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Commissioners blame treasurer for near loss of \$1 million

When First National Bank of Lincoln County was declared insolvent and closed by the United States Office of the Comptroller of the Currency Friday evening, Lincoln County stood to lose \$1.6 million in uninsured accounts.

The county's money became safe when the First National Bank of Alamogordo purchased the bank Monday, forming the Lincoln National Bank of Ruidoso. The Lincoln County Board of County Commissioners met Monday afternoon to discuss the potential loss and issue a statement to the press.

County attorney Steve Sanders read the statement, which details the problem and places the responsibility for the uninsured funds on County Treasurer Florence Vega.

According to the statement, the commissioners had directed Vega on June 21 to keep no more than \$750,000 in the First National Bank of Lincoln County account. On December 4, commission chairman Bill Elliott ordered the treasurer (through account manager Suzanne Cox) to remove \$1 million from all accounts at First National Bank of Lincoln County.

When the bank closed, the commission learned that the county treasurer had not followed the commission's directives to check the amount in the county's checking accounts to \$750,000, nor had she taken any action to withdraw \$1 million in certificates of deposits and checking until the day before the bank failure," read Sanders.

According to the statement, the commission learned that it had \$2.9 million in a checking account at the failed bank, with \$1.6 million of it unsecured. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) would pay \$1,120,000 on the dollar, leaving \$1,200,000 in jeopardy.

During the weekend, the commissioners and local bankers contacted Senator Pete Domenici and other congressmen. Domenici contacted the FDIC chairman in Washington, D.C., to request a time extension so that interested parties could prepare and submit merger proposals. As a result of Domenici's request, FDIC reopened and extended the bidding period until 1 p.m. Monday.

Mel O'Reilly, a Ruidoso attorney and director of the Bank of Ruidoso, met with Sanders and devised a plan for the county to retain all but \$150,000 of its money. The plan called for Ruidoso State Bank and Bank of Ruidoso each to put in \$75,000 and

for the county to put in \$150,000, to make a \$300,000 bid to buy the bank.

The group was outbid by \$15,000 by First National Bank of Alamogordo, who bought the bank. "I'm extremely proud that the events came out OK," said Ruidoso State Bank president Richard "Buz" Browning before the meeting Monday.

Bank of Ruidoso president Ralph Petty said he made the offer to help save the taxpayers' money. He said the two banks pulled together to help the community. Petty said that all the New Mexico congressmen helped, but Domenici was instrumental in securing the time extension.

When contacted Tuesday, Domenici said he had been very

concerned when he learned of the county's problem.

"If things went on as planned, the county would have lost money collected for the schools and communities," said Domenici.

"For our county and the people who depend on the money, it would have been a disastrous year," he said. "Clearly, the local banks and the county needed more time to see if they should bid."

The senator said he was thrilled and pleased when he heard the county's money was safe.

Although the question of the money's safety was settled when the bank was purchased, the issue of responsibility was not. According to the statement, the commission requested Vega's resignation Sunday night.

Although she did not comment at Monday's meeting, Vega issued a statement on Tuesday afternoon. She states that she fulfilled her duties in a "professional and responsible manner," which will be made apparent when the state auditor's report becomes public record on December 31.

"The facts contained in the County Commission's December 16 press release are incomplete and are consequently both misleading and inaccurate," stated Vega, ending the release with a statement that she would not resign from her office.

When contacted Wednesday, Vega said she had transferred the money as directed.

"How did I know the bank would close," she said.

Vega's attorney, Ron Harris, would not comment on the case. "It's not appropriate to start a press war with the county commissioners," he said.

At Monday's meeting, Petty spoke on Vega's behalf.

"In defense of the treasurer, I have seen checks for \$1 million that were deposited today," said Petty. "In her books, she didn't know she had so much."

Petty explained that the money came in faster than it went out, with delays in check processing.

"If not for timing, the \$1 million would have been transferred," said Petty.

