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## Elections draw many office-seekers

### Ruidoso

Thirteen candidates threw hats of all shapes and sizes into three rings Tuesday at Ruidoso Village Hall.

Declaring their candidacy for mayor were Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Rick Evans, J.D. James and William L. Karn.

Three four-year village council positions will appear on the ballot for the March 4 election. Filing for those slots were Milton R. Alcorn, Michael W. Callaghan, Richard A. Davis, William A. "Dub" Holt Jr., Elmer R. Pirelli, Michael J. Radziewicz and Michael L. Simon.

Victor M. Alonso and J.A. "Al" Junge have declared their candidacy for the one two-year village council slot.

Village clerk Leon Eggleston certified the declarations as they were filed, and candidates were notified that ballot positions will be drawn at 5:01 p.m. Tuesday, January 14.

All four members of the present council whose terms expire with the March election were among the 13, with Councillors Karn and Evans hoping to become mayor and Councillors Holt and Alonso aspiring to further terms on the village govern-

ing body.

Mayor George White is leaving office after serving one term. He also served a mayoral term in the early 1970s.

Councillors Ray Dean Carpenter and Jerry Shaw, elected two years ago when the entire council took office in a special election that enlarged the membership from four to six, are scheduled to serve for two more years.

Until two minutes before 5 p.m., Alonso was the only candidate who had declared for the two-year council seat.

"Nobody deserves a free ride," said Junge as he entered his name in that race just seconds before the filing deadline.

Shaw, who many had expected to file for mayor, was on hand Tuesday as the list of candidates grew. After Lloyd L. Davis Jr. entered his name as a mayoral candidate late Tuesday afternoon, Shaw said she wouldn't run, but would support the former mayor's candidacy.

Two years ago, 21 candidates vied for the six council positions, compared with this year's 13 candidates for the five election slots.

And now the campaigns can begin.

### Ruidoso Downs

Three candidates declared their intentions Tuesday to run for the position of mayor in Ruidoso Downs. Four people will run for two seats on the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees and four will vie for the municipal judge position.

Jackie Branum, J.C. "Jake" Harris and Stanley Dean Brewer filed their election forms on Tuesday, January 7. Branum and Harris

currently are village trustees.

Candidates for the board of trustees are George Smith, James Lee Wilson, Rita Nash and current trustee LeVerne Cole.

Municipal Judge Martin Valenzuela will campaign to retain his position against candidates Larry Norman, George Moncrief and Harold Mansell.

Elections will be in March.

### Capitan

Candidates for municipal offices in Capitan were plentiful as hopefuls signed up to run for municipal judge, mayor and trustee.

Up for election in Capitan are four-year terms for one municipal judge, one mayor and two trustees.

Declaring their candidacies for municipal judge were Jimmie

Stewart and Charles R. Beck. Candidates for mayor include Vernon Kelly Beavers and Benjamin F. Coker.

Hopefuls for the trustee seats are Charles B. Locke, W.F. Eckland, David N. Rouleau, George Olan Booher and Dave Strickland.

Elections for the positions will take place Tuesday, March 4.

## Village water tank leaks, water workers seek cause

A leak in one of Ruidoso's two five-million-gallon tanks at Alto Lake will result in a big water loss for the village, said Frank Potter, assistant village manager, early today (Thursday).

"It's draining all the five million gallons out of one of the tanks," he added.

Potter said a malfunction was discovered at about 3 p.m. Wednesday, when water was observed leaking from the tank. Water Department personnel immediately removed the leaking tank from service and isolated it to identify the problem, said Potter, adding that a routine check Wednesday morning found the two tanks in good shape.

When the tank was shut down,

one valve was accidentally turned off, causing some residents of the village to be without water for about an hour, explained Potter.

He said the tank is releasing about a foot of water an hour, and is expected to be dry within 48 hours. Water is leaking past the Springs Condominiums and ultimately into Bogs Springs, said Potter.

"By tomorrow we're going to be looking at it," noted Potter. The village engineer and Water Department personnel will investigate the cause of the leak as soon as the tank is empty, he explained.

No water shortages are expected, but some village water users may receive "murky" water because of the disruption, said Potter.



### Surprise visitor

The Alfonso Luceros had a surprise visitor Wednesday when this 1981 blue Toyota slid down the hill and overturned in the front yard of their 143 Juniper Road home. Linda Cornelius, a 31-year-old Ruidoso resident, told police her brakes locked as she was eastbound downhill on the icy, snow-packed street. Cornelius was treated and released at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, according to a hospital spokesman.

## Texas family is honored by states' top officials

New Mexico Governor Toney Anaya and Texas Governor Mark White greeted Texans and Ruidosoans as the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce presented the Brown family, winners of the "Picture Yourself in Ruidoso" contest. The reception, sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Greeters (a branch of the chamber), took place at the Waller Creek Plaza Hotel in Austin, Texas, Wednesday evening.

More than 150 guests, including a delegation of approximately 20 Ruidosoans, attended the event. During the presentation ceremony, chamber executive director John Jeffers introduced Anaya, who said that Ruidoso is "one of the most dynamic communities" in New Mexico.

Anaya said that economic development is "tough sledding" in today's economy and that travel and tourism represent New Mexico's second largest industry. Texas is New Mexico's largest market in the tourism industry, said Anaya.

Anaya told The News that he felt "Ruidoso is to be commended for its initiation and novel approach" for creating the contest. He opined that the advertising will help the entire state of New Mexico get more publicity.

The New Mexico governor told the crowd that he was happy with the response to the contest.

"I'm pleased to find the many good things that Texans say about New Mexico," he said, explaining that such has not always been the case.

"Things have changed and changed for the better," he added.

Governor White thanked New Mexico and told the group that Ruidoso had been a part of Texas 150 years ago.

White said that Texas' second largest industry also is tourism and commended Ruidoso on its advertising campaign and "aggressive delegation" present at the party.

The Ruidoso Valley Greeters presented Anaya and White with Nambe trays engraved in appreciation. White presented the Browns

with a Texas flag. Anaya gave the family a book about New Mexico.

The chamber advertising committee sponsored the contest as its winter advertising campaign to promote Ruidoso in various Texas cities. Contestants were required to submit a family photograph and a written testimony about Ruidoso.

Michael Brown, a video producer and motivational speaker from Arlington, Texas, wrote a poem about Ruidoso and sent it in with a picture of his family—his wife, Sandra, daughter, Rachel, and son, Ryan.

