

## FAA accepts airport appraisal

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has accepted the Ruidoso Municipal Airport appraisal submitted by the Village of Ruidoso.

A letter to Village Manager James J. Hill, dated March 10, and signed by William E. Henderson, manager of the FAA's Albuquerque Airport District Office, said the appraisal was acceptable.

The letter states that the appraisal was a "very good" one, with the FAA's "major comments" being "minor" and "easily corrected."

Henderson said he recommended that the Village "proceed with the appraisal" and that the FAA "will be in touch with the Village as the appraisal is completed."

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Village Councilman William J. Hill said he was "very pleased" with the appraisal.

## Grand jury looks at jails

A District Court special grand jury was discharged Monday, April 14, finding after nearly three months of investigation that Lincoln County jails are in satisfactory condition.

The grand jury found that jails in Lincoln County are clean, serve three nutritious meals a day, have adequate religious services and that the moral of inmates and

jailers is high, according to District Court documents.

The grand jury report was signed by Ralph Petty, grand jury foreman, ending the investigation that began when the jury was called into session January 22.

District Judge Richard Parsons praised the efforts of the grand jury.

## Business license fees concern Downs Trustees

"Excuse my frank language, but we have a disaster in our business code with regard to our business licensing," village of Ruidoso Downs attorney Don Dutton told the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees at their regular meeting last Monday.

Dutton and the Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees would like the public to discuss business licensing regulations with the board at their next regularly scheduled meeting.

Dutton and several members of the board would like to charge seasonal businesses (like Frank's Fruit Market) one licensing fee and another fee to itinerant or short term mobile business people.

Seasonal business licenses would be granted to business people who were in a fixed location more than 75 days.

Short term licenses would be issued to businesses who operated from a mobile unit on weekends or racing days, Dutton said.

Board members did not want to discourage vendors who sold from a truck or other vehicle, but they felt itinerant sellers needed to be regulated by the village.

The board asked for discussion on licensing fees from the public at the next regular meeting.

In other business the board: —Accepted the resignation of Ruidoso Downs Police Officer Larry Cox.

—Approved a trip by Wilma Webb to the clerks and finance officer's meeting in Artesia in late April.

—Approved new sewer lines. —Agreed to support the welcoming of horsemen by groups in the village of Ruidoso.

## School Board sets budget

Faced with the possibility of zero student growth next year, the Ruidoso Board of Education approved a proposed operational budget of \$5,821,063 for the 1986-1987 school year.

Ruidoso Municipal Schools (RMS) superintendent Sid Miller will submit the operating budget for the 1986-1987 school year to the Office of Education in Santa Fe for their approval.

Miller warned the board the district could face staff cuts if RMS loses a substantial number of students in the 1986-1987 school year.

School districts in New Mexico receive education revenues from the state based in part on the

number of students enrolled in the district.

Associate superintendent Mike Gladden told the board RMS could face budget adjustments next year if only 10 students left the district.

In other business the board: —Refused to hear a motion on a lunch price increase.

—Mandated the cheerleading program at the middle school be continued.

—Heard some school sponsors would lose their club sponsor increments.

—Discussed a regional meeting for board of education members.

—Approved a life skills program for middle school students which is sponsored by the Noon Lions Club.

It looks like 1987 could be the year the Ruidoso High School boys track team duplicates the feat of the 1965 Warrior state-championship football team.

The bulk of the Warrior team is composed of juniors who have a lot of potential and should continue to get better. Among the individuals who have the best chances of winning the district title and doing well at the state meet this season, almost all of them are juniors.

Jeff Willingham, a junior, is one of the leading javelin throwers in the state with a 175-7 best.

Junior Gabe Tam has developed into probably the best 1,600-meter and 3,200-meter runner in the southern part of the state.

Verlon Edwards, a 12-6 pole vaulter, and 6-0 high jumper Mark Airington, also are juniors.

Brian Davis, a 200-meter standout and relay runner, is another junior as are Chuck Daniels, Bubba Miller, Billy Harrison and Matt Evans, more sprinter-relay runners. Willingham also is a fine sprinter-relay runner.

Willingham, Davis, Tam and Edwards are near-cinches for state meet berths in individual events this season.

Willingham and Tam made the "big meet" last season, Davis qualified on four relay teams and Edwards just missed out.

Airington has shown great improvement in the high jump. The Warrior coaches think he could go 6-4 by the end of the season.

Miller, Harrison, Daniels and Evans all have done well in relay events and the open sprints this season.

Top sophomore prospects include javelin thrower Todd Morris, long jumper-high jumper Kirk Ryan and distance runner Clint Bob.

So the Warriors have a bright track future.

They should do well this season, but 1987 should be the banner campaign.

The Warrior girls track team also has a bright future.

Although the team hasn't score many points in invitational competition this season, the bulk of the athletes are sophomores and freshmen.