Petty said that the county had not

followed the state law (item 6-10-36) which requires public money to be diversified among banks and saving and loan institutions within county lines. According to the law, the distribution must be proportional to each institution's net worth.

The majority of the county funds were in First National Bank of Lincoln County, which had bid favorably on their accounts.

Petty said the county's funds should have been removed from First National Bank of Lincoln County (formerly Moncor) six months ago, when the bank ceased to have capital surplus. He said the problem would have been avoided if the county had "diversified funds, like the law says, rather than bid at a failing bank."

"Follow the capital base as published in the quarterly call reports," O'Reilly told the commission. "When you see it go to zero, get the money out."

First National Bank of Lincoln County had a negative net worth in recent call reports.

"I plead ignorance," said Elliott. "I'm not a banker. Traditionally, the treasurer takes care of these things."

Sanders said Vega was advised in June to diversify the funds, phasing them out of Moncor slowly because the bank could not stand a significant decrease in funds. The money was to have been moved by September.

It was not done, to his knowledge," said the county attorney. "At that point, there was no risk. We were secured 100 percent."

The commission's statement said that as late as November 18, the county was given written assurances by First National Bank of Lincoln County that its money was "safe and completely secured." County officials and commission members were warned of the bank problems beginning December 4, said Cox.

Petty said Tuesday that he had discussed the diversification law with Elliott and Commissioner Ken Nasker and vice Nasker as a copy of the law.

"That's what we were working on when we went to the bank in June and Nasker on Wednesday," Petty said. "At that time, we were assured our money was safe."

The commission is scheduled to review its bank account on Friday with banks today. The hearing on December 19 at the Lincoln County office at 11 a.m.

First National Bank of Ruidoso

'Brand new bank' opens for business

Ruidoso has a new bank. First National Bank of Ruidoso is open and doing business in the former First National Bank of Lincoln County building on Mechem Drive.

The new bank opened Tuesday morning, following the Friday evening closure of the First National Bank of Lincoln County by the United States office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC). The OCC declared the bank - formerly held by the now-bankrupt Moncor, Inc. - insolvent, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) took over the bank Friday evening.

The new bank - First National Bank of Ruidoso - is owned by the holding company of First Alamogordo Bancorp, Inc. which owns the First National Bank of Alamogordo. This is the second bank for the holding company.

First National Bank of Alamogordo bought the bank Monday, after the bidding period was re-opened by FDIC. On Friday, FDIC rejected all bids and opted to close the bank and pay off its depositors. Bid specifications were modified when the bidding was re-opened.

Robert Hays, former president of Ruidoso State Bank from 1977-1982, is the president of First National Bank of Ruidoso. He was the executive vice president of First National Bank of Alamogordo from 1982 to the present time.

Hays said he is pleased to work with Ruidoso again and feels confident that the new bank will be strong and solvent.

"This is probably, today, the cleanest bank in New Mexico," said Hays, explaining that FDIC purchased all the problem loans, leaving the bank with a small portfolio of good loans.

Hays said it was Moncor's portfolio of bad loans which killed the bank.

When Albuquerque Federal Saving and Loan Association took control of the bank in early August, it did not put capital funds into the bank, said Hays. First National Bank of Alamogordo put \$1,400,000 of capital funds into the new bank.

"This community has seen First City, Moncor and First National Bank of Lincoln County - all operated by the same people," said Hays, stressing that First National Bank of Ruidoso is a "brand new

bank."

Hays said the bank will operate in a prudent, conservative manner. "We intend to offer service to the community, but not be frivolous with our money," he said.

The bank president said that he does not intend to change any account policies at this time. All deposit accounts and good loans with the former First National Bank of Lincoln County have been transferred to the new bank.

Banking procedures will continue uninterrupted under the new bank. Checks from the First National Bank of Lincoln County and Ruidoso Moncor will be honored as the accounts automatically become First National Bank of Ruidoso accounts.