"I didn't really tell anybody that I entered," said Michael Brown. "I was hoping I might have a chance (to win)," he said, adding that he felt "a little stunned" with the result.

Sandra, a native Texan, is a successful romance novelist. The only non-skiing member of the family, Sandra said that Ruidoso could be the location of a future novel.

"I don't go anywhere without mentally photographing it for later use," she said.

Rachel, a seventh-grader at Shackleford Junior High School, said she is looking forward to skiing while in Ruidoso. She said she enjoyed the "neat" reception at which she met two governors in one day.

"I never met anyone famous," she said, before Anaya and White arrived at the reception.

Ryan, 11, is a fifth-grader at Pope Elementary School in Arlington. He said the experience has been exciting for him, especially when the principal announced it over the loudspeaker at school.

The Browns won an all-expenses-paid vacation in Ruidoso which they will take sometime during this ski season.

Melody Vuicich, president of the greeters, said she was thrilled with the success of the reception. Greeters Georgia Griffith, Charlotte Jarratt, Becky Rankin, Nancy Radziewicz and Susan Miller made up the committee which planned the Austin reception.

Austin restaurants that donated food during the event included the Courtyard, Vogue, Tomasitos, County Line, Waller Creek Plaza and Pecan Street Cafe.

## Airport land appraisal bids are received

Two proposals on appraising the Ruidoso Municipal Airport land are being reviewed by village administrators.

Brooks, Lomax, Fletcher, Inc. (BLF) of Albuquerque and Dan D. Swearingin MAI SREA of Ruidoso responded to a call for proposals which was mailed to five firms, all Member of the Appraisal (MAI) appraisers.

Swearingin was the apparent low bidder offering a bid of \$14,757.34 for completing the project in 120 days and \$18,393.93 for a 60-day completion schedule. BLF submitted a bid of \$27,700, and indicated an eight-week completion date.

However, criteria for selecting an appraisal firm is not limited to costs, according to the request for proposal.

Reviewers will consider each firm's experience, qualifications of the personnel to be assigned to the work, demonstrated knowledge of the appraisal assignment and the

delivery date. Each of the four items will be worth 25 percent on a scale of 100, according to the request form.

"These are going to take time to review," said Donna Hendricks, village purchasing agent, as she opened the lengthy proposals. Village manager Jim Hine, assistant manager Frank Potter and Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris will grade the proposals using the above criteria.

Potter said a recommendation will be made before a Tuesday meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council.

"Generally after a sponsor goes through a selection process they submit their choice for our consideration along with an outline of the process," said Jerry Trujillo, environmental specialist with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) in Albuquerque.

Trujillo, when contacted by telephone Wednesday, said submit-

ting the appraisal proposal for FAA review is the "prudent" thing to do.

Village officials were given a portion of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, said Trujillo, who added that some portions of that act can offer guidance during the appraisal and disposal process for the current airport site.

"It's a real good guide," said Trujillo.

"If we don't agree or feel comfortable with the appraisal they provide then we're going to do one ourselves," remarked Trujillo.

He said that although the zoning designation may affect land prices in certain areas, "you still go back to the best use."

"We are certainly interested in maximizing the proceeds of that sale," noted Trujillo.

"We're going to require the most out of it—not the least," he stressed.

## Planning and Zoning Commission moves to ban real estate signs

Things will look different around Ruidoso if the Ruidoso Village Council adopts a Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) recommendation to amend the municipal sign ordinance.

P&Z Monday unanimously approved a motion by Commissioner Martin Rose to ask the council to amend the current ordinance to eliminate all "for sale" and "for rent" real estate signs in the Village of Ruidoso.

"It keeps being brought up and then it just dies," said P&Z member Mary Underwood, who reported that Multiple Listing Services also was wrestling with the pros and cons of eliminating or more closely regulating real estate signs.

Paul Davis, village enforcement officer, was instructed to present the recommendation, along with three previously proposed sign ordinance changes, to the village governing body.

Davis also revealed Monday that Mayor George White had accepted Karon Petty's resignation from the commission. Petty's letter indicated that she was resigning because she lives outside village limits, said Davis.

P&Z chairman Mike Callaghan displayed a zoning map color-coded to indicate current zoning status using proposed zoning designations. He said his map reflected no changes except in the central business district, a new designation to be applied in Midtown.

Consideration of the land use map was postponed since Commissioner David Smith, the map's preparer,

was absent from the meeting. Callaghan said adoption of the two maps is the last step needed to send zoning and master plan proposals to the council.

Callaghan noted that the Ruidoso Municipal Airport is currently zoned R-1 (single-family residential), however special conditions were applied in 1984 to deal with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) requirements. He suggested that a paragraph be included in the current ordinance dealing with FAA requirements be included in the one being proposed.

"That's (airport zoning) in litigation right now," remarked Davis.

During regular business before the commission, members approved Mountain Lakes Subdivision, a county subdivision already approved by the county.

Davis explained that the village P&Z has planning and platting jurisdiction over a three-mile area, and planning and zoning jurisdiction over a one-mile area outside the village limits.

The subdivision is located within three miles of the village, he said.

Commissioners withheld approval on a review of commercial development in Pinecliff Subdivision for Crown Point Corporation. Callaghan told P&Z that a single-wide trailer was installed and occupied before the application was filed.

Rose recommended denying approval and ordering Crown Point to "cease using that building until this matter is resolved."

"People take it on themselves just to do what they want to do," said Rose. "These are out of town folks coming in here making good money," he added.

Davis said that, if necessary, utilities could be cut off to the trailer, but explained that the use cannot be stopped if an appeal is in progress.

Also during the meeting Davis distributed a report of P&Z activities over the past two calendar years.

During 1985 the commission heard the following: one annexation petition, two change in use requests, one conditional use request, one land exchange, one non-conforming use, one temporary use and one plat review.

Commissioners heard 25 replat requests and reviewed 17 commercial and four residential development plans. Six vacant applications were heard: four administrative and two owner-initiated. Three vacancies of right of way came before P&Z—one utility easement and two rights of way.

