick recalls.

Dick is one of the most modest fellows in the world, not given to talking about himself. He would have said nothing if I hadn't brought up the matter of his military service. Therefore it was a rare privilege to hear him tell of his war experience.

"Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could take the lives and effort and money that we spend on wars and feed the hungry people of the world," said Dick with a sigh, in remembering back through the years.

This is Dick Bunt's kind heart shining through. We rejoice that after all he has been through he is happy at home with his devoted and charming wife. We wish them all congratulations, and blessings on their golden anniversary.

coach James Sanchez. "I think we held our own, particularly when our starters were in."


"The girls got a chance to look at some AAAA-division and AAA-division Alamogordo first and they are the defending state AAAA-division champions."

However, with the score tied 30-30, the Braves' Rusty Silva stole a Holloman pass and scored on a layup for a 32-30 Ruidoso lead.


The Braves never trailed after that.

Well, the college football bowl season is almost here. Within a few weeks, most of the top teams in the country will be playing in or preparing for a bowl game.

And undoubtedly, we'll have some debate in early January as to which team is really the best in the country.

There's no way of really deciding a national champion unless you have a playoff system similar to the one that exists in college basketball.

And that's not likely to happen. The bowl committees have too much power and too much money riding on the bowl games to let a college playoff system be organized. The cities involved also have big stakes in the bowl games.

But there's something to be said for bowl games.

The big bowl games, like the Rose Bowl, Cotton Bowl, Orange Bowl, Sugar Bowl and Fiesta Bowl have become major attractions on New Year's Day.

College football would seem to be incomplete without these bowl games. They've been going on for so long they're permanent fixtures on the college football scene.

Some of the bigger bowl games have parades associated with them. Huge television audiences watch both the parades and the games on New Year's Day.

Bowl games like the Rose Bowl and the Cotton Bowl have teams from the same leagues playing in them every year.

The Rose Bowl has had the Pac-10 Conference and Big-10 Conference champions play each other every year since the end of World War II.

The Cotton Bowl traditionally has the Southwest Conference champion acting as the host team. Usually one of the country's top teams takes on the Southwest Conference champion each year.

Big games are also common in the Orange Bowl, Sugar Bowl and Fiesta Bowl.

In fact, the Orange Bowl probably has had the best attractions the past few seasons, particularly the 1984 game which featured the University of Nebraska and the University of Miami battling for the top ranking in the polls.

So it's unlikely that we'll have a national college football playoff system in the near future.

And judging from the success of the college bowl games, maybe it's not that bad a situation.

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
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

P&Z restricts subdivisions

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) took a hard line on subdivision growth at their November meeting Thursday in Carrizozo.

Bill Seelbach, after being absent for a number of months, chaired the meeting in which he questioned a request for an additional block in Unit 1 of the Rancho Ruidoso Village subdivision.

Tim Collins of Burke-Collins Associates, a Ruidoso engineering firm, said developers presented Block 2 because they felt it to be more economical to plat the entire area at this time.

Seelbach said he thought developers actually were creating a Type 1 subdivision (one containing five hundred or more parcels) in the Rancho Ruidoso area by requesting additional blocks and units.

Seelbach objected to the entire development because he said in the past the subdivisions came to P&Z as Type 3 subdivisions, which do not require paved roads or community sewer and water systems. He said he thought the entire area, including Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates, was large enough to be classified as a Type 1 subdivision, requiring a community water and sewer system and paved roads.

Collins, representing Rancho Ruidoso Corporation, said that the corporation was not connected with the Stanton Corporation which developed Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates. He said the Rancho Ruidoso Village developers plan to include a central sewer and water system in the village masterplan.

Collins also requested a variance for paving roads in the Rancho Ruidoso Village Units 1 and 2. P&Z previously approved the conference review plat for Block 1 of the village as a Type 2 subdivision (paved roads are required in a Type 2 subdivision).

P&Z members agreed that the county could avoid future water,

sewer and road problems with the subdivisions by considering the area as a Type 1 subdivision. The commission unanimously approved that consideration and denied the paving variance for units 1 and 2.