Linder Rad, Dari Stierwalt and Kristin Tidmore are freshman standouts who should make their mark in future seasons.

Sophomore Cindi Harrison and junior Shannon Lee are other potential standouts.

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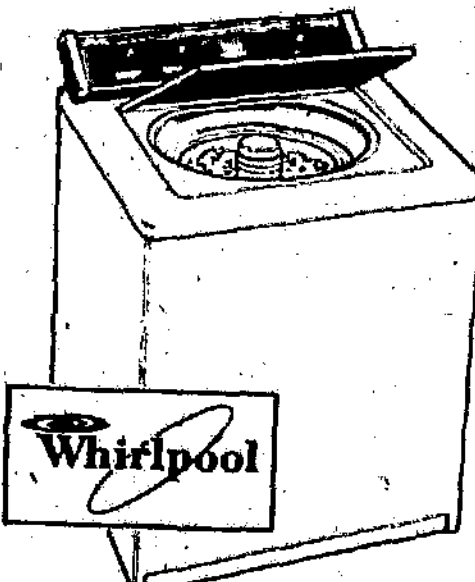
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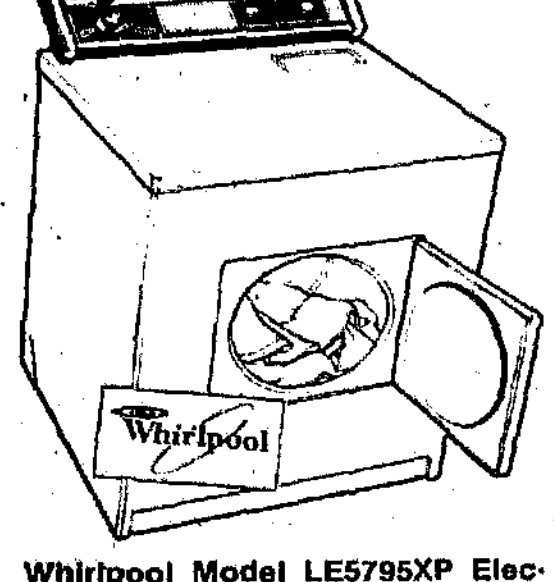

Local track fans will get a chance to watch the Ruidoso High School boys and girls teams at home for once when the Warriors have their Ruidoso Invitational Saturday, April 19.

The field events and some running event trials will start at 10:30 a.m. Running event finals will be in the afternoon.

Besides Ruidoso, Lovington, Artesia and Tularosa also will compete in the meet.

The Warrior boys are coming off a sixth-place performance in the prestigious Roswell Invitational last Saturday. The young Warrior girls teams did not score a point at Roswell, but had some fine efforts.

President's budget proposals, who wanted to "tell us what's good for us." He said such attitudes from the Reagan White House are a "diservice to the people."

Runnels praised Republican Senator Pete Domenici for his efforts on behalf of bi-partisan budget proposals.

He said Senator Domenici took a "very courageous stand" in advocating the plan that calls for increasing taxes to meet conditions of the Gramm-Rudman Act.

Rural water supplies, the Small Business Administration and rural economic development are just a few areas Runnels named that "have big zeros behind them in the President's budget."

"We don't have any local problems which aren't national problems," noted Runnels. He said he has conferred with the state congressional delegation about problems caused by the "miles and miles" of unfenced area on the New Mexico/Mexico border, but has seen no legislation dealing with the problem.

He also recalled asking congressmen for help in dealing with New Mexico's water problems.

"You can't turn water into a mere item of commerce because water will flow uphill to money,"

said Runnels.

Runnels stressed party unity during his speech.

In an interview before his speech, Runnels blamed the coalition for making it difficult to get anything passed in the past two legislative sessions, and spoke of a "bloc of people who control the Senate and have an Albuquerque bias."

"If you want to name names, it's Les Houston," he added.

In that interview Runnels said he has always had his own agenda within the Anaya administration. Although he and the Governor disagreed over some issues, Runnels said they have not taken their disagreements to the media.

Runnels said he formed a close liaison with local governments and has been an advocate for the needs of rural communities in the state.

Besides lobbying to gain community development and public works monies for local governments, Runnels said he went to the cattle growers and asked them to drop their opposition to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, and they did.

"What we have been able to do is ours," stressed Runnels. "I'm counting on local government officials to carry that message to the public," he added.

Runnels said he'll be taking his own message "door-to-door." Dur-

ing his visits, Runnels said he'll be asking voters what they think the problems facing the district and nation are.

"People in this district have never expected Washington to take care of their problems," he said.

The 40-year-old Runnels is a native New Mexican whose family has maintained a home in Ruidoso since 1959. He is a graduate of Lovington High School, Colorado College and the University of Texas School of Law. He has two sons: Josh, 14, and Sean, 10.

"I'm willing to work hard to get the job and I'm going to work hard on the job," said Runnels.