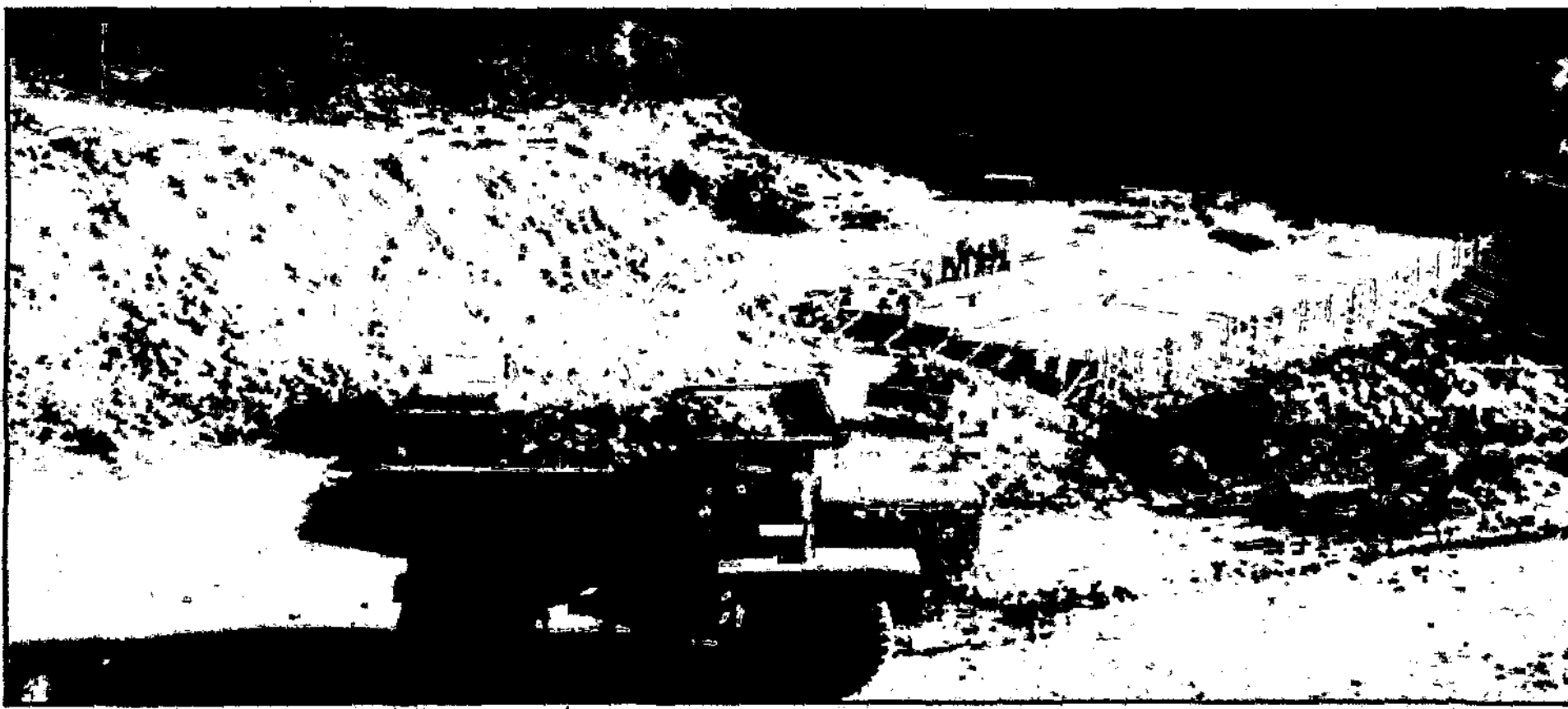
Of the 32 variances considered by commissioners, 25 were let alone and seven were sign variances.

Davis handled 21 administrative reviews and processed 198 sign applications. The Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC), abolished as of May 28, 1984, by council action, considered 25 commercial development plans.

Davis reported that in 1984 P&Z heard: 38 owner-initiated reuse requests, 13 administrative reuse requests, 32 replats, 48 variances, five conditional use requests and 15 appeals from APRC.

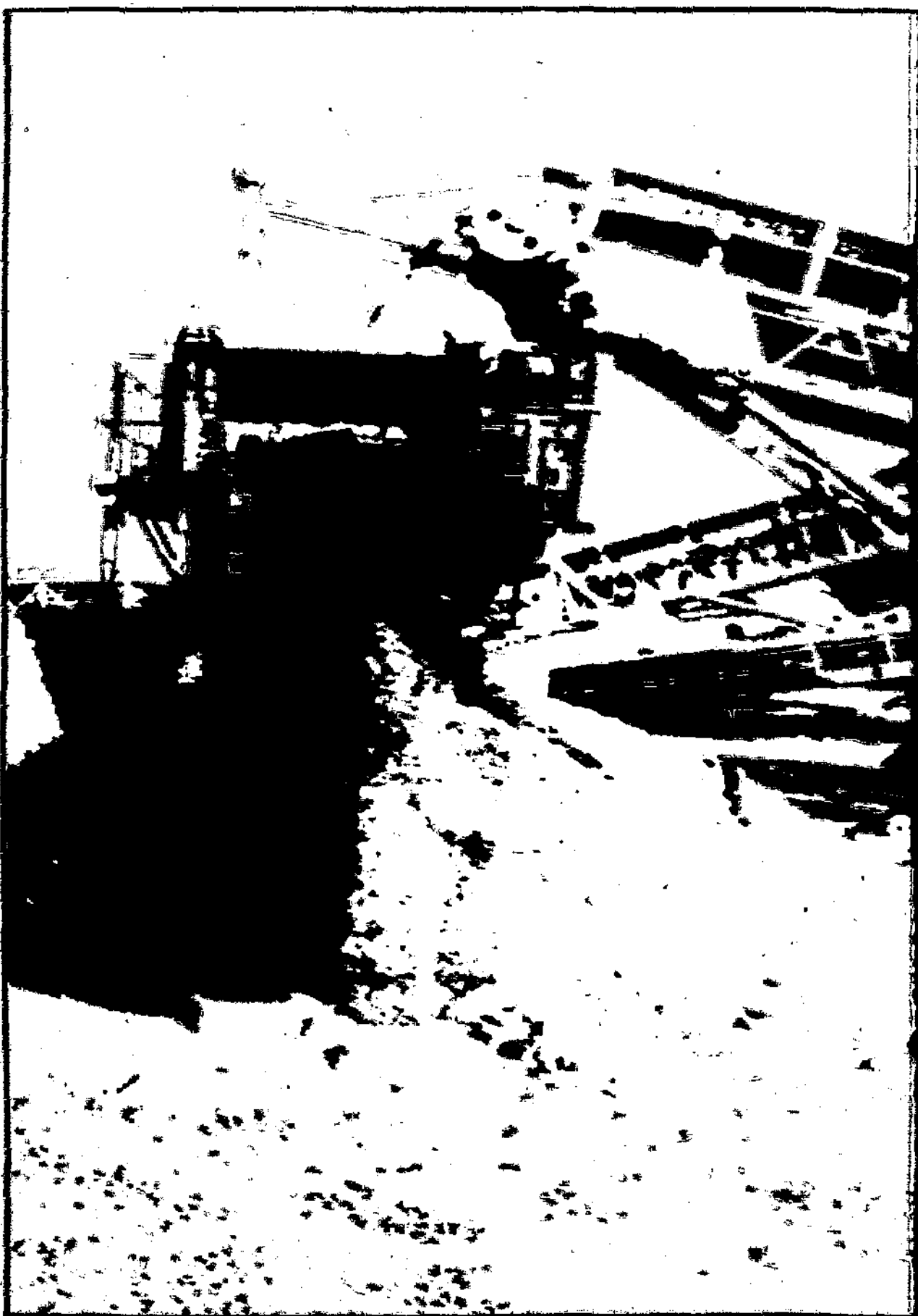
Also in 1984 commissioners heard: 13 vacancies/sheddowns of right of way, six commercial development reviews, two changes of use, two annexations and one non-conforming use.