P&Z continued to take a hard line on subdivisions when they denied a replat of six lots in Pine Point Estates. Collins, representing developer John Hall, said that the access for the lots in the Fort Stanton Road area, which P&Z approved six months ago, was not feasible for the developer. The replat showed access to the lots by a 500-foot cul-de-sac.

Seelbach voiced his disapproval of the cul-de-sac. "Tell your (Collins') customers to read the book (subdivision regulations) and that's what we're going to do. We approved it (the plat with no road) once and that's the way it stands," Seelbach said.

Collins replied that he reflects the developers' wishes in the engineering plans he presents to P&Z, with no intentions of "badgering" the commission for approval of the plans.

Commissioner Ben Hall said that P&Z could send any unsuitable plans back to the developer with explanations for the rejection. P&Z then rejected the variance because of the cul-de-sac.

In other business P&Z: —Approved a preliminary plat review of the Mountain Lakes Subdivision for referral to state agencies with the stipulation that horses not be allowed. Developer Gary Caughn's original plan, to allow two horses per lot, was questioned by commissioner Betty Shreengost because of the potential damage to the terrain.

—Approved a preliminary plat of Alto Townhomes, Lot 4, Block 2 of Alto Lakes Golf & Country Club, Unit 3, as developed by Hal Cliff, for referral to the state agencies.

—Postponed the final plat review of Salado Creek Flats Subdivision developed by Hall Brothers, Incorporated.

Capitan sets municipal election

At their Monday meeting, the Capitan Board of Trustees set March 4, 1986, as election day for the positions of mayor, two trustees and municipal judge and a \$600,000 general obligation bond for water improvements.

Trustees Benny Coker and Norm Renfro voted for the election. Trustee Kelly Beavers voted against it because he said the language for the bond was too vague. Beavers wanted the language to specify the priorities in spending the bond if it passes.

Beavers said he thought part of the money should be used to improve the filter plant. Many present agreed with Beavers. Coker replied that the priorities could be included on the bond question.

The positions in the election include the four-year terms for mayor and municipal judge. The four-year trustee positions held by Coker and Ann Goodwin also are open for election. Goodwin, who was not present at the meeting Monday, was appointed in October to fill the vacancy created by Bill Allred. Allred was appointed by the board to fill a vacancy created when elected trustee Sharon Horton resigned.

Any person wishing to declare candidacy must do so by the end of regular business hours, Tuesday, January 7, 1986, at Capitan Village Hall.

A group of concerned citizens was present at the meeting to support David Rouleau, a local physician

who presented an unofficial petition with 430 signatures. The petitioners expressed concern for the village filter plant, questioning why grant funds were apparently transferred from the filter plant to the new well.

Rouleau listed other questions concerning the quantity of water rights available to the village. The quality of the water in the well and the effects on the water after continual use were also questioned. The petitioners also wanted to know the plans for the Eagle Creek water system as it concerns the village and the future plans for the filter plant.

Rouleau also presented a historical perspective of the village's water problems since 1983; from water usage to information used for the water improvement grant application.

Coker commended Rouleau for his research on the water situation. He recounted the history of the filter plant, saying that the village applied for grant funds to improve the filter when the village had only one source of water. Since then, the village drilled the well for an alternative source which could be used in times of emergency, Coker said. He stressed that the excessive silt problem recently experienced would have happened even with a new filter.

Coker said that if the well was in operation it could be used to supplement the water, instead of using the contaminated Bonito Lake water. Coker and Mayor Dave Cummins

are members of the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association. Coker told of a proposal in the association to take water directly from Eagle Creek to Capitan, bypassing the Bonito system. Coker said he did not want to see the village drop the Bonito system, because the village now has a "good working relationship with Alamogordo."

He opined that if the village drops the Bonito water it will not be available again. He said the village would need a supplemental source of water if this happens because Eagle Creek sometimes is dry.

Trustee Renfro said he was told by local environmentalists that it was "utterly ridiculous not to bring the well water to town."