Runnels was among a host of candidates and their representatives on hand for the meeting Tuesday. Runnels spoke on behalf of gubernatorial hopeful Ray Powell.

Don Dutton called for support for Melesia Heilberg, a candidate for secretary of state. She'll be opposed by Rebecca Vigil in the primary.

Lincoln McTeigue asked members to vote for Alex Armijo for state land commissioner, calling him "a hell of an honest man."

Speaking for State Supreme Court candidate William W. "Bill" Bivins, John Underwood called him "one of the most honorable brightest jurists that this state has ever been blessed with."

Dick Ransom, running for

another slot on the State Supreme Court, was praised by Dutton as a man who "will bring us a balance that we need on that Supreme Court."

Steve Sanders, unopposed in the primary for State Representative District 52, pledged that he will be available to talk to the people of Lincoln County.

"I don't think I have all the answers, but I'm willing to listen," said Sanders.

Ralph Dunlap of Lincoln, a candidate for County Commissioner District One, voiced his support for the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

"I personally feel that that airport will not only benefit Ruidoso, but also Capitan and on into Lincoln," said Dunlap.

Dub Williams, also a candidate for County Commissioner District One, said he "threw his hat into the ring" because he found he had the time to devote after retiring as a Ruidoso Public Schools teacher.

"I like to accentuate the positive and eliminate the negative," said Williams.

John Hightower is unopposed in his bid for the Democratic nomination to County Commission District Two.

"I will put in the time and the effort to do the job," he said, who has previously served six years on the commission.

A candidate for County Commission District Three, Jim Woodbridge said he is "openminded, fair ... and can work with any of the candidates."

Ruidoso Village Councillor and Mayor Pro-tem Jerry Shaw is the other Democratic candidate for County Commission District Three. "I can bring a certain amount of unity and communication between the two governing bodies," said Shaw.

Coleta Elliott, president of the Lincoln County Democratic Women, got a standing ovation in announcing her bid for Lincoln County Clerk.

"I will serve you with honesty, dedication and loyalty," said Elliott.

Dave Pfeffer, operations commander for the Ruidoso Police Department, is a candidate for Lincoln County Sheriff.

"I will bring control back to law enforcement for Lincoln County," said Pfeffer.

Jim Nesmith, a retired New Mexico police officer, is also running for the Democratic nomination for sheriff.

"I would appreciate your vote," said Nesmith.

Democrat Jackie Martin of Carrizozo is running for re-election as Probate Judge. Martin, past president of the Lincoln County

Democratic Women and current treasurer of the group, called on members to support her in her bid. Former Ruidoso Mayor George White, who wasn't present Tuesday, also is running for the Democratic nomination for Probate Judge.

Gerald Dean Jr. of Capitan is a candidate for Magistrate Judge. He listed DWI, drugs and hunters trespassing as issues in his area. "These problems can be corrected ... they affect us all," said Dean.

S.M. Ortiz, Dean's opponent in the Democratic primary, was not present Tuesday.

Barbara Langley of Carrizozo, who has worked in the Lincoln County Courthouse for six years, is unopposed for the Democratic nomination for County Treasurer.

"I feel that I can be competent and conscientious, and I have a good positive attitude," said Langley.

Elliott listed a number of upcoming events where candidates will again have their say.

She said the Democratic Women will sponsor a Meet the Candidates pie supper and auction at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 17, at the fair building in Capitan. The club will have a booth at the Spring Wing Ding Fling Thing on May 9-10, at the Sierra Mall.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—How much can an administration accomplish in eight and a half months still left to it in office? Unfortunately, probably not nearly as much as presently needs accomplishing.

Governor Anaya recently gave us a list of ten things he intends to concentrate on during what remains of his term. Though the items vary in importance, as they almost always do in such catalogs, everything he suggests merits deep consideration.

He would be justified in skipping the other nine if he would simply accomplish the one to which he, strangely enough, gives second place. It is described as "concentrating attention on our state's fiscal crisis and taking steps and making recommendations to assist the next Governor and Legislature in meeting this problem."

Phrases like "taking steps" and "making recommendations" sound refreshingly humble from a man who almost certainly would have spoken only about "solving" such problems just three short years ago.

That Anaya list also serves to remind us that his major weakness may have been to have only projects, when a plan was needed.

Our next governor must be able to look at the facts of government and see them as something other than discrete items on a list. There is no such thing as government by litany; the job can't be done simply by addressing topics one by one.

Instead, a chief executive who has what New Mexico needs at this time must understand how the

parts of state government interrelate and interact with one another. He has to know what will happen there if he puts pressure here. Unless he begins with carefully considered principals and a consistent body of knowledge about this peculiar institution, what we will get will be four more years of impetuous tinkering on the road to disaster.

In all fairness, neither the Anaya administration nor the Legislature of these years have been without accomplishment. What is sad, however, is that the accomplishment has been so thin at a time when robust and successful actions were needed as the order of the day.