Most of the former bank employees have been retained by the new bank and some are working temporarily for FDIC, which will remain in town for 30 to 45 days to deal with the problem loans it purchased.

Hays said he could not give a definitive answer on the employees' jobs in the future.

"Obviously we need people to run the bank and we're retaining it with the people here. I don't know that all the people will stay on," he said.

Hays said the new bank will temporarily occupy the First National Bank of Lincoln County building on Mechem Drive and will reopen the branch on Suddarth.

We want to get the bank open and re-establish confidence," said Hays, adding that he is pleased with the public reaction to the bank on Tuesday.

Hays said he is optimistic about the bank's future. "We're putting \$1,400,000 of our wealth on the line," he said. "This company's confidence in the new operation. We have no intention of going to the rooftops of a failed bank."

Hays and the bank's vice president, Robert Lytle, and Ralph Petty, president of the Bank of Ruidoso, said the new bank top notch and is comparable to the two existing banks in town, the Bank of Ruidoso and Ruidoso State Bank.

The banking climate in Ruidoso will be healthy, said John Hall, a director of the Bank of Ruidoso. Richard "Buz" Browning, president of the Bank of Ruidoso, said he welcomed the new competition in town.

Lincoln group objects to airport plans on Site B

The purpose of this meeting is to receive comments," said Robert Lytle during a public hearing Monday on the environmental assessment for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Lytle, project manager for EA preparer Envirosphere Company; D. Jean Pate, assistant project manager for Envirosphere; and Jerry Trujillo, environmental specialist with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) were all in attendance at the hearing as observers, according to moderator John Underwood, village attorney and chairman of the airport liaison committee.

Underwood cited legal requirements for the hearing and explained to an audience of about 50 people that remarks would be limited to five minutes per speaker.

Before public comment began, Lytle related how the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) requested the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to provide land and funds for a new airport on Fort Stanton Mesa at Site B.

He said the FAA contracted with Envirosphere to complete the environmental statement, and work was begun in March 1985.

Lytle said his firm considered four alternatives and looked at 17 possible sites for the airport, and said the FAA selected the replacement of the existing airport at Site B as the preferred alternative.

Audience members, most from the Lincoln area, spoke in opposition to that preferred alternative. Jerry Jordan challenged several parts of the EA, and accused the FAA of "pulling the rug out from under the public," by releasing an assessment rather than a more detailed environmental impact

statement.

Cleis Jordan, resident of a trailer in the Lincoln County Historical Society in which the validity of some EA statements was questioned.

After quoting from the EA that the issue at stake is safety, Cleis Jordan commented, "I find it strange that this document (EA) doesn't discuss this issue at all. She also suggested that alternative number four, elimination of the airport, would be the appropriate action."

Gaylord Freeman, a Lincoln-area rancher, complimented EA preparers on a precise, well-done, unemotional and quite complete document," and quoted extensively from the EA as he gave reasons not to build the airport on Site B.

They (area residents) have come to Lincoln with the choice of the world because it has excellent natural beauty," said Freeman. "The airport would spoil the valley but allow more condominiums in Ruidoso," he added.

Is this progress?" asked Freeman, citing information from the EA that stated the airport won't pollute the air because it won't be used by many airplanes. He said residents would "suffer a real decrease in the quality of life" if the airport is built as proposed.

Although Underwood reminded Freeman of the five-minute time limit, he extended his limit, and reminded the audience that additional comments may be made in writing to the FAA for 15 days after the hearing.

Freeman compared driving to airport facilities in Roswell or Alamogordo to the drive in the New York City area to the John F. Kennedy Airport, and opined that the similar distance hasn't been detrimental to tourism in New York.

I would like to present if the interests of the county would dictate, pending \$50 million," said Freeman, who said overcrowding at the current airport on big racing days is a reason being used to replace the facility.