Cummins said he felt the well would be used by everyone in the village. He opined that the village will grow to the extent that Eagle Creek and Bonito Lake will not be enough to supply all the needs. He said he wanted to look to the future by pursuing other sources.

Cummins commended the board for its accomplishments in the last two years. "We're trying, we're not sitting here idle," he said.

Cummins stressed that the village will not give up the western sources of water (Bonito and Eagle Creek). He agreed the village needs a new filter plant, but not as extensive as previously planned if the well supplements the village water system.

Also Monday, Beavers pointed

out the deficit in the village budget. He said that spending exceeded the projected budget by 29 percent. He wanted to see a "cap put on spending." The trustees agreed that spending be curtailed. Village clerk Virginia Spall said that village gross receipt revenues were down from last year's. She opined that the problem was compounded by tardy and incomplete payments of the receipts the village is due from the state.

On the positive side, Beavers reported that the water department profited 5.4 percent over last year.

In other business the trustees: —Approved the public hearing dates for the proposed Planning and Zoning Village Subdivision Regulations. The public hearings will be at 5:50 p.m. December 9; 7 p.m. January 13; and 7 p.m. February 10, for the final hearing at village hall.

—Heard a report from village road superintendent Guy Henley about spending money to meet the cooperative road improvement agreements made with the state Highway Department. The trustees agreed that Henley should contact the state department about reimbursements while the program is in progress.

—Approved the sale of the village garbage truck to Wayne Hobbs for \$3,300 as specified in his contract for solid waste disposal.

—Postponed the adoption of the uniform traffic code until the December 9 meeting.

Capitan students may study abroad

A year-long stay in a foreign country may become a reality for four area students.

Valerie Garner, Jed Hall and Angie Trujillo, all seniors at Capitan High School, and Kim Van-Winkle, a senior at Ruidoso High School, have one more step in the process of being selected as foreign exchange students by the Rotary Club.

The students and their parents recently traveled to Roswell for interviews on a district level. The district includes Alpine, Van Horn and El Paso, Texas and all of New Mexico. The students were among 50 interviewed in Roswell.

Trujillo, Hall and Garner said the interviews involved questions about how each one would respond to different situations in the foreign countries—such as drinking wine with dinner, dealing with unruly children in the host family and not being able to drive for a whole year.

Hall and Trujillo said they applied for the program last year as well as this year. Hall said he was interested enough in the program to apply again. Hall said he chose Australia or New Zealand for his host country. Trujillo and Garner chose Italy, but all of them said they would take any country. Van-Winkle chose Holland for her host country.

John Howden, a member of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Rotary Club, is a district exchange officer and coordinator for Canada and Mexico. Howden said the students meet in Alamogordo in the final stage of interviewing and observation.

Howden said that the district applicants will meet during the second weekend in December at the School for the Visually Handicapped in Alamogordo. The students will have opportunities to meet exchange students from 20 different countries who are living with host

families in this district. During the weekend the selection committee will observe the students' behavior and interaction with others, Howden said.

The students become ambassadors for the United States and the Rotary Clubs, making it necessary for the seven-member committee to choose the most qualified applicants, Howden said. The selection is "very hard," Howden added.

The applicants will enjoy a weekend of activities in Alamogordo, including a tour of Holloman Air Force Base, a picnic at White Sands National Monument and a disco dance. The applicants also will ski at Ski Cloudcroft for a small fee compliments of the owners, Tom

Jenny Dorgan, Howden said. Rotary, which has clubs in 157 countries, sponsors the year-long exchange program for any high school student 16-19 years old with a B grade average.

Garner, Hall and Trujillo are excited about the possibility of becoming exchange students, even if they can't drive for a whole year. The applicants will receive notice of acceptance or rejection in January.

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

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Board refinances bonds, saves schools \$123,000

Ruidoso Municipal School District tax rates will be reduced next year since members of the School Board approved refinancing five outstanding bond issues.

In a special Thursday morning meeting, board members approved the refinancing which, according to bonding agents at the meeting, will lower the bond interest rates paid by a full two percent.