Ray Powell has written the satchems of the Democratic party to tell them he accepts the leadership position in the party. That may strike some as a little premature, since Powell is at the moment merely a member of the party, more or less on a par with all others who declare themselves Democrats when they fill out registration forms. After he becomes the nominee of the party for its top position in-state he may become its leader, but he hasn't quite gotten himself there yet.

Besides, that "titular" leadership of the party the media speak of is really something of a myth. Any person is a leader only to the extent that certain others are content to be followers—a condition which has not in the past appeared too attractive to New Mexicans of any category, not least of all Democrats. Members of that party tend to mill

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about a lot, which is discernibly different from following any merely titular leader.

Last year, the publisher of one of the papers carrying this column proposed that it should rate legislators. "Tell us which ones you think do a good job and which ones do a bad one," he suggested.

It sounded like a good idea—but prudence prevailed.

After all, a New Mexico political commentator has to live with these folks, year in and year out. They are more than objects of coverage; they are also subjects, and occa-

sionally sources.

It might seem like fawning to designate some of them as "best," and it would be unpleasant to see pain in the eyes of those one had called "worst."

It's not that the writer is unduly shy, or believes himself incapable of making the judgements required. He thinks he knows quite clearly what the characteristics of a good legislator are—and it is those very same characteristics that designate by their absence what a bad legislator is.

Still, it seems wisest to let you intuit what such rankings are, without listing them badly.

## Editorial

The arguments for having representation back and forth between meetings of the Ruidoso Village Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission certainly sound strong on first mention. Having a councillor at Planning and Zoning meetings and a commissioner at each council meeting sounds like a sure way toward better communication.

But reliance on the representative for an account of the other's meeting can be asking for trouble.

One person's report of what happens at a meeting can be strikingly different than the next person's account. Recent court decisions involving the council's and commission's decisions on zoning-related matters have hinged on the irregularities of such information exchanging.

A suggestion to instead exchange reports—more detailed and explanatory than minutes—between the two groups makes a lot of sense.

In matters as important as those that share the interest of both groups, like zonings and annexations, perhaps reducing discussion and reasons for making decisions to a precise report will be simpler for all in the long run.—DJP

## Reporter's Round

It's hard to live in Lincoln County and not chase the ghosts of history. Last Sunday I rode the Capitan Range trying to put together some more bits and pieces in the life of Billy The Kid.

But the hot dry wind seemed to whisper the names of the men and women who shaped this rugged part of the Southwest.

I saw horses, cows, hawks and even snakes, set in a panorama of crude bridges, wood-stump fences and windmills.

Fueled by Sunday's strong winds, the windmills pumped tirelessly, as if life had not and would never change for the settlers of the hilly range.

Suddenly, a strange and cold sensation crawled up my spine, even as the bright sun sparkled against the pebbles in the Rio Ruidoso.

And as the warm winds whistled through the trees, I knew the mysteries of more than 100 years ago were calling my name. The ghosts of history... the ghosts of the Lincoln County War... had shown themselves.

It all began somewhere between Glencoe and San Patricio.

A former army Major by the name of Lawrence G. Murphy had opened a store in Lincoln called The House of Murphy. He and his three partners, James Dolan, John Riley and Emil Fritz, were beginning to become wealthy selling stolen cattle and flour meant for the Mesqueros to the soldiers at Fort Stanton and the Lincoln townspeople.

They wanted to crush the legendary cattle baron John Chisum. Chisum had declared all the land 200 miles north, south, west and east of his ranch as part of his empire. One man had claimed 16,000 square miles of the Southwest. Chisum was considered a threat to everyone in the region.

Chisum's friend, a likeable, scrawny Englishman named John Tunstall seemed to be good at everything he did.

He could ranch, he was a good investor, and with Chisum's blessings, he opened a bank and a general store in Lincoln, much to the dismay of Murphy and his men.

A lawyer named Alexander McSween had been hired by Murphy to collect a \$10,000 life insurance policy on the estate of his partner Fritz, who had died suddenly.

But McSween embezzled most of the insurance settlement and had to side with Chisum and Tunstall when Murphy and his partners threatened to kill him.

The Murphy group sent Lincoln County Sheriff William Brady down to Tunstall's ranch on the Rio Feliz to foreclose on his cattle for the odd reason that the cattle really belonged to McSween.

But Tunstall told Brady to avoid a shootout they better settle things in Lincoln.

Tunstall, his foreman John Mid-

leton, Dick Brewer and a seventeen-year-old who was fiercely loyal to Tunstall—who called himself Billy Bonney—set out for Lincoln.

Near San Patricio, Brady's deputy and a posse from Lincoln caught up with Tunstall, who was alone because he sent his men to kill wild turkeys and pick mescal for a stew.

One of the men in the posse, Jesse Evans, shot clean through Tunstall's chest at close range with his rifle.