APRC reviewed and acted on 232 requests in 1984.

Ruidoso's boys will travel to Socorro Tuesday, January 21. The Warrior girls will host Goddard Monday, January 20.

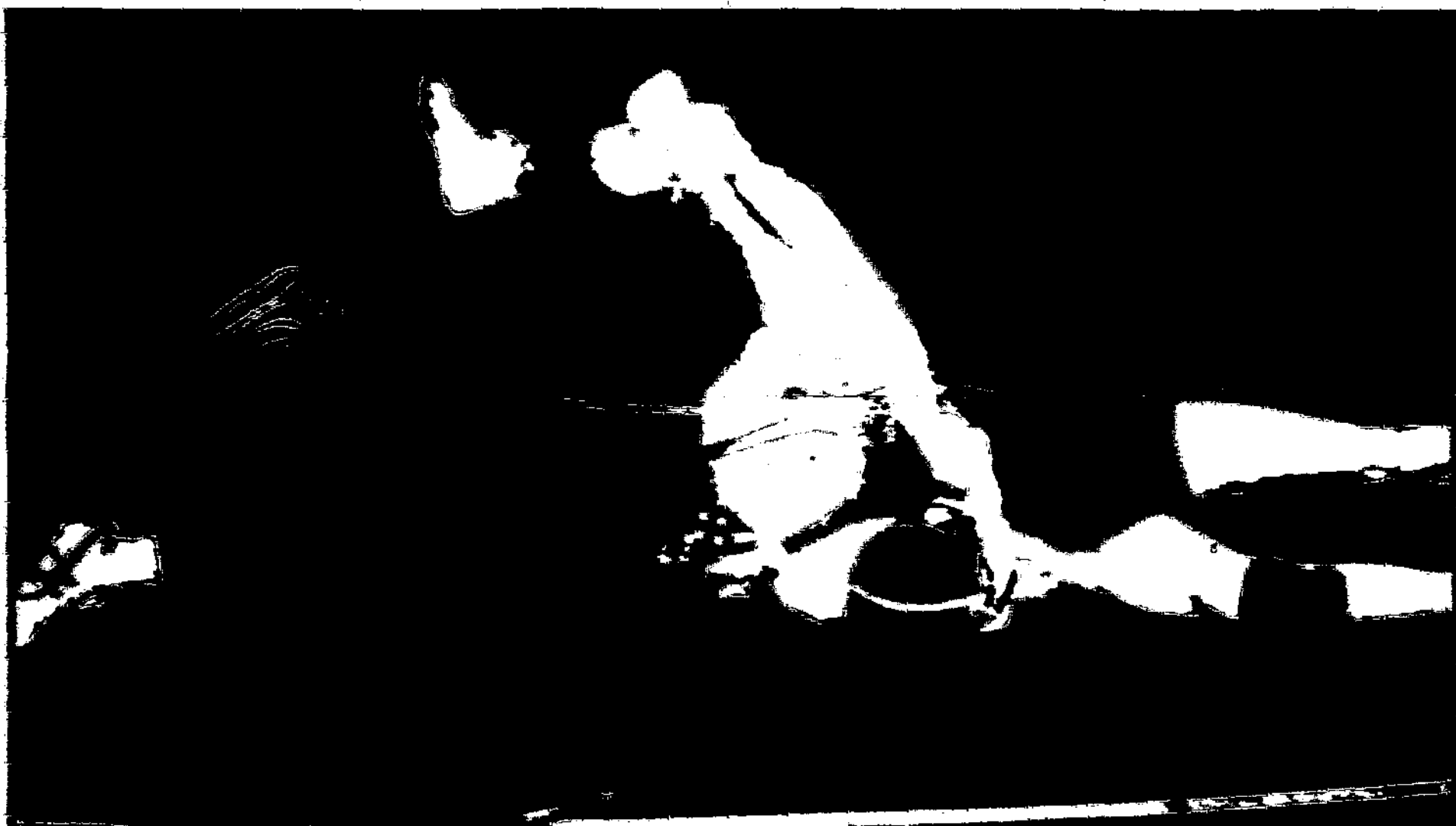
Ruidoso's boys varsity and junior

## Chiefs, Blazer Bus take cage victories

The Chiefs and Blazer Bus took victories in Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Adult Basketball League action Wednesday night at White Mountain School.

## Lodgers' Tax Committee ponders funds

The current business and lodging slump that Ruidoso has been experiencing since September may have "bottomed out" according to Budgie Green, chairman of the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee.

Leon Eggleston, Ruidoso village clerk, estimates that gross receipts for area businesses seem to be running about 8 percent below this same time last year.

Though it is difficult to be precise because the lodgers' tax was raised

from 2 percent to 3 percent beginning last summer, Eggleston feels total lodging business is down about 8 percent from the same time last year also.

At their regular monthly meeting yesterday, LTC members expressed their concern for the current economic slump the area is facing.