Cy Rilee, president of Rilee and Associates of Albuquerque, provided a schedule that showed current school tax rates of \$10.63 per \$1,000 of property valuation, compared with the new rates after the refinancing of \$8.65 per \$1,000 valuation.

Rilee said the bond transaction, set to close on December 31, will save taxpayers nearly \$2 per \$1,000 property valuation.

The board also learned that the school district will experience sav-

ings of over \$123,000 due to the refinancing.

Besides the reduction in current tax rates and the upfront savings to the district, the move will give the school district the capacity to issue as much as \$2 million in bonds over the next two years, with little increase to taxpayers, according to Rilee.

"We anticipate building in three years," said Sid Miller, superintendent of schools. He said he didn't want to do anything that might jeopardize the district's bonding capability.

"Regardless of what you do, you will have established a lower base from which to start," said Rilee.

According to Rilee's schedule, the district school tax would go to \$11.57 per \$1,000 valuation if voters elect to issue \$2 million in bonds. That would be an increase of less

than a dollar over today's rates, he said.

"Instead of five bond issues, you'll have one," remarked Rilee, who added that local accounting procedures should be simplified by that change.

Rilee said his company will now finalize the refinancing process, and then recommend a financial institution to act as paying agent for the schools.

"That bank will be responsible for paying the old bonds," said Rilee.

After questioning Rilee on the details of the bonding proposals, board members voted unanimously to accept the 29-page document and go ahead with the refinancing.

Board secretary Lynn Willard and member Lamar Osbourn were not at the meeting.

Airport commissioners continue construction planning process

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) met Thursday, and reviewed plans for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport (SBRA) prepared by Leeds-Hill-Herkenhoff, engineers for the airport project.

"This really is a functional design just for SBRA," said engineer Earl Cook. He compared the future facilities to those at the Grand Canyon airport.

Cook said the expected mixture of small single engine planes, executive jets and carriers has been carefully considered in designing the airport. He said his staff will work closely with Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris on operational details and "fine-tuning" the design.

Commissioner Conrad Buchanan recommended that Morris visit the Grand Canyon airport, and the group agreed that such a visit would be beneficial.

It was learned at the meeting that loading ramps from aircraft into the terminal are not planned.

"We don't see any commercial," said Clint Dodge of Leeds-Hill-Herkenhoff, who added that commercial planes would be principal users of such ramps. He said the ramps are normally designed for multi-story terminals, and SBRA will have a one-story building.

Cook reported that his company is negotiating with utility companies about service to the airport site, and Fred Heckman, Chairman of SBAC, cautioned that the subject should be "handled with care."

Cook said conversations have occurred with Otero Electric Cooperative and Contel. He said the

engineers are recommending that butane be used for some airport functions.

Water will be needed for domestic consumption and for fire protection, said Cook, who said he recommends constructing and equipping two wells to be used alternately for both functions. A ground-level storage tank is also planned, he said.

"The wells, we believe, are going to be very expensive," said Cook, who reminded commissioners that the water development expense will not be eligible for reimbursement by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). He said another alternative would be to construct just one well, and increase the size of the storage tank to provide plenty of water in case of fire.

Soil percolation tests are already being performed, said Cook, who said locations will be recommended for sanitary wastewater disposal.

Engineers said they're incorporating some cost-cutting proposals into their preliminary cost estimates. Cook said some savings might be achieved by postponing construction of the crosswind runway, achieving desired pavement thickness in stages and installing retroreflective markers instead of lighting on the taxiway.

Fred Heckman, SBAC chairman, said the group would be discussing right of way acquisition in an executive session, because of "potential litigation." Commissioners also discussed an engineering bill in executive session, before reconvening to approve paying the \$104,000 invoice.

Heckman reported that

everything is going according to schedule with the Bureau of Land Management, and that agency will submit land requests for patents on December 15.

Everything will come together in the middle of December said Heckman. He said an FAA funding report will be complete on December 15, a public hearing on the environmental assessment is set for December 16, the commission will meet on December 19 and final engineering plans should be complete on December 20.