Walter Henz, citing the poor economic conditions in the county as a whole, used EA figures to illustrate his belief that building the airport is a "very good fiscal business."

Ann Ruffin, town of Lincoln wanted to know "who is going to pay" for the airport.

Bob Scribner of Alto said he has been flying in and out of the current airport since 1961, and said pilot error has been the cause of the accidents that have occurred at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport. He said failure to zone contributed to safety problems, and predicted that the same thing could happen on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Scribner said how much the ongoing support of airport operations will cost is a question that hasn't

been answered.

After all, when the FAA representatives asked the public to give their comments at a public hearing, they addressed in the final document which should be published within 15 days, and adjourned the meeting.

Some audience members expressed dismay that they were not allowed more time, and were disappointed not to get answers to their questions.

However, Trujillo explained after the meeting that FAA representatives are constrained from replying to questions during such a hearing. He reiterated that his role was limited to that of "observer."





Chamber could face more financial problems

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce vice president of operations and management Bill Carrigan told the chamber board Wednesday that the chamber could face financial problems as the fiscal year progresses.

In his budget report, Carrigan said the chamber made \$19,201.27 during the first five months of the fiscal year (July through November). Carrigan said that amount would cover the chamber through three months of operational costs. Seven months remain in the fiscal year, he added.

"This is where we were one year ago," said former board president James Paxton about last year's monetary shortfall and subsequent need to borrow funds. Paxton said that if something is not done to change the situation, the chamber could end up in financial trouble this spring.

Board member Charlie Smith, chairman of the building, equip-

ment and personnel committee, said his committee recommended that the chamber board and staff concentrate on membership, member retention and collection of dues.

"The board has been negligent in identifying problems with money," said Smith, explaining that he felt the chamber spends too much time on activities and not enough time on membership and dues collection.

Chamber executive director John Jeffers said he has spent "very little time on this" since he took over last year. Jeffers said that when he interviewed for the job, he was told that the chamber had problems with image, membership and a splinter group which had formed.

"During the healing period of the last 11 months, the activity and image of the chamber is up," he said.

The board approved a motion to direct themselves and the chamber staff to place an emphasis on membership development and retention and delinquent dues collection.

The board also passed another

motion at Smith's request, that committee work—telephoning, typing and other tasks—be done by committee members and not by the chamber staff. Smith said the office staff and equipment are insufficient to handle the additional committee work created when the chamber formed the committees in its program of work for the year.

Jeffers reported that the Ruidoso Valley Greeters' trip to Austin, Texas, to present Ruidoso's Texas Family of the Year contest winners has been rescheduled for January 8. The family will be presented then to Texas officials and to the press.

Nancy Radziewicz reported that her recent wine and cheese receptions in Austin and San Antonio, Texas, received "adequate attendance," but not as much response as hoped. Radziewicz said she had hoped that 200 people would attend each party, but had only 50 in San Antonio and 75 in Austin.

In a discussion of the celebrity ski race planned by Spirit of Ruidoso, Spirit vice president Janey Perry said the venture would require a

"sizeable amount" of funds from both the chamber (who would co-sponsor the event) and Spirit, with a tentative budget of \$10,500.

Perry said that Spirit members questioned if the ski race is the best way to promote Ruidoso and sought the opinion of the chamber board.

"We have no commitments at this point, but we need to get moving as soon as possible," she said.

The chamber board referred the issue to the chamber's advertising and promotion committee.


In other business, the board:

Planning and Zoning wraps up final 1985 business

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) denied one request, approved four and voted to recommend changes to the current sign ordinance during their last meeting of 1985 on Monday.

Commissioners denied Rose McSwane's request for front and rear lot line variances to build a new house on Lot 7, Block 2, Glen Grove Subdivision.

"There's just not enough information here for us to go that far afield of the ordinance," said commissioner David Smith before recommending that the request be denied.