There was general agreement among LTC about the reasons for the current economic slowdown in the area.

The lack of snow may be the biggest reason the area has seen a business slowdown this winter, ac-

cording to LTC members. But LTC member Bill Rawlins said private homeowners seem to be renting out their vacant property to skiers and tourists more and more.

LTC member Phil Hamilton said he didn't feel there was any way the local lodgers could compete with private property owners, many who live in cities other than Ruidoso.

In other LTC business Wednesday, committee members discussed the best ways to spend advertising money to promote Ruidoso and procedures for the appointment of new LTC committee members.

## Builder is fined in municipal court

Municipal Judge John Cupp found James Scott Miller guilty Wednesday of building without the required permit within the Village of Ruidoso.

Miller was sentenced to pay a \$300 fine, which was suspended, and ordered to pay \$100. Cupp said Miller, who entered a plea of not guilty, has 15 days in which to appeal his case to District Court. Miller still must obtain a building permit on the completed deck, and the village building inspector said that permit will now cost double the amount that would have been due if obtained before beginning construction.

Jimmy Neeley, Ruidoso building inspector, said that on July 5, 1985, he "red tagged" a deck construction project on Lot 11, Block 6, Juniper Hills Subdivision. When the inspector or his associate apply a red tag to any construction project, that serves as notice to the builder and/or owner that all work must stop until village regulations are

met, explained Neeley.

At that time the building inspector said he also discovered that the double-wide trailer on which the deck was being constructed had been placed too close to the property line.

Although Miller appeared in October before the village Planning and Zoning Commission and was granted a lot line variance, he didn't return to the inspector's office and apply for a building permit, explained Neeley.

Another red tag was later applied on the project, which is now 100 percent complete, said Neeley.

"He removed the red tag and kept on working," said Sandy Hall of the inspector's office. Hall said she contacted Miller after the red tags were removed, and asked him to come into Village Hall and settle the matter.

When he didn't comply with village requirements after that telephone call, Neeley said the

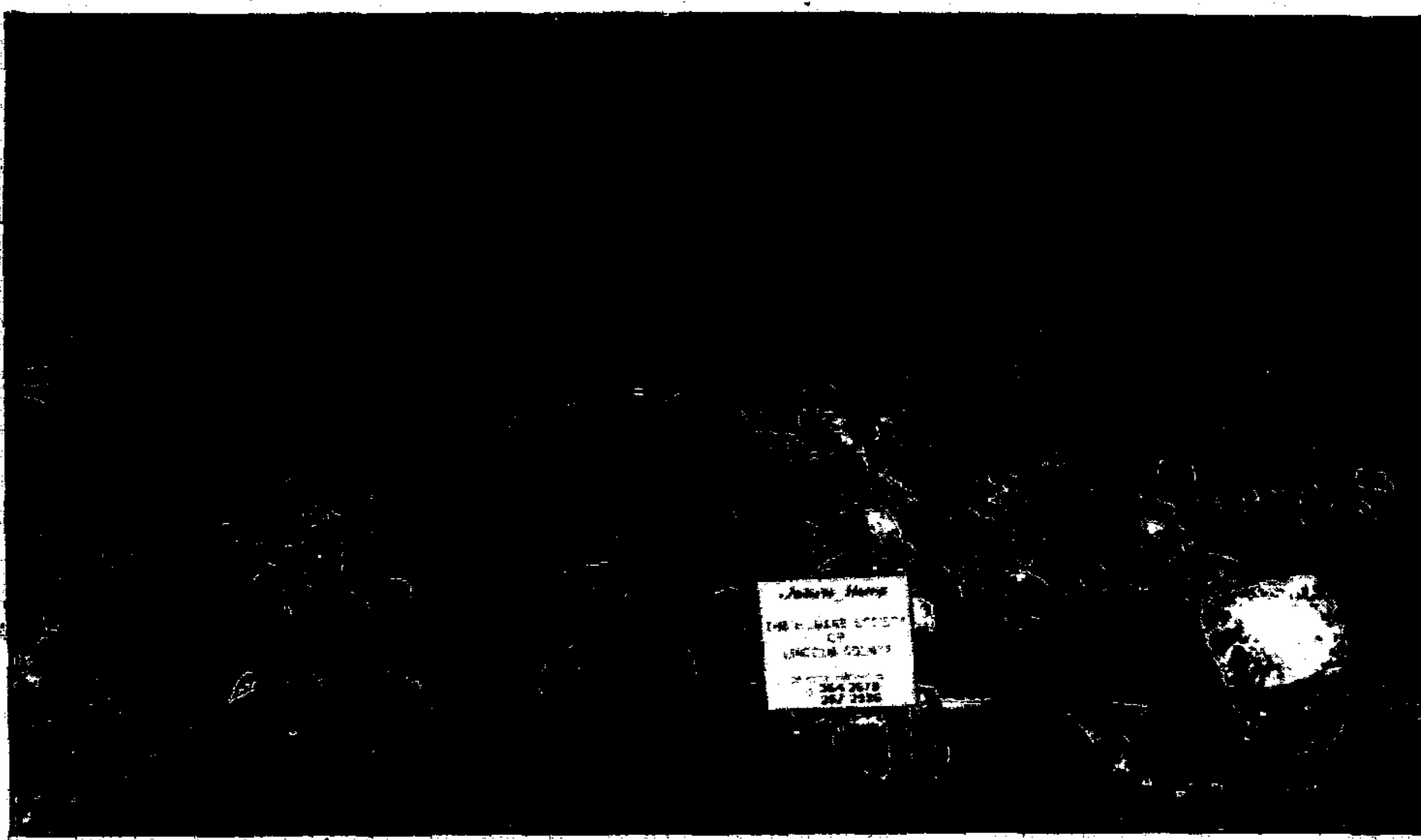
charges were filed in Municipal Court—adding that going to court is a last resort in his enforcement process.

Miller said in a telephone interview Wednesday that he now plans to obtain a building permit, and has no plans to appeal the court's decision.

A local real estate agent, Miller said he checked the restrictive covenants for his subdivision and found that a building permit would not be required for a project under \$400.

Hall explained in a recent P&Z meeting that the village sets a dollar value on new decks that is calculated by square footage—not actual costs. By those calculations, Miller said his deck, which cost around \$400, has a building permit value of about \$5,000.

Judge Cupp explained that the more restrictive applies—either the village ordinance or restrictive covenants.