The sides were drawn. A dark period in America's and New Mexico's history had begun. The Lincoln County War had started.

Much has been made of the rest of Billy The Kid's life after the Tunstall incident.

A longtime resident of the Hondo Valley, Lillian Klasner, who knew "The Kid," first came to Hondo with her parents in 1867. She kept diaries until a few years before World War II.

Sadly, her diaries, with old newspaper clippings and photos from her lifetime, were lost in 1946.

But in 1966, her diaries and memoirs were miraculously found in an abandoned adobe hut along the banks of the Rio Ruidoso.

Klasner also personally knew John Chisum and his niece Sally, the McSween's, the Murphy's and Pat Garrett.

She was only a few years younger than The Kid.

Her mother was not very fond of Billy The Kid. She often called him a "sneaky little horse-thief."

And Klasner did not have a high opinion of Billy The Kid either.

But she did pay him a begrudging compliment in her memoirs. She said Billy The Kid worked at maintaining his skills and reputation.

Klasner said, "The Kid was active and graceful as a cat. At Seven Rivers he practiced continually with pistol or rifle, often riding at a run and dodging behind the side of his mount to fire, as the Apaches did. He was very proud of his ability to pick up a handkerchief or other object from the ground while riding at a run."

Billy The Kid spent the last years of his short life in and out of one prison or another.

When he was out of prison he would steal cattle from Chisum's ranch on the Pecos, sell them to buyers at the railroad yards in the Northern part of the state, steal some horses from the Northern ranchers and sell them to the cattle ranchers in Southeastern New Mexico.

But when he humiliated Lincoln County Sheriff Pat Garrett by killing two of his best deputies, J.W. Bell and Robert Olinger, while escaping from the Lincoln County Courthouse (the old Murphy general store), the Lincoln County War and one of its youngest victims, were laid to rest by Garrett's single-action .44-40 Colt.

I gathered the following statistics for the Ruidoso Hondo-Valley Hospital Board and have given them to Ken Moore:

—New births at the Ruidoso HV Hospital from 1981-1985 (children not in school as of 12/31/85) : 1,156  
—Children in grades 1-6 who will be attending the Ruidoso Municipal Schools this coming school year : 838

—Total children in Capitan Schools, grade K-6 : 285

Statistics are not readily available for the rest of Lincoln County

Therefore, we have approximately 2,300 children in Ruidoso and Capitan. Historically, school bond issues have never failed to pass in Ruidoso. The voters evidently believe that our children are the future of Ruidoso. I wonder whether the Hospital Board of Directors feel the same?

Several RHVH Board Members told me recently that the hospital does not have the funds to recruit a pediatrician, although they are recruiting an internist and possibly another general practitioner. We know the hospital has recruited or financially assisted family practice physicians, a urologist and an

internist.

The last pediatrician who practiced in Ruidoso was seeing 20 patients a day. This meets Mr. Moore's economic criterion. The currently depressed local economy has taken its toll across the board, including the RHVH. It now seems apparent that a new pediatrician will likely come to Ruidoso on his own, with no hospital sponsorship. It is unfortunate that the Hospital Board's priorities lie elsewhere at this time. Statistics seem to indicate the desire and capability of the community to support a fulltime pediatrician. Hospital support or not, a pediatrician will have to weigh these variables on his own. Think how much easier his task would be if he knew he had not only public but hospital support?