P&Z member Don Shaw sug-

gested to Glen Bullock, the builder and McSwane's spokesman at the meeting, that he redesign the house to better conform with the dimensions of the lot, and then bring a complete plot plan before the commission.

Paul Davis, village enforcement officer, told the group that discrepancies existed between the recording and the written notes on sign ordinance recommendations made during the last P&Z meeting.

After more discussions on directional sign allowances, P&Z recommended that the Ruidoso Village Council amend the current sign ordinance to restrict commercial directional signs to a total of four square feet or less.

After a discussion on real estate

sign regulations, commissioner Mary Underwood volunteered to take a copy of the ordinance to the next meeting of the Multiple Listing Service.

P&Z also voted to recommend that the council further "amend the current sign ordinance to reflect the front side as used to compute as sign square footage be the side that faces the street."

In other business Monday, P&Z: —Approved plans for a new garage on the Hospital Tract, Palmer Gateway for Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

—Changed a previously approved temporary approval on temporary living quarters for EMS to a permanent approval with the stipulation that the approval will be rescinded

if and when the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital moves from the present location on the Hospital Tract of Palmer Gateway.

—Approved a replat on Lot 1, replat of Lot 6, Block 5, first addition to Cree Meadows Heights for Tommy Beatty.

—Approved a replat of Lots 36 and 37, Block D, Singing Pines Subdivision for Katherine Crews and Jerry Givens.

—Received copies of an article on drive-up windows.

—Planned a Wednesday sub-committee workshop to review zoning and land-use maps.

Martin Rose, Reed Stirman and Ken Carr were not present for the meeting.


Winter Wonderland

team's future.


"We're coming along," he said. "The guys are playing together more and we're going to be a good ball club."

With joyful inspiration at Christmas season, the early Spanish turned the things of nature all about them into ingenious Christmas celebration features that have become traditions all our own in New Mexico.

One of these was the "Luminario" or lighter of the way. Showing the way to the Christ Child on Christmas Eve, and also lighting the way to the church, for midnight mass.

One type of luminario was sticks of pitch pine driven into the ground, and then the tips lighted. These were placed all around the church and along the pathway to the church door.

The early people here told of a great fire that was built on the hill north of San Patricio on Christmas Eve as a signal to travelers miles away that midnight mass was to be celebrated at the Church of San Patricio.

The luminario in several different forms is popular in New Mexico and other places in the southwest today.

The Nacimiento
"The Manger Scene"

Central to the Christmas celebration of the pioneer Spanish was the "Nacimiento" or "Nativity Scene", depicting Mary and Joseph and the Christ Child, just born.

These took many forms from those using real live human figures and live animals under a shelter lighted with lamp of pitch pine, to small shelters made of evergreen boughs with the sacred assemblage represented by small figures carved in wood or molded in clay. A cave like half room might be dug out of a bank by the side of the trail or road, and in here wood carved figures half life size would represent the Nativity Scene.

In all these the animals of the stable were sure to be present.

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

Editorial

More than \$1 million of our taxpayer dollars were jeopardized by careless or ignorant actions by a Lincoln County official or officials with the failure last week of First National Bank of Lincoln County. The voting taxpayers have a right to know why their money was jeopardized and who was responsible.

The Lincoln County Commissioners—Bill Elliott, Ken Nosker and A.W. Gnatkowski—have pointed the finger at County Treasurer Flora Vega, and have sought her resignation.

Vega says the commissioners are mistaken and that "even a minimal inquiry would have established the propriety of my actions," but when contacted by The News, she refuses to divulge any information that could clear the air, instead referring inquiries to a mute attorney.

Beyond blaming the treasurer, the commissioners, also, have so far neglected to discuss the details of what happened to threaten the security of so much taxpayers' money.