Buchanan asked whether archaeological sites discovered at the airport site would impact the schedule, and Heckman said they should cause no problems. The two or three sites of any importance are located near U.S. Forest Service land, far from the runway, explained Heckman.

Commissioner Ken Nosker told engineers, since they have crews working at the site, "seems like they could help us out."

"Kick dirt on some of those things and we wouldn't have them in our way," he said.

When questioned by engineers about local and state funding, Heckman said an agreement is in sight with the Village of Ruidoso. He added that the agreement depends on FAA funding capabilities and decisions.

Heckman, when contacted by telephone Friday, said next month's meeting will be a critical one. Commissioners will discuss the environmental assessment, funding report, report from the Village of Ruidoso Airport Liaison Committee and engineers report.

Post office says wrap it well

"Mail early and wrap it right," is the advice being given Christmas mailers by Bernie Lechman, Ruidoso Postmaster, and Shirlene Fitzner, Ruidoso Downs Postmaster.

The two area postmasters offer the following recommendations for holiday postal customers to be sure holiday parcels are safely delivered.

—1. Don't box yourself in—use the right container. Boxes must be large enough, have space for cushioning material and be sturdy. Boxes need not be wrapped, but printing on unwrapped boxes should be removed or marked out. Paper used to wrap parcels should be at least 60-pound weight (equivalent to most grocery bags). Fiberboard tubes may be mailed providing the length does not exceed 10 times the girth.

—2. Give yourself some cushion. Good cushioning materials to absorb and distribute shock and vibration are foamed plastic, corrugated cardboard and loose fill material such as polystyrene, popcorn or shredded newspaper. Loose fill material should completely cover the items being mailed.

—3. Close parcels correctly. Use tape, not string or rope, to properly close parcels to be mailed. Pressure sensitive, filament-reinforced tape is recommended rather than cellophane or masking tape, and the tape should be wrapped around the parcel at least twice.

—4. Remember that addresses are important. A great deal of time and money may be spent on wrapping, but a package will never reach its destination if it is not clearly and correctly addressed. Besides labeling the outside of the package with a carefully printed or typed ad-

dress, the sender should also enclose the name and address inside the box in case the address label comes off.

—5. Don't mail a pet elephant. Packages must not exceed 70 pounds. They must be at least three and a half inches wide and five inches long, and total length and girth cannot exceed 108 inches.

—6. Don't overinsure. Since the Postal Service pays claims based on the actual value of lost or damaged items, and not a higher insured amount, insure items mailed according to actual values.

Lechman and Fitzner assure postal patrons that following their six suggestions will help get packages delivered to the desired destination on time and in good shape.

"Make sure your love arrives in time," said the two postmasters. "Mail early!"

Keeping Ruidoso beautiful is a community project

It's here ... KRB!

That's right, KEEP RUIDOSO BEAUTIFUL, a serious challenge from the Cleanup and Beautification Committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, is here.

The challenge—to KEEP RUIDOSO BEAUTIFUL—is made to every citizen in the village.

During a Wednesday meeting of the chamber cleanup committee, also known as the KRB Committee, members agreed that instilling civic pride in the citizenry is the first step to implementing the group's stated goal—to KEEP RUIDOSO BEAUTIFUL.

The committee addressed a number of concerns in an open letter to concerned citizens of Ruidoso. Following are parts of that letter:

WHY IS LITTER A SERIOUS PROBLEM?

No one likes seeing litter-strewn streets, neighborhoods, business sites and recreation grounds, but few of us are aware of the unseen damage litter does, such as:

- Wastes money—litter lowers property values, drives away businesses, discourages tourism and leads to neighborhood decay.
- Pollutes water—Runoffs carrying litter from streets and curbsides add to water pollution problems.
- Starts fires—Accumulations of flammable litter increase the risk of fires.
- Threatens safety—Littered glass and metals pose a safety risk to children and pedestrians.
- Threatens health—Litter attracts and harbors disease-

carrying rodents and insects.

WHO LITTERS?