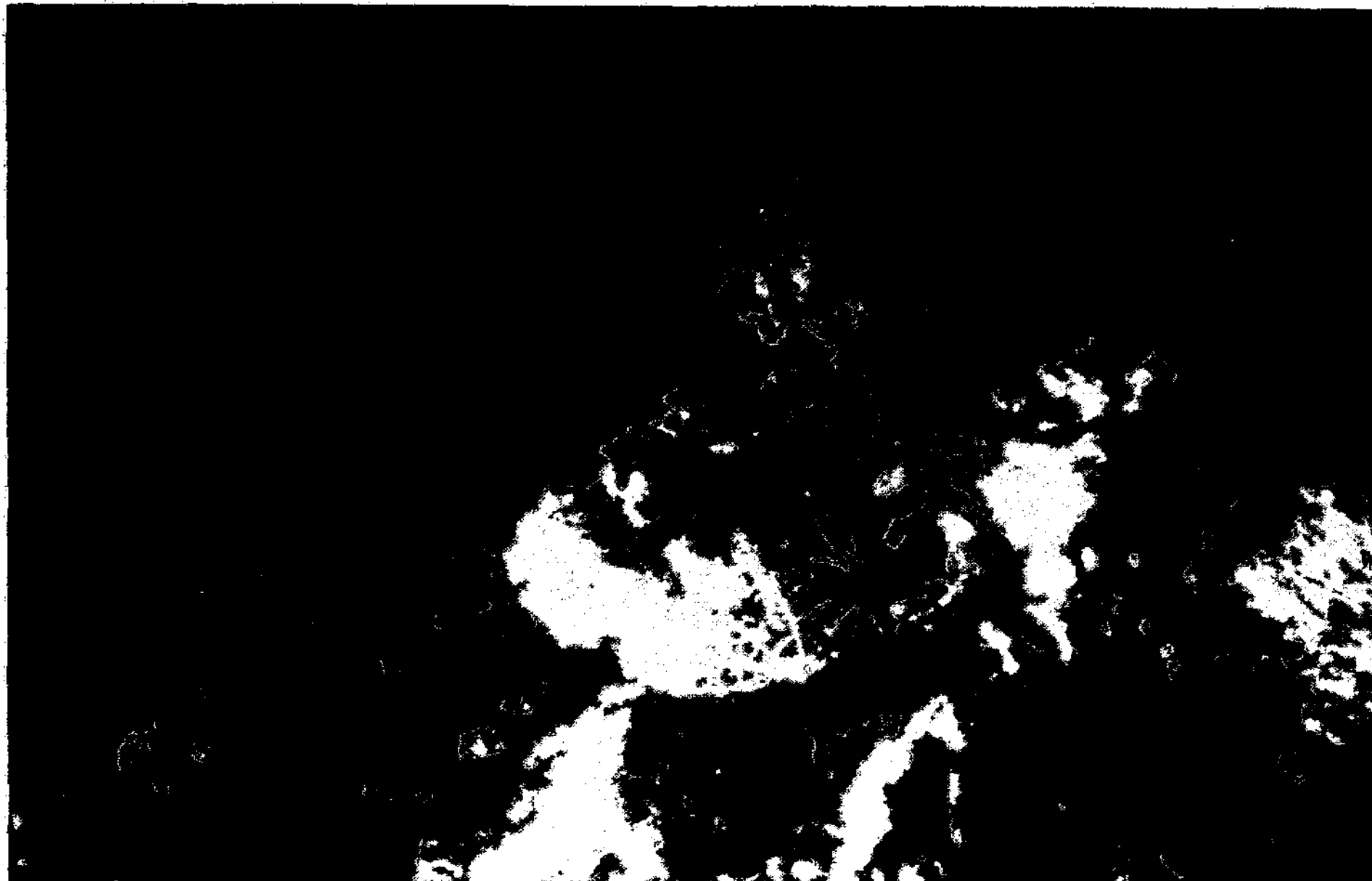

## \$4,877 daily double sets track record

Instant Glory got the best of odds-on favorite Lovely Glass in the feature race on January 5, at Sunland Park. The headliner on an 11-race card saw the highest daily double payoff in the history of the track.

A \$2 ticket in Sunday's daily double returned \$4,877 when 24-1 outsider Field Stripper captured the opener and 31-1 longshot Wobbly Pass won the second race. The payoff eclipsed the all-time high recorded Feb. 13, 1965, when Hardi Plow and Count Maxwell combined for a hefty \$4,637 return.

Lovely Glass, under leading rider Eugene O'Neill, raced as an entry with Miss Sun Tag in Sunday's main event, which spotlighted seven 4-year-old and -older thoroughbreds racing over Sunland's three-quarter mile course.

The duo led the field around the lower bend to the top of the lane, where Miss Sun Tag faded from contention, while rider F.O. Martinez made a bold move aboard Instant Glory from just off the pace.

Martinez drew alongside O'Neill at the 1-furlong mark and the two

riders traded the lead with each stride down to the wire with Instant Glory winning by a nose in a tight photo-finish.

Instant Glory, trained by Louis Schauger, who owns the horse in partnership with E.S. Leon of Sunland Park, earned a winner's purse of \$1,500. The 8-year-old returned mutuels of \$8.80, \$2.60 and \$2.40.