After all, it's our money these elected officials are handling so frivolously, and it's we to whom they owe an explanation.—DJF

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It isn't difficult to describe good management; what's tough is to practice it. In government as presently organized, as a matter of fact, such good management may even be an impossibility. A military commander, to choose one example, has the potential to manage thoroughly. At least he can determine and describe a concrete objective for action, divide responsibility for the steps necessary to get those steps taken. That's not the way government—particularly state government—operates.

Partly, that's because there is no chain of command of the type found in the military or industry. In government there is in fact no ultimate boss, with the right to give orders that must be obeyed.

Many citizens think the governor has that kind of power, but he doesn't, as some have learned, to their own dismay, after they have taken the job. At very most, a governor can function in that fashion only in relation to civil servants as make up his own administration. Even there, many of these employees, who were here when he took office and plan to be here when he's gone, will mostly go their own way.

fragmentary and momentary objectives as it agrees on offers little hope of providing the kind of firm guidance that is at the heart of good management.

Given those facts, it is hard to avoid stating flatly that effecting good management in New Mexico government as it is presently constituted is unlikely to the point of impossibility.

It would not seem to be worthwhile to suggest we sit by watching for changes in the Governor that will make him in an instant into a proficient manager. To look for that would be to expect a complete change in his personality.

To demonstrate the unlikelihood of that, just the day these words are written, he sent the man who oversees public school financing to tell legislators these institutions should be given \$200 million more next year than they are presently spending. Even to suggest such an idea is so irresponsible, given present facts Governor Anaya is well aware of about declining state revenues, that a decision is almost forced to conclude the action is ultimately cynical, and a deliberate attempt to embarrass those lawmakers with whom he must get along if even minimal management of the state is to be possible.

If he allowed increases in other parts of state government at the same rate as he suggests for the schools, the total state budget for the coming year would increase almost half a billion dollars. To make that suggestion at a time when he knows present revenues will not even meet present expenditures is to suggest he does not want to manage state government but to bankrupt it.

So where can we poor citizens who get to put up the money for all this look for hope? At best, only to the legislators, and to them only if we can convince them to take the chips off their shoulders, stop their endless squabbling and start working together for the good of New Mexico.

The only way a democratic form of government is supposed to be superior to a hierarchical one like the Army or a big corporation is that our representatives are charged to be responsive to the will of those who elected them. In New Mexico, it's about time they became so.



Whata Lucky Jet is 15-to-one longshot winner

Whata Lucky Jet, a 15-to-one outsider ridden by Jesse Langoria, upset a good field in Sunday's featured Fall Quarter Horse Futurity at Sunland Park, notching a wire-to-wire victory from the rail post position.

The longshot winner contributed to a Pic-Six carryover of \$16,626, when no fans in Sunday's crowd of 2,640 held perfect tickets pegging the winners of the fifth through tenth races.

Whata Lucky Jet lined up in Sunday's \$115,000 Fall Quarter Horse Futurity off a neck win in trials for the stake on November 29. The son of What Luck stepped the sixth fastest qualifying time among the 10 finalists, racing down Sunland's 400-yard straightaway in 20.19 seconds.

Ima Mr Easy Charger, the number-two qualifier for the Grade II event, went postward as the even-money choice to win the stake, with Six Fols Brown (4-1) second in the wagering and top qualifier Fly Big Jay third at six-to-one.

Langoria rocketed out of the number one post aboard Whata Lucky Jet as Troy Crissup made his bid aboard Ima Mr Easy Charger

from the seven hole. Crissup appeared to be holding his own with What A Lucky Jet, but faded out of contention about 100 yards from the wire.

Two horses breaking from the far outside posts—Six Fols Brown and Rocky Jones—closed strongly in the final going. And Star Kissin, who came out of the two hole under veteran Larry Byers, was in the thick of the action from flagfall to finish.

A neck, nose and a head separated the four horses at the wire. Whata Lucky Jet was the winner in 19.97 seconds, collecting \$57,464 for owner M.C. Gist of Andrews, Texas. Nerrei Bruney is the trainer.