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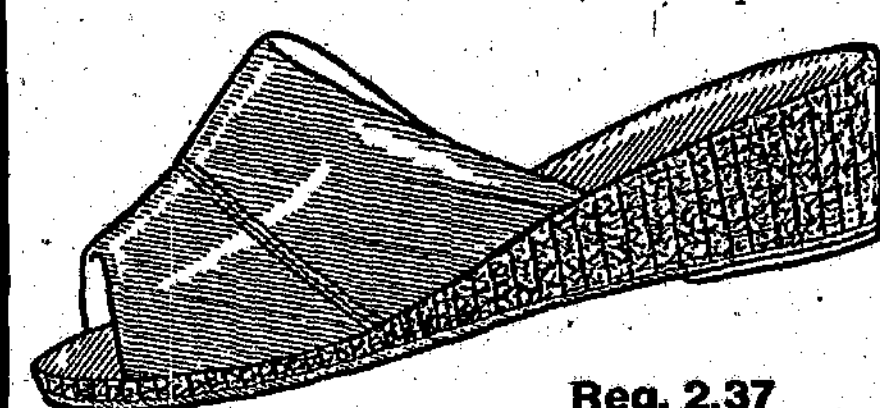
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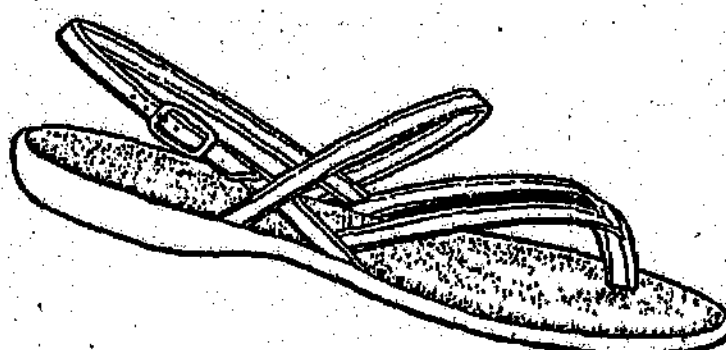
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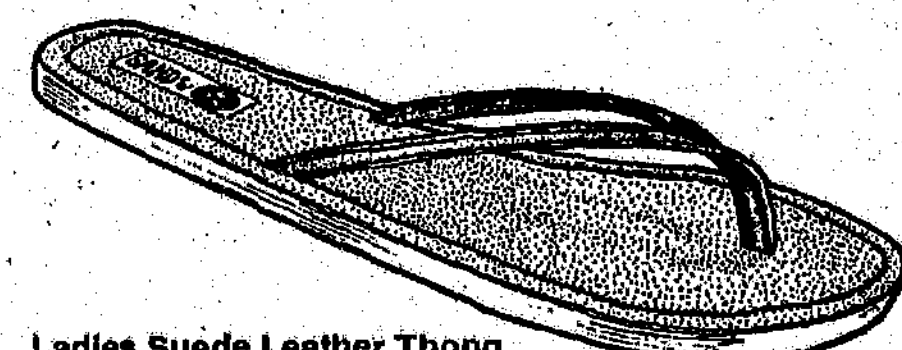

# Sunland Park Hoofbeats Northern Demon takes win

Following Magic Street's impressive win in the \$25,000 El Paso Herald Post Handicap on Saturday, April 12, at Sunland Park, trainer Billy Myers said the race was a tune-up for the Sunland Park Handicap. "His best distance is at a mile or more. But he sure looked good at 4 1/2 furlongs today," said Myers in the winner's circle.

In addition to showing a good effort in preparing for the race handicap, Myers said Saturday's win was important for another reason. "We plan to stand him at stud in New Mexico next year and winning a stakes race is really important for that."

The \$5,000 it cost to supplement Mr. Monkey Jet into the \$25,000 Sun Country Stakes has already paid off for owner Marilyn Hiler of Mansfield, Texas, and trainer

Dwayne "Sleep" Gilbreath. The gelding turned in the fastest qualifying time among 50 entries with a 17.68-second effort over the 358-yard course.

Gilbreath and Jack Brooks each had big days during the trials, qualifying three horses each into the finals. Jerry Lantieri had two. Jerrey Allen Holmiller Jr. made three horses into the finals and four into

the consolation, while Gary Sampson also headed three into the finals and one into the consolation. Terry Layton qualified two for the finals.

Two season best times were set on Saturday, April 12, at Sunland Park. Imperial Age set the mark at 5 furlongs with a 58.1 seconds, while Hi Flyin' Waho turned in a 21.67-second clocking over 450 yards.

Mike Dahlberg moved into the lead in the jockey standings when he rode Magic Street to victory in the El Paso Herald Post Handicap on Saturday, April 12. He now has 60 wins for the season after taking three horses to the winner's circle over the weekend. He shared

Jockey-of-the-Week honors with Gary Sampson, Alex Holmiller, Joe Holmiller, Darrell Holmiller and Dwayne Sterling, all of whom also had three firsts.

Holmiller's riding moved him into fifth in the overall standings. Dwayne Sorenson broke into the tenth spot.

Fred Denley had three winners over the weekend to earn Trainer of the Week honors, moving him into third in the trainer standings. Cliff Lambert still leads the conditioners with 36 wins over the season.

Northern Demon, claimed by trainer Dwayne Rosenberger for Richard Birch earlier in the meet for \$6,250, stunned the stakes win-

ner Acrophane in the featured 10th race Friday afternoon at The Downs at Albuquerque.

Under jockey J.P. Maxwell, Northern Demon led for nearly the entire seven furlongs while finishing a full length ahead of the 7-5 favorite.

Acrophane, Flying Sumner made a late move to finish a distant third in the field of eight.

The victory was the second of the meet for Northern Demon. His other top finish was the winner's circle in the \$6,250 claiming race in which

Rosenberger captured the four-year-old colt for owner Barbara E. Birch.

Evening from the outside post in the field of eight did not bother Northern Demon. Maxwell kept him at or near the lead through much of

the run over the track stretch. Coming into the turn, Northern Demon opened up a three-length lead but held Acrophane safe in the final furlong.

Northern Demon covered the seven furlongs in 1:51.1 and returned \$25.50, \$3.40 and \$1.00. Acrophane paid \$3.60 and \$2.40 with Flying Sumner returning \$3.00 for the show.

The \$2.00 exacta 5-3 was worth \$3.00.