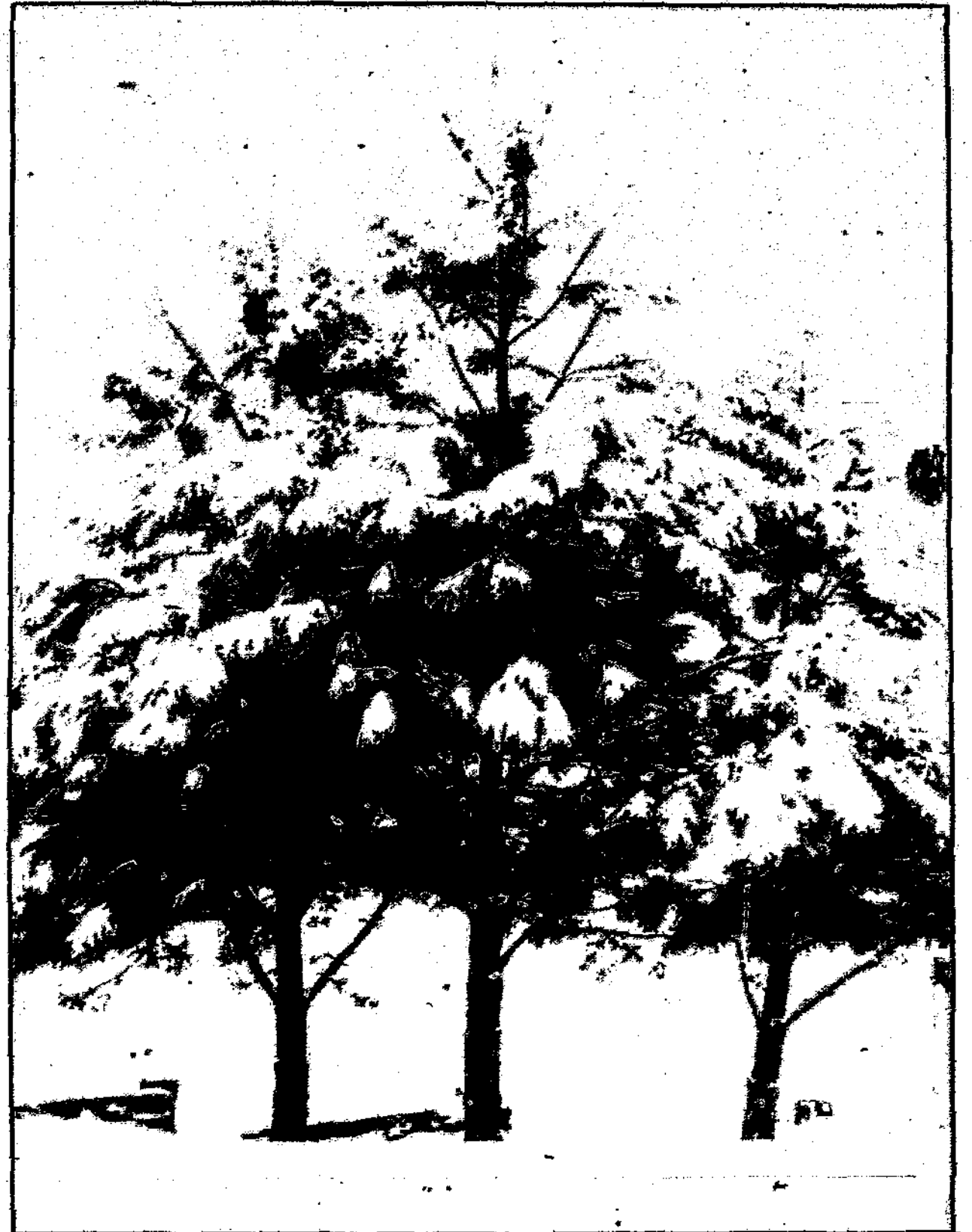
The final time for the 6 furlongs was 1:12.1 seconds.

Lovely Glass collected second-place money of \$550, finishing 3 lengths in front of Scout Hankins, a

7-2 shot ridden by Salustio Burgos.

Lovely Glass is trained by Alberto Dominguez for owners Carol and John Tisdale III of El Paso, Texas. The filly paid \$2.20 and \$2.20. Scout Hankins, a Doyal Roberts Sr. trainee, paid \$2.60.

Duck N Dive went postward at 7-1 odds in the 6½-furlong main event, with veteran rider Carlos Rivas at the reins.

The Duck Dance filly stormed out of the gates to nab a quick one-length lead on the seven-horse field for the main event, with Sand Hills Rusty and 3-1 shot Itsfoggysfault stalking the leader to the half-mile pole.

The three contenders were side-by-side around the final turn showing the way to the head of the stretch. Only a head separated the trio with one furlong remaining.

Both Sand Hills Rusty and Itsfoggysfault began to tire and Duck N Dive drew away to win easily. The winner collected \$1,560 for owner Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas. G.R. Howell trains the filly, who returned mutuels of \$18.60,

\$4.20 and \$3.60.

The final clocking for the 6½-furlong allowance race was 1:17.1 seconds—a seasonal best for that distance.

Annies Dancer paid \$6.20 and \$3.20. Cliff Lambert Sr. is trainer. Bowers ZB Western Wear of Colorado City, Texas, owns the gelding. Smooth Wind's third paid \$2.60. Also trained by Lambert Sr., Smooth Wind is owned by Troy McCarty of Midland, Texas.

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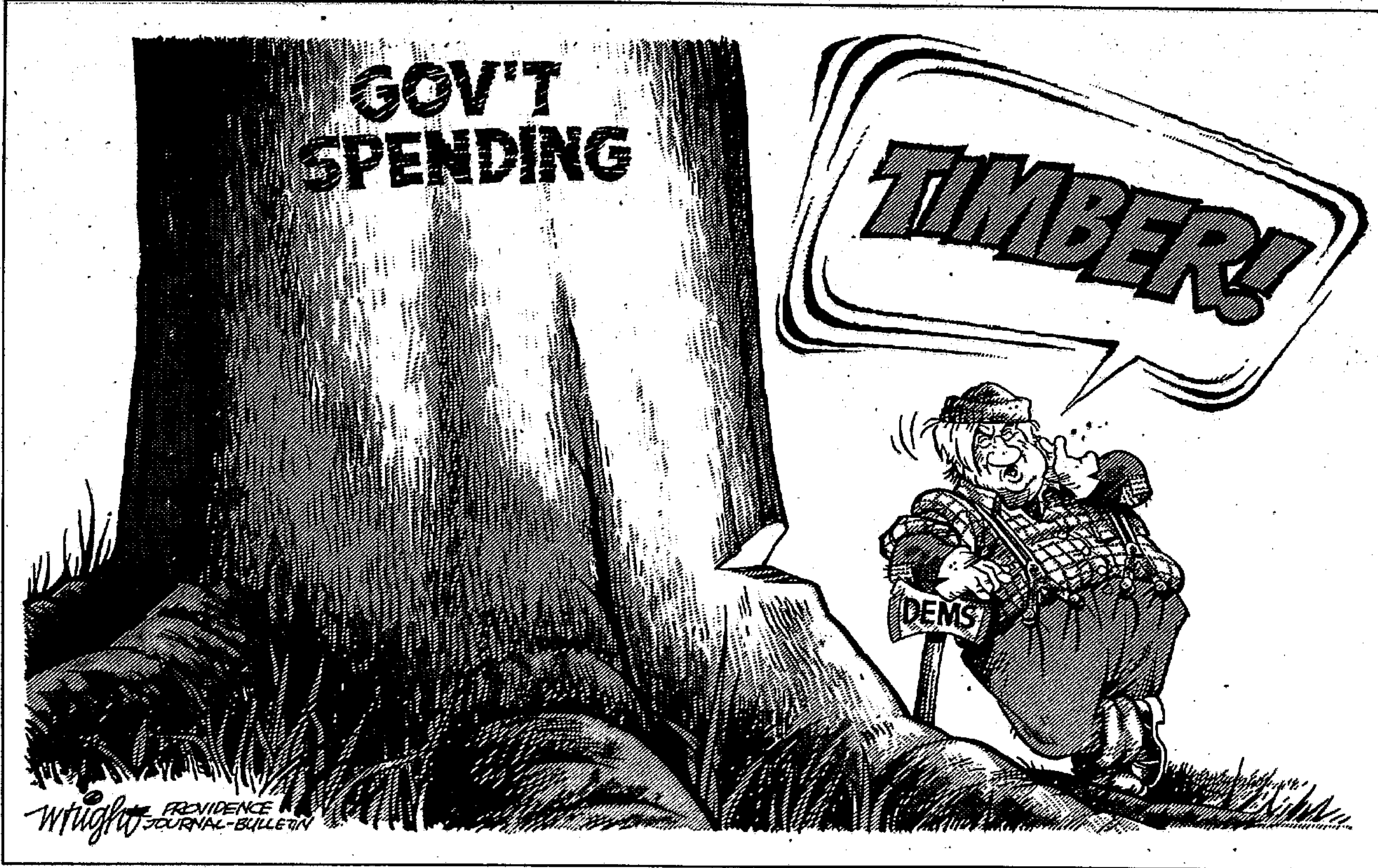