A neck back came Six Fols Brown to pocket runner-up money of \$19,538. Jockey David Wells took the assignment for trainer Kenneth Register, who owns the colt in partnership with Israel Flores of Adel, Georgia.

Rocky Jones, at 12-to-one on the boards, missed second by a nose with Richard Ruiz at the reins. The son of Moon Lark earned \$11,493 for third.

Gallant Red Wing was backed down to the nine-to-five choice to win the quarter-mile dash, with Sitting On Go (2-1) the second favorite, and recent ship-in St Run at four-to-one on the boards.

Rutherford had American Moon Fun away from the gates in good order, racing stride-for-stride with Gallant Red Wing, who broke on top with jockey Salustio Burgos at the helm.

Rider John Alleman was urging St Run into contention from the eight hole as the field approached the wire. Gallant Red Wing began to fade and it appeared to be an easy win for American Moon Fun as the filly held a commanding lead less than 50 yards from the finish.

Coming from well out of it, Jimmie Hunt stormed by St Run in the final strides from the far outside post aboard 18-to-one outsider Always On Charge, finishing a neck back of American Moon Fun for second-place money.

St Run held on to the show, two lengths behind Always On Charge, and a close neck in front Gallant

after coming out a step slow on the break.

American Moon Fun is trained by Dan Howard for owners Claude Neeley and Billy Copeland of Strawn, Texas. The daughter of American Jet returned hefty mutuels of \$41.40, \$17.20 and \$9.

The final time for the 440 yards was a seasonal best of 21.85

seconds. American Moon Fun earned \$7,395 for her winning effort, boosting her bankroll this year to nearly \$25,000.

Always On Charge, a Richard Fry trainee owned by Kenneth and Betty Brown of Austin, Texas, collected runner-up money of \$2,712. The gelding paid \$13.60 and \$5.60.

St Run's show was worth \$4.20. Israel Flores, who leases the colt,

pocketed third-place money of \$1,479.

Forever A Ruler is Futurity contender

Forever A Ruler and Special Command emerged December 13 as strong contenders for the \$85,837 Fall Thoroughbred Futurity scheduled for December 28, after capturing two trial divisions for the stake at Sunland Park.

Leading rider Eugene O'Neill took Special Command to a head verdict in the first six-furlong trial division for the Fall Thoroughbred Futurity on Friday, racing at seven-to-one odds behind eight-to-five favorite Madam's Pleasure.

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

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Building permits drop

Village building permits dropped in November to the lowest value level since December 1984, leaving the year's total construction valuation at less than half that of last year.

Thirty-four permits were issued during November with a total valuation of \$857,188, bringing the year-to-date total for all categories to 572 permits valued at \$19,845,838.

The same time last year, the year-to-date total was for just 560 permits, but the total valuation was a hefty \$39,661,252.

Last month, October 1985, the Village Building Inspector issued 53 permits with a total valuation of \$1,337,298.

Permits issued during November on new single-family dwellings numbered just eight with the total valuation listed at \$679,353. That is a slight decline from October's nine permits for one-family homes, with a valuation of \$601,930, and a big decline from October 1984's 13 permits with a valuation of \$945,666.

Residential additions and alterations, the one category that has been holding steady, fell with just 20 permits issued in November with a valuation of \$137,416. In October, the village saw 30 remodeling permits issued with a valuation of \$246,265, and last year in November the inspector issued 26 alteration permits with a valuation of \$322,047.

Just one permit was issued in November for a new commercial building, and its valuation was \$14,210. Last month two commercial permits were issued with a total of \$288,650, and last year, in November 1984, just one permit was issued but the dollar valuation was \$151,088.

The building inspector issued one commercial addition and alteration permit during November, and the dollar valuation was \$500. During October seven permits were issued in that category with a valuation of \$51,800, and last year in November one permit was issued with a valuation of \$21,100.