## Big Chill takes win

Big Chill established himself as the favorite for the April 25 Old Town Derby when he landed the previously undefeated colt. My Friend Adam has first loss in the featured ninth race Saturday at The Downs at Albuquerque.

Big Chill, under jockey Steve Lantieri, used his usual late running tactics to perfection once again as he pulled past horses through the line to set the victory by a whisker. The 2-1 favorite over Dublin's 1-2, My Friend Adam, who had the advantage for most of the race, finished third with Summer Time far back in the field of five.

Trained by Jeff Derrahl, Big Chill was born a just year's Santa Fe favorite before competing against some of the top horses in the nation at Kentucky and New York.

Lantieri indicated that the next colt for Big Chill is in the Old Town Derby, where he will likely be the favorite after the impressive win in the Saturday feature.

My Friend Adam, who was struggling out to try two turns for the first time, held on gamely through the stretch and will likely be back for a rematch in the Old Town Derby. The Derby Short turned out well, underwritten in two lifetime starts, finishing the Eldorado Handicap third.

Big Chill covered the mile in 1:29.1 and returned \$5.60, \$3.00 and \$2.20 as the 4-5 favorite. Dublin's 1-2 returned \$4.80 and \$2.40 with My Friend Adam paying \$3.20 for the show. The \$2.00 exacta 5-3 paid \$7.00.

## Sunland to simulcast Kentucky Derby

With the recent approval of the New Mexico State Racing Commission, general manager Rick Benson announced that Sunland Park has contracted with Churchill Downs to simulcast the 113th running of the Kentucky Derby scheduled May 3.

"We'll be carrying the race live on our track monitors as the focal point of Derby Day at Sunland," Benson said. "We were pleasantly surprised at the reception to our first Derby simulcast last year, which offered racing fans the opportunity to actually wager on the most famous leg of the prestigious Thoroughbred Triple Crown."

Benson said Sunland will offer win, place, show and quinella wagering on the Kentucky Derby. The race will be scheduled as the sixth event on a 12-race program.

The 26th running of the Sunland Park Handicap will highlight the remaining 11 races, which will be run "live" at Sunland on the Derby Day card.

"The Sunland Park Handicap is a perfect complement to the Derby simulcast," Benson said. "This race has traditionally featured the best distance thoroughbreds in the Southwest. The great stakes horse Curriat has won the Handicap for the past two years, and word is that he'll be coming back to try and make it three this year."

Past performances for the complete field for the Kentucky Derby will be included in the Racing Form available at Sunland. The day's official program also will contain the field with a projected "morning line" transmitted from Churchill

Downs in Louisville, Kentucky, to aid in handicapping.

"Our track stewards and announcer will be keeping in direct contact with the officials at Churchill that day to provide our fans with updates on weather and track conditions, and to verify the official results of the Derby," Benson said.

As part of Sunland's Derby Day festivities, Benson said the track will be serving mint juleps in commemorative 1986 Kentucky Derby glasses.

"Our clubhouse will be decorated for the occasion," he added, "and many of our employees will be wearing attire traditionally associated with the elegance and pageantry of the Kentucky Derby."

The Derby Day program will get under way at 1 p.m., with Sunland's gates opening at 10 a.m.

## Favored Rene's Queen takes Albuquerque race

The 7-5 favorite Rene's Queen did not disappoint her backers as she took a length and a quarter victory in the featured 10th race Wednesday afternoon at The Downs at Albuquerque.

Under jockey Casy Lambert, Rene's Queen rallied through the stretch to get to the lead, then had to hold off the late challenge by Danang Mizahl and Fodish Valentine. Fodish Valentine got up for second along the rail while Danang Mizahl made a strong run to get the show.

The victory was the second for the J. Dwyer Eubanks trainee at the meet as she defeated a similar tract

or fillet and comes early in the season in her most recent races.

Rene's Queen had been losing stakes earlier in the season. A step back to face a slightly weaker field was all she needed to return to the winning circle.

Rene's Queen covered the six and one-half furlongs in 1:24.1 and returned \$5.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00. Fodish Valentine paid \$4.00 and \$2.40. Danang Mizahl returned \$3.00 for the show. The \$2.00 exacta 7-5 was worth \$22.00.

Wednesday's crowd of 1,174 watched a Wednesday record turnout of \$35,990.

## Tony Lama executive and his family make a hobby of horse racing

In past years Frank and Carol Tisdale were lured to Ruidoso to escape El Paso's desert heat. This summer the lure will be Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

"We have a place in Ruidoso and were going up there nearly every weekend last summer," said Tisdale, an executive vice president of Tony Lama Co. Inc., in describing how he became addicted to horse racing. "We would go to the track pretty regular and one day I wondered what it would be like to own a race horse."

"We asked around about how to get started. Then we got an owner's license, hired Albert (Dominguez) for a trainer and bought some

horses. Now it has become a family hobby that has changed all of our lives."