Research shows that litter comes from seven major sources, four related to business and industry and three to the general public. They are:

- Household refuse storage sites
- Pedestrians
- Motorists
- Commercial refuse storage sites
- Loading/unloading operations
- Construction sites
- Uncovered trucks.

WHY DO PEOPLE LITTER?

For three basic reasons: (1) they feel no sense of personal ownership of the property, (2) they know someone else will clean up after them and (3) they see litter already accumulated.

CAN LITTER BE CONTROLLED?

Yes! Litter prevention begins at home. Teach children that littering is wrong, unhealthy and harmful to the environment. Practice what you teach by keeping your house and surrounding property litter-free.

Education on proper waste-handling should also be taught at school and in play areas.

Controlling litter in the community begins with each individual taking some responsibility. One small way to begin is by carrying a litter bag in your car at all times, and using it. When walking, pick up litter and dispose of it in a public receptacle.

Help to monitor littering in your neighborhood by reporting violators to the Village of Ruidoso,

258-4014, or to members of the cleanup committee.

Report motorists who throw litter from their cars—record the vehicle type, color and license number, call KRB.

Members of the business community can do their part by providing containers in convenient locations for customers to easily dispose of wrappings and other materials. Clean up litter that hasn't been placed in containers.

Have adequate litter receptacles at construction sites and clean up scattered litter daily.

Make sure all company vehicles have litter bags, and see that all loose cargo is firmly secured.

A large-item pickup service of the Village of Ruidoso is available to help individuals keep property clean. The village is divided into 14 districts, and the garbage truck is assigned to certain districts each day. To find out districts, call the Village of Ruidoso, or check maps posted at the Ruidoso Post Office.

In closing the committee made this plea:

P&Z works on Zoning Ordinance

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) met Thursday in a workshop session to continue reviewing changes to a proposed zoning ordinance. That ordinance, prepared by planners from BRW, Inc., has been carefully reviewed by a P&Z sub-committee headed by commissioner Martin Rose.

Members of the Ruidoso Village Council were invited to participate in the workshop, and Village Councillor Victor Alonso questioned the commission about paying requirements he heard discussed at a previous workshop.

"We have no provision in here to force anybody to pave," said Rose. Alonso expressed concern about adopting an ordinance that is too restrictive, especially in the area of paving since, he said "fully half the public streets are not paved."

"I thought what we were doing here is making a plan to improve," said commissioner Mary Underwood.

"All I want to do is not impact the smaller business guy that will improve at his own pace," said Alonso.

Commissioners decided to require that developers pave parking

lots on businesses large enough to require 14 parking spaces, the same number at which a handicapped parking space becomes a requirement.

Further discussions were on requirements in the ordinance for topographical maps showing four-foot slope intervals.

Audience member Mike Mulholland told the group that the village has topographical maps available with five-foot intervals.

"Does this body want to compete with local surveyors by providing these prints?" asked Paul Davis, village enforcement officer.

"If we're going to start selling things right and left, I'm not going to get any work done," he said.

The group decided to handle language in sections dealing with topographical drawings requirements, calling for five-foot or less.

Members of both groups then discussed outdoor vendors, outdoor displays and transient vendors.

Village Councillor Jerry Shaw said she gets complaints about outdoor displays, and added that they "ruin the looks" of downtown.

Davis said he sells itinerant mer-

chant permits for \$100 for five days, and business licenses for \$25 for the year. He said itinerant merchants have to provide bathroom facilities, but those obtaining business licenses have no such requirement.

"If they pay for a permit and sales tax, I don't have any problem with that," said P&Z member David Smith.

"The taco wagon rolls into town ... what does he have invested in the town?" asked Alonso, who named several regulations governing full-time businesses.

Rose suggested that the question be postponed for a public hearing, adding "that's an eight-hour session."

Discussions followed on the location of an architectural review committee to handle zoning appeals. P&Z members decided to act as a review board through sub-committees.

Portions of the ordinance were complete, and their review during the Thursday session.

P&Z members Don Shaw and Reed Stirman and Village Councillor Bill Karr were not present for the workshop.

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