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE**—Some politicians always seem strangely young, no matter what their actual age may be. It is as though they always have promising futures, when the present is what really matters.

Ted Kennedy is that way. No matter how long he serves in the Senate, to some he will always be "Teddy," the younger brother whose day is still to come.

Gary Hart has something of the same problem. He speaks nobly about the value of youth and new ideas, but somehow he seems to lack the maturity to buckle down and produce the plans for our nation that he perennially promises.

The problem isn't limited to politicians on the national scene; it applies here at home too. It's one of the things, for instance, that will hurt Tom Rutherford if he decides to become the third Democrat running for his party's nomination for governor.

Rutherford, now in his fourth term as a state Senator, has always been seen as a man of "promise," but promise isn't enough to sustain a career. One wonders when the promiser is finally going to deliver. Maybe this is Rutherford's time—and maybe it isn't.

For one thing, if Rutherford gets into the race, it's clear he will be sort of backing in, not coming head-on at the project of running out of a deep conviction that being governor of New Mexico at just this moment is his destiny. If he becomes a candidate, it will mainly be because some liberals in the party are disgruntled with their present choices and want to talk somebody—anybody—they can support wholeheartedly into making that race.

But there is also the question of how many New Mexicans feel the need for a candidate who has almost always simply followed the textbook, ADA-type liberal line, right on down even to favoring legalization of marijuana. Those are not ideas that will play well in Loco Hills.

Rutherford is reportedly now touching base with his party's leaders in the state, mainly to see if money is likely to be forthcoming if he makes the race. That may settle the issue once and for all. Democrats, one hears, are largely keeping their hands on their wallets these days; and many of those willing to make large contributions have already promised their support to Ray Powell, who despite some weaknesses, is not a Johnny-come-lately in the contest.

One commentator here, remarking on a possible Rutherford run, makes much of the fact that political consultant Brian Sanderoff is available to assist an effort by the Senator. That's true, and it could well be Sanderoff's availability—that is, the fact that nobody else wants to hire him—that started the search for a third candidate in the first place. Unless Rutherford runs successfully, Brian isn't likely to have a client in the governor's chair, and so he may lose out on

those juicy contracts Democratic governors in the past have given him.

On balance, it would seem probable that Rutherford will decide not to run. If 1986 is a year in which New Mexicans are willing to elect another Democrat to succeed the one who now occupies the governor's chair, it isn't very likely they will choose another self-confessed liberal for the job.

Unless Rutherford is willing to make some bigger philosophical changes than we have a right to expect, he will probably be wiser to go on being an aging but still-promising member of the Senate.

How important is youth in political matters? It's hard to say, but it would not seem likely that the citizens of New Mexico, when they go to the polls this November, will be looking for that as a major attraction in those they vote for.

After four years of Toney Anaya, our state is in such shape that it will be almost impossible for the next governor to run it at all. That certainly wouldn't suggest that we should be searching for someone for that job with what George Eliot rightly says afflicts the young, a "strangely perspectiveless view of life."

That's what we've been putting up with for four years, and we aren't very probably going to be comfortable with more of it. Instead, most of those likely to vote this fall who are already expressing opinions tell this writer they will be looking for an extraordinary degree of maturity and proved judgment in those they plan to cast their ballots for.

## Editorial

The only things standing in the way of an animal shelter for this area are volunteer help and financial contributions.

A shelter will provide a place for homeless animals to stay while awaiting adoption. No such long-term-stay facilities are presently available in this area. Instead, animals are kept for a short time, then if not adopted, they are "put to sleep."

According to Cyndy Livingston of the Lincoln County Humane Society, the animal shelter on Gavilan Canyon Road is under construction and just lacks funding or volunteer help to complete the roof, dry walling, kennel work, electrical work, some woodworking and labor to erect kennel fencing.

She said the shelter could be complete by April or May if the necessary money and labor are received soon to make possible construction of the last fourth of the shelter.

Livingston pointed out that about \$3,000 worth of plumbing labor and materials were donated, and that a volunteer work crew from Camp Sierra Blanca will help out at the construction site this week. All work on the shelter to date has been made possible through donations and money raised by fundraisers.

Even after the shelter is constructed and ready to house animals, volunteer help will continue to be needed to guarantee success of the program. Livingston said she hopes students, senior citizens and other interested animal lovers will be willing to lend some time to operating the shelter.

Having a shelter here for animals depends largely on our willingness to help make it work. Let's take the time to donate some time or money to make sure the Lincoln County animal shelter is a success.—DJP