Since deciding to make the plunge into racing, the Tisdales have built a well-respected and competitive stable of thoroughbreds who have earned commendable records at Sunland Park this season. They give most of the credit to trainer Dominguez.

"Albert has done a super good job with our horses. Most of them have improved and moved up in class since he took them over," said Tisdale.

Dominguez was recommended to the Tisdales last summer in Ruidoso about the same time they bought their first two horses - Miss

Sun Tag and Eastern Royale. They bought two horses at the Summer Sale For Select Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso and rounded out the remainder of their 11-horse stable with purchases from claiming races.

Among Tisdale's horses that have moved up to allowance and stakes competition under Dominguez are Addendum, who was claimed for \$8,000; Incredible T, who was claimed for \$8,000; Lovely Glass, claimed for \$5,000; and Miss Sun Tag, purchased for \$8,250. Also included in the stable are such Sunland Park crowd favorites as Zulu Liz, Turntogether and Graceful Gator.

"Frank has a very good sense for

picking out horses," said Dominguez of Tisdale's efforts to build a strong racing stable from the claiming ranks. "Nearly all of them have been very good runners."

Tisdale said he looks for winners by studying their past performances. "I look at who has been riding and training the horse. If I think it is in good condition and can win, then I'd be interested. But I just buy the horses. It's Albert who improves them."

Dominguez, 38, has been a trainer for eight years. But he has made a living around race tracks since he got a job as a stall cleaner at Sunland Park when he was 13 years old. He worked as a clocker, flag boy, and on the starting gates at Sunland Park. He was schooled for horse conditioning by such trainers as D. Wayne Lucas, Ner-

rell Bruney, Johnny Nall and Jake Cascia.

Dominguez' wife, Lisa, was also a trainer when the two first met while he was working with the starting gate crew at the State Fair Meet in Albuquerque. "She's now my assistant trainer and is in charge of running the stable. She's the one who keeps everything running in perfect order," said Dominguez.

In describing his strategy for getting a horse to perform at its top level, Dominguez said that "after we get a new horse I leave them in the stall for three or four days to see if they are healthy."

"I start working them with the same equipment the previous trainer had used, then make adjustments that are better suited and most comfortable to the horse. We work the horse on the track to

determine its best distance. Then we look for a jockey who is a good match for the running style."

In the few months that Tisdale has been a racing addict, he said he has "given up my golf on Saturday morning and go running at night to spend all my leisure time pampering my horses."

Carol Tisdale now finds her hands full "keeping the books" and their daughter, Lori, uses her home computer to handle races. She was the one who recommended that Zulu Liz be claimed. Their son John has such a desire to be a jockey that he spends a good portion of his free time riding, despite having a cast on a broken leg.

"It's amazing how much all of this has changed our lives," said Tisdale. "But I wouldn't trade it for anything. There's nothing better than seeing one of your horses win."

## Pic-Six fan wins \$11,277 at Sunland

Sitting in for jockey Jim Powell, who was injured in the first race on Sunday's program, veteran rider Leroy Coombs steered overwhelming favorite Curtwince to his third straight win over Sunland Park's mile course in the day's feature allowance race.

Sunland's four-day Pic-Six pool was busted on Sunday, when one lucky fan held the only ticket correctly picking the winners of the fifth through tenth races. A total of 2,994 fans wagered \$10,908 chasing Sunday's carryover of nearly \$7,000. The single winning ticket - a \$288 investment - returned \$11,277.

Powell was reported to have suffered a broken pelvis in an accident that occurred while the field was being loaded into the gates for the opening race on Sunday's program. Coombs accepted two of Powell's eight mounts on the afternoon rac-

ing program, including the assignment aboard Curtwince in the mile-long feature.

Curtwince, who was heading postward off two straight mile victories, was backed down to the \$5 choice to win the route. Sailing Master was the second favorite at 3-1.

With less than three furlongs remaining in the race, he moved on the leaders to draw alongside them as the field rounded the final turn.

Curtwince earned \$1,520 for his performance. Juvenile Championship conditions the son of Good Gaden for R.E. Stankard of Cleveland, Oklahoma.

Twisted Affair's second was worth \$55 to James Richey, who owns the horse in a partnership with Opal DeFlea of Ruidoso.

African Wind pocketed third-place money of \$34 under rider Carlos Rivas. Steve Farris is the trainer. Foreign Saint held on for fourth-place money with Sebastia Burges aboard.

Racing resumes next weekend at Sunland Park with 12-race programs scheduled Friday through Sunday beginning at 1 p.m. Satur-

day's card is highlighted by the \$10,000-added Ruidoso Handicap, featuring veteran quarter horses at 400 yards.

Sunday's headliner brings out Southwest stakes standout Oscar T. heading the field for the 56th running

of the Riley Allison Derby. The renewal of the mile-long stake offers more than \$44,000 in prize money.
